A top official at a boys academy in San Diego County has had his child abuse conviction overturned, and been granted a new trial by an appellant court. Jeffery Barton, then 55, was head of schools at the Army and Navy Academy in Carlsbad when he was arrested and accused of child abuse in October of 2013. He had been employed there for almost 20 years, from 1994 until his arrest. Accusations first surfaced in June 2013, when Barton was accused of molesting boys from 13 to 15 years of age.

Three months ago, on October 26, 2020, an appeals court overturned Bar-

ALPINE Red-hot real estate? Plan calls for new homes in bazard zones

In Alpine's latest Community Plan Update, wildfire is given its own standalone section, a result of changes to the environmental review process made by the state in 2018. The idea was to put the brakes on development in places most prone to wildfire and other hazards. Alpine, 25 miles east of San Diego, has many such areas; its long fire history includes the 2003 Cedar growth to the village. As it is, the project instead allows development throughout the plan area, wreaking havoc on agricultural and forest lands, they say. "Perhaps of greatest concern, the Alpine Community Plan area is also located in a highly fire prone area." As shown by the recent West Fire and Valley Fire in San Diego County, fire breaks and setbacks are no solution to the wind driven blazes that are becoming more prevalent, the letter claims. Even if fuel modification zones and building design can protect the homes, "nothing can

Fire, among the state's worst. Last September, the Valley Fire torched 76,067 acres. But the update to the existing 1979 Alpine Community Plan considers increased densities, both within and adjacent to forest lands. According to the planning report, 60,072 acres of the Alpine Community Plan area are within the Wildland-Urban Interface, which represents 88 percent of the community. All of the areas eyed for development are entirely within that region, in a Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone. The update would allow 2013 more homes than the general plan now allows, for a total of 6078 dwelling units at build-out. Past efforts to open up land during updates and amendments were defeated by local concerns, concerns that included wildfire risk.

Though the updates are till a work inprogress, the plan's critics are calling for an overhaul. In a letter from their attorney, the Cleveland National Forest Foundation "urges the County to go back to the drawing board" to prepare an update that limits guarantee the safety of the new residents."

After receiving public feedback, a process that began in 2017, the county developed six alternatives for land-use changes. The one that was chosen is village-focused; the other five are alternatives in the draft supplemental environmental impact report. The village alternative proposes land-use changes in four of seven subareas, concentrates density in more developed areas, and puts commercial options near residential communities. Opponents say the plan creeps into the forest by expanding higher density land-use designations outside the established village boundaries. It would increase the density in one area several miles from the village "by more than five-fold."

So what is the county doing to address how projects will create or exacerbate wildfire risks? One goal is to use clustered development, keeping homes close together, as supported by the Conservation Subdivision Program, they say. *continued on page 6*

Kidd conquers Covid

But *Theodore Roosevelt* succumbed, says audit

A heavily redacted report by the Inspector General's office of the U.S. Department of Defense had critical words for both the Navy in general and the leadership of the San Diego-based USS Theodore Roosevelt, one of two warships to suffer severe outbreaks of Covid-19 last year. "As of August 1, 2020, the aircraft carrier USS Theodore **Roosevelt and the destroyer USS Kidd** were the only Navy warships that had a Covid-19 outbreak while underway at sea, and both had the highest number of cases relative to the crew size," noted the document, dated February 4. "The USS Theodore Roosevelt had just completed a port call in Da Nang, Vietnam, when its leadership reported the ship's first Covid-19 case on March 24, 2020." Twenty-five percent of the aircraft carrier **USS Theodore Roosevelt's 4800-member** crew ultimately turned up positive for the virus after the March outbreak, and one crew member died. "On March 24, 2020. the first sailors tested positive for Covid-19. while the ship was underway at sea to Guam." Three days later, on March 27, the aircraft carrier "arrived in Guam to receive medical care for the crew and to clean and disinfect the ship."

"Prior to the Covid-19 pandemic," the report said, "we found that four out of five Navy Component Commands did not conduct a biennial Pandemic Influenza & Infectious Disease exercise in accordance with the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations requirements. As a result of not conducting biennial [Pandemic Influenza & Infectious Disease] exercises, most Navy commands did not exercise pandemic response in coordination with their supported combatant commanders."

The removal of USS Theodore Roosevelt commander Capt. Brett Crozier, following the April leak of his memo critical of Navy higher-ups, went unmentioned in the report. But the audit echoed the blame-laying against the USS Roosevelt's leadership by an in-house Navy audit. **"The Command Investigation report** stated that USS Theodore Roosevelt leadership believed that social distancing would be impossible onboard an aircraft carrier." Added the document, "The command investigation further stated that the USS Theodore Roosevelt leadership team allowed social gathering areas to remain open and continued to perform urinalysis testing for illegal substances that the leadership team should have considered non-essential during the Covid-19 outbreak. Despite the release of Navy guidance allowing Commanding Officers to redu ce urinalysis screening and to close social gathering areas to support Covid-19 mitigation efforts, the ship continued to conduct command urinalysis screenings and keep gyms open" In addition, auditors said, "Leadership decided to prematurely release sailors from shipboard quarantine because conditions in guarantine were crowded and believed that the quarantine was causing more sailors to become infected. According to the Command Investigation, these decisions likely resulted in an increased infection rate."

No criticism, however, was leveled against leadership of the Arleigh Burkeclass destroyer USS Kidd, based in Everett, Washington. "The USS Kidd was supporting counternarcotic operations in the U.S. Southern Southern Command area of responsibility in the the eastern Pacific Ocean when its leadership reported the ship's first Covid-19 case on April 22, 2020," said the new audit. "On April 28, 2020, the USS Kidd arrived at Naval Base San Diego to receive medical care for the crew and to clean and *continued on page 13*

UNDER THE RADAR

Virtual giving, post facto Covid-

19 has proved no barrier to post-election fundraising for winning mayoral candidate **Todd Gloria**. Influence peddlers **Stephanie Saathoff** and **Denise Z. Price**, two Clay Company employees, threw a "virtual coffee" on November 24 that raised \$5200 for Gloria's campaign fund. Besides that event, the pair's virtual coffees came up with \$5350 on October 16 for City Attorney **Mara Elliott**'s reelection. Saathoff and Price raised \$2850 on December 7 for newly elected council

Democrat **Marni Von Wilpert** and \$3200 on December 4 for council Democrat **Joe LaCava**, another November winner, at other online events. The report says a December 3 "virtual mtg" by the pair for councilman **Stephen Whitburn** raised \$600. Prominent Clay Company clients include Evans Hotels, which leases from the city the land under the company's Bahia and Catamaran hotels, and the Lodge at Torrey Pines. Evans

paid the lobbyists \$13,000 in the final quarter of 2020, the disclosure shows. The hotel group has been pushing hard for rent relief during the covid-19 pandemic.

David Alvarez, the former San Diego city council Democrat who lost the February 2014 mayoral runoff to Republican **Kevin Faulconer**, now hoping to be governor, has signed up his first city hall lobbying client. According to his February 3 lobbying disclosure registration, he's advocating for Los Angeles developer Kilroy Realty regarding "Acquisition/Development of 951 Park Blvd." The so-called Popular Market site is being sold by the city to Kilroy for a reported \$8.5 million

for development as offices for technology and life science companies. Kilroy already owns adjacent real estate, sold by the Salvation Army for \$40 million, to be included in the mega-complex.

San Diegans for

governor Rancho Santa Fe Republican **John Cox** kicked off his latest campaign for governor with a TV spot drilling ex-San Diego mayor Kevin Faulconer, another declared Repub-

lican gubernatorial hopeful, for the city's Ash Street office building scandal. Cox, who lost to Newsom in 2018, self-funded his latest campaign with \$1 million on January 5, records show. Real estate mogul and Los Gatos vintner **Joe McCarthy** kicked in \$31,000 for Cox on January 26. Meantime, yet another famous GOP name is being floated for governor. Ex-Trump administration acting Director of National Intelligence **Ric Grenell**, no stranger to San Diego's roughand-tumble political environs, is said to be the top pick of some MAGA adherents, according to a February 5 dispatch by *Breitbart.com*. "A recall fight could be the best way for a Republican, especially one this close to Trump, to get into the governor's mansion in California with just a plurality of the vote," notes a February 5 take by the website.

Grenell cut his teeth in San Diego as a manager for the 1996 GOP convention here and later as tough-talking spokesman for Republican mayor **Susan Golding** and her quickly aban-

doned race for the U.S. Senate. After that, he briefly served as vice president of corporate communications for La Jollabased military contracting giant Titan Corp., where Golding was a board member. "After a lifetime career in the public sector, Grenell calls this private enterprise post, which he assumes in December, a great challenge and a welcome return to San Diego," wrote Union-Tribune columnist **Diane Bell**. But Gren-

ell vanished from the role when Titan's connection to the Abu Ghraib torture scandal emerged in 2004. In 2014, Grenell briefly returned to San Diego politics as a hard-hitting champion of GOP ex-city councilman **Carl DeMaio**'s congressional challenge to La Jolla Democratic incumbent **Scott Peters**. "Congratulations to @**PeteButtigieg** on becoming the second openly gay member of a President's Cabinet. Welcome to the club!" Grenell tweeted on February 2 following Buttigieg's confirmation as transportation secretary in the **Joe Biden** administration.

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

Cops follow the mules Because the mules don't follow the rules

A feeling of déjà vu struck John Sears — and perhaps his two mules as well — when county sheriffs recently escorted them out of the Poway city limits. "It was about a week ago," Sears said to me on February 7, "we had problems on Poway Road, where it was narrow." During this

not be on the road." Then a third patrol vehicle pulled up, Sears said. "He was a little bit more reasonable. He started with the same ultimatum: this road was not made for horses, and [the mules] can't be walking on this road. He went back to his

time of the year, the 72-year-old nomad walks our county's streets and bush with his mules, Little Ethel and Little Girl in tow. The three had almost reached Mina De Oro Road, the turnoff to get to the Poway Equestrian Center where the "the mules had been invited to stay. Then two cruisers showed up. I guess it was from the county sheriff's [department]. They stopped us and told us flat out we could cruiser, talked to somebody for a while, then he escorted us off Poway Road to the 67, where they intersect."

A couple of days later, and about 17 miles south of Poway, Julie spotted the three outside her flower shop by Mission Valley. "I rushed out to greet them and brought red carnations with me, which John immediately put on his mules' ears," she posted on the *3Mules.com* website on

February 4. "[It was an] awesome, pure nature and heart-warming experience. If you see them, please take a moment to stop and chat with John and enjoy his beautiful mules. They live a nomadic life and are

at peace with this earth and lifestyle – carefree and spreading joy to others without even knowing it. God is good, and I am blessed to have met John and his precious mules."

When Sears and I spoke on the phone, he said I could refer to him as "Monk or Mule." His website, *3Mules.com*, and linked Facebook account and Instagram account with the same name, journals his almost-daily adventures with Little Ethel

and Little Girl. (While Sears corresponds directly with many of his 53,000 Facebook followers and 5400 plus Instagram followers, he admitted that he and the mules have an undisclosed "magical" woman who has helped with the site's blogs and social media posts since 2014.)

On February 5, the three made their way to City Heights, where people photographed them strolling on a 54th Street and El Cajon Boulevard sidewalk. A fan commented underneath the photographs, "Will you take a break from walking at this point, or do you never take a break?" Sears responded: "Yes, people offer their property from time to time for the mules to stop and rest for a couple of days. The mules get plenty of rest, and they are by no means traveling day in and day out." While most commenters on the 3 Mules' social media accounts are supportive of the lifestyle the three have "been living for the past 35 years," there are those who

disagree. "If we all packed the streets with mules, it would be a mess," opined a Central Valley dweller. "Come on, man, time to retire and enjoy life. Mules are soulless animals put under human dominion. Treat them well is the best you can do for them, and then they die." Sears was quick to respond: "The 'megatropolis' has packed the world with machines, and it is a horrible mess [with] anger, depression, confusion, and a deteriorating world all around us."

Before Sears and I spoke, he messaged me a link on their site with a video titled "CHP Dashcam Video of 3 Mules Arrest January 23, 2020." The video depicts California Highway Patrol officers arresting Sears near San Luis Obispo, 300 miles north of San Diego. "I went to jail for about 24 hours; they stripped me down to my shorts and a t-shirt and put me in an ice-cold cell." The mules were "hauled off to an animal shelter that was about a quarter of a mile away from the jail. So I just walked down the road, and I had to pay \$266 to get them out."

As we spoke, I could hear traffic passing Sears and the mules as they walked

down Beyer Boulevard between Chula Vista and Imperial Beach. Sears messaged me another link to the site, headlined, "The Mules sue the California Highway Patrol over their right to travel on the public thoroughfare." He explained, "We submitted the complaint on January 21, and I believe Todd Cardiff is in the process of suing the arresting officer, and what comes after that, I don't know." Sears added that Cardiff, a San Diego-based attorney, is handling the case "pro bono."

"Assuming this case goes to trial," how long will it take you and the mules to walk back up to San Luis Obispo?" I asked.

"We'd average about 15 miles a day, and the quickest way to go up there is through the 101 corridor."

That's about a 20-day trek for the monk and his mules.

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TIJUANA Real estate collapse Saturation spurs serious slide

On January 30, a landslide took place in Tijuana. This time, the working-class neighborhood 3 de Octubre, 18 miles southeast of downtown TJ, was affected. Marta Cardenas and her family built up their home here 30 years ago. She explained that she had worked with her own hands on this life project. But on that day, her property and 40 others sank down nine feet into the ground, the moving earth ripping down houses, trapping cars, and driving 50 families out of their homes. Some 23 more houses still stand but aren't safe for their owners to live in, according to the Municipal Civil Protection Department.

Cardenas said that the ground started cracking at 6 am that Saturday; from that moment, the neighbors had only a couple of hours to take their belongings out of their homes — while they were falling down around them. "At noon everything sank down," she recalled, "but we were able to take the car out of the property at the last minute. Neighbors were carrying out their stoves and other stuff

on their backs. If I were younger, I would be able to start up again and build another house, but how can I do it now?" She said her daughter realized the street pavement was cracking up right away, but she never took her seriously. Her daughter and other neighbors called to report the cracks, and also the clean water leaking out of the ground. "That water filtering from a Tijuana State Public Services Commission pipe was reported last year. And because all the land got soaked, the pavement began breaking down in pieces," she added.

Jorge Delgado is another affected resident; he agreed with Marta's daughter's statement, "For me, the public services have a lot of responsibility here," the 52-year-old said. "They never fixed that leaking well. My house is still up but has cracks everywhere. Now I need to save what I can, but for now, I'm homeless. My brother offered me a place to

stay with my wife, but it's just temporary." According to the Civil Protection director Marco Antonio Sanchez, this area has been categorized as a risky zone since 2019, but the first settlements in this neighborhood

date from the early '90s. He added that the event was mainly caused by the heavy rains last week. The public services commission has stated that they will lead an investigation to clarify their responsibilities. For now, the affected home dwellers are being sheltered with relatives or neighbors, but the locals are uncertain if the municipal government will re-locate the families, or, since the settlement was illegal, limit their involvement by giving groceries, blankets, and medicines.

Battle fishing

"This night, we were stuck on a sand bar," says Justin. "There's weather out there, and strong current. There's the potential for the boat to just get knocked over. The tide comes in very fast. It can bury you. Twenty-foot tides sometimes. They come in like floods."

You'd never pick Justin Martin for a storm-

grizzled Ancient Mariner. He looks too young, too preppy to have been out risking all in the storms of the Bering Sea. But he's been fishing in those lethal waters between Alaska and the Aleutians for twenty years already. And right now, he's already got me hooked with his story.

"The waves were smashing into the boat. The tide was coming in, and the boat was starting to tip. This was late in the season, and we couldn't see anybody around. Our radios were broken, so we couldn't call for help, and our greenhorn captain was having a complete mental breakdown. He was an emotion-

ally unstable guy anyway. He was up on the fly bridge of the boat, ripping components out and throwing them overboard, including things that worked. Myself and the other deckhand, Erik - there were only three of us on the boat - we were looking at each other: 'What do we do? Do we need to get our survival suits on? Like, what's happening here? Are we going to die?'''

I had spotted Justin standing in his Hillcrest Farmers Market stall, beside his sign. "Maqi Seafoods. Wild, Fresh. Sustainable. Vista, California."

Last time I wrote about fish was two weeks

ago, actually about futurefish. Or bits of fish grown in a kind of vitamin soup from fish cells. Some people say we won't need to actually go out and catch fish any more, once we perfect the growing of their cells. So it's funny I should bump into Justin, who goes to the roughest seas in the coldest latitudes in the most dangerous circumstances possible. (And deaths

in the fishing industry are 16 times higher than among US firefighters or police, and 40 times the national average, according to the UN's International Labor Office, although these are 1996 figures. More recently, between 2000 and 2015, 725 fishermen have lost their lives fishing in US waters).

"Why do you do it?" I ask.

"Blame my brother," he says. "He got a job up in Dillingham, Alaska. He was working as a chef for a cannery up there. And he gave me a call, in the spring of the year 2000, and asked me if I'd be interested in coming up to Alaska to do some seasonal work. Lots of work, long hours, not much to spend money on, I could make a good chunk of change. And I thought that could really help. I was 19, at college, studying biology at Southern Oregon University, and pulling out school loans. So I jumped on that opportunity. My first gig in Dillingham was in a boatyard. But I soon realized that if I could get on the right crew, there was the potential to make a lot more money out on a fishing boat."

He has been going up there every year since.

"I love eagles soaring, hearing the loons on the lake, seeing the salmon in their spawning grounds."

"I am on a fantastic boat now," he says. "We have had the same crew for the last six years. We're like a well-oiled machine. We don't have to say much, which speaks for the captain's discretion. He can handle situations. And there are always situations. When there's a [salmon] run, all the boats want in, trying to get in the right spot. We call it 'battle fishing'. You're close to others. Equipment can get tangled between boats. Or, worse, it can foul the propellors. Things get very crazy. But that's the thing about our crew. We never freak out and we never stop working. We push each other. That's why we're salmon in their spawning grounds."

And he also loves how, at the end of each fishing trip, the one thing everybody does is jump into somebody's Maqi (pronounced "maa-gu'ey" in Yupik language), which is the sauna everybody has. "That's where you thaw out. You have the steam temperature as hot as you can. You have a beer, you talk story. Lots of yucks and chucks. That's why I chose 'Maqi' for my company name."

the highliner, the top-ranking boat."

Yes, he'd like to captain his own boat some day. And maybe soon: partly because of covid, people are expecting a downswing in catching and consuming salmon. That could mean boats going out of business, prices for boats dropping. Justin is playing a waiting game.

Meantime he is here, with the salmon fillets he has been freezing and smoking and bringing down to sell at Southern California markets without having to pay middlemen commission. He loves being with his wife (they met when he was completing his degree at the University of Hawaii) and two kids, but he get knocked over, thankfully. The boat started floating. We had lost one of our engines as well, but the other screw was still working. Except, the captain said he was going to go to sleep. He couldn't be awake any longer. We were all exhausted. He asked me to drive us back to Dillingham. I was brand new. That's a sixhour [boat trip], in pretty treacherous water. I knew nothing. I got up on the fly bridge, out in the wind and rain and cold, all night long, while the other guys were sleeping. That was my introduction to Alaska. But I always come back. I've known since I first went up: I'm a lifer." ■



Retali-hate Hillcrest vandalism being investigated as rare gay-on-black hate crime

On January 25, worshippers at the University Christian Church in Hillcrest discovered that the night previous, someone had spattered paint on the Black Lives Matter sign adorning their building, as well as two of the rainbow-colored doors that normally stand at the church entrance to indicate the church's open and affirming stance toward the LGBTQ community. (The other doors vanished, and have yet to be located.) Mayor Todd Gloria was quick to tweet about the matter, writing, "This is more than vandalism. This is hate." The San Diego Police Department later announced that it was investigating the incident as a hate crime.

But according to Hillcrest resident Bill Bearbait, there is hate and then there is justice. "I didn't do the painting, but I get why it was done," says Bearbait. "In 2008, California's Black population voted 70-30 in favor of Proposition 8, the ballot initiative that amended the California constitution to define marriage as between one man and one woman. A community that had been through so many hardships in

In July 2019, the New York Times reported that Sharpton joined with **Manhattan Democratic** Party boss Keith L.T. Wright at the behest of tobacco giant Reynolds American to oppose the city's regulation of menthol cigarettes. The proposal subsequently foundered. Sharpton acknowledged to the paper that his group, the National Action Network, had received funding from **Reynolds American**, as did the company itself, but neither would not say how much. "Ten thousand dollars or \$15,000 would not influence us either way," he said, adding that his convention brings in more than \$1 million from corporate and other sponsors. "This is not about money."

Incumbent contractor American Medical Response has heavily lobbied San Diego's paramedic deal. deploying campaign contributions, personal gifts, and charity donations. Since 2012, according to campaign finance disclosure records. A.M.R. employees have given almost \$40,000 to municipal campaigns. The lineup of high-dollar lobbyists on both sides is formidable. City records show that Falck U.S.A. has signed up Public Policy Partners, run by Nancy Chase, to lobby for its selection as E.M.S. provider. Southwest Strategies, another well-connected San Diego influence peddler, has also been retained by Falck, the filings show. Southwest has represented Falck on the matter since the Fourth Quarter of 2019.

Like Falck, A.M.R. uses two lobbying firms, Affairs, run by Kimberly Miller. Her previous partner on the A.M.R. account, ex-GOP aide Phil Rath, was slapped with hefty fines in 2018 by the San Diego city ethics commission and California's Fair Political Practices following a conflict of interest scandal arising from Rath's votes as a Faulconer appointee to the board of Civic San Diego. In addition to Miller, A.M.R. employs Presidio Public Affairs Group, per the disclosures. That lobbying shop was founded in 2014 by Faulconer's political strategist Jason Roe. A year later, Roe left the operation after engaging in a nasty public spat with Chargers' special counsel Mark Fabiani, who questioned his role as a lobbyist for stadium food service contractor **Delaware North.**



Nothing friendly about the Friendship Hotel

he untold stories about Hillcrest's Friendship Hotel would probably read like William Burroughs' dream journal. Once a nurse's dorm for the nearby hospital, by the turn of the 21st century the two buildings across the street from each other on 8th Avenue had devolved into the most fleabitten of fleabag hotels. For most residents, whether passing through or permanent, it was a last potential offramp on the road to oblivion. Twenty bucks a day, plus an equal and unadvertised room deposit (and ten more bucks for the key deposit, if the operator found you shifty) got you the most minimally outfitted room. The entire floor shared one (frequently unspeakable) bathroom.

A while back, I posted an autobiographical article called Chuck Norris vs. Wyatt Earp, about living in the late '70s at the storied Palms Hotel, a palace-turned-flophouse sprawling across half a block at 12th and Island downtown. As it turned out, exactly 20 years later, I found myself once again homeless and hotel shopping, though still with a modest income from publishing assets, freelance writing, and drawing the weekly Overheard in San Diego comic strips. When I noticed the Friendship Hotel was practically next door to a Kinko's where I was already renting computer time and using photocopiers to complete my paying work, I walked into the Hotel cold and requested a room.

I should be upfront here and tell you that I was strung out. In full addiction mode and frankly, looking forward to getting into my room and feeding that addiction. I daresay one could tell from looking at me, a guy with sunken Uncle Fester eyes wearing long unwashed duds, and whose only luggage was a backpack.

Notwithstanding the fact that I looked like Sid Vicious checking into the Chelsea Hotel just before Nancy arrived with a big-ass knife in her purse, the operator, a big gruff guy (who got angrier and angrier over the next few weeks, like some kind of slow-mo werewolf transformation) took me right to my room, across the street from the main building and on the second floor. Minus that extra ten dollar key deposit.

It took me only a few moments alone in my room to do my drug of choice, and then I was bouncing back out my new door to go put my few remaining dollars toward more drugs. I noticed that my door had a huge gap between it and the frame, big enough to nearly wiggle fingers through, and I made a mental note to drape a blanket over the door from the inside when I got back.

The first person I came across was standing just outside the building, a very pretty young woman, probably in her early 20s. She was on the steps and said hi, so I said hi and noticed she seemed to want to say more. I figured this might be worth holding off on the drugs, at least for a moment.

She looked around awkwardly and then back at me. "Look, I just got here and I don't know anybody, so let me just come out and ask you. Do you know where, uh, working girls go around here? Like, is there a track where guys go to find a date?"

I told my new neighbor about how nearby El Cajon Boulevard transformed at night into a hooker parade, all the way up to Mad Jack's.

And then we took off in opposite directions, though we did cross paths later that night on the Boulevard. She thanked me and said she was going to be able to afford a much better hotel now. I wasn't so lucky. She was out there earning, I was out there spending.

The next time I left my room was the next day, moments after my drugs were again used up.

my doorway while saying this, so I assumed that the suspicious tenant was me. I was indeed suspicious, but that I'd just used up all my drugs, and that there wasn't so much as a piece of paraphernalia left in my room. So I just chirped, "Well, good luck with that then, hope you catch the guy," and walked downstairs and out the door.

When I got to the

As soon as I opened the door, there was the big gruff guy who'd rented me the room, standing almost in the door jamb. The door jamb I'd covered from inside with a sheet. I was startled. "What's up, is there a problem?"

He looked guilty. "Uh, I'm just keeping an eye on a tenant. I think he's up to something, and I want to find out what it is."

He was standing in

Jack in the Box parking lot next door. I looked up at the Hotel window closest to my room on the second floor. There was the Hotel operator, opening my room door and walking in. As I got to know other residents, both semi-permanent and occasional like myself, they often told me the guy had keys to every room, and wasn't at all shy about walking into anyone's hidey-hole. Some people lived

there full time, but they still had to leave for one night every month, to avoid local occupancy laws or something. There was a lady who walked her cat on a leash who said she'd been there four years, and who had only good things to say about hotel management. A family on the first floor was said to have been there for even more years, and they too seemed happy, although they avoided interaction with almost everyone who hadn't been there as long. In fact, once the sun went down, the family was locked in as tight as the peasants of Dracula's village. I never once saw them emerge

after dark. The operator's lover (who I never talked to but who is best described physically as what Poseidon Adventure-era Ernest Borgnine might see in the mirror after a week without sleep), seemed to have free reign of any unoccupied room he wanted to use for open door hotel parties.

More than once, he and others tried to lure me into those parties



as I walked by, promising me everything from sex to drugs to things I couldn't comprehend then or now. He and his fellow partiers were using code words that greatly amused them, but com-

pletely baffled me.

One night, I had a female overnight guest who didn't know about my drug use. So, after she fell asleep, I got high in the dark, in the corner of my room, very quietly and very furtively. When I silently stood and opened the door to go out for the bathroom, the door hit a guy standing right there in the hallway, bent over like a cartoon kid peering into a key-shaped peephole. like I'd fallen into an outtake from The Birdcage.

The guy apologized with a bunch of babble about "I thought this was someone else's room," but it was obvious he'd been peeking through that huge door crack. That was when I started calling it the Looky-Loo Hotel. When I said that to another resident, he told me "Man, you don't know how right you are!"

According to this guy, who'd been living

there off and on — we'll call him "Max" — there were peep holes in the ceilings of every room on the second floor of the secondary building. Sure enough, I soon spotted the operator going up a weird set of stairs into an attic looking room, and then hearing his footsteps up there, going back and forth. According to Max, that's where the peepholes were.

One day, the operator was coming down from the "attic" just as I walked by, and I took the opportunity to ask "Hey, what's up there? You don't have any artist lofts with a view to rent, do you?"

The guy looked at me strange and grunted "nothing but storage up there." Why a semiresidential hotel operator needed to go climb into an attic storage room multiple times each day — never carting anything in or out of that storage room that looked related to storage - went (and remains) unaddressed.

I mentioned this to Max, and he took me into the communal kitchen and showed me something really strange. A big plywood sheet was thing. The hole behind the plywood was just big enough to bend over and walk into.

Looking into the hole, you could see a sort of hallway that seemed to wend all the way down the length of the building, situated just behind what would have been the back wall of the rental rooms. Max said the hole had just appeared,

But I wasn't surprised to hear about it. It's not like anything friendly had ever happened during my time at the Friendship Hotel.

It's all in the jerk

eagan ("Think 'Reagan" she says) saws away at her violin right by the entrance. She's playing Arianna Grande's "34+35." Sounds really cool. Actually, this whole scene is hard to beat. Saturday morning, sunshine, cool

breeze to balance things out, your shadows following you everywhere, so the place looks more crowded than it is. Life is good, even if you do have to join a twoblock line to get in. The waiting gives you a chance to pick up all the smells and colors of the

Hillcrest Farmers' Market. Turns out Hillcrest is the oldest of the markets, going since 1997. And the gal letting us in (when her walkie-talk tells her four people have just exited the market at the other end) says they have 10,000 coming every week.

"I'll call when I am done," says Annie. She wants to get her supplies solo. "Men just complicate things," she says. Not a problem. Much better than fighting like two yo-yos on the ends of one string.

And even though they have extra volunteers telling us all to stay apart so we don't cluster up when we're supposed to be social distancing, it is such a kick, wandering about, strangers together, not touching the fruit, but sampling the goat cheese, drinking the Ethiopian coffee — so-oo delish! — and knowing that it comes from where these Ethiopian guys' ancestors invented the whole idea of coffee (from an iffy-looking shrub that shepherds noticed made their goats frisky when they nibbled its red berries).

Oh boy. I see a couple of Brazilian guys have a stall going that says "Home of the Stuffed Hash Brown." What a great idea. Only problem is wafts of jerk chicken kept hitting me on the way up here. Man. I could have stopped there and breathed in the jerk for hours. Not only that, but Annie's talking about wanting some of "that African chicken" before we head off back out into the world. I make a private deal that I will be back for these hash brown guys. There are still lots of temptations on the way down, of course. We pass the House of Bao, which is mainly \$4-5 dumplings and steamed buns; an avocado toast place (\$8-10); a carrot cake tent; and Lady G's Canteen, a Filipino food tent.

We know we're at Jerk Central by the smoke, and the sight of dozens and dozens of chicken thighs and breasts all grilling away on giant flameheated racks right here in the



street. Another clue: the sound of the chop-chop as one of the crew picks up each breast and cleavers it into four parts.

But of course, above everything is the aroma. Oh baby! Spices in the smoke, dripping, blackened meat, carnivore's heaven.

David, one of the guys keeping this chain of deliciousness going, stands under the shade of the tent, methodically stirring each of

the dozen chafing dishes loaded with lentils, eggplant, beef stews, goat curries, different kinds of rice, and *ugali*, a mashed corn meal he says is a popular rice alternative in Africa.

"We have been doing this since 1995," he says. "We have a restaurant now, but June, the Kenyan guy who started it up, put in sixteen years just cooking at markets like this before he could get his own place."

So, what to eat? He points to the menus. "But don't worry," he says, "you can mix it any way you want."

And mama, quite a choice. You can start with small dishes like *dengu* (\$5.95), lentils in a curry sauce; or *niyoyo*, a hominy, kidney bean, carrot and potato mix, also \$5.95; or *biringanya* (\$7.95), eggplant in a tomato-based sauce. Or I almost go for goat soup (\$8.50), with a slice of *injera*, the fermented, spongey Ethiopian bread (\$1, or \$2.95 for a whole round).

But then there are the big plates. Like, seven *sambusas* (\$13.50. Or \$2 each), stuffed with fillers such as spicy beef, chicken, spinach, potato, shrimp, cream cheese, pineapple, and spicy lentil.

Or African jerk chicken in a sweet or a spicy sauce, with veggies and rice or *ugali*

(\$15.95). Or *nyama choma* ("African roast beef steak"), \$19.95. But I end up with an awesome deal: a medium chicken combo plate for \$12. And David is good to his word. "Can I have half spicy jerk chicken and half sweet jerk chicken?" I whine. "Not a problem," he says. Then he slops my *biringanya*, eggplant, and *dengu* into spare spaces. "Can I have half coconut rice and half saffron?" I say now. "Not a problem," David says. Guy's a saint.

And I swear, when Annie and I get to a

Annie gives me one of her looks. "So you're not?" ■

Bitchin Sauce is everywhere now

About ten years ago, young mom and aspiring personal chef Starr Edwards started bringing her food samples to farmers markets in Leucadia and San Marcos, hoping to drum up business.

Among her samples was a creamy, almondbased sauce she'd come up with as a 16-year-old trying to make her vegan diet more appealing. She blended raw almonds with garlic, lemon, tamari, grapeseed oil, and nutritional yeast. At home, she liked to cook with it, use it as a salad dressing, or to spruce up a bowl of beans and rice. But the easiest way to share with farmers market customers was to serve it with tortilla chips. "When we went to the farmers market, that was the first time it was used as a dip," Edwards recalls.

She didn't get any work as a personal chef, but she got a lot of people clamoring for that dip. Within six months, she was selling it at 25 farmers markets around Southern California. By the end of that first year, she'd sold about 100,000 tubs of the addictive almond dip she began to market as Bitchin' Sauce.

And this year, the company she built around Bitchin' Sauce expects to sell somewhere in the range of nine million tubs. Not just in San Diego, but in nearly 7500 stores nationwide. Not just natural food stores, but large chains including Whole Foods, Costco, Albertsons, Vons, Safeway, 7/11, Target, and as of this month, Sprouts.

Meanwhile, food bloggers around the country have spent hours developing copycat recipes to share with their readers.

For most of the 20-teens, Bitchin' Sauce was a weekly fixture of San Diego farmers markets, emerging as one of the community's greatest success stories.

Though it bears a passing resemblance to hummus, the less pasty, almond-based sauce doesn't really belong to any existing condiment tradition. So Edwards had to give it a name. She wanted to convey wholesome branding, that also reflected her beachy, SoCal roots.

"I was trying to find a word that could com-

municate that," she tells me. "I googled *awesome* sauce, but it was taken."

Instead, the Bitchin' name took off, and though Edwards allows the SoCal slang probably bemuses a few folks around the East Coast and Midwest, it doesn't seem to have hindered sales.

The original, addictive, savory flavor has expanded to an entire product line, including sweet and savory options ranging from chipotle, pesto, and cilantro chili to chocolate and salted caramel. A line made with organic almonds includes spinach artichoke and Buffalo sauce. A "Snacker" line packages the stuff with tortilla chips or carrots for single serve dipping.

It's a statement that does three things to convince the customer that a third fee, on top of delivery and service fees, isn't merely justified, but justice in action.

First, it invokes the specter of "regulation," a dog-whistle to those against government overreach. Second, it reinforces the notion DoorDash is only out to offer us convenience, the universal salve to our existential pain. Finally, it implies the added fee isn't about maintaining profit, but creating jobs for its drivers. Never mind the fact its drivers are independent contractors who rely on tips to get their take-home pay above minimum wage.

On the last point, DoorDash does nominally advocate for its drivers. When I placed an order for delivery from Crack Taco Shop to witness the new fee in action, the DoorDash software autofilled a \$7 tip for \$30 worth of tri-tip tacos and burritos. I suppose if we customers aren't willing to pay 24 percent tips on our deliveries, the low pay of delivery drivers is on us.

I'm not so naïve to think DoorDash is evil for trying to maintain profits, and I do believe they provide a valuable service to restaurants and customers. I even think online ordering and delivery have only become more valuable during the covid era. I just don't think they are worth what DoorDash was already charging before the pandemic began.

When I reached out to Door-Dash for further explanation of the new fee, it replied "We realize this isn't ideal..." and then mostly included language similar to the "regulatory response fee" description above. It pointed out, "Operating our platform, paying and insuring Dashers, and ensuring highquality service can be expensive," but that doing so provides "valuable services that help drive orders for merchants."

Fair points, all of them. However, DoorDash declined sacrosanct. With the commission cap in effect, my \$29.35 taco delivery wound up costing me \$45.01. Out of that, \$9.39 went to DoorDash fees, while Crack Taco Shop presumably forked over an additional 18 percent to the app (\$5.28). So far, I haven't seen either UberEats, GrubHub, or Postmates follow suit with a regulatory response fee, but I won't be surprised if it happens. A delivery app is always going to get its cut. It reminds me of casino gam-

Statistics offered by the Brewers Association estimate some 92 percent of brewers are male, while 89 percent of brewers and 88 percent of brewery owners identify as white.

A new scholarship created by Ballast Point Brewing seeks to put a dent in at least some of those figures. The newly announced Brewing for Diversity Scholarship will cover the roughly \$6200 costs of completing UC San Diego Extension's Brewing Program. A few of those same pro brewers make up much of the faculty of the program, including Ballast Point's former brewmaster, Yuseff Cherney, who was instrumental in developing the program when it started in 2013, and remains its lead instructor. In fact, despite two highly publicized changes in ownership, Ballast Point has been closely involved with the program from its outset, bringing in students for brewery tours and internships, and occasionally offering jobs.

Kyle Wiskerchen, who oversees the extension program, says that the idea for Ballast Point to create a scholarship first came up a couple of years ago, while the brewery was still owned by multinational Constellation Brands. However, the idea ultimately fizzled out until after the beer company was purchased by Chicago area microbrewery Kings & Convicts Brewing Co., in late 2019.

The concept resurfaced late last spring, Wiskerchen says, when it was introduced by Ballast Point employees. And they were intent that it should be a diversity scholarship, partly in response to the social justice protests then taking place across the U.S.

"They definitely were persistent about reconnecting with the community," says Wiskerchen, adding that the employee's approach to building diversity within the brewing industry was, "We need to do something, not just talk about it." Spearheading the action was a part time

bartender, Misha Collins, who has since been

appointed the company's full time Community Engagement Manager. "I felt compelled to do something," says Collins, who approached Kings and Convicts cofounder and Ballast Point chief executive Brendon Watters. "As a woman of color, my conversation with Brendan delved deeper into the topic of how to make an impact in the areas of diversity and inclusion," she continues."We talked honestly about the racial tension the world was

experiencing in that moment and how Ballast Point could help."

Wiskerchen notes that the majority of the UC brewing program graduates have been hired by

breweries, or gone on to found their own. While the extension program has, like the industry it supports, been mostly white and male, it's gradually become more popular among women, commuters from Mexico, and vets attending on a G.I. bill.

The new scholarship, offered annually, will be awarded in May to a person chosen by a committee composed of "members of Ballast Point, UC San Diego Extension Program, and the Inclusion Committee of the San Diego Brewers Guild."

The selection will primarily be decided by a personal essay,

and though diversity within the brewing community is the end goal, what diversity specifically means will remain, to some degree, subjective. Technically," says Wiskerchen, "anyone can apply who is going to champion diversity in their community."



The cause of the fire remains undetermined. "All they know is it most likely started in the walls of my [17-year-old] little sister's room. Luckily, both of us weren't home when the fire started around 2 am." Byrne didn't have renter's insurance to cover the loss of music recording gear including microphones, cables, four guitars, and a keytar ("That thing was awesome!"), as well as clothes, old photos, and much of her

The San Diego Jewish Men's Choir managed

to release their third album in December of 2020. Quite an achievement, one would think, given the circumstances of covid-19. But, says conductor Ruth Webber, "Had it not been for the pandemic, I actually don't think we would have released the album at this time! We most likely would have collected a few more songs. When the pandemic started, we began holding virtual rehearsals on Zoom. Those were very frustrating since the technology causes a time lag and an inability for the singers to hear each other clearly. Since we had to cancel our entire concert season, the choir decided it would be the best use of our energies and funds to finish our album at this

from musicians from all over the U.S. that we added to our vocal tracks."

The Billboard-charting choir has been operating for more than 20 years, and the group bills itself as "25 good looking guys who can also sing and dance," according to a promotional flyer. Weber came on board nine years ago. Choir members range in age from early 20s to late 80s and they hail from several different countries. The mission statement is to preserve and promote the rich heritage of historically relevant Jewish music, and they sing in a variety of languages including Yiddish, Ladino (also known as Judeo-Spanish,) Hebrew, and English. They began recording tracks for the new album Legacy five years ago, and they used the large room at Studio West in Rancho Bernardo.

I wondered about the logistical challenge of managing a group of 25-30 male egos.

"Haha, yes! That was my big fear when I accepted this position. I thought no one would actually listen to what I had to say since I was the only woman in the group," says

One song produced by Oscroft, "Broken People," hit the Top 10 on Sirius XM's Alt 18 Countdown, was featured on Amazon Music's Best of 2020: Alternative playlist, and the tune was covered on a summer 2020 single from Sofi Tukker. Almost monday's debut EP Don't Say You're Ordinary has generated more than 23 million total streams. The band recently dropped the video for their single "live forever," which they describe as a "Beastie Boys-inspired visual [that] showcases the track's message of not taking moments for granted and living boldly." They were also recently profiled in GQ Australia's 21 Breakout Musicians to Know in 2021, Amazon Music's 2021 Artists To Watch playlist, and Apple Music's Shazam Predictions 2021 playlist, which features 50 emerging artists "who are poised to have a breakthrough year."



WARISH

Horror punk rock band Warish is fronted by singer-guitarist Riley Hawk, formerly of Petyr and perpetually the son of skateboard star Tony Hawk. Since their debut self-titled EP dropped in early 2019 on RidingEasy Records, they've gone on to release several singles and videos, as well as touring with San Francisco stoner rockers Acid King, who helped introduce them to the outdoor party circuit with events like Portland's Hesh Fest and Austin's Levitation Fest. In advance of their upcoming 13-song album *Next To Pay* (due April 30 via RidingEasy), a new Warish video is streaming online for its first single, "Say To Please." According to Hawk, "*Next To Pay* is about a sense of imminent doom, everyone is going to die. It's not the happiest record, I guess. This album is more of an evolution, it's a little more punk-heavy." Original drummer Nick (Broose) McDonnell plays on about half of the album, while new drummer Justin de la Vega appears on the more recent tracks. The record also features new bassist Alex Bassaj, who joined after the debut album, and includes a cover of Gray Matter's punk anthem "Burn No Bridges."



SARA PETITE

"My sound is like a modern day June Carter," says folky bluegrass singer-songwriter Sara Petite, who was born and raised in the countryside of Sumner, Washington, before relocating to San Diego. She won Best Americana or Country Artist at the 2009 San Diego Music Awards and Best Americana at the 2012 SDMAs, a trophy she won again in 2013. Her album *Doghouse Rose* debuted at number 33 on the Top 40 Americana Album Chart. A new country rock full-length, *Rare Bird*, will be released February 26 on JTM Music, preceded so far by a music video for its first single "The Misfits." The album was recorded with collaborators like fiddle legend Bobby Furgo (Leonard Cohen, Nancy Sinatra) and guitarist Mike Butler (Billy Bob Thorton's Boxmasters). *Rare Bird* also marks the final work from Grammy-winning producer David Bianco (Tom Petty, Lucinda Williams, Bob Dylan), who began recording with Petite before passing away during the early stages. Petite teamed up with local co-producer and engineer Ben Moore to finish the record, taking a principal role in the songs' creation and their arrangements. A Belly Up virtual release party is planned for February 26, and the album has been added to the Sirius XM Outlaw Radio plavlist.



CHUCK SCHIELE

Born in San Jose and raised in New York, Chuck Schiele arrived in San Diego at the end of the 1970s to take art classes at SDSU. He came to local attention as guitarist/ singer/songwriter for the Grams, who won a 2006 San Diego Music Award as Best Americana Group and a 2007 trophy for Best Americana or Country. The guitarist for Gandhi Method and Bad Science Fiction has also been an integral part of bands such as Modern Peasants and Chuck Schiele & the Mysterious Ways. He runs Studio B, a full-service recording facility, and has produced projects including Podunk Nowhere and Johnny Different. Schiele has a new solo EP, *Love Letters*, with a music video streaming online for its first single "Justice." According to Schiele, "I'm tired of the perpetuation of things and ideas that are anti-love. It really bothers me that our supposedly superior species keeps encouraging ideas of hate and violence. This four-song EP is basically four letters that acknowledge the situation of today, offer ideas, a lot of hope, and a practical first step plan. Tough love."

I've had dozens of conversations regarding the greatest symphonies of all time. I've read dozens of articles on the same topic. The usual suspects are all there, Beethoven's Ninth, Mahler's Ninth, Bruckner's Eighth, Brahms' Fourth, Shostakovich's Seventh. But what about the best secondbest symphonies of all time? Who wrote the best second-best symphony? Allow me to explain. Tchaikovsky's greatest symphony is his Sixth. In my opinion, his second-best symphony is his Fifth. How does Tchaikovsky's Fifth stack up against the second-best symphony Sibelius wrote, which would also be his Fifth?

Of course, it isn't always clear which symphony is a composer's greatest. In the case of Mozart, his Symphony No. 41 is usually considered to be his greatest, but nearly as many

rom the look of things, Mark (Kyle Allen) is definitely a morning person. He impresses both his dad and younger sis by tending to every item on his breakfast menu with the skill and grace of a six-handed juggler. En route to school, he guides his bike in the direction of the car with a coffee cup perched atop the driver's side window. He scoops! He sips! He scores with a perfectly-timed slam

dunk into a turning garbage truck. Mark is so good, his "Bless

you!" anticipates a sneeze by seconds. Has he seen *Groundhog Day*, or are these sites of interest on *The Map of Tiny Perfect Things* about to unfold before us? Yes to both!

The team of director Ian Samuels and writer Lev Grossman (adapting his short story for the screen) score points early on for referencing by name Harold Ramis' revered romantic comedy that finds Bill Murray forced to relive the same day. Ditto a mention of Tom Cruise in *Edge of Tomorrow.* (*Before I Fall, A Dog's Journey*, and, to a certain degree, *Remember* would also qualify, for those looking for a subject to binge

watch.) Such is Mark's fate: a life of "infinite do-overs" with no end in sight, until that day the beach ball is intercepted. Lonely Mark spends his mornings at a local swimming pool, where each day a runaway inflatable toy careens off Phoebe's (Anna Mikami) head, knocking her into the pool. Everything changes the moment Margaret (Kathryn Newton) interrupts the repetitiveness to lend a hand.

> Her amber aviators and frizzy blond hair flowing from beneath

a backward-turned baseball cap turn Mark's heart into an exploding bag of microwave popcorn. They are both geeky, but as Margaret so rightly points out, Mark is a flagrant exception to the rule: he's a nerd who sucks at math. Still, she takes special interest in Mark's drawing, the one that gives the film its title. It's a compendium of all those privileged moments that make up his day, where they took place, and when. Margaret brings her own brand of magic to the proceedings: her tiny perfect moment du *jour* is that split second the eagle swoops down on the pond and flies off with that night's dinner wriggling in its talons. She

confesses to feeling more of an affinity for the fish than the bird of prey, a moment that's brilliantly highlighted later on by the meticulously-timed arrival, in frame, of a moving van that traps her between outstretched wings. When Mark does at last summon the courage to move in for a kiss, Margaret responds with a flinch. Poor schmuck. The one day he's doomed to repeat and still he can't find a girl who wants to be more than friends. Mark familiarizes himself with every inch of the map — Margaret is convinced that one more perfect thing is all that's needed to get unstuck in time — but there's one moment so spectacular it warrants a few rewinds (and raised the question, "How many takes?"). Looking to gain after hours access to the school, Mark waits for the last person to leave for the day. I Googled "temporal anomaly definition" to find: "a disruption in the spacetime continuum which can take many forms and have many different effects." Kudos to Samuels and company for finding the perfect visual corollary: Mark looks on from behind a pole some 20 feet away from the door. Before it has a chance to slam shut, a well-rehearsed Mark lobs a water bottle that lands in the door jamb at the precise moment to prevent the automatic closer from doing its job. I wouldn't exactly call it movie magic, but it did take a certain persistence of vision



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on the part of the patient filmmakers to pull it off.

The ground covered is not exactly fresh, but what's a genre film if not new characters inhabiting familiar surroundings? The leads lend warmth and credibility to their quest to find a pattern to Mark's map. What they do eventually find may have less to do with being stalled and more to do with an unwillingness to confront change. And that's just one of the perfect things on display that make this film worth a look. ★★★ —Scott Marks

Mar — In their heyday, studios employed dozens of comics, screenwriters, and animators, whose job it was to take an active interest in cranking out absurdist comedy. Most of them did so without overstepping the characters they worked so hard to create. Television had long ago reached the point where crazy comedy existed only in the time it took for one commercial break to end and another to begin. In this case, all that's missing is a laugh track. Barb (Annie Mumolo) and Star (Mumolo's co-Bridesmaids scribe, Kristen Wiig) deserve an entire wing in the Hall of Guff named in their honor. There hasn't been a less mirthsome comic duo since Ferrell and Kattan tricked viewers into spending A Night at the Roxbury. Imagine Chip 'n Dale (or is it the Goofy Gophers?) being scooped into a blender filled with rainbow sherbet and set on low, and you'll have some idea what you're about to be dragged through. Even in the most absurdist terms, their whimsy makes no sense. The choreographed exchanges in which the stars carefully avoid stepping on each other might be tolerable if what they were saying made the remotest bit of sense. The majority of their dialogue flows up river like a non-sequitur stream of consciousness, fallacies of logic where replies bear no relevance whatsoever to the remarks that precede them. A negligible sci-fi subplot can be traced back to Austin Powers, with Wiig, as if proving to the world that she can stretch, takeing on the second role of Dr. Evil replica Sharon Gordon Fisherman a mad scientist whose plan is to release a swarm of killer mosquitoes on the titular resort $\stackrel{\infty}{=}$ town where Barb and Star vacation. The ending couldn't have come any sooner. Josh Greenbaum receives credit, when in truth, this thing directed

BABES IN ARMS (1939)

Babes in Arms was in many ways a film of great significance for all parties concerned: M-G-M's contract wunderkind Mickey Rooney and Judy Garland's first musical together kicked off a profitable series of four tune-filled vehicles directed by Busby Berkeley. The two star as the talented offspring of vaudeville artists — performers whose popularity is dying off faster than the once dominant variety show format. To help prop up his parent's financial situation — and prove to the world that the youth of America is just as capable of putting on a show as the former generation — Mickey brings together his schoolmates in the name of charity to turn a barn into a music hall gala. Gee willikers, kids! Do you think there'll be a big-shot producer in the crowd clamoring to take the show all the way to Broadway? Long before anamorphic filmmaking made Cinema-Scope a household name, Berkeley was working hard

at Warner Bros. using different optical apparatus to choreograph his musical numbers: gyroscopes and kaleidoscopes. And it was Berkeley's brilliant idea to position his camera on high and aim it directly down at the decorative human geometric designs into which he was wont to mold his chorines. Berkeley very much wanted to prove himself to be more than just a purveyor of novelty numbers in this,

his first entirely solo effort since making the leap from Warners to Metro. The intimate, comparatively low-key numbers — one set inside an apartment, another in the audience of a legitimate theatre — find Berkeley more than capable of working in confined spaces. Still, for all the subtlety, the most memorable production number in the piece is the titular tune, shot from overhead, as we follow our leads and Douglas McPhail (who at 25 is far too old to be playing an ingenue), marching as if en route to a Bund rally, toting burnable items though the backlot to build a giant bonfire. This was the maiden production of MGM's illustrious

Arthur Freed Unit, the studio detachment that went on to set one musical benchmark after another (*The Pirate*, *Singin' in the Rain, The Band Wagon*). Freed would later be more generous to his leading ladies, but in spite of their work together on *The Wizard of Oz* (Freed didn't receive credit), Judy always took a back seat to the multifaceted Mick. (It didn't help that she and Berkeley reportedly did not get

> along.) They appeared in ten films together; Judy received top billing once, on their debut pairing, *Thoroughbreds Don't Cry.* Author Charles Wolfe observed that Berkeley "seems more comfortable with the cocky, energetic Rooney, who plays an adolescent version

of Cagney's role in Footlight Parade, than with Garland." In this company, Judy becomes little more than a prop. When prolific songwriter Mickey needs someone to perform "Good Morning," Judy's there on cue. When Mickey needs a shoulder to cry on, it's Judy's ball-and-socket joint absorbing much of the moisture. The film's most understated highlight is June Preisser's Baby Rosalie, so much so that one rather wished that Mick would have slighted Judy in favor of her rival babe in arms. The once-popular child star whose career got stalled in puberty is a direct dig at Shirley Temple. If something can be both bland and tasty, this is it.

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police sort things out until wayward mother Shelly (Juno Temple) turned up. (Her Jean Kasem braid pulled tighter than a ship's anchor, Shelly conveniently disappears on a drugfueled bender for the first half of the picture.) But even the 12-year stretch in the pen that he just finished serving couldn't harden Palmer's heart to that degree. Sam is non-binary. For those not up to speed on current terms of respectfulness, one of the locals sums him up with, "There's something seriously wrong with that kid." Palmer goes directly from his cell to grandma Vivian's (June Squibb) house, where Sam and his mother live in the trailer out back. He spends his first night of freedom in Shelly's bed, which may contribute to his willingness to look after Sam when Vivian dies in her sleep. Director Fisher Stevens (*Stand Up Guys*) and novice screenwriter Cheryl Guerriero put their creative talents to best use when pointing out the finer details of an ex-con returning to life's daily rigor — like the moment when a con realizes he may once again leave his towel and toothbrush in the bathroom. Sam becomes so loyal to Palmer that he eagerly starts the day by bringing his new friend a morning beer. And it will be some time before I forget Sam's scornful reply of "Football?" when asked if he's ever attended a game. (Alas, Cuteness began to set in around the time Sam was forced to accompany Palmer on a visit to the parole officer.) All hell breaks loose when Shelly returns to find Palmer petitioning for custody of her child. Shelly moves like a rusty weathervane. You really can't blame the generally dependable Temple for the quality of her performance. She's only as awful as the script allows her to be. Palmer kidnaps Sam and the penny serenade he sings to the judge is effective, but nothing short of an overhaul could salvage the film's unrepentantly hackneyed final third. 2021 — S.M. \bigstar

The Queen of Black Magic -

Rather than a wedding, the departure point for this remake of Liliek Sudjio's same-named 1981 Indonesian cult horror item is a reunion of sorts at an orphanage. Mr. Bandi (Yayu A.W. Unru) will any day now breathe his last, and a trio of acquiescent repatriates are coming to pay their respects to the man who raised them. Haqi (Muzakki Ramdhan), the young son of former orphan Hanif (Ario Bayu) and wife Nadya (Hannah Al Rashid), bears the brunt of much of the film's introductory exposition: as a current resident tells him, 20 years ago Ms. Mirah (Ruth Marini) returned alone after an outing with orphan Murni (Putri Ayudya) and alleged that the young girl was abducted by a demon. Her rantings led to banishment behind the mysterious green door, currently situated just down the hall from the children's wing. Some say her ghost spent the ensuing decades locked in the room. As for Murni, she was never seen again. Not only does Haqi discover the door, the inquisitive tyke also finds, buried beneath a safe, a photo album containing a faded photo of — you guessed it — Mirah and Murni! In the original, Murni's main concern was to work her hoodoo only on those who participated in chucking her over a cliff. 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

OUTDOORS

Tree Heights can be easily measured this week if the sun shines at midday. On or near February 18, at or very near 12 noon, the sun as seen from San Diego County stands at an altitude of 45 degrees above the horizon. Under those conditions, the length of a shadow cast by a vertical tree trunk on a horizontal surface equals the height of the tree trunk. Even if you lack a measuring tape, you can still use your own feet to pace the distance heel-to-toe: the length of an average adult male's shoe sole, for example, is very close to one foot.

Ceanothus, or wild lilac, begins its annual blooming cycle this month — at least in the warmer coastal areas. Assuming sufficient rainfall arrives, by sometime in

March virtually every chaparralcovered canvon and hillside on the coastal strip may exhibit blue or white-flowering specimens. The peak of the ceanothus bloom will work its way eastward, reaching Ramona and Alpine by March or April, and the Palomar, Cuyamaca, and Laguna mountains by April or May. Ceanothus growth was rampant in Cuvamaca Rancho State Park, where the devastating 2003 Cedar wildfire incinerated nearly all of the trees, and opened up opportunities for post-fire, pioneering vegetation such as the ceanothus species.

Very Low Tides this week coincide with optimum times of day for tidepooling: Thursday, February 18 at 6:38 p.m. (-2.13 feet); Friday at 7:07 p.m. (-2.59 feet); Saturday at 9:39 p.m. (-2.89 feet). Very high tides will also occur within that string of days, Thursday at 1:08 a.m. (+4.53 feet); Friday at 2:02 a.m. (+4.64 feet); and Saturday at 3:19 a.m. (+4.53 feet).

Have you ever seen Canopus, the second-brightest star after Sirius? In one of the interesting coincidences known to devoted skywatchers, Canopus lies almost due south of Sirius: by 36°. That's far enough south that it never appears above your horizon unless you're below latitude 37° N (southern Virginia, southern Missouri, central California). And there, you'll need a very flat south horizon. Canopus crosses the south point on the horizon just 21 minutes before Sirius does. When to look? Canopus is due south when Beta Canis Majoris — Murzim the Announcer, the star about three finger-widths to the right of Sirius — is at its highest due south over your landscape. That's probably sometime between 8 and 9 p.m. now, depending on how far east or west you live in your time zone. Look straight down from Murzim then.

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The Way the World Works

- The Staten Island Zoo is weathering a storm of controversy over the prediction made by its resident groundhog, Staten Is-land Chuck, on Feb. 2 – an annual event at the zoo. Chuck popped up on a Facebook "livestream" at the designated hour, on the designated day, but something seemed ... off. After hours of accumulating snow in the New York area, the New York Post reported, Chuck was seen to emerge into bright sunlight with no snow on the ground, his handlers wearing sweatshirts. "So there ya have it, folks, we're gonna have an early spring," announced zoo executive director Ken Mitchell. Viewers weren't fooled, one commenting, "Welppp this isn't live." Pre-vious Groundhog Day celebrations at the zoo have also raised a ruckus. In 2014, a stand-in groundhog named Charlotte died after being dropped by Mayor Bill de Bla-sio, and in 2009 Chuck bit Mayor Mike Bloomberg's finger.

Least Competent Criminals

- Edner Flores, 34, entered a PNC Bank branch in Chicago's Humboldt Park neighborhood on Jan. 27 and allegedly tried to rob it by handing a teller a note stating that he wanted \$10,000, with "no die (sic) packs," and that he was armed, according to a federal criminal complaint. The teller activated a silent alarm and the man to fill out a blue withdrawal slip, which he did, then asked for his ATM card. The helpful Flores instead produced a temporary Illinois state ID card, authorities said. WMAQ- TV reported police arrived while Flores was still at the window, arrested him and found a knife in his jacket, according to a police report.

Oh, That Old Thing?

- Italian police arrested an unnamed 36-year-old in Naples on Jan. 16 on suspicion of receiving stolen goods and found a 500-year-old copy of Leonardo da Vinci's Salvatore Mundi, a painting they returned to the museum it belonged to, surprising museum officials, who had no idea it had been missing. The painting is part of the Doma Museum collection at the San Domenico Maggiore church in Naples, where the room it had hung in "has not been open for three months," Naples prosecutor Giovanni Melillo told *The Guardian*. The copy was made by Giacomo Alibrandi in the early 1500s; da Vinci's original painting sold in 2017 for a record-breaking \$450 million at auction and hasn't been seen in public since.

Misinformed

- Authorities in Essex County, England, received a tip on Jan. 16 and arrived at the Freemasons' Saxon Hall expecting to put an end to the illegal "rave" reported to be happening there, but instead of loud music and wild teenagers, officers found old people lining up to get their COVID-19 vaccines, *Echo News* reported. "Grumpy old men and grumpy old women were in abundance," confirmed Dennis Baum, chairman of the hall, with "wheelchairs, Zimmer frames and walking sticks." Baum said things got testy when the vaccine was late arriving: "It was absolute chaos ... The car park became chock a block with 80-year-old-plus drivers." Police remained to offer their assistance with the traffic.

Government in Action

- Watertown, Massachusetts, recently installed new parking meters with updated technology to make payment easier, but the city is instead fielding complaints from residents who say the meters are too tall to use. "I'm 5'7," and I have to do a little tiptoe reach," Marianne lagco told WBZ-TV, which reported Feb. 2 that the meters measure about 5 feet, 6 inches high. Assistant Town Manager Steve Magoon said public works employees will be lowering the meters to 48 inches in the weeks to come. "It's actually sort of refreshing to have a problem of slightly shorter stature than unemployment, COVID-19, no food and no money," commented optimistic resident Ken Pershing.

Mistaken Identity

A woman in Cajeme, Mexico, identified only as Leonora R., faces charges of domestic violence after repeatedly stabbing her husband when she found photos of him having sex with a younger, thinner woman on his phone, according to police. Local media reported the husband was eventually able to disarm his wife and clarify that it was HER in the photos, which were taken when they were dating. The New York Daily News reported on Jan. 26 that police responding to neighbors' calls for help arrived and arrested her.

Recent Alarming Headlines

- Police in Rome, New York, responding to an animal cruelty complaint on Jan. 13, arrived at a home to find a man cooking a canine on an outdoor grill, police said. The unnamed man cooperated with police, saying the animal was a coyote – which would be legal in New York, as hunting and trapping the canines is allowed with a license, WNBC-TV reported. Animal control officers took the carcass to Cornell University for testing to determine its species.

Oops

- The Monroe Township (Michigan) Fire Department launched a rescue mission on Jan. 26 after receiving a call about a goose or duck possibly injured and in distress on the frozen River Raisin. Firefighters suited up and headed out on the ice, WXYZ-TV reported, but realized upon closer inspection that the bird was just a hunting decoy. "It ended up being a good training session, actually," said Chief Mark Cherney. "In the end, we can sleep well at night. A bird is not suffering."

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
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
