Quesadillas: melting cheese and making bank online

Starting the second week of January, San Diegans have noticed a shortage of giant-sized tortillas. The anomaly is partly due to the TikTok app's 3 billion and counting #tortillatrend hashtagged video views. It seems post-millennials and millennials, who make up more than 50 percent of the video-sharing app audience, are buying up the near 20-inch flour-and-lard tortillas, then grilling them with cheese and often leftovers.

"People are scooping them up because of the challenge," corroborated Rudy Serrano on January 25, "but I found some at Food Bowl Market and Deli." Serrano cooks at the Big Kitchen cafe on Grape Street in South Park, a half a mile north of the Food Bowl at Cedar and Fern. "We downloaded the app because my five-year-old daughter likes watching the

dance videos. I think the tortilla trend is better than the dancing trends on TikTok. All you get from most of the trends is judgment. At least you get a meal out of this #tortillatrend. And if you don't ever cook, you're teaching yourself how to cook. You have to follow a process and gotta make sure whatever protein you cook is cooked." TikTok videos must be one minute or

tortilla wrap with *birria* meat, cabbage, cheese, and salsa, then grilled it in my Panini press. I call it queso-birria."

Serrano has cooked at the cafe,

known for its specialty omelets, for over 20 years. He's made the orders to-go since the shutdown. "It's different doing take-out for

song "Spam" by Muddy Boots and the Porch Pounders. He captioned it, "SPAM WRAP IS HERE!!!! Fried spam, onion rings, egg fried rice, sesame seeds, jack cheese, and spicy mayo inside and outside for that perfect sear." He immediately received three orders.

less, so many of the DIY tutorials are edited and emblazoned with text pop-ups and voiceovers to provide viewers with good cooking intel in a short timeframe. Often, licensed background music is added for ambience.

Some of the more popular #tortillatrend videos employ unorthodix quesadilla fillings, things like peanut dipping sauce and Nutella. "No mames güey [You gotta be kidding, bro]," said Jorge from Chula Vista, "IMHO, it's crazy what they are [stuffing] in their quesadillas. They're just trying to shock people for the likes." Plus, he says, "The word quesadilla translates to 'little cheesy thing' in English. These on

TikTok are grandote [huge]." Serrano agrees: "Some ingredients just don't make sense; I can tell they won't work. But I'll give 'em an 'A' for effort." And the effort is key. "The way people are making them on TikTok is a shorthand tutorial on how to cook, because you only have like a minute to show how to make this. And the kids or young adults are like: 'I can do that, I wanna try that.' The thing is, you probably had all the ingredients in the refrigerator, and these video challenges are motivations for the viewers to make quesadillas. And when they post about it, people are like, 'That looks so good.' Two things get fed: your stomach and your ego. I know I'm guilty of it. Recently, I made a

breakfast, where breakfast is usually better eaten hot on the spot. You can't enjoy it as much without [owner] Judy's smile. That's what hurt us. Yeah, the food speaks for itself, but you miss out on the atmosphere and us employees. People went there for the bonus of getting a hug from a stranger or a random conversation. It's hard to get that in a to-go container."

That lack of contact may be part of what fuels the interest in social media cuisine, "especially since the shutdowns. People are anxious. People are trying to find the next high; they log into TikTok to stimulate the brain and get excited about food or whatever piques their interest. And when you get likes, that makes you feel relevant, wanted, appreciated — things many people can't get right now because everyone's at home"

On a search for quesadillas on the Facebook Market page, I found over a dozen San Diego dwellers offering quesadillas, starting from basic cheese variations at \$4 apiece to \$12 deluxe quesadillas filled with goat or lamb meat and a side of veggies. Hundreds of Instagrammers worldwide have followed the TikTokkers' #tortillatrend, including salsa and tortilla companies. "I've been doing it," Serrano said, "not deliveries, but for pickup. I'll reach out to my friends about making a big pot of birria or mole. There's only three of us in our house, and I'll sell the rest. We'll get like 10-15 orders. It's a reasonable price with no delivery fees. People get a home-cooked meal."

I asked Serrano what he was making that evening for the #tortillachallenge." "Spam!" he replied. Later that night, he posted a video on his TikTok, backed with the country

Maggie McCann speaks for the trees

A battle to save 35 stately old pepper trees, the last still framing the streets of Kensington, is far from over. The latest skirmish erupted in September when the city announced that the four trees would be removed due to decay and other structural defects. First to go was Karla, a centurion located at 4190 Monroe Street - until she was toppled on January 22. Karla had an overhanging branch in need of trimming, but by noon, a city crew had carted away every last one of her shade-bearing limbs, leaving only a stump. Residents were told by crew workers that the city would be back Monday for the three more pepper trees across from the Kensington Community Church on Marlborough Drive.

Karla's overhang had been an issue for some time. "On October 17, 2019, a public request came in through 'Get it Done' to review the Monroe Avenue pepper trees for safety between Edgeware Road and 42nd Street," according to city forester Brian Widener. He evaluated the big tree and decided it had reached its end, "as it is no longer a viable tree and suffers from significant decay and structural defects throughout all the stems. One of the 21-inch diameter limbs has at least 13 inches hollow." Pepper tree longevity is anywhere from 50 to 150 years, Widener wrote. "This tree can no longer be saved." Other public requests and an assessment extended to the trees on Marlborough, which he said "pose a significant risk to our community in the right of way."

Newsom's nemesis readies for recall

Ex-San Diego mayor Kevin Faulconer, facing a daunting array of well-heeled Republican challengers to his bid to become governor in the face of a possible recall of Democratic incumbent Gavin Newsom, has hit the money circuit. State disclosure records show that Faulconer's just-created gubernatorial exploratory campaign committee raised a total of \$501,200 from January 12 to January 27 of this year, with many of the donors hailing from the super-rich reaches of La Jolla and Rancho Santa Fe.

Kelly Burt, chairman and CEO of Price Self Storage, a real estate mogul who took part in the closed-door meeting of kingmakers that picked Faulconer to run for mayor after a scandal caused the fall of Democrat Bob Filner in 2013, gave his longtime ally \$64,800 on January 21. Burt's wife Laurie did the same. When he helped engineer Faulconer's rise to mayor, Burt was head of a political committee calling itself New Majority San Diego. "We don't address the social issues," he told the Voice of San Diego in October 2013.

Doug Barnhart, a Rancho Santa Fe contractor who has long been a major GOP donor, and his wife Nancy, kicked in a total of \$64,800 to the ex-mayor's cause, as did Dallas, Texas computer billionaire Darwin Deason and latest wife Kimberly. In November 2009, Deason and a prior spouse, Katerina Panos, bought the La Jolla oceanfront estate owned by developer Doug Manchester and first wife Betsy — then divorcing — for \$18.15 million, substantially less than the \$33 million asking price. Three years later, Deason forked over \$3284 to La Jolla lobbyist Matthew Peterson to make sure permits for an over-the-top Baroque makeover of the Spindrift Drive property made it through the Faulconer administration's development department. As for prior money-giving, in 2015, Deason funded a super PAC, backing then-Texas governor Rick Perry's presidential aspirations to the tune of \$5 million. But a year later, he switched his financial support to Donald Trump.

Deason's son Doug, also a staunch Trump backer, has been behind a bid to take control of San Diego-based One America News Network, which the ex-president has lately preferred over Fox News. Together with his father, Doug Deason is on the Deason Foundation board, which gave \$5000 to Faulconer's now-defunct One San Diego charity to fund the then-mayor's Thanksgiving turkey handouts in the city's more impoverished neighborhoods.

Phil Oates, chairman of the Buzz Oates Group, son of late developer Marvin "Buzz" Oates, and a partner in the Sacramento Kings basketball team with the sons of Qualcomm billionaire Irwin Jacobs, gave Faulconer's committee \$50,000, filings show. And Los Angeles mega-landlord Gerald Marcil, who manages more than 3300 apartments per a November 2017 account by Los Angeles Times columnist Steve Lopez, along with his wife, gave Faulconer's committee \$68,400. Marcil told Lopez that "lots of communities oppose new construction anywhere near their neighborhoods. That, along with rising construction costs, has pumped up rents, especially in job centers where there are more people making good money," Continued Lopez, "Marcil said he thinks the state's large population of immigrants in the country illegally is a factor, too. He said they're good for his business because they increase the housing demand, but that drives rents higher for everyone."

Having been given new social justice marching orders, two lobbying firms for San Diego are set to be re-upped at a hefty six-figure cost to tax-payers by new Democratic Mayor Todd Gloria and his city council allies. "Funding for this Agreement will come from the General Fund, Municipal Wastewater Fund, Development Services Fund, and the Environmental Services Fund," according to the item on the council's January 26 consent agenda. "These contracts were previously authorized, and this action extends authorization to the Mayor, or their designees, to execute the two additional one-year periods."



Jesus is boss South Bay political powerhouse **Jesus Cardenas** came under fire in 2019 by then-county supervisor candidate and state senator **Ben Hueso** for "gaming" the San Diego Democratic Party central committee, resulting in the endorsement of Hueso's foe, **Nora Vargas**. She ultimately won the election. Now Cardenas, the new chief of staff for San Diego city council-

man **Stephen Whitburn**, has filed his legally required statement of economic interests for last year, revealing that his Chula Vistabased political consulting outfit Grassroots Resources is valued between \$100,000 and \$1 million and grossed between \$10,000 and \$100,000. During the period, Cardenas borrowed between \$10,000 and \$100,000 from the company, per the filing. Single income sources over \$10,000 to the firm included Whitburn for



Whitburn's deputy chief of staff **Codi Vierra** also hails from local Democratic politics. Last year, she picked up between \$10,000 and \$100,000 as campaign manager for La Jolla congressman **Scott Peters**'s reelection drive, her January 11 disclosure filing shows. Meanwhile, **Juan Reyes**, Democratic Mayor **Todd Gloria**'s state and local government affairs manager, reports he received between \$1000 and \$10,000 in the form of a "win

bonus" last year from Gloria's mayoral campaign.

Turkeys and diapers San Diego Mayor Todd Gloria's 2020 Assembly reelection campaign fund, which drew a 2019 lawsuit after it became apparent he wasn't running for the Assembly but instead campaigning for mayor, had a \$68,276 cash balance on the final day of 2020. According to a January 21 disclosure report, during the last two months of the year Gloria used the fund to provide \$171 worth of unspecified "items for Asm [Lorena] Gonzalez Turkey/Diaper drive," and \$262 for "items for Assembly Staff Dinner via Zoom (8 total)." A judge dismissed the lawsuit, but the state's Fair Political Practices Commission subsequently fined the then-mayoral candidate \$200 for what Gloria said was an inadvertent late filing. Gloria critic **Mat Wahlstrom** of Hillcrest has called the commission a "sham and a fraud."

Stuck in the bucks A housing project that promises to transform San Diego's Carmel Mountain Ranch is barreling through city hall in what may be the first test of the city council's new Democratic majority regarding how it treats newly minted political benefactors. "It's a

development that's in the wrong place at the wrong time," **Troy Daum**, the Founder of Carmel Mountain United, told TV station KGTV last month about the proposed 1200-unit development by New Urban West, Inc. of Santa Monica. Called the Trails at Carmel Mountain West, the project seeks to redevelop the old Carmel Mountain Ranch Country Club golf course, shuttered since July 2018. "We aren't against development," Daum told the *Union-Tri*-



New Urban West is no stranger to handling such controversial makeovers, having stepped into the old Escondido Country Club redevelopment following years of bitter warfare between the local citizenry and the original sponsor. That was an outfit called Stuck in the Rough, run by Republican donor **Michael Schlesinger** of Beverly

Hills. A major donor disclosure report, filed with the City Clerk's office on January 22, shows that New Urban West spent \$47,950 on political causes in California during 2020, including \$10,000, its single most significant expenditure, for the San Diego County Democratic Party, which in turn successfully backed the election of the present council majority...The Committee to Recall Jennifer Campbell is officially registered with the City Clerk as of January

20, with **John Thickstun** as its principal officer. The La Jolla attorney has been at the head of the battle against short term vacation rentals. "John was the glue that held us together," **Sue Hopkins**, a UC San Diego professor, told the *Union-Tribune* columnist **Logan Jenkins** in July 2018 regarding Thickstun's role in Save San Diego Neighborhoods, a group battling Airbnb and similar operations. Campbell has proposed new regulations, but the plan "does not have an enforcement mechanism that will keep platforms from engaging in bad behavior," Mission Beach Town Council past president **Gary Wonacott** recently opined.

Kensington resident Maggie McCann disputes the city forester's health report. She now has two active lawsuits against the city, one for skipping the environmental review process for undergrounding in her area despite having done it elsewhere in Kensington, and another for the stealth removal of two other trees. Says McCann, "In January 2019, without warning, the city removed a pepper tree one block away from me, and then I got a knock on the door a few days later from a contractor, telling me they were going to take out my tree, too." McCann had spent a year fighting to protect Kensington's 110-year-old pepper trees through an attempt to get them listed as heritage trees — a status they are eligible for under city policy since they are more than 50 years old. She and other advocates submitted a Conserve-a-Tree nomination in 2018 for all the neighborhood's remaining historic pepper trees. The nomination goes to the city arborist — currently Widener — who forwards it to the Community Forest Advisory Board to make the decision. When the conservationists heard back months later, they were told the Edgeware Road. She then hired Chula Vista city forester Sam Oludunfe to assess its health. "He also looked at the Monroe tree that was removed, and the three trees on Marlborough that were also tagged for removal." The consulting arborist performed a basic tree assessment, finding the one at 4748 Marlborough Drive was afflicted with fungal rot and in need of removal. But the Monroe tree named Karla and the other two on Marlborough "are stable, had moderate to full canopies with strongly attached branches and good foliage." He recommended an advanced tree assessment to determine the structural soundness of the outwardly healthy trees. It wasn't the only independent assessment Karla received.

Monroe Avenue, hired a certified arborist to evaluate his tree. The arborist concluded that the tree was healthy and posed no danger.

"In accordance with public safety and requests made by the public, some pepper trees in the Kensington community have been and are scheduled to be removed." The city says they will replace removed street trees, but not with pepper trees.

Naked in Balboa Park

"See you at the Nudist Colony," says John.

This rainy Saturday afternoon happened in the last days of the lockdown. Still no gatherings allowed. John Drehner and I were so bored, we came up with this brilliant idea: "Let's do Shakespeare in the Park!" I suggested. He'd do the acting, I'd be his audience of one. The governor couldn't object to a crowd of one.

Drehner's a retired mail carrier whom friends know for playing bit parts in a ton of

Shakespeare plays right here in Balboa Park, ever since the 1990s. His more famous portrayals include the gravedigger in Hamlet and the porter in Macbeth, small but funny roles to relieve the tensions of the plots.

"I started off being hired as a spear-carrier, but if you hang around long enough, you can end up being a star," says John, "just because other actors don't turn up."

So here we are where he acted, in the sunken dell behind the Fleet Science Center in a deserted Balboa Park. Today, it looks unused, but intact, like a classical Greek stage in the round, with galleries climbing up towards the Prado.

But our crazy Shakespeare idea also reveals another secret of the park to me. It turns out this was also, in its day, a fullfledged - unfledged? - naturist demonstration park. "The garden got its name during the 1935-36 International Exposition when it housed a nudist colony exhibit called "Zoro Gardens," explains a sign erected by Friends of Balboa Park. "Several times a day, the mostly female troupe conducted rituals to the Sun God. To enter, visitors were charged 25 cents, later raised to 75 cents, for unlimited observation time."

Today, the only audience apart from me is

a four-strong wedding party trying to set up a canopy to hold a ceremony, not strictly legit under lockdown rules, but who's noticing? That doesn't bother John either. He stands right in the middle, and takes a deep breath. His normally hard-to-hear voice booms up out of the dell. "Come out, damned spot! I command you!" he booms, playing Lady Macbeth. "The Thane of Fife had a wife, where is she now? What? Will my hands never be clean?"

Now, he's Hamlet: "Alas! Poor Yorick! I

knew him well. A fellow of infinite jest!"

Somehow, John gains power from the isolation of the stage. He transforms into Richard III. "A horse! A horse! My kingdom for a horse!" Then ends up the porter in Mac-



in enthusiastic clapping. But now I want to know more about what happened down here in 1935. "Between shows," says the sign, "the nudists played games, read, cooked, and lounged amidst lush vegetation and a running brook.... A small Maya-style building provided a kitchen and bathroom. Animal skin rugs and a fire pit were used for chilly evenings. Conveniently-placed knot-holes in a wooden fence surrounding the upper rim of the garden provided a free peek inside. Despite several public attempts to close it down, the nudist attraction was hugely popular, and kept long hours during the exposition. According to historians of the naturist movement, Zoro Gardens was the only known nudist colony in the world to sell tickets to spectators."

Right next to the zoo: coincidence?

Lab-grown seafood

Q: What do Lou Cooperhouse and Winston Churchill have in common?

A: They both believe in growing only the part of the chicken or fish or beef you actually want

Amazingly, Churchill had this idea 90 years ago. "We shall escape the absurdity of growing a whole chicken, in order to eat a breast or a wing, by growing these parts separately, under a suitable medium," the Great Man wrote in 1931

on consumer demand."

He admits costs right now are "extremely expensive," but will become "clearly affordable over time, because for the first time we're demonstrating large-scale production and bringing the economies of scale into this industry. And while our prices will come down, with the increasing shortage of ocean fish stock, the price of traditional fish can only go up. But [with cellular aquaculture] we could keep more fish in the ocean, and really help take the pressure off the [natural] system."

Cooperhouse believes he's got a tiger by

the tail, on the scale of, say, inventing the PC,

or the World Wide Web. Why set up in San

Diego? "It's all about the San Diego workforce,

A century later, here in San Diego, Lou Cooperhouse looks like he's making that exact miracle happen, except with fish. He has found out how to create "whole-muscle, cell-based seafood products, in which living cells are isolated from fish tissue, placed into culture media for proliferation, and then assembled into great-tasting fresh and frozen seafood products."

Now he's creating a 40,000-square-foot San Diego facility to actually make this happen. "We will be able to create real seafood, but without mercury, without micro plastics, or environmental pollutants, simply fish cells multiplying in stainless steel containers like beer vats until they can be combined and shaped into the bits of fish we'd recognize." And because it's still an expensive process,

appropriate talent. "Tissue engineering, cell biology, bio-pharma processing, on and on. And also a deep San Diego heritage in the seafood industry."

> Cooperhouse remembers how he came to his aha! moment. "I had spent 35 years in the food industry, but I was increasingly out there giving a lot of speeches about food trends and con-

sumers' interest in sustainability. Initially, plant-based foods were the focus. And then in the early 2010s, the proof-of-concept happened with cell-based [food]. At the Hawaii Agricultural Foundation, I was saying, 'Yes, Impossible Burgers, but why's nobody working on seafood?! That's the biggest opportunity!'

"Sure enough there was a person in the audience from a venture-capital firm. He said, 'We've got to talk. You've just made the case for a very disruptive company."

A few months later, in 2017, Blue Nalu launched. "Now we have \$84.5 million in funding, and commitments worldwide." ■

Cooperhouse's company, BlueNalu ("Nalu" is Hawaiian for "ocean waves," and "go mindfully with the flow"), is starting with recreating about the most expensive fish in the Pacific, the blue fin tuna. One sold for \$1.8 million the other day in Tokyo. "But with our system, blue fin costs the same to produce as pollack. So we may start with mahi mahi, then it might be bluefin tuna, then a red snapper, then a mahi mahi that's targeted for use in poke or ceviche, maybe in the form of a cube, or a filet, and your bluefin tuna might be in the form of a sashimi-grade strip. So we're targeting products we can literally manufacture based

The father said they were not going to the movies; instead, he was doing a chore, delivering a utility trailer somewhere. It was not clear to Oscar, but it seemed they had left Oceanside and were headed in the direction of downtown San Diego. At some point the eldest daughter was able to connect with her Uncle Oscar. She was distressed. She believed they were headed for Mexico. She saw guards and signs in Spanish. A license plate reader at the border recorded Ramirez's red 2001 Pontiac minivan crossing into Mexico.

Ramirez phoned Oscar. "The conversation was hostile," Oscar later said. He described Ramirez's demeanor as angry, and said he used a lot of profanity. Ramirez expressed anger about the sale of his home in Nevada, and he demanded a lot of money to return the girls back to the U.S. The number he wanted fluctuated between forty and fifty thousand dollars, according to Oscar, who said Ramirez "was hard to negotiate with." Oscar suspected that his brother-in-law was probably in a hotel in Tijuana. He decided that he would cross the border and look around for the red minivan. He thought maybe he could spot Ramirez, or even find the girls.


The negotiations to return the girls went on through the weekend. Eventually, Rosa managed to get an \$18,000 loan from the Navy Federal Credit Union, and her family was able to scratch together another \$500. Oscar was able to negotiate that \$18,500 dollars would be deposited into an account for Ramirez, and then a balance of \$20,000 would be paid later, after the girls were returned. Ramirez would not reveal the location of the hotel until the money was deposited. He sent information for a Bank of America account which had his brother's name on it: Jose Ramirez. Rosa deposited the money into the account her ex-husband specified, took a photo of the deposit receipt, and texted that to Oscar, who sent it on to Ramirez. Ramirez eventually texted back his location in Tijuana: the City Junior Hotel. Oscar went immediately; the three children were inside the front lobby. Oscar never did see his brother-in-law or his vehicle.

The two eldest girls were interviewed by police after they had returned. The eldest said their father sometimes took the SIM card out of their phones. Both girls said that each time their father had to leave the room, he took their phones, and sometimes he took the littlest girl with him. As the days passed, sometimes they watched TV, and sometimes they went around town, but when their father saw Mexican authorities, he got agitated and sped up and said the police better not try to come and get him. They

said they were aware their father was demanding money from their mom to return them to the U.S. He told the girls that she owed him money from the divorce, and they were not going back to the U.S. until that money was deposited into the account.

In the town of Paulsbo, Washington, Ramirez tried to access the money. He used an ATM in a convenience store there, trying to get into the Bank of America account in his brother's name. When Ramirez discovered that the bank account was frozen, he phoned Oscar. Oscar says Ramirez was agitated, "You guys are liars! I knew you called the police!" And he allegedly threatened the family: "You know what is going to happen!" The two started to argue, and then Ramirez hung up the phone.

Ramirez was held for some months in Washington State, then he was extradited into California. He was booked into jail in San Diego County in June, 2019. He appeared in a San Diego courtroom in the spring of 2020. His defense attorney asserted that Rosa "did not ever tell Martin that he could not take the girls to Tijuana." And the father never threatened to use force or harm, neither against his daughters, nor against the person from whom he demanded money. And the money he requested from his ex-wife was not ransom money, Ramirez's attorney said; it was proceeds from the sale of their home — money due to

him. She insisted Ramirez did not intend to kidnap his own daughters.

At the end of a two-hour pre-trial hearing, Judge Brad Weinreb ordered Ramirez to face charges at trial. The defendant pleaded not-guilty to four felonies, three kidnappings, and one extortion. At his most recent hearing, on January 19, through an interpreter, Ramirez demanded to represent himself. He intends to act as his own attorney at his next court date, February 17, currently set for jury trial.

Don't Vaccinate — Blaccinate!

City Health Department addresses vaccine hesitancy among black community with cool representative superhero

"It worked for Marvel!"

Recent surveys have indicated that while roughly 20% of the White, Hispanic, and Asian communities would not take the covid-19 vaccine even if it were available to them, nearly 40% of the Black community would skip out on the opportunity. Dr. Ronnie Wood, chairman of the city's Got Shot? campaign, has been tasked with overcoming this systemic hesitancy, and he has this to offer: "Blacks have historically been treated badly by the United States' healthcare system. Perhaps the most famous example of this is the infamous Tuskegee Study of Syphilis in the Untreated Negro Male, in which Black Americans were deceived into thinking they were receiving treatment for syphilis when in fact they were not. Over 125 men lost their

lives, when a simple dose of penicillin would have saved them. And this was a collaboration between the US Public Health Service and the CDC. It's both shocking and shameful, and it goes a long way toward explaining why Blacks might be suspicious about the government coming around and sticking a needle in their arm 'for their own good.'"

Happily, says Dr. Wood, the San Diego Department of Well-Meaning Gestures has come up with a way to address this suspicion. "The covid-19 pandemic is a disaster of global proportions, and if the past ten years have taught us anything, it's that global threats demand superheroes to save the day. BUY OR NOT 10 BUY

During morning walks around my neighborhood, I like to window shop for real estate. One day, curiosity made me stop to scan the QR code on a 'For Sale' sign outside of a charming gray craftsman that I often

stroll past. The twobedroom, one-bathroom standalone in the heart of Normal Heights was going for \$685K. Considering what I'd heard about San Diego prices, it wasn't quite as bad as I feared.

I started to think of the possibilities, then quickly stopped when I remembered the lack of money in my savings. But as I kept walking, I wondered whether it was really that crazy. Could I afford a house in San Diego? Would I ever own a home? I turned to a pool of 30-somethings to learn how

they were handling one of life's most daunting crossroads.

Ileana & Jared

Ileana Saldaña is a 29-year-old office assistant for Dietz & Watson. With her husband Jared, 30, and two daughters ages 7 and 4, she rents a three-bed, two-bath house in Vista for \$1400 per month. Saldaña is expecting a baby boy at the time I'm speaking to her, so buying a house is understandably not at the top of her to-do list.

"If I lived in the apartment we used to live in with the kids, and had a third one on the way, I wouldn't be as happy as I am. But because this is a house. I don't mind if I'm renting it or buying it because I already have what I want. We're comfortable, we're content."

They haven't given up, but are shelving the idea for now. "It was always a dream of ours — it's still a dream of ours — to own something that you can pass down to your kids. But as of right now, it's not possible."

In 2014, the Saldañas laid some of the groundwork. "We thought about it, and we actually did some planning. We were taking the steps to buy a home and seeing how much they really cost, and how much we could get from a loan, and looking at our credit. And we knew we could not afford a house at that moment. And then we just kept renting and renting and time flew by."

Two years ago, they left a small apartment and moved into the house. "We kind of just stopped looking for a home to buy

because rent is affordable here and buying a home is really pricey."

Saldaña notes one perk of renting. "I like that I'm not the owner of a house, because there's way more responsibility. So if pipes burst or the toilet was overflowing, the owner of the house would have to take care of that.I'm just the renter — so that's something that they have to pay for, that they have to fix."

Still, buying a home could one day provide a safety net for their children. "That is something cool — if me and Jared owned a house, then our kids have something to fall back on if times are even more rough in the future and they can't afford a house for whatever reason. They could always live where we lived and not even worry about paying a mortgage."

The Saldañas pay no mind to the so-called norm. "Society definitely does put pressure on people our age. It's very old-school like, 'You have to get married, have kids, buy a house.' And you don't really have to do any of those things." She postulates, "You pretty much are paying off a house for 30 years, that's like 'the standard.' So if you think about it, when you buy it at 30, you're done by 60. And then you retire at 65. But people these days are not retiring at 65, so why can't you buy a house at 40?"

When it comes down to it, Saldaña says it's a matter of money. "It's going to be years for us to even try to buy. And you just need so much money down first. You need a chunk of money and then you need

a stable income. And it's just not working for us. It hasn't been.... With finding new jobs and getting a job and going on maternity leave. And then Jared's back was injured for a while... if something were to happen and one of us did not have an income, then we would be in the crapper, because we would not be able to afford it. If an emergency happened, we would have to lose the house."

Until they gain better financial footing, the Saldañas have no immediate plans to purchase. "In the next five years, we are sticking to what we are doing, living in this home, renting. And raising our kids, paying off the car, paying off debt. Then hopefully, after that, start saving and working towards it. I'll be 34 and Jared will be 35, and maybe we can actually start getting serious."

Saldaña is already painting a picture in her head. "Three bedrooms, two bathrooms is a must — I'm not sharing with kids. And a backyard would be nice."

She wants an open kitchen, "a place for friends and family to gather. It makes everything more homey when you can see everybody and hang out. But the size, I'm not too picky about. As long as we all have our separate space, so we're not down each other's throats."

Miles and Linda

Nearby in Oceanside, Miles Cook, a 30-year-old music director for an elementary school, rents an apartment with his wife Linda, 29, and two kids ages 11 and 13. They're in the middle of packing everything up to move back in with his parents.

Cook explains the situation, "They're rais-

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ing our rent again. So I said 'No, we're not doing that anymore. It's time.' We've been working with a realtor for like two years on how to fix our credit. because our credit was terrible, and just basically how to get on the right track to buying a house. So we're going to temporarily move in with my parents while we're hunting for something in our price range. But right now, there's not much in that category. Hopefully we don't have to live with them for too long. I know my mom loves it but... um... you know."

Cook says their \$1900-a-month, twobedroom, two-bathroom apartment feels very small. "We've been here five years. They raised the rent every year. We used to pay \$1500 when we moved in. But nothing new has happened, they haven't updated anything. It's the same exact apartment, just costs more." Technically, the complex has a newly remodeled gym, which he has only used once. "I swear that's where our rent money is going."

Despite the time spent living at their apartment, the family has never considered it home. "It just feels like staying at a hotel. We live here, but we don't actually own it. We're using these rooms, but they're not ours. I'd rather be putting my money into something that I would own eventually."

They began to make their dream a reality. "When we started, it was kind of like, 'Well, that's what you do.' You do some renting for a little bit and then you go out and you find your white picket fence. But it was never financially an option for us. It was like 'the kids need clothes, they gotta go on a field trip,' and all these little things add up and make vou feel like, 'We're never getting out of this, we're just stuck."

It was his mother who pushed them to finally consult someone about options. "You may find that you're actually pretty well established already! There's no hurt in just talking to somebody. I don't know if that's a millennial thing or not, but we just don't want to talk to people."

The Cooks were told, "'You're probably not ready to start the process but here's some things you should do to get you on the right path.' It was basically fixing our credit. And that helped! Just hearing 'You're not there yet, but you can be there. It just takes some effort. It's something people don't talk about...' Nobody ever talks about what you have to do to get there. Or that you can even do something about it."

Before, it seemed like just a pipe dream. "I was not convinced that we were going to be able to do it. I was going along with it for Linda. Because she would not stop pestering me about it. Two years after that first conversation, and now that we finally have a number, I feel like it's actually going to happen."

One of his takeaways is that "having bad credit isn't the end of the world. You can fix it. And that's why we're in the spot that we are, because we were able to fix those things and get back into the good graces of... whoever is in charge of that. For me, it always felt insurmountable."

With some wiggle room in their \$380K budget, the Cooks feel optimistic about getting their foot in the door on San Diego's housing market. "We're not going to find 'the' house that we're going to spend the rest of our lives in. Right now, we're just trying to find 'a' house that's not falling apart and that will last for however long we need," he says. "What we're seeing is a lot of the 3 bedroom houses are in the low \$400Ks, so we're trying to wait it out and see what happens to the market. Right now, nobody really knows what 2021 is going to look like. But it could be good for us."


Sam and Ryan

Another couple in Pacific Beach is also actively looking to buy their first house. They're fortunate to have some know-how.

Ryan Pearson, 33, created PacificBeachHomes. com and has nine years' experience in the business, but calls himself a "part time realtor" since shifting his career to marketing. This is not his first time buying. "I got lucky and I got into real estate really early. And I put like \$32K down on a condo and staved there for a few years. And basically held onto that thing for a really long time. Just a couple months ago, we sold that."

Ryan and his wife Samantha, 32, are ready to upgrade after welcoming a new baby boy. "We're using the proceeds from that condo

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(bought for \$260K, sold for \$515K), plus the townhouse that we're living in — that my dad owns and we're selling (listed for \$695K) - and we're house shopping right now."

The Pearsons have been in the market for several months. "It's been tough. There's somehow a ton of money, and a ton of people looking to buy right now. And there aren't that many homes for sale. We looked at a house last weekend that was listed at \$999K... and then we called the agent and they had an offer over \$1.1 million. So stuff is selling on the first weekend, he said they got nine offers in one day of showing."

Samantha comments on how the pandemic is affecting the search. "All the showings are booked to the max for each day. That one we just went to, we waited in line for 30 minutes to get in because with covid, you can only do one party at a time."

She sounds flabbergasted by seeing the lines of people form. "That was a million-dollar house! I would think with the \$700-900k range, that's

probably even more competitive, just because it's more competitively priced."

Despite low interest rates, Ryan acknowledges that it's currently a seller's market. "Because inventory is so low. The number of homes for sale in each zip code is drastically smaller than it was last year. And I think there are probably a lot of people who are scared to let people into their house," he speculates. "So a lot of people are putting it on hold, if they can, and trying to wait for the vaccine to roll out."

The Pearsons also wonder whether the housing market will crash. "We haven't really seen a hit to the market like I was expecting. I think a lot of people are wondering what will happen. When we look at the future, it's a big question mark — what is going to happen when tenants can be evicted? Or when homeowners have to pay their mortgage? I don't know if there's going to be a big change. It makes me wonder... maybe we never really see a big dip in the real estate market?



Aaron says, "When we walked out to the backyard, they had really done a beautiful job of landscaping it. We kind of went, 'Whoa! This is a real gem of a property.' Because there aren't many places that have this much space and we just really loved the outdoor area."

Which is surprising to me, but a lot of economists are expecting home prices to continue to go up in 2021 due to limited inventory and low interest rates."

Ryan doesn't believe in playing the wait-andsee game. "I think a lot of people try to time the market, or the whole concept of the word 'when.' Like, when is it going to get better? Should we wait? Should we do it now? More important than trying to buy at the right time, it's a question of what makes sense for your life right now. There's lots of worry about what could happen and the whole 'when' question, but at the end of the day, it's 'What makes sense?' It has to make sense for your situation and your family."

Samantha says, "With the baby, we don't really have the luxury of waiting and seeing where the market goes. He's crawling, he's on the move! Whatever the market does... he needs a backyard, he needs a little space. Whether the market is up or down... do what's best for your family and then figure it out later."

Though aiming for a three-bedroom house, they're keeping all options open. "We've looked at everything between \$650K up to \$1.2M," Ryan responds, but Samantha interjects, "I don't want to go that high. I think we can get more of a starter home for under a million. That's my goal."

Samantha gives me a quick overview of the neighborhoods where they're searching. "San Carlos and Del Cerro and around San Diego State have more one-level, 3 bedroom starter homes, which would be really good for a small family. Then you get into San Marcos and Carlsbad, and the houses are bigger and more expensive — those would be more 'forever homes,' if we wanted to pull the trigger on something more expensive."

One requirement for the Pearsons' new home is a good elementary school. "That's been a priority for us. Otherwise, we're going to have to move again once our son gets older. And the cost of moving, and the cost of selling and re-buying another home is substantial. So finding something with a good school district can make it a better long term investment."

Samantha's housesearching philosophy: "You can't be cheap. You have to spend money to live in the best place," she declares. "And you have to move fast when it comes to buying a house. You can't go home and think about it for a week. If we like a place, we're putting in an offer the hour we get home. And if that makes you feel uncomfortable, moving that fast, you're going to miss out on a lot of housing opportunities."

Ryan has something of a carpe diem approach: "You're going to be happy. There's a lot of people who build wealth through real estate, and taking that first leap can really change your life. It seems like such a stressful pro-

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



Many consider him an early proponent of the environmental movement, as his poetry dealt largely with the natural world and a concern for

its conservation. His poetry was informed by a focus on "inhumanism," a belief that human concerns ought to be considered only in the larger context of the universe – which included the natural world and the needs and concerns of nature. He lived his life as he wrote his poetry: involved intimately with the outdoors and nature, he spent most of his life in the remote regions of Carmel, where he built his famous Tor House, a residence built of rock atop one of the Carmel coastline's "tors" — craggy outcrops of rock.



Vietnamese lunar new year," says Khanh. "It's the feast of the first morning of the first day."

She says you can tell at Tet celebrations if someone is from the north or south. "Northern people traditionally see the earth as a square and Southern people see it as a roll. So that is how they make their cakes. Square and flat — banh chung, the northern cake — or as a roll, rounded, and richer with added coconut milk, from the tropical south, banh tet. My grandparents are from the north, so they can't take the rich coconut milk in the cake. They prefer their own. I like the banh chung better, too, because I grew up with it."

She has rows of sticky rice breakfasts, some stained green from the pandanus plant, some purple, from the magenta plant. Mostly dominated by sticky rice, and costing, yes, three bucks each. Maybe most interesting is the khuck, which is noodles with mung beans, roasted peanuts, yellow

onion, and sausage (\$4.50), or the Chinese sweet rice with cha lua (\$3).

Khanh says we must come back for Vietnam's lunar new year. Tet. "It's February 12. Lots of music. Lots of firecrackers! We work hard to make everything so when Tet comes, we have finished all our work and can rest for the day and visit relatives. All work must be done!"

She signals me to come behind the counter, to a giant steaming saucepan. "This is banh Tet: It's one of the traditions. Sticky rice with mung bean and pork belly in the middle. And it's shaped like a tube, the southern 'world' It is one of the traditions during Tet."

So two banh Tet would cost \$15, a little more expensive because they're big, and they take a lot

For a start, you must cook them for seven hours, constantly boiling. "And then once that's done, you have to take them out, wash them, rinse them,

dry them, make them look pretty. Because that banh Tet goes onto the altar. Everything has to be nice-looking."

You also have to decide if you want to eat northern-fashion, as in North Vietnam, or southern. North will mean savory, south will mean sweet.

If you're just here for the banh mi, expect a little craziness. Tet's coming up. ■

Main Chicken shows up hot and fast

least one subset of eateries that only seem to be growing stronger: those serving Nashville hot chicken.

I've tried so much of spicy fried chicken this

year, my heat tolerance has leveled up a notch or two — which, as spice addicts know, only makes you want it more. I've started adding sriracha to my soup, Cholula to my eggs, and jalapeño to my burgers.

It's never enough, though, so as new hot chicken joints keep opening, eventually I feel the need to pay them a visit, if

only to hit my weekly chili pepper quota.

And so I wound up driving into Clairemont in search of Main Chick.
The fast-growing Los Angeles chain apparently has big plans for San Diego, which seems to be the case with most

L.A. fried chicken spots (though not the king of them all yet. Howlin' Ray's, what's it going to take?).

I'm not sure what I expected, but what I found is a small counter shop in the Clairemont Town Square, which is home to the likes of Big Lots, Domino's Pizza, and Ross Dress For Less. My search for a trendy food spot dropped me in the middle of chain store country.

The Main Chick menu is pretty simple, mostly following the hot chicken stan-

dards. That means choosing between chicken tenders (\$4.50) and chicken sandwiches (\$5.50), then deciding whether you want it mild or extra spicy, and whether you want sides of crinkle cut fries, coleslaw, or mac and cheese.

Where Main Chick got me excited was offering a second sandwich choice featuring all dark meat. Most fried chicken sandwiches involve white meat, which is fine for fried chicken. But chicken thighs are just better, so that little switch-up told me somebody out there is listening to hot chicken reason.

For the most part, everything tasted all right. The hottest spice didn't taste all that hot, but I'll allow that may be due to the extremes I've been experiencing from competitors such as Dave's Hot Chicken and its outlandishly spicy "reaper."

Where the chicken of any spice let me down was in its granular textures. Rather than hot chili paste or sauce, the seasoning here seems

to be powdered on, resulting in otherwise sumptuous battered bites having a dry and dusty edge.

When I think about it, despite the long, slow lines Howlin' Ray's has become famous for, the hot chicken genre does seem ripe for adaptation in a fast-food model. As I looked around at the Krispy Kreme, Taco Bell, and Jack in the Box populating the shopping center, it occurred to me: Nashville hot chicken is just mainstream enough to fit right in with drive thrus and value menus. Choose your spice wisely.

BOOZE NEWS

Breweries sue for the same covid rules as wineries

Like most San Diego breweries, Deft Brewing resumed drink service last week, when the three-week stay-at-home order issued in early December finally lifted (after seven weeks). The Morena neighborhood beermaker offers a shaded patio, and hosts a resident pizza counter - both crucial to covid-era business. Under current purple tier restrictions, only outdoor service is allowed. And thanks to a California rule issued last summer, on-premise beers may only be served to customers also ordering a meal.

Though Deft is equipped to handle such restrictions, it continues to lose business on a daily basis. Customers routinely show up wanting to drink beer, then walk away when told they must order food to do so. Best case scenario, they visit Deft's neighbor, the Lost Cause Meadery next door. The meadery operates under a wine license, and unlike

breweries, wineries are not required to serve food with drink orders.

The California Department of Public Health has explained this distinction by stating breweries are "social hubs and meeting locations for different households," while wineries are "generally not." Which might be subject to debate were it not for a simple fact: Deft shares its patio seating with Lost Cause. Whether ordering beer with food, or mead without it, customers drink their beverages in the exact same space.

The uneven application of rules between the two businesses aptly illustrates why the California Craft Brewers Association — on behalf of the state's 1000+ breweries — filed a lawsuit last month against state public health officer Sandra Shewry and governor Gavin Newsom. Citing the equal protection clause of the 14th amendment, the suit contends the unequal treatment of breweries versus wineries is unconstitutional.

With breweries and wineries throughout the state allowed to resume service for the first time in 2021, the CCBA has now filed for injunctive relief. In March, it will go before a judge hoping he or she will block the food requirement, in the same way a notorious November ruling briefly allowed a local strip club to reopen.

Last week, that injunction was overruled on appeal. But a more enduring precedent still stands. In the spring, Napa's Caymus Winery filed a similar suit against an earlier version of the state rule that required food service from wineries, too. Within a month, that suit was dropped, and the state amended its rules to relieve its 4000+ wineries of the food service burden.

Leia Bailey, associate executive director of the CCBA, says the trade association hoped drawing up the lawsuit on behalf of breweries would likewise be enough. "We were hopeful to not have to pursue legal remedies," she says, "We were hopeful we could have a conversation." But ultimately

the state held firm, and the CCBA concluded it had "exhausted all avenues for resolving this issue through settlement negotiations."

Six breweries from throughout the state are named as co-plantiffs in the suit, including San Diego's own Second Chance Beer Company. However, Second Chance cofounder Virginia Morrison, herself an attorney, notes that CCBA actually represents most of the breweries in California, it's just too costly and complicated to add a thousand co-parties to a lawsuit.

Rather, Second Chance and its five co-plaintiffs represent breweries of different sizes and locations, which will each offer evidence their business has been irreparably harmed by uneven application of food requirements. For example, Ventura's Topa Topa Brewing Company also shares tasting room space with a winery.

Second Chance represents small packaging breweries that do not serve food. It relies on a mix

of 35-percent distribution and 65-percent taproom sales. With the pandemic, Morrison says, "Now we're pretty much flip flopped. Which sounds great, because we had a 98 percent increase in can sales. But cans are the least profitable way that we sell beer."

For every dollar made selling beer in a can, she says the brewery would have earned \$7.29 selling the same amount of beer in its taproom. Which makes every on-premise beer served more valuable than a six-pack sold by a grocer. Yet despite this

favorable math, Morrison says, "Our tasting rooms have just been losing money all year."

The triple whammy of recurring shutdowns, social distancing requirements, and outdoor dining has already brought local breweries irreparable harm. Whether a California judge determines that the unequal burden of meal service does too could make the difference whether some breweries manage to stay afloat through the end of the pandemic.

"Going into the summer," adds Morrison, "the breweries that are still in business, will one hundred percent need people not just outside, but inside their tasting rooms too."

Che's glory days "I really thought I'd build a simple archive and hoped that a few of the old crowd would turn up to participate, but within a year, we'd located most everyone involved," says Matthew Rothenberg, co-founder of the Che Underground blog archive. Subtitled The Secret History of San Diego's '80s

Tobiason, Toby Gibson [Personal Conflict], Dave Rinck [Wallflowers], Bart Mendoza [Manual Scan], Paul Kaufman [Lemons Are Yellow], and the late author Cyndie Jaynes, to name just a few."

The Che Underground site spent over a decade archiving hundreds of audio files, around a thousand

Music Scene, the website collects stories, images, music, video footage, and visitor comments focused on local groups such as Hair Theatre, Noise 292, the Tell-Tale Hearts, and the original local Wallflowers. "The epicenter is an eclectic group of bands that emerged from San Diego punk and collaborated intensely, including putting on some pioneering rock 'n' roll shows at UCSD's Che Café."

The original site was launched in 2008. "It was a way to collect material I hadn't seen or heard in 25 years, raise our historical profile on the web, and most importantly, catch up with the people who made our little group so memorable. In short order, I got design help from Dave Ellison of the Rockin' Dogs, multimedia support from Dave Fleminger of the Answers, technical help from [emcee and flyer artist] Jerry Cornelius, and written contributions and donated artifacts from Ray Brandes [Tell-Tale Hearts], graphic artist and photographer Kristen

photos and images of flyers and other ephemera, a couple hundred articles, and more than a thousand comments before it became evident that their web host was no longer suitable. "Over the 13 years it had existed on the original hosting platform, the code had gotten tangled up with some other material, the design was incompatible with modern versions of WordPress, and we'd already experienced some terrible crashes that lost comments and other irreplaceable pieces."

The entire archive had to be rebuilt elsewhere. "Not switching wasn't really an option. Not unless we wanted to lose something that had given everyone a lot of pleasure over the years. Jerry Cornelius spent about six months cutting the knots out of the Che Underground database so he could migrate it to a fast new host with all the latest versions of WordPress and supporting software. He put a new design on it that evokes Dave Ellison's original work. It's much faster and more responsive now, and this build should be rock-solid for many years."

Working on the site continues to reap unexpected dividends. "First of all, the sheer volume of people amazed me. At our busiest, we were getting more than 16,000 visitors a month, way more than the original scene. I really enjoyed the arrival of European fans of the bands. Some of our friends are especially big in Spain, but folks from all over have contributed. I very much enjoyed when Billy Zoom of X showed up to appreciate a series of Chuck Norris-style accolades for his guitar playing, such as

> 'Billy Zoom doesn't have to turn his tuning pegs: He holds one and lets the earth revolve around him."

He says the biggest reward of running the archive has been the way the blog catalyzed new creativity among the people it featured. 'In 2009, we had a two-day reunion show at the Casbah with eight of the

original bands, and we've done a lot more events. People have started new collaborations, and romantic relationships, and a couple of our scattered crew even moved back to San Diego in the wake of all the excitement. In fact, our most recent Che Underground gig involving three bands' worth of old friends played February 29, less than two weeks before the pandemic shut the clubs."

Like many website operators with frequently refreshed interactive online content, Rothenberg is finding that the pandemic lockdown appears to have boosted site traffic. "As participants become more concerned about the privacy and ownership of their data on Facebook and other big social media platforms, we're seeing renewed interest in the blog as a safe harbor where they retain control of their material and identities. I've got a lot of new contributions lined up, and I'm determined to update at least weekly."

"While I'm still focused on the connection to our shared history, I'm very excited to cover more of the fresh

IMMORTAL BEAUTY

The gaps in my Vaughan Williams

Recently, I realized I had some holes in my listening habits for one of my favorite composers, Ralph Vaughan Williams. I have listened to some of Vaughan Williams's most popular pieces to death. These would include The Lark Ascending, Fantasia on a Theme by Thomas Tallis, Songs of Travel, Dona Nobis Pacem, Hodie, A Sea Symphony, and Symphonies No. 2, 5, and 7.

All along, I've been aware of other pieces by Vaughan Williams such as Norfolk Rhapsody No. 1, In the Fen Country, Overture to the Wasps, Five Variants of Dives and Lazarus, and Serenade to Music. We'll take a brief survey of them here.

The Norfolk Rhapsody No. 1 is an early composition from 1905-1906. There were three rhapsodies, but the first is the only one to have survived in its entirety. Nor-

folk Rhapsody No. 2 exists in a version that has been completed by lesser composers. Norfolk Rhapsody No. 3 is completely lost.

Vaughan Williams himself went to Norfolk and gathered folk tunes that he incorporated into his rhapsodies. When I heard the energetic sea shanty tune mid-way through Norfolk Rhapsody No. 1, all I could think was that NFL films copied that music note for note and some point.

Right next to Norfolk is The Fen Lands or Fen Country. This marshy land has been inhabited since at least the bronze age. A Roman causeway linking The Fens with central England still exists. For the most part, The Fens have been drained, creating dry grassland and open spaces.

The composition by Vaughan Willimas was written in 1904 and later revised in 1905 and 1907. It received its premiere in 1909 under the baton of Sir Thomas Beecham. *In the Fen Country* is the earliest composition by Vaughan Williams that he allowed to remain in his oeuvre.

Musically somewhat reminiscent of Borodin's In the Steppes of Central Asia by Borodin, In the Fen Country invokes that same feeling of open sky and grassland, but it has an English lushness that is missing from Borodin's more arid composition.

Vaughan Williams wrote The Wasps as incidental music for the Aristophanes play of the same title. Written in 1909, it is another relatively early composition. The Overture to the Wasps is performed most often, just like Beethoven's overtures to incidental music for Egmont and Coriolan and Mendelssohn's Midsummer's Night Dream.



So moved was Rachmaninoff by the beauty of Vaughan Williams's music that he openly wept during the performance.

When listening to this music, I couldn't help but think that the composer of Pixar's A Bug's Life must have been familiar with this music. The tunes are too alike.

If you have consistently attended an Anglican, Episcopal, United Church of Christ, or Catholic Church, then you may be familiar with Five Variants of Dives and Lazarus. The tune has been set to several different hymn texts that are used throughout the liturgical year.

In 1938, Vaughan Williams

wrote his Serenade to Music to honor the 50th anniversary of conductor Henry Wood's first concert. The text is taken from the fifth act of Shakespeare's The Merchant of Venice.

Sergei Rachmaninoff, having played the solo in his *Piano Concerto No. 2* in the first half of the concert, was in the audience for the premiere. So moved was the great Russian by the beauty of Vaughan Williams' music that he openly wept during the performance.

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nother week, another film festival — this time, the 30th Annual San Diego International Jewish Film Festival, which runs February 11-21. For a complete lineup of features and virtual discussion groups, visit www.lfjcc.org/cjc/ sdijff.aspx. Here are two must-sees and one... well, I suffered, why shouldn't you?

MOVIES

Tango Shalom (2021) It's not often one thinks of rabbis and their wives as amorous entities, but that's the first thing you'll notice when Moshe Yehuda (Jos Laniado) and his spouse Shira (Justine Laniado) are introduced in mid-passionate embrace. (Jos co-wrote the script with brother/co-star Claudio Laniado and co-star Joseph Bologna). It's important to establish a strong, faith-based romantic relationship between the two, because it's about to be put to the test. With the wolf barking at the door of Moshe's Hebrew school, the Hasidic rabbi takes to the pavement in search of an alternative way to feed a family of five. Dance instructor Viviana Nieves (Karina Smirnoff) knows that with the right partner — perhaps a Grand Rabbi that has her by a good 20 years and who, by Talmudic law, is not allowed to touch any woman other than his wife — they'd stand a good chance of winning cash prizes on Dance-TV's first-ever Tango Contest. (Duck! Here comes another trope: her share of the loot would fund an operation for her sick daughter.) Servant of God that he is, Yehuda will stop at nothing to get the answer to his prayers that he wants to hear, and that includes visits to a Catholic priest (that's Bologna beneath the white Panama), a Muslim imam (Carlos Barrionuevo), and a traveling Sikh mystic (Hamza Zaman) for advice. Rather than risk becoming the topic of Crown Heights chit-chat, Yehuda's prayers to HaShem are answered in the form of a red balloon used to prevent the dancers from ever touching. He soon becomes a shanda, the eyes of God (and internet subscribers) waiting for him to do anything even remotely "unholy." The opening nasal salvos lobbed between Moshe's blubbering mother Deborah (Renée Taylor) and her equally adenoidal in-law-tobe Leah (Lainie Kazan) were pushing things in the direction of Sitcom City, but once the characters took hold and the direction picked up its pace, there

was a good, non-denominational time to be had by all. This was to be the last collaboration between a prolific husband and wife quadruple-threat duo: the writing, acting, producing, and directing team of Renée Taylor and Joseph Bologna (Lovers and Other Strangers, Made for Each Other). Mr.

Shared Legacies (2020)

"It's not about comparing scars," says Rabbi Capers Funnye, his thought completed moments later by Dr. Michael Berenbaum's, "It doesn't mean the Holocaust doesn't have something to say about slavery and slavery doesn't have something to say about the Holocaust. Both of them have something to say about suffering." You couldn't prove it by my Hebrew school teacher, Rabbi Sol Lerner, who, in 1966, escorted his class to Chicago's Roosevelt Theatre — a downtown picture palace that took up an entire city block — to attend a performance of the 10-year anniversary reissue of DeMille's The Ten Commandments. As early as age 11, my mind associated the term slavery with African-Americans, but it wasn't until that Passover week matinee when I began to realize that Jews were once considered human chattel. "Were Jewish slaves like black slaves?" I asked Rabbi Lerner while waiting for the northbound Howard "L" train to arrive. "No!" he answered in tones that incited an instant change of subject. "We had it worse." It had been a long time since this "L" platform pissing contest returned to mind; it might never have come back were it not for Peter Yarrow's aide-memoire, "Pharaoh enslaved the Jews." Writerdirector Shari Rogers' documentary takes us through a concise history of the century-old coming together of African-American and Jewish communities. The coalition came of age during the Civil Rights Movement, as many witnesses will attest, but the relationship has remained stagnant over the past 30 years. The film's prevailing voice of reason, the one that stayed with me after the film ended, belongs to Yavilah McCoy, an African-American advocate for Jews of color. "Jews believe in meritocracy," she asserts — the notion that people get ahead in life through

demonstrated abilities and merit." She continues, "There is no narrative that advances the story of Civil Rights... Blacks and Jews, now more than ever, need to carry each other's story in mind, heart, and spirit." This powerful tale acts as a reminder of a friendship that, now more than ever, must endure. ★★★

The Crossing (2020)

The reason Daniel (Samson Steine) and younger sister Sarah (Bianca Ghilardi-Hellsten) are seeking shelter in the home of Gerda (Anna Sofie Skarholt) and Otto's (Bo Lindquist-Ellingsen) parents is dispensed with before the opening credits close: it wasn't safe for Jews of any age to be living in occupied Norway in 1942. As explained in director Johanne Helgeland's maiden feature, mean old Mr. Hitler and the Nazis punished people for no reason, so in the time it took for the adults to plan their escape route to Sweden, Daniel and Sarah took up residence within the walls of the gentile family's cellar. And when the Jewish-sympathizing parents are arrested, Gerda takes it upon herself to escort the children to safety. She is reluctantly joined by sloe-eyed (and even slower-witted) Otto (think Larry Mondello of Leave it to Beaver fame). who just that afternoon attended his first Hitler Youth rally. If it all sounds a tad remedial, it should: this is a G-rated family picture aimed at introducing the concept of Nazi atrocities to impressionable minds. It's what a liveaction Nazi adventure for the entire family would have felt like if, in the early '60s, Disney had had the audacity to tackle the incredible journey. (The quartet looking on as children are forcibly taken from their mothers' arms is about as brutal as it gets.) When Otto questions the benefit of giving aid to

Jews, even the least hip toddler in the bunch is bound to smart when hit with the ear-cud-chewed-thoroughly reply, "They're people. We're people. People help people." And don't Hitler's henchmen have better ways to spend their time than being outfoxed by a band of kids? Two German Shepherds overseen

by five uniformed Nazis and one 4K camera drone, and still they can't bring four refugee children to their knees? Beware: your children may question why mommy and daddy were snickering during this variation on A Child's Berchtesgaden of Verses. ★

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
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

continued from page 16 cess, but it can create so much reward. If you have the opportunity, take it. Enjoy your life."

Aaron and Holly

Aaron (not his real name), a 37-year-old insurance adjuster, had his first dance with real estate when he bought a condo for \$300K in 2016. "I have since sold. But when I was buying, I went through insanity trying to actually have an offer accepted. I made offers sight unseen, well over asking, and was outbid multiple times by all cash offers." He came out on top when he sold for \$357K in 2018. "On the flip side, I got to entertain multiple overasking offers when I sold it, so that was satisfying at least."

That was before meeting his girlfriend Holly, 38, with whom he now co-owns a home in Encinitas. About two-and-ahalf years ago, the couple bought their three-bedroom, two-bathroom, 1500-square-foot house for \$845K."When we first bought the house, our mortgage payment was \$3500 a month," says Holly before letting me in on one of their financial tricks: "We've refinanced three times now, to bring it down to \$2950." Aaron says it's more than simply setting the intention to buy. "It's really about assessing your financial position. We have both been very diligent savers throughout our lives, and I think that just comes with a lifestyle. But someone doesn't all of a sudden just save \$100,000." He also cautions, "Just because you have 20 percent down, doesn't mean you should blow your whole savings. Because what if something else happens? Lose your job, medical emergencies, things like that.

"Before we bought here in Encinitas, we actually looked far and wide at areas where we would consider living." Looking back on their days of searching, he says, "We had been interested in finding a different house in a different area, in a market that might have been a bit more affordable. In a state that maybe didn't have state income taxes - more money in our pocket."

They visited open houses in both Seattle, Washington and Austin, Texas. "Those two areas are completely saturated and blown up now, too. But at the time, you could find houses that were cheaper, with more room and more land."

The couple eventually decided against moving out-of-state. "Seattle — besides the weather — the houses we were looking at were comparable in price and they were really old. So we anticipated there would be a lot more maintenance. And in Austin, we could've easily come in under the amount we would've paid here. But the areas where they were really affordable were neighborhoods that were just springing up overnight and there was no town around them. Looking at those places just reaffirmed that we wanted to live here."

As fate would have it, they ended up getting the first house they put an offer on. "We looked around the house and we thought there was a lot of potential. We could see what the layout would be like. We'd play that game in every house. But when we walked out to the backyard, they had really done a beautiful job of landscaping it. We kind of went, 'Whoa! This is a real gem of a property.' Because there aren't many places that have this much space, and we just really loved the outdoor area. So we thought we could make improvements on the inside to make it more our style. It was the first house where we both said, 'Let's just put in an offer!' And we didn't expect to get it at all."

Aaron tells me another part of what won them over. "The house spoke to us because it had a dog door already built in." They had talked for a long time about getting a dog. "So, it was just meant to be."

After celebrating, the couple went to work on roughly \$200K worth of renovations. "We lived here the whole time. There's one room that we didn't touch at all. We moved our bed into that room. We had couches all around the perimeter. We had our coffee table stacked on a couch, which was then serving as our headboard. It was about 200 square feet." They lived with no lights or kitchen, but a toilet, and a sink faucet to wash their hands. "And we lived there for four months. And it was the first time we ever lived together."

With the remodel complete, Aaron loves the new kitchen, but the garage holds a special place in Holly's heart. "It's so funny, but the garage is the one room of the house where we did the work ourselves. Whenever I go out there, I'm proud of us for having done the floors."

She's on the other side of it now, but Holly still remembers home buying being nerve-wracking. "That was the first offer I had ever put in on a house. I didn't know what the process would be like. But when you're actually interested in the house, it seems like it's so much more high-stakes. Every wait was agonizing. And then, even when they accept your offer, there's still a lot of things that have to fall into place."

She recalls the emotional ups-and-downs, "There's a negotiation period, where you feel like it can fall through at any moment. And the farther into the process you get, the more invested you are in the outcome, and the more you worry that it won't happen."

Aaron went in hoping for the best, but was prepared for the worst. "Things don't always work out... set vour expectations, know what you can afford," he advises. "You're never going to get everything you want in a house that you can afford — no one will ever get everything, unless you're a billionaire. You will make concessions."

For many years, Holly believed she would never own a home. To those still looking, she counsels "feeling okay with wherever you are in life. If you're renting or trying to buy, or have already bought and looking for a different kind of property. Every place you live teaches you something about where you'll go next. So don't be worried if you're not exactly where you want to be yet. I think that's what I would tell my vounger self."

They're ready to start the process all over again after recently closing on a cabin in Idyllwild. The plan is to turn it into a family vacation house that they can also rent out on Airbnb once they fix it up. "I guess we weren't totally scared off of real estate after all that!"

year term and two additional one-year options "at a not to exceed rate of \$168,000 per year," according to a December 30 report to the council by government affairs director Adrian Granda. Total costs of keeping both lobbying outfits on for another two years would be \$672,000. When extended, the contracts' total not-to-exceed costs would amount to \$840,000 for each lobbyist's five-year term, per the agreements, raising questions of whether the pandemic-squeezed city could have gotten a better deal.

Council approval of the extensions is now required because "the original resolutions approving both contracts did not include the required budgetary actions and authorizations to allow the Mayor, or their designee to execute the two one-year option years." As reported by the Union-Tribune January 22, the new council majority recently added a component to the city's "guiding principles for lobbying," mandating that the activity "promote social justice, equity and inclusive economic development."

The city's high-dollar lobbyists have drawn questions and criticism over the years, a trend which peaked in January 2013 when thenmayor Bob Filner fired Patton Boggs and the city's then-Sacramento lobbyist Sloat Higgins Jensen & Associates. "The job is not being done by our lobbyists, either in Washington or Sacramento," Filner was quoted as saying. "There's no proactive policy. There's no accountability. There's no report. I got an invoice for \$15,000 and there was no report attached or anything that they did for that money." But following Filner's resignation in the wake of a sexual harassment scandal, then-interim **Mayor Gloria hastily restored** the two lobbying deals, saying, "We need to make sure someone is advocating for San Diego's interests on the national and state levels."

Platinum Affairs chief Darius Anderson, a controversial lobbyist for Pacific Gas & Electric, has drawn scrutiny for his ties to Rebuild North Bay, a San Francisco Bay Area non-profit that critics say has engaged in influence peddling for business interests. "It's not even a close call; it's blatant lobbying," Loyola Law School professor Ellen Aprill told Raw Story in December 2019. "The foundation is primarily a lobbyist, not a charity." According to the site, "The day after Christmas 2017, PG&E cut Rebuild North Bay a check for \$2 million: the utility's largesse accounted for 75 percent of the foundation's contributions in the ensuing months."

For its part, Squire Patton Boggs, the city's D.C. influence peddler, has been in the news for backing Republicans tied to ex-President Donald Trump, "It has donated to Paul Gosar, a House member from Arizona who helped promote the January 6 rally that turned violent," according to a January 12 New York Times account. The firm subsequently "paused" contributions by its political action committee in the Capitol riot's wake. There is history there: "The Squire Patton **Boggs PAC's contributions** to federal candidates in the 2019-2020 cycle leaned Republican, according to data from the Center for Responsive Politics, which said the PAC gave 34% to Democrats versus 66% to Republicans," per a January 12 report by Bloomberg Law. In addition, **Squire Patton Boogs once** maintained a secretive professional relationship with ex-Trump aide and convicted felon Michael Cohen, which ended after the FBI raided Cohen's offices in April 2018. "The firm's arrangement with Mr. Cohen reached its conclusion, mutually and in accordance with the terms of so the agreement," the company said in a cryptic statement 🥳 cited by Law.Com. "We have 😤 been in contact with federal authorities regarding their execution of a warrant relating to Mr. Cohen. These activities to Mr. Conem. 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
