

Tis the season for migratory layoffs



Truck ruckus around cement corporation

Environmental coalition wants concrete changes to business operations

A plan to build a massive new warehouse on the Tenth Avenue Marine Terminal has reignited the fight over truck pollution in Barrio Logan. If approved by port commissioners, the Mitsubishi Cement Corporation warehouse, located along San Diego Bay and adjacent to Barrio Logan, would begin operations in 2023. The state will require more than half of vehicles sold to be zero emissions by 2035 and all of them by 2045. But when the cement trucks start rolling in two years, 2000 more monthly diesel truck trips — a 50 percent increase — will add to

overcome, and "use of zero emission trucks is likely still infeasible."

"Air pollution from diesel trucks is a very significant problem" in these portside communities, says Danny Serrano, a spokesman for Environmental Health Coalition, an advocacy group calling for a whole new zero emissions plan for the cement trucks. Cesar Chavez Park

Association of Governments, and the California Department of Transportation are considering "Harbor Drive 2.0," a new and improved haul road. Still, diverting trucks away from homes doesn't stop the drift of exhaust. The solution sought by the Environmental Health Coalition is an overhaul of the proposed zero

increasing number of zero emissions heavy duty trucks, getting to 100 percent by 2030. They recommend that charging facilities be installed in 2021, at least 30 percent of truck trips be electric when operations begin, and that there be a 10 percent increase each year after until all trucks meet the goal.

poor air quality throughout Barrio Logan and west National City, neighborhoods already among the most polluted in the state. Will zero-emissions trucks spare the air? Not any time soon, a feasibility study has found. Heavy duty electric trucks capable of hauling cement "are not commercially available today." By 2023, the outlook is better, but barriers such as range, vehicle cost and charging must be

and Pier are about 1500 feet to the southeast of the warehouse, and several schools are nearby. Serrano says children in Barrio Logan have 2-3 times more asthma than the county average. "These trucks will make it so much worse. The city council passed a resolution in 2018 to divert trucks away from the neighborhood, but some drivers ignore it, says the coalition. Currently the Port of San Diego, the San Diego

emissions vehicle strategy. "The only requirement proposed thus far is one demonstration electric truck," Serrano says.

The zero emissions feasibility study, conducted by two consultants hired by the port district, found that battery electric trucks currently have low feasibility for both the 130-mile and 300-mile range. But Serrano says the project's average daily range is 124 miles, and there are several zero emissions trucks available now that can handle that without recharging. "This was backed up by the Port's subsequent zero emissions vehicle feasibility study." These trucks are available today, and many more options are expected by 2023, he adds. The group is urging Port staff to require a different plan that would call for an

The challenge is about logistics, not feasibility, Serrano says. It requires businesses to change their operations to accommodate electric trucks.

The Port's response to the call for the cleanest possible trucks is that the mitigation measures proposed are more than sufficient. At least 90 percent of the trucks loading cement at the terminal must have an engine "that emits no more than would be expected of a 5-year-old truck during the entirety of project operations. These measures are well beyond the requirements of the District's Clean Truck Program, as well as CARB's drayage truck, and truck and bus rules."

Gloria nabs gab gal

Faulconer flack finds new flock

Those looking forward to the end of the era of Republicans Jerry Sanders and Kevin Faulconer — whose lack of transparency

is widely seen as responsible for a broad range of municipal malfeasance, from streetlight spycams to the 101 Ash Street debacle — may have a long wait in store. Judging by a host of recent appointments by soon-to-be Democratic mayor Todd Gloria, city hall's secrecy business may go on as before.

There is Jen Lebron, Gloria's newly minted communications director, an ex-Union-Tribune scribe who first signed aboard at the city as Faulconer's press secretary in 2014. She made \$96,992 in pay and benefits as mayor representative 2 in 2016, according to TransparentCalifornia.com. In 2017, Lebron got a raise to \$110,250, then was jumped to \$112,758 as a Program Coordinator in 2018, having been elevated by Faulconer to director of public safety and neighborhoods services policy and LGBT liaison in 2016. By 2019, she was the

city's digital strategy manager. Last year, she pulled down the handsome sum of \$145,623 with the official title of program manager,

Lebron became noted for her February 2017 response to Reuters regarding the rollout of a vast video surveillance network atop city streetlights. "It's anonymous data with no personal identifiers," Lebron was quoted as saying. (A few months year earlier, streetlight camera staffer Lorie Cosio-Azar said in a December 2017 internal white paper, "Video data from digital smart city infra-

structure will make it easier to identify, and, therefore, arrest criminals.") As first reported here, the real story was far different from the one Faulconer wanted portrayed, though the truth remained hidden until San Diego police finally fessed up and released a detailed surveillance policy in February 2019. That document, dated February 3, more than a month after a January 3 request by the Reader under the California **Public Records Act for spycam** records, showed the surveillance effort's true nature. "The video and related images from the cameras onboard the City's intelligent streetlight sensors may be accessed exclusively for law enforcement purposes with the Police Department as the custodian and departmental owner of these records," said the policy. Audio from the City's intelligent street-

UNDER THE RADAR

Highs and low of health tour-

ISM Hard hit by the covid-19 pandemic, the *Union-Tribune* is reaching out to Tijuana's medical tourist trade for new advertising revenue in a deal with the website San Diego Red. "The collaboration will inform and educate readers about advantages and benefits of traveling south of the border for medical services," says a *U-T* display ad. "Comparable treatments in the U.S. are usually 60 to 80 percent higher than in Mexico. That is partly because of higher

overhead, salaries, and educational expenses in the United States, along with the high cost of malpractice insurance, not required in Mexico. The expenses of medical tourism destinations — travel, lodging, procedures, and a vacation-like experience — is often cheaper than the treatment alone in the United States."

The pitch seems to some to ironically harken back to November 2017, when San

Diego's tax-financed tourism authority put up \$100,000 to promote DestinationCare San Diego, a promotion pitching the super-rich on the notion of coming to the region for state-of-the-art, high-dollar treatment. "Planning a visit to San Diego? Hit the beaches. Check. Spend a day at the zoo or a theme park. Check. Sample craft beer. Check. Book a stay at a local hospital for cutting-edge cardiac or cancer treatment?" asked a November 6, 2017, *U-T* dispatch.

"Medical tourism in a lot of people's minds is where can I get inexpensive care. This isn't about getting a new set of teeth for half price," **Tom Gehring**, an ex-chief executive of the San Diego County Medical Society and interim

executive director of DestinationCare, told the paper. "It's about why should I go to San Diego for the best possible treatment on the West Coast."

But not much happened after the flashy rollout. In December 2018, PR man **Peter MacCracken** told the San Diego Business Journal, "Short answer is that this is harder than we might have thought. Going forward, we are also looking at more aggres-

sive marketing, though what (that) means is not yet determined." These days, a link to the DestinationCare website touted by the U-T no longer works.

Herb Klein's ghost Postmortems regarding the sweep of San Diego city races by an array of Democrats have avoided discussing one of the biggest reasons for the bloodbath Republicans suffered in November: the slow demise of the *Union-Tribune*. A prior

owner **Douglas Manchester**, a Republican stalwart, repeatedly bragged of using the paper on behalf of his political agenda. He imported take-no-prisoners reporter **Trent Seibert** and conservative columnist **Steve Greenhut** to go after Democrats. (Seibert returned to Dallas following the special election run-off of 2014, in which Republican **Kevin Faulconer** bested Democrat **David Alvarez** for mayor. The Texan died of heart disease in August 2018 at the age of 47. Hired by Manchester at the beginning

of the mayoral election season in July 2013, per his LinkedIn profile, Greenhut left the paper in February 2016 to become western regional director of R Street Institute, a self-styled libertarian think tank.

Three years before Manchester, there was the Copley Press, run by **Jim Copley** and his second wife Helen as the region's GOP Central, where **Herb Klein**, a company scribe whose services Copley "lent"

from time to time to **Richard Nixon**, served his last days as the editor in chief. "Ostensibly a working news reporter, Klein would be remembered for his...extraprofessional contribution to the campaign," wrote Nixon biographer **Roger Morris** of Klein's Nixonian role.

A last hurrah of sorts for the *U-T*'s downballot kingmaking came this August when GOP council candidate **Noli Zosa** claimed on his ballot statement that he had been endorsed by the paper. Zosa's Democratic opponent **Raul Campillo** went to court, noting Zosa's endorsement was only for the primary and that the newspaper had yet to express a general election preference. In the end, the *U-T* did pick

Zosa for the runoff, saying in an October 23 editorial that Campillo "seemed at times peevish and curt" during an interview with the opinion staff.

During the *U-T*'s golden years, such a personal swipe would likely have been enough to undermine a budding Democratic candidate. But in November, Campillo swept past Zosa to take the Seventh District seat, 40 to 33 percent. Now Zosa, part-owner of the

Dirty Birds bar and grill chain, has started a legal defense fund, which he registered with the city clerk's office on November 30, in a bid for donors to cover the costs of his summer court battles.

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


One. No trying to change the past, present, or future. This isn't even about paradoxes, of better uses for a time machine than try-

Beach walk proves fruitful The sea gives up its produce

On November 21, Jennifer McDaniel and her dog Hilda noticed apples, oranges, bananas, limes, eggplants, mangos, avocados, and pineapples scattered along the shoreline "by the art installation." She snapped a photo, then posted it onto Facebook asking, "Anybody know what it's about?" "It was strange," she told me later. "It almost seems like it could've been some kind of religious offering/homage from what I gathered from commenters' experiences. There was also mention of similar arrangements the same night and early morning."

McDaniel has lived in the southernmost city in California since 1982; this was her

first time witnessing remnants of the "produce polluters." But for Anne Pilgrim, the scattered produce isn't such an anomaly. We spoke after she and her friend strolled the beach as a cool-down following a workout. "We usually see this; in fact, we laughed because the week before it was mostly vegetables. Usually, it's spread out along the shoreline." Pilgrim has lived in IB for 33 years. She sent me a photo that appears to depict the same fruits and veggies that McDaniel posted online. "I've been seeing them for ten years or more," Pilgrim continued. "If you've been traveling in international waters and you dock in San Diego, or wherever, you have to go through customs. And just like at land and air crossings, you can't bring certain foodstuffs into the U.S., no matter where you obtained it originally. So they dump it in the ocean." Some online

commenters had suggested that deep-sea fishing boats might have dumped the food, but Pilgrim opined, "Fishing boats tend to run lean. With the amount of stuff I see, it makes me think it's the cruise ships, especially since now they're anchored offshore."

> Multiple beach strollers and joggers corroborated this theory online, saying they'd witnessed increased fruits and veggies scattered or washed-up along the IB shoreline and beaches.

> On Thanksgiving, Carolyn Flores saw one of the photos showing fruits and vegetables strewn along the beach just south of the Imperial Beach Pier. "I was outraged to see that somebody could throw away food when there are families that are in dire need," she recalls. Flores is the founder of the Hope Project, "a drivethrough food distribution services for families in need." Since the shutdown in March. Flores has provided IB residents and visitors with boxes of vegetables and fruits, and canned goods from her IB home and the Cavalry IB chapel on Impe-

rial Beach Boulevard, two blocks east of the pier. Flores, her friends, and family connect recipients with food boxes every Monday and Thursday, with one stipulation:

with little kids; they can't return to work because there's no daycare taking children."

Upon seeing the photo, "I'm like, 'Oh my goodness, everyone's going to think the produce is from our food boxes.' Then I realized there were pineapples on the beach, and we don't give out pineapples." Whatever the source, says Flores, "It breaks my heart to see this. The people throwing away the fruits and vegetables can reach out to us. Our chapel's close to the beach."

Fair Unfair? **Ex-employees say institutional** sickness set in well before covid

Covid-triggered cancelations pushed the Del Mar Fairgrounds into a \$10 million deficit as of September, but two former fairground employees claim that that the fairgrounds governing board and its staff were headed for a fall even without the virus. They tell tales of free cars, drinking on the job, loosey-goosey accounting, and a system where friends of managers were rewarded while others were fired. They also say that although the Del Mar Fairgrounds operates with the supposed oversight of the governor, its free-wheeling management practices would never be tolerated in official California work environments. The two were employed by the 22nd District Agricultural Association, which had a fulltime staff of 153 at the beginning of 2020. The crew ran the Fair and oversaw the yearround operations of the 370-acre fairgrounds. Last month, 91 of those employees were terminated. Many of them signed agreements promising not to talk about their termination.

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

The two who are speaking up for this article agreed to do so did so on the condition their names not be used.

Both claim that general manager Tim Fennell was forced into an early retirement three years before he reached the 30-year mark. Employee A says Fennell got a gym built on the fairgrounds. "He was very cheap. He didn't want to pay to go to Frog's [a private Solana Beach gym], so he had a gym built at the west end of the grandstand. He'd go there every day. The rest of the staff could use it if they got a \$5 pass." The former staffer says certain vendors and contractors who got lucrative exclusive contracts to do business for the fair didn't have to follow the rules. "It was the same contractors year after year. If new contractors wanted to come in, the staff would tell the existing contractor what the bid was so they could beat it... And the general manager [Fennell] and the two deputy GMs were given cars. Why would they need cars when almost all the meetings were held on the Fairgrounds? Maybe it wasn't illegal, but it just didn't smell right." The Del Mar Fairgrounds general manager reports to a ninemember board; its members are appointed by the governor. "When [attorney] David Watson resigned from the board, he said he was leaving because of misappropriation of funds and bad management," says employee A about Watson's departure in April. "They are now saying everything is crashing because of covid. But it really started tanking four years ago. They kept seeing a decline in horse racing, which was no surprise, yet they kept borrowing money. That's when they started talking about making loans against existing bonds." Responding to one doomsday scenario, Employee A says, "I would hate to see a developer get a hold of that property. My own thinking is that maybe the 22nd DAA should just go away and the fairgrounds should be run by the Del Mar Thoroughbred Club."

Employee B maintains that last month's employee bloodbath cut out some competent staff. "They got rid of all accounting people who actually knew what was going on." The former employee said honest account staffers were sometimes rebuffed by their superiors. "Managers would turn in falsified travel claims. They would use the same receipt that someone else had already used. We would bring it up and nothing would happen. Why isn't the state sending in people to do an audit so they can see what is actually being done? I know for a fact that people contacted Sacramento and nothing ever happened." The former staffer also maintains Tim Fennell's employment roster was huge.

"They had 150-plus people. What did they need all those people for? Other fair districts have a fraction of what we had. A lot of them were paid really well, like \$60,000 to \$90,000... And when they started firing people, they didn't care about seniority. It should be last to be hired, first to be fired. But here, it was if you



She says it is important to think about new ways to oversee how the Fairgrounds are run, and that she wants to help create a new consortium of local leaders from the adjacent cities (San Diego, Del Mar, Solana Beach), incoming county supervisor Terra Lawson-Remer, elected state officials, the governor's office, and the Del Mar Fair board. "Let's craft a new business plan and create a new business model as the governor has requested." Heebner says it is clear covid will not be over by the summer. "I think it's safe to say we will go another year without a fair as we used to know it. And we will not have horse racing with spectators anytime soon. How long can the fairgrounds survive in this manner?" Heebner says the Fairgrounds must always be available for evacuation. Besides that, she thinks everything else should be on the table as to how the Fairgrounds should be used going forward. "I really don't want to see it morph into one big concert venue. What does that have to do with agriculture?" Heebner says live music was increasingly added in the '90s to bring in more revenue. "I think we have to ask ourselves, 'Is that really what we want that property to be used for?" The Fairgrounds is hoping to get millions in bailout assistance from both the state and the federal government in the next few months.

The fair board was rebuffed in June when it asked the Orange County fair board for a \$5 million loan. Meanwhile, "drive-in concerts" have been scheduled, including local reggae band Iration on December 5, former members of Oingo Boingo December 11, and *The Nutcracker*, staged by City Ballet of San Diego, December 19.

Replying to the former employees' claims, Del Mar Fairgrounds marketing director Jennifer Hellman says that the fair maintains a sponsorship agreement with Chevrolet that includes the use of six courtesy vehicles. "These vehicles are used for various purposes including use by the executive staff, educational program outreach staff, and sign shop staff." She says the Fairgrounds follow a competitive bidding process for its vendors and contractors. "In the case of an IFB (invitation for bid), the contract is awarded to the qualified bidder with the lowest responsive and responsible bid, or in the case of a twotier RFP (request for proposal), the contract is awarded based on both an evaluation of the proposers technical ranking and lowest cost." Regarding the claims of fake travel reimbursements, Hellman responds: "Fairgrounds employees submit travel reimbursements using the Travel Claim form and following CalHR travel claim procedures." She says that employees were not "fired....We did lay off 60% of our permanent staff as well as 99% of our seasonal/temporary staff for a total reduction of 85% of our total workforce. For these layoffs, the Fairgrounds strictly followed instructions provided in the Layoff Manual published by CalHR." Finally, she denies there were any "loans against bonds," adding: "The current existing debt includes a combination of investments in revenue-generating facility improvements, infrastructure maintenance and upkeep projects, and legally-mandated environmental improvement projects."

Moon shot

The back of Amethel Parel-Sewell's business card for Light Chasers (a learning community of photographers) lists 22 elements of a photograph, from Composition and Color to Tones and Texture, with stops at Emotion, Light, and Subject along the way. But she says that for her, "the most important is Moment. One of my personal heroes in photography is Henri Cartier-Bresson. He's one of the founders of photojournalism, and he coined the idea of the decisive moment. Photography is capturing this fleeting fraction of a second in time so that it lives in eternity. All of the craft work that goes into making a photograph — the technical and creative process — is ultimately about capturing that moment the way you've envisioned it."

On November 28th, I happened upon Parel-Sewell as she was doing just that: capturing the moment the moon rose behind the cross atop Mt. Helix. "That alignment happens only once every two years. I shot it two years ago, but the conditions were more difficult. I had to wait to get another shot at it. I see the cross from my house every day; it's part of my environment. And every day, I would dream of that shot. Every time I see the moon rising, it kind of takes my breath away. I teach photography and judge at the Fair, but this I do for myself. It's like therapy. I love it because it gives me this kind of transcendent feeling. To witness this cosmic connection" — the moon touching the earth — "makes me feel alive. It's like a connection to the divine, if that makes any sense."

I know whereof she speaks. That same weekend, my 11-year-old called the family outside to see the ring around the moon — a corona that seemed to open a hole in the sky, revealing a blacker blackness beyond the surrounding night. The kids compared it to the shadow of a descending saucer;

the wife said it looked like the opening act of judgment day. Everyone stayed standing outside, chilled but transfixed, jaws hanging, necks crimping. We picked up on the transcendence, but my photo...did not capture the moment.

"I like to shoot the moon interacting with the environment," says Parel-Sewell. "I started

course, is hard to come by; as she says, "this kind of photography is 80 percent planning." First, there is the matter of equipment. "To achieve the ratio where you get a giant moon over a landscape, you have to have a long focal length, at least 500 millimeters, and

as a photojournalist, and to me, authenticity is key. Often, people will just Photoshop a moon into a scene. But when the moon interacts with the buildings and landscape, you can't fake that. The environment won't take in the light in a natural way." Authenticity, of

you have to shoot from a distance." (Alpine Avenue is over a mile away from the cross.) Next is the matter of timing. "The moon rises so fast; if you're trying to get an exact alignment, you have to be in the exact right place at the exact right time." Happily, there's

an app for that: PlanIt! for Photographers, which allowed her to pick the landmark she wanted to shoot (the cross), find the moment of moonrise, and then figure out the precise spot from which to shoot (a concrete slab jutting out from the road). "Five seconds later, and it would have been off center."

But it's the other 20 percent, after you've done your planning and picked your spot, that's the tricky part. "You're in a spiritual mode, but your technical ability has to be on in the moment. Every landscape is different. You have to shoot so the moon is in focus, and so that its highlights aren't blown out in comparison to what is usually a darker scene. You have to consider ambient light."

As noted, she didn't always pursue such elevated material. "I've wanted to be a photographer since I was 10, and I got my training in photojournalism at Western Kentucky University." There, "I fell in love with anthropology and folk studies, and so my interest was in documenting peoples and cultures, and landscapes and ways of life. I see myself as a lifelong learner, and photography was a conduit for that. I loved photojournalism, but I got burned out; it was exhausting. Since coming to San Diego in 2013, I've been able to get back into photography the way in which I intended." Why? "I've traveled the world. The light here in San Diego is the most magical that I've ever experienced. My family came here on a visit from the Midwest, and as soon as I crossed the bridge from the airport to the parking lot, there was this breeze that came through, and the palm trees started dancing in this golden light. I looked at my husband and said, 'This place is magical.' Not just the light; the diversity of the landscapes. It's unmatched." ■

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
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

Don't Hate, Collaborate

Bishop McElroy stresses need for cooperation with Catholic president-elect, despite differences

The Catholic Church teaches that abortion is "gravely contrary to the moral law," that formal cooperation in an abortion results in excommunication, and that "the law must provide appropriate penal sanctions for every deliberate violation of the [unborn] child's rights." Catholic President-elect Joe Biden begs to differ, which is why San Diego's Bishop McElroy said that the Church in America needs "to be frank and forthright in its sharp disagreement with the President-elect's position." But he also highlighted areas where he hoped that fruitful collaboration would be possible: climate change and "the searing questions of racial justice and division." The bishop said he expected some pushback on his comments, "just like when I partnered the diocese with Planned Parenthood as part of our outreach to women in crisis. Some people noted that Planned Parenthood is the largest single abortion provider in the nation, and that it passes out artificial contraception, which the Church also condemns. But you can't deny the value of the other medical services they provide, often free of charge, to the women of our community. Or when we brought in Black Lives Matter representatives to help us understand systemic racism in our parishes. Sure, they explicitly seek to disrupt the nuclear family and they're founded by a trained Marxist. But you have to look at the whole picture. Otherwise, you're liable to end up praising Donald Trump for putting another pro-life Catholic on the Supreme Court. And besides, what else are we going to do? It's not like we have some kind of institutional authority over Biden or anything."

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
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THE DREADED PURPLE TIER WAS BACK.

This would be the final weekend before the most severe social distancing rules would again suspend indoor operations at restaurants and bars

on November 14, potentially shutting down countless local happy hour specials. I hit the phones thinking I was simply building a database of drink specials still being offered despite the pandemic. Instead, I got a virtual tour of a bar-business battlefield.

We went into 2020 with over 400 happy hour specials listed on *SanDiegoReader.com*. You can imagine how much work it requires

to call hundreds of venues and confirm upto-the-minute data. It used to be an all-week gig, completed top-to-bottom four times each year, and I'd come out of those phone sessions

My home office was so whisper quiet, you'd have thought I was phoning to offer condolences regarding deceased loved ones. In a sense, I was.

with a voice husky enough to pull a dog sled. Not so much from talking to that many people, over a short period, but from having to talk so *loudly*. Any place with a successful happy hour is going to be noisy most any time you call. Before the pandemic, I had to pose happy hour queries over the phone at a volume usually only heard from ex-spouses, heavy metal singers,

and hyperactive children. I was often forced to repeat each question multiple times, getting exponentially louder with each query. That didn't happen this last time. My home office was so whisper quiet, you'd have thought I was phoning to

offer condolences regarding deceased loved ones. In a sense, I was.

When the first pandemic shutdown happened, we had to cut the 400-item happy hour

database back to around 140 specials. Those were a lot of grim phone calls. The happy hour tally was slowly starting to rise again when the restrictions were reinstated in San Diego, which left around 79 confirmed specials. The weekend of November 14, as our city prepared to slink back into the purple penalty box, ended with only 52 active happy hours.

In University Heights, Small Bar & Grill was still reeling from a week's closure due to an employee testing positive for covid-19 when the newest restrictions were announced. The bar. which has been in business a little over a decade, confirmed on November 12 that it would be closing.

Phil's BBQ is managing to keep several of its locales open, though the San Marcos branch announced on November 13 that it was shutting down. "I feel like the prudent thing to do is to step away and look for other opportunities in the North County area," said owner Phil Pace on Facebook (where he also admitted that locale's lease is almost up).

announced its impending closure, perhaps for good, just before the purple axe fell, and nearby Mother's had already been shuttered. Martinis Above Fourth in Hillcrest is now closed and reportedly seeking Chapter 7 bankruptcy protection.

North Park's Bar Pink tried but failed to hang in there with cocktails-to-go and concert livestreams staged in the mostly empty venue. That tack seems to work moderately well for the Belly Up in Solana Beach, bound patrons a whole selection of previously archived livestreams. Nearby Tiger! Tiger! didn't quite make its ten vear anniversary before shutting down.

Other venues that recently suspended their drink specials or appear to be shortening their hours or closing, at least temporarily, include Encinitas Ale House, Tin Roof, Pacific Beach Shore Club, Wonderland Ocean Pub, and Guava Beach Bar & Grill.

Many bars which

hour specials several nights each week have cut back to only a single day, usually their slowest, such as the Local Pacific Beach, where the sole discount is on Monday (half off appetizers). The Old Town Mexican Café gets happy only on Tuesdays when their 50 percent discounts on well drinks and selected appetizers run all day.

Happy Hours are also scheduling much earlier, going from a prepandemic average of 7 to 10pm to specials that frequently end before sunset. "We close two hours earlier now" one server told me, "which means there's not enough time between getting off work and 6 o'clock to get totally wasted for happy hour. That makes the roads around here a lot safer at night, but we're pretty much emptied out after the dinner rush."

As the pandemic drags on, bars and restaurants are trying to jury-rig a failing life support system, and happy hours are the least of their worries. More than one audio interviewee became annoyed with me for pes-

tering them with apparent penny-pinching. One bartender complained the way someone usually does from the seated side of a bar rail, telling me "It's bad enough that the governor keeps dangling my job in front of me like a yoyo, but I actually voted for the guy."

I never could have imagined myself saying "I'm sorry" to so many people, so many times, over such a short space of time. During a previous happy hour purge, someone answering the phone at one bar flat out told me to "knock that shit off, nobody's happy for a whole hour anymore."

According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, over 600,000 working U.S. bartenders were on the payroll at the beginning of 2020. Until recently, tending or owning a bar, with or without food service,

must have seemed like one of the greatest jobs ever. A party every day, and eternally in demand. The world will always need someone to pour it a stiff drink, right? Look what happened

when they tried to ween America off the barley teat with Prohibition, when getting busted with a bottle of giggle juice was no laughing matter and could land you in prison. Not only did that not stop people from drinking, but a whole new underground subculture was created of liquored up lawbreakers.

Kind of like Covid Cocktail Parties. Oh sure, nobody calls them that. But when you see online posts or receive private messages with coded how-to-attend invitations to a formerly public venue, now privately hosting a "membership only" drink-athon replete with happy hour specials and live music, I know it makes me feel like ordering a month's worth of groceries, locking the door, and filling the bathtub with hand sanitizer.

I found a married couple willing to tell me about attending a County bar that threw up so much subterfuge to off both entrances visadmittance was through in an adjoining building, a valid ID, a confirmed password, and 50 bucks That earned customers the right to saddle up to a bar full of disease vector daredevils doing approxi-

mately the same thing in the same bar that, back in February, wasn't even asking a cover charge on live music nights. "It's impossible to

keep anything a secret nowadays with social media," says husband "Jack," "so there were people trying to get in all night. They had it peaked out at 50 people [the venue capacity is over 200] but there wasn't anything like spaces roped off between chairs and tables, and almost nobody was wearing a mask other than whoever worked there."

Were all the employ-

ees wearing masks? "I think so, the bartenders definitely were, and all the bouncers had on hospital gloves." I asked if that meant bouncers were daring to touch patrons, patting them down. "No, not at all, I think the gloves were because they were handling the cash too. I didn't see anybody get searched or bounced."

According to his wife "Jill," "I saw a few people putting on masks and then taking them off or pulling them down to talk and drink, at least early on. I'd say, by ten o'clock, the only people still wearing masks were the bartenders and security. It's hard to fight peer pressure."

When it comes to employees wearing masks, management doesn't always provide a clear and guiding light. "Our staff all wears masks at all times," one phone responder told me at the end of a long list of on-site happy hour safety protocols, adding, "Even though one of the owners believes that masks scare off the customers." One longtime bartender friend of mine is so fed

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

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up with the ever-changing covid restrictions that he's ready find another line of work. He says he's lost count of how many customers have fought with him over masks or requests to physically distance. As for me, I lost track of how many people told me about angry bar patrons threatening to spit on them.

Of course, any job requiring contact with the public carries a high risk for infection. That probably explains the rising popularity of local-centric happy hours on Zoom, FaceTime, and Google Hangout.

Splash Wine Lounge & Bistro regularly has a virtual Play 'N' Sip wine lounge where you can pick up your drink flights and bingo grids ahead of time, and then enjoy your happy hour from home with an online group of likeminded wine loving

players. Wine Not, Wine Now offers online and inhome wine tasting via their *travelingvineyard. com* website, courtesy of a growing army of independent party hosts.

Local nonprofit Serving Seniors hosts a frequent Sips For Seniors virtual happy hour, a recurring online fundraising event which trades delivery and pickup cocktails for donations that support low-income and homeless seniors. Women in Bio ("Promoting diversity and inclusion for women in the life sciences") mounts Virtual Sip and Paint Nights on Zoom, during which local artist instructors help these science ladies with a painting project paired with a drink selection.

Knotty Barrel downtown is one of the few bars whose discount specials have remained mostly unchanged for over a year, with \$2 off craft beer and \$6 wells and wines running Monday through Friday from 4 to 7 pm. At Ambrogio15 in Pacific Beach, the longtime weekday wine specials are matched to a selec-

tion of appetizers at a \$19 per-person price from 3 until 5 pm.

Other venues have maintained happy hour specials on the same days as previously, but with heavily reduced windows of opportunity that make the term "happy hour" more literal than usual.


Mavericks Beach Club in PB is discounting drinks from 5 until 6 pm, and only on weekday afternoons, but with a generous variety of reduced price items such as \$4 beer, wine, and wells; and \$6 margaritas and mai tais. The Crossings at Carlsbad is offering their two-forone discount on the Weekend Brunch Special (bottomless mimosas, Bloody Marys, and Sangria) for just a half hour each Saturday, between 8 and 8:30 am.

Hooleys offers a Friday food special, but the only liquor discounts are on slow Sunday mornings with \$4 Bloody Marys and \$5 Champagne. Ditto for Bootlegger in East Village: one day for happy hour food (\$10 build-your-own-nachos and beer all

day Tuesday) and a weekend bottomless mimosa special (\$25 per person).

You can find two hours' worth of weekday afternoon drink specials at most Cheesecake Factories (\$3.95-\$4.95 select beer bottles and drafts), as well as in Pacific Beach at Latitude 32 (\$3-\$5.50 wine and beers), Point Loma's The Wine Pub (\$5 craft drafts and select wines), Vintana in Escondido (\$8 martinis), and in Mission Valley with McGregor's Grill and Ale House (\$1 off beer and wines, \$5 off half-gallon pitchers), all running from 4 until 6 pm. North Park's Redwing Bar & Grill hosts a 3 to 6 pm happy hour Wednesday through Friday, with \$4.50 Tall Boys and another slightly different special each afternoon, mostly favoring domestic beers.

The majority of San Diego's other still-extant drink specials run three to four hours, with a handful offered all day, for example the noon until 6 pm selections at King and Queen Cantina in Little Italy with \$1 off drafts, \$4 beer bottles, and

A (very) few venues are offering live music again, albeit on a limited basis. Arrowood Golf Course in Oceanside has been hosting an occasional happy hour with Cowboy Jack Johnson, aka the Singing Cowboy of Rawhide Ranch, with rotating drink specials averaging a buck off. El Cajon's Bull & Bourbon has a live acoustic music happy hour on Friday and Saturday nights, but the only discounts are Wednesday's \$29.99 surf & turf special.

Panama 66 is also unsure of upcoming happy hour plans; their Gilbert Castellanos Supper Club Jazz shows will continue with outdoor performances, but they currently don't handle cash, only credit cards and virtual payments, in order to lessen the risk of virus exposure.

One bar I called is hosting a live music happy hour, though with the caveat that "Wearing masks is optional in the bar area, but mandatory in the piano lounge."

When I asked why, I was told, "Because the piano player doesn't want to die."

Back at the beginning of 2020, San Diegans had no idea that it was the golden age of happy hours. In a city famed for craft beer and custom cocktails, everything from the barstool looked rosy. One hopes the local bar scene will someday at least resemble the way it was. This may be many days away, but bars will eventually need to lure back their old clientele. And don't forget, nearly a year's worth of Americans have reached legal drinking age during the pandemic. After all, nothing really goes away forever until its forgotten. And though we're in danger of forgetting what it's like to be happy, we won't forget happy hours

Mongaku

Needless to say, Buddhism, like other religions, helps to extirpate evil and to bring good fortune. Throughout its history in three countries, there are records of answers to prayer and of benefits received. If Your Highness will first pay strict attention to your own conduct and then proceed to put your administration in order, then when you offer prayer, an answer will come just as surely as sound follows when a word is spoken. There will be no failure. In these days, however, all religious works and rituals sponsored by the great are merely for the eye and are only an expense to the country and a burden to the people. Buddha and the deities do not accept them at all. Those who pray should know that Buddha and the deities accept only virtue and faith; material treasures have no appeal for them. It is with this in mind that Your Highness, at the head of your warriors, should guard the Emperor and become the mainstay of the whole nation.... It would be possible for me, without going into detailed reasons and unmindful of Buddha and the deities, to reply favorably to Your Highness and offer up prayers. But that would mean wasting the land's substance without benefiting anyone and only harming Your Highness. I myself would have to pay the penalty also. How can I permit Your Highness to carry out a project so injurious to yourself? I say again that the Goddess of Ise and Hachiman and the other deities will never consent to be indulgent because of material offerings, they extend their hands only to those whose heart is pure and whose conduct is proper. The Bodhisattva Hachiman said, according to the oracle, "Even if I should have to drink molten copper, I would not accept offerings from those whose hearts are tainted." He said again, according to another oracle, "Day and night I stand guard over the land If the

ruler is evil, he will be unpleasing to the Three Treasures and to all the Devas. Such a thing would be most lamentable, most deplorable."

Mongaku (1139-1203) was a Japanese Buddhist monk. Early on in life he learned about the emptiness of human selfishness. Mongaku was a strident defender of Esoteric Shingon Buddhism - which believe that enlightenment was obtainable by all, not just by the select few – but required true piety, as testified by his berating of the Shogun (who were military defenders of the emperor – and de facto rulers of Japan). The Shingon system also placed a premium on training under the guidance of earthly mentors and spiritual models. As part of this training, initiates are blindfolded before tossing a flower upon the Womb Realm mandala; the location of the flower upon landing determines which Buddhist figure pictured in the mandala will become a spiritual model for the initiate.

OUTDOORS

Poinsettias, a favorite of backyard gardeners, are now exhibiting their scarlet, petal-like bracts, just in time for the holidays. The onset of 14-hour-long nights triggers their behavior: In San Diego this condition is met just before the date of winter solstice - Monday, December 21.

Exceptionally High and Low Tides are set to occur on several

days in mid-December. These tides approximately coincide with the winter solstice — two factors that influence tide-level extremities. On Sunday, December 13, a peak high tide of +7.5 feet occurs at 7:37 a.m. Monday's high tide of +7.62 peaks at 8:18 a.m. Tuesday's high tide of +7.51 feet peaks at 9:00 a.m. Wednesday's high tide of +7.18 feet crests at 9:42 a.m. There are at least two consequences of such high tides. If any strong winter storm happens to arrive from the west during these peak tides, some flooding of low-lying coastal areas around San Diego is likely. On the brighter side, birdwatchers have an opportunity to spot species of rare shorebirds that get pushed to the edges of local bays and coastal marshes by the high water. Several exceptionally low tides will also occur within the same string of mid-December dates. On Sunday, December 13, the tide falls to -1.71 feet at 2:42 p.m. On Monday, the tide drops to -1.89 feet (almost as low as it can possibly go) at 3:28 p.m. On Tuesday, a low tide level of -1.81 feet occurs at 4:14 p.m. On Wednesday, the tides drops to -1.51 feet at 5:00 p.m. (very near the time of sunset). Any of these lowtide occasions are perfect for exploring marine life in the tidepool areas along San Diego County's coastline.

Ripening Palm Fruit, hanging in great clusters on California's native fan palms (Washingtonia filifera), can be seen (and tasted) this month. The black, pea-sized fruit consists of a deliciously sweet but almost paper-thin skin surrounding a hard seed. (These are not "California dates" — the fruit of cultivated palms introduced into California's deserts from northern Africa.) Our native fan palms can be seen in their natural habitat in about two dozen canyons within Anza-Borrego Desert State Park. They have also been planted widely elsewhere in California, including along the main streets of Palm Springs.

Brewery taprooms don't stay closed for long

Sorrento Valley barrel aged sour beer maker California Wild Ales announced last week it will be opening a taproom in Ocean Beach. Actually, it's taking over the same Newport Avenue taproom originally opened by Helm's Brewing and eventually purchased by cannabis beer brand Two Roots Brewing Co.

Wild Ales cofounder Bill DeWitt, who lives in Ocean Beach, took note when Two Roots closed its taproom last month, and reached out to its ownership to inquire about the space. He says, "We feel that our style of beer will fit right in with the vibe of Ocean Beach, San Diego's funkiest neighborhood."

Cofounder Zack Brager notes they wasted no time locking down the venue, "Our leasing agent is in the same building as the property manager, so it worked out perfectly," he says. "We were able to start talks and scheduled a walkthrough before the space even hit the market."

Turns out, one beer company moving in to take over another's former taproom space has not been uncommon in 2020. In fact, the same thing just happened a hundred yards away. A half-block up Newport, the OB taproom of Solana Beach-based Culture Brewing Co. closed in April, only to reopen in October as Nova Easy Kombucha.

Nova Easy is the kombucha brand launched by Chula Vista beermaker Novo Brazil Brewing. Novo brought the location a vibrant, Brazilianinspired paint job and added coolers to sell its canned product to go. Though the venue takes its name from Novo's hard and soft kombucha lines, it serves everything under the Novo brand, from beer to hard seltzer.

Both Two Roots and Culture will continue on as beer companies, just not with a presence in Ocean Beach. The fact that their beer businesses are being replaced by beer businesses suggests location wasn't so much the problem as the arrival of covid-19.

That said, the pandemic's impact on the local beer industry has not been uniform. While several breweries have been forced to close or make cutbacks, others have successfully managed to pivot their businesses toward pandemic-friendly models, whether by increasing canned distribution, adding food service, expanding outdoor drinking options, or, in some cases, all three.

Burgeon Beer Company, for example. In a constant state of growth since its inception in 2016, Burgeon hasn't stopped for 2020. It's expanded the footprint of its Carlsbad brewery, taking over additional warehouse and parking lot space to keep up on-premise service, while enlisting on-site food vendors to remain compliant with current county regulations.

And, in late November, it took over the former home of Escondido Brewing Company. One of San Diego's tiniest breweries, Escondido Brewing closed permanently early in the pandemic. Burgeon has adopted Escondido's mostly outdoor drinking venue and rebranded it as The Oasis beer garden, serving fifteen taps of Burgeon beer, including limited amounts brewed on a small pilot system.

"The opportunity to open a tasting room in the previous Escondido Brewing facility came from an existing friendship with the

owners," says cofounder Matthew Zirpolo. "We are honored to carry on their legacy by bringing high-quality craft beer to the people of Escondido.'

In another case of taproom swaps, the former Bay Park home of **Benchmark Brewing** will become a new outpost of Scripps Ranch-based Harland Brewing Co. While Benchmark never had a chance to invest in its beer garden vision for the venue, the well-capitalized Harland is in a position to wring the most out of the space, during the pandemic and beyond.

With new shutdowns of drinking establishments likely happening through the end of the year, at least, it's too early to say that the local beer industry has survived this pandemic mostly intact. But, so far, it doesn't look as though we're going to lose too many beer drinking locations.

Bait, and Beer.' A poem!"

But does it mean it? I've already walked out past the Crab Shack and towards the Symphony's almost-ready sound shell by the bay.

"You start," says Annie. "I'm already eating."
All this fresh air, sunshine, water, trees, and space sharpen the hunger. And who isn't looking for eateries that cut down the covid risk? Pier, beer, and it's right here!

The sign's on a sandwich board that's been propped up where the cement trucks turn in to the construction site.

I come up past a kind of food trailer, to a patio with tables and chairs, and two five-sided store-rooms, except one's fitted out as a small cafe. And here, waiting behind a counter, stands Esmeralda, waiting to take orders. Plenty of other customers

mill around. I'm amazed, because this isn't exactly on the road to anywhere, except the fishing pier, ten yards further. Turns out most of the custom-

ers are guys from the construc-

Ooh. For starters, beer. Plenty of local-ish craft brews. And I see they have Lagunitas. I like Lagunitas, honestly, because of the address they put on their labels. "Petaluma Calif., Chicago Ill.,

USofA, Earth, Sol. Milky Way, Local Group, Virgo Supercluster, Space."

Pretty good IPA too. Not sure where in the Supercluster they found it. Costs \$7.50. A blue-and-white wall slides between us and the rest of

the world. Wow. *G. Poseidon*. It's a huge car-transportation ship sliding out towards the harbor entrance, just yards away.

Of course you've got to order food with your cerveza. Not a probbo for me. This is breakfast. It looks like most items are hot dogs and burgers. Also tacos (the *carnitas* costs \$5.75, the shrimp tacos are \$6.25), *ceviche tostada*'s \$7.25. A TJ hot dog's \$7.25. Cheapest is the Ball Park dog, \$3.50. Grilled cheese sandwich is \$6.25.

"What's most popular?" I ask Esmeralda. "Dogs? Kraken," she says. "Burgers? The Pastrami. It has beef and pastrami, and it will fill you up."

Hmm. But now I am definitely thinking dog. The Kraken is an "all-beef sausage with grilled shrimp, caramelized onions, corn and black bean salsa, creamy chipotle dressing, and red cabbage in a gourmet bun."

Costs — wow! — \$13.50. "It's a monster," says Esmeralda. "And the sausage is handmade, in our kitchen."

Maybe it's the beer, but for a moment I turn into a wild and crazy guy. "I'll take it!" I say. "And a fishing pole." I intend to catch something big as I chew before Annie turns up.

"Got four hands?" says Esmeralda.

"Will in a little while," I say. Of course I have to buy some bait. (Anchovies cost \$6.) And until Annie arrives, Esmeralda's right, I can't do it all at once. Natch, I ain't gonna release the Kraken. I'm going to eat it.

Esmeralda takes the order out to Adrian the cook standing beside the food trailer. And guess what? This combo in a folded-out hot dog bun is outstanding. And monster? I have to use the plastic knife and fork to cut it down to size. I'm doing this at the little patio they have. The sautéed shrimp are too wicked. Chipotle dressing's salmon pink and a nice mild add to the peppery rich dark sausage. Add the garlicky shrimp and I swear it's the perfect mouthful. This is one of the best hot dogs I can remember.

Sigh. Sloping sun bounces right off the Bay. In

the last of the warmth, I'm suddenly feeling nice and drowsy. If Annie wants to go fishing, she'd better move it. Or, maybe we'll do the fishing next time. If Esmeralda will let me return the bait.

In the end, Annie never does turn up. But I do. The dog was so good, I call back the next afternoon. I want to try that pastrami burger, because it's not just the salty brined beef, it's mixed with regular sirloin beef.

I call just in time. "We close at 4:30," says Esmeralda, "because that's when it starts getting dark. So really, we stop at four. Give me your order on the phone, and I'll have it ready when you come."

Can't argue with that. When I arrive the sky's already a rich orange over Coronado. Esmeralda collects the silver foil-wrapped pastrami burger from Adrian at the kitchen trailer, and I pay for it (\$12.50) and a St. Archer Hazy IPA (\$7.50). Oh, dang. Super good. Juicy, and not too pastrami-salty. Onions, tomato, lettuce, Swiss cheese, thousand island. So-oo good. And so totally filling. I swear, these two days have been some of the best eats in a while. Plus some of the best seats too, to catch the daily sunset

show. All we need is the music to start from that new sound shell

One of the hard hat guys comes for a beer and a snack. He looks back at the sound shell. It's glowing green in the dusk. "We built it, but we won't ever see it happening," he says. "Kind of concerts they're planning, not our scene."

Man. That's sad. Someone should talk to the symphony boss. Like, how about some blues in the green shell under the orange sky? ■

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Bread basket

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Izola lowers a breadbasket in **East Village**

On Thursday night, a few minutes before sunset, I found a parking spot at 13th and G Streets in

East Village, and called upstairs to let them know I had arrived. From the sidewalk I could see a rope and

pulley system rigged outside a third story window, with a basket attached. Within moments, a masked figure appeared in the window to place a pair of cardboard boxes in the basket, then lower it to

the street

As the basket descended, I could start to make out the sign fastened to it: Izola. When it reaches me, I pick out my boxes, which contain croissants and a loaf of sourdough bread.

Izola Bakery is the work of Jeffrey Lamont Brown, a local photographer who for the past couple decades has pieced together a notable career in fashion photography, photojournal-

ism, videography, and portraiture. Most of those years, he's lived and worked out of his Studio 710, a loft

right here on the third floor of 710 13th Street.

When the pandemic disrupted his photography business, Brown decided to pursue another interest to make ends meet: baking. When San Diego shutdown in March, he was traveling in Paris,

signs courting walk-in traffic up to his studio. However, the need for curbside pickup option led to the pulley and rope system. Customers order and pay for their baked goods online, which are ready to lower by basket about a half hour later.

Unlike most bakeries, which open in the early morning, Izola operates afternoons only: Wednesday through Friday from 3-6 pm. Brown spends his days baking a variety of rustic loaves from the same sourdough

starters. Options - which happen to be vegan — may include olive loaf (\$11), cranberry black walnut (\$12), and my choice, a simple toasted sesame (\$11). All have the name Izola baked into their sides.

up on my radar again in June, when the Black Lives Matter protests were surging nation-

wide, and it appeared on lists

Spoiled Vegans would show

at the moment and still sticking to its Monday-through-Sunday business hours. But, it wasn't sold our this time, so I finally had a chance to try the vegan world's answer to Egg McMuffins, ordered and paid for online, through Spoiled Vegans' web site.

Now if you've been to this stretch of 16th Street, East Village, south of Market Street, you already know: it's colored, luxury apartment tower, erected a couple years back as part of a broader East Village redevelopment plan. If a black-owned business selling vegan breakfast sandwiches from the base of a luxury highrise surrounded by shopping cart-pushing homeless people doesn't perfectly encapsulate the conflicting political realities of 2020, then I don't know

what does. With indoor dining shut down, the power of Spoiled Vegans — and surrounding food and beverage businesses — to revitalize this area will suffer a bit. But, in the meantime, the vegan café has a smooth, contact free take-out operation going for it. A small table, plexiglass shield, and shade structure are set up outside its front door. All I had to do was walk up

and give my name, and a bag containing my order was handed over to me. In other words, if you feel any distress about picking up food at this location, you probably needn't worry. The entire stop took less than three minutes, and that included time for me to snap a few photos.

Some of the food I took home did closely resemble a fast food breakfast. The café's signature Spoil Yourself breakfast sandwich (\$10) features vegan sausage, egg, and cheese, plus an air-fried hashbrown, served on a sourdough English muffin. That's served with the house maple mustard sauce, or maple chipotle.

I went for the latter, and the chipotle adds another dimension of flavor to a thick breakfast sandwich incorporating many, seeming to include sweet, sour, savory, bitter, and spice notes. Other breakfast sandwiches — such as those including vegan buffalo chicken patties, or black forest ham alternatives - go for something similar.

With the stack of animal protein substitutes and starch accumulated on such a plantbased breakfast sandwich, the

> flavor-forward recipes help distract from veganism's textural challenges. Really, it keeps the thing from tasting like a stack of potatoes and bread.

The Spoiled Vegans menu looks more streamlined than when I first heard about a pop up slinging waffle sandwiches. Hopefully once the pandemic

subsides, the cafe will branch

prep room, Brown prepares the sourdough at higher temperatures, then lowers the temperature intermittently to prepare ultrabuttery croissants. Available plain (\$5), or with a chocolate center (\$6), these things boast crispy crusts with soft, flaky

layers within. In other words, there's more to recommend these baked goods than the fact they drop from the sky.

Spoiled Vegans Cafe; 440 16th St., East Village. It wasn't long before the pandemic started that I first heard of Spoiled Vegans. At the time, the small business had been a pop-up business, serving plant-based breakfast sandwiches and waffles within an East Village coffee shop on weekends. A late morning attempt to try it left me empty handed, because the vegan fare had sold out. How often does that happen? I remember thinking.

of blackowned local restaurants. The business had kept going as a pop-up and bridged some of this pandemic year as a sort of ghost kitchen, selling pre-ordered vegan breakfasts for pick-up. And still likely to sell out.

Apparently, ties to its original pop-up location in East Village would remain — though the coffee shop is long gone, a Spoiled Vegans Cafe now operates a permanent storefront at the same address (440 16th Street). It's take-out only

in the thick of San Diego's skid row. As I parked in front of the tire shop across the street from Spoiled Vegans, an indigent, partially undressed older man stepped in front of my car to glower at me and grumble disjointed profanities.

By contrast, the Spoiled Vegans Cafe occupies the commercial ground level of a brightly

out once again for more wideranging vegan breakfast and lunch fare. But in the meantime, it does offer the unique Let Go of My Diego: sort of like a corn dog, but with vegan apple sage sausage in a waffle wrapper (\$7).

I picked up one of these hashmarked sausages on a stick with a side of the maple mustard. The clash of savory, sweet, and bitter flavors proved memorable, and coupled with a cup of coffee would make an ideal breakfast on the go, say for someone walking to work. Now if only any of us had any place left to go....

Persistent donut cravings lead to Copper Top

Copper Top Coffee and Donuts; 101 West Washington Street, Mission Hills. It was just one of those mornings everybody and their brother wanted donuts. Out on an early morning errand, I knew I would pass the bustling Solomon Bagels & Donuts on the way home. I even thought to call in an order ahead of time, but couldn't get through. When I arrived, I saw why: the line went out the door.

Okay, no problem. There are other donut shops in the world. A little farther west, I approached the Dunkin Donuts drive-thru in Hill-

crest. But the drive-thru was so backed up I couldn't even get into the parking lot. It's located across from a hospital between one-way streets, in the thick of Hillcrest traffic, so cars tend to back up down the block in the name of a sugar fix.

No big deal. Dunkin's donuts aren't good enough to warrant a sig alert. And I knew I could head a little farther west to reach another drive-thru donut opportunity in Mission Hills.

Copper Top Coffee and Donuts sits in the style of A-frame shack favored by fast-food hot dog chain Wiener-schnitzel. After that fast-food chain cleared out a few years back, this stand-alone coffee and donut shop took over its tiny kitchen, maintaining both the drive-thru and walk-up ordering windows.

Both especially handy features these days. Solomon is great, but its mask-wearing customers stand in lines that wind around the interior of the shop, and when hungry groups show up, most abandon any pretense of social distancing and try to cram themselves inside anyway. Dunkin, meanwhile, has had to build an ad hoc external shelter to control the flow of walk-in customers to its small operation.

Though Copper Top proves easier to access, don't expect the drive-thru line to move quickly. This isn't fast food. Rather than trays of readymade donuts sitting behind glass, it serves freshly baked cake donuts, each one glazed and otherwise dressed based on your order.

So if you ask for the signa-

ture Copper Top donut, for example, moments later it will be drizzled in salted caramel, slathered in maple cream, and dusted with espresso powder. Meanwhile, the better-than-it-sounds Dirt Pile will be frosted then dusted with a generous pile of Oreo cookie crumbles.

Now, these aren't the fluffy, raised donuts that get the most attention at Dunkin. Rather, they are cake donuts, baked and then frosted, which essentially means they're little, round cakes selling for two bucks apiece. They're a slightly different experience, and they look it. Especially the Everything Nice donut, which stacks slices of banana on top of nutella, then sprinkles it with granola.

Others are inspired by anything from bear claws to peanut butter and jelly sandwiches. My

personal favorite would be the s'mores inspired Camp Fire: spread with a layer of marshmallow fluff, drizzled with chocolate syrup, and dusted with graham cracker crumbles.

I'm not the driver

Originally from West Monroe, Louisiana, Ron Steven Houston is best known from his time playing with the Sickstring Outlaws, whose album Johnny Drank Jack was nominated Best Local Recording at the 2013 San Diego Music Awards. He was diagnosed with covid-19 at the end of October. "I suffered severe symptoms for almost two weeks: fever, chills, body aches, no taste or smell, and hallucinations from the daily fevers. I don't remember much about that two weeks of being insanely sick. My lungs are not the same, but seem to be slowly getting better. The coughing is not as bad as last week, but deep breaths are not easy. My smell and taste are not back all the way, but better than when they first went away."

Fatigue remains a major issue. "Doing simple things takes a lot out of me. Brain fog is another symptom that I'm battling. It's very frustrating to not feel like I'm in reality. I'm having short term memory problems, and I've had two very scary incidents while driving on the freeway, actually hitting a center divider because I was in a dream state and only snapped out of it when I hit the divider. The brain fog is the weirdest and scariest thing I've ever dealt with. That being said, I'm so

grateful to have survived the severe symptoms, but I'm definitely not the same person I was before getting covid-19. I have no idea how long these lingering symptoms will last, or what if any damage to my lungs, heart, or brain the virus may have caused. Only time will tell. I'm fighting every day."

Houston says he holds no ill will toward whoever gave him the virus. "I've been playing the risk game and it caught me...I tried my best to be safe but, as a singer, was not able to wear a mask while singing. I blame nobody for this. I know I got the virus playing out. I love trying to give my friends and family time away from whatever problems they may be experiencing in their lives by playing music for them. I knew there were risks, but was willing to take those risks to put smiles on my friends' faces. I assume all responsibility for catching this very real and very damaging virus."

Houston has released several albums with the Sickstring Outlaws, as well as contributing music for Buckshot: The Movie, which includes a Sickstring original as well as Houston singing a song written by director Josh Smith. They also collaborated with Liberty Call Distilling to produce their own brand of liquor called Electric Moonshine, which is sold online, in

stores, and at shows.

His upcoming solo album is called A Long Road Home. "It's my first ever solo CD. I've been sober for over a year now, for the first time since I was 14, and started writing

> songs to keep my mind busy. I kept wondering how my fans who know me from the Sickstring Outlaws would take my new musical direction, which is more like John Prine and Ryan Bingham. One day on my walk, I had almost talked myself out of doing a solo CD, and I turned onto a street and there was a car with the license plate that read 'Ballads.' I knew that was a

sign and I had to do it. The CD is my own personal and spiritual release of things deep inside me."

The album's first single "Take a Walk With Me" is inspired by the protests over the death of George Floyd at the hands of police. "I've been called a sellout for writing the song because I was, and I quote, 'sticking up for the blacks.' I knew right then I had hit a nerve and the song had to be heard."

According to Houston, "When people ask me what made me finally want to do a solo CD, I tell them I don't really know. I'm not the driver on this journey anymore. I'm the passenger. I'm going wherever it takes me."

Señor Snoop Ven aquí, ay, mami /Holla at me. So begins Snoop Dogg's verse in "Qué Maldición," a banda-rap meld that Banda MS and the Long Beach rapper dropped in May.

"Snoop Dogg loves corridos, güey, especially from Culichi (Culiacan)," commented Angel from Chula Vista.

A corrido is a Mexican ballad whose lyrics recount a historical event or courageous deed, often associated with drug smuggling.

"When I visited Mazatlán, they played that song a lot,"



Angel recounted, "and "MS" stands for Mazatlán, Sinaloa."

"Snoop's 'Ay mami ven aqui' sounds medio-corny, but I see he's practicing his Español. 'Sta chingon." (It's bad-ass).

The 49-year-old rapper turned actor demonstrated appreciation for the regional Mexican genre of music on Instagram. One post shows him groovin' to "Juicio Final (El Regreso De La Última Sombra)" by Bukanas de Culiacan, then says: "That shit's jamming like a mother f*cker." In a video he posted in October of 2016, he's depicted listening to "Tengo Que Colgar" (I Have to Hang Up) by Banda MS, and said: "Sad day for the Dodgers, I wanna dedicate this song to all of the Dodger fans in the house."

"That took everyone by surprise," Oswaldo Silvas from Bandas MS said in an interview with Grammy.com. "We laughed thinking it was a meme, but no, he confirmed with another video that he really liked Banda MS's music. He's also said in interviews many times that he likes regional Mexican music."

"I've always been a fan of banda music, and the collab just felt right with Banda MS," Snoop said in a Billboard interview.

"Que Maldición" is a fusion of polka-influenced instrumentals played by the dozen or so Banda MS members — including clarinetists, trumpet players, trombonists, a tuba player, a snare-drummer, and a Tambora drummer, mixed with G-funk bass drops

overlaid with Snoop's smooth-Spanglish raps and Spanish vocals from Alan Ramírez and-Oswaldo Silvas.

The 178-beats-per-minute rollo debuted at number four on the Billboard's Hot Latin Songs list and played on our countywide hip-hop and Spanish music radio stations.

"I trip out when I hear Snoop's Spanish flow on the car radio," Ron Morales said, "then I realize my dial's on the EXA 91.7 station when the Spanish advertisements cut in. I hear the song's popular in Tijuana as well."

Morales, the founder of now-defunct Real Legit Magazine, a print publication on the hip-hop industry, fashion, and celebrity events — photographed and interviewed the rapper at the Athletes vs. Cancer Celebrity Flag Football

lab to begin filming the "Qué Maldición" music video in Los Angeles. "And now they're going to tap into the younger demographic when that video goes live, and the kids will probably make a Tik-Tok out of it."

"Covering Snoop Dogg at charity events, private events, and concerts, I've noticed his public persona crosses markets and platforms with ease."

Indie electronic pop-rock singer-guitarist Heather Nation was already writing songs for bands while still a teenager, with her first recording studio session taking place while still in high school. She's a founding member of synth-pop band Belladon, who were nominated Best New Artist at the San Diego Music Awards. She's also been known to play with prog-leaning groove rockers Meadow, formed in 2017 with Jon Hasz (of Aja Alycean's band), Erdis Maxhelaku (from Gayle Skidmore's group), and Josh Frontiero. Her new solo single "Selene" drops December 11, with a pre-recorded live performance

video debuting the same day on the website for Solana Beach music media group Halfway Home. The single was recorded and co-produced by Trevor LeVieux, and mixed and mastered by Mike Butler, whose credits include Ray LaMontagne, the Shins, the Pretenders, and Norah Jones. Nation also teaches classes in guitar, vocals, and songwriting, and she's been one of the few local musicians to maintain somewhat of a gig schedule through the pandemic. She's currently performing on Thursday evenings through December at Nick and G's in Rancho Santa Fe, including a New Year's Eve show.



ANOUSHKA SHANKAR

Ravi Shankar was considered the master of the sitar, a 19-stringed instrument made of gourd and teak. Having performed at the Monterey Pop Festival (1967), Woodstock (1969), and the 1971 Concert for Bangladesh with former Beatle and sitar pupil George Harrison, Shankar and his family moved to Encinitas in the early 1990s, though they also maintained a residence in India. His daughter Anoushka grew up in San Diego; and the 1999 honor graduate of San Dieguito Academy in Encinitas who also plays the sitar. Her 2012 full-length *Traveller*, which fuses Spanish flamenco with Indian classical music, was nominated for a 2013

Grammy Award as Best World Music Album (as was her late father Ravi Shankar's album *The Living Rooms Sessions*, *Part 1*). She earned another Grammy nomination in the same category the following year with her seventh album *Traces Of You*, which featured her half-sister Norah Jones on several songs, as well as in a video for the title track directed by Shankar's husband, filmmaker Joe Wright (*Pride & Prejudice, Atonement, Anna Karenina*). In her seventh Grammy nod, the British-Indian sitar player and composer has been nominated for Best Global Music Album for her newest full-length *Love Letters*.



SECRETS

Post-hardcore band Secrets released their debut full length *The Ascent* in 2012. Produced by Tom Denney, formerly of A Day to Remember, it debuted at number three on the Billboard Heatseekers Chart and became the first Velocity Records release to appear on the Billboard Top 200. After their vocalist quit in 2013, their sophomore release *Fragile Figures* showcased new singer Aaron Melzer, formerly of local group Author & Finisher. However, Melzer left Secrets in 2015, announcing that "the touring lifestyle is no longer for me. I have different goals for my life now...This was a decision I made to better my life. I wasn't happy so I made

the decision to change it." According to a band statement released November 24, "Today we lost our brother, our friend, and our family with the passing of Aaron Melzer. Aaron's passing came much too soon in his life and in ours. Words cannot express how devastating and painful this is for all of us to hear and believe. We will miss Aaron every day. Every day we will remember his presence, his laughter, the joy he could bring to a room, the light he brought with him to the stage, his smiles, his heart, and every memory we were able to share with him. For now we ask that you please respect the privacy of the family and loved ones as we take this time to reflect and grieve."



THE NAKED I

Back in 2010, three members of The Naked I were already stirring up trouble with a garage band that played so loud, cops were called to shut them down. That event was recently recalled by the band with an online photo post showing the cop who responded that night, posing with the young band and holding two thumbs-up. "He loved our music and was happy to take a picture to commemorate the milestone... [this is] the ten year anniversary of the first time we ever got the cops called on us for rocking too hard." Founded in 2013, the Naked I released their *Chance Encounters* EP

three years later and have become regulars on local stages such as Lestat's, Tin Roof, the Holding Company, House of Blues, Tio Leo's, and the Gator by the Bay music festival. Their second EP drops in mid-December, with a livestreamed EP release party planned for January. A music video is streaming online for their recent track "Further From Freedom," a "Jailhouse Rock"-inspired production featuring the band dressed as prisoners and performing on a set adorned with little more than prison bars, bunks, and a toilet.



BILLY WATSON

Bluesman Billy Watson is often accompanied by the International Silver String Submarine Band, an improvisational, all-star rotating cast of musicians, hand-picked from the California music scene. Since all members also work with their own bands, the lineup changes often, with both established local players and new musicians joining in. In addition to hosting open mic blues nights and recording albums with his own bands, his songs appear on a number of compilations, including a United by Music blues collection, *That Ain't*

It, which also features local star players such as Jonny Viau, Laura Chavez, Sue Palmer, Paul Fasulo, Harm Van Sleen, and others. Watson has also held long-running residencies at various local venues. On December 26, Old Town Blues Club in Temecula will host The Return of Billy Watson and his International Silver String Submarine Band Post Christmas Extravaganza. All distance safety precautions will be observed for the event, which takes place in an outdoor performance area.

A pillar of San Diego's cultural Parthenon

The La Jolla Symphony recently released a performance of Sibelius's Symphony No. 5 from their performance vault. I gave it a listen and have concluded that it is a marvelous performance.

For those who are not familiar with The La Jolla Symphony, it is an amateur orchestra that is associated with UC San Diego. They have a tradition of presenting large-scale masterpieces such as Mahler's Fifth Symphony, Verdi's Requiem, Benjamin Britten's War Requiem, Berlioz's Requiem, and Dona Nobis Pacem by Ralph Vaughan Williams.

Prior to this video presentation of Sibelius, La Jolla Symphony music director Steven Schick described the symphony in poetic terms and tied it into the season of late November. Schick explored the cycle of the seasons and the day-lengthening journey from autumn to spring.

Following Maestro Schick's lead, I find this performance to be idiomatic to the season of Advent as we move toward the rehirth of the sun — Sol Invictus. Sibelius's symphony is very much a journey from darkness to light.

Nowhere is this more evident than in the threenote ostinato figure that starts in the brass at the 36:36 mark of the video and continues to develop until the symphony concludes with five strokes of Thor's hammer. This is one of the greatest moments in the symphonic repertoire, and the La Jollans executed it magnificently.

I've not been to every single La Jolla Symphony concert, but the ones I've been able to attend have been sturdy events of rigorous music-making. Maestro Schick has developed a group of students, doctors,

lawyers, and engineers into a pillar of San Diego's cultural Parthenon.

The 2020-2021 Season is still breathing in La Jolla, with concerts scheduled to start in February. They are offering several modern and contemporary compositions, but a few items stand out. In April, there is a concert juxtaposing the works of LS. Bach and Oliver Messian that should be interesting. But there is a massive shadow being cast over the entire season.

That shadow belongs to Gustav Mahler's Symphony

No. 2: Resurrection. It is scheduled for June, and the idea of hearing that gargantuan symphony within the somewhat intimate confines of Mandeville Auditorium is beyond exciting.

This might be the only chance some of us will ever have to hear this symphony live in San Diego. The San Diego Symphony performed it a few decades ago, but there is no telling when or if it will come around again.

My new Christmas wish is to hear Mahler Two at the La Jolla Symphony. I hope Santa is listening.



Was Mank shanked?

MOVIES

o matter how lofty one's stature as an artist or how impeccable one's list of accomplishments, there will always be someone out there sporting a pair of steel-toed loafers for the soul (and sole) purpose of booting a deity from the Pantheon. 'Tippi' Hedren built a career off of

bad-mouthing Alfred Hitchcock. Reviews of Jerry Lewis' movies

read like critical contract killings. But not even the National Enquirer could have concocted a slam as spurious and mean-spirited as the one Pauline Kael leveled against Orson Welles. And David Fincher's Mank picks up where Kael left off.

The title is short for Herman J. Mankiewicz, a prolific screenwriter who, in addition to having a hand in writing Citizen Kane, gifted audiences with untold hours spent pleasurably in the dark (Dinner at Eight, The Wizard of Oz, Christmas Holiday). The script, written by the director's late father Jack Fincher, uses as its base of operation,

amid the myriad of Kane-inspired flashbacks, a Victorville Hotel. It was there that Mankiewicz, incapacitated after a car accident left him nursing a broken leg, dictated the script to secretary Rita Alexander (Lily Collins). In his attempt to assign sole authorship to his subject, Fincher forgets to mention

> a version of the script Welles was simultaneously working on back

in Beverly Hills.

Fincher takes delight in recreating Hollywood's golden era, maneuvering his camera through a backlot surging with a sea of full-dress extras. Inside the walls, the story conference participants seated in David O. Selznick's office read like a Who's Who? of screenwriting bluebloods. Joining Mankiewicz are George S. Kaufman, S.J. Perelman, Charles McArthur, Ben Hecht, etc. The round-the-horn story improv ends with the new kid on the block — in this case, Charles Lederer (Joseph Cross) — being asked, "Why don't you tell him how it ends?"


Kael's decision to target the film of films as a means to elevate her solidlyestablished anti-auteur profile defies reason. Welles joins D.W. Griffith, Tex Avery, and Jean-Luc Godard as one of the rare few who can lay claim to forever changing the face of cinema. Was it his arrogance, his youth, or both that aroused envy? During the days of the studio system, film production was an old man's game. Where does a 24-year-old pisher get off co-writing and directing what many consider to be the one film deserving the title of all-time greatest? Any film critic-historian (Robert L. Carringer, Andrew

Sarris, Peter Bogdanovich, Joseph McBreide, Jonathan Rosenbaum, etc.) worth their salt rose to Welles' defense by acknowledging his contributions to the script. As for Fincher, I can appreciate a son wanting to honor his dad, just not when Pop has lies to peddle.

Told in flashback, Fincher borrows heavily from Kane's labyrinthian structure and baroque opulence, right down to the melting ice sculpture replicating the ones found at its subject's birthday party. But it's impossible to believe that the destruction of the second Mrs. Kane's bedroom was penned just moments after a visit to Victorville

finds Welles shattering Mankiewicz's liquor cabinet. And was the drive through the desert to the hotel meant to be an homage to the second unit ride to the Mirador Motel in Touch of Evil?

Thankfully, Fincher doesn't confine himself solely to the chapter of Mankiewicz's life dealing with Mr. Welles. His battle against Louis B. Mayer (Arliss Howard) and Irving Thalberg (Ferdinand Kingsley) over a fictionalized newsreel the two whipped up to quash the political aspirations of socialist Upton Sinclair is far more interesting than the story of an inveter-

ate alcoholic who stays focused long enough to write the great American screenplay, only to have it snatched from him by a satanic upstart. Allegedly. I would prefer a film about Mankiewicz's much-warranted disgust with MGM's boy wonder Thalberg to a continuation of Kael's fairy tale. ★★ -Scott Marks

Black Bear — No one can tolerate Allison's (Aubrey Plaza) on-set behavior, so the actress sets her sights on another form of torture: directing. Creative juices all but parched, Allison opts to spend a little emotional tuneup time at a woodsy bed and breakfast owned and operated by an unhappily married couple: musician Gabe (Christopher Abbott) and pregnant wife Blair (Sarah Gadon). In the time it takes to carry her bags to the house, Allison's host has already hit on his paying customer. After dinner, and with the lugubriously lubricating aid of a bottle of wine, Allison watches as the couple act out their rage in a manner that makes Albee's George and Martha look like Blondie and Dagwood. So far, nothing we've seen rings even remotely true, starting with the premise. A retreat epitomizes alone time, not a place one goes when in need of a bout of relationship counseling with the hired help. This all changes when, halfway through the film, roles reverse and we leave our one-act play for a film-within-a-film about the making of the one-act play. At one point, Allison is described as "hard to read," an insight that applies to the actress as well. Plaza has built a career leaving audiences trying to outguess her every move. If you're a Plaza-watcher waiting for her ship to come in, the Queen Mary just docked. She's never been better. Too bad the performance is housed in a technical exercise gone awry. Freaky — The superimposed text reads "Wednesday the 11th," but its purpose is not to establish time, place, or even herald a film-within-a-film parody. For all the good it does, the latest Blumhouse Production might just as well greet us with: Warning: Secondhand Horror Comedy Ahead. Not that the idea of spinning a horrorreversal on the Disney family comedy Freaky Friday is a bad one, but must everything play out in such a familiar manner? Vince Vaughn doesn't get the recognition he deserves; there aren't too many comedians currently at work who possess the actor's sly slobbery and innate ability to use it to occasion laughter. SHE DONE HIM WRONG (1933)

Across town at 20th Century Fox, it was child superstar Shirley Temple keeping the studio in the black, while Paramount used pre-code sex to foot the bill. At a time when monogamy governed Hollywood, Mae West had more lovers in a single picture than most did in a lifetime Based on West's scandalous stage play Diamond Lil, this was to be her second feature and first starring role. For two years, West and screenwriters Harvey Thew and John Bright grappled with a way to get it past the censors. Within months of its release, the Catholic Legion of Decency was formed, largely in response to the perceived threat West posed to the male libido.

The film is set in the 1890s — a period in the notso distant past that West felt most comfortable in. Apart from a nude painting strung up over the bar just that morning, we don't get to see Lady Lou (West) in the flesh until 10 minutes into a picture that runs a scant 66 minutes. Similar to a slice of Universal horror, the opening passage is spent establishing local color as well as determining the opposition; all the word of mouth gives extra drama to the monster's big unveiling. (Ladies of the

Bowery plug their noses the moment her horsedrawn carriage nears; menfolk doff their hats, craning forward for a look.)

West's approach

to the opposite sex was simple: married or single, it's a man's game. Lou "happens to be smart enough to play it their way." Apart from Cary Grant (and W.C. Fields), West's lineup of leading man were fully operational targets, set in line for West to knock down. Other slabs of meat on the menu, just waiting for West to butcher them, included David Landau, Noah Beery, Sr., and the pristine and preeminently arrogant Gilbert Roland. With a load of lumber like this to play off, is it any wonder that Grant's nextdoor missionary turns out to be an undercover cop for West to fall for at picture's fade? The cheapest cut of ham is Owen Moore as Lou's locked-up ex, Chick Clark. Hardcore romanticist Chick expresses his love for Lou by threatening to kill her if she so much as looks at another man. Judging by his muddleheaded performance, Moore's "method" is allowing the liquor to do the acting. But Lou's visit to prison, complete with a sashay through the cell block like it's old home week, is a highpoint second only to a hair-pulling match between Lou and Russian Rita (Rafaela Ottiano, reprising her role from Diamond Lil.)

The film was directed by Lowell Sherman, a man Andew Sarris said was "gifted with the ability to express the poignancy of male lech-

ery when confronted with female longing." Much of what made it on the stage wasn't suited for mass consumption at the movies; still, what's here is probably the closest to undiluted West as the Golden Age of Hollywood would allow.

BELLE OF THE NINETIES (1934)

Paramount in the '30s, the right place and right time for Leo McCarey, the only director fortunate enough to work with the studio's behemoths of comedy, that triple-helping of absurdity The Marx Bros., W.C. Fields, and Mae West. (And he did them all in a row, too, from Duck Soup to Six of a Kind to Belle of the Nineties.) For the first time in her career, West received sole screenwriting credit, and it was she, not McCarey, calling the shots.

Unlike her slow rollout in She Done Him Wrong, West's quick-to-arrive first musical number is a gawker's paradise. "My American Beauty" amounts to little more than an immobile West positioned center frame, hands planted firmly on hips that can't stop gyrating, performing from within a quintet of costu-

mier Travis Banton's tiahtest — leaend has it West had to be sewn into her costumes — and most outlandish creations. She doesn't even sing. (That chore goes to one of her stud muffins.)

This isn't a musical as much as it is a series of stage performances by West interspersed between bits

of melodrama. The one deviation occurs when she steps out on the balcony for a smoke and observes an allblack revival meeting being held practically in her backyard. These numbers were quite popular in the day, but there is something particularly off-putting about this stereotypical mix of fire and brimstone and bayou hoodoo. It was enough to make Jean-Pierre Coursodon call the sequence "an immensely tasteless" number in which West sings along with a "black chorus going through grotesque contortions in a repulsively Hollywood display of religious ecstasy."

And what better way to end the film that introduced the world to jazz standard "My Old Flame" — Duke Ellington and his orchestra are on hand to accompany West — than by having a flicked butt, tossed by careless smoker West, miss the fireplace and literally bring the house down? West appeared in but a dozen features, and I suggest you see them all, including Myra Breckinridge. Make that especially Myra Breckinridge!

The Twentieth Century — It's rare to find female characters behind more convincing mustaches than

their male counterparts, but then again, it's even more uncommon for a film to come along that defies classification. How else does one account for a subject as potentially lethal as the fall and rise to power of Canadian Prime Minister W.L. Mackenzie King (Dan Beirne) being transformed into visual perfection? Like being hit with a warm sock filled with splendor, writer-director Matthew Rankin's debut feature portrays real life as a kaleidoscopic, fantasy-filled ride

through Canadian history. (Imagine how much more colorful and commanding high school history classes would have been had our teachers shared imaginations similar to that of Rankin.) The lightbox composition at once calls to mind such seemingly diverse temperaments as Powell and Pressburger and David Lynch. Two complaints, starting with Rankin's maddeningly maddened ripoff of fellow Canadian Guy Maddin. Both appeal to one's primitive instincts with

their uncanny ability to fictionalize in historical context, but Maddin's € fingerprints are all over his. And even this indefatigable connoisseur ® of bodily functions humor inside me was more than a bit rankled over the $\frac{a}{c}$ profusion of sudorific giggles, most notably the ejaculating cactus. Don't $\stackrel{\circ}{\mathbb{S}}$ let that dissuade you. The third act g drags, but nothing we've seen this 5 year can match this Century's visual wit and splendor. 2019 —S.M.

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

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Desperate Times

- Passers-by were reported to be incredulous at signs posted since mid-September outside Trillade elementary school in Avignon, France, asking parents to refrain from throwing their children over the locked gate when they are late to school. "Parents who arrived after the ringtone literally threw their children away," Principal Sanaa Meziane told *La Provence* with a nervous laugh. "It hasn't happened that many times .. but we preferred to take the lead." While there were no injuries, the practice alarmed school officials enough to create the signs, which feature an adult stick figure tossing a child-sized stick figure over the gate.

Government in Action

- Indonesia has the highest death toll from COVID-19 in Southeast Asia, and officials there are getting creative with punishments in addition to fines for not complying with mask laws. Metro News reported on Nov. 11 that regional governments are forcing scofflaws to do pushups, pull weeds, clean riverbeds and dig graves for coronavirus victims. Coffeeshop owner Evani Jesselyn of Jakarta said she was given a choice of paying a fine or cleaning public toilets after she was caught not wearing a mask in her car.

- The mayor of Oudenburg, Belgium, said it was not the city's intention that new Christmas decorations it installed resemble an iconic part of the male anatomy. City offi-

cials had set out to create lighted columns that looked like candles, the Daily Mail reported, but decided to do something different and placed blue spheres on top instead of flames. "I only realized (they looked phallic) when they were illuminted," Mayor Anthony Dumarey said. "I see the funny side of it myself (and) I see no reason to remove or replace them ... we will have the country's most talked-about Christmas lights this year."

Bad Behavior

- Police in Middlesbrough, England, are asking for the public's help in locating those involved in an apparent egg fight at a local Tesco supermarket during the two minutes of silence meant to honor fallen servicemembers on Nov. 8. Most shoppers at the store on Remembrance Sunday stood still and quiet for the observence, but one customer continued shopping and talking, reported Metro News, and objected when asked to be quiet. "We were all stood still, observing the two minutes' silence when we heard lots of screaming and shouting," one witness said. Police noted "a man allegedly assaulted two women ... following a verbal altercation."

Finders Keepers

 Douglas Allen Hatley, 71, of Lakeland, Florida, was arrested on Nov. 16 after the Florida Highway Patrol said he found a metal light pole by the side of the road in Tampa and tried to sell it to Eagle Metals Recycling. The Tampa Bay Times reported the recycling center turned him away because he didn't have documentation for the pole,

and officers responding to reports of a 1997 Camry with a pole twice its length strapped to the top pulled him over soon afterward. Hatley told troopers a highway maintenance worker "gave it to me." He was charged with third-degree grand theft.

- Mayor Yutaka Umeda of the Japanese town of Yamato was puzzled when his name started trending on social media after the U.S. presidential election, but he is now hoping his newfound fame will help him "promote the town," United Press International reported. The extra attention online came because the Chinese kanji characters used to spell Umeda's name can also be pronounced "Jo Baiden" -- strikingly similar to U.S. President-elect Joe Biden. 'Although there are differences in the positions of a U.S. presidential candidate and the mayor of Yamato ... our passion is the same," Umeda

Bright Idea

Two recent graduates of the Sydney Grammar School in Australia hatched á plan to skirt COVID-19 restrictions on large gatherings to host a graduation party while their parents were out of town. Outdoor gatherings are limited to 30 people, and indoor events are capped at 10, the *Daily Mail* reported, but up to 150 guests can attend weddings if they follow social distancing protocols. On Nov. 12, the unnamed best friends "married" in a backyard ceremony and planned a 150-person party to follow,

until their parents caught wind of the event online and returned to put an end to it: "We shut down the planned private celebratory event as soon as we found out about it, and thankfully, nobody was put at risk," one of the lads' dad said.

Uniform Complaints

- San Juan, Puerto Rico, police officer Fernando Leon Berdecia, 46, is accused of stealing \$1,300 worth of merchandise from a Home Depot on Nov. 16 while wearing his uniform. The Associated Press reported Puerto Rico Police Chief Henry Escalera said Leon has been suspended from the department, and a court date has been set for Dec. 2.

Schemes

- Two men have been arrested on suspicion of conning an unnamed doctor in the Indian state of Uttar Pradesh into paying \$41,600 for an "Aladdin's lamp" that the sellers promised would bring him "wealth, health and good fortune." The two con artists even conspired to conjure a genie from the lamp, which turned out to be one of the men, to convince the doctor of its authenticity, the BBC reported. According to local police, the con men had duped other families in the same way.

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



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
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
