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

No peace for Paz Police patrols mean migrant misery

Honduran national Olman Paz migrated to Tijuana two years ago in hopes of reaching the "American Dream." Since then, he says, he has been harassed, beaten, and threatened with deportation by the police, despite their having no jurisdiction to immigration. (It seems this type of practice became common under the administration of the former Mayor of Tijuana, Juan Manuel Gastelum.)

Paz says that since his arrival in Playas de Tijuana, he has been detained more than 20 times by the police. The last time it happened, he was sweeping the sidewalk in front of the seafood restaurant where he works. The police officer hit him - breaking his dental bridge, which held four teeth — and then detained him; it was the patrol's final pick-up of the day. According to Border Angels founder Hugo Castro, the Tijuana police Department has a daily quota of detentions they must achieve in order to cover a sort of efficiency standard, which allows them to keep obtaining international and federal aid for security affairs. So perhaps it was not surprising when they invented a felony charge for Paz. "They took

for long periods of time, or stealing money or cellphones from them. "They even called the Mexican immigration on me. They kept me locked up for five days in the migration building even though I have refugee status." When Paz finally got his day in court, the judge noticed Paz's's injuries and just let him go. He is still in

need of medical attention, as he's just taking painkillers to treat himself. "I can't eat now, and sometimes can't sleep because of the pain," he notes.

me (to the police station) and said that I was stealing a car. That was a lie," he says, adding that the low-intensity migrant persecution by Tijuana's police officers includes "sowing" drugs on suspects to keep them locked up

Mr. Miguel, another Honduran migrant who just arrived at the Embajada Migrante, the shelter where Paz lives, says he was kidnapped by municipal police in Veracruz during his journey to Tijuana. "They asked us for

32,000 pesos or said they would kill us," he says. "And officers from the General Prosecutor's Office blackmailed us with a bribe to let us continue."

Last month, promigrant activists celebrated the ruling of a federal judge delcaring these kinds of "poli-migra" unconstitutional. At a press conference, Gina Garibo from the American Friends Service Community said that it does not matter where a person is from, police have no right to detain and ask for migration papers from anyone. According to the National Migration Institute, there are approximately 10,000 foreign migrants settled in Tijuana waiting to get refugee status in the United States.

DEL MAR Not the last Worden Housing grousing won't KO councilman

During the run-up to last month's election, two different slates of candidates were running to occupy three seats on the fiveperson Del Mar city council. And each slate was derided by the opposition as to how it would deal with the looming April deadline, when the city must prove to the state that it is providing new, cheap housing. Voters were warned of two possible outcomes, depending on which side got in; for many residents, both were unthinkable. If incumbent David Druker, investment advisor David Quirk, and registered nurse Tracy Martinez got elected, Del Martians were told it could trigger the state of California to re-zone valuable property overlooking the Pacific for low-income apartments. (The breathtaking expanse was proposed for the Marisol condo/hotel development, but was denied by the voters and now sits undeveloped.) Opponents of the trio of Phil Blair (founder of the Manpower employment agency), Bob Gans (attorney), and Glenn Warren (retired diplomat) claimed that their election would lead to ugly, highdensity housing on the San Dieguito lagoon, causing environmental harm and severe summertime traffic congestion.

A city councilman since 2014, Dwight Worden sided with the Blair/Gans/Warren trio, which wound up to be a losing bet. The 40-year Del Mar resident is one of the city's most recognized locals - he served as Del Mar's city attorney from 1977-83 (immediately following Roger Hedgecock when Hedgecock was elected to the county board of supervisors) - and he's long maintained his image as a champion of the environment, serving as a high-profile member of both the Sierra Club and the Surfrider Foundation. But one longtime local wonders if Worden's support for the Marisol backers has cost him enviro credibility. Thirty-year resident Arnie Wiesel says that Worden and two outgoing councilmembers voted to ignore Del Mar's general plan by illegally voting to change zoning laws and so allow high density housing in the North Commercial area along the San Dieguito river. "They did it with a 3 to 2 vote," says Wiesel, "when any change to the [general plan] needs a super majority, or 4 to 1 vote." In response, Wiesel spearheaded a referendum drive to overturn that vote. "With a referendum, you have 30 days get the signatures [after the law is passed]," he explains. "We wanted to wait until after the election so as not to confuse anyone. Bottom line was, we only had 12 days." He and 20 of his Del Mar neighbors needed 345 signatures, or ten percent of the electorate. "It was not easy doing that during covid. But the response was overwhelming. We got over 600."

Once the signatures are verified in January, the council can vote to reverse the October 19 vote, or put it on the ballot. Wiesel is confident the new council will dump the zoning change to build on the San Dieguito lagoon.

It wasn't only covid that made signature gathering difficult. Wiesel claims Worden launched "a full-bore attack" against his referendum effort. "He told anyone who would listen that they don't dare sign this. He painted a doom and gloom attack against us. He sent out an article with a demeaning attack on the future city council." Worden's position was that if the referendum succeeded, the state's Housing and Community Development Agency could come in and rezone any Del Mar property for affordable housing including the highly valuable Marisol bluff top. But Wiesel says the Worden-backed rezoning plan is wrong. "Not only would his development impact the lagoon and the wetlands, it would create a traffic gridlock in the continued on page 6

Pro-Gloria group accused Bry of working with *gasp* Republicans

It's been no secret among inside political observers that the big gorilla of the San Diego's election season this year was a so-called independent expenditure committee calling itself **Neighbors for Housing Solutions Supporting** Todd Gloria for San Diego Mayor 2020. The committee raised a total of more than \$1.3 million through October 17 this year, according to financial disclosure forms submitted to the city clerk's office. Now the city's ethics commission has confirmed the outsized role of the group in the form of a list of big-money donors ranked in order of contribution.

Protect Neighborhood Services Now, sponsored by the SD Municipal Employees Association, is expected to press Gloria hard for raises and other financial perks for its members during the trying budgetary times to come. The city employee labor group gave

\$250,000, followed by the LGBT Caucus Leadership Fund with \$155,000, the Southwest **Regional Council of Carpenters Political Action** Fund Small Contributor Committee, which came up with \$100,000, and the San Diego Regional Chamber of Commerce PAC, contributing \$99,963. The Committee to Expand the Middle Class, Supported by Airbnb, Inc., gave \$80,000, per the ethics commission's list. At

the next level down \$50,000 each came from John G. Thompson, the Laborers' Int'l. Union of North America Local 89 PAC Fund, the Laborers Pacific Southwest Regional Organizing **Coalition PAC Small Contributor Committee,** the Southern California District Council of Laborers PAC Small Contributor Committee, and the San Diego Works! PAC. And \$20,000 each was raised from SeaBreeze Vacation Rentals, LLC, the Downtown San Diego Partnership PAC, and Share San Diego, a political committee run by the short-term rental lobby. Meanwhile, Anheuser-Busch Companies gave \$10,000, as did HNTB Corporation, Campland's Michael Gelfand, Service Employees International Union Local 221 Independent Expenditure PAC, Westfield Property Management, LLC, Evan Low for Assembly 2020, and ex-San Diego Unified Port commission member Robert Nelson.

Sorry, Barbara, but someone had to be the Republican in this race.

In their take-no-prisoners campaign against Gloria's opponent, fellow Democrat Barbara Bry, Neighbors for Housing Solutions rained a volley of direct mail hits on the city councilwoman from La Jolla, including one that charged that Bry was "tied to Donald Trump." Said one of the committee's two-sided hit pieces, dispatched October 7 according to the website PoliticalPropaganda.org, "Barbara Bry will drain the swamp and run San Diego like a business." Another mailer pictured Brv with an offshore oil derrick and linked her to Big Oil through her stock ownership. Another. sent to Democrats and headlined "Barbara Bry. The Republican Choice for Mayor." carried endorsement-style praise for Bry from **Republican county supervisor Dianne Jacob** and GOP Coronado Mayor Richard Bailey. "As a Republican, I know I can work with Barbara," said Bailey's quotation. "Barbara Bry shares the same principles that have guided me as an elected official," Jacob was said to have proclaimed. A quote from Holly Smithson, identified in the piece as a "Republican, Technology Leader," said: "We need a proven job creator and that's Barbara Bry." A onetime U.S. Environmental Protection Agency spokeswoman under 43rd President George W. Bush, Smithson backed Biden over Trump this year as part of a Biden-sponsored effort called 43 Alumni for America.

Sherman's "paid volunteer"

With last week's change of staff at San Diego's city hall has come a torrent of leaving-office filings, shedding light on the politics and finances of a bevy of departing aides. Cheryl Hoy, the confidential assistant to exiting Republican mayor Kevin Faulconer, reports on her December 8 disclosure owning an interest in Cypress Consulting, [doing business as] JH Campaigns, valued between \$10,000 and \$100,000, from which she received income in the same range. Hoy got

\$128,216 in salary and benefits last year for her role with Faulconer, according to TransparentCalifornia.com.

The nature of Cypress Consulting's business is said to be "public affairs & campaign consulting," Three clients each provided an annual income of more than \$10,000. They were Manolatos, Nelson, and Murphy, a political public relations outfit, the failed Steve Vaus for County Supervisor campaign;

and MNM advertising. John Hoy is president of JH Campaigns, with clients who have included Republican ex-councilwoman Lorie Zapf. "She's standing up to Donald Trump on offshore oil drilling," Hoy announced to the Union-Tribune in October 2018 regarding Zapf, shortly before she was beaten by Democrat Jen Campbell.

Elizabeth Spillane, who was paid \$157,319 last year as chief of staff for termed-out Republican-turned-independent councilman Mark Kersey, reported having a \$100,000 to \$1 million interest in Red Rock Group. The outfit deals in "political consulting and public affairs." The San Diego County Medical Society paid the company more than \$10,000 in the past year, per the disclosure. Spillane sits on the

Republican Party County Central Committee.

Sheldon Zemen, a council representative for termed-out GOP councilman Scott Sherman, with a salary of \$87,880 in 2019, reported receiving between \$1000 and \$10,000 as a "paid volunteer" for the campaign of Joe Leventhal, a Republican who unsuccessfully sought to succeeded Kersey on the council.

Patronage rules A former La Jolla Light reporter put on the public payroll by councilwoman Barbara Bry when she was running for mayor earlier this year has taken his leave of city hall. Corey Levitan got his job as a council representative for the La Jolla Democrat on April 13, according to an statement dated August 31. He left the position on December 10, per a December 8 leaving-office statement filed with the city clerk. According to that document, Levitan reported having an income between \$10,000 and \$100,000

from the Light, owned by the Union-Tribune. "I drafted speeches, all social media and proclamations and commendations for San Diego City Council President Pro Tem Barbara Bry," says Levitan's LinkedIn profile. "I created and wrote a weekly newsletter profiling local small businesses devastated by the pandemic. And I managed special projects for the District 1 Council office, including the preparation of case reports on problematic short-term vacation rental units. Our term ended on December 10, 2020." Bry lost the mayor's race to

According to a November 30 filing posted by the California Environmental Quality Act website, the Hilton San Diego Bayfront is working on the "renovation of existing restaurant space to convert it to an event function space."



summer. Now, during the summer, it sometimes takes an hour to drive from one end of Del Mar to the other. This extra traffic would make it impossible to drive through. If there is a fire, people aren't getting out." Wiesel says the 500-plus low-income units mandated by the state could be created without paving over the banks of the San Dieguito, and that a serious effort to work with the fairgrounds management to site low-income housing on the fairgrounds has never been made.

Councilmember Terry Gaasterland often voted in the minority with Drucker, often losing key votes to Worden's majority. Now the UCSD professor is mayor. Gaasterland says Worden and outgoing mayor Ellie Haviland would meet often with the city of Del Mar planning department, vetting and refining projects before they came before the council. "That is not a normal way to do business," she says, adding that Worden often voted in support of Marisol before it was killed at the ballot box in 2018 with a 59 percent voter rejection. Now, Gaasterland says she is confident Del Mar's new council can find a way

we wanted to continue on that path. If you interject elected officials and disrupt that path, that may not be productive...This was not for one councilmember to go off on her own." And while he grants that he did meet regularly with city planning staff, he insists that "we did not deal with big policy issues. It was more to provide a sounding board on mundane issues. To portray it that we were cutting deals in smoke-filled rooms is way off

to meet the April deadline set by the state's housing agency. She says she wanted to meet with the agency before this, but was blocked by Worden and his majority, which voted to have only city staff meet with the agency.

Worden's response to Wiesel: "Amendments to the general plan require four affirmative votes. Changes to the zoning require a simple majority, which requires three. My position on Marisol was very public and very simple: it was appropriate for the community to vote on this. If the community didn't want it, I was totally happy with the existing low density zoning." And like Wiesel, he thinks the fairgrounds may prove crucial. "We are required by state law to provide affordable housing at a minimum of 20 units per acre.... Let's get the housing done on the fairgrounds." He says he sees a way to get the fairgrounds to agree to host 51 units, but in order to pull that off, the city needs to spend \$1 million dollars for lawyers and planning. "We don't have that money. We need state grants." And he says that one result of the referendum is that it may decertify Del Mar from getting that grant money. "I think the city's position is now substantially weaker."

Regarding Gaasterland's complaint that she was not allowed to speak with the housing agency, Worden says, "For our city to have success, the [agency] had discussions with our staff. That was our path to success, and base." In any case, Worden says the council election results and the referendum rebuff will not signal his end in politics. "I am absolutely not throwing in the towel. I'm not going anywhere. I love my little city. I will adapt to the lay of the land. I am now in minority. I don't expect everyone will agree with me, but they will continue to hear from me."

MISSION BEACH **Zona Rental** Will the city hand over a third of a neighborhood to semipermanent vacation? It's finally the homestretch for the question of vacation rentals in San Diego. After years of a Wild West free-for-all that has pit neighbors against neighbors — and also the remote investors they say are turning homes into hotels — rules have taken shape.

The San Diego Planning Commission is recommending the city adopt regulations that cut the number of whole-home vacation rentals in half, use a lottery to distribute licenses, and include enforcement measures. A decision on the proposal, submitted by councilmember Jen Campbell in October and sent back to her office for changes, will be made by the city council early next year. If approved, the ordinance would go into effect January 1, 2022. It defines a short-term rental occupancy as a stay of less than a month, and a host as a "natural person" rather than an LLC. The plan is described as balancing the rights of hosts and neighbors, but while the commission unanimously agreed

on the rules, hosts and residents did not. Mission Beach would get — or get stuck


with — the biggest share. The small sandspit enclave would see 30 percent of its housing

units eligible to become short-term rentals, compared to the rest of the city's one percent cap. Venus Molina, Campbell's chief of staff and a main author of the plan, said 30 percent was enough to retain housing units and abide by the Coastal Act, which requires affordable lodging. "And at the same time we know there is a history of short-term rentals in the Mission Beach community." Regulations will allow the city to differentiate between part-time use, home sharing, and whole-home units, and licensing will help with tracking and enforcement. A 24/7 complaint portal on the city website will keep track of complaints, which can get a host's license revoked. Molina added that

the rules will curb abuse of the system, since only a host can apply for a license, and just one at a time. In addition, the whole-home rental cap limits the number of licenses, and they can't be transferred to other people or

properties. The difficulty of the lottery system, which applies to whole-home rentals, discourages bad actors, she said. If someone loses their license, someone else on the list will get it, creating a big incentive to play by the rules.

Scott Bishop, who manages over 20 shortterm rentals and credits them with lifting his family out of middle-income status, said the rules "will crush San Diego citizens looking for equality in life. We can be responsible without taking away" our rights, he added. "No caps." Airbnb echoed the sentiment: Sarah Simon, advocacy manager, asked the commission to increase the citywide whole-home cap to 1.2 percent to gain "the full economic benefits." Meanwhile, in Mission Beach, the proposal opens the door to 1081 whole-home vacation rentals, which are allowed for more than 20 days per year with the owner absent. Gary Wonacott, a former

Lights, camera, fashion!

When you're lifting heavy cameras and lights and running around to capture the perfect angle for 12 hours at a time, your clothing has to work with you, not against you. This is something Brandon Gong (@brandon. gong) knows well. He's a profes-

sional camera operator and photographer from the Bay Area.

While on set, Brandon prefers dri fit t-shirts — "because being on set, it's like a workout" — and cooperative shoes. His outfit pictured here is fit for the job: a black dri fit shirt (Nike, \$20); black, durable and non-reflective jeans (Levi's, \$40); a snapback hat (Odesza, \$40 from their live concert, pre-pandemic); and a chest strap for lugging around gear (Conterra, \$75).

"When I'm working," says Gong, "I try to exhibit my own style, but I also want the clothing I buy to fit my lifestyle. At times, I do copy clothing that I see on set and pull inspiration from other crew members. Like when I see some nice boots, I like to ask where the person picked them up from."

That's how he picked up his Conterra chest strap, which he refers to as his most useful piece to wear while on-set.

When Brandon's not shooting, he's typically out exploring the nooks of what California's diverse landscape has to offer and capturing stunning photos. Public records indicate ownership of the Rimini villa lies with Gala Yayla, who is listed in a photoless LinkedIn profile as a CFO. Yayla purchased the home in 2000 for a reported \$1.72 million. The tax rolls also reflect a discrepancy in square footage, reporting an improved square footage of 3115 compared to the 3922 displayed in the listing.

After nearly two decades off-market, the property was offered for sale beginning in mid-September. While ranging as high as \$7,995,000 and as low as \$7,250,000, the current asking price sits just under \$7.4 million. ■

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
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Kate McGrath outside her 200-year-old apartment in Paris

A San Diegan in Paris

Kate McGrath can't wait to get back to Paris, virus or no virus.

"I live right around the corner from the Pompidou Center in a building that is partly 200 years old. I am at the American University of Paris, studying fashion business. I love my life there."

Her intrigue with Paris began with an exchange program in France when she was 16, in Laon. "It's a medieval capital in France. I lived in a tiny village outside of there with a French family for six months, and learned to beer for 39 cents. I would cook a week's worth of food for us. My go-to was pasta pesto with goat cheese and smoked salmon. A three-slice pack of salmon would cost maybe \$3.50, a big bag of pasta would be \$1.50, a big tub of goat cheese, \$2.50, and with a jar of pesto, you'd have enough to feed four people, and you'd get in under \$10."

She says for the same price you can cook a chicken curry, or Korean fried rice for four. "And that would include the *go chu jang*," she says.

Even when she lived in the expensive dis-

speak French pretty fluently. I came back to San Diego and I had two years of high school left. But living in France made me realize that, you know, there are much bigger things than San Diego. So I applied to many, many schools, most of them in New York. I also applied to the American University of Paris, because I started realizing: why should I pay so much more money to go to school in the US, when I could pay less money and I can be in Paris? I was applying to NYU, and that was very expensive. So [Paris] was about a third of the cost, with scholarships and everything."

Her initial lesson was how to survive in Paris on a student budget.

"First of all I realized that my friends had no idea how to cook. And I was living in an apartment with three other girls. Thankfully, I grew up helping my mom with cooking a lot here in San Diego."

Secondly, different supermarkets have different strengths. "There are four main brands of stores in Paris. One you'd go to for their fresh produce. Another, say, Lidl, the German chain, has really cheap food. Like, tall cans of trict around the Eiffel Tower, Kate and friends scouted out cheap restaurants. "A Lebanese place had this wrap, a foot-long, pretty much, for 5 Euros, say six bucks. A Greek restaurant called Apollon has a sandwich for \$6."

She says one of everybody's habits before lockdown was to take a bottle of wine down to the canal St. Martin for evening drinks with hundreds sitting on the banks, socializing, and watching the sun go down. "No hassle from authorities, and it's affordable! You can get a bottle of wine, say a Roche Maze, for about \$3."

But isn't she worried to go back, with this second covid wave hanging in there? "Not at all. I'm very excited. I am 22, and Paris is now home for me. I miss my friends from the Canary Islands, Egypt, Bulgaria, Texas. I even miss climbing seven floors with the grocery bags."

Zippo man

In a Dickensian back room behind the tobacconists Racine & Laramie, in Old Town Plaza, Geoffrey Mogilner rifles through the contents of his high security safe. "It's somewhere here. I would never put it on display. Ah!"

He hauls out a folded envelope, secured by two paper clips. He slides the clips off, and brings out a little plastic bag. He tips it up. Something heavy drops into his hand.

"The last one that sold fetched \$32,000," he says.

He's holding an old Zippo lighter, the kind that was known as much for the *ping* it made when you flicked it open as for its claim to be windproof.

"These were the very first Zippo lighters, 1932, 33," he says. "I was so lucky. I bought it from the lady who actually made it in Zippo's factory in Bradford, Pennsylvania. See the hinge? Outside hinge."

Since 1932, Zippo has sold a bunch. In 2012, they made their 500 millionth lighter. Many are emblazoned with military insignia, like the one I just saw with "Franklin D. Roosevelt, CVA 42" embossed on it. Or another with "USS Langley," the very first US aircraft carrier.

"Zippo was a cultural icon right up to the deglamorization of tobacco products in the 1980s," says Geoffrey's colleague (dressed in Civil War garb) Jeff Lawing, who's helping me ID some of the aircraft carrier Zippos on display, "Ninety percent of the military folks smoked, especially Navy and Marine Corps. So

it was pretty much a staple thing for every single commanding officer to order a large amount of Zippos with the unit embossed on it. It was like the challenge coin, a custom which came from the US Army and the Air Force. It was handed out to dignitaries. Because they could be extremely useful. The custom is, when you're in a bar and you smack the

coin down, that means that if your neighbor doesn't have his, he has to buy the round. But smacking down a Zippo with your logo is just as good."

Besides, Jeff says, "You always had to have a light anyway so you could light the lady's cigarette. Just look at Hollywood movies of the '30s and '40s. That was the gentlemanly thing to do."

But for Geoffrey Mogilner, this is his most special Zippo — and he has a huge collection. It is one of the very first Zippos ever made.

"The lady who made it discovered me through an article I wrote about Navy Zippos," he says. He had published it in a glossy Japanese magazine, *Zippo Manual 2*, devoted entirely to Zippos. She read it in Pennsylvania and sent this letter to Geoff, and he ended up buying (for an undisclosed sum) the lighter which she personally made in 1932-3.

Out in the beautifully Old West Racine & Laramie store, he displays hundreds of Navy Zippos, each embossed with the name and numbers of a ship or submarine. But he won't put this out there.

"Too valuable," he says. "Somebody would steal it."

Like, a collector? He just smiles. ■

mber" lost her job as a customer service representative due to covid. Jobless and faced with high living costs, she, her husband, and her seven-yearold daughter moved out of their City Heights apartment at the end of June.

Fun Runner

In July, the family decided to buy an RV and live in it until they could get back on their feet, and until Amber could find another job.

Like so many other people who live in their cars or RVs, the family headed west to Mission Bay for a safe and temperate place to park during the day, a place where she could homeschool her daughter.

But the savings from not paying rent were short-lived.

Within two weeks, Amber received her first parking ticket for parking in two stalls. The ticket was the first of many.

By the beginning of October, she had received a dozen tickets, some for violating posted signs, others for oversized vehicle parking, and others for parking too close to a boat ramp.

Since July, Amber, who doesn't want to use her full name for fear of retaliation, has seen more and more officers patrolling the popular parking lots in Mission Bay. She has also witnessed city crews painting curbs that were once legal parking spaces red. "At Leisure Lagoon, they painted it red and blocked it off," she says.

Amber and other vehicle dwellers say the city has ramped up parking enforcement, especially for those living in their cars, vans, and RVs despite Mayor Kevin Faulconer's March 16 mandate to suspend parking enforcement in order to help residents navigate the pandemic.

She and others who live in their vehicles say the city has implemented new measures

in its fight against socalled "van life" and the habitation of vehicles in the city of San Diego.

In doing so, crews have reportedly changed time limits on parking signs, removed parking places by painting them red, and issued an increasing number of citations since the outbreak of the pandemic. The types of parking tickets include failing to cramp wheels, expired registration violations, red-zone infractions, and citations for violating parking signs.

Amber and others believe that the city has ramped up enforcement as another way to force those living on the streets and in their cars away from popular bay and beach parking lots. These people also say they are reluctant to go to the city's safe parking lots because of a lack of health protocols to protect them against covid, leaving them with few options other than to continue their cat-andmouse game with law enforcement.

"I feel uncomfortable

parking anywhere around here. I feel like I have been singled out," says Amber. "I don't know where else to go. I've just got to keep moving."

She is not alone. David Wilson, who has lived in his vehicle since 1999, says he witnessed city crews change the noparking times on signs near a popular parking area at Mission Bay's Ski Beach.

"At the beginning of the pandemic, my truck was free and clear of tickets," savs Wilson. "But I got my first ticket after they changed the time on the signs. Everyone knew the restrictions, and the city changed them on a whim. I saw them changing the signs and immediately knew what they were up to."

According to data obtained by the Reader through a public records request, parking citations have increased dramatically since covid's arrival.

In the weeks after Faulconer issued his mandate, city police and parking officers issued only 1260 citations, public records show. By July, as businesses began reopening after the shutdown, that number in-

creased ten-fold to 14,247 citations. And it continued to rise. By September, the city issued 22,068 parking tickets. Again: the increase occurred despite Mayor Kevin Faulconer's March 16 directive to reduce parking enforcement to holiday and Sunday regulations.

Doug Higgins has lived in his 35-foot Pace Arrow Coachman for the past six years, ever since he retired from his car salesman job to help care for his mom when she was diagnosed with dementia.

Higgins, a 71-yearold Vietnam Veteran, is knowledgeable — passionate even — on the subject of parking laws and the ways around them. And since the pandemic emerged, Higgins says the crackdown on parking enforcement is

apparent. He believes the city has turned to issuing citations for violating signs and red-zones as a way around the potential public relations night-

mare that enforcement of the vehicle habitation tickets might cause during a pandemic.

Higgins saw this first-hand. "I have received two during the pandemic," he says. "They have taken two parks and taken all motorhome parking out, removed all parallel parking. They painted them red. It eliminated motorhomes. That's all they are trying to do. They find ways to ticket you. I don't break the law. I am getting so sick of it. There is another park on Sea-World Drive where they painted the spots red."

Added Higgins, "Everybody was under the impression that they stopped enforcing this. That, obviously, is not the case."

People who live in their vehicles and RVs

say they have few places to turn and little support from the city.

In large part, their frustration has been mounting ever since the city passed the Vehicle Habitation Ordinance in June 2019. The ordinance made it unlawful for people to sleep in their cars near schools and in neighborhoods, while at the same time prohibiting others from sleeping in their vehicles between the hours of 9 pm and 6 am. As a temporary solution, the city implemented the Safe Parking Program, which consisted of three parking lots open for those in need of a place to sleep.

However, conditions at those safe parking lots and concerns over the spread of the coronavirus have driven people away. "In addition to falling short on basic human rights standards, there is no covid testing at these lots," says Ann Menasche, an attorney for the nonprofit Disability Rights California. "Their idea of safety is to set aside one port-a-potty for people who feel sick, and that port-o-potty sits directly next to the others. There is no enforcement for masks. These people are not safe against covid, nor are they protected from much anything else. These lots already posed numerous safety issues for those staying there. In so many ways, the lots are not even on par with the most rudimentary refugee camps. It's awful, and the city does nothing about it."

Menasche represents dozens of homeless individuals now suing the city in a potential class action

She says if class certification is granted, there will be thousands of plaintiffs in the case.

With regard to the rise in parking citations since the mayor suspended enforcement, Menasche says numerous clients have told her that the city has turned to writing citations as an alternative to impounding RVs and arresting those living in cars. "These people are prohibited from being in public places in the daytime. The parks and the large parking lots at the beach and bay are so important to these people, because they offer a safe place to park with restrooms and running water, without the high temperatures seen inland. But these are the places where enforce-

ment has increased."

Menasche says she has heard from several people about the spike in citations, especially

"Citing people for violation of signs is just another way to enforce the vehicle habitation ordinance. It is just another way to target the people who use the beach and bay area. And with more evictions on the way due to the pandemic, more people will be out on the streets. This is the time to act. If things remain as status quo, more people will be on the street, fighting for a sliver of parking lots where they can be safe, have access to running water, and restrooms."

Getting those living in vehicles out of neighborhoods and popular beach and bay parking lots has been one of Faulconer's main initiatives. "If you want to work toward finding a permanent home, we have programs that can help," Faulconer said in a June 19 statement during the implementation of the Vehicle Habitation Ordinance. "We will not allow

But with the arrival of the pandemic came new problems. More and more people have lost their jobs as a result of the pandemic, and like Amber, have had to leave their homes and live on the streets. "We have been staying at Mission Bay for almost three months now," says Amber. "My daughter is in the first grade. I homeschool her, and having to shuffle around and move from place to place has been difficult to say the least. I didn't think it would be a problem. There are people in the cars and in the streets. I thought this would be better and safer."

Yet, while moving out of the family's home may have been the smartest financial option for Amber and her family, the savings were soon offset by the thousand dollars in fines from parking tickets that the family has paid.

"I got my first ticket within two weeks of moving out of our home, maybe less," says Amber. "It was for parking in two stalls even though it was meant for RV parking. Since then I got the oversized ticket three times, twice in October. I have probably gotten around 12. I have lost count."

It was not just the increase in tickets that Amber and others living in their vehicles noticed, it was the type of violations.

While the city has continued to issue oversized vehicle tickets to those living in their vehicles, the increase in those tickets is not as stark as other infractions. In April, as the pandemic tightened its

grip on the region, parking officers issued 46 oversized vehicle citations in the city. In June that number decreased to 18 before jumping to 486 in September.

City data shows that parking officers concentrated on other infractions, most notably, "violation of signs" infractions. In April, the first full month of suspended enforcement, the city issued only 108 citations for sign violations. By September that number increased to 3608.

In April, officers issued 400 tickets for parking in red zones. In September, that number was just shy of 3000.

A spokesperson for

the city in response to the dramatic upswing in tickets says it is important to note the "lag for processing citations through the Treasurer's office."

As for the rise in tickets at the beach and the bay, the spokesperson attributes the spike to public parks and beaches opening after the health order was lifted.

"The major drop from March to April is explained by the suspension of enforcement and the fact that parking enforcement officers were deployed to other tasks at the start of the pandemic (mid-March). Many parking enforcement officers were stationed at beach parking


lots to enforce those closures following the state and county stayat-home orders in mid-March. When beaches reopened in June, staff was able to return to regular duties issuing citations of the Sunday/holiday regulations that were in effect," says the spokesperson.

Regarding claims that crews have recently painted curbs red in Mission Bay, the spokesperson confirmed that Park and Recreation crews removed nearly a dozen spots from the area, but denied it was a way to chase away RVs. "The location is a peninsula called Playa III, a small road and cul-desac," says the spokesperson. This area previously had approximately 10 parallel parking spaces. City staff were noticing an increase of large vehicles not being able to easily turn out of the parking lot to exit, due to the cars parked along the curb, creating a very tight space for those vehicles to turn.

"On busy days, City staff also noticed pedestrians walking into the street between the parked cars, and not seeing vehicles driving down the road to exit the parking lot."

Added the spokesperson, "City staff determined it would be prudent to improve safety conditions by painting a red curb to no longer allow parking along the cul-de-sac and the small one-way road. This was due to safety concerns for pedestrians and park users and not to impede visitor access to Mission Bay."

Meanwhile, Amber worries about finding a safe place to park her family for the night and remains frustrated at the level of enforcement as she tries to navigate her and her family's new no-

"The city should offer more resources for us and so many others. Thousands of people have lost their jobs and their homes because of this. There should be a place we can go. Instead, we are greeted with more and more officers whose sole goal is to write tickets. They pour all of this money into enforcement when it could go to finding solutions for people like us."

Timothy Steele (b. 1948) is an American poet and one of the leading proponents of the New Formalism, which seeks to return to the traditional structures and devices of poetry, including meter, rhyme, and traditional poetic forms such as the sonnet. He is well known for his critical work on English prosody, *All the Fun's in How You Say a Thing*, and his critique of modern

"free verse," *Missing Measures.* Steele was one of the founding members of the West Chester University Poetry Conference, which helped give birth to the modern revival of formal verse. While Steele has generally rejected the idea that his poetry is part of the New Formalist movement (which suggests an interest in style over substance), critics have noted that his work almost exclusively employs full rhymes (vs. half rhymes), and rarely uses metrical substitutions or enjambment — rendering his poems more formal than those of most New Formalists.

Except, since the lockdown, Old Town is pretty-much deserted. In the silence, you can hear his two-note bongos up and down San Diego Avenue. A couple of dollar bills sit in his tips bucket. "God Bless you!" it reads

Ooh. I get whiffs of carne asada. A couple of Mexican cafes are making tacos right out on the street. But no seats. You've gotta find your own space to eat them. People have to take them off to their cars, if they have them.

which leads to Congress Street. It's even more deserted. All except for that Italian place that has been here forever. Pizza Bella. Hey hey! Open for take-out! I'm in like Flynn.

I see they have a whole empty patio in the middle of the building. The counter guy, Lou, gives me a menu and says I can go into the courtyard to sit, but just to check the options.

So I'm looking at the menu.

"Our Sigma Chi was voted 'Best pizza in America' on ABC's Mike and Matey Show. It was a kind of Good Morning America," he says. Huh. Best in America! That's impressive. I think seriously of going pizza, just to see what The Best tastes like.

They start at 13 bucks for the "personal"

garlic bread and a side salad as part of the deal), and main entrees such as Shrimp Alfredo go up to \$21. But they do have meatball sandwiches for \$11. I go for an appetizer-size spicy BBQ wings \vec{s}_{0} (\$10.95 for eight). Oh, and while I'm waiting, a glass of wine, \$10,

which Lou lets me drink at one of the tables. A nice Pinot Grigio. Couple of gents come up with a whole bottle of wine. They're waiting for their take-out too. Wine's a Salmon Creek Cab. They're regulars.

> I take my wings up to the Old Town Plaza, even though, heck, all seating has been hauled away here too. So I kinda wander from one fence post to the next, pausing to haul out one chicken wing from the box at a time. Interesting sloppy BBQ taste, though. Then, aah: you can almost lay the box down on this big stone ball in the plaza. But I don't, because it has a plaque set into it. "On this spot the United States flag was first raised in Southern California by Lt. Stephen C. Rowan commanding

sailors and marines July 29, 1846."

I try to imagine that scene in the dusty summer plaza as I walk and chew these very tender, juicy wings. I think of the American sailors and marines, and of the Mexican citizens of the plaza who suddenly weren't Mexican citizens any more.

The wings: super sloppy, sweet, spicy, savory, and at eight pieces, the perfect stomach-filler. I'm bloated, but super-satisfied.

And — hey hey! —I'm back next day. Because I keep remembering Lou mentioning that pizza. "Best in America." Sigma Chi.

This time it's Michael behind the counter. "Sigma Chi?" he says. "Sure. Our winner. Italian sausage, bacon, pepperoni, primavera veggies. What size?"

Of course I go for the "personal." It costs \$14.95. Only other quite as good, Michael says, is the "Kitchen Pizza." (It has "everything but the kitchen sink," menu says.) Problem: no personal size.

So, second day in a row, I'm back to the grassy plaza, under that tall mast, working on a big slice of this scrumptious pizza. Chewing, walking, contemplating all the scenes this place must have witnessed: bullfights, fiestas, parades. Easy to evoke, now nobody's here.

Thing about the pizza is its airy, almost crunchy crust; and its tons of sausage, bacon, and pepperoni. And sautéed chunks of celery, cucumber, carrot

demand the *tortilleros* barely keep up: the last of my small flour tortillas goes straight from the grill into my bag. The perfect combination of fluffy and elastic, these *harina* beauties are yummy enough to

eat on their own. They'll still be warm when I get them home.

Why would people wait for tortillas? Because

they're made right there in front of you, pressed

and grilled on a large, round *comal* that sits beneath a ventilation hood roughly between

But first, I have another stop to make, just on the outside of the store. There, from a window counter facing the Pancho Villa parking lot, Taquería Zapata dishes up tacos made on Adelita's terrific corn tortillas.

For years, the counter has kept its street tacos under two bucks apiece — and still does, sorta. They go two for \$4 now, which means I'm going to eat four today. In a way, the twofer pricing will protect me from myself. I might have set-

tled for three tacos, otherwise, and missed out on that filling fourth. There aren't as

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When you can't stop eating Fredcel Lumpia

Fredcel Lumpias & Catering; 3876 38th Street, City Heights. Nobody's out to bad-mouth underperforming restaurants during a pandemic, shutdown or otherwise, so I'm not here to name names. But I will say that we took the family out to try out a new-to-us Filipino restaurant last week, and found only bitter disappointment. The food just didn't taste good, and not even the lumpia could salvage our meals

Bottom line here, is that I owed the kids good lumpia. So with restaurant dining closed this week, I went looking for what's said to be the best in town.

That would be Fredcel Lumpia & Catering. Combining the names of married

Rodriguez, the small, 14-yearold business sits on a side street in the Cherokee Park

aspect that certainly bolsters Fredcel's business is the price. Currently, lumpia run about 50 cents apiece, meaning my order of 20 cost just 10 bucks. That 20 might have been plenty — if I were eating them all myself. But these crispy, savory rolls are so tasty, and so instantly addicting, I had barely taken the vented I turned around and they were gone.

Fortunately, lumpia wasn't the only thing on the menu. In normal times, Fredcel operates as a traditional Filipino *turo-turo* — or "point point" - type eatery. Meaning customers get to look over a cafeteria-like line of hot dishes in large chafing pans, and point to which ones look best.

However, in covid times, Fredcel's glass counter is off limits to customers, so a hand-written menu sits at the front, revealing which dishes are offered this day. I wound up choosing between a classic *adobo* chicken and a pork menudo, before settling on the



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and deep fried. afritada, featuring braised, bone-in chicken, swimming in a slightly tangy tomato sauce

with potatoes. Again, the cost was marvelously low. A combo with two sides (steamed rice and pancit) went for \$9.50. I might have added a second protein for a buck or so more, except the portion of rice, noodles, and chicken was already so heaping, my Styrofoam to-go container could barely contain it and refused to stay closed.

This simple and huge — if not very photogenic — meal was twice the amount of food and good flavor than the spread we had spent 40 bucks on the week prior. I can only imagine how many parties Fredcel Catering has made affordable and delicious over the years, with its variety of dishes.

But for anyone who loves food, it has to start with the lumpia. While plotting this story, I had planned to cut a lumpia in half, hoping to offer a good look at the mixture of minced beef, onions, carrots, and celery that make them so good (vegetarian lumpia are also available). But small hands grabbed away all the lumpia so quickly that, in retrospect, I was lucky to get a shot of their fried wrappers. Whether dipped in a very slightly spicy sweet-and-sour sauce, or straight out of the box, these were in fact the redemptive lumpia my family needed. A box of these makes the perfect pandemic comfort food. And, however many you think you can eat in one sitting — order twice as many. by Ian Anderson



Ceiling caved in Gary

Wilson's new album is *Tormented.* Which is not to say that Gary Wilson himself — notorious denizen of San Diego's weirder side — is necessarily tormented. Although he came reasonably close to going over the edge; closer than his other albums have taken him.

"The album was recorded

gone days he may not have actually lived, girlfriends who may or may not have been real, and his perpetual loneliness in the "Twilight Zone."

But he's not immune to some real-life revelry. "My favorite restaurant in San Diego is Filippi's, located in The Little Italy area near downtown. A little wine and a cheese pizza at Filippi's and

at my pad," explains the artist. "While recording the album, my ceiling collapsed. The bedroom ceiling in the room where all my instruments and recording gear are set up. Damaged a lot of my equipment. That's showbiz."

Wilson believes the album reflects how "We all have our ups and downs on our journey through life. One moment I'm happy. The next moment I'm sad."

In his long-running oneman-band fashion, Wilson layered his own keyboards, guitar, bass, drums, and drum machine on the album. "Also vocals, with the help of my band The Blind Dates. I try to make it sound like a band behind me. The above instruments plus upright bass and cello, are my favorite instruments, the cello being the most challenging. Lyrically, *Tormented*'s classi I am in paradise. Their pizza reminds me of the pizza from my hometown, Endicott, New York."

His lifelong cinemania also helps. "I started working as an usher at the UA Glasshouse 6 around 1981-1982," Wilson remembers. "I helped secure the seats to the floor before they opened. Stayed with UA Glasshouse for five years before moving on to The Academy Theatre on 37th and University Avenue. The Academy Theatre at one time was part of the Landmark Theatre chain. Monty Jones (the unofficial mayor of Kensington) managed The Academy Theatre. Before working there Monty booked my band Gary Wilson And The Blind Dates at San Diego State University. Thus, it was like working with your friend.

"Had good times at both theaters. One of my favorite films was the Jack Nicholson/ Meryl Streep movie *Ironweed*. Though the film takes place in depression time Albany, New York, it makes me think of being homeless in Binghamton, New York, about eight miles from my hometown of Endicott."

The virus abides for now, of course, but Wilson globetrots when he gets the chance. "I did two tours in Europe. The band and I were treated well and we had a good time. The thing about touring Europe is that you can feel the history and age of the various cities and countries. Hope to go back sometime in the future."

Asked about his seeminglyinexhaustible supply of stage costumes - mixing hats, wigs, sunglasses, women's clothes, uniforms, institutional clothing, gauze, bolstered sometimes with flung flour and/or paint - he allows, "I do have an assortment of wigs and other wearable robes and sunglasses. I can always use more. Artist Kelly Paige Standard made me a beautiful robe which I wore on my last tour. Kelly also painted the cover for my latest album."

Next for this juggernaut of arcane? "Working on a new album and more shows." — Andrew Hamlin

Needle to the groove

Since the shutdown of our venues county-wide in March, record sales are trending upwards for most of our local record vendors. One reason for the uptick in sales is that old heads are sharing the needle-to-the-groove experience with our quarantined post-millennials.

Local collectors I've spoken to report an almost magical allure to music on vinyl. The say playing the right 12-inch or 7-inch polyvinyl chloride spinning discs subliminally cues young San Diegans to put down their cell phones and convene by the music source and its accompanying loudspeakers. Especially if a current Billboard Hot 100 artist sampled the record playing. Take the early 70s hit "I Love You For All Seasons" by The Fuzz — the groms might wonder why 21 Savage and J. Cole aren't rapping in between the verses.

In my household, face-

to-face communication experiences near the record player begin when I recount a memory jarred by the song playing. Then if I'm lucky, I'll transition into something of a pep talk before my kids pick up their phones again.

Another father, Nathan Apodaca, parlayed his love for 70s jams into pep talks with a national audience. In late September, the Idaho Falls resident reportedly started his day with a broken down vehicle. Bummer, right? Not for Apodaca. He hopped onto a San Diegomanufactured Sector 9 longboard and skated to the potato processing factory where he worked. On the way there, the 37-year-old man created a selfieskate video lipsynching to Stevie Nicks' lead vocals on the circa-1977 Fleetwood Mac song "Dreams." He uploaded the clip onto his @420doggface208 account on TikTok on September 25. A day or so later, the video went viral. It currently has 11.7 million views and counting. The thing is, much of TikTok's audience is from the postmillennial sect. Reportedly 41 percent of its users are between the ages of 16 and 24, making their grandparents probable listeners of "Dreams" when the song topped the Billboard Hot

100 chart in 1977. About 43

years later, and three days after

Apodaca's selfie-skate video was uploaded, "Dreams' racked up 2.9 million on-demand U.S. streams and 3000 in digital download sales – numbers up 88.7 percent and 374 percent, respectively," reported *Billboard*. Apodaca became a 2020 viral sensation, and in two months, reportedly made

> \$340,000 in donated monies and swag from Sector 9, Sayer Nissan, Vivint, and Ocean Spray — and appeared on national news, and radio shows spreading good vibes.

Fast forward to Christmas season 2020, and I recently sold two *Best of Fleetwood Mac* cassettes with "Dreams" on the track lists, thanks to Apodaca.

"That's because they are re-releasing the Walkmans," Bernie Fishman said to me. Fishman owns Beat Box used to be a dollar-bin item. Records in Logan Heights. "And the *Rumours* record

with 'Dreams' on it?" I asked. "The most I'll sell *Rumours*

for is \$15. I'm sure other spots charge more, because they'll probably get it."

On a quick search on eBay, I found a couple of vendors selling the *Rumours* record for

over \$1500 apiece. "It's not a rare record, they sold millions of them, and they used to be in one-dollar bins for a long time, but they have dried up."

"And are parents buying records from you, or younger kids?" I asked.

"Nowadays, parents are buying their kids record players because they are cool gifts. And the kids are looking for records, like *Rumours*, so that they can share good memories with their parents back home.

It's come to a full circle." Walmart.com has over 30 different record players available, many of which start at \$45 apiece. That's almost the same price they sold for when "Dreams" first dropped in 1977.

SCOTT WEST

The titular frontman of the Scott West Band has recorded with guest contributors such as Cake bassist Gabe Nelson, Lee Rocker (Stray Cats), and Prairie Prince (The Tubes, Jefferson Starship). Since the early 2000s, he's been working with Tesla members, including bassist Brian Wheat, guitarist Frank Hannon, and drummer Troy Luckketta, recording his 2010 holiday album *California Christmas* at Tesla's Sacramento studio. West recently made his music video directorial debut with the shoot for his song "Fallback," featuring Frank Hannon, Steel Breeze singer-guitarist Dan Bauer, and Stoneground guitarist Tim Barnes, who played with West's earlier Sacramento band. "'Fallback' is about being at the crossroads of a relationship, when you have to decide whether you're going to pick it up and make the relationship work, or you're going to kick it down and move on to something that is hopefully better," says West. "We shot most of the video on San Diego beaches, including Mission Beach, La Jolla, Del Mar, and Encinitas. We did shoot a sunset shot at a famous surfer spot, Black Rock in west Maui." "Fallback" was the fourth single from West's 2006 album *Standing on the Moon*, soon to be re-released in a remastered version completed at Air Studios London. The video features Kristiana Koroleva, who was Miss Russia in the 2016 Miss Universe pageant



THE RED STEP

Tobias Nathaniel of the Black Heart Procession formed The Red Step with musicians from the garage rock scene in his new home of Belgrade, Serbia's capital city: keyboardist Boris Eftovski, bassist Rudolf Cibulski, and drummer Vladimir Markoski (who played drums with Andre Williams), all hailing from the longstanding Serbian garage rock band Kazna za uši. Nathaniel seems to be eschewing keyboards to instead handle vocals and guitar, Londoner Sarah Jane Seatherton plays cello, and both Eftovski and Markoski have been members of the Black Heart Procession. The Red Step's eponymous debut was just released by Chicago's Pravda Records via streaming platforms and on colored marbled vinyl with an accompanying download card. A single for "Reset" is available online, and a video recently debuted for "Black Summer," which was reportedly written four years ago as a prediction of what might happen in Donald Trump were elected president. Tobias Nathaniel has also recorded with indie rockers Blonde Redhead and Bauhaus bassist David J (who ended up living in San Diego), and he played piano on what became the "Evil Morty" theme on the TV show *Rick and Morty.* He was recently interviewed for the podcast *Conan Neutron's Protonic Reversal*.



NOAH C. LEKAS

Saturday Night Sage, a collection of poetry and narrative prose by Noah C. Lekas, was the first book released by local label Blind Owl Records, founded by singer-guitarist Daniel Cervantes (Whiskey Circle, Mrs. Henry, Creature & the Woods). Released last year, audio and visual pieces inspired by the book were produced by locals Joshua and Jeremiah Zimmerman (The Silent Comedy), Ben Ambrosini (Taken By Canadians), and members of Mrs. Henry. In February, Blind Owl will release a collaborative spoken word EP based on the book, Sounds From the Shadow Factory, with tracks by Ben Ambrosini, Chad Lee (The Silent Comedy), and Mrs. Henry. The first single "Saturday Night Sage" features Howlin Rain accompanying Noah C. Lekas. "The Howlin Rain music here was dug out of a rehearsal recording from one of our past jams," says bandleader Ethan Miller. "It was the kind of thing we play to warm up when we first reconvene, usually someone is still changing guitar strings or setting up an amp and whoever is ready begins an improv and everyone joins in eventually. Dan Cervantes took what probably never would have been revisited, heard the spirit in it, and brilliantly edited and overdubbed a few subtle elements to really make it a thing and create a piece that could thread into Noah's fantastic neo-beat poetry. In the end, that off-the-cuff 'found' music source is a really cool vehicle for Noah's words."



CROCODILES

Indie/fuzz-rock duo Crocodiles features Brandon Welchez (the Prayers) and Charles Rowland (Some Girls), who've been playing together since they were teenagers in San Diego bands such as the Plot to Blow Up the Eiffel Tower and the Prayers. Kate Clover directed the video for their new single "Christmas In Hell," which doesn't come from any existing release. "The world needed a Christmas song reflective of the total shittiness of 2020, so last week we decided to write one," says Welchez. "We recorded it immediately via email and shot the video in our respective apartments under Kate's direction. Hopefully, it makes your holiday season slightly less shitty." The video features a socially distanced Santa and one coked up elf enacting a lonely holiday, as Wells Fargo prepares to repossess Saint Nick's workshop, forcing massive elf layoffs. The improbably chirpy pop rock sheen is counterbalanced with lyrics such as "Mommy's in the hospital, daddy's out of work, fascists on the TV screen, the world is run by jerks."

Other new locally created Christmas-themed music includes a single called "Christmas With Friends" from Safety Orange, founded in the mid-90s by singer-bassist Sol Turpin (40 Oz to Freedom), a San Diego native, with singer-guitarist Greg Karlo (who once played with Turpin in a Cure tribute band). The video for Josie Day's new original Christmas song "I Can't Wait For Christmas" was filmed at last year's December Nights in Balboa Park. Jose Sinatra may not be able to host OB's longtime Christmas Eve Karaoke event, but the comedic singer and his longtime musical partner Troy Dante are marking the holidays by releasing their version of "The Xmas Song," replacing the lyrics about chestnuts roasting on an open fire with their own bawdy phrases. 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The Prom: **Bashing bumpkins**

hespian rhymes with lesbian. Ain't that a hoot? Seldom has confronting homophobia head on appeared more proudly patronizing or signaled less pleasure than here. It would be one thing were The Prom a satire warning fatuous celebrities to stick to their craft and

avoid poking their noses in politics. (Were that the case, Meryl

Streep would probably have taken a pass.) What we have here is a glittering example of cecity being the mother of invention.

With their latest production, a musical based on the life of Eleanor Roosevelt, opening and closing on the same night, an overly-theatrical ensemble of career narcissists led by Dee Dee Allen (Meryl Streep) — a rapidly aging leading lady still looking to command power — must face the reality of failure. (One assumes the name Dee Dee Allen was a holdover from the play that served as source material, for where else would a film

as haphazardly strung together as this get off naming its lead after cutterextraordinaire DeDe Allen [The Hustler, Bonnie and Clyde]?) She's joined by Barry Glickman (James Corden), her equally entitled and suffocatingly selfabsorbed co-star; chorus girl Angie (Nicole Kidman); and nobody Trent (Andrew Rannells),

an actor/bartender between gigs and des-

perate to flaunt his degree from Juilliard. It's a running gag that doesn't bear repeating.

Instead of taking a nod from the critics who panned the play-with-amovie for its heavy-handedness, director Ryan Murphy & Co. proceed to hurl bricks at their audience in the form of foregone messaging. Looking to stay relevant, the effete opportunists turn to activism as a way out. The troupe must have hit the "I Feel Lucky" function on Google's homepage and hit paydirt on the very first result. Up comes news of a town in Indiana that's cancelling its prom over

the legal rights scuffle that might ensue if a same-sex couple were allowed to attend. For the sake of argument, we'll overlook this chunk of random plotting, but not the YouTube video that's attached. It features the school's principal (Keegan-Michael Key) evoking the name of Eleanor Roosevelt. Plotting doesn't get more plodding.

Judging by the script, the only two residents of Indiana who aren't flaming homophobes are Emma Nolan (Jo

Ellen Pellman) and her closeted partner Alyssa Greene (Ariana DeBose). (You'd stay in the closet too if your mother [Kerry Washington] was the vocal anti-gay chair of the PTA.) As written, there is nothing remotely endearing about these so-called Broadway liberals, who in truth are nothing more than a band of intellectual bigots waiting for a bunch of backwoods bumpkins to come along and show the elite the errors of their ways.

What can be said of his performance other than Corden blew? It's the same old cantankerous queen that Paul Lynde and Rip Taylor made a career out of exploiting. I'd sooner believe Dumbo flew than any of their fits of cartoonishly sincere insincerity. Kudos to Corden for having appeared in two of the worst musicals I have ever had the displeasure to endure. The reason Cats outshines The Prom has nothing to do with quality and everything to

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do with a shorter running time.

Director Murphy's (Running With Scissors, Eat Pray Love) camera covers the musical numbers with more thrusts and pull-backs than you'd find in a porno. His idea of opening up a play is restaging one of the film's numerous instantly forgettable musical numbers at a monster truck rally or an Applebee's, where the sight of La Streep dining is bound to draw titters. If Murphy had spent as much time structuring those numbers as he did cutting around his cast's inability to dance, this leaden Broadway bumpup might have earned a spot next to the entertaining likes of Hairspray and Rock Of Ages. My initial instinct was to call this the worst musical to disgrace screens since Mamma Mia! 2, but Lily James' performance had more going for it than any in this.

In case their alcoholic states aren't obvious, director Thomas Vinterberg (The Celebration, The Hunt) decides to underscore their unsobriety

by going hand-held. In the end, some- $\underset{\aleph}{\mbox{\scriptsize \sc one}}$ one will die, just not the one character that might move this in the opposite direction of "Just Say No!" And if ever a film didn't warrant a happy ending, it's this. If Vinterberg's point is that alcoholism is an equal opportunity disease that doesn't recognize class or socioeconomic lines, did we really need another feature-length PSA to wake us up? Good performances, but when all is said and done, who cares? ₩ 2020 — S.M. •

SANTA'S WORKSHOP (1932) In my teens, my friend Timothy Murphy asked me, "You know what my Uncle Roy says Jews do on Christmas Day?" There's nothing like hate for the holidays. No, my ruddyfaced, only goyish kid on an all-Jewish block, I thought. What does your sozzled Uncle Roy say the Jews do on Christmas Day? Timmy smiled, threw out his chest, and snarled, "They stay home and count their money." No, Timmy. We put dead trees in our living rooms, life-sized Sears Santas with 100-watt bulbs in their bellies on our front stoops, guzzle boilermakers to commemorate the birth of our Lord and Savior, and pay retail for gifts. On top of that, Timmy, if I had your Uncle Roy's money I'd have thrown mine away.

Fortunately, this adorable brush with ignorance was not my first foreglimpse into holiday traditions. Like many, I was introduced to Santa Claus partly through Haddon Sundblom's nostalgic holiday illustrations for Coca-Cola and partly through a pair of merry Walt Disney cartoons. (When asked to validate the existence of Santa, my dad laughed it off with, "We're Jews.") Santa's Workshop opens on Christmas Eve, with Santa's elves still hauling last-minute sacks of mail to the titular toy mill. Santa (voiced by a basso, overly-joyous Walter Geiger) is a circle-upon-circle enchantment, a jelly-bellied gent whose cheeks are so round that it takes a second to realize that the two rings bordering his nose are facial features, not reading glasses. Allow your eyes to roam freely

about the frame, taking in a myriad of pixies — each with unique character traits and functions — working their various assembly lines. (A Noah's Ark float with at least a dozen movable characters on deck and/or poking their heads out of portholes warrants a few rewinds.)

But while I am loath to besmirch the festivity of the season, I would fall short in my duties as a critic if I failed to draw attention to the anal fetishism of Walter Elias Disney. The pre-code land of un-PC wonders starts innocently enough, with an elf lifting a reindeer's tail to give its backside a wipe. Next up: a pile of reindeer poop being mucked out of Vixen's stall, followed by a hobby-horse being drilled a new rectus in which to glue a tail. Then things get racially murky to boot: while passing through quality control, Santa stamps his "OK" on the behind of the "Ma-ma"-squeaking little white dolly, but won't handle the black ragdoll, which falls to one knee and, in her best Jolson, rasps "Mammy!" before bouncing tush-fist onto the rubber stamp.

The scene in question has been excised from the print currently playing on Disney+, but there's plenty of racial stereotyping to go around. Parades were a custom in Silly Symphonies - in this case, the toys form a line and march into Santa's bag. The short would lose a minute of its running time and its continuity would take a hit were they to censor the band of marching minstrels, the duo of Asian stereotypes, and the horadancing gent with his flowing beard, hook nose, and Hasidic hat positioned squarely behind the wind-up pig. But there's no knocking success. The cartoon was such a hit that it was followed up the next year with The Night Before Christmas.

CHRISTMAS COMES BUT ONCE A YEAR (1936)

The light of Christmas morn breaks. With a twist of Max and Dave Fleischer's patented stereoscopic tabletop animation device, we're whisked

through the doors of a ramshackle orphanage, wherein stands an anorexic fir that can barely sustain an ornament A Dickensian dormitory houses a dozen or so foundlings, who awaken to find broken toys suspended in threadbare stockings (and not a governess in sight). Thank heavens for Professor Grampy, the inveterate inventor who just happens to be dashing through the snow when the cries of the necessitous tykes reach his outboardmotor-driven sleigh.

Of the 10 Fleischer cartoons to feature Grampy, this Color Classic was the only one in which he didn't appear opposite Betty Boop. The character arrived late on the scene, after the censors forced the studio to put Betty's sinful ways behind her. We're never sure of whose grandfather he is, but his superannuated presence was needed to help trammel Betty's libidinous allure. A lightbulb where a pestel should be flashes atop the mortar board perched on his egregiously chipper noggin. Leave it to Grampy to turn the dining room table into his personal Toys R Us, a makeshift workshop where he can assemble presents made from stuff lying around the asylum. (The ingeniously hilarious inventions are spurred by a mechanical turkey that's geared to delight.) The maniacal laugh can be a bit much, but Grampy's otherwise brazen ingenuity and mixmaster legwork make him a delight to watch. Ditto the film's closing minutes, in which the waifs put Grampy's handiwork to the test. The short is in the public domain, which means

there are a number of prints to watch on YouTube.

CHRISTMAS NIGHT (1933)

Trust me on this: you have never seen anything quite like James Tyler's Christmas Night (originally titled Pals). The short stars O. Soglow's comic strip sensation the Little King. When first we meet, the childlike ruler sits alone in his ice skater-drawn carriage, gazing forlornly out the window at his subjects as they prepare for the holiday. A stop in town finds His Loneliness sparking an instant camaraderie with a pair of tramps eyeballing a holiday-dressed department store window. (Minstrel dolls were guite the rage in the '30s. They appear in all three of these cartoons.) An audience with an ominous-sounding department store Santa — he has the only speaking part in the show — finds the minimajesty contemplating the meaning of good will toward men. Either that, or the married monarch is in the market for a little hobosexuality.

The noble *naif* decides to sneak the pair of even more passive vagrants past the aggressively snoring Queen. In no time, the trio strips down to frolic Sandusky-style in the royal outhouse tub. There are plenty of painstakingly precise bits of animation on display. Study the supple, lifelike movement of Santa's hand as he plants the Christmas tree seeds. Note the tender manner in which the crowned head — scrambling to find a stocking to carefully hang by the chimney — gingerly relieves his wife's leg of its nylon casing. This is followed by the plaster-crumbling nails that loosen from the hearth under the weight of the queen's hosiery. Sit back and enjoy this soap-swallowing, bra-baring mélange of pre-code perversity, gussied up with just the right amount of charm and innocence to make it all seem perfectly acceptable for deviant kids of all ages. Another public domain casualty — look for it on YouTube.

member of the Mission Beach Town Council, told the *OB Rag* that no Southern California beach area has been more saturated with vacation rentals. "MB is being destroyed; the first step to recovery is to eliminate the carveout." Andrea Schlageter, chair of the Ocean Beach planning board, agreed with home-share or whole-home short-term stays. But she said that whole-home short-term rentals for more than 20 days per year and the Mission Beach carveout "are a giveaway" to investors. Vacation rentals can still work in mixed-use zones, she said. "It might help revamp our Main Street."

The commission recommended several revisions for the council to consider, suggesting that the whole-house limit be distributed by district or another boundary equally; that there be a requirement that the license holder validate their permanent address to match the rental property; and that restrictions be added for issues like noise mitigation. Planning Commissioner Vicki Granowitz asked about the possibility of putting limits on occupancy to deal with "the party problem." That, however, is governed by state law, Molina said.

Smuggling goods for good Fire-ravaged neighborhood feels crossborder warmth

On December 3, over 50 homes burned down in the Cumbres del Rubí neighborhood of Tijuana; news outlets said the strong Santa Ana winds were at least partly to blame. One M. García reportedly died attempting to rescue her cats. "She was a really nice lady," former resident Ana Wooten said to me on Decem-



ber 6. "She lived by herself; she was able to get out at first." But neighbor Mario Javier Renteria told *ElImparcial.com* that the woman "returned inside, because she had her kittens locked up, which were about ten in total, and escaped with her husband and children just as their house caught on fire. "And in less than ten minutes, the house was basically gone. She was a teacher in a private daycare center." Wooten, a teacher's assistant on maternity

she wasn't able to escape." Continues Wooten, "And the roof fell on her, and someone tried to get her out, and he got really bad burns, but he survived. She used to sell candies right outside the elementary school in the neighborhood." Wooten tells the story of another woman who leave, lives in Imperial Beach now, but says she "grew up around that Tijuana neighborhood, and I know other people that lost their homes there. My friend's father and mother-in-law lost their home, also his brother-in-law and his sister."

The day after the fire, Wooten reached out to her IB neighbors on Facebook and asked for used clothing donations for the families who had lost their homes. Her post garnered more than a hundred replies and 24 donations; one local wrote, "I saw the smoke yesterday. I have clothes for baby boy size three months to 18 months, a few kids' shoes, and a few women's clothes too. All have been washed and clean." Wooten says that every donor "brought at least six bags, and some brought boxes of food, including cereal, canned food, milk, baby cereal, and Gerber baby food."

She couldn't fit all the donations in her car, so she borrowed her mom's van and covered the contributions with blankets. "Luckily, I haven't been stopped, and haven't paid a tax fee." (About four years ago, I reported about a truckload of used clothing and food en route to a Rosarito

orphanage that was stopped by customs; the official reportedly said at the time that the do-gooders could not bring in a large load of used clothing articles, even to donate.)

Wooten reports that "a single mother with a nine-month-old lost her home and everything she owned; her baby didn't have any food, blankets, or clothes to wear. She cried when I took out diapers, blankets, baby clothes, 40 cans of Gerber, and eight baby rice portions of cereal. She asked me to thank the lady that donated all those things personally, and she was super thankful. There was a pastor that lost her home, and thankfully she was building a church and was able to move inside her church to live. I took a lot of donations to her so she could pass around things for the people she was letting stay with her."

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Creme de la Weird

- The Design Museum in London has included a "DIY meal kit" featuring steaks that could be grown from a diner's own human cells among the nominees in its Beazley Designs of the Year exhibit. Developers of the Ouroboros Steak envision that an individual will be able to harvest cells from their own cheek and feed them with serum derived from donated blood that has expired, Dezeen reported. After about three months, the steaks would be fully grown. "People think that eating oneself is cannibalism, which technically this is not," said Grace Knight, one of the designers. Researcher Orkan Telhan added, "Our design is scientifically and economically feasible but also ironic in many ways," he added.

Tis the Season

An animal rescue worker in Adelaide, Australia, thought she was being pranked when Amanda McCormick called on Dec. 2 to report she had discovered a koala in her Christmas tree. The little marsupial didn't come with the tree; it wandered in the house and found a cozy new home among the ornaments, 9News reported. The female koala was safely removed to its more natural habitat. "Koalas are very curious creatures, and if the opportunity presents itself, they will investigate," the rescue team said.

 Socially distanced visitors to Tokyo's Sunshine Aquarium were delighted to see Santa Claus, complete with a mask and flippers and holding a Christmas wreath, gliding among banana fish and a stingray in a huge tank on Dec. 4, according to Reuters. The swimming Santa, who also used a bazookalike feeder to shoot treats to the fish, is a 20year tradition at the aquarium. "I know it's difficult to hold events like these because of the coronavirus situation," said visitor Ayami Kobayashi, 35, "but I'm grateful they still held the event."

Bright Idea

- Matthew Piercey, 44, has been indicted on 31 federal felony counts related to a suspected Ponzi scheme, but when FBI agents tried to arrest him in Redding, California, on Nov. 16, he took off, authorities said. NBC News reported agents followed him to Lake Shasta, where Piercey pulled a \$1200 Yamaha 350LI Seascooter out of his vehicle, then disappeared into the frigid water, spending about 25 minutes "out of sight underwater where law enforcement could only see bubbles," Assistant U.S. Attorney Christopher Hales wrote in court papers. The agents waited him out and arrested him when he resurfaced. Piercey faces up to 20 year in prison if convicted.

Signs of the Times

- Alexios Gerakis, 37, a candlemaker in Thessaloniki, Greece, has updated his Santa Claus candles for 2020 with blue surgical masks covering the big elf's beard. "Because of the times, we are trying to convey a message that health comes first, then everything else," Gerakis told Reuters Television. His snowmen candles also sport masks. And in Lajosmizse, Hungary, confectioner Laszlo Rimoczi can't keep up with the orders after he added tiny marzipan surgical masks to his chocolate Santas. He has simplified the design, Reuters reported, and has increased production to about 100 Santas a day in his rural workshop. Father Christmas "will have to wear a mask because Santa has to show a good example to people," Rimoczi said.

Names in the News

A newly elected local councilman in Ompundja, Namibia, is assuring constituents that he has no plans for world domination, despite his unfortunate name: Uunona Adolf Hitler. The 54-year-old, who prefers to be called Mr. Uunona, told a German news website that his father named him without an understanding of the Nazi leader, *Sky News* reported. Namibia is a former German colony, so many streets, places and people have German names. "It was a perfectly normal name for me when I was a kid," Uunona said.

Cliches Come to Life

After a heated argument with his wife in late November, a 48-year-old unnamed man from Como, Italy, stepped outside to walk it off and kept on walking until he was stopped a week later by police officers patrolling after curfew in Gimarra, more than 260 miles away, Oddity Central reported. The man said he had walked the entire way, without using any other modes of transportation and relied on the kindness of strangers for food and drink. "I'm fine. I'm just a little tired," he said. His wife, who had reported him missing, picked him up the next day, but had to pay a fine of almost \$500 for his violation of the curfew.

Least Competent Criminal

- Daniel M. Rizza, 20, of McKeesport, Pennsylvania, was driving a gray Audi SUV on Nov. 27 when he , ran out of gas and called state police to ask for help. But when he was told a trooper would be responding, he abruptly said he'd changed his mind and hung up, according to court documents. WTAJ reported that the trooper responding to the call learned en route that a gray Audi had been reported stolen nearby earlier in the day, and after a check of the SUV's make, model, identification number and registration, he arrested Rizza, who was charged with a felony count of receiving stolen property.

Turnabout Is Fair Play

- An unnamed hunter near the Czech Republic village of Horni Plana contacted police in late November after a deer startled by the man's dogs charged him, snagging his .22-caliber rifle on its antlers before running into the woods, United Press International reported. The gun was unloaded, and police said another hunter saw the stag more than a half-mile away with the rifle still hanging from its antlers.
