

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

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

Thwarting the thieves

Bike owners declare: no Morely

On June 30, a local woman reached out to the 1700-plus members of the Stolen Bike San Diego Facebook forum. "My Jamis City bike was stolen from my garage in Hillcrest last night along with my husband's bike. I drove around this morning and found the culprits, but unfortunately, I was alone so could not approach the group." She uploaded a photo of her aqua bike before it was stolen. The other image she posted depicted three individuals on the lawn of the Newbreak Church at the corner of Normal Street and Harvey Milk Street, a block north of University Avenue. One person in the photograph appeared to



be a six-foot-tall man wearing a black shirt, a black baseball cap, a black backpack, a dark pair of distressed pants, and grey sneakers, pushing a bike towards Normal Street. The other person stood closer to a different bike that lay on the grass by the church's wroughtiron fence.

"The culture/belief of 'It's okay to steal' comes from the pits of hell," commented Ivan.

"They were already taking his [bike] apart to disguise it," the victim explained.

Later that day, she posted an update. "I

walked by the Morley Field [by] Balboa Park and saw the same guy as this morning riding it. So I ran over and pushed him off. I don't know what came over me as I was still alone, but I wasn't letting him get away. I pleaded with him to give it back as it was special to me, but he was not aggressive. He said he bought it, but I don't believe [it]. They all had nice bikes in the group. But anyway, I thanked him for doing the right thing by giving it back." The victim added that she was

because the crankcases don't necessarily match, and they have to walk them." Herrera said that on his birthday, thieves broke into his North Park property through the fence, clipped the cables protecting two bicycles, a bike trailer, and a bike seat, and took off with the whole lot. "There's no lock that can withstand a three-foot bolt cutter that goes through an inch of steel." Two of Herrera's other bikes had been snatched from a sunroom soon after he moved in. The crimes

shaking during the confrontation and posted an accompanying video of her recovered bike. The basket on the bike's handlebars still appeared intact.

"I was shaking, too," commented an Ocean Beach cyclist. "I was just as scared getting my bike back in a similar way. [I] called 911; they said [to] call non-emergency. Waited a few minutes, and I just approached him in an aggressive way. He did not fight back and said he also just bought it."

"Wow!!" added Joseph Herrera "Great story but glad you are safe and got your bike back!" Herrera was my North Park neighbor when I lived off University Avenue. On July 4, he told me, "I've seen that before with other people, where the [bike theft victims] go do that. Morley Field is a chop shop. It's a location where they gather to modify and sell the bikes that they have stolen from the North Park and Hillcrest neighborhoods." Herrera and others on the stolen bike forum snap photos of groups of individuals breaking down bicycles in areas around the county, then post the images online. "They like to take the rims off of the bicycles first to conceal the bike's identity; then the seat post has been modified and so forth. They sometimes can't ride them led him to put up security cameras and to start patrolling his neighborhood streets. "I walked around and asked people, 'What's your business here? You're casing houses. I've seen you, and you're not welcome here.' If they approach me in an aggressive manner, I will defend myself, and that's when I realized that is what's going to take to get these people to go. So I cleaned up my neighborhood."

Continued Herrera, "Citizens have to take it upon themselves to fight back for their property. Morley is Central Division's responsibility, even though the bikes are stolen out of mid-city. That is where the biggest disconnect with the police is. So we started complaining. Then they transfer the call to dispatch, and they take the call with a non-emergency tone, saying, 'Okay, it's a bicycle.' They are probably not cyclists and probably have never seen a \$13,000-\$15,000 mountain bike or road bike. On a rare occasion, you get a dispatch that asks you if you see your bicycle, and then when they send someone, their response is good — but the rest of the time, it's terrible."

Many cyclists on the Stolen Bike San Diego forum advise other cyclists to register their bikes on *BikeIndex.org*. The bike registry seeks to give "everyone the ability to register and recover bicycles," and claims it is "the

most widely used and successful bicycle registration service in the world, with over 286,000 cataloged bikes, 850 community partners, and tens of thousands of daily searches. It's a database used and searched by individuals, bike shops, police departments, and other apps." As of July 5, nine bikes had been stolen in San Diego County and then reported on BikeIndex.org since the month started. Three of the owners had recovered their bicycles. But Lily Williams from BikeIndex.org warns bike theft victims that "whoever has your bike might not know it's stolen" in a blog post titled "Bike safety tips for recovering your own bicycle." The post continued, "If someone has or lists your bike and you want to confront them, remember that they could truly think they got a screaming good deal on a sale. Your bike could have also been stolen, abandoned, picked up, abandoned again. It goes on and on. Your bike's journey once it leaves your possession might not make much sense, but it's not on you to accuse someone of bike theft. Even if you have concrete evidence that your bike's thief is a serial offender and will strike again if you don't do something, your local law enforcement might not be able to help. They'll be even less inclined to assist if you haven't filed a police report on the theft to begin with."

At Whitson's endScripps to scrap solar structure

A modernist tower built with San Diego's sunny climate in mind finds itself threatened by modern medicine: its owner, Scripps Health, wants to replace it "in accordance with leading hospital standards." The Whitson medical building, situated at the intersection of Washington Street and Fifth Avenue, features a functional passive solar design that gives it a distinctive, sunlight-and-shadow facade. The Whitson's aluminum "tracery," which changes along with the movement of the sun throughout the day, was characteristic of its designer, William S. Lewis, Jr. (Deems Martin and Associates). Built in 1964, the tower is something of a landmark for the neighborhood; but to the hospital, it's an outdated shell.

In February, in response to a proposal to refurbish or demolish the eight-story building, the San Diego Historical Resources Board found it worthy of historic designation as a unique local example of formalism. That rendered the building shovel-proof, but not for long. Scripps filed an appeal, claiming factual errors, violation of bylaws or hearing procedures by the board, and new information. And two weeks ago, the city council overturned the designation, disappointing those who consider the building an icon of the commercial corridor. "This paves the way for the owner to demolish this well-known landmark," said the Save Our Heritage Organization on its website.

Savvy Sara sells scores of shares

Controversial Covid crusaders AstraZeneca and Gilead among the dumped

As the stock market reaches near-record highs, wealthy House Democrat Sara Jacobs of San Diego has unloaded a raft of personal shareholdings — some potentially controversial — per a May 28 Periodic Transaction Report filed with the Clerk of the House. The transactions came on April 9, the report says. The young congresswoman, an heiress to the Jacobs family fortune created by her grandfather Irwin's Qualcomm cell phone chip success, disclosed 41 separate sales transactions, all but three of which yielded capital gains of greater than \$200, the disclosure threshold required by law. Her

lone asset purchase, according to the document, was an investment valued between \$100,001 to \$250,000 in a security by the name of "San Diego County Regional Transportation Sub Ltd BDS B 5.0 % Due 4/01/2045."

Among the Jacobs holdings sold were interests valued between \$50,001 and \$100,000 in computer and cell phone chip-

maker Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Company, Ltd., cell phone giant Verizon Communications, cell phone infrastructure provider SBA Communications Corporation, and healthcare insurance behemoth Anthem, Inc.

Jacobs's collection of sold-off interests valued between \$15,001 and \$50,000 included those in coffee concern Starbucks, Inc., medical tech maker Stryker Cor-

poration, and merger-seeking Connecticutbased power utility Avangrid. Avangrid,
seeking to combine with New Mexico power giant PNM, has run into

Faulconer's China connec-

tion Some well-heeled members of the made-in-China clothing crowd are coming out for Republican ex-San Diego mayor Kevin Faulconer's bid to become governor. Among them is Gerard Guez, chairman of the board at Sunrise Brands of Vernon, who kicked in \$5000 for Faulconer's 2021 campaign committee on June 28. "Sunrise Brands has leveraged three decades of uncontested denim preeminence into becoming the most dynamic

diversified apparel company in the United States," says the company's website. "Today, while Sunrise Brands remains a denim powerhouse, our product mix includes casual bottoms, knits, sweaters, sportswear, outerwear, bags and other lifestyle accessories." According to an online Dun and Bradstreet profile, "Its products are made by third parties, primarily in China." According to a June 12 account by the *Miami*



back home in San Diego, Morgan Dene Oliver, a developer pal of the mayor, gave \$7500 on June 25 to Faulconer's 2022 election committee. Oliver's behind-the-scenes lobbying of the mayor on behalf of the ultimately failed Soccer City development in Mission Valley featured intimate office lunches and a lavish bayside wedding venue in August 2015 for mayoral chief of staff Stephen Puetz.

Down in Mission Bay As the city's Mission Bay Park struggles to re-emerge in the wake of the Covid-19 pandemic, some self-inflicted harm to the well-being of the lucrative hotel and tourist magnet is getting called out in a June 29 performance review done by the city auditor's office. "The Real Estate Assets Department is not properly staffed." according to a report summary. "They lost a key employee that manages the Mission Bay Leases in March

of 2020. This position was cut from the budget in FY2021. On-site visits have not been completed this past year due to this as well as due to COVID-19." The document adds that "because of Assembly Bill 1486, which was signed into law in October 2019, there is now a requirement based on this Assembly Bill that all lease renewals be brought forward for State review. This adds additional responsibilities to the management of the Mission Bay leases." Regular oversight is needed, says the


audit, "to ensure compliance with lease terms and to ensure the property is being properly maintained." Making matters worse, the audit team discovered that an unnamed member of the Mission Bay Committee/Mission Bay Improvement Fund Oversight Committee "is currently serving beyond eight consecutive years in violation of the language in the [Municipal Code]."

Road trip taxation Pushing a mammoth \$160-billion public transportation plan, to be paid for in part by \$34 billion gleaned from a so-called road charge on drivers through 2050, the San Diego Association of Governments spent more than \$150,000 on lobbying fees during the year's first quarter. The funds went to the Sacramento influence-peddling firm of Ellison Wilson Advocacy, LLC, run by **Brooks Ellison**. Since the beginning of the current legislative session, the company has received \$308,793 of the San Diego agency's cash, according to an April 26 disclosure report. "Brooks is the managing partner of Ellison Wilson Advocacy and was admitted

into the California Bar in 1986. He began his lobbying career in 1986 with Former Senator **Bob Wilson**," notes the lobbyist's website. Wilson was the only Democrat among three San Diego pols, including Republican mayor **Pete Wilson** and GOP House member **Bob Wilson**, to bear the same last name. The happenstance was widely believed to have boosted his showing among unknowing Republican voters.

ADVICE YOU DIDN'T KNOW YOU NEEDED ASK A HIPSTER

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
Dear Hipster:



The bandshell was never scheduled for demolition. The city tried to give the land to a sleazy developer named Doug Manchester. The Coastal Commission killed the deal after a pair of "vocal" housewives started a grass roots effort to save the public beach.

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The demolition "would result in the loss of one of San Diego's most important and influential post-WWII buildings." Another supporter told the council that as the pandemic recedes, holding on to history "is more important than

ever before."

Scripps Mercy argued it was one of the state's hardest hit hospitals during the pandemic, and to carry on, "the existing hospital requires full replacement and modernization." (The tower was the biggest single element in a larger building plan announced by Scripps in 2017.) The historical designation, said Scripps, "obstructs our ability to create a new landmark medical facility" at the site, though the hospital granted that some buildings on its campus "truly warrant historical designations" and "are an important part of our legacy." Currently, the northern portion preserves the original chapel, nursing student housing, and nursing education building. Scripps has invested in restoring these buildings for use as AIDS housing and health care support. But it argued the southern part of their campus, where the tower stands, is the focus of new development and innovation and "does not host any historic buildings."

Adjacent to the building that many begged the council to protect, Scripps is completing construction of the new Scripps Prebys/MD Anderson Cancer Center, "expanding worldclass cancer care to Hillcrest and surrounding communities." The center "will complement the future Scripps Mercy hospital where the 550 Washington Street building is currently situated." To continue serving San Diego into the future, "Scripps must evolve with new technologies and best medical practices in state-of-the-art facilities, including on the Scripps Mercy campus."

The board granted the appeal based on factual errors - nothing could be found in the record to support a claim by Save Our Heritage that the building was nationally awarded and recognized. They disagreed with the other claims, saying the new infor-

> mation that had been presented to the board — which involved a 1964 San Diego Magazine article and a transcript from a conversation between seven local architects — was insignificant. The board pointed out that their motion to designate under Criterion A - finding the building a unique example of San Diego's architectural development - focused on the tower and excluded the modified ground floor, which Scripps said had caused the building to lose its historic core. In comments to the city, Alan Hess, an architect and architectural historian who serves as Commissioner on the California State Historical Resources Commission, said - speaking independently of the Commission - that it's crucial to recognize what the

alterations did not alter. "The tower's seven floors remain true to its original aesthetic, compared with one ground level floor which has been altered. Seven to one."

Fair first for fun County celebrates while state hesitates

"Better than I expected. I'm very pleased," said Terrill, proprietor of the High Seas Hawaiian Shirt booth located inside Bing Crosby Hall at the Covid-abbreviated San Diego County Fair. He thought most of the other booth operators would agree. Terrill pointed out that no organization wanted to be the first to hold a big public event in California. "They" — the Fair officials — "took a chance."

It was April when Governor Newsom indicated that he might be dropping his emergency color-tier restrictions by summer. In response, the Fair's board of directors, unlike other major fairs and festivals around the state, decided to put together an abbreviated fair for this year. Using the theme of Homegrown Fun, the Fair opened on June 11, four days before the governor's final elimination of most Covid restrictions. "Remember," said Terrill, "this [large public gathering] was illegal for the first few days."

Other counties chose not to take the chance. The Los Angeles County Fair - one of the largest in North America, but one situated in one of the hardest hit areas for Covid infections — pushed their event to May 2022. The Sacramento Fair, the official state fair of California, pushed theirs to July of that year. The counties of Contra Costa, Kern, Merced, San Joaquin, and Ventura canceled their 2021 fairs for this summer and fall. Alameda, El Dorado, San Bernardino, and Sierra counties all "post-

The Jack Straws Band has been the welcoming house band at the Fair since 1982. This year, they were relegated to the lush paddock area, where tribute bands usually play to hundreds. "Its great to see the smiles on peoples' faces again, "said band member Jeff Williams, who had to convince Fair officials to hire the band, as the original plan was for no live music. The

poned' or "rescheduled" their fair dates, with no new dates announced, while Marin and Solano counties will hold "virtual" fairs. Santa Clara County will be the only California county to try another "drive-through" fair, a format which was little attended when it was tried last year at the Del Mar Fairgrounds. After hearing of the San Diego County Fair board's decision, the Orange County Fair announced an abbreviated fair with their regular summer dates, starting on July 15.

The San Diego County Fair offered little in the way of regular fairgoers' attractions. There were no flowers, agricultural displays, or farm animals. There was no infield Kiddie Land or fair-theme exhibit building. Also, no concerts. Carnival rides and games were greatly reduced. But if attendees were disappointed, you'd never know it from the backed-up line at the ride ticket booth on the Fair's final weekend, July 3 and 4. Hundreds of families and teens waited, eager to board the kid's carousel, big Ferris wheel, and a few adrenalin-pumping rides. And as the day wore on, the exhibit halls started to fill up as well — but not too much. Visitors enjoyed crowds that were less dense and entry ticket prices that were less steep: just \$10 for adults, down from \$20 in 2019. And paddock provided sit-down tables with shade and adult beverages; Williams said he liked the casual atmosphere, as compared to playing at the front gate.

Fair Fun Facts: San Diego County has 43 coffee bean farms. Who knew? The popular Swifty Swine Pig Races, normally held in the Ag Show area, took place right beside the food booth Midway, just behind the pulled pork sandwich booth. And even with a pocket full of quarters, sore-footed souls could not get automated relief: the famous 25-cent Foostie Wootsie machines were nowhere to be found.

"With help of drone patrolling, we have confirmed, as well, the sale and consumption of drugs and other illegal activity — in federal areas where we have no jurisdiction to take action," Camarena added. Tijuana's mayor, Karla Ruiz, noted that despite migrants having spoken with authorities about sexual abuses within the camp, the migrants have no will to file any criminal complaints due to fear or other situations. "When we take them to the prosecutor's office, they don't want to start the procedure, so that limits us. If there's no complaint we can't take any action."

Two weeks ago, tensions between groups of Central Americans and Haitians reached their peak when, according to the Haitians, 150 Hondurans broke into their tents. "Saturday night they beat us with sticks – even women – ripped our tents, and told us that all black people will have to leave the camp," said a Hai-

encourage chaos in the camp. There's just 10 of them living here, and the rest live downtown; they all pay rents there."

ing desert parcels, talking up mineral rights and the possibility of oil.

By the 1960s, when the Anza-Borrego Foundation began its work, those private holdings remained largely unoccupied, and presented a challenge for the state park system. The foundation was formed at the behest of the California State Park Commission to fill in the gaps. The current 17,597-acre transfer represents 29 years of acquisitions, a combination of 331 separate parcels donated or paid for with foundation funds and grants. The largest single parcel was 690 acres; the smallest was a 3-foot by 402-foot former mining claim.

One highlight of the new additions: a portion of Lucky 5 Ranch that expands the connection between

Cuyamaca Rancho State Park and Anza-Borrego, forming a continuous link from coastal mountain habitat to desert for wild-life such as mountain lions, bobcats, gray foxes, and golden eagles to roam. 

Anza expands

State park swallows stakes

At over 640,000 acres, Anza-Borrego Desert State Park in eastern San Diego County is the largest state park in the contiguous 48 states. And as of July 29, its domain, which stretches beyond the northern reaches of the county to within one mile of the international border, will grow by 17,597 acres. When the park was officially created in 1933, it encompassed a checkerboard of private lands (about 68,000 acres) mixed in with park holdings. That was because planning for the park's creation was going on simultaneously with the development of the town of Borrego Springs during the 1920s. Speculators were dividing and sell-

6000 acres in Coyote Canyon, watershed of the whole Borrego Valley, and 3500 acres of Borrego Badlands, current home of the Flat Tail Horned Lizard and previous home of dinosaurs. Anza-Borrego is the only state park to have a full-time paleontologist on staff, and fossils found in the park include prehistoric camels, woolly mammoths, and "terror birds." A beak found in the Badlands in the 1960s was classified as that of Titanis, a six-foot-tall flightless bird that lived from 2 to 62 million years ago.

In her quest to add "pieces to the puzzle," Anza Borrego Foundation land program manager Julie Gerson communicated with landowners scattered all over the country. She had a list of about 350 names to whom she

Crown Manor, the palatial 24,000-square-foot mansion at 1015 Ocean Boulevard in Coronado, is billed in its Zillow listing as "the most iconic estate in Southern California." Originally built in 1902, the home was designed by Irving Gill and William S. Hebbard, two of early San Diego's most influential architects. They worked in partnership from 1896 through 1907 on some of the city's most notable private residences, including the Marston House at the edge of Balboa Park.



Bill Clinton ate here.

Having received various additions over the years, Crown Manor currently counts 12 bedrooms, nine full baths, and another seven half-baths among

its more than 40 rooms.

Built in a Tudor Revival style, the Manor stands out from the Queen Anne Victorians popular at the time (such as The Culver House, another historic home we recently visited up in Carlsbad). Over the years, it's played host to a variety of guests, ranging from the entire Indonesian national swim team to President Bill Clinton — a guest in the 1990s of then-owner and Democratic political booster Larry Lawrence.

We're eager to get inside, but first let's pause a moment to admire the "gabled red brick exterior surrounded by a fortified, gated garden" that at one point was reported to be home to more than 130 species of flora. There's a massive semi-circle driveway guarded by two gates facing Ocean Boulevard, but garage access is around back, off Loma Avenue.

The formal entry is draped in wallpaper that we'll assume is period-specific, and the rich wood paneling that runs along the bottom of the walls and frames the doorways thankfully hasn't been painted over. We also get a hint of the listing's promise of an "enchanting

home filled with elegance and history," including "marbled floors [and] jeweled chandeliers," both of which immediately make an appearance.

The living room has even more of the polished wood paneling, plus a marble fireplace, but it's a shame that the front wall mostly blocks our ocean view from the first floor. We'll overlook that and instead focus on the gold leaf ceiling, which was painstakingly installed by hand in four- to five-inch sections. A formal dining room offers seating for up to 20 guests, while an adjacent smaller dining area works for family breakfasts or the kids' table during holiday gatherings.

We also see the formal ballroom with grand piano and a separate billiards hall before coming

The Smoking Gun 555 Market Street Downtown



On a bustling corner of the Gaslamp Quarter, I'm chat- well with it. And it did blend really well with the nutmeg and everything ting with The Smoking Gun's bartender Alex Ramos, who tells me to give the Smith 'n Wesson a shot. The name, she says, "goes back to, historically, what this building was before it turned into bars — it was a shooting range. That's where 'The Smoking Gun' came in, in a lot of how we do things. A throwback on the original building."

The Smith 'n Wesson was also part of the original drink menu when the bar first opened. "We brought it back for a reason! Because it was so good, and we wanted to get back to where we started, with our roots."


The cocktail offers a unique blend of coffee liqueur and spiced rum, "with a Coke whip that layers on top. And then we grate the fresh nutmeg on top for just a little spice, a little drizzle of color to it," says Ramos. Leveraging a surplus of soda syrup, the whipped topping adds a special element to an otherwise understated cocktail. "We just wanted to have else. It seemed to have a great flavor profile."

To make that tasty Coca-Colaflavored whip, the bartenders "take equal parts of the Coke syrup and heavy cream, and we just whip it until it's ready," she explains. "It kind of has a thick layer, similar to the consistency of Bailey's, where it kind of lays on top."

Ramos doesn't consider it a dessertonly cocktail, but grants, "It tends to be something people enjoy after dinner. It does have a little sweetness to it, it's a little bit creamy, a little bit heavier — but still light and refreshing in a sense."

In Ramos's experience, anyone who tries the drink becomes a fan. "The coffee liqueur is a good balance for the spiced rum. It's just something really new to [guests]... an interesting combination that isn't commonly seen. So once we tell people about it, they're willing to try it, and they absolutely love it."

to the kitchen — or, more appropriately, kitchen complex. First, there's a wine tasting area that's been redone with tons of stainless steel and solid white quartz. It's much more modern-looking than anything we've encountered so far, probably part of a reported 24-month renovation that was recently completed "to revitalize the infrastructure while preserving the architectural heritage of the property" while "technological innovations affording the most affluent of amenities were seamlessly integrated."

bedroom's "spa/bath" suite that, while exuding the style of a 1990s Las Vegas Strip penthouse, is still somehow nice, with a full wall of book-matched pink marble by the tub. Moving on, there's a full salon on site, with multiple beauty chairs and a massage room; another bedroom where the walls for some reason are entirely covered

Next we see the "butler's pantry," with more original-looking glassdoored cabinetry and a butcher block prep station along with a nice touch for the help: an ornate chandelier. From there, it's off to the "industrial style" kitchen, which looks more like the back of house at a medium-sized restaurant and can reportedly pump out food for 100 or more guests at a time.

Passing through the rest of the house, we first encounter a bath that's fully tiled in red except for the claw-foot tub that looks like it could be original, a stark contrast to the multi-room main

in mirrored glass; and a Prohibition-style "speakeasy" outfitted with bar and snug seating and lots more wood.

As part of the interior renovations, an elevator was installed, as was a "Savant Whole House Smart home" technology system, commercial smoke and fire alarm systems, security cameras, and "some of the most recent technological advancements in air and water purification of any residential setting in the world."

A private gym with sauna and indoor spa round things out inside, while the outside yard features a saltwater pool and spa, offering perhaps more privacy but much less space than the giant saltwater ocean sitting right across the street.

Crown Manor has passed through many hands over the years, including a period in the early 1970s when it was owned by noted former Navy SEAL and local favorite McP's bar owner Greg McPartlin. Public records show ownership currently lies with Christopher Bower, founder and CEO of the private equity fund Pacific Corporate Group. Until last year Bower, in partnership with the Hilton hotel group (which manages the nearby Hotel Del Coronado), was attempting to turn Crown Manor into a public event space, which would host corporate retreats and overnight guests, much as a hotel would. That may help to explain the commercial nature of some of the upgrades described in the listing. Unfortunately for him, the Coronado Planning Commission denied the request in the summer of 2020.

Shortly after the permit denial, a listing seeking \$25 million for Crown Manor (dating to 2018) expired in September 2020. After several months off-market, the Manor was re-listed in mid-May; its asking price of \$34 million remains unchanged to date. ■

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Ian Anderson's favorite food finds

Most restaurants count on location, location, location to help make a name for themselves. Others make do with whatever space they've got. The restaurants featured here don't necessarily operate in conventional storefronts, on restaurant rows, or within popular dining neighborhoods. Some of the people behind these businesses chose their location out of convenience, or due to a unique vision. But most are chasing dreams on limited resources. What

they all have in common is that they offer something tasty, and in most cases interesting, to San Diego's food landscape — often with an equally interesting story to back it up.

FRIED CHICKEN IN A DONUT SHOP

Ali's Chicken & Waffles

4350 University Avenue
CITY HEIGHTS

To find City Heights' favorite new chicken and waffles spot, look for

the Donut Star. Ali's Chicken & Waffles leases the back counter of the donut shop, serving a halal rendition of the famous pairing alongside shrimp and grits and fried chicken sandwiches. It's a unique setup, and owner Genemo Ali took a unique path to get here. The Ethiopia-born entrepreneur recalls the impression waffles made on him as a young immigrant first arriving in a San Diego school. By the time he earned a business

degree from San Diego State, he and a friend wanted to launch the Ali's Chicken brand, in the mode of L.A.'s famed Roscoe's Chicken & Waffles. But he would have to start with a smaller investment. In 2018, he bought a farmers market stand established by a local Thai chef, and wound up entering the restaurant game making Thai food. Then he had to move his Coconut & Co. operation inside when covid closed the farmers markets. Work-

ing out of the Minnehaha Food Market up the street, he found he was doing most of his business through delivery apps. So he tried reviving the Ali's Chicken and Waffles idea as a ghost kitchen, and before long, it was outselling the Thai. His chicken



Traditionally, mall food courts have been more closely associated with corn dogs and orange chicken than plant-based cuisine. But a funny thing happened at the Grossmont Center food court during the pandemic: three new vegan eateries sprang up. And if Vanessa Corrales has anything to say about it, they won't be the last. The founder of Split Bakery has been a tenant at the mall for three years: her plant-based business sits just outside the food court's doors. That put her in prime position to notice when three businesses vacated their food court counters last year. Sensing an opportunity, the vegan entrepreneur leased all three counters herself, then turned around and sublet them to vegan entrepreneurs in her network. Now mall visitors will find a pair of farmers market fixtures operating permanent locations side by side: Veg'n Out serves vegan burgers, brats, and wings; while El Veganito offers plant-based Mexican food, including

tacos, burritos, and specials ranging from pozole to mole. Directly across the court, new property Mariscos No Mar concocts vegan ceviches and aguachiles, replacing seafood with jackfruit, mushrooms, young coconut, and vegan shrimp

made from the starchy konjac root. And while Split itself had been operating as a wholesaleonly bakery prior to the pandemic, Corrales pivoted a few months back and began making retail pastries available from her food court-adjacent window counter. That's four vegan food options for Grossmont, and counting — Corrales will be standing in the front in line should any of the other counters become available, and hopes to lure other plant-based businesses

Originally, Deborah Berry opened her cookie bakery across the street from her husband's business. But a couple years back, the couple decided to consolidate, and the print shop made room for Deb's. It's easy to spot which side of the counter sells cookies: a vibrant checkerboard motif frames a glass counter filled with large, crumbly cookies ranging from snickerdoodles to almond coconut chocolate chips (\$3 each, or two for \$5). Deb's got a few non-cookie winners up her sleeve as well, including buttercream cupcakes (\$3), fudge brownies (\$3), and on Fridays only, monkey bread (\$5).

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
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BBQ JOINT IN A LIQUOR STORE Pete's Smoked BBQ

Up the hill in Ramona, where highway 78 makes a hard right turn to become Main Street, passersby may notice there's a smoker hard at work outside of Ramona Liquor. That's because there's a BBQ counter in the back of the liquor



store, and it's there only partly by accident. Store owner Peter Aboudi has worked primarily in liquor stores and beer distribution since coming to San Diego as a refugee from America's first Iraq war. He hadn't intended to open a restaurant, but after they bought the shop formerly known as Ramona Old Time Country Store, Aboudi and his wife Susan realized it offered considerably more space than a liquor store needed. So they decided to turn it into a food counter. Initially, they hired people to establish a taco shop. Several other concepts followed, but nothing stuck until Aboudi invested in a smoker and started cooking up brisket, tri tip, pulled pork, and ribs. Six years later, the Aboudis are scouting locations to open a standalone Pete's BBQ restaurant, probably in a more conventional location.

HOT DOGS IN A HOME DEPOT **PARKING LOT**

Duff's Doggz

12047 Carmel Mountain Road CARMEL MOUNTAIN RANCH Forget about getting Swedish meatballs at Ikea: this hot dog kiosk in a Home Depot parking lot is the place to get your snack on when you're out shopping for the home. Chicago favorite Vienna Beef hot dogs provide the heart of the menu, and the "Chicago style dogg" — with mustard, relish, onions, tomatoes, sport peppers, a dash of celery salt and a pickle spear - shouldn't be missed. However, the stand's namesake owner, Hatch Duffy, has built a deep menu, featuring a litany of toppings.

You may opt for the relatively simple Coney Island style, with mustard, onions, and chili. Or you can try one of Duff's more exotic hot dog creations, featuring the likes of pastrami, jalapeño relish, pineapple salsa, or crushed Fritos. But the smallbusines s-owner-in-a box-store-parking-lot really throws a culinary curveball when his menu explores a decidedly different bunbased cuisine: Maine lobster rolls.

Fast forward a couple of years, and he's built Hannegan's House, brewing true-to-style Irish ales and serving them in pub-inspired taproom, along with pints of ice cream flavored by the beers themselves. Think mint chocolate stout ice cream, or chipotle and strawberries ice cream made with red ale. It's good enough that you'll be forced to wonder: does he add the beer to his ice cream just

ground level. Izola first caught my attention by using a basket and pulley system to lower baked goods to customers waiting on the sidewalk below, but these days, I'd recommend going upstairs and eating a hot croissant while admiring Brown's stunning studio space, built within "a converted turn-of-thecentury sewing factory."

BEER. SAUSAGE. AND BURGERS ON A FISHING PIER

Fathom Bistro, Bait, and Tackle

SHELTER ISLAND Dennis Borlek was five years old when his father taught him how to fish on the Shelter Island Pier. That charming bit of history may help explain why diners will find burgers and sausages at the pier's bait shop today. A former bartender, Borlek was looking to lease his own, traditional restaurant space nine years ago when, while walking his dog, he noticed the bait shop had closed. Then he learned the Port Authority was looking for a new tenant to keep the shop going, so he quickly put together a business plan, one built around his fondness for his beer- and sausage-making hobbies. He suspects his personal history fishing from the pier helped him beat out the ten other applicants to take over the shack sitting atop it. He installed a gas grill and 20 craft beer tap handles, and six months later, Fathom began serv-

ing beer, burgers, and sau-

sages, in addition to sell-

ing bait and tackle. Borlek says bait shop customers are more likely to buy candy bars than shrimp or squid these days, but a steady stream of tourists staying at local hotels have been delighted to discover the small bar and grill, decorated with vintage scuba gear and nautical-themed movie posters. And while inthe-know locals have long since realized it's an excellent place for a pint and bite (with an outstanding view of San Diego Bay and Coronado across the way), some are still surprised to learn the place also serves kimchi, lumpia, and Sunday brunch.

THAI **SPOT IN A CORNER STORE** 55 Thai Kitchen

2601 Broadway

GOLDEN HILL

Since launching four years ago, prolific restaurateur and chef Vijit Pipatkhajonchai has expanded his charitablyminded 55 Thai Kitchen brand to three additional locations, including SDSU and central Pacific Beach. But it's this original location, set up in the back of a corner convenience store, that contin-

ually proves the concept. It wasn't the first food counter installed behind San Diego Market, but considering the fact that previous tenants lasted months, not years, 55 Thai's longevity speaks volumes. Crammed into a couple hundred square feet at most (including table tops), there doesn't seem much to recommend it from the outside. But in the eyes of renters in the neighborhood, it has basically everything going for it: affordable, healthy food, served late. Everything tastes good, whether you're craving meat, seafood, or sticking exclusively to the refreshing, parcooked vegetables.

FINE DINING IN AN INDUSTRIAL PARK

You don't expect to find a fine dining experience tucked within an industrial park — the neighbors here include HVAC contractors and a packaging equipment supplier. But there's a reason The Cork & Craft does it: the gastropub is built around both a brewery and a winery. Abnormal Beer Co. and Abnormal Wine are both produced on-site, and the house brews provide plenty of nice drink options. But that doesn't stop the restaurant from stocking its 40 taps with examples of the world's best beer, or furnishing an extensive international wine list. The whole experience is supposed to revolve

practically hear the collective moans of downtown burger fanatics last July, when the bar's founding griller, Tom Logsdon, announced he was permanently closing the location. Fortunately, that permanent closure proved short-lived. Turns out, the property owner recognized that having burgers in the building was mutually beneficial, and reached out, asking Logsdon to return. Even better? The offer included the original Balboa's neighboring suite. So, when the bar re-opened in April, it was double the size, now with ample seating for covidweary fans to resume eating, with newfound elbow room.

ASIAN FUSION NEXT TO THE TROLLEY TRACKS

Angkorian Pikestaff

EAST VILLAGE Since 2019, across the trolley tracks from the NewSchool of Architecture and Design, chef Socheath Sun has been turning a small commercial kitchen with a narrow sidewalk patio into a venue for the ongoing exploration of Southeast Asian and fusion cuisine. Her popup started out serving weekday lunches, but has come out of our uncertain year serving dinner a couple nights a week - usually, but not always, Sundays and

Thursdays - offering one or two dishes at a time. Fans have long since learned to keep an eye on the @angkorian_pikestaff Instagram for the latest details, including each day's menu and the deadline for pre-orders (usually noon the day prior). It's an unusual place and process, but arguably the wildest part of Sun's project is that she has yet to repeat a dish. She'll routinely offer some kind of banh mi, noodle soup, or even breakfast burrito, but will switch up the ingredients to make it a different experience. For example, sometimes, the meal is vegan, while at other times it presents

a more traditional turn, whether reflecting Sun's Cambodian background or the national dishes of other Asian cultures. whether Malay, Indonesian, Korean, or Chinese. More often than not, Sun conjures irresistibly creative dishes sparked by whatever meal, ingredient, or mashup inspires her: Mongolian beef Wellington, bulgogi brisket, and vegan dim sum are but a handful of recent examples. Eventually, the greatest hits may turn up on a fixed menu at a permanent Angkorian Pikestaff location. but for now, Sun is expanding her pop-up presence with collaboration meals served at partnering businesses around town.

BEER AND MUSIC IN A NURSERY

Nate's Garden Grill

Nestled in the canyons below City Heights, City Farmers Nursery dubs its two-acre nursery and farm "a little bit of the country in the heart of the city." Bordering the nursery, the grill's rustic setting feels removed from the warrens of freeways and commercial corridors surrounding the property. And, like the nursery, the kitchen favors naturally raised products, whether local produce, free-range poultry, or grass-fed beef. It likewise champions local brews and local performers. Bill Tall founded City Farmers here nearly 50 years ago, and Nate's owes its name to his father Nathan, who originally brought the property into the family.

LAO FOOD BEHIND A TIRE SHOP

So Saap

You'll spot a cluster of small eateries situated around the intersection of 47th and Market Streets, but So Saap probably won't be one of them. It's mostly hidden behind an auto repair shop, in the back corner of a run-down

shopping strip, across the street from the other restaurants. But the small shop's Thai and Lao cuisine is worth seeking out, and in just over a year, So Saap has managed to build a regular clientele with a menu of boat noodle soups, larb, and delectable Lao beef jerky. It's proof you don't need a splashy storefront to serve good food.

PACIFIC BEACH

Since 1990, chef Yukito Ota has offered "choice sushi, in an unassuming setting." Though the address is technically Pacific Beach, it's neither close to the beach nor to the neighborhood's clusters of bars and restaurants that bustle with beachgoers. Instead, his unassuming setting is tucked behind a 7-Eleven and surrounded by car dealerships. Nevertheless, it's long been considered one of, if not the best sushi restaurant in town, a surprising enough development to make it San Diego's original unexpected dining destination.





A Supermarket in California

What thoughts I have of you tonight, Walt Whitman, for I walked down the streets under the trees with a headache self-conscious looking at the full moon.

In my hungry fatigue, and shopping for images, I went into the neon fruit supermarket, dreaming of your enumerations!

What peaches and what penumbras! Whole families shopping at night! Aisles full of husbands! Wives in the avocados, babies in the tomatoes! — and you, Garcia

Lorca, what were you doing down by the watermelons?

I saw you, Walt Whitman, childless, lonely old grubber, poking among the meats in the refrigerator and eyeing the gracery boys

I heard you asking questions of each: Who killed the pork chops? What price bananas? Are you my Angel?

I wandered in and out of the brilliant stacks of cans following you, and followed in my imagination by the store detective.

We strode down the open corridors together in our solitary fancy tasting artichokes, possessing every frozen delicacy, and never passing the cashier.

Where are we going, Walt Whitman? The doors close in an hour. Which way does your beard point tonight? (I touch your book and dream of our odyssey in the supermarket and feel absurd.)

Will we walk all night through solitary streets? The trees add shade to shade, lights out in the houses, we'll both be lonely.

Will we stroll dreaming of the lost America of love past blue automobiles in driveways, home to our silent cottage? Ah, dear father, graybeard, lonely old courage-teacher, what America did you have when Charon quit poling his ferry and you got out on a smoking bank and stood watching the boat disappear on the black waters of Lethe?

An Eastern Ballad

I speak of love that comes to mind: The moon is faithful, although blind; She moves in thought she cannot speak. Perfect care has made her bleak.

I never dreamed the sea so deep, The earth so dark; so long my sleep, I have become another child. I wake to see the world go wild.



Allen Ginsberg (1926-1997) was an American poet and a core member of the Beat Generation of poets and writers, which included William S. Burroughs and Jack Kerouac. A gadfly of the Industrial-Military complex as well as the traditional moral and social norms of the day, Ginsberg was seen as a spokesman for the Hippy culture that flourished during the 1960s and

1970s. His most famous poem, "Howl," became all the more popular when it became the focus of a well-publicized obscenity trial — the poem included descriptions of heterosexual and homosexual sexual acts. (The judge ruled in the case that as poetry, "Howl" was protected under the First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution.) Ginsberg's work reflects a panoply of influences – including Walt Whitman (whose long vatic lines Ginsberg consciously emulated), William Carlos Williams, William Blake, Eastern philosophy, and jazz.

July - San Diego's driest month

July is San Diego's driest month, according to precipitation data compiled since the year 1850. Only four hundredths of an inch of rain falls on average this month, compared to almost two inches in January — the wettest month. July also marks the beginning of a new rainfall year, as defined by local meteorological convention.

Native lilies, such as the Humboldt lily, are blooming this month in widely scattered locations throughout San Diego County's higher mountains. To find them, take a walk on the Noble Canyon Trail in the Laguna Mountains, or explore the pine woodlands of Palomar Mountain and Cuyamaca Rancho state parks. The large, nodding flowers of the lilies — orange or yellow with brown spots — grow in clusters on stems two to eight feet tall.

Cicadas, the insects that sound like tinny buzzsaws in the brush, have been putting up a racket around San Diego lately. Occasionally mistaken for the tail buzz of a rattlesnake, the sound is merely that of a male calling to potential mates. Some 30 species of cicadas inhabit San Diego County, but none are of the famous periodical type that emerge en masse every 13 or 17 years to serenade parts of the eastern United States.

With the advance of summer, the Sagittarius Teapot, in the south-southeast lower left of Scorpius after dark, is starting to tilt and pour from its spout to the right. The Teapot will tilt farther and farther for the rest of the summer — or for much of the night if you stay out late.

In late twilight, Spica shines three or four finger-widths lower left of the first-quarter Moon (it's exactly first-quarter at 3:11 a.m. Saturday the 17th). High above them is brighter Arcturus, tinted

with a lower color temperature: yellow-orange.

The tail of Scorpius is low due south right after dark, to the lower right of the Sagittarius Teapot. How low depends on how far north or south you live: the farther south, the higher. Look for the two stars especially close together in the tail. These are Lambda and fainter Upsilon Scorpii, known as the Cat's Eyes. They're canted at an angle; the cat is tilting his head a little to the right and winking (Upsilon is fainter than Lambda; they're magnitudes 1.6 and 2.6). Both are blue-white supergiants, 700 and 500 light years away, respectively. Yes, the nearer of the two is the fainter one.

h man. I do this every time: show up at my wannabe favorite place, Chennai

Tiffins, just as it's closing for the afternoon. This is in Little India, up by Miramar. I sit down in their tent, just to take a load off. Had to walk 1.4 miles down roads crossing scrubby fields from Miramar College to reach this food-mecca-ina-bus-desert. That or wait 45 minutes for the #31.

So, hungry? You can say that again. Actually, though, the main reason I'm in this part of town is for the Marmite. Most people can't stand the stuff. It's a veast extract made

from beer leftovers — dark, strong, ancient gloop. Hard to track down. Sorta like soy, but different. It's

a concentrated, sticky spread that you scrape on toast, or make into a soup. For me: deee-lish! Has been around forever. (OK, just looked it up: it's the creation of Justus von Liebig, a German nobleman. Invented it in the late 1800s.) The only place I know that has it in 'Diego is Akshar Cash'n' Carry, here

in Little India. I nail the purchase (costs about \$6), and then head for Chennai Tiffins, because what I'm desperate for now is a nice gungey Indian curry, even a cliche one like chicken tikka masala. Only problem: Chennai Tiffins is closed for three hours between lunch and dinner

Sigh. I wander up towards Black Mountain

Road, but now I find I'm gradually joining what feels like a little group of hungry people. They have that urgent walk about them. We all end up outside a sign that says "Baba Kabob." Open! "We are here for a family reunion," says one of the ladies. "Half of us live in San Diego, the other half in Texas. We are all originally from Afghanistan."

Huh. That's interesting, specially with the US troops pulling out.

But the people — kids, grannies and everyone in between — ain't interested in talking war. They move out to a parking area and sit down at long tables under tents near the grass verge. Me, I head inside the main building. Gent asks what I need. He turns out to be Rohullah Attaie, the founder and owner here — and of another Baba Kabob in Poway. I'm impressed that he's still doing the dayto-day work like this at the counter. His wife, Sofia, is rolling dough for what look like dumplings.

> Hmm. I look at the food pictures around the wall. Honestly, I'm so hungry that as soon as I see they have French fries, I take one order of those (\$2.59) tout suite. "Do Afghans have curry

> > like Indians?" I ask Rohullah. Dumb question, when you stop to think that Afghanistan straddles

all the trade and invasion routes of Asia. Heck India and Pakistan are on Afghanistan's doorstep. "Your best bet is our

chicken tikka korma." says Rohullah. Seems the korma is a mild curry with coriander, vogurt sauce

and nuts. Heck yes. It sounds right on the button. Costs \$10.99. So I order that plus a fountain Coke (\$2.69). And when it comes, it is like the curries I know and love. The meat may be a little less drowned in curry sauce than I like, but it's still full of flavor. What impresses me the most

> is the steady stream of customers coming in. Tuesday, 3 pm! Other restaurants have closed for the afternoon! "I think we do good business because Afghan food is way less spicy than some other Asian foods," says Rohullah (he says his name means "spirit of God"). "Afghan food is more familiar to the American palate.

The amazing thing is despite covid, we have had our best year ever. We never slowed down. I am so grateful."

"I always ask for the same thing," says Karim, who's at the next table. "The chicken kabob (\$11.99). Really tasty."

He's an air traffic controller supervisor at nearby Miramar. Looks so like The Rock that I have to ask if he is The Rock.

Meanwhile, I'm also noticing this continuous stream of plates heading to the reunion outside. I follow them. "OK, this is bolani," says one of the ladies. She's pointing at a plate laden with slabs of thin, stuffed bread, looks like. I'm thinking Polish pierogi, Argentinian empanadas. "You usually have mashed potato inside and maybe spinach," she says. "Or chives and spices." (A plate costs



But the star of the party is a plate loaded with what looks like wontons and white yogurt and colorful veggies. "Mantu," says one of the ladies at the end of the table. "A beloved Afghan dish. Especially for occasions like this." I look at the plates. A mix of thin-skinned steamed wonton-style dump-



Whatever, the Afghans have taken this dish right to their heart. "We always have it at celebrations," says the lady. Boy. I have to try this. I go back in and ask for a plate to go. Costs \$15.99. When I get to it, it has the sharp edge of a distinctive yogurt base, in a tzatziki, lightly peppery, veggie-filled, creamy kind of way. I think

of all the people in history, up and down the Silk Road, who must have closed their eyes dreamily at their first taste of this very dish. Meanwhile, Baba Kabob never slows down.

I'm gradually getting a picture of Afghan food: ground meat and vegetables, tomato-based sauce, garlic-based yogurt dressings, sprinklings of mint and paprika. Kinda Greek, kinda Turkish, kinda Middle-Eastern, kinda Chinese...kinda Silk Road, when you think about it. Guess I'll have to come back for Chennai Tiffins, but if they hadn't been closed just now, I would have missed all this. Crisis equals opportunity! ■

Fried chicken gets caviar treatment at Naegi

Elaborate green and black graffitied monikers float like crumpled leaves through a land-scape of clouded mountain peaks, pink cherry blossoms, and blue waterfalls. The vibrant mural covers the broad, flat side wall of the stand-alone storefront, a block west of the Coast Highway (626 South Tremont Street, Oceanside). The product of a recent live art performance, its more colorful elements were added in deference to the building's imminent

added in deference to the building's imminent future as a Japanese fine dining restaurant, Matsu.

But first, and for this summer only, it's a fried chicken pop-up restaurant called Naegi. And not only does Naegi offer the best fried chicken sandwich in the county (for \$8) — for

an extra \$20, you can make it the most indulgent chicken sandwich in the county, thanks to the option to add sturgeon caviar.

Both the Matsu and Naegi concepts are the

work of Oceanside chef William Eick, last seen

a year ago providing fried chicken meals to food insecure residents from his kitchen post at Mission Avenue Grill. That's where a growing interest in Japanese cuisine prompted Eick to introduce the Matsu concept, as a *prix fixe* pop-up restaurant charging \$120 per person.

Two years later, the upscale Matsu (what the Japanese call a pine tree) is waiting on an alcohol license, and will open as soon as late August or September. Until it does, Eick will use its kitchen to operate Naegi (Japanese for sapling).

Though Naegi is only at this property temporarily, Eick has wider plans for the casual concept and is actively seeking multiple locations for it around San Diego (though the proud local is determined to launch first in Oceanside). The restaurant's focus is *karaage*, better known as the Japanese fried chicken familiar from

many a ramen and sushi menu.


At Naegi, this means marinating chicken in a shio blend of koji and shoyu for up to three days, prior to frying in a crisp potato starch crust.

You can order a whole bird for \$29, or order chicken pieces of your choice: a single breast (\$8), or pairs of thighs (\$7), legs (\$7)

The \$8 "famous karaage sando" features a thigh, dressed with togarashi mayo and cabbage on a house-baked Hokkaido milk bun. If you're not feeling chicken, sandwiches also feature the likes of fried tofu (\$7) and shrimp (\$9). If you're not feeling fried food, you may opt for egg salad (\$5) or kanikama (a.k.a. krab).

and wings (\$7).

You may add caviar to any of them, but I cannot argue for skipping the fried chicken.

The meat inside is surprisingly succulent and tender, while the starchy exterior adds crunch and a seasoning that offers more complex *umami* notes than the southern fried and Nashville hot chicken styles that currently dominate San Diego's fowl cravings.

As for the caviar, it adds an ocean essence to the sandwich, boosting the salinity and creating a palate that is unmistakably Japanese. Like caviar itself, it could easily become an addiction. It turns out Eick acts as an ambassador for Sterling Caviar, a brand out of Northern California. It will be a fixture on Matsu's menu, and he told me the idea to put sturgeon roe on his Naegi sandwiches is mainly about priming the Oceanside community to associate this building with a place where caviar is served.

Caviar may or may not travel with future Naegi locations, but for the time being, the 20-dollar add-on may be the cheapest way to experience the fish roe delicacy. Sterling's caviar starts at \$90 per ounce, and when New York City chef David Chang famously made caviar available with fried chicken at his restaurant Momofuku, he charged \$500.

By comparison, Oceanside's highbrow ingredient on a casual dish combination looks too good to pass up at \$28. Get it soon — it'll be gone by end of summer.



'Don't Poke the Bear' is a 9-minute song I wrote in the middle of the night and just kept adding parts to it until five in the morning."



SILENT

A video is streaming online for the new track from goth-inclined rockers Silent, "Empty Spaces," from their upcoming sophomore album (their first in five years) *Modern Hate*. "For this record," says the band, "an ever-evolving work in progress on and off over the last five years, the focus culminates in what is happening around the world right now. *Modern Hate* represents all the racist, supremacist bullshit that has come to the surface again as a new form of rage and hate, not only in America, but across the world. The band also considered all of the mass shootings and killings

that have happened across the U.S. over the years. These are some of the heavy influences that brought the band to the idea of the album's title. Most of the lyrics focus on the disturbing flaws of people and religion, love and dreams." Jung Sing has been talking up the album with online music sites such as Ordinario Extraordinario and Scene Point Blank, and the band is racking up new accolades at Post-Punk.com, I Die: You Die, in British magazine The Quietus, and elsewhere.

Reggae singer E.N. Young has kept busy during the pandemic, with a single called "Queendom" made available in both electric and acoustic versions, as well as a collaborative album, *Raggamuffin Ride Riddim*', featuring eleven different singers on his song "Cooyah Raggamuffin." He also released a remake of a track from his first album, "Wicked Man," this time featuring reggae star Michael Palmer. Now, "I'm working on live dub performances from many songs I've produced over the years," says Young, who recently gave his four year-old son Sol his first dub lesson. "As a


young kid getting into reggae music, I discovered dub and was immediately hooked and taken into a trance. It was after listening to the ambient spacey mixes from engineers like King Tubby, Scientist, [and] Mad Professor that I knew I needed to learn more about this art. Dub is an alternative mix to a song. Instead of focusing on the lead vocal or lead instrument, dub focuses on the drum and bass, while creating space using time-based effects on the different layers in the song."

In their San Diego days (1987 through 1990, when they moved to Los Angeles), Stone Temple Pilots called themselves Mighty Joe Young. In a 1994 Rolling Stone poll, STP was voted Worst New Band by critics, and Best New Band by readers. The same year, STP's song "Plush" won a Best Hard Rock Performance Grammy. The band's late singer Scott Weiland will be the subject of an upcoming biographical film from Dark Picture called Paper Heart, based on Weiland's own memoir Not Dead & Not for Sale, co-written with David Ritz. "It's an honor to have the trust to tell Scott's story and the ability to portray the lesser known sides of

him," says Dark Picture cofounder Jennifer Erwin, "the loving and tender man he was, the high school athlete he was, the melancholy soul he was, and the legendary frontman that he will always be." Welland passed away in his sleep while on a 2015 tour stop in Bloomington, Minnesota, with his band the Wildabouts. His son Noah Welland recently formed a group called Blu Weekend with Tye Trujillo, son of Metallica's Robert Trujillo. Noah and Tye previously played together in Suspect208 alongside Slash's son London Hudson, but Noah Weiland departed that group in January.

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IMMORTAL BEAUTY

Summertime sounds and sensations

As we are in mid-July, your summer should be in full swing. With that in mind, let's take a look at five pieces of music that inhabit the tone of summer. There is one caveat here: the word "summer" cannot appear in the title of the piece. That rules out Vivaldi's "Summer" from The Four Seasons along with Frank Bridge's Summer and Frederick Delius' A Song of Summer and at least a dozen others. Anyone can Google "classical music for summer" and see lists of pieces that contain the word "summer." We are going after something finer here.

When you think about summer, Russia might not be the first place that comes to mind. However, I would imagine that Russians have

an extra appreciation of summer, based on their winter. Musically, I find the third section of Tchaikovsky's Serenade for Strings to be quite evocative of a summer day. Though I should note that this music isn't just a series of lazy naps on a sunny beach. Rather, this is a summer experience that has some activity to it. There's even a bit of drama under the shining sun.

"Daybreak" from Maurice Ravel's Daphnis et Chloe interprets the rising of the sun — but it is rising on a warm summer day. I can recall being a schoolaged child and waking up on summer days with the realization that I didn't have anything to do except whatever I wanted to do. It was a glorious epiphany, and I find some echo of it

in this music by Ravel. What a gift to regain the feeling of a summer day from one's childhood.

Many of us find ourselves hiking during the summer season. Some hikes are more demanding than others. We might find ourselves on a hike that is a little more than we had anticipated. For the most part, the difficulty of the hike is relative to the payoff. The "Adagio" from Bruckner's Symphony No. 5 starts off very much like a fatigued hiker. The strings pluck out the steps, while the oboe plays a mournful tune for our aching feet. All seems to be lost until we arrive at the vista and the strings intone a solemn hymn of nature (at the 2:30 mark of the video included

on the website), washing the accumulated dust of the trial off of our souls. We continue on our journey with renewed enthusiasm.

Nothing is more associated with summer than a National Park, and no National Park is as impressive as The Grand Canyon. Ferde Grofé wrote his Grand Canyon Suite between 1929 and 1931, just as the auto-

mobile was opening up the country to the summer road trip. "On the Trail," the third section of the suite, impersonates the canter of the donkey train as it descends into the canyon.

The final piece of summer is the opening movement of Dvorak's American Quartet. Dvorak's warm and energetic lyricism is a perfect fit for summertime listening.

Half of Novo Brazil's brewing business now kombucha

Last October, when Chula Vista beer-maker Novo Brazil Brewing Co. took over the Ocean Beach taproom previously operated by Culture Brewing Co., it had a branding decision to make. The company had been brewing beer since 2015, but a hard kombucha pilot program launched in 2018 had rapidly grown into a thriving spin-off brand in its own right — and was still growing. When the sign went up, it didn't mention beer at all. Instead, it read Nova Easy Kombucha.

"I was really in doubt whether to build it as a beer brand or kombucha brand," says Novo CEO Tiago Carneiro. "But when I look at the vibe of Ocean Beach," he adds, "it's very colorful, it's made of different cultures, it's very open minded." With nine other beer outfits operating in the beach neighborhood, a chance to stake a claim as its first hard kombucha bar tipped the scales. And judging by customer response, it was the right call. Since opening, taproom sales "are basically 80 percent alcoholic kombucha," reveals Carneiro, "even though we have beers on tap."

Indeed, Novo pours its beers, both hard and soft kombuchas, and hard seltzers at the location. But the overwhelming success of its hard booch in the beach community is no anomaly. Nationwide, hard kombucha sales have grown exponentially each of the past five years, and at Novo itself, Carneiro says beverage sales are now 50/50 beer and hard kombucha. Overall, beer still holds the edge in wholesale and onpremise sales. But kombucha is surging when it comes to retail packaging (12 and 16 ounce cans), especially since placing the non-alcoholic kombucha in Whole Foods this year.

"When we look to the packaging side," Carneiro says, "we will sell more kombucha than beer, I think, by the end of this year." Novo sells 85 percent of its booch in California, and Carneiro says Nova Easy Kombucha now stands as the "number three hard kombucha in SoCal... according to [market measurement firm] Nielsen."

While other craft breweries have worked to develop hard kombucha lines, Novo had a bit of a head start. Carneiro launched the business along with his father and brother, who came to

San Diego from their native Brazil, where they previously owned a brewery. But the family also operates **KHappy Kombucha**, South America's largest traditional kombucha brand.

In addition to a core offering of 6-percent alcohol kombuchas, Nova has launched an 8-percent, cocktail-inspired line of "sexy" offshoots, so far including a Sexy Piña Colada and Sexy Mojito. A new cocktail-flavored kombucha will debut each summer, alongside seasonal releases, including this year's cactus fruit, agave, and jalapeño; and peach lychee.

Meanwhile, the beer side of Novo's busi-

ness isn't slowing. Carniero anticipates Novo Brewing's beer branded taproom at the long-expected (and pandemic-delayed) National City food hall and market on 8th will finally open in September.

Novo will follow that up with an even bigger project in Imperial Beach. Carniero reveals it has purchased a more than 13,000-square-foot property from **Coronado Brewing Co.** A part of the city's burgeoning Bikeway Village, the property fronts the Bayshore Bikeway, the bike path that cir-

cumnavigates San Diego Bay. Positioned at the Bay's southern tip, the new Novo Brazil property will comprise a full restaurant with a large patio and views across the bay to Coronado Bridge and the San Diego skyline. Carniero expects it to open in December at the soonest.

houghts of writing this one off were tempting, but the day was hot, the timing right, and the screen large. Was Marvel right to patiently ride out the pandemic by skipping the VOD route in favor of a theatrical release like its DC supersister? Would this be the first postpandemic film to draw the masses back to the multiplex? The two-hundred or so souls who joined me inside the

big Grossmont for an opening weekend matinee of *Black Widow* seemed to think so.

At its most elementary, the first shot we see in a movie should in some small way set the tone. The logo faded and in an instant, my palms were drenched, shirt collar tightened, and seat back taxed by what greeted me: an anonymous pandown from the sky. The same tilt of the camera that had for decades unimaginatively kicked-off live-action Disney comedies, episodic network dramas, and sitcoms alike opened the show. A \$200 million budget and that's all the Marvel braintrust could come up with? Audiences returning for a big screen vision were greeted by WandaVision!

Fortunately, it got better fast.

In many ways, this is the best James Bond picture since Daniel Craig assumed the role. Imagine two sibling 007s for the price of one: Natasha Romanoff (Scarlett Johansson) and her little sister (a feisty, pug-nosed Florence Pugh). The act of leaving home to find a home among superhero freaks supplies the backstory for much of what follows. What stands out amid the swamp of special effects is

the chemistry between the two leads. (The one message that can't be

hammered home hard enough for this crowd is the one about women making choices.) For the most part, it's the characters who drive the special effects, not the other way around. The genuine rapport between sisters is what separates this from Brie Larson's pretentious turn in *Captain Marvel*. It's clear that Pugh is being groomed for a standalone feature. Let's hope future scripts offer her more to work with. Even Margaret Leighton couldn't have done much with dialogue like "Ha!" and "Whoa!" and "Huh!"

Had the filmmakers trimmed the redundancy, we could have left a good 15 minutes earlier. Mason (O-T Fagbenle),





the closest we get to a love interest, returns to Romanoff a box containing mail and personal belongings from her time spent in a Budapest safe house. Her verbal underplaying of the importance of its contents is followed by a lingering shot of her placing the box in the trunk of her car. With all that effort paid

to getting audiences to ignore the box, one knows damn well there's something of importance in it. Mason is Natasha's answer to 007's gadget-master Q, providing a beat-up chopper when the girls asked for a jet.

Watching an episode of *The Rifleman* fifty years ago at the Goldmans'

house comes to mind whenever I pay a visit to the MCU. During the climactic showdown, Chuck Connors hears the villain tiptoeing across the roof above. No sooner did dad Irv Goldman yell "Shoot through the wood!" than Connors aimed and fired his gun skyward to take out his target.





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Moments like this are geared to make even the most undemanding viewer among us feel one step ahead of the game. Black Widow is padded with at least a half-dozen obviously foreshadowed "Irv Goldman moments." At least these digressions involve some thought on the part of the audience. One guesses that for all the times the filmmakers spent tricking viewers into feeling smart, they'll be forgiven when they slip in something blatantly stupid in order to facilitate dad Alexi's jailbreak: the prison guards are too busy chowing down on the pastries in his CARE package to bother examining the Avengers doll contained within.

If there is one thing the Masters of the MCU are guilty of, it's their reliance on CGI as a crutch to tell the story. For over a century, filmmakers have delighted in crashing cars for our pleasure. Since when does an action as insignificant as two cars colliding need to be juiced by a computer? CGI is used much the same way slapstick comedians employed sudden bursts of accelerated motion to get cheap laughs. Only in this case, computers aren't taking work away from stunt people.

I'm still not 100% clear on the significance of Red Room. At the risk of alienating audiences with unpleasantry, if it's the child-slavery ring I think it is, the filmmakers should have played it up more. Come for the special-effects, stay for the subplots involving adoptive daughters and their deeply damaged parents, played spectacularly by Rachel Weisz and an uncompromisingly amusing David Harbour. I haven't enjoyed a Marvel movie this much since the second Captain America. Be glad that they waited for the theatres to reopen to release it. Why wait for your living room? See it on a BIG screen. ★★

ness — Apart from Frank Tashlin's The First Time (it's narrated by a fetus), talking baby movies are not my bag. Adding to the aggravation, this joins Spirit Untamed as the second film from Dreamworks Animation in as many months to base a sequel on a small screen counterfeit and not the spawning theatrical release, and it shows. Like any lazily conceived follow-up, this Baby laughs at the thought of continuation and character advancement, opting instead for the sparkly distraction of simply parroting its older brother. Ted (Alec Baldwin) and Tim (James Marsden) have grown up and apart. Tim is quick to admit that being a dad is the best job in the world. But his older daughter

SATURDAY NIGHT FEVER (1977) John Travolta was respon-

sible for spearheading not one but two culture-crippling trends — disco and the mechanical bull — and legendary Chicago showman Oscar Brotman cashed in on both. When it came time for Saturday Night Fever to hit the screen of his Lincoln Village Theatre, rather than dismissing disco as a developmental disconnect, Brotman embraced the craze by transforming a portion of the theatre's spacious lobby into a minidisco, a giant Lite Brite box located to the right of the concession stand. (Years later, a bucking machine was erected on the same spot to celebrate the opening of Urban Cowboy.) Adding to the disco delirium, Brotman raided the Fred Astaire Studio and hired pros to prance delightedly on stage before each show and during intermission. A brace of Tony Manero wannabes in attendance that opening night pelted the entertainers with a steady stream of discouraging heckles. But like bossman Astaire, the duo's smiles and fluid moves remained undithered. No one expected a film about a short-lived fad to have such staying power,

but this is one that gets better with time. Had it not been for the film, and the \$285 million it took in, disco would have been dead by 1977. We open memorably on a paint run through the streets of Brooklyn that invites audiences to follow the bouncing can rhythmically dangling from store clerk Tony Manero's (Travolta) hand. Travolta oozes seductiveness, so much so that it's

almost easy to overlook the more repugnant aspects of his personality: Tony's joke about a customer's wife's ass finds the shnook on the receiving end of the gag laughing and patting him on the shoulder on his way

out the door. Paramount had no faith in the production. The suits considered it a "vulgar little movie" with little to redeem it. As if chainsmoking weren't enough to earn the film its R rating, Manero is a confirmed sexist, racist, and gay-basher who resorts to attempted rape when he doesn't get his way. And yet screenwriter Norman Wexler's dialogue remains as fresh as the day it was written. Travolta fought hard not to sweeten Tony, and if there's one thing on which to pin the film's success, it's the entirely fair approach it takes to the characters.

His critical better-half and Saturday Night Fever groupie Gene Siskel bought Travolta's iconic white suit at a charity auction. Upon learning this, Ebert guipped, "Anyone who would pay \$2000 for John Travolta's suit from Saturday Night Fever has snot for brains."

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Bluefin tuna near San Clemente Island provide mixed-bag opportunity for anglers

Dock Totals 7/4 - 7/10: 5139 anglers aboard 218 trips out of San Diego landings this past week caught 535 barracuda, 1 black seabass (released), 2875 bluefin tuna (up to 213 pounds), 2599 calico bass (1453 released), 12 halibut, 1 leopard shark, 1069 rockfish, 1545 sand bass, 27 sculpin, 201 sheephead, 90 whitefish, 2 white seabass (released), 163 yellowfin tuna, and 453 yellowtail.

Saltwater: The bluefin tuna bite that had been holding off the northern Baja coast for a month or so began sliding north into US waters this past week. Schools have been spotted as close as a few miles off the coast, roiling the surface as they pummel balls of baitfish in feeding frenzies commonly called 'foamers'. As the week progressed and catches were recorded on outings as short as three-quarter day boats departing

from landings from San Diego to San Pedro, social media started buzzing about the possibilities of catching tuna from the rocks. That's probably not going to happen, and though most of it was joking (including posts of schools swimming into lagoons, up rivers, bumping into the Queen Mary, and boiling in swimming pools in the Hollywood Hills), there were credible sightings on the north end of 9 Mile Bank west of Mission Bay, and one fish caught within three miles of Oceanside Harbor by a private boater.

The fleet is currently concentrating on an area of several schools a few miles to the east of San Clemente Island and is reporting good action on fish from 20 to over 200 pounds. More yellowfin tuna are trickling into the counts as they slide up from the south with warmer water that is pushing bluefin schools north. Most of those fish have been between 25

anglers on trips targeting bluefin. As the tuna are closer to shallower water and near-shore fisheries full day boats are reporting uncommon mixed catches: the Malihini and the Grande motored out on Saturday, July 10, and returned to the dock with barracuda, bluefin tuna, calico bass, rockfish, sculpin, yellowtail, and even one halibut.

Given that bluefin tuna can often be finicky biters, their current location allows for inshore-type fishing en route on shallower banks and off San Clemente Island as a viable backup plan. This is a good thing for anglers, as when the tuna are in deeper water or further from the landing and biting in slow or finicky fashion, it can make for a long trip with little result. The mixed bag reports from Saturday were no accident. The previous day, the Grande reported just three bluefin for the 35 anglers on board.

That prompted this announcement: "Fish everywhere today putting on an impressive show but not very many willing to bite. We will be trying our luck tomorrow in shallower water." So they headed toward the Coronado Islands, which worked out well, and though only a couple tuna were caught in the shallower water, all the anglers aboard returned with fish in their sacks. As the fish are within 30 minutes of the lee side of San Clemente Island, I suspect we will see more mixed catches — including bass, barracuda, yellowtail and tuna in the coming weeks.



"Everyone seems pretty chill"

Chula Vista native Zachary O'Hara, an 18-yearold surf instructor at the San Diego Surf School, talks about nearby Ocean Beach as well as his local break in Imperial Beach.

His go-to spot since starting surfing at the beginning of the pandemic has been Imperial Beach — in part, O'Hara said, because the temperament of the local surfers in OB can be hit and miss. "From what I've heard, they are kind of territorial a little bit," said O'Hara. "I heard there's a lot of competition out here; it sure seems like it, too." O'Hara finds Imperial Beach more welcoming, though tensions can still flare both in the water and on the beach. "Everyone seems pretty chill," said O'Hara. "You get the one or two hotheads that show up, but from what I know, everyone is pretty much chill."

On one tense day, two of these hotheads crossed paths, as O'Hara recounted. Things got nasty as violence broke out."This one guy got pushed off his wave and then pulled a pocketknife out of the sleeve on his wetsuit," O'Hara said. "He cut someone's leash as they were going by. There was an argument on the beach after, and both guys just stormed off."

before her April divestiture, helped develop the antibody cocktail known as Remdesvir, aided by federal assistance arranged by the Trump administration, per a June 29, 2020 Washington Post account. "A clinical trial sponsored by the government showed the drug — invented by Gilead but developed largely by taxpayer-funded agencies — sped up hospital

services. But in reality, it was never developed, and most of the land remains largely inaccessible. Mineral and oil discoveries obviously didn't pan out. "When they see the land is in San Diego County, they think it must be worth a lot. They've never been here, they don't know it's a desert. They're surprised to find out their 10 acres is only worth about \$4,000." Also surprising — much of the land is in a flash flood zone, where storms can bring two feet of water in

recoveries by four days. It had no statistically significant impact on survival for Covid-19 patients." In June of last year, Gilead told the Post that the cost of the drug for a typical privately insured patient would be \$3120.

Jacobs also disposed of a similarly valued holding in AvalonBay Communities. Last September, the big development outfit attracted controversy when it gave \$2.9 million to Californians just a few hours. Consequent strict building codes make development more expensive.

Gerson said it would take about \$10 million to acquire the remainder of private land — about 14,000 acres — still mixed in with Anza-Borrego Desert State Park. Land close to Borrego Springs is worth about \$400-\$600 per acre, and in rare cases, up to \$800. "We're only looking for willing sellers or donors," Gerson said.
