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

Curious about Keria Homeowners inquire about previous tenants

After my wife Lynne and I had bought each other subscriptions to *Ancestry.com*, I realized I had a ton of information about people at my fingertips. (Am I really one of the only people who actually misses the old massive phone books?) About a week into my new addiction to the seemingly infinite quantities of biographical information, it dawned on me that I could look up the ownership timeline of our old house on Richmond Street in Hillcrest

When we bought our house in 2012, I went to the San Diego History Center's archives to glean what I could from city directories. Lynne and I love seeing plaques on old homes in our neighborhood, the kind that read, "THE SO-AND-SO HOUSE, 19xx." I'd even scouted for a perfect spot on the façade of our 1928 Spanish-style Hillcrest home on which to hang such a piece of bronze. We were going to be ready when we ascertained the original owner's august name.

The anticipated thrill fell flat. Our house's first owners didn't seem to be anyone too exciting. In fact, the directories listed many residents at our address during its early years, most of them renters. The original owners of the house were identified in the 1929 San Diego city directory as Harry L. Rogers and Keria Rogers. So much for the dream of the first owner being a locally recognizable name — I could accept that. But more disconcerting was the fact that this couple resided at our house for just two measly years, then rented it out for about the next eight years.

By that point, I was demoralized enough to abandon my archival pursuit for the day. If the owners' own residence was fleeting and they simply hung onto the place as a rental investment, then we didn't feel right ordering a plaque that read, "THE HARRY AND KERIA ROGERS HOUSE, 1928." Closing the batch of directories in front of me, I took several final notes in the History Center and walked home. The only substantial piece of news I'd learned was that Harry Rogers had been in the U.S. Navy and worked at the nearby Balboa Naval Hospital as a "chief pharmacist." Not much intrigue there. But even as I walked home that day, questions started to percolate in my history-buff brain.

Lots in store for Hodor Toybox is 216 feet long — that's a vacht

On December 19, San Diegans and tourists alike were struck by the sight of a a 215-foot space-age catamaran named *Hodor* docked near the *Star Of India*, across the street from the San Diego County Administration Building. "Is this a kind of hovercraft?" asked Mark A., one of my NextDoor neighbors. "[It's an] unusual vessel...parked at the Embarcadero." Al P., a Mountain View resident, said that he had fabricated parts for the circa-2019 boat. "I asked the chief engineer if it was named after the character from *Game Of Thrones*, and he said, 'Yes, [like the character,] we have to carry everything."

Local boaters and offroaders refer to *Hodor* as the "world's largest floating toy box." On December 27, local teacher Jeff Feehley explained to me that "in the huge garage below its decks, *Hodor* is carrying nine jet skis, four Yamaha quad bikes, two Yamaha side-by-side ATVs, and four Yamaha

TW200 trail motorcycles." Felipe Mojica, a local offroad racer who races in the Baja 1000, added, "Hodor is badass. Those 700cc quads in Hodor's garage used to be in the 1A class at the SCORE International events; they had the biggest engine at the time, around 2001-2005. And those side-by-sides are great for the dunes at Glamis and Gordon Wells; they

have a Fox suspension, and the engines are like 1000cc. They're fast." which is launched using a special crane." I asked Feehley — one of the 297 members of San Diego Bay and Ship Watchers group on Facebook — about the symmetrical contraptions sticking out underneath the helicopter from the rear of the boat. "It's a \$1.2 million boat powered by five outboard engines. What you're asking about is the most impressive 'toy' — a 56-foot Nor-Tech center console. I'm not sure about the horsepower, but I'd bet they are at least 600 horsepower each. If

Both Feehley and Mojica had learned about the ship's toys on the SuperYacht Times website, which also

mentions the onboard helicopter propped on the boat's landing pad, a fleet of five tenders on its aft decks, and a remotely operated underwater vehicle "on the foredeck, that's the case, it's 3000 horsepower." Feehley added that *Hodor* also houses two Laser dinghies and a Hobie Cat. "The leftover space is already earmarked for a soon-to-be-delivered SeaMagine Aurora-3 submersible."

Per SuperYachtFan.com, Hodor's price tag without its toys was about \$30 million when launched from the Astilleros Armon

Merry, merry payoffs Chris Cate,

San Diego's only Republican city council member, got \$5000 for his well-publicized annual Christmas Tree giveaway from city vendor CGI Technologies and Solutions, Inc. On November 3, CGI issued a news release saying it had recieved an "\$84 million, 4-year contract, with additional option years for a potential 10-year contract term, under which it will provide long-term IT support to meet the evolving requirements of key business applications operated by the City, including

a growing portfolio of digitized services." Per a so-called behesting disclosure filed by Cate with the City Clerk dated December 9, CGI made its Christmas tree payment to the Cate-backed Rosie Network on November 30. "San Diego City Councilman Chris Cate teamed up with The Rosie Network to give away 100 free Christmas trees to active duty military and veteran families Saturday," said a KGTV-TV account on December 11, with



no mention of CGI's financial role in the event... San Diego's gift to the California state Senate, Pro Tem **Toni Atkins**, finished 2021 with a torrent of end-of-year cash raised from a host of special interests, including search giant Google, LLC. On December 28, the Mountain View behemoth gave the Atkins for Lieutenant Governor fund \$9400 via the company's Vice President of Governmental Affairs, Mark Isakowitz. As reported by Bloomberg in a December 2 dispatch, he's leading the company's battle against a raft of antitrust bills introduced in the House of Representatives to curtail the company's might. Congress should "carefully consider the unintended consequences for Americans and small businesses of breaking


a range of popular products that people use every day," Isakowitz warned. The same day Democrat Atkins picked up Google's cash, the Dentists Insurance Company of Sacramento kicked in \$16,200.

Holiday bailout Amid acrimony regarding the abrupt cancellation of the Holiday Bowl due to UCLA's covid-caused pullout, well-paid executives of the San Diego non-profit that runs the game remain to contemplate


a bleak bottom line. The high-rolling San Diego Bowl Game Association paid Chief Executive Officer Mark Neville an annual \$301,100, along with \$43,869 in "other compensation" for a total of \$344,969. (Those salary numbers are from the non-profit's 2019 IRS 990 disclosure report — the most recent available — covering March 1, 2019 to February 29, 2020, filed November 11, 2020.) According to his LinkedIn profile, Neville has worked for the group for more than 30 years. Chief Revenue Officer Jeffrey Craig Nichols got a total of \$225,386 during the period, and Chief Financial Officer Cheryl Tishue received \$185,440. But even before the Covid-19 onslaught of 2020, the association's year-to-year revenue totals had dropped from \$16,392,322 to \$10,021,713. Total salaries and compensation fell far less, from \$1,098,162 to \$1,028,042. "This has been the most difficult decision our Board has ever had to make since our bowl game started in 1978," Neville said in an October 2020 statement after that year's cancellation. "While it's not the decision we wanted

> to make, it's the right decision for our non-profit association and the community for the long term." With the 2021 game abruptly terminated by UCLA's pullout, the fate of the payments promised by the Holiday Bowl Association to UCLA and North Carolina State, which furnished the teams, remains unknown. According to the association's 2020 IRS filing covering the 2019 game, the group paid \$6,856,834 for "Team Participation." That

contest featured the University of Southern California Trojans versus the Iowa Hawkeyes, and income from sponsorships was \$1,196,843. As was also the case in 2021, the San Diego County Credit Union purchased naming rights to the 2019 game.





shipbuilding factory in Spain in 2019. The annual running cost of *Hodor* is between \$3-\$5 million. "I've seen *Hodor* a couple of times this year around the San Diego Bay," Feehley continued. "Most recently, it was tied up at the Kona Kai Resort on Shelter Island. Not sure what it costs to dock a superyacht there; I would guess between \$4k-\$5k a day, based on slip rentals around the area at \$20 per foot. *Hodor* is 216 feet long. And fuel is a lot more expensive in the yachting world, approximately \$5 a gallon, and Hodor holds over 40,000 gallons."

If those numbers aren't enough to blow you out of the water, it should be noted that *Hodor* is a support ship for a larger superyacht that reportedly docked behind the Marriott two weeks ago. "*Lonian* is the name of the 285-foot yacht *Hodor* is attached to," Feehley noted. "It's the superyacht for yachts. More about the owner and his boats can be found online; his name is Lorenzo Fertitta, former owner of the UFC (Ultimate Fighting Championship). Their last known position was in the Sea of Cortez, north of La Paz on December 24."

Some locals voiced their disdain towards *Lonian* and *Hodor* on NextDoor, Facebook, and Reddit. But Scott L.'s online voice poured oil on the troubled waters. "Those who are fortunate enough to purchase and use these large yachts support thousands of people and businesses worldwide. The global yacht industry is approaching \$85 billion a year.

Got a lot?

City invokes eminent domain to build jumbo rest stop

It's been more than five years since transportation officials came up with a plan to get buses and portable toilets off certain city streets. Eventually, the downtown bus stopover project evolved to add a new headquarters and multiuse development as well. The San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG) is developing the project in partnership with the Metropolitan Transit System, which has

tax for transportation projects administered by SANDAG. Then there's the proposal to use eminent domain, forcing five different property owners to sell their land. By June, 2018, the agency had two willing sellers and is currently in the process of acquiring the

Plaza peril Rain brings pain in deadly roof collapse

The storm that hit the region on Monday, December 13 caused the collapse of a section of the roof of Centro Comercial Otay in Tijuana, one of the oldest plazas in that neighborhood. The roof that collapsed under the rain caused the death of a 63-year-old woman; in addition, some business owners were injured or trapped by the debris.

Carlos Santiago, who has a printing business in the plaza, is one of those who survived but was buried. "Everything happened in seconds. I was working close to my business entrance with my headphones on, so I couldn't hear the roof falling. I reacted when the ceiling broke over me; my instinctive reaction was to escape, and I jumped to the other side of my workshop." The debris trapped him there for

now awarded another \$1.4 million in funding. But the board still hasn't decided which option to pursue. (Today, the multimillion dollar plan is for just a bus stop. San Marcos mayor Rebecca Jones, a board member, said there has been no discussion of whether it is still planned as a headquarters for SANDAG.)

The stopover, the most basic plan considered, includes a parking lot and restroom, one that will keep 400 buses from having to idle

along parking-poor streets between routes, and also keep bus drivers from having to hunt for a portable toilet. "Right now, it's envisioned to be a bus stop, because the buses right now are parking in the streets, both the Rapid and the local," said Hasan Ikhrata, the agency's executive director, at a December 17 board meeting. The number of bus routes that end in downtown is expected to surge with the growth of the region's Rapid network, and the lot is expected to serve over 700 buses in the future.

The project would take over a privately owned block in the Columbia neighborhood, bounded by A Street, Union Street, B Street and State Street. Criticism of the proposal has focused partly on its cost — approximately \$46 million allocated from TransNet, the voterapproved half-cent sales

other properties, for which the additional \$1.4 million will be used. One of the willing sellers was GLP Trust & Stahlman Family Properties, LLC (the Stahlman offer and appraisal value was \$8,650,000). A previous holdout, the San Diego County Bar Association, has now apparently agreed to sell.

Acquiring land through eminent domain requires that the project serves the public interest and is necessary. According to the agency, several sites were studied before they settled on the city's civic core in 2016 as the most suitable for ensuring on-time transit for downtown riders and "the current and future need for housing buses at the stopover facility requires the acquisition of the entire city block."

The transportation agencies hope to have the lot open for use in 2023. Ikhrata agreed to provide more information at an upcoming meeting, including the amount of regional dollars spent so far.

two hours until firefighters extracted him by making a hole in a wall of the room. "According to my doctor, my movement was so abrupt that it caused problems in my back and neck. "Sublime seclusion, luxurious ambience, and phenomenal design for welcoming family and friends are yours in this magnificent gated estate," promises the Zillow opening for our stop this week at 6001 La Iolla Scenic Drive South, a seven-bedroom, seven-bath mansion occupying more than 7500 square feet of living space in the Muirlands neighborhood of southern La Jolla. "Seductive contemporary aesthetics, [the] finest natural materials, and modern

technological systems are maximized throughout the main residence and detached guest house," the listing continues. Let's have a look, shall we?

The first photo in the listing is a sunset shot of the black-bottomed pool; there's a square gazebo open to the spa in the middle. Light features

are trained on a stand of poolside palms and some other trees in the background, lending a resortlike feel to the backyard. It's a little over the top, but you can't tell me you wouldn't enjoy an evening cocktail out here.

An aerial shot follows, along with one of a perfectly manicured front lawn and circular driveway. The "almost two acres of lush, specimen-planted grounds" certainly afford us some privacy here, in a spot that is a bit more than a mile as the gull flies from the cliffs of Hermosa or the beach at Windansea. (If we were closer to the ocean, this much space would command even more of a premium than it already does.)

Dual doors, which we're told are made of solid teak (as are the window frames and the flooring), lead us through the entry foyer and into a living room with giant sliding glass doors, which in turn lead us out to the patio and poolside cabana.

Off to one side, there's a casual dining area with an 800-gallon aquarium built into a wood-lined wall. Beyond is the "serious kitchen with two refrigerators and two dishwashers." Moving on, we find a more casual living space with a wall-mounted TV that dwarfs the fireplace with which it grudgingly shares a wall. We also see a more formal dining room and a bedroom with its own sitting area in front of another fireplace — this one reportedly carved from a single slab of onyx. In the main suite's bathroom, there's a freestanding tub that looks like a hollowedout boulder - the listing tells us the tub was literally hand-carved from a solid hunk of granite. Impressive! There's also a "steam shower with dual shower heads and custom body


California: for Travellers and Settlers

IN EARLY CALIFORNIA, when night came, if no house was near, the traveller staked out his horse, often tying the rope to his own arm, that he might be awakened if the horse was startled by a wild beast, spread upon the ground the huge leather flaps which in those days loosely covered the saddle tree, rolled himself in his blanket, and lay down to sleep on the leather.

In San Diego County, I believe, it was the custom to guard against the approach of rattlesnakes by surrounding this couch with the horsehair rope which is used to stake out a horse. This, made ingeniously with the manes and tails of horses, is very rough, the ends of the hairs sticking out all over it, and these,

it is said, the snake dislikes, as they prob-



ably irritate his skin; and feeling them, he turns aside.



ON THE OUTSKIRTS of just about any city in America is a place like National City, just a few minutes from uptown San Diego. Nasty City, the residents call it. It's the kind of place that reassures you if you've been getting paranoid about America's impotence. When you begin to think that the Cuban Coast Guard might just decide to capture everything south of Illinois.

National City will take care of that for you if you just walk into any saloon on the boulevard, where you'll notice that people can file steel on their whiskers and that most of them resemble Willie Nelson or Johnny Cash. If you're feeling suicidal, you don't have to do anything terribly stupid like dumping on the U.S. of A. Just try poor-mouthing the San Diese Chiefer.

If you watch and listen to the image makers and communicators in the media centers of New York, Washington and Hollywood, you can get a crazy head from an impression



of America gone soft. But just travel to the outskirts of the big city and discover that it hasn't all gone the way of mud flaps and running boards.

continued from page 8 wash system," which is not pictured but I envision as being something like one of those gas station car washes you park in while a machine moves back and forth, alternately soaping and rinsing you.

The "state-of-theart acoustically-engineered theater" with Crestron automated controls has what looks like a full bar in back, plus three rows of leather stadium seating plopped in front of the 19-foot screen. There's a whole paragraph just dedicated to listing the A/V components that went into the build, so I'm going to assume that means we should be very impressed with what's going on here. And while we're on the subject of tech, let's also note that the estate has a fully automated indoor/outdoor audio system, automatic window shades, fiber optic wiring to provide commercial-grade Wi-Fi, remote controlled lighting, full surveillance and security system, and automatic Toto toilets. To keep everything running if the grid goes down, there's both a solar array and 5000-kilowatt diesel generator.

Moving on once

again, we find a massage room, small home gym, and guest bedroom. Then we move back outside, where "air, water, and fire all take their place in the vast grounds." Though the residence was constructed in 2005, we're told many of the palms used for the landscape are more than 50 years old, while "picturesque specimen plantings surround the vanishing edge pool and spa with laminar fountains." We also see the "charming children's playhouse" surrounded by shrubbery, along with some more aerial shots to highlight the guest house and 1275-square foot garage with granite floors and a six-door commercial refrigerator.

Public records list Harry Rady, an asset manager whose LinkedIn profile says his specialty is "focusing on high net worth investors," as the current owner of the estate. The property has been on- and off-market several times dating back to 2018, with asking prices as high as \$14,990,000 and as low as \$7,895,000. The current listing, which went live in late December, seeks a sale price of \$9.8 million. ■

the kind of guy who checked the coin chutes of pay phones, and just automatically felt under couch cushions.

have problems of leaking water this time of the year."

The plaza's closure due to an infrastructural assessment by *Proteccion Civil* has affected the more than 300 people who work there. Luis Matus, who works in a school uniform workshop, was not directly affected by the accident, but even so, he says, "Economically, it's going to affect us because we won't have work."

The damage assessment will help determine what might happen to the building. Meanwhile, Santiago will do some assessing of his own. "All the equipment I work with is heavy machinery. They are expensive pieces. I haven't worked on my inventory, but losses are at least up to hundreds of thousands" of pesos. "Without my equipment, I can't work."

That same day, another two people died in Tijuana after being dragged by water currents. One body was found in the working-class neighborhood Mariano Matamoros in the east of the city; the other in Colonia Aviasion, near Tijuana's Country Club.

Caparell LLC ("Defendant") did not comply with California law in the operation of the Reiss hotel. Defendant denies having any liability or committing any wrongdoing whatsoever.

On December 17, 2021, the Hon. Eddie C. Sturgeon granted preliminary approval of this class action settlement. A Final Approval Hearing has been set for **April 15, 2022 at 8:30 a.m.** in Department 67 of the San Diego County Superior Court, 330 West Broadway, San Diego, California 92101. You do not need to appear at this hearing in order to receive your compensation.

The residential president

I was reminded of my meeting with President Jimmy Carter the other day when news broke that the organization he's intimately involved with, Habitat For Humanity, had come up with their first-ever 3-D printed house. It's a three-bedroom, two-bath home basically made of concrete, which they built in Williamsburg, Virginia. It took them just 12 hours to build, as opposed to the four weeks that Habitat would normally require. I mean, this has to be a game-changer, and not just for Habitat.

Like everybody, I reckon Mr. Carter has to

be the best ex-president ever. But that reckoning has had a personal aspect ever since I turned up in 1990 southeast of Tijuana, where the Carters were helping 3000 volunteers build hundreds of houses. It was dusk. I had just missed a beautiful candlelight procession of thanks through the hills of Tijuana. In fact, I thought I had missed everything, but then I heard this *tap tap tap* coming from inside one of the unfinished houses. I climbed up through the rubble to where this one light was shining

dankly in the dusk, and saw a lone man with a hammer working on some framing. I couldn't tell who it was until I knocked and walked through the door.

It was Jimmy Carter, with hammer, nails, and a piece of timber. Alone. No guards, no Secret Service as far as I could tell. Just him and his hammer in the house. I introduced myself and we talked as he worked on, racing the fading daylight. The guy has been building houses for poor people since he and Roselynn founded the Jimmy and Roselynn Carter Work Project in 1986, two years after they

started with Habitat for Humanity. They say he has worked with over 100,000 volunteers, and built or renovated nearly 5000 homes for people from his home state of Georgia to the Philippines to Africa to you name it. Every year, without respite.

So I stood there, and he just kept on tapping away while I tried to ask him questions that he hadn't been asked 100,000 times before. He was nice enough to let me carry on. But I didn't want to hold him up. So I said my goodbyes, and retreated as his *tap-tap-taps* got swallowed up in the earthy sounds of a working twilight and melded with chat

and laughs and dog yelps and far-off yips of coyotes and kids' giggles and *ranchero* music on someone's radio. And somewhere, the smell of carne asada wafted forth. I tried to print it all — in 3-D, natch — on my brain, so I would remember the moment.

I don't know what else Jimmy Carter has done with his life. OK, yes I do. But this was enough for me. I walked slowly up the shadowy hill, marveling at the ecosystem that one man can create — drawing along a comet-stream of

good people behind a beautiful idea.

I doubt the whole 3-D innovation will change that one iota.

Chillin' and struttin' at the beach

My good neighbor Kevin and I are walking into the ocean, towards the white waves of a gray winter's day. Water temp is high fifties. Knife-like breeze makes the air feel colder than the water. "OMG!" says this girl, huddling with her boyfriend against the wind. But here's the thing: once you've decided to jump in, it already doesn't feel so bad.

Kevin and I started this daily ocean body-surf routine back in the summer, and the interesting thing is that as the temps have dropped, both beneath and above the water's surface, we've kind of gotten used to them — once we've taken the initial plunge, anyway, and as long as we don't keep our

our thing in front of these landlubbers." The literature backs him up. Cold water swimming gives you a natural high, improves your circulation, increases your libido(!), burns calories, reduces stress, boosts your immune system, and activates your "feel-good" endorphins. Not only that, but today, Kevin is talking all about "anticipatory thermogenesis." "It's a Pavlovian response to the expectation of going into cold water," he says. 

WM: Oh, I see. This is about the Babbitt statue. TL: I thought we were tearing down our monuments to traitors these days, not putting them up.

Lester Bangs: Who wants to...*hic*...know?

WM: Walter Mencken, San Diego Reader. Big fan. LB: The Reader? The most ironically named publication in San Diego history? That's still a going concern? When The Door has been closed lo these many long years? Wonders never start. You guys always were the alternative

to the alternative weeklies; figures you'd survive the Big Businification of media. I'll say this for the *Reader*: it comes out every week, but only once. So there's a kindness.

WM: As I recall, you called Lou Reed "a deteriorating

silhouette of a star" when you met him, and everyone knows you thought he was the bee's knees. So I won't argue, except to say that we must be doing something right if we're still around. I'll even cut you some slack, seeing as how you've been dead for so long. Because really, if you'd been around to see the internet come in, you might be a tad more impressed by our longevity.

LB: Correction: I was dead. Or at least, I was silent, which is the same thing for any writer who's in it for something more than a paycheck. WM: Banging the spirits

a little hard there, Spirit? I mean, Christmas was a week ago, and it's, what, eight in the morning? What are you drinking, anyway?

LB: Heh... "banging." As in, "Lester Banging." I suppose that's what passes for humor these days. It's Skrewball! Peanut butter whiskey! Invented right here in Ocean Beach! It's like that old commercial for Reese's Peanut Butter Cups: "Hey jerkface, you've glopped your peanut butter in my whiskey!" "On the contrary, numbnuts, you've sloshed your whiskey in my peanut butter!" *Gulp*, *munch*... delicious! Two great tastes that taste great together! God, that really was the end of reality-based advertising, wasn't it? A year later, and we had "Coke is it." Never mind what it is. From there, it was a long, fast slide to "Brand X: it's about Y." Bottoms up before we bottom out! [Chugs from bottle.]

WM: Why stop at just two great tastes? I was

just thinking: given your fondness for grape cough syrup, you could go on to invent the PB&J cocktail. Is *that* the urgent message of goodwill that has you back among the living and threatening to topple that lamppost?

LB: Philistine. I do not profane my chemical romances by writing about them. They are the secret wellspring that permit me to commune with Burroughs and company, to produce the precious prose that punctures the pomposity of pop, punk, and all the rest of it. 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Slain Capitol protestor honored by community for championing counterculture

"Ocean Beach has a long, proud history of political protest, peaceful and otherwise," says Fred Hippy, publisher of the OB Fishwrap. "We threw rocks at cops during the Easter and Labor Day riots of 1968. And remember the jetty riots of 1970? The city tried to turn us into another marina/hotel district, and we fought back. First, we organized nightly digs to undo the work being done by the Army Corps of Engineers. Then we occupied the Corps' crane and threw rocks and bottles at the pigs who tried to drive us back. When they posted guards on their tractor, we firebombed it. Then we smashed up cop cars and fought in the streets long enough to buy time for our legal efforts to block the project, which were ultimately successful. And of course, we burned a cop car and fought the riot police to a standstill during the Collier Park riot of 1971. Sometimes, when you want to speak truth to power, you have to use force as part of your effort. Ashli Babbitt understood that. Like so many OB misfits before her, she knew that the system is rigged in favor of the status quo, and that while

go go up to the Whiskey to hear it, or get it sent to me at Creem's offices in Detroit, or even descend into some grotty black basement on the Lower East Side to write it up for The Village Voice, God rest its soul. WM: You mean Ocean Beach.

LB: I mean Baker Beach. Many a town has been renamed for its favorite son, and it's only a matter of time before the residents of this hippie 👼 daydream of a neighborup to what

Matt Baker from Ocean Beach has accomplished. The most metal moment for San Diego music, and maybe rock and roll in general, since onetime Coronado resident Jim Morrison dangled his dongle onstage in Miami. WM: Oh, no. You don't mean...

LB: I abso-diddly-dutelydo. I have always, always championed rock's essential right to be fun and dumb, even and especially in the face of endless preening opposition about how all art has a political character. I'm sorry, but Metallica playing "One," a song about a wounded vet begging for death, at the

Grammys is not a political act, no matter how harrowing the subject matter. It's an audition for an award from the recording industry. Business as usual. A Grammy is just a particularly valuable piece of marketing material. You want to know what has a really political character? Politics. Recognizing that seemingly screamingly obvious fact is what makes Baker a genius. He walked into that Board of Supervisors meeting on August 17 and laid down the vocal track for a Grade-A banger of a protest anthem. Dude is the absolute face of rock and roll, 2021. Hell, he's

the face of 2021, period, full stop, hit send, and turn off the replies. All he needed was for a guy like Andre Antunes to come along and put it to music, and Antunes, being no fool, did just that. This is how art happens. Just listen. [Pulls out iPhone, opens YouTube to Antunes' "Covid Rant goes METAL (San Diego Board of Supervisors meeting Remix)."]

WM: Apple? Really? LB: No choice. Total control of the afterlife market. Anyway. Baker comes in with that low, mournful whistle at the outset, and everybody sits up. What is this shit? I mean, these

poor public officials have been sworn at, screamed at, insulted, threatened, you name it. You're a public servant, you gotta deal with the public, whatever. But whistling? What gives? And then he draws in that big sighing breath, all weariness and resolve, and begins, low and slow, but gradually building in volume and pitch. It's showtime. [Whistling]

That is the wind That is the wind of time That is the wind of history That is the wind blowing through your ancestors' bones, begging you to do the right thing

Now, normally, I'd

wave that away as the worst sort of portentous world-historical bullshit. Except yeah, that's the sort of language that's surrounded this thing from the beginning: global pandemic, unprecedented times, more Americans dead than in all the wars combined, our moral duty to our fellow man, etc. etc. Baker's just playing along. And then the real theater begins: this guy breaking in with, "Sir, can you please state your name for the record?" Baker doesn't miss a blankety-blank beat, he keeps his cadence and replies, just as natural as ever you please, before

going back to that ominous whistle.

That is the wind that Matt Baker is calling upon, from Ocean Beach

Ocean Beach! Where the most famous resident, The OB Spaceman, spent the latter part of his life handing out tickets for when the aliens came to take the lucky ones away! Fantastic! And that's when Antunes stops his minor-key, echo-heavy, scene-setting noodling and starts thumping the strings, and Baker kicks it into second gear:

The wind that is blowing through the black people through the white people through the Chinese people through the Mexican Americans, through the people that built this building with their bare hands to raise up this nation...They are begging you, they are blowing through your veins, and they should be putting a tingle up the spine of your back, and they should be begging you to do the right thing...

Hilarious. Look where he starts: Black people — the group with the lowest vaccination rate in San Diego, just under half. Then he goes onto the whites, just to show he's not pandering, before moving on to the Chinese

and the Mexican Americans and "the people who built this building with their bare hands." Now we don't have a whole heck of a lot of Chinese people in San Diego, and the ones we do have are mostly vaccinated, so what's that about? Ooh, there's that word, about. Maybe those ad guys were onto something. It's about historically oppressed minorities is what it's about. The people the ruling class has always been comfortable controlling and exploiting. The people whose hopes and dreams and desires rock and roll has always prided itself for representing. That's why he moves on to manual laborers — another routinely exploited demo, this time along economic lines. And suddenly, all anyone who's been paying attention can think about are those Met Gala photos with the rich white attendees smiling for the camera and the POC staff all in masks. All they can think about is that photo of Fauci maskless at a ballgame during lockdown, or Newsom maskless at The French Laundry, or San Fran's Mayor Breed maskless at a club

concert. Baker is talking to the same Board of Supervisors that said racism and inequity were public health crises, so he's taking his stand with the minorities and the impoverished they so ardently support. Rock on! And now Antunes starts to shred just a little bit, as Baker gets apocalyptic:

You're about to open a pit of hell

Well now, that sounds extreme. But rock 'n roll has always been devil music, am I right? And here's the best part: he's serious! See what I mean about gloriously dumb? Here we go:

You do not get a vaccine passport put on us

You know the population is in control

You know that the people, the politicians, once you get a power you will never relinquish it

Yeah, see also, Patriot Act, government surveillance of citizens, etc. etc. etc. But Baker's not working in the arena of ideas and policy, because he knows that makes for crap rock. He needs concrete images. Or, ha ha, marble images:

Do you think the four feet of marble that holds you above high in this chamber

will help you from the fate of humanity which you are unleashing?

And this is my favor-

ite part. It's a rhetorical question. It's obviously a rhetorical question. So he pauses for effect, because no answer is necessary. Except this is rock and roll, so an answer is totally necessary, and his audience in the cheap seats doesn't let him down. Rock and roll abhors silence the way nature abhors a vacuum, and so into the silence of that rhetorical pause comes rushing the great Cry of the People: NOOOOOO. And Baker is ready for them, and Antunes is ready for them, and BOOM goes the dynamite, and the guitar is like the devil's own thudding heartbeat, rising up from below like the great satanic NON SERVIAM that is rock's absolutely bedrock foundational axiom:

Noooooooo! It won't! Your children and your children's children will be subjugated

They will be asked, 'How many vaccines have you had? Have you been a good little Nazi?'

Hail Fauci, Hail Fauci, Hail Fauci, Hail Fauci!

Now, ordinarily, I'm as tired of labeling the opposition Nazis as the next dead person, even if vaccine passports do call to mind the classic request, "Papers, please." But again, Baker and his Buddies are serious here, which is essential to what makes the song work. They're bringing up Nazis because of what came out of the trial of the good old God-blessed USA vs. actual Nazi war criminal Karl Brandt: the Nuremberg Code concerning permissible medical experimentation. It ain't law, but it ain't nothing, either.

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

Grammys issue statement defending nomination of local activist's metal rant



"We won't restrict the people who can submit their material for consideration. We won't look back at people's history." That was Recording Academy CEO Harvey Mason, Jr. last year, defending the Academy's nomination of both Louis CK and Marilyn Manson for Grammy awards, despite the fact that both have been accused of abusive behavior by multiple women. Now, Mason has been forced to reaffirm and expand on that position in light of the "Heavy Metal Single" nomination given to Matt Baker's August rant against the San Diego County Board of Supervisors regarding mandates for covid vaccines. The speech, colloquially known as the "Wind of Time" rant, was turned into a heavy metal anthem by You-Tuber Andre Antunes. It was later retitled "The Nuremberg Variations," due to Baker's claim that the Board was in violation of the Nuremberg Code, which was created by a war crimes tribunal following World War II in light of various Nazi atrocities. Released as a single, it quickly sold more than 7 million copies, and has been streamed over 100 million times on Spotify.

"Clearly, Mr. Baker has touched a cultural nerve," read Mason's statement. "And heavy metal has always had as its mission the touching of that nerve, the furious rallying of the outcast and those who are despised by so-called 'civilized society.' The Establishment told Matt Baker that his time had expired. Clearly, that was not actually the case. Society has tried to censor heavy metal before, deeming it a threat to morals and decency. The Academy didn't yield to the Powers that Be then, and we're not about to start now. This is heavy metal, people. You may not agree with Mr. Baker's ideas, but you can't argue with his lyrics and performance. And that's what we're nominating."

flag fly. Like it says on the shirt, man. Like it says on the shirt. [Bangs gestures to his Freedom or Death t-shirt1

WM: So you think Baker is right that...

LB: Right? Who said anything about right? Was Lou Reed right when he said "Hey babe, take a walk on the wild side?" That's not my department. I don't give a hoot and a holler if he's right. He's rock. [Passes out.]

[Matt Baker arrives on the scene, dressed like Fat Thor from Avengers: Endgame.]: Happy New Year! -Walter Mencken

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



San Diego. Slowly at first, then more rapidly in the weeks to come, sunrise will arrive earlier with each passing day. By March 20, the sun will be rising a full hour earlier than it does now. The earlier sunrises are mostly a consequence of the sun's apparent movement from the southern sky toward the northern sky from December to June. You can keep track of that movement by noting where the sun rises (or sets) over a period of many weeks from a fixed vantage point, such as your home.

Where's Venus These Days? It's nowhere to be seen, and for good reason. Venus reaches conjunction, 5° north of the Sun, on January 8th, which means that it lies on the far side of the sun and is hidden by the sun's glaring light. Venus will make its first appearance as a newly reborn "evening star," visible in the west after sundown, about a month from now.

The memory board photos that adorn the opening credits looked too real to be Photoshopped. Sure enough, this is the genuine thing, a family affair built around the Basco Brothers, Philippines' answer to the 4 Marx Brothers. Duke's (Dante Basco doing triple duty as star, writer, and director) one-take arrival at the wedding that opens the show is a heartfelt homage to Henry's table-hop through the Copa in Goodfellas. The Bascos are "jungle Asians," crazy middle-class Filipinos slung on the dark side of the family tree. The brothers are all assigned a chunk of the narrative with youngest brother David (Dionysio Basco) as the least developed sibling whose pointless food porn fantasy positions him as the Zeppo in the bunch. Its lightning pace makes it impossible to predict what's around the corner. A business trip to Manilla and the impromptu visit to a church funeral that ensues is one of the many unexpected detours that give the film its favorable flow. The script occasionally feels as if writers Arianna, Dante, and Darion Basco first came up with a kicker and worked backwards, i.e. how did a very pregnant first date wind up at the family breakfast table? If it's laughter and surprises you're after, this is a sweet slice of fabulousness. 2021. — S.M. ★★★ (EDWARDS MIRA MESA)

Licorice Pizza — Whither were thee in '73? Watching American Graffiti. It's no coincidence that Paul Thomas Anderson nostalgic tale of coming of age in the Valley opens the same year as George Lucas' terrestrial masterwork (and with a filched cherry bomb in the boy's room). The controversial age gap between our heretofore unknown leads - Alana (Alana Haim) has at least a decade over 15-yearold Gary (Cooper Hoffman) — isn't the prickliest thorn on this wandering vine. Theirs is a zipless pursuit set 50 years in the past, a time when an underage male looking to score with a chick nearly twice his age was held in high regard. Anderson set the bar high with Boogie Nights and a woke spin on the time frame would ring insincere. Compare this to John Michael Higgins' Jerry Frick, an entrepreneur whose over-enunciating obsession with mail order "Oriental" brides isn't so much offensive as it is umbday. The anecdotally-correct celebrity lookalikes never fail to amuse: not since I Love Lucy have Ms. Ball (Christine Ebersole) and William Holden (Sean Penn) shared billing. It's the questionable nature of our central characters (and a lack of running time-management skills) that lost me. The entrepreneurial lad wants so much to bag Alana that for a brief moment he considers fashioning a skin flick around her while she in turn becomes an angry star-effer. A mixed bag destined to accrue enough critical one-liners to convince theatregoers and VOD consumers of its genius. 2021. — S.M. ★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

The Lost Daughter — A woman's picture that doesn't adhere to a "chick flick" formula or detail a reckoning with one's past that ends inevitably in terminal disease. It began for Leda (Olivia Coleman and, in flashback, Jessie Buckley) as a quiet sabbatical at a picturesque seaport in southern Italy. The mincing English professor (Olivia Coleman), divorced and estranged from her two daughters, finds her solace ruptured by a family of parnevu deplorables on loan from Queens who overtake the resort. After a hellacious first encounter — she refuses to move her beach chair - Leda slowly warms to the family, most notably Nina (Dakota Johnson), the tribe's ravenhaired temptress. The more she observes through her black, size 114 sunglasses, the more she begins questioning her own worth and the "crushing responsibility" that is being a parent. Written and directed with reserve to spare, one look at Maggie Gyllenhaal's complex, masterfully executed debut assures us that she's spent her years before the camera paying close attention to what goes on behind it. 2021. — S.M. ★★★★ (LAND-MARK HILLCREST)

Nightmare Alley — What made the 1946 adaptation of William Lindsay Gresham bleak tale of life far, far under the big top so unique was the curious combination of director Edmund Goulding (acclaimed for such "woman's pictures" as Grand Hotel and Dark Victory), the backing of a Hollywood major (20th Century Fox), and Tyrone Power, the handsome leading man contracted to star as the mentalist, fallen on hard times, reduced to entertaining the crowd by biting the heads off live poultry. Bradley Cooper cooks up a chilly con's carny while Cate Blanchett's overworked vamp on Barbara Stanwyck provides the actress with a rare fizzle. It looks great Guillermo del Toro casts a mahoganyblush over production designer Tamara Deverell's spacious art deco sets. The story is ripe for remaking, but at a bloated 150 minutes. I'm not certain this is the film to do it. With Rooney Mara as the sole softening agent and Richard Jenkins, never nastier. 2021. — S.M. ★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

The Tender Bar — Director George Clooney hit a grand slam his first time at bat (Confessions of a Dangerous Mind). then set the blandness bar high with Good Night, and Good Luck, and has gone down swinging ever since (The Monuments Men, The Ides of March). This steeped-insentimentality adaptation of newspaperman, novelist J.R. Moehringer's quest for a daddy figure never really allows us to get to know the sagacious surrogate father's that populate his uncle Charlie's (Ben Affleck) corner tavern. Screenwriter William Monahan (The Departed) alternates time frames between Young JR (Daniel Ranieri) and Jr. (Tye Sheridan) his postgraduate self on a commuter train to the future, next stop: an interview at Yale. When asked, his first name stands for "Junior," a sobriquet he adopted to spite a father (Max Martin) who barely qualified as a guest in his life. Affleck's Charlie is every young man's favorite uncle: not only will he let you lick the foam off his boilermaker, you'll leave his bar instilled with a proper respect for women. For once, the romantic subplot, this one between Jr. and Sidney (Briana Middleton), the daughter of haughty magazine publishers, is an oasis amidst familiarity, 2021. — S.M. ★★ (LAND-MARK HILLCREST)

The Tragedy of Macbeth — A standing joke/disclaimer: I probably would have liked Shakespeare more had his plays been written by someone else. If the film's the thing, my appreciation of his work doesn't extend beyond the films of Welles and Kurosawa. To hold Joel Coen to those unattainable standards would be unfair. So it's been a bad holiday season for the Bard, what with Spielberg's pointless restaging of West Side Story and now this equally quizzical endeavor. It follows The Man Who Wasn't There as Joel Coen's second solo director's credit and the first without the collaboration of his younger brother Ethan. This Christmas, the elder Coen gifted his quirky bride with the role of a lifetime. (Rumor has it that Frances McDormand insisted that she wear her own clothes.) Fooz having a ball

"Him [Jimmy Fallon] and [Foo Fighters frontman] Dave Grohl are good friends, so I think they looked around and tried to find Foo Fighters tribute bands, and it was slim pickings," says Fooz Fighters guitarist Dave Tishenkel. His group recently appeared on the Fallon-produced Clash of the Cover Bands series that aired its first season on the E! Network. "I'd have to apologize to all my friends in New York if they [the TV show producers] had to send us to a movement coach and teach us to rock out."

The program's premise was originally under wraps, so the band's attempt to figure out exactly what they were being interviewed for was a slow process that teased their curiosity. "We thought, you know, these tribute things are usually hokey in these competitions. Just somebody exploiting people to get people to their venue, or something like that. But they kept giving us more information, then asking us for more Zoom calls and more interviews. Then they said, 'Hey, you guys are in. You have to come out to Hollywood this week.' They did hair and makeup. It's basically American Idol-type bands, and then it starts, it's real bands playing real music."

Celebrity judges for the competition included Meghan

Trainor and Mount Carmel graduate Adam Lambert, who gave the group a standing ovation. One episode pitted the Fooz against Blank 281, who pay tribute to Poway's Blink-182. In the end, Tishenkel's band won the Best '90s Rock Band round, and made it as far as the finals. The Clash of the Cover Bands winner was a Dolly Parton tribute, which earned a \$25,000 award.

Given the deep dive that some tribute band members go into, I said I was surprised that a Hole tribute featuring a faux Courtney Love hasn't attacked the Fooz. "No, that hasn't happened," says Tishenkel. "It could be interesting, though. Or if a Nirvana tribute somehow played out the whole marriage thing." But unlike some tribute bands, the Fooz don't immerse themselves in their alter egos — speaking in accents and performing shows in character. Aside from lead vocalist Nicky Rich's passing resemblance to Dave Grohl, and the Ace Frehley sticker on guitarist Brent Wright's axe (a la Chris Shiflett of the Foo Fighters), there are no visual synchronizations. "Nobody's gonna mistake me for Pat Smear," Tishenkel laughs. "We just really like playing the music. What's the difference between seeing a cover band do a bunch of other people's songs and focusing on one

band, really?"

So how does a tribute band get work when their inspiration is still active? "I think a lot of times we get booked in places where the Foo Fighters don't necessarily play, and

> it's a huge draw for them. I've played the House of Blues in San Diego, and when that's packed, that is massive and fun and just so much energy. Then you go play the House of Blues in Houston, and it's ten times that. It seems like there's almost 10,000 people in that place. And then when you're done, you do meet and greets, and I'm like, 'Wait, I don't understand, I'm just

some schmoe who's going to be picking up dog poop in his backyard tomorrow."

Once they get done walking their dogs, the Fooz Fighters will play downtown's House of Blues on Thursday, January 6, along with Badfish: A Tribute to Sublime.

songwriter since early childhood, Julia Sage plays Chilean folk, blues, and Americana. She performs bilingual songs as a solo artist, as part of Grampadrew's Flim Flam Revue, and with her band the Bad Hombres. Their debut album was recorded in 2018 and released the following year. Her new album Desnuda was recorded locally at Chaos Recorders with Christopher Hoffee, who plays percussion on the title track.

"We recorded three of the singles a long time ago now," says Sage. "Ni de Aquí, Ni de All á' was our first one, recorded in August 2018. We didn't even have a drummer back then yet." Tom Peart ended up playing drums on the next two singles, "Ahuevonao" and "Wondrous Woman," both recorded in May 2019, previous to Peart's departure from the Bad Hombres. wrote, recorded, and produced my own solo album *Midnight* Songs in the Time of Corona Vol. 1, which got nominated for the SDMAs [San Diego Music Awards] this year. It was a huge learning curve, because I don't know the first thing about sound engineering, and all I had at home was an old Mac, GarageBand, and one good microphone. I'm still supposed to record Vol. 2, but this took the back seat for a bit because we were finally starting to be able to perform again."

After playing a few postpandemic shows with her band, solo, and as a duo with whole album. I just released it, a little over three years after we recorded the first song, and almost two months after my mother's passing this year. It is a tribute to her, mostly, but also dedicated in my heart to both my parents and anyone - friends, family, new friends — who ever supported my music and my creativity. It also happened to coincide with the full moon, which has always been a very creative time for me."

All are present on the track "Amor Universal," which Sage says "talks about how all of us are connected through something bigger than us, no

Matthew Strachota, Sage finally completed recording the Desnuda album by returning to Chaos Recorders in October 2021. Guest musicians include John Meeks, who plays horns on "I Shouldn't Stay." "As you can imagine, I was elated that we were able to finally finish the

The Frequency Conspiracy features members of Raven, Last in Line, 24-7 Spyz, and Seventrain. Their *Quarantine Covers* album contains "Sailing" (Christopher Cross), "Carry On Wayward Son" (Kansas), "Life in the Fast Lane" (Eagles), "Hell Bent For Leather" (Judas Priest), and other tribute tunes. Guest players include singer Andrew Freeman (Last in Line, Offspring), bassists John Gallagher (Raven) and David Pastorius (Pat Travers, Tech N9ne), guitarists Joshua Jones (Poster Child) and Christophe Godin (Morgibl, Metal Kartoon), keyboardist Craig Soderberg (Shockhead), and Conspiracy drummer Joel Maitoza's 24-7 Spyz bandmate Rick Skatore. According to Maitoza, "I decided to contact some musicians I've always wanted to work with and record an album of cover tunes with

a hard rock metal vibe. The songs are some hand-picked favorites of mine that I thought everyone involved could have some fun with and the fans would enjoy hearing. It all started with releasing two videos in 2020 featuring Last in Line/Lynch Mob vocalist Andrew Freeman, and it just took off from there. I recorded the drum tracks in the studio by myself without any music, just a click track and the arrangement in my head. Then, I sent the tracks out to the individual musicians I wanted to have perform on the songs. The artists recorded their parts in their own home studios and sent them back to me. It was amazing to hear how each musician interpreted and performed their parts, and the songs just evolved."



HEMISPHERE

Promoting the spirit of unity, diversity, and equality, Hemispheres features openly gay members, including bandleader and founder Rob Shinno. The group draws on rock, pop, jazz, fusion, and metal for inspiration and has played at prestigious events such as the Newport Beach Jazz Festival. Their 2020 album *American Dreams* includes guest players like Grammy winning percussionist Tommy Aros (Fattburger), vocalist Rebecca Jade (2020 San Diego Music Award Artist of the Year), singer Leonard Patton, trumpeter Derek Cannon, a guitar solo from Patrick Yandall, and local jazz star Peter Sprague served as engineer and mixer. As the band works on their upcoming

Unity album with Rebecca Jade and other guests, Rob Shinno reports that "the American Dreams album got 400K-plus views and streams, and got on 55-plus stations on NACC radio. [I] saw the 'Home' video hit 55K streams on YouTube today, and we sold out our Humphreys show in October. In 2022, we have SXSW [South By Southwest music festival] in Austin TX, the Unity release with Peter Sprague and Bernie Grundmann, a special original artist showcase called Dudes and Divas hosted by Donna Larsen and I, and the Hemisphere Art & Dance live show. So, great things in the works."



DEAD FEATHER MOON

Most members of North County psychedelic alt-country rockers Dead Feather Moon grew up around Vista. Since making their live debut in 2009 at 710 Beach Club in Pacific Beach, they've gone on to become regulars at the Belly Up, the Casbah, and other blue chip local venues. A debut EP was released in 2009, Leave Heaven to the Birds, followed by the full-length Dark Sun, tracked in 2011 at White Horse Recorders with producer Aaron Swanton. A little over a year later, it won Best Alternative Album at the San Diego Music Awards, where

the group also got a nomination for Best Alternative band. In 2014, they were named Best Alternative at the SDMAs, which offered the band another nomination nod in 2019. Their 1.1-song album *The Finder* is several years old now, but they dropped a pandemic project with unreleased concert tracks, *Life In Lighter Times*, as well as digitally offering several unreleased songs. A new single called "Teenager" debuted on 91X's *Loudspeaker* local music program in late 2020. They'll appear on Friday, January 7, at the Casbah in Little Italy.



INUS

Innerds was founded by Brandon Relf (Sleeping People) and Bobby Bray (The Locust, Holy Molar). By 2016, with the addition of Chad Deal (Phantom Twins) on bass, the band had changed its name to INUS (The Institute for Navigating the Universal Self), describing their sound as "pre-postapocalyptic, post-honky-tonk-prog-skronk, space-tropicalia, math-lounge." Their album title Western Spaghettification is a play on words intertwining Stephen Hawking's concept of spaghettification (what theoretically happens when you cross the event horizon of a black hole) and vintage spaghetti westerns, which were filmed in Italy with Italians portraying Mexicans to save money.

The album was recorded at UCSD's Conrad Prebys Music Center and K-Street Studios and mastered by Tom Erbe (Morton Feldman, Alvin Lucir). Their most recent release was a surreal video for their track "We Are Our Computers' Genitalia." They'll appear at the Kensington Club on January-6-(canceled), for a bill that includes experimental musician and cult performance artist Gary Wilson, who was considered "lost" until discovered working at a College Grove nudie club by private detectives hired by a reissue record label. Opening act Peymaar plays alien funk and cosmic punk.



TIM FLANNERY

Former San Diego Padre, longtime local musician, and son of a Kentucky preacher Tim Flannery plays an acoustic blend of folk and country music. In 2013, he performed on a CD called *Angel Song*s, a charity album recorded to raise funds for Newtown, CT victims that also includes locals Lisa Sanders and Randi Driscoll. By late 2014, he had officially retired from his job as third base coach for the San Francisco Giants and announced plans to increase focus on his growing career as a singer-songwriter. The following year, he released *Three Ring Circus*, on which he was backed by his band Lunatic Fringe,

featuring Douglas Pettibone, Dennis Caplinger, and Dean Smith. Flannery will appear at the Java Joe's Reunion concert, taking place Saturday, January 8 at Pilgrim United Church of Christ in Carlsbad. Presented by San Diego Folk Heritage, the event features a celebratory gathering of players associated with the iconic coffeehouse venue which hosted so many future stars at various San Diego locales. Performers will include Billy Galewood, Berkley Hart, Gregory Page, Lisa Sanders, and Brown Sugar.

Chamber comforts

After seven days of rain and with a few more to go, my classical music habit has turned toward chamber music. When the sun is shining and the San Diego weather is living up to its reputation, chamber music is rarely on my mind. Now, with the skies gray, the Christmas tree still standing, and a warm glow stirring in the fireplace, chamber music is my aural tomato soup and grilled cheese. Here are three pieces of chamber music comfort food.

Edward Elgar's Piano Quintet in A minor is near the top of the list. Does anyone know more about gray skies than an Englishman? As it turns out, this music was composed in the summer of 1918. This makes no difference to me. I never consider the original context of a composition to be of any merit. What is of

merit is my current context, and how the music colors my aggressively subjective experience. This piece by Elgar stirs both my mind and heart, and I like that. Some music goes straight to the heart, such as Tchaikovsky, while other music engages the mind, such as Brahms. Elgar has always appealed to both.

I have often wondered if Mozart might be my best friend. While that may sound as if I am a misanthropic uber-curmudgeon, hear me out. Mozart is the 1st Corinthians Chapter 13 of composers. He "does not delight in evil, but rejoices in the truth." He "always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres." Do you have a friend like that? Nowhere are Mozart's virtues more evident than in the Clarinet Quintet in A major. The opening movement creates confidence in the listener. Here is a friend that can be trusted. The second movement invites us to share our darkest deepest secrets, knowing that all will be forgiven. The third movement builds on the trust and intimacy of the first two movements. It is an invitation to see how far we can go together. That is a best friend.

The third piece is Mendelssohn's String Octet in E-flat major. This might be the most optimistic music ever written. I've expressed my displeasure with Mendelssohn in the past, in particular the middle movements of his Symphony No. 4. That being said, the opening movement of the octet is probably my favorite Mendelssohn music. It strides forward with such optimistic conviction that I

can't help but be persuaded.

Despite Ludwig Wittgenstein's misgivings — "Mendelssohn isn't so much a peak as a plateau" — the Mendelssohn Octet is a masterpiece. I am compelled to put a few more logs on the fire when listening. This is chamber music, but it burns bright. The second and third movements can't

quite compete with the brilliance of the first movement but they do not disappoint. The five unfinished books languishing on my computer are my personal testament to the difficulty of fulfilling the initial inspiration of the muse. Mendelssohn fulfills the promise of the inspired first movement with a complete piece of music.



■lickety-clack along the track! We're rolling! The Pacific Surfliner snakes through the hills around Sorrento Valley, slowly, methodically rounding the canyon curves like a

hunting dog following his nose. That distant horn I hear? Oh wow. It's us! It's a good feeling. Specially when Jason the barman announces that the Market Cafe is now open for breakfast and lunch downstairs.

I lucked out with the carriage I climbed aboard back at the Santa Fe Depot. It was also the dining car. Okay, "dining" maybe elevates it just a bit too high. This is a snack car,

with pre-cooked food aboard that you, like, microwave and unpack. We're not talking fifteen gastro-spectacular courses served on white linen aboard the Orient Express here. Still, I'm thinking: it's a train, we're on the move, it has food aboard, and, hey hey!, drink, like grog. Okay,

it's a little discouraging that all the dining tables are blocked by a tape across them saying, "No Sitting!"

"Since Covid," says Jason the bar guy. "You have to take everything back upstairs to your seats." Bummer. We don't have tables up there either — not that I can see, anyway. So breakfast is gonna be a balance-on-the-knee job? Looks like it. I join the little line at the counter, and start checking what's on for

chow as we rock along. Let's start with breakfast. I'm glad to see prices actually aren't outrageous. A breakfast burrito runs \$4.50. So does a hot breakfast sandwich. Yogurt parfait with fruit is \$4. And if you want more hot stuff, the Angus cheeseburger runs \$5.75, as does the jalapeño cheeseburger. There's a pretty delicious-looking

Of course I can't leave without drinking something. Coffee (\$2), because this is pretty-much breakfast, and a beer, because, well, they're featuring Stone

Brewery, my Arrogant Bastard heroes. I've never been to their Escondido HQ, but that's because I know that the famous beer gardens would be

> dangerous, like the Hotel California. I could check out any time I liked, but I could never leave. What I can't ignore: they have a nice big 22-ounce bottle of Stone Tangerine Express hazy IPA going

Ending the year with Pozoleria Doña Maria

Pozolería Doña María; 1660 Broadway, Chula Vista. Not that I needed encouragement, but the late year rain and chill reminded me that New Year's is the traditional time of year to feast on pozole. Which meant the thing to do was aim my car south, toward Pozoleria Doña Maria.

Tijuana enthusiasts may be familiar with the popular Zona Centro hominy soup destination, but this year I went for its sister restaurant, on Broadway in the southwest corner of Chula Vista. On both sides of the border, Doña Maria specializes in the Guerrero-style of *blanco* (white) pozole, which means its stock isn't flavored with either the green or red chili peppers of the *verde* and *rojo* styles. Rather than spice, it leans on the milky, white savor of pork broth to get the job done.

The job, of course, being to deliver warmth and comfort from the inside out (though I did wind up adding salsa to spice things up). Given that this year, the notion of comfort may once again include ordering to-go, I was heartened to find that this *pozeleria* has put some effort into streamlining its take-out operation. Customers continued to fill in around the

edges of its half-capacity dining room, while the center of the restaurant remained open to facilitate the funneling of bagged and sealed tubs of hot soup out the door.

Doña Maria offers two *pozole* options, each named for the meat mixed in with the kernels of



Guerrero-style *pozole blanco*, prior to adding red salsa to taste.

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

hominy. I continue to tell myself that, one of these days, I'm going to be a bolder food writer and try the *pozole surtido*, which would mean enjoying my soup with "mixed meats" including the pig's cheek, jowl, and tongue. This was not one of these days; once again, mine was a large order of the *de maciza pozole* (\$12.49), where *maciza* refers to pork cuts that are substantial and shreddable (think leg or shoulder).

Though I balked at what I am certain are delicious pork parts, I did venture past the *pozole* menu this visit, which forced me to realize that this place I think of as a soup restaurant actually does things well across the board. For about \$12 apiece, the place offers combination plates, each featuring an array of *antojitos*: enchilada, tostada, *sope*, and a corn tortilla beef flauta.

One key difference between the two combos is what tops each chicken enchilada: *combinado* number one gets covered in green sauce, while number two features black mole. I'm always game to sample a black mole (I'd label this one just above average). But perhaps more interesting is the other major difference: one of the restaurant's specialties is tostada *de pata*, one of those dishes which sounds better in Spanish than its English translation: tostada of pickled pig's feet. In this case, I was ready to dive in and try a pork preparation that's been, let us say, largely unembraced by the mainstream American palate. But in my combination, the pigs feet were replaced with shredded pork.

Most likely the restaurant ran out of pig's feet, but I like to imagine the person who took my phone order heard what is arguably the most gringo name of all time, and took it upon himself to spare me the pickled trotter. I might try again around some other holiday, but for now I can't complain: that plate of *antojitos* proved an excellent lunch with which to finish the year.

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Drinks All Around

t's like a Thin Mint Girl Scout cookie," says Claire Sexton, Bar Director at Kettner Exchange, about her cocktail, the Scouts Honor. The recipe was partially inspired by her own childhood shenanigans. "I was a very good cookie salesman back in the day! My dad's favorite was the

Thin Mint cookie. He used to keep them in the freezer, and I used to sneak down and eat them at night," she says, reminiscing. "So, this is like my Thin Mint milkshake cocktail." As someone who grew up eating Dairy Queen Dilly Bars, Sexton says with confidence, "If you like mint chocolate chip ice cream, this is for you." Mint leaves and crushed mint-chocolate cookie topping create a stark visual contrast with the cream-colored cocktail, which uses a clear spirit. "Copalli is a rum from Belize; they infuse it with cacao so it gives that chocolate taste to it," explains Sexton. "Then we're using a Tennessee dirty cream, which is like the 'classic' cream liqueur. And then crème de menthe, which is gonna be that minty flavor that you get behind there." And for this drink, she opts to use demerara for sweetness. "It's gonna have a richer flavor to it, it's a little bit thicker. So it's like a richer simple syrup, one made with dark sugar."

For the topping, "I wanted to do some sort of cookie crumble. And I was thinking of Irish coffees. And then

being at Erin Rose..." she says, thinking back to one of her favorite travel stops, a classic bar in New Orleans. "They do the best Irish coffee, with that cookie-coffee crumble on top of it. It's amazing. And I was like, 'I want to do something like that!" Avoiding the need for a blender, she uses crushed ice and cream liqueur to recreate the rich texture of ice cream. "All going back to the milkshake dreams... Boozy milkshakes. Nothing's better than a boozy milkshake."

An avid traveler, Sexton says she is "always doing R&D, all the time. My favorite thing to do is research and development, *aka* try everybody else's drinks," she jokes. "I did mess with the specs a lot; I tried to use crème de cacao at one point and then went back… there's always trial and error."

She cites Christmas indulgence as another motivation behind the Scouts Honor. "It's like you get to put your sweaters on, you're not in a bikini, let's have a cookie and a milkshake, ice cream — all those gluttonous things we like to do in the wintertime."

Bring kneepads for the Pacific bluefin

Dock Totals 12/26 – 1/1: 295 anglers aboard 19 half-day to three-day trips out of San Diego landings this past week caught 2 bonito, 43 calico bass, 2 halibut, 2 lingcod, 37 perch, 1080 rockfish, 51 sand bass, 34 sculpin, 46 sheephead, and 223 whitefish.

Saltwater: The year ended with a flourish for the fleet fishing midway down the coast of Baja in an area outside and a little north of Cedros Island. As it was a bluefin tuna bite, it seems a fitting end to the year. Weather conditions offshore have kept us kind of in the dark about the bluefin out around the Tanner and Cortez banks in U.S. water about 110 miles west of Point Loma, with few boats making the run and finding mostly small fish in the 15-to-25pound range. Where did those big tuna to 300 pounds go? Those boats running south found them. The 5-to-10-day boats running south for yellowfin and wahoo off Bahia Magdalena out to Alijos

Rocks saw some breezing schools of bluefin while running back up the coast for yellowtail, and soon reports of fish up to and over 200 pounds were coming in.

Though the big fish were found, the question is still valid. Bluefin never go away from our part of the ocean, not entirely. I'm sure, weather allowing, someone will get them biting again at Tanner. There are always some out there within reach, and unlike other tuna species more subject to favorable water temperatures, bluefin don't have to leave to survive. When we see them in the counts, it means they are close enough, given weather and fuel, and the operator is sure enough they have a good chance of putting anglers on them. In many cases, it is not worth the trek offshore to search them out — if, for instance, they are aware of an area of fish but options for targeting other species are slim to none if bluefin don't bite.

This past week, the Polaris Supreme and the Intrepid ran across bluefin and got the larger fish to 200 pounds off the mid-Baja peninsula, while the Royal Star went out to Tanner and caught smaller bluefin to 30 pounds or so. For months, the big bluefin were being caught at Tanner, and south meant yellowfin and dorado. That they are always around doesn't come with any guarantees. Typically, they will be where their food is. With fish that concentrate on sardines as the top of their dietary intake and feed in the top portion of the water column, it is a little easier to judge about where they will be given surface temperatures.

Most species make their migrations into our waters annually while following warmer water and bait. Pacific bluefin are not held to the same restrictions as their cold-blooded cousins, because bluefin tuna can create their own heat. Pacific bluefin tuna spawn from mid-April to June in the Sea of Japan and the southwestern North Pacific Ocean. Young bluefin — at about one year of age and barely larger than a football — migrate 5000 miles to the Eastern Pacific, primarily to the waters off California and Baja, and will remain in the area until sexually mature, between 5 and 7 years and between 140 to 300 pounds, when they then return across the Pacific to spawn. They are able to do this because they can dive deep to feed on pelagic crab, squid and other creatures still abundant in cooler water and deeper climes.

Yellowfin tuna, for example, cannot dive 3000 feet in a burst without having a heart attack, due to the extreme drop in temperatures that doesn't affect the endothermic bluefin. Yellowfin, like most fish, cannot retain the heat they produce as they swim. They lose their body heat as the warm blood courses through the muscles then circulates through the gills.



"We finished off the year with a bang. Ended up with 21 bluefin; 2 over 200lbs, 18 from 100-200lbs and 1 at 90lbs."

The thin capillary walls in the gills are perfect for the blood to pick up oxygen, but they also leave the blood exposed to the icy temperatures of the water.

To get to our area, Pacific bluefin travel through Arctic waters that sometimes reach temperatures close to 16 degrees Fahrenheit. When water temps drop below 64 degrees, most pelagic species we see during the summer/fall months have returned south to warmer climes - Yellowfin tuna are now being targeted off the southern half of the Baja peninsula. But like their relatives the Atlantic and southern bluefin, Pacific bluefin tuna have a circulatory system known as a countercurrent heat exchange system that enables them to navigate through cold water. Their warm veins leaving the muscles are situated right next to the cooler, incoming arteries so that the heat is passed from the veins

to the arteries in an efficient loop. Thus, heat remains in the muscle and never dissipates through the gills. And this is why bluefin can fight a longer, harder battle when hooked, often wearing out anglers and gear.

Typically, anglers targeting larger bluefin are advised to bring setups that can handle 100-pound test and above. Rods that allow the angler to use the leverage of the rail, or 'rail rods', are coupled with two-speed high-capacity reels. Often, during what are usually hours-long battles, the angler will kneel with the rod butt under their armpit with the rod on the rail and hold on with all their might while the behemoth tuna dives and runs, seemingly untiringly, until either the angler wins out or the tuna wears or chews through the line and escapes. On some trips, the big fish will bite, several will be hooked, and none or only a small percentage will be landed. Captains advise bringing the big gear or using rental setups, and bringing kneepads may be desirable, as roughened non-slip deck surfaces can be tough for an angler who is kneeling and fighting such an impressively strong fish.

Still, 2021 was a very good year for bluefin tuna for the fleet, with the long-range Polaris Supreme out of Seaforth Landing topping all boats with 3002 bluefin landed. Seaforth Landing boats, on mostly 1.5 to 3-day runs to Tanner and Cortez banks, recorded the most bluefin caught for the year by landing with 18,572 fish by year's end. This great bluefin fishing over the past few years may not last forever, as rising annual average water temps influence migratory patterns, but the odds are in favor of them not changing their pattern.

Albacore tuna, a white-meat species of tuna that used to be caught in the tens of thousands close to San Diego and was a mainstay of the commercial tuna industry in Southern California, was represented in the sport-fishing counts just once in 2021, one fish caught by an angler aboard the New Lo-An out of Point Loma Sportfishing. Due to a temperaturedriven migratory shift, albacore have been mostly caught in recent years offshore near the Washington-Oregon border. But bluefin have the adaptability to withstand the change, maintain their cross-Pacific migrations, and so remain in our neck of the woods for the foreseeable future. That they spawn in the Sea of Japan and return to the western Pacific to finish their growth cycle might be a good thing. With 300-400-pound fish causing so much pain, I can't imagine hanging on to a 900 pounder! The California state record bluefin tuna is 395.4 pounds; the world record Pacific bluefin tuna is 907 pounds.

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

Who Knew?

- The Saudis take their beauty contests seriously, it appears: judges at a competition northeast of Riyadh are cracking down on artificially enhanced contestants. The contest is part of the King Abdulaziz Camel Festival. Yes, the contestants are camels, the Associated Press reported, and 43 of them have already been disqualified. Camel breeders enter their most beautiful animals with the hope of winning \$66 million in prize money, but Botox injections, face lifts and other cosmetic changes will not be tolerated this year. How, you ask, are those procedures implemented? Breeders might stretch the lips and noses of their camels, inject their heads or lips with Botox, inflate body parts with rubber bands, and use fillers to relax their faces. "The club is keen to halt all acts of tampering and deception in the beautification of camels," the Saudi Press Agency said.

Merry Christmas!

- An unnamed mountain climber is a little richer this season after a cache of precious gems valued at \$84,350 was awarded to him by the Chamonix-Mont-Blanc council on Dec. 3. The climber found the emeralds and sapphires in 2013 as he scaled the tallest peak in western Europe; they apparently were debris from an airplane crash there in 1966, CNN reported. The original owner of the stones couldn't be located. The council split the booty with the climber and will display their half at the Chamonix Crystal Museum.

- A 50-year-old Italian dentist tried on Dec. 2 to dodge getting the COVID-19 vaccine but still gain a health pass by offering the health worker a silicone prosthetic arm for the jab, The Guardian reported. Italy recently cracked down on unvaccinated people at social, cultural and sporting events, so the man allegedly purchased a fake arm that may have cost him hundreds of euros. The medic, Filippa Bua, said she "felt offended as a professional. The color of the arm made me suspicious and so I asked the man to uncover the rest of his left arm. It was well made but it wasn't the same color." The unidentified man will face fraud charges, according to Luigi Icardi, the regional health councilor.

Wrong Place, Wrong Time

- Graham George Spencer of Singapore was walking with a friend in the Singapore Botanic Gardens on Nov. 30 when a runner dashed right into the path of a group of about 20 otters, causing them to change from "being quiet to going crazy like dogs," Spencer told todayonline.com. The otters, apparently confused about who was who, attacked Spencer, pushing him to the ground and biting him around his feet and buttocks. "I was bitten 26 times in 10 seconds," he said. "If it wasn't for my friend, I don't think I'd still be here. I'd be dead." At a hospital across the street, Spencer was given tetanus shots and

GOAT

- No, not that kind of goat. Former (unsuccessful) mayoral candidate for Berkeley, California, Wayne Hsiung, an animal rights activist, is going to spend some time on supervised probation after a February 2018 stunt in which he stole a newborn goat, Berkeleyside reported on Dec. 8. The theft, a felony, took place in Transylvania County, North Carolina, at Sospiro Ranch. Hsiung said he stole the kid because he thought it was suffering and might face a cruel death, but the court was not entertaining his "rightto-rescue" defense. In fact, Judge Peter Knight sustained so many objections by the prosecution during Hsiung's opening statement that he wasn't able to finish it. Curtis Burnside, owner of Sospiro Ranch, said NipNap, the baby goat's mother, "cried for days and was beside herself looking for her lost baby."

Bright Idea

■ In the "this could never happen in America" category: New Zealand is putting in place laws that will eventually ban smoking altogether by 2025, The Guardian reported. Each year, the legal smoking age will increase, said associate health minister Dr. Ayesha Verrall. Legislation will also make smoking unaffordable, reduce the level of nicotine in tobacco products, limit retail outlets, and increase funding for addiction services. "We want to make sure young people never start smoking ... People aged 14 when the law comes into effect will never be able to legally purchase tobacco," Verrall said.

Signs of the Times

- A middle school in Milton, Massachusetts, went into lockdown on Dec. 8 when a student reported that an adult "may have had a weapon." The Patriot Ledger reported. After about 30 minutes of investigation by school officials and Milton police, however, it was determined that the "weapon" was a phone charger that a staff member was carrying. "I am pleased to report that nobody was physically harmed," Superintendent James Jette said in a statement.

New World Order

- Those seeking euthanasia in Switzerland now have the option to use a 3D-printed "death capsule" called the Sarco, Oddee reported on Dec. 7. Philip Nitschke, founder of Exit International, an Australian company, explains how the pod works: A patient enters the coffinlike capsule, closes the lid (which includes a large window), answers a few questions, and then activates a series of events with a single button. At that point, the chamber is flooded with nitrogen, but the occupant will not feel like they're suffocating or choking, he says. "There is no panic. The person will feel a little disoriented and may feel slightly euphoric before they lose consciousness. Death takes place through ... oxygen and carbon dioxide deprivation." After five to 10 minutes, the patient is deceased. "The machine can be towed anywhere for the death," Nitschke said. "It can be in an idyllic outdoor setting or in the premises of an assisted suicide organization."

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
