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

Max mission almost accomplished Ivy ante, span planning, fraternal forgiveness

On January 29, 2021, Max Lenail was finishing a long run around Mission Trails Regional Park when he attempted to cross the San Diego River near the Visitor Center Loop trail. There's no official bridge or crossing over the river in that section of the park, but most visitors who want to cross use a concrete-encased sewer main later, their efforts seem to be paying off. "We really are kind of running the show," said Lenail. "We're working with the Park and the Park Foundation, but we, the family, are really the ones that are driving the project. We had an open bid for the job. We hired KPFF to be the project manager, and they have started the work. In 2022, it's all going to be about surveys and permits. The new target dates that everybody gave me are opening of the bridge around February 2024 — in time for Max's 25th birthday, which is March 26th, 2024."

He continued, "It's a two-year project. Construction will probably **Arti** be end of 2022 and shouldn't take more than six months, because a lot of the components of the bridge are prefab. But that said, it's a hundred-footlong bridge. It has to be elevated. It can't touch the water. And it's in an environment that has all kinds of complexities, so it's a

that acts as a sort of man-made dam. It had turned into quite a stormy day, so the usually tranquil river was swollen and running strong.

The sewer enclosure usually has visible rocks on top of it that hikers can use as stepping-stones. On that day, they were likely completely submerged. Max's car was nearby in the Visitor Center parking lot. He had to choose between a treacherous river crossing and retracing the route of

The family has raised \$900K for the project so far and has secured a state grant for an additional \$1.5M. Lenail noted that one donation came from an suppris-

for an additional \$1.5M. Lenail noted that one donation came from an surprising source — the college where Max was enrolled at the time of his death. "We got a completely surprise donation, \$25K, from Brown University, which is very unusual because typically, universities don't give money to non-profits. They want to raise

money for themselves. So, that was beautiful," Lenail said.

Lenail is confident that the combined \$2.4M they have raised so far will be enough to fund the entire project. If they have surplus funds, he thinks that money could go towards ADA infrastructure — "a combination of usefulness and beautification" — at the Jackson Drive parking lot and the trail leading

down to the river. The bridge itself will be a bit upstream from where the current trail crossing is located, and will be about six to eight feet in width. "It's gonna have a sort-of pretty outer shell that's shaped like an 'M,' as in 'Max," Lenail added. "That not only adds an aesthetic element, but it also protects the structure against the elements."

Undergrounding: coming eventually to a street near you!

WIREWORLD Undergrounding underway Just a hundred years or so to go

San Diego wants to underground the wires that line all of its streets. While it's a lofty goal, residents have been asking for decades when the project is coming to their address. The state estimates that undergrounding costs about \$1 million per mile, and individual projects typically take three years to complete.

Two weeks ago, the environmental committee gave unanimous approval to a new memorandum of understanding between the city and San Diego Gas & Electric concerning the undergrounding of powerlines, *continued on page 6*

Local bank gets Meta crypto project after company pivots


Meta, formerly known as Facebook, is ditching its once-vaunted entry into the wild world of cyber currency, unloading the mystically named Diem Association to a subsidiary of a small La Jolla bank. The heavily touted project was revealed back in June 2019: The Libra Association, as it was first called, was supposed to form the heart of an alternative financial system to compete with conventional cash-based money. "It feels like it is time for a better system," Facebook's blockchain technology research chief David Marcus told the New York Times. "This is something that could be a profound change for the entire world."

Mark Zuckerberg, Facebook's chief executive, picked the iconic San Francisco Mint to unveil the project. A subsequent white paper intoned, "the Libra Association's mission is to enable a simple global payment system and financial infrastructure that empowers billions of people. We have worked with regulators, central bankers, elected officials, and various stakeholders around the world to determine the best way to marry blockchain technology with accepted regulatory frameworks."

But repeated blasts of techno-verbiage never convinced skeptical regulators, and Meta has finally thrown in the towel, per a January 26 account by the Wall Street Journal, "selling its technology to a small California bank that serves bitcoin and blockchain companies for about \$200 million."

According to the story, the buyer is Silvergate Capital Corporation. "We leverage our technology platform and management team's expertise to develop solutions for many of the largest fintech and digital currency companies

and investors around the world," reads the website of the firm, founded in 1988. Alan Lane, the bank's chief executive officer, has been at the helm since 2008. "The grandfather of 21 and devout Catholic said he became interested in cryptocurrency in 2013," per a May 31, 2018, CNBC profile. "At the time, he had been reading about bitcoin and how it might disrupt banking, an industry he had grown to love and started working in when he was a student at San Diego State University. Because of what's known as 'distributed ledger' technology, people could theoretically become their own banks, without the need for third parties, he found out."

In addition to Silvergate's early involvement, Libra and the subsequent Diem venture boasted the participation of Visa. MasterCard. Uber, Lyft, eBay, and Spotify, according to a June 18, 2019 ArtsTechnica account. But the big corporate guns started dropping out as regulators began questioning Facebook's plans to get into the cryptocurrency business. For its part, Silvergate "had earlier reached a deal with Diem to issue some of the stablecoins — which are backed by continued on page 43

UCSD's uncontrolled sub-

stances An audit completed last fall but just recently released to the public following a request to the university under the California Public Records Act calls out UCSD Health for being out of compliance with controlled substances policies. "A gap in oversight was identified for human subject research," says the document, signed September 16 by the university's Director of Audit and Management Services Christa Perkins. In a particularly egregious case involv-

ing a study conducted outside of UCSD Health clinics, the report says, "The [Principal Investigator] held the [U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency] registration for the controlled substance." University officials, on the other hand, looked the other way. "The [UCSD Controlled Substances Program] has indicated that it does not provide oversight of controlled substances utilized for human subject research," says the audit. In the case of the unnamed

project, "No controlled substances oversight was provided other than that provided by the DEA registrant and the study sponsor." According to the audit, the unidentified drug, which was "provided directly by a study sponsor" to the similarly unnamed university researcher, fell into the category of Class IV. That group includes anxiety drugs diazepam, known as Valium; alprazolam, commercially known as Xanax; insomnia treatment triazolam, marketed as Halcion; and the muscle relaxant carisoprodol, known as Soma. Illegal use of Class IV drugs has lately burgeoned. A January 20 DEA news release says Balboa Pharmacy recently paid \$105,000 to settle charges related to the category. "According to

the settlement agreement, Balboa Pharmacy filled prescriptions without resolving the following commonly known red flags." They included "dangerous combinations of drugs, including duplicative therapy; opioids and benzodiazepines (e.g., Valium, Xanax); and opioids, benzodiazepines, and muscle relaxants (e.g., Soma), a combination that is colloquially referred to by drug abusers as the 'trinity' because of the rapid euphoric effects of this combination of drugs."

Chula Vista's spycam spinner

Facing festering questions about police high-tech spying, including the use of drones and automated license plate readers, Chula Vista has tapped not an online privacy expert but a well-known lobbyist, PR man, and ex-San Diego council Republican to conduct a probe. Jim Madaffer's company Madaffer Enterprises peddles influence to a host of clients, including online rent-a-scooter pur-

veyor Uber and San Diego's Deckard Technologies. The latter is a high-tech start-up backed by La Jolla's Neil Senturia, spouse of ex-San Diego city council Democrat and failed mayoral candidate **Barbara Bry**. (*That* outfit attempts to bust illegal single-family rentals using esoteric data mining tools.) Now Madaffer has cut a \$165,000 deal with Chula Vista's city council to staff a panel of hand-picked citizens that will look into cop spycams and related hardware used to collect data subsequently forwarded to federal

Nurse Toni Toni Atkins, the San Diego state senate Pro Tem who has been collecting campaign cash for a 2026 lieutenant governor run from a raft of special interests, picked up \$5000 contributions on January 25 from both GC Operating Company LLC of Sparks, Maryland and Providence Administrative Consulting Services LLC of Farmington, Utah. Both outfits are big nursing home players. In November of last year, Providence's parent company announced it was buying Plum Healthcare Group, California's second-biggest skilled nursing facility operation, according to the website Skilled Nursing News.

"Fifty-four of the facilities are located in California, and four facilities are in Nevada. Capital Funding Group provided financing for the deal." GC is manager or owner of six nursing operations in California, per Nursing Home Database. The website gives five stars to the company's Santa Cruz facility, but awards just two stars to each of two facilities in San Jose and La Crescenta. According to her year-end campaign accounting

disclosure, filed January 21, Atkins raised a total of \$632,040 in 2021. After spending \$96,485, mostly on fundraising, the campaign had a cash balance of \$557,500 on December 31. Meanwhile, ex-Assembly Democrat Lorena Gonzalez, who resigned her seat last month to become Chief Officer of the California Labor Federation, ended 2021 with a cash balance of \$348,047 in her state Secretary of State campaign committee. But Democratic Gov. Gavin Newsom's continued on page 43

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which they say will speed things up. "We're on the right track," said councilmember Joe LaCava. "You hear of the mayor's 'sexy streets." He describes the vision the city has been working on as involving "no ugly boxes," following a rash of poorly-placed utility equipment in older neighborhoods along narrow streets and sidewalks. Then

again, Linda Vista is one such neighborhood, and councilmember Raul Campillo said that it appears to have been left out of the undergrounding plans altogether. "One thing that was shocking and disheartening to me is that Linda Vista had no projects in development, design or construction," said Campillo.

Since 2002, San Diegans have been

Linda Vista's community plan, there are high voltage transmission and distribution lines running through Tecolote Canyon and along Friars Road. The community's highest priorities for undergrounding are listed as Ulric Street, Comstock Street, Genesee Avenue, Morena Boulevard, and West Morena Boulevard. They also want help from SDG&E to attain "visual relief" from the Gaines Street Substation.

Typically, all overhead distribution lines on a given street are undergrounded

together, the effort funded by utility companies and/or by the assessment district, in which property owners pay. Campillo said the state's fire threat district tool misses many residential areas that have been impacted by fires. In District 7, "the tool encompasses all of Mission Trails Regional Park, but practically none of the adjacent homes where the under-

grounding is going to take place," he said. "Fundamentally, the communities themselves seem to be left out," if decision-makers simply rely on the high fire threat district tool alone. People want to know when the undergrounding is going to happen, he said, because they know it's going to help with safety and weather-related outages. He asked that the committee tuck changes into

paying a 3.53 percent rate surcharge on their electric bill to help expedite the undergrounding. In 2021, it appears only \$172,000 was expended in his District 7, Campillo said — about one percent of the \$16.8 million dollars spent. In addition to aging infrastructure, the neighborhood is "situated right above Tecolote Canyon," adding to wildfire risks. And according to the memorandum related to high-risk fire areas, and also outreach that would include council district offices, in order to assist the city's older, poorer communities.

One reason given for the program's delay was the transition to a new franchise agreement with SDG&E, approved last summer. "We are in a unique historic place, where a 50-year franchise agreement has ended and

a new one is beginning," said Gene Matter, the city's assistant director of transportation and storm water. But despite the slowdown, "our program was able to complete 8.7 miles of undergrounding in 2021," he added. The new agreement gives the city more oversight, allows joint projects, and includes a citizen's advisory group for the franchise that includes undergrounding.

Every neighborhood with overhead lines is included in a master plan that was overhauled in 2018. Criteria for selecting sites was included, and the council must approve each project, at which point it is allocated. Design and construction don't start until it comes back to council for approval by a public hearing to create the underground distrct. "We only receive enough funds to support about 10 miles of construction per year," Matter said.

In addition to local surcharge funding, the city taps funds through the state's rule 20A, which applies to utility providers across California. San Diego's surcharge was established so entire neighborhoods is adopted.

Councilmember Campbell praised the work of the public-private partnership, saying that "it should serve as model for everything we do. For 50 years, SDG&E and the city have been working block by block, street by street, to underground our powerlines." But her District 2 has waited decades, and like others, she was hoping for a timeline to finish the work. "Those blocks lucky enough to have the money allocated already — many are still years away from the next phase. So from Pacific Beach to Clairemont, Pt. Loma to to Linda Vista, many of my constituents are beyond frustrated with this seemingly endless process."

According to the report, 999 miles remain. Matter explained the math. "If we're funded to do 10 miles per year and there's about 1000 miles — if we can stay on that current pace of receiving \$60-80 million per year, and the pace is still \$6-8 million per mile — there's still quite a bit of work," he said. "It could take a hundred years."

outside rule 20A boundaries could also be undergrounded. Matter said the fund balance was \$171 million at the start of 2021. The city receives the money from SDG&E as franchse revenue, and can use it only for undergrounding. San Diego has 93 miles of planned projects left that meet the state's criteria for using rule 20A funds, such as being on a major street or scenic area. (Poles down side streets don't qualify.) SDG&E manages the money, and allocates a budget, known as work credits, for each city. San Diego has been receiving \$15-20 million dollars in work credits annually. "Our work credit balance at the start of 2021 was about \$105 million dollars," said Matter. Currently, he said, the state is revising rule 20A, and has tentatively stopped issuing work credits, which has put several projects on hold. There are 28 projects mid-construction, all expected to have enough work credits to finish. Nineteen other projects are ready to take to district councils to create new undergrounding districts once the MOU

Magonista memories

"The Red Flag Now Flies Gallantly Over Tijuana!" reads the headline in *Hellraisers Journal*, Saturday, May 27. Of course, that's Saturday, May 27 of 1911. Things were happening, right outside where I'm at in TJ, at the bottom of Avenida Revolucion, where I'm sitting, at Hotel Nelson's bar (Appropriate: it is the oldest bar in Tijuana). I guess I'm looking for history. And right here, where TJ began, there's a ton, from the sublime to the ridiculous. Like, it seems Marilyn Monroe stayed here. And here's a signed, time-stained, blackand-white photograph of The Beatles in TJ, with Paul caught ducking behind Ringo Star.

But what I'm looking for is a pic showing *bona fide* rebels gathering to launch an actual revolution. Back in 1911, they wanted to create a separate republic of Baja California. And I finally do get to see the picture: armed men lining up on Avenida Revolucion to march south and challenge Mexican dictator Porfirio Diaz's government forces. The recruits were photographed — God bless those early photographers! — outside Sr. Savin's Bazaar Mexicano curio shop. The flag declaring *Tierra y Libertad* ("Land and Freedom") flies over the store.

What's known as the *Magonista* Rebellion, named after Ricardo Flores Magon, was planned up in LA by the Organizing Board of the Mexican Liberal Party. The problem was that no-

one, not the many Americans who joined up, nor the Mexicans, nor the supporting Native Americans, could agree on what they were actually fighting for: to abolish property and create an anarchist workers' commune? Or to create a basic bourgeois democracy? Or just to get Porfiro Diaz out of his dictator's seat? The whole movement apparently foundered thanks to the collision of these different views, and to the backgrounds of the Mexican, Native American and North American rebels. Only the idea of giving Baja back to its original inhabitants was agreed upon.

The remarkable thing amid all this ferment is the numbers. The tiny town of Tijuana had maybe 100 inhabitants in 1911. The organizers collected perhaps 220 men to actually step up and go fight in the rebellion.

The actual campaign? It was a mess, but the *Magonistas* fought real, lethal battles with Mexican government forces between January and June 1911 in what were called the First and Second Battles of Tijuana. And at the start, the rebs prevailed. "[This] was by far the biggest battle that has been fought since the Mexican Liberal Party placed their army in Lower California," wrote the pro-rebel, pro-Libertarian *Hellraisers Journal.* "Many brave acts were recorded. At 8:30 am on Tuesday May 9th, the Liberal Army was in full possession of Tijuana, Mexico. Thus ended a memorable struggle, between slaves of the capitalist class on one side, and LibertyLoving Workers, who are fighting for freedom, on the other side. At last the victory of social revolutionists in lower California is assured."

Well, not quite. By the end of June, all of Baja was back in Mexican federal hands. But the two Battles of Tijuana did fuel the fires of what was to become the full-fledged, decade-long place and settles in, like nothing ever happened. Did she have a set of babies? Is this the next? Egg-centric adventure

It's a miracle! She's back! Heather the hummingbird is back!

I'm talking about the little hummingbird who whirred into town one day and started threading together a perfect egg cup nest on a dangling branch right outside my bedroom window. I tried to be discreet as she wove away and finally wiggled her little butt into place and settled in. All was well until the night (OK, 3 am) when I tried to take a dozen collected Foster's Lager cans to the garbage. They slipped out of my arms and went CLANGITY CLANG CLANGING on the path. for their body size of all birds." Like Monarch butterflies, many hummingbirds migrate from the Pacific Northwest all the way to Mexico. They can fly 500 miles in a single flight. They need the nectar of 2000 flowers per day, or the equivalent, to sustain them.

Yeah yeah. But I'm looking for baby info. I find answers on morebirds.com. How often do they have babies? One to three broods each year. Usually two eggs each time. How big are the eggs? The size of a coffee bean. How long to hatch? Fifteen to eighteen days. A bit longer if the weather is cold. They're born naked and blind, and stay that way for their first nine days. Mom has to keep them at 96 degrees, so she can leave only for a few minutes to find nectar and insects. (Good news for humans: hummers eat mosquitoes, spiders, caterpillars, aphids, flies' eggs — lots of things we don't like.) But the chicks need to eat every 20 minutes. So we're talking a busy mom. Babies stay in the nest three weeks.

Now all I can do is wait, and keep my cans

Freedivers find calm and chaos under the surface

THE HISTORY OF FREEDIVING IS SO RICH IN LA JOLLA that diving in its cove is akin to a Catholic visiting Rome: maybe it didn't all start there, but that's where it really hit big. The biggest innovations in the sport were created by local divers, sea cowboys who went by the classy moniker of The Bottom Scratchers. The Scratchers formed a freediving club in 1933, before the existence of diving aids. Back then, it wasn't even called freediving. It was known as skin diving. Their friendships and underwater antics led to the invention of the first

swim googles used for sport diving, swim fins, the two-piece trigger mechanism for spear guns, and the first underwater cameras.

The Bottom Scratchers were an exclusive crew of thrill-seekers. The only way to gain membership in their club, which never counted more than 20 souls among its members, was by capturing a horn shark with your bare hands and removing its horns, bringing up three abalone in a single dive, and capturing a lobster measuring over three feet long. During its first 15 years, the group had only nine members, because no one else could meet all three challenges. Every one of its 19 members is now deceased; two of them died doing what they loved, diving. One perished in an underwater cave in France, and another's body was found in the water at Torrey Pines.

The San Diego Freedivers Club is sometimes considered the heir to The Bottom Scratchers' spirit. Certainly, former president and current member Volker Hoehne continues their tradition of pushing the envelope while diving.

"My guardian angels are working overtime," he says with a chuckle. "I came up from a dive once and the whole world turned into a pinhole" — his bodily functions were shutting down from lack of oxygen. "I was on the surface, but I couldn't see anything. Then the pin hole slowly started opening again. I thought, 'Well, I did not die that time!" Noting the horror in my face, Volker adds, "It was fine! I went diving the next day! I have known a few people that have died [freediving]. There are depressing aspects to

the sport, but overall, it's worth it. The mortality of it makes it more real. HR hasn't gotten ahold of it to make it sanitary."

Why is it worth it? In La Jolla, the kelp reach 30-80 feet in length, creating an underwater forest filled with Garibaldi, dolphins, and sea lions. The kelp sway along with the current, and when the sun peeks through their stalks, it's magical. According to Volker, "It is a place where I can get away from everything and just imagine. We live in a big city with all kinds of rules. But below the water, there are no rules. You are a split second away from death. Here in my office, there is nothing scary here, but underwater, all sorts of stuff can happen."

Volker is clean cut; he wears round spectacles and has graving blond hair. Despite his 56 years, he has a distinctly boyish and goofball quality in his demeanor and tone. A financial analyst by trade, he has been a freediver since childhood. "I have always had a fixation with nature." he recounts. "When I was little, I thought Native Americans were the coolest people on the planet. I was this white kid who came from Germany to the states when I was three. We lived in Solana Beach. I got into [fishing] through a childhood friend. But one day, I was in front of the Chart House watching a Corbina swim around. I thought, 'I'm just waiting around for a fish to be in the mood to die! I want to go shoot that little SOB." With that inclination

in mind, Volker headed home to borrow his dad's mask and fins and walked back to the beach. He swam out, looked around at all the fish, and had one thought: "I want to shoot them!" On the way home, he stopped into a diving store and saw a spear gun hang-

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
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ing on the wall. The clerk told Volker that he would not sell it to him.

Frustrated, Volker went home and convinced his mom to go to the shop with him. "My mom is a pacifist. She grew up under the Nazis and saw all the atrocities of war. I was not allowed to have toy guns or to watch war movies. But somehow, I talked her into it by saying, 'Look, it's not really a gun. It's for food." He returned to the store, mother in tow — or rather, in front. "I stood behind her. She said, 'I'll have that spear up there? The guy looked at her, and then at me, and said, 'This isn't for him, is it?' With a smile, she responded, 'No, it's for me.' He sold it to her!" Volker was eight years old. He spent that summer swimming from Solana Beach's restaurant row to Tabletop Reef,

blasting everything in his path.

"I was determined," he recalls. "I had a strong desire to eat off the land. I shot everything — bat rays, Warren sharks, and Corbina. If it did not taste good, I did not shoot it

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again. But one time, I

was walking back from the beach, and there was an old guy camped out in an RV. We were talking, and I said, 'I don't get it. I haven't been able to catch many fish lately, The old guy explained that I had made an impact on the ocean. I was only two years into spearfishing, and I realized I had blasted everything. As a little kid, you think you are insignificant. But I realized, Holy smokes, every fish I take isn't in the ocean any*more*. That conversation changed my life. I started

being very selective."

Now, Volker mentors new divers, and tries to instill the lesson he learned as a kid. "I always say, 'Every fish you take has an impact.' They usually stare at me blankly; they're thinking, 'All I want to do is shoot a big fish.' I tell them, 'We dive in one spot a lot. Pick a notable fish. Don't shoot any fish that looks like that. Take notice anytime you see it. You'll realize you see it quite a bit. At the end of the season, if you feel like it, shoot him. Then keep diving that spot, and you'll feel it's absence.' It helps them understand. You can't learn that in a book. It works."

Seven years ago, Lew Cox became of those newbies after spotting Volker exiting the water on a bright sunny morning in La Jolla with a massive Yellowtail slung over his shoulder. To Cox, it seemed like a moment out of a movie. "I couldn't comprehend what I was seeing. I asked Volker what he was doing. He said he was a freediver. That's what got me into the sport."

Now, Cox is accomplished: on a static dive, he can hold his breath for 4¹/₂-5 minutes. On a dynamic dive, he can pull off 2 minutes. "It has taken me 7 years to build up to that. Anyone who can calm themselves down can do it. But it's hard to get your heart rate to 40. It's hard to do that just sitting on the couch, let alone in the ocean with predators." When a diver is at depth, every 30 feet is an atmosphere. On the surface, we are under one atmosphere of pressure. At 30 feet, two. At 60, three, and at 90, four at-

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study.

mospheres of pressure. By the time a diver gets to the fifth atmosphere, the capacity of air in their lungs is one-fifth the size it is on the surface. "At that point," Cox explains, "it is very tough. You start violently contracting. Your body is trying to force you to breathe. Your brain is saying, 'Take a breath!' But you have to ignore that sensation. Turn it off! That is the hardest thing to do. It's a wild sport!"

A former maritime enforcement specialist in the Coast Guard, Cox is athletic: tall and lean. with a swimmer's shoulders. His hair is buzzed short, and his rectangular glasses give him a bookish look. He can still recall his first spearfishing outing off the Coronado Islands with a group of other new divers. "I think everyone is a mess when they first start freediving. You step off the boat, and you're in the ocean, on your own, with no tanks. It is shocking! I shot my first fish on that trip; I have been addicted ever since. I spend 50% of my weekends diving. I travel to a lot of countries. I have been to Panama, Costa Rica, Central and South America, and I spend a lot of time lobster diving in San Diego as well."

It occurs to me that after you shoot a fish, there is the matter of hauling its bleeding body around in the water. Cox shrugs at the thought. "I am not that concerned about getting eaten," he says. "Sharks come. We call it taxes when they take our fish. One time, I was swimming through the kelp in La Jolla with a 15-pound yellowtail attached to my waist. A sevengill shark swam right up when I wasn't looking and pulled me back-

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wards. I turned around and there was a massive shark trying to get the yellowtail off my waist. It absolutely freaked me out. But you just tap them and say, 'Hey! Let it go!' Normally, they'll swim away. You have fight for your fish. Never give the sharks the fish, because then they think you're a food source. There are very few of us divers, and we have a responsibility to train these animals that we are not food."

Unfortunately, says Cox, that familiarity with sharks extends to Great Whites. "There are so many in Del Mar that it would blow your mind!" he says with a laugh, "I usually get out when I see a White. I have only seen the 10-12-foot juveniles. They can mistake you for food. They will give you a test bite. A test bite can cost you a limb."

But according to him, sharks aren't the real problem. Sea lions are. "I've gotten bitten by sea lions. The cove is a protected area for them, and their populations are way out of control. NOAA did a study recently that showed the sea lion population is about 20 percent over sustainable. It is devasting the local fish population, and they are harassing divers. It's a real problem."

Like Volker, Cox has mentored many new divers since joining the San Diego Freedivers Club. Addrianna Reitenbach, founder of the SoCal Dive Babes, is one of them. When I meet Reitenbach at a local brewery in Carlsbad, she is wearing a shiny '70s-inspired satin jacket with a whimsical sunset embroidered on the back. royal blue velvet pants, and pink high heels.

Her hair is meticulously curled, her teeth Colgatecommercial white, and her make-up, expert. Her 200-member, all-women dive club's slogan is: "Have fun, shoot fish, look cute."

Reitenbach started freediving in 2020. "At the time, I had no idea about the strong history of the sport, or that it was mostly male dominated," she says, pushing a curl behind her ear and taking a bite of a buffalo wing. "When I first moved to Southern California, I had this vegan roommate. She went on a vacation to Florida and saw girls pole fishing. She came back from that trip and was like, 'I think I want to spearfish.' She had been a vegetarian her whole life, but figured if she actually killed a fish, she would be okay with eating it." Together, the roommates



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binged spearfishing tutorials on YouTube. Reitenbach stayed up most of the night watching adrenaline-spiking videos of freediving adventures. A flip switched in her brain. "I woke up the next day and thought, 'This is it! This is my next thing! I am going to learn how to freedive!' I even went out and bought all new gear." Her vegan roommate never did get into it, and the fish Reitenbach killed and brought home to gut in their shared kitchen became such a point of contention that she had to move out.

say, 'Hey, I'm new. I just got certified. Will you take me out?' It didn't work," she says with an embarrassed laugh, "No one said yes. Most people didn't even respond. I get it. It's super dangerous to take new people out. For most of them, this is the only outlet they have. They have kids and a job. The last thing they want to do is spend their one Sunday in the water with some new person."

And then there was her status as a woman to consider. "I think women are seen as a commodity in this sport," laments Reitenbach. "Clubs want to say they have the most women to get better sponsorships and donation dollars. Its bullshit. I think most women that go to the clubs and their meetings are immediately turned off. It's very rare that they stick around. It's just men wanting to hit on you and not really teach you anything. It was a crash course to figure out the culture of the sport. I experienced sexism all the time, and I still do. It's bad." Instead, she learned the basics via a boat captain she met at a scuba shop. She paid him charter prices, and he took her out two or three times a week. When she made mistakes in the water, he guided her through them.

Then both beach access and boat ramps were shut down due to covid. But Reitenbach was not deterred. "I had a dive buddy who took me out even after the beaches closed. We got chased by lifeguards. One time, the lifeguard truck was screeching down the beach after us. We ran in the water and dove for five hours. When we got out, that lifeguard truck was still there, waiting for us. We had to scale a cliff to get out. I was overloaded in gear in a 7 mil wetsuit with 20-pound weights. We had to walk two miles to the car. It was a nightmare. There were a lot of moments like that during covid."

It wasn't just covid; in those first days, everything was a struggle. She had a hard time diving past 30 feet. She could barely handle her gun, and she felt that every fish she got was just a lucky shot. Starting the SoCal Dive Babes helped build confidence. The comaraderie she shared with the other women pushed her to learn how to handle her gun, how to brain a fish under water. how to prepare the fish she caught, and how to be a more efficient hunter and diver. "I began targeting one species at a time. I told myself not to just shoot whatever I saw. I focused on one fish and shot placement. I started with calicos, because they are very hard to shoot. Once I started to stone them repetitively, I moved on to other fish. I went species by species, learning how to hunt them before graduating on to the next."

Then, in July of 2021, Reitenbach had a lifechanging experience during a bluefin tuna hunting trip. "I will always remember my first bluefin. I spent two days trying to catch one. I tried everything, but it just wasn't lining up for me. I gave up on shooting one. Instead, I got in the moment. I dove down and held my position. There was a school of bluefin tornadoing around me. One fish broke out of the school and moved towards me. I was looking right at it. They say never to make eye contact because you'll look like a predator and the fish will swim away. But we made eye contact, and I felt a connection. It felt like this fish chose me. Time slowed down. It was almost like an Avatar moment, of merging consciousness. I felt that the fish was giving me permission to take its life. I shot it, and it changed me forever."

She swam the bluefin back to the boat, and there was a big celebration over her catch. The captain started gutting the fish. Then he hand-

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ed her its heart. "He said, 'If you want to be taken seriously as a freediver, you have to eat the heart of the first bluefin you catch.' You eat it raw while it's still beating. Everyone was crowded around, and I remember thinking that I wanted to be alone with the fish. While holding its heart, I knelt and touched it and said my own little thank you. Then I ate the heart. It changed my idea of spearfishing. I started seeing it as connecting as opposed to hunting."

But two years ago, something happened that changed the way he dives. On a perfect 70-degree sunny San Diego day, Volker headed to Solana Beach to catch a fish for dinner. The conditions were clear. The water was tranquil. Volker was zenned out underwater. He took note that were not a lot of fish in

sight. The water was eerilv still. Finally, he spotted a sheep head and shot it. "My mind was so relaxed," he recalls. "Normally, I would make sure the fish was on the stringer before taking him off the shaft, but this time. I didn't. He was bleeding, and a thought came into

my head: there is a lot of blood. Why was I so concerned about the blood? I never cared about the blood. The fish struggled, and it got out of my hands. I lost it."

A little frustrated, Volker floated to the surface before heading back down. The he saw something from the corner of his eye: a large dark object approaching from above him and to the right. When it got closer, he realized that he was in the company of a Great White. It swam past. Volker wondered, "Is that it? Is he leaving? Am I safe now?" But the shark came back around. This time, it was underneath him. "I thought, 'Okay, I've rehearsed this.' But my brain was blank. The only thing that mattered was being alive. The shark came back by me again and I thought, 'If he comes back a third time, it will be a bump or bite moment."

Convinced that his life or at least his limbs were on the line, Volker decided that he would stab the shark with the tip of his spear gun if it circled around again. "He comes back again, this time within two feet. I

have 15 feet visibility and it's right under me. I cannot see its tail. It is a big shark! I see its giant eyeball and suddenly, I feel nothing. No fear! I stab it! It takes off. I think, 'Maybe I can stay out and continue spearfishing?' My next thought is, 'That is a really bad idea. Go in!""


Volker swam past the nearby line-up of the surfers and told them that he had just stabbed a Great White. "A third of them kept surfing. The rest caught the next wave in." Once on shore, Volker broke down. The fear hit hard; it took him two hours to compose himself enough to walk to his car and drive home. Guardian angel or no guardian angel, "it took me a long time to get out there again. I haven't been the same since. I bought a shark shield. It's an electronic

thing to keep the sharks away. I have not been out in North County since. You don't want to see a Great White in the water. Everyone says, 'Oh what a special moment you had! You are so blessed!' No! I was diving by myself, and my happy place tried to eat me!"

Lew Cox sees the ocean itself, with its fierce currents and tides, as more of an obstacle than the wildlife it contains. But while he has never had to stab a Great White with his spear gun, he knows whereof Volker speaks. "I have had a couple of near-death experiences out there, one in particular with a Great White shark. We use the phrase 'poop your wetsuit' - that was one of those moments, for sure! We were offshore Del Mar at the 9-mile bank. The water was crystal clear. I jumped in a kelp paddy and there was a 12-13-foot Great White sitting underneath it. I was like, 'Oh!' I started to turn away and swim backwards. He thought that I was a fish. It was an invitation to come check me out. He swam right up and bumped my leg and swam off. I was like, 'Oh my god!'

I got back on the boat. I said, 'Guvs we should go somewhere else! Let's find another spot!"

For her part, Reitenbach has not had any close encounters with Great Whites: however, she did witness something just as dangerous: a shallow-water blackout akin to Volker's pinpoint-vision experience. It happened in Louisiana while diving among the oil rigs. Her companion was a local who agreed to take her out. The water was murky; it resembled frothy Chocolate milk. The first fifteen feet of water had almost

zero visibility. "It's called the murk layer. The rig has intersecting pipes underwater, making it extremely dangerous for divers, due to the possibility of running into one your way back up to the surface. The legs of the rig are covered in barnacles and mollusks that feel like glass when rubbed against. They tear up wet suits and skin, and break lines." Most spearfishers use cables for the lines when diving the area, because they won't tear.

"When we got in the water, he started being a little micro-managey and mansplainey. I thought, 'What is this guy's problem?' I think he was worried about things going wrong. But when I stoned a fish, he finally backed off a little. After a while, he said, 'I am not feeling well. I am going to swim my gun back to the boat. I am thinking, 'Well, I am not done! I just flew all the way out here for the weekend.' I asked if he would mind just staying with me and watching from the surface while I dove. He agreed to do that for another hour."

After dropping off his

gun, her companion decided he would keep diving after all. Alarm bells went off in Reitenbach's mind, but she pushed them aside. She wanted to explore more. The man asked to borrow her gun, dove down, and shot a three-pound snapper. "The fish took off and the reel got wrapped around the rig underwater. I was really frustrated. He wanted to cut the line. I did not. We argued about it." Finally, he said that if she let him cut the line, he would buy her a new gun. She agreed.

The man swam done to cut the line. After a while, Reitenbach realized he had been down for a long time — it was his longest dive of the day. When 56 seconds had passed, she got nervous. Then she felt the line go slack and figured he must be on his way back up. "Because the water was so murky. I didn't see him black out. By the time I made him out, I saw the top of his head and shoulders. He was shaking. I couldn't understand what was happening. The water was really volatile, and I was in this little pie slice between the pipes in the rig." She dove down and lifted him out by the armpits, then hoisted him up over her shoulders like she was burping a baby. He had blacked out.

"On the surface, I ripped his mask off. I was just kicking, kicking, kicking, and all the while thinking, 'I don't know how to get him on the jet ski! I don't know how to drive a jet ski! I don't know what to do with a dead body! I don't even know where I am. I don't have a compass or one of those call thingies!""

He came to while she was still clutching him. She somehow managed to swim him back to the jet ski. "His lips were not purple or blue, they were black, and his skin was so white! It was traumatizing! It turned out he had covid. That explains why he blacked out." It's just one of the reasons she never dives alone. "I have had people tell me that to get better, I should. I will never do that. You never know when you will need someone."

Volker might disagree, or at least demur. "People get caught up in the whole 'dive with someone else' idea, but here

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is the thing: If I am in the water and my buddy is in the water, maybe I'll check on him every ten minutes. If he blacks out, he's dead. I can't do a thing about it. I won't be close enough to save him. Besides, if I wait for a buddy, I'm not going to get to dive a whole lot."

Part of the freedom of freediving is the freedom to die while freediving. Lew Cox admits this is a thought with which his wife struggles. "It is tough for her. Especially when I go on a trip. I am leaving next week to go to Mag Bay. and I will have no cell service for five days. After I say goodbye to her, she has no idea if I'll return, when I'll return, or whether or not I'll be injured. It happens. We lose freedivers every year. But we are all very cautious about how we do this. We never dive alone.

We pick good buddies, and we train for safety." When Cox dives, there is always a first aid kit with bandages, gauze, and a tourniquet on the boat, in case someone gets bitten by a shark or hit by a boat in the water.

But again, it's the water that poses the greatest danger. "Shallow water blackout is the scariest thing we can experience as freedivers. It happens all the time. Last year, it took two divers in California. These were very good and talented divers who could dive 120 feet. But it happens. You finish your dive and you're pumping too hard, or you're too excited about a fish that you shot that is pulled up in a cave. By the time you hit the surface to grab that breath, you run out of oxygen and black out. If no one is around you immediately when that happens, that

is the end of it."

Even so, Cox does not get hung up on the fear. "You can only control what you can control. Nothing is hundred percent safe. You can get killed on the highway. Certain hobbies are fulfilling on another level. My identity is a spearfisherman and freediver. The risks associated with it are what make it fun." It's evident that he has had this conversation countless times. He leans in, taking a sip of his coffee before continuing, "If there was a way for me to do this more safely, I would. I do evervthing I can. But if I get to the end of my life and I have any regrets, it will be that I did not take this further. That I did not go more places. That I did not see more reef, and try more fish, and meet more people."

continued from page 8 case with a wrought iron chandelier and bannisters to each side. There's also a random tree branch jutting out of a wall, with what appears to be a stuffed snow leopard perched upon it. Other than a potted plant, our big cat is the only adornment in this otherwise very white, sterile space. Maybe it's enough.

Off to one side is a sitting area, where adjoining "walls of windows and doors" open to the pool deck, and reclaimed wood lines the ceilings in various shades of white and gray. Some would call this "gentrification gray," after the tone that's dominated middle class fix-and-flip housing for the better part of a decade now — even moreso when we get to the eerily-empty seeming dining room with its gray faux-wood flooring - but I kind of like it. (Confession: the first floor of my own house has gray tile styled to look like fake wood. I liked it there as well - at least enough to not spend a week chipping it up and replacing it before I moved in.) From the dining room, we can see that the retractable doors disappear to connect the space with an outdoor ocean-view terrace, and there's an added shot of the sea off in the distance to remind us that even though we're inland compared to nearby Solana Beach or Encinitas, it's not as if we're in East County.

Next, we're back inside for a look at the "spacious domed ceiling gourmet kitchen." The skylight above the central chandelier is a nice touch, as is the center island with bar seating and an extra prep sink. The shot of just a double-wide range with two ovens reminds me how frustrating it is to try and keep more than two pots going at once on my starkly inferior "normal person" stove.

From there, it's off to the "panoramic view [main] ensuite bedroom upstairs," with walls and windows covered in drapery that leaves me unable decide whether it reminds me of a circus tent or an old-time theater. at least the fireplace we glimpse in the corner is clad with an interesting choice of stone.

The listing reminds us that there are three more ensuite bedrooms downstairs, part of the "flowing open floor plan" that "lends to privacy and serenity." We're not going to look at any of those, however. Instead, we're going back outside to look at the "private pool with spa, pool bath with sauna, pizza oven and fire pit." The pool is nice, and it also looks like there's a room with a massage table and a device that I think is a rowing machine styled in the fashion of a medieval torture device, but I'm going to focus on the pizza oven for a second. I've been repeatedly impressed by the presence of pizza ovens, which seem to be an extravagantly unique appliance for a home to possess. I'm guessing I've seen them in at least five of the last seven homes we've looked at for this column, so perhaps I'm underestimating just how common it is for a rich person to have a cooksite dedicated to a single foodstuff that's probably best left to pros anyhow.

We wrap up our tour with a few more interior and exterior photos that are fine for conveying just how much maintenance is going into keeping up the opulent appearance of the manor and grounds. But we don't get to see any of the "bespoke walking trails [that] naturally surround the estate allowing one to enjoy the outdoors on one's own land and connect with nature," or the space where one could plant a "vanity vineyard." Nor do we get an explanation of how a walking trail can be bespoke, or "made for a particular customer or user." If there's a walking trail, anyone should be able to walk on it! There is, however, a picture of an old VW bus parked in the terminus of the very large driveway.

The Via Gaviota estate has been owned by a Colorado-based holding company since it last sold for a reported \$5 million in 2008. After a decade and a half off market, it was listed in late January with an asking price of \$8,750,000 that remains unchanged to date.



days during the first week of February. A peak high tide of +7.2 feet occurs on Tuesday, February 1, at 8:46am. Wednesday's high tide of +6.86 feet occurs at 9:30am. If any strong winter storm happens to arrive from the west during these extreme high-tide episodes, then flooding of low-lying coastal areas around San Diego is likely. Several exceptionally low tides will also occur within the same time period. On Tuesday, February 1, the tide falls to -1.87 feet at 3:47pm. Wednesday's low tide of -1.49 feet bottoms out at 4:25pm. These days are great for exploring marine life in the tidepool areas along San Diego County's coastline.

Tuesday is Imbolc or Saint Brigid's Day, one of the four traditional "cross-quarter" days midway between the solstices and the equinoxes. More or less. In the many centuries after this tradition took hold in the British Isles, the calendar drifted with respect to Earth's position in its orbit, until our current Gregorian calendar system was instituted a few centuries ago to put an end to such problems. So this winter, the midpoint between the December solstice and the March equinox actually falls on February 3rd at 7:42 pm PST.

Ask Dr. Ruth — Before Dr. Phil, Dr. Drew, and Dr. Laura began their careers as radio and TV advice dispensers, Ruth Westheimer was the pioneering therapist with whom Americans were on a strictly first-name basis. Who better to broach the subject of sex in graphic yet straightforward and wholly nonthreatening terms than someone resembling your grandmother? Therein lies the key to Dr. Ruth's success. Orphaned by the Holocaust as age 10, the 90-year-old, thrice-wed, inexhaustibly upbeat media sensation put her celebrity to good use, first by advising her audience on how to overcome personal feelings of sexual inadequacy, and later by dispelling myths about the AIDS virus. She laughs off being labeled a feminist, but when pressed by her granddaughters, the only objection to the

characterization she can come up with is an aversion to the arcane habit of bra-burning. But as much as I desire to laud the subject, there is one major flaw in director Ryan White's portrait of her. The decision to rely on animated passages to take us through the Nazi occupation was one big sentimentalizing mistake. (Screens: February 9, 1:30 pm.) **Four Mothers** — How does the military honor a soldier shot down on the field of battle? By firing rifles into the sky. Mamas, don't let your babies grow up to be soldiers.

Zohara Antebi left her son's circumcision in mid-celebration after overhearing one of the women standing cradleside remark, "What a cute baby for the Army." Miri Sela's baby was born in a time of peace, but it didn't last long. A pregnant Rachel Ben-Dor would sit and watch the tracer bullets flying outside her window. And the irony wasn't lost on Ronit Nahmias when she observed the impossibility of raising a child of peace while living in a country that's forever engaged in a war that neither side can win. An article written by Eran Shahar and an accompanying cartoon of a mother pushing a baby carriage with tank treads instead of wheels was what it eventually took to bring the quartet together. Shahar had the audacity to ask the question that most people dare not think: what kind of a mother would encourage their son to play Russian Roulette for the satisfaction of the Israeli army? Their work was initially greeted with cries of, "Get back in the kitchen where you belong!" but these four women, firmly determined to get their children out of Lebanon, took it upon themselves to expose the lie that Israel's presence in Lebanon was there to protect their northern border. (Watch what happens when one of the sons puts his mother's philosophy to the test by refusing to engage in a conflict.) And for all the times Bohemian Rhapsody has been included in a soundtrack to act as a period reminder, few have reverberated more than the "music video" that closes the picture. Make this as a festival must-see. (Screens: February 18th, 10:30 am)

Greener Pastures — It's the smart pusher who doesn't use. At least not knowingly, as in the case of Dov (Shlomo Bar-Aba), a 75-year-old widower who, after less than a

week in a posh retirement center, is already scraping a tin cup against the bars of his gated community. Dov blames the eviction from his family home on a government-predicated loss of pension, and he will not rest until he has the funds needed to repurchase the property. He learns of a program that provides seniors with free medicinal herb, and is so put off by the stigma surrounding cannabis that he can't bring himself to say the word. But he can come up with a way to make cash off it. He encourages the locals, even those who don't partake, to take advantage of the offer and sell him their flower, which he in turn will peddle to a local dispensary. Dov doesn't smoke, but after one bite of an edible cookie, he's zig-zagging a golf cart through the sprinkler system. (Note to the writing-directing team of Assaf Abiri and Matan Guggenheim: it's pot, not windowpane.) Odelia Mora-Matalon is the house doc who captures Dov's heart and Alon Neuman plays the cop looking to bust the geriatric dope ring in this generally agreeable comedy. (Screens: February 10th, 7:30 pm)

Kenny Scharf: When Worlds Col-

lide — "All great art has some element of humor to it." These words to live by come from art collector and publisher Peter Brandt after he's asked to boil down Kenny Scharf's appeal. Scharf was a child of television cartoon culture, equal parts Bob Clampett's Wackyland and what he liked to call "Hanna-Barbarism" mainlined through a pinball machine, never tilting under the force of its own illogicality. Scharf came of age in '60s suburbia, the San Fernando Valley to be

EDDY'S WORLD (2020)

always been making art accessible. He's been labeled a "street artist" and a "graffiti artist," but Scharf's unwavering ability to stick to his own set of ground rules rockets his work beyond the realm of classification. Once a major force in the New York Arts scene, he has since migrated West, which is where filmmakers Max Basch and Malia Scharf find him. A fountain of productivity, he finds inspiration while vacationing in Brazil, combing the beaches for what he deemed the best garbage in the world. If life means living for the moment, Scharf wants every moment to be fun. Perhaps it's his devout adherence to Peter Pan Syndrome that keeps the smile on his face. (Screens: February 13th, 1:30 pm.)

Soros — What is it about George Soros that brings out the hate in people? Could it be jealousy over the amount of wealth he's amassed? (People are still stinging from that fateful black Wednesday "The Man Who Broke the Bank of England" bet the farm and took home a billion dollars overnight.) His family survived Germany's occupation of Budapest - living under fake Christian identities, they didn't have to wear the gold stars - but not before his mother was raped by two Nazis. Is it his anti-authoritarian fight for an open society that sparks his opponents rage? (Surely even the most dimwitted among us can't possibly believe that Soros' deep pockets finance white supremacist groups.) Supporters of the twice-impeached former president demonize Soros for funding Hillary Clinton's war chest. And when all else fails, nothing bolsters a conspiracy theory quite like the crutch of antisemitism. George Soros is the Irwin Jacobs of Warren Buffetts, a munificent force bent on making the world a better place to live, a firm believer that individual voices can band together and shout down totalitarianism. In that sense, Jesse Dylan's documentary would make a great double-feature with Four Mothers. (Screens February 16th at 4:30 pm)

Tiger Within — Did you hear the one about Samuel (Ed Asner), the Holocaust survivor who gave shelter to straight-offthe-farm Holocaust denier Casey (Margot Josefsohn)? She's the homeless teen he found dozing in a Jewish cemetery, a black leather jacket with a swastika painted across the back acting as her blanket. The jacket is the white power elephant in the room. We're asked to believe that Casey spent four months, half the film's running time, walking the streets of Los Angeles with a swastika on display and no one on either side called her out for it, least of all her farther or her boss at the massage parlor where the teenager finds a flourishing career in wanker management. (Better providing happy endings than a life in prostitution and the loss of her virginity it would necessistate.) The script by Gina Wendkos (The Princess Diaries, Coyote Ugly) is preachy by any choir's standards, an R-rated after school special steeped in naivete. There's even a "Harold and maudlin" moment when Wendkos equates the serial number on Samuel's chest with the "F*** You" freshly inked across Casey's belly. No one could have played the part of Samuel any better than Ed Asner. And one can understand why, after seeing hundreds of actresses, the producers chose newcomer Josefsohn to star. With its heart firmly planted in the right place, the film still never finds the gritty tone needed to balance the discourse.Rafal Zielinski directs. (Screens: February 20th, 7:30 pm)

Moonfall — The sky is falling! No? Just the moon? Okay then. When Roland Emmerich blew up the White House in Independence Day, audiences went bonkers, and God bless him, he paid attention. And if people reacted this way to the destruction of one of the world's great landmarks, well, what about the world itself? The Day After Tomorrow begat 2012 begat...this. 2022. (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Parallel Mothers — Leave it to Pedro Almodóvar to slap a fresh coat of Technicolor enamel on that most reviled made-for-TV variant: the switched-at-birth melodrama. Two mothers, two accidents, and numerous unexpected twists come to a boil in this, the filmmaker's definitive statement on motherhood, melodrama, and the unhealthy allegiance that's formed when shuffled and dealt from the crazed mind of Almodóvar. And he does so with the greatest of stylistic ease. Responding to something as seemingly innocuous as a knock on the door whisks us into the past. And don't expect any of that "One Year Earlier" nonsense when a change of costume and hair will do for an

indicator. You know you're in good hands when along the way, every question that arose - and there are many to be found within the labyrinthian narrative - was answered the moment after it came to mind. Penelope Cruz reciprocates by gifting her frequent directorial collaborator with a performance that's equal parts warmth, depth, and nervous breakdown required in these parts. A white Shinola bob adds elfin charm to Milena Smit. She co-stars as Cruz's maternity ward bunkmate-turned-lover, and mother of Cruz's dead daughter. I warned you about the unwholesomeness. Not to be missed! 2021. — S.M. $\star \star \star \star \star$ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Rifkin's Festival — The first obvious point of reference would be Stardust Memories, Woody Allen's career-derailing capper to a financially successful run that saw such hits as Everything You Always Wanted to Know About Sex and Annie Hall. Set in large part at a Felliniesque film festival, it was the first time Allen argued against autobiography, claiming the director in the film - an arrogant auteur who placed his audience beneath contempt - was based on schtick and in no way a reflection of his true feelings. Rifkin (Wallace Shawn) is accompanying his wife Sue (Gina Gershon) to the San Sebastian Film Festival, where she's to represent her client, this year's Best Director-winner - and potential cuckolder - Philippe (Louis Garrel). Rifkin attends not so much for the art, but to see if his suspicions about his "fraying marriage" are true. Storaro tells all by miraculously composing a dinner conversation between the three as if Rifkin wasn't at the table. Former film professor Rifkin does his best work on his back sound asleep, dreaming in black-and-white and in the context of the European Masters (and Claude Lelouch), about whom he has based his class. Both director and cinematographer feast on affectionate recreations of the genius of Godard, Buñuel, Renoir, Truffaut (and Claude Lelouch). When it comes to Bergman, I'm not sure whether Woody is spoofing Persona or his own Interiors. It's been a lot of movies ago since Allen's level of wit has connected to produce this many laughs. (When choosing between testaments, he argues, "In the New Testament, at least the Messiah shows up.") Rifkin's numerous runs for the doctor's office and the zipless romance that follows help to make this Allen's finest and funniest since Midnight in Paris. 2020. — S.M. ★★★ (LAND-MARK HILLCREST)

The Cocktail Hour

A.R. Gurney's play about a playwright (William Parker Shore) who writes a play about his family and goes home to get their blessing on it is pleasantly (as opposed to mind-bendingly or selfadmiringly) meta, what with its talk of how such a work ought to have a big confrontation to end the first act just before the big confrontation that ends the first act, etc. Scribbler John's parents Bradley and Ann are big enough fans of the theater that they know what they're most likely in for in these anything goes days of the mid-'70s: all their skeletons vanked from their closets and sent skittering across the stage for the world's amusement and/or mockery. Dad is particularly worried, in part because he's an actor himself, playing the role of Pillar of Society and Preserver of Civilization when the facts are that he doesn't come from money, his own father killed himself, and his beloved titular time period, the one that is meant to glue society together with convivial conversation, is instead dissolving it under splash after splash of gin, Scotch, and various other tipples. So naturally, that's when the play we see here takes place. It's a delicate piece of work: we're in Buffalo, New York, not hothouse South, meaning that rage and hate must give way to their more reserved cousins, annovance and frustrated love. Director Dennis Floyd seems to understand this, maybe a little too well: the pain of certain exchanges didn't register with me until I considered them apart from



their presentation. When their time comes to skitter, the skeletons are a mite too polite. And while it's son John who's on the quest to find out What Went Wrong, it's Dad who owns the show. That's not a bad thing, though: David Janisch lends heart and humor (and a rich trombone of a voice) to a sad man who would never want to do the damage he does, if only he could see it.

Hedwig and the Angry Inch

This musical, the glampunk cabaret Story of My Life as told by a genderqueer hard-luck case in a platinum blond wig that looks like it's ready to take flight, first played in 1998, which means it's old enough now to have a generational legacy. That's made clear by the program, in which Patio Playhouse artistic manager Matt FitzGerald

calls Hedwig "a vital part of queer history" and says that it "teaches us that we are enough, that we are whole, and that we are worthy. That message is as important today as it was in 1998 or any other year." Director Juztine Tuazon-Martin writes that it "speaks to anyone who's ever been excluded from a binary when saying, 'You know, you're doing all right." The first-time viewer will recognize that quote from the big number "Midnight Radio," the title of which alludes to Hedwig's impoverished youth in Communist East Germany, listening to American radio with his "girly-boy" head in the oven. That same viewer may

wonder at the veracity of the claim: here is a kid who was sexually abused and abandoned by his G.I. Father, neglected by his mother, subjected to a botched sex-reassignment by his first lover, and utterly betraved by his Aristophenean Other. (There is a lot going on here in the religion department, mostly but not entirely as it relates to power.) Doing all right? Hedwig writhes in obscurity, drinks throughout the show, and is generally abusive to onstage/life partner Yitzhak (Kailey Agpaoa). And the show's grand moment of triumph seems to hinge on an out-of-character whim from Ye Olde Antagonist. It feels like a story,

not of winning, but of losing with style, of suffering magnificently, of telling terrible off-color jokes to keep from crying ("When it comes to a huge opening, a lot of people think of me," "When Luther proposed, I was on my knees," etc.) But while it's a sad story, it's anything but a sad show, thanks to that style and magnificence, and thanks also to the way Amanda Blair responds to the lead character's invitation to go noballs to the wall. The accent is tough, the songs hit every emotional key, and the spotlight never lets up, but Blair is game, and that carries her through as she stomps, struts, and slumps about. The rest of the production shares that same spirit, and makes virtues of its limitations - overhead projectors, childlike illustrations, fan-blown confetti - rather like its subject. [Note: Patio Playhouse is using two sets of actors for the show.]

BEN MARQUART Wormwood 4677 30th Street North Park



New to the neighborhood, Worm-wood introduces itself as an absinthe-focused bar. After greeting me, Ben Marquart busts out a beginner's lesson on absinthe. He decides Le Frappe is a good place to start. "It's an absinthe-based cocktail and it also has a little bit of crème de menthe," he says, noting that these are what give the cocktail its luminous green color. Plus, there's "a little bit of elderflower, which smooths things out; annisette, which is an anise liqueur; lime juice, which will create acidity; a bit of sugar for balance; and some soda for a tiny bit of effervescence."

He says that while "it's not all absinthe, this is the most absinthe-forward cocktail we have. A lot of times, absinthe will be used as a modifier in a cocktail," he explains as he grabs a pink begonia for garnish. "These guys are super cool! It's an edible flower, literally tastes like sour apple."

Et voilà, Le Frappe is served! The cocktail is Wormwood's "variation of the traditional absinthe frappe, which was created in New Orleans in the late 1800s. When absinthe was just becoming a big thing, with absinthe bars popping up all over New Orleans, this was one of the more refreshing-style cocktails that they were serving at that time. So, it's an adaptation of that."

Marquart dispels lingering myths about absinthe. "And then the ban... it was essentially that spirit companies and the wine companies were creating propa-

ganda with absinthe, saying 'Ah, it makes you go crazy! Hallucinations!' Things like that. Which is total farce. It is so minute," he says of the compound found in wormwood. "There's absolutely no way you could hallucinate from absinthe."

But it does make for a stiff cocktail. "The alcohol is so high in this spirit; it ranges from 45% to up to 72%. So you want to drip the ice water with a little bit of sugar cube just to dilute, make it a little smoother, make it more palatable."

Once absinthe became legal in the states, different styles developed. "Some are going to be really dry," says Marquart. "Some will be very robust... or have almost like bark characteristics, almost like bitters. So the main ingredients will be of the black licorice theme, but there's the little idiosyncrasies that you can taste with each one by adding water, just to diffuse the harshness and the alcohol of the spirit." Le Frappe offers a welcome approach to the stuff. "I know absinthe can be somewhat of an acquired taste. This would be a really good starting cocktail for people who want to gain a little more knowledge."

WORMWOOD'S LE FRAPPE



- .75 oz absinthe
- .5 oz elderflower liqueur
- •.5 oz anisette
- .25 oz crème de menthe
- •.75 oz lime juice
- .25 oz simple syrup

Pour all ingredients in a shaker tin, add a small scoop of crushed ice. and shake. Pour frappe right into your glass, add a splash of soda water, top with more crushed ice. Garnish with edible pink begonia flowers and enjoy!

Peering into Pearson

"To be honest, when asked to describe my music, I won't describe it," says Justin Pearson. "I think words, specifically genres, are limiting and misleading. However, Kids. Shortly after that group split in 1998, Allen committed suicide. "That was the other big heavy-hitter for me, as far as someone dying," he says. A documentary about Pearson is in production, Don't

when I get asked what kind of music I play, I generally just say 'annoying." Pearson is a vet of over a dozen local bands, including Dead Cross (with Slayer drummer Dave Lombardo), All Leather, The Locust, Holy Molar, Head Wound City, Some Girls, and ReTox.

In addition, Pearson heads up a record label called Three One G, founded in 1994, which also publishes books. His own travels around the world ("I met Jaleel White at the Eiffel Tower") provided the inspiration for his book How to Lose Friends and Irritate People, which chronicles a miserable overseas tour with the Bloody Beetroots. The Race to Zero is a collection of lyrics he has written throughout his career up until 2018, as well as short creative vignettes and prose. And From the Graveyard to the Arousal Industry deals in part with how he was 12 when his father was assaulted, robbed, and died during a 1987 altercation with patrons in a restaurant bar.

The year after his father's death, Pearson was living in Clairemont, where he met Eric Allen, with whom he later formed the 1990s hardcore/screamo band Swing

Fall in Love With Yourself, which explores his life as it progressed from those two tragedies through his appearance on Jerry Springer's show and his role in the local music scene, as well as its role in his life. "My favorite concerts were all in San Diego, like The Cramps at the California Theatre 1987 or Downcast at the Che Café [in] 1991. As far as why: those two shows changed me, how I am, and how I perceive music and art."

Documentary interviewees include bandmates Dave Lombardo, Gabe Serbian, and Bobby Bray, as well as Travis Ryan of Cattle Decapitation and others. Additional material is sourced from dozens of VHS and mini-DV tapes Pearson recorded over three decades. It's a story of living life with no regrets. "If it sucked, I learned from it."

Pearson is also one of 12 American musicians featured in a 2020 documentary about independence and music, Parallel Planes, along with interviewees Michael Gira (Swans), Mick Barr (Orthrelm), Ian MacKaye (Minor Threat, Fugazi), Valentine Falcon (Get Hustle), Jamie Stewart (Xiu Xiu), Anna Barie (These Are Powers), Weasel Walter (Flying Luttenbachers), Jenny

Hoyston (Erase Errataof), Alap Momin (Dälek), and Greg Saunier (Deerhoof).

His podcast Cult and Culture, produced in collaboration with Luke Henshaw (Sonida de la Frontera, Planet B), is recorded locally at Penguin Studios, and has hosted guests such as cult filmmaker John Waters. "The focus is not intended to be solely on people in any one realm, and because guests are friends and family, the conversations are


frank, informal, well-informed. and genuine." The newest episode features Deaf Club guitarists Tommy Meehan (The Manx, Squid Pisser) and Brian Amalfitano (ACxDC). "They discuss their methods

when it comes to collaborating in the band, and the shared goal of creating organized chaos in order to push the listener and themselves. They share some of their early influences, including Gwar and Nirvana, and the ways in which these possibly unexpected foundations influenced their playing and theatricality in order to later form something newer, weirder, and nastier. They also question the purpose of defining terms like 'punk' and 'power-violence,' and have conversations about the uselessness of gatekeeping, how to confuse neo-Nazis, and the importance of the cultural shifts and relevance that music can bring about beyond the music itself."

Covid causes impresario improvisation Jazz

concert impresario Daniel Atkinson has experimented with all types of presentation ideas in the 32 years he's been bringing music to San Diego. It's been a while, however, since he focused a show on music from one instrument, as he's about to do with the guitar for the upcoming Winter series at the Athenaeum Music and Arts Library. "I found that concept to be



too limiting, when it came to putting a series together," he says. "If someone really good became available that didn't match whatever theme I had, I would have to pass on them. It was a series of happy coincidences that led to these four concerts that all feature guitarists."

The series began this week with a rare appearance from Austrian guitarist Wolfgang Muthspiel, leading a trio with American bassist Scott Colley and drummer Brian Blade, both favorites of Atkinson's. "You could say that they both walk on water, musically, so all three are just amazing, toplevel musicians."

On Sunday, February 6, the series continues with a Brazilian guitar duo featuring Romero Lubambo (Dianne Reeves, Michael Brecker), and Chico Pinheiro, who Athenaeum fans will recognize from his past appearances with Anthony Wilson and as the leader of his own quartet. Jazz guitar superstar Pat Metheny is a big fan of Pinheiro. "There are many incredible guitarists out there," says Metheny. "On the top of that list, I'd include Chico Pinheiro."

Next up, on February 23, is the San Francisco String Trio, featuring former San Diegan Jeff Denson on bass, Mimi Fox on guitar, and Mads Tolling on violin. Atkinson remembers being impressed with the group after catching them three years ago as a featured act at the San Francisco Jazz Festival.


Rounding out the series on March 2 is the Oscar Peñas Quartet, with Peñas on guitar, Sara Caswell on violin, Motohito Fukushima on electric bass, and Richie Barshay on drums. "This one represents a

rescheduled event due to the pandemic. We've had a few of those. At this point, we've had to reschedule it twice. I feel honor-bound to present artists who got canceled as soon as the conditions allow."

Atkinson has returned to the concert presenting business with strict postcovid requirements. The Athenaeum Music and Arts Library is a small venue (it seats about 150), and is limiting these events to 70 percent of capacity (just over 100) to allow for social distancing. Mask wearing is a requirement, as is proof of vaccination, or a negative test within 48 hours of the performance, with no exceptions.

Atkinson is keeping a wary eye on a myriad of circumstances that might require a change of plans. "I just sent an business, he says, protocols must evolve. "The parameters keep changing. I think the biggest thing has been to remain really flexible, and to understand that there are some inherent unknowns that may affect what we think is going to happen, or how it's going to happen. This has created a level of uncertainty that is a little daunting at times. I've become more thoughtful about booking to the current reality of the situation right now. Booking larger bands with more challenging requirements in terms of transportation and general logistics might be too ambitious in that regard.

"On the other hand, it seems like there's a great feeling of readiness for everyone to get back out there. I think



Americana fiddle rockers Lexington Field specialize in punked up versions of classic traditional Celtic tunes like "The Wild Rover," "The Old Black Rum," "Pretty Irish Girl," and "Molly Malone," as well as original songs such as "My Dream" and "City That We Love." Co-founder Beau Gray (rhythm guitar and lead vocals) cites fellow locals Flogging Molly as inspirations, as well as Dropkick Murphys, Great Big Sea, Young Dubliners, and The Pogues. Among their local collaborators are Jeff Berkley (of Berkley Hart), Steve Poltz (The Rugburns), Veronica May (The Lovebords), and banjo-picker Dennis Caplinger. Although little new material has appeared in recent years, according to the band, *"The Lumberjack* has arrived. In 2021, Beau, along with illustrator Morgan Wagner, decided to turn our song 'The Lumberjack,' from our 2018 full-length *Dreamers*, into a children's book. To go along with the book, over the summer we headed back into Clarity Recordings with Sean Tolley to rerecord the song and do a new acoustic version. We wanted to give something fresh to go with the book. While the 24-page book is set to be released next month, the songs are here now." Anna Lee Fleming of local folk band Finnegan Blue provided harmonies on both versions of the song.

The new solo project from JT Moring, of folk-Americanablues band Gemini Junction, will feature songs he describes as "Woody Guthrie meets Warren Zevon. Remember last year when I wouldn't stop talking about that album I made? We've rescheduled the album release backyard concert party on February 27, 1pm, in Encinitas. Ramona Ault and I and Barry Brown will put on a show and we'll have us a time. Covid will have waned; we'll share some food and catch up with each other. I've still got almost half a case of CDs. You can get one from me or behind the counter at Folk Arts Rare Records." See Moring's Facebook page for event locale and details. "The next part is some of the most fun, where I get to add all the bells and whistles — and bouzouki and banjolin? — to make the arrangements sparkle." Instruments used so far include "lots of acoustic strings, but also the pennywhistle and harmonicas, plus an electric keyboard that has nice organ sounds. I really enjoy playing bass, which I only get to do in the studio."



SWITCHFOOT

A new video produced for "beloved," from Switchfoot's recent 12th studio album *interrobang*, was directed by frequent collaborator Erick Frost. According to frontman Jon Foreman, "I wanted to set the tone for the album with this song: addressing the listener as you and seeing myself in the face staring back at me. Could it be that maybe we need each other? Maybe we need our differences? 'beloved' is a song that attempts to see 'you' as you are, rather than as an 'it' that can be commodifized or used. Love is only possible in this exchange. In this surrender,

this humility, this intentionality." The track was co-written by Tim and Jon Foreman and the album's producer Tony Berg. Other videos from the new album include "if I were you", "i need you (to be wrong)", "lost 'cause", "fluorescent," and "the bones of us." Last November, the band teamed up with NEEDTOBREATHE and Judah for a new track called "Hometown Christmas" released exclusively through Amazon Music. They performed the song as part of *The Wonderful World of Disney: Magical Holiday Celebration*, which aired that month via ABC.

"My shows have a big energy, with the organ and horns blaring at all times," says Mike Pinto, who grew up in a suburb of Philadelphia. His music blends reggae, ska, dub, and Latin rhythms, while keeping true to his roots with the acoustic guitar. Based in Ocean Beach, Pinto has played in over thirty states, including live acoustic performances for various college and reggae on-air radio stations. His album *Hotel Rendezvous* debuted at number four on iTunes Singer-Songwriter charts, and was nominated Best World Music Album at the 2018 San Diego Music Awards. "We'll be offering meet and greets on the bus for some of these dates. Still deciding, but definitely for Texas and the Southwest."

Florida metalcore pop-punk band A Day To Remember recruited Blink 182's Mark Hoppus to sing on a new version of the song "Re-Entry," from their 2021 studio album *You're Welcome*, which they just released as a single. "When this song originally took shape, it was without a doubt massively influenced by Blink-182," says A Day To Remember frontman Jeremy McKinnon. "So when the idea came up to do a remix of sorts for it, Mark was immediately who we pictured. We sent him the track with no second verse and said to do whatever he was inspired to do, and what he sent back genuinely makes the song for me. My younger self still can't believe it exists." Hoppus also guests on the recent debut album from Arrested Youth (a project led by lan Johnson), Nonfiction, appearing on the single "Find My Own Way." Blink 182, whose most recent single is called "Quarantine," are reportedly working on a new full-length. In other ways, he detested it — but he never suggested that it shouldn't exist.

I'm full, not the gull

"Back in the day, this was where everybody came."

h no! "Rosy! *Rápido, por favor*!" Rosy whips around. She makes a wild grab at the gull as he's about fly over the cliff with my Bistro Burger. The wooden rail keeps her from launching herself over the

cliff. The gull drops the burger neatly on the plate.

Man! This is the second time a bird has swooped in on my burger. First was when a dozen squawking gulls got away with my en-tire burger outside the

Walking On Water Cafe out on the OB pier. Just now, for the sequel, we're 22 miles south of the border in Baja. I finally made it here by way of pick-up taxis to this ancient clifftop hotel, the Calafia, named after Queen Calafia, the mythical Moorish Queen who ruled the all-woman domain of California. The place is faded but famous, a destination where movie stars would come and dance Sunday afternoons (like today) on dance floors above the crashing waves. It's

also the spot where the Franciscan and Dominican and Jesuit missionaries duked it out for dominance of both Californias 300 years ago. Back then, the Franciscans won. But I've been worrying that this time, the pandemic may have won. Also that I might not get any food, this far out from Rosarito.

But it looks like I needn't have worried. In this most unlikely spot, among a bunch of replica California Mission churches, and overlooking the mighty Pacific Ocean, 35 klicks south of Tijuana, I spot an unlikely sign: "Craft Brewery



and Kitchen." Arrows point you into a building's passage. It feels more like a museum, with ancient photos and historic declarations of independence (from Spain!) and pottery and actual giant fossil shells from, uh, 91 million years ago. Found right here.

> Then you turn right and find yourself in a *whack!* modern bistro that looks out over this incredible panorama of the Pacific Ocean. "Welcome. *Bienvenidos*," says a guy behind the bar. Juan Carlos. I plop onto a stool. It's a bit

disorienting. There's this long counter, a small balcony, and then...*woah!* Nothingness, till your eyes climb down to the wild blue yonder of the ocean below.

Meanwhile, beer's up and on draft right here. Tecate. 90 pesos (about \$4.50) for a pint. Rosy, Juan Carlos's offsider, insists on bringing it out to the balcony for me. She sets it on the wooden railing, Man.

The ocean reflects golden through it. I take a slurp. Aah. One of my most delicious slurps ever. Through the glass, I notice a gull sitting on the roof tiles. I think of OB pier. "Be careful," I tell myself.

A couple sits drinking wine, Sergio and Liz. "We just happened upon this place on our way back from Ensenada. We'd never heard of it," Sergio says. Hmm. Check the menu. It only does lunch. And my biggest surprise (and slight disappointment): it's 100 percent gringo fare. Or, more exactly, craft

beer-type pub food. Pizzas, burgers, wings, shrimp. "We're limited since Covid," says Kevin the

manager. "We opened two weeks ago. We will be doing more." Which is fine. I know this used to be the go-to place for the in-crowd of its day. Me, I'm just thrilled to see it's open for business. Pizzas look like they're a good price. The pepperoni is \$10, the five-cheese is \$12, the Margherita, \$10. But I'm looking at two sliders ("served with cheddar cheese and caramelized onions and fries"), which go for \$8. Battered shrimp in buffalo sauce is \$12. Wings (bone-in or boneless), are \$8 for a half-pound, \$14 per lb. Different burgers are each \$12. "All-American," "Bistro," "Black and Blue," "Smoke House," and the "Baja," which has sliced jalapenos and a chipotle cream sauce.

"I think the best one is the Bistro," says Rosy. "It has goat cheese, as well as bacon, sautéed mushrooms, caramelized onions." I do end up going for that. Place is starting to fill with families and couples on a Sunday outing. I follow Rosy outside. Have to say, my burger is a towering wonder. It has the onion rings on top, a ton of sauce, and then a generous patty.

So I am just about to stretch my hands to grasp

and beautiful." There's a wistfulness in his eyes. And I can see why. Truth to tell, a lot of the cliffside levels are closed off. The rest looks a little crumbly when you're close up, like it could do with some angel to pour a few million into it, like, now.

But I come away full, and full of wonder. Also, with one eye on the gulls. ■

Ichiban Sando has a way of making fried meats feel special

573 H St. Chula Vista. You can slap just about anything between two slices of bread and call it a sandwich, but that doesn't mean all sandwich making arts are equal. I pointed the car south toward Chula Vista this week to find a delightful

example how of much fun the craft becomes in the hands of a Japanese culture driven to refine and elevate every meal with

which it comes in contact. Ichiban Sando is tucked into a small storefront adjacent to the shopping mall at Broadway and H Street, easy to miss among the crowd of fast-food franchises populating the area. In this little counter shop, at least, the hot sandwiches are made from scratch ingredients, cooked and

assembled to order. And they're well worth a short wait.

When Ichiban opened last spring, it did so behind the simple pairing of boba milk teas and katsu sandwiches. The bobas and smoothies are fine, but it's the latter that first caught my attention. Katsu, of course, are pork or chicken cutlets, fried with a seasoned panko crust and commonly served with Japanese curry, or with egg and onions over rice.

It's not the katsu that make these sandwiches noteworthy, however. Rather, it's the housebaked milk bread they're built upon. Milk bread gets its name from being mixed with a slurry of milk and flour called tangzhong. Some portion





together to make *tangzhong* A fluffy rolled omelet and spam breakfast sandwich, in a teddy bear package.

before being added to the dough. Thanks to some process involving, ahem, science, this simple addition helps the dough

of milk and flour are heated

rise higher, and allows its starches to absorb more liquid, yielding bread that is at once fluffier and more moist.

Thick slices of this bread take especially well to toasting or grilling, and that's how they're treated at Ichiban Sando. You get a couple of *katsu* cutlets stacked together with crisp coleslaw, so lightly dressed as to be almost cabbage (\$8.95). Adding cheese is optional (\$1).

Ichiban has quickly grown its katsu sandwich menu to include fried shrimp and fish (tilapia). When I tried the fish, at least, I detected curry seasoning in the panko crust, whereas the chicken katsu was more traditionally salty and savory.

Another option — perhaps the shop's most popular — is the spicy katsu sandwich, dressed with a slice of jalapeño and a sweetly spicy red chili sauce. I ordered this one with sauce on the side, as I also experimented with an alternative milk bread the shop recently introduced: a purple tinted bread sweetened with the Filipino sweet potato ube (\$1). This added a bit of a breakfast pastry vibe to the bread, but I'd say it impacted the look of the sandwich more than the overall flavor.

Perhaps the most intriguing sandwich here was another recent add: an egg and spam breakfast sandwich (\$6.95). You may opt to replace the thinly sliced "luncheon meat" with avocado (\$1)

or bacon (\$1.50), but most important to the sandwich's construction is the egg: tamagoyaki, the impossibly fluffy Japanese style of rolled omelet. So beautifully cooked is this egg, it seems to overstuff even the thick slices of milk bread. The

whole thing is finished with American cheese, and drizzled with another distinctly Japanese staple: the mildly sweet, almost custardy Kewpie mayo (made with yolks only).

Most importantly, for photo purposes, the breakfast sandwich is served upright, presented in a printed cardboard container. Mine featured a teddy bear face, lending an aura of cuteness unmatched by most sandwich genres.

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San **BUYING GARBAGE PAIL KIDS**

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Dock Totals 1/23 - 1/29: 654 anglers aboard 38 half-day to 1.5-day trips out of San Diego landings this past week caught 37 barracuda, 56 bocaccio, 235 calico bass (124 released), 3 halibut, 117 lingcod, 97 lobster (75 released), 1 opaleye, 44 perch, 4 rock crab, 1,589 rockfish, 437 sand bass, 684 sculpin, 36 sheephead, 2 triggerfish, 220 whitefish, and 1 yellowtail.

Saltwater: January and February, typically, are not the best months for fishing in Southern California nearshore waters. This is the slow season, when cool waters force pelagic species south and endemic species mostly seem to lock their jaws. Rockfish, the usual winter target for table fare in northern Baja, is closed in Southern California waters until March, and our early spring targets - white seabass, barracuda, and bonito - have yet to show. Though yellowtail might be caught on occasion off the kelp beds for those fishing off La Jolla to Del Mar, they are what we call "homeguards," or fish presumed to be among a rare few that do not migrate when the water drops below 62 degrees.

Surf fishing can be hit-and-miss as the normal

bait in the swash, sand crabs and sand worms, dig deeper and are harder to find for the anglers who use them to catch the surf perch and corbina that feed on those critters when they are displaced by the roiling water on the beach-side of breaking waves. It might be sad, if it weren't for the plethora of options afforded anglers living in the most populous state in the nation. Let's explore those options

First, we have to back up a bit and acknowledge that, though the bait is tougher to find, the surf can still be productive.

Surf perch and corbina are around all year, even if in fewer numbers than during their high season during summer and fall. Using scented artificial baits such as Berkley Gulp imitation sand crabs and sand worms can be productive. and mussels can be gathered on low tide that will also entice a bite. Guitar fish. or shovel-nosed sand sharks, are always around, though like other predators in the shallows, they will be fewer in number. Most caught here are released, but the long loins from behind the head and running the length of the tail are prized table fare in many cultures. Taste is subjective, and preparation ranges widely, but I happen to like the firm scallop-like texture of 'guitaras'. Maybe you haven't eaten it, maybe you have; many taco stands south of the border will use sand shark chunks fried in batter to fill fish tacos.

California halibut are also in our waters year-round. During the winter months, they tend to slide out deeper to the flats along channel edges and shelves in 30 to 100 feet of water, but can be caught from the beaches, piers, or jetties in the shallows behind the surf or in the bay. As batch spawners that usually become active around May, they can spawn any time of the year. Their spawns run for about two weeks at a time; when found in the shallows with egg roe, there will generally be more in the same area where one is caught.

When looking for halibut in deeper water, bounce-balling a large live bait, say, a 6" to 9" mackerel or fat sardine, is a popular method. A bounce-ball setup is basically a three-way swivel with a one-foot leader to a weight heavy enough to keep the bait on the bottom, and another 2' to 3' leader going to the hook. A slow drift is best, and the angler simply raises the tip every so often to 'bounce'

the bait along the bottom. In the shallows, live bait becomes less productive than plastics and crank baits, as one can cover a lot more area casting and retrieving, whereas bait is usually moved slowly, if at all, when targeting halibut in less than fix feet of water or so.

There have been some good catches so far this winter, with the majority coming from the flats along the channels in San Diego Bay, and a few good ones from the surf as well. As bay fishing can be done from a small boat, kayak, or even float tubes, targeting halibut in deeper water is something most can try. If no boat, the Dolphin out of Fisherman's Landing is running a halibut-specific half-day trip on Wednesdays through February.

Other than halibut and surf species, calico and sand bass generally bite well during winter months. Though tough from shore, our basses are a good option for anglers with access to any legal vessel that will safely get to kelp beds or sand flats in 40 to 80 feet of water. Again, a half-day run on a sportboat is a good option, as they will be targeting bass until rockfish opens on March 1st.

Of course, we are in the high season for longrange trips, but they can be pricey for the average

angler. A Baja adventure to either side of the peninsula, from Ensenada or San Felipe to the tip, is also an option for San Diego anglers on a budget seeking warmer waters. Yellowtail are biting well from Ensenada south, but especially off the fishing towns mid-peninsula on the Pacific side. Medium grade yellowfin tuna are biting very well off the southern Baja inshore waters, and further out and south, the big cow yellowfin are testing the gear and backs of anglers targeting them. One report coming out of that area, especially, caught my eye this past week:

While fishing in the Sea of Cortez north of Cabo San Lucas from his kayak, angler Barry Martinez hooked and fought to the gaff an impressive vellowfin tuna. The fish was caught on 200-gram silver and green flat fall in 250 feet of water off Los Frailes. That may sound like a long paddle, but the 100-fathom curve runs well within a mile of the coast there. One can reach 250 feet depth in about the same distance as paddling from La Jolla Shores beach at the Marine Room to the Children's Pool. But it wasn't an 'easy' outing or catch by any means. From Martinez: the fish "broke my Trevala jigging rod with a Daiwa Saltist reel with 60-pound leader on 80-pound braid."

Either way, a fish caught is a fish caught, and a yellowfin tuna in the 60-pound class from a kayak is quite a catch. Whether fishing bays, lakes, the beach, or offshore, San Diego "off-season" ocean fishing can be pretty darn good, and with our sportfishing fleet and the Baja Peninsula as our southern neighbor, our area is one of the top fishing destinations in the world for good reason.

Freshwater notes: In preparation for the Youth Fishing Derby on February 5th. Lake Poway will be closed for fishing from January 31st to February 5th at noon. Lake Hodges is reopened for fishing Wednesday February 2nd following their annual seasonal closure from October through February.

continued from page 3 hard dollars and designed to be less volatile than bitcoin and other digital currencies - that were at the heart of the effort." said the Wall Street Journal report. But the arrangement failed to ease regulator fears, says a May 12, 2021, Wall Street Journal story. "Switzerland's former president declared in late 2019 that plans to back Libra with a basket of currencies were unacceptable. and that the project, 'in this form, has thus failed."

"Diem was effectively doomed from the start, the people familiar with the effort said," according to a Washington Post January 28 account. "Foreign governments, members of **Congress and regulators** expressed fears about the project immediately, saying Facebook wasn't prepared to address concerns about money laundering, consumer protection and other potential financial risks. Two years later, after a re-branding to Diem and an overhaul of the project's design so that it would be pegged to the U.S. dollar to create more stability, it faced even greater resistance from regulators, who said the company acted arrogantly, according to one of the people."

Tech site The Register reported January 27 that La Jolla's Lane wasn't talking about the latest turn of events, "possibly because negotiations were still underway - but affirmed that the company still sees a business opportunity to provide Stablecoins - digital tokens tied to the US dollar - which was why the firm hooked up with Diem last year."

"We intend to be the issuer of a US dollar-backed Stablecoin, and we would expect that the distribution for that Stablecoin would largely happen through our existing customers, as well as new potential customers that have retail distribution." Lane was reported to have said.

Maybe she had decided that with Harry dead and her senior years approaching, she would fix up apartments and flip those instead of houses? Was she still at it near the time of her death in 1965? Was it possible that someone in her Georgia Street neighborhood might even remember her?

As I kept rolling the early-flipper notion over and over in my mind, I moved on to my next Google discovery: an article about Glikeria's will from the L.A. Times. The 1967 news story focused on a judge's decision to allow Glikeria to leave \$3000 apiece to Russian cosmonauts Yuri Gargarin and Gherman Titov. To quote the article, "Probate Judge William Sommer ruled that reciprocal rights of inheritance exist between the Soviet Union and the United States in the case of individuals." The article also mentioned that Glikeria had left \$80,000 split between a few Russian and Chinese orphanages, but the judge hadn't yet ruled on "reciprocity rights regarding institutions," so that decision was still to come. The legal questions involving a U.S. citizen trying to will money to Russian or Chinese entities obviously emanated from the Cold War, but \$80,000? That was an impressive contribution in the mid-'60s. From the article: "The money is from the estate of Mrs. Glikeria Rogers, who made \$200,000 in real estate and died in San Diego two years ago at the age of 75."

And there it was. Real estate wheeling and dealing — yes, flipping! — had evidently become Glikeria's (and probably Harry's) passion. But it wasn't until I went to look at the "Newspapers and Periodicals" link on *Ancestry* that I found several more articles from the same period about Glikeria's will. The most revealing one was from the *Winnipeg Free Press*, even though I never found a Canadian connection to Harry and Glikeria.

The article finally and wholeheartedly confirmed my house-flipping hunch. Referring to the pair, it reported: "They bought rundown properties, rebuilt them and sold them at handsome profits." I think the term "rebuilt" may have been an exaggeration, and "handsome profits" has to be considered in context. Another article referred to the \$200,000 Glikeria willed to various charities, organizations, and individuals as a "fortune", but, adjusted for inflation, that amount would be a little more than \$1,500,000 today. Yes, Harry and Glikeria obviously did nicely for themselves as San Diego's (possibly) first house flippers, but they didn't exactly own an empire. Glikeria's posthumous intentions obviously showed that she felt very tied to her native Russia, and also made me wonder if she had been an orphan herself. SAN MARCOS **Dyer straits** Judge hopes nine-year sentence will be the start of a new, better chapter

Last week, Isaiah Michael Dyer, 23, was sentenced to nine years in prison. Dyer was first arrested by the San Diego County Sheriff the year he turned 18; that was on New Year's Eve in 2016. He was accused of public intoxication. Dyer was arrested again in April of 2019, in San Marcos. In that case, he was charged with battery and false imprisonment of his girlfriend and resisting arrest. He was 20 years old. Dyer made bail, and appeared for one court hearing the following week.

But then Dyer did not appear for his following court hearings. Instead, he committed multiple felonies using the same semi-automatic pistol. On August 12, 2019 there was a shooting in Carlsbad, in which Dyer and two others (who pleaded guilty separately) set up a drug deal "ripoff." Dyer reportedly shot the victim in his leg as the victim was getting out of his car, with bystanders and witnesses nearby. Dyer admitted to the shooting in a plea deal later. "He might claim that was an accident, but he brought the gun, he had it out, and he pointed

the time. "He was picked up near the border, by Border Patrol, for smuggling undocumented individuals," the prosecutor said. "He went on quite a crime spree during 2019."

Dyer acquired three different state criminal cases while he was in custody; the San Diego County DA filed the cases separately, as information came in, according to prosecutor Joshua Brisbane. Dyer was taken from federal into

it, or had it in a position where it could go off," a prosecutor told a judge. One week before the shooting, Dyer turned 21.

Two days later, on August 14, 2019, Dyer was involved in another armed robbery, this time in in San Diego, using the same gun. In that crime, "The victim was just trying to sell his Rolex," the prosecutor said, "During that incident, Mister Dyer pointed the gun at him, but thankfully didn't shoot him." One week after that armed robbery, on August 21, 2019, Dyer was arrested by federal officers; he and another man were accused of smuggling illegal aliens or immigrants. The same pistol used by Dyer in earlier crimes was found in the car at

local custody in January of 2020. After he was had been in custody more than two years, in late 2021, Dyer made a plea deal. He admitted felony robbery and assault on victim with a semi-automatic firearm, according to prosecutor Brisbane. As part of that deal, Dyer agreed to be sentenced anywhere from 7 to 14 years prison.

This week, on January 6, 2022, Judge James Simmons Jr. heard from the defendant before he announced sentence.

Defense attorney Julia Jara pointed out that his mother and father and sisters and wife had sent letters to the judge, and that they had come to court to support Dyer. The girlfriend Dyer previously "imprisoned" became his wife, and they had a child, Jara told the judge. "They are a good support system for him." Jara said that at the time of the crimes, Dyer was living in an apartment with many other young adults, and he was the only one with a job, and the other people "had a lot of history in the criminal justice system." Although they were all young men of the same age, "one had four strike convictions."

Dyer read a written statement to the judge. He apologized to the person he shot, saying "I sincerely repent for my sins to Mister (Victim)," and he thanked his family "for not turning their back on me." He said "my character has been tarnished," and that he wanted to mold himself into a model citizen. He cried when he told his parents, "I hope I can be the man you raised me to be." The judge told Dyer: "You will come out of prison with two strike priors; it will be hard for you to find a job. It's not going to be easy for you. Ten or fifteen years from now, we hope to be hearing good things about you. This is a chapter in your story, it is not the end of your story. I hope you will be the author of the rest of your story. Don't let anybody else dictate how the rest of your story will go." Dyer was given a total term of nine years, with 970 days of custody credits so far. The judge used his discretion and did not apply an additional 10 years for intentional use of firearm. The federal immigrant-smuggling case will be adjudicated separately.

The defense attorney told the judge that Dyer wanted "to give his mom and his wife a hug goodbye." But Judge Simmons explained that would be a security problem for the bailiff, and then revealed that someone "recently" tried to run out of the courtroom during a "hug," and so the hug request was denied.

OLD TOWN Track attack tracks Man's murder fits with fellow passengers' fears

"On New Year's morning, UFCW Local 135 union member Martin Andara was senselessly killed after being pushed into an oncoming train at the trolley station in Old Town San Diego," read the union's January 7 online post. "Martin worked at Ralphs 207 in Pacific Beach and was a member of our union for six years."

That Friday, local union members rendezvoused with Andara's family and friends for a vigil, a few feet away from where Andara died from his injuries. "Goodbye, our friend, until we meet again," read one of the posters hung on a wrought iron fence by a photo depicting Andara and an inflatable snowman. Lit candles and flowers in vases sat on the pavement below.

On January 1 at about 6:15 am, Andara, 68, and a suspect, Ryan Michael Rukstelis, 26, disembarked from a southbound trolley that had pulled into the Old Town Transit Center on Taylor Street. Andara was walking along the *continued on page 46*



platform heading to work when Rukstelis allegedly shoved him off the platform without provocation, said SDPD Lieutenant Andra Brown. Andara fell into the side of a passing train, and Rukstelis fled. Andara died at the scene.

At 8:05 am, MTS tweeted an alert stating that the Old Town Transit Center was closed due to police activity. Services were anticipated to resume within 30 minutes. Tina L., a 31-year-old Ocean Beach resident, was a passenger in one of the trolleys that pulled into the terminal afterward. "I was just there that day, and to me, it was kind of strange to hear that he [Andara] had gone into the tracks; it was saddening to hear about. I see a lot of elderly get verbally abused by malevolent individuals, and elderly people are often alone in these parts." Tina noticed more security along the trolley terminals days after the tragedy, but said that when she last rode the trolley on January 21, "I did not see as much, and I was on the trolley four times that day. I have my pepper spray in hand, and I don't respond, and I definitely don't engage with anyone. It's scary, because there are a lot of mentally ill and drugged-out homeless using the train for housing purposes. People are urinating and using the train to use drugs.""

For almost two years, Barb. L., a 62-year-old El Cajon resident, rode the trolley to Downtown for work. "Sometimes, when I had a car, I'd drive to Old Town and park, then only would have to take the trolley to Santa Fe Depot; that was a nice option. Although the Orange Line was way more sketchy, it dropped me off right in front of my job while working at Superior Court. Also, Old Town is unique in that the trolley doors open on both sides, so you have the added rush of people getting on and off and even walking through the trolley to get to the other side of the platform. I could very easily envision [Andara's death] happening. I'm surprised it's not more common, to be honest. I saw so much yelling at people for no reason, and there's always loud yelling, loud cursing, trash, and opportunistic-type people who will steal in a heartbeat. There were many moments I didn't feel safe. One guy was yelling he wanted to murder people, one guy was shooting up, one guy smoking crack, and two guys almost came to blows while I was stuck in the middle seat and they were arguing above me. I texted the trolley police multiple times. But it's a huge percentage of homeless who ride and hope they won't be caught without a ticket. I always debated if I had time to change cars at a stop."

On the Reddit pages 'Bad trolley experi-

ences?' and 'Best ways to stay safe in the trolley/ bus?' members go back and forth about bullying and yelling within the red, light-rail trolley cars and at some of the 60-plus trolley terminals throughout the county. Rick D., who rides the trolley almost every day, agrees with many of the Reddit trolley riders, but adds, "I don't mind the crazy people on the trolley, I ignore them. I'm on the first car that the driver's on, not on the second or third car where there have been crazy people." Rick says he's "a big fan of the trolley. I even own a U2 light rail model of the San Diego trolley and a hat with trolley pins. I have ridden the trolley since I was born." On January 1, Rick trekked into the Old Town Trolley station via an MTS bus. "I was there a few hours after it happened, and the police and the security guards closed the trolley and coaster part of the station." Even so, he said he still feels safe on the trolley, "and if I were ever to feel unsafe, I'd push the emergency button and tell the driver." (MTS security is available 24/7 by text or phone, says the trolley's website. If you see something suspicious, contact security or notify a bus or trolley operator, call 619-595-4960 or text 619-318-1338.)

On January 4, Rukstelis, a transient, was reportedly arrested on the 2200 block of Park Boulevard in Balboa Park. He remains in custody without bail.

Government at Work

- In the United Kingdom, as of Jan. 29, flouting a new highway code rule will cost you up to 1000 pounds, the Mirror reported. The rule requires someone inside a car to open the door with the hand farthest from the door, employing a technique known as the Dutch Reach. In other words, if you're driving (on the right side of the car), you would use your left hand to reach around and open the car door. (The technique is borrowed from the Netherlands, thus the name.) Rule 239 reads: "This will make you turn your head to look over your shoulder. You are then more likely to avoid causing injury to cyclists or motorcyclists passing you on the road, or to people on the pavement." If a person in a car injures someone by opening with the wrong hand, a fine will be levied. Cycling UK estimates that more than 500 people are injured every year by car doors.

Wait, What?

- Cameron Newsom, 42, of Colorado Springs, Colorado, was treated for stage 4 squamous cell carcinoma on her tongue in 2013, the *New York Post* reported. Removing the tumor meant also removing part of her tongue, which doctors replaced with skin and muscle taken from her thigh. Through all of her experiences in treating the cancer, she said, "The weirdest part ... was when I felt a rough texture on the 'thigh' part of my tongue -- and when I looked in the mirror, it had started growing leg hair!" Newsom had to learn to speak again and still finds eating a challenge, but she's back to being a gymnastics coach, even with her fuzzy tongue.

When Pigs Swim

- Veteran surfer Ingrid Seiple was catching a wave on Dec. 18 off Oahu, Hawaii, when she saw something floating like a log in the water, KITV reported. She at first thought it was a Hawaiian monk seal, but, she said, "That's when I realized it was a pig, and it saw me. It started swimming toward me as fast as it could! It was very close and getting closer. I pushed the board between the pig and I and it bit my board." Seiple thinks the wild boar was chased into the ocean by hunting dogs. "It looked like it had an injury on its face," she said. Seiple escaped the boar without harm, but no word on the pig's condition.

Family Values

- Teacher Kerry Lyn Caviasca, 36, of Watertown, Connecticut, was arrested on Jan. 15 and charged with two counts of risk of injury to a child and second-degree reckless endangerment, WFSB-TV reported, stemming from an incident in November. According to the arrest warrant, Caviasca's ex-husband informed police that she had left their two children, both under age 12, home alone for two days while she went on vacation to Florida with her boyfriend. When the father checked one of the children's phones, he saw texts between the child and Caviasca, including exchanges about what they should eat, to which she replied, "Just eat candy." She also instructed them to stay in the basement so they wouldn't be seen. The children told police they were alone in the house, except for their dog.

Just Rewards

- Mayor Chen Qimai of Kaohsiung City, Taiwan, has ordered a clever punishment for people convicted of drunk driving in his community. Oddity Central reported that offenders will have to clean funeral parlors to give them the experience of being close to death. In January, 11 drunk drivers spent hours cleaning a mortuary, refrigeration unit and crematorium. "I had never been close to death, and it felt disturbing," one offender said. When they were finished, they reportedly expressed their deep remorse and said they wouldn't drive drunk again.

A Jack Russell terrier named Millie, who slipped out of her leash and became stranded on mudflats near Hampshire, England, was lured to safety with the most reliable of baits: a sausage. Officials began a rescue mission when it seemed Millie might be swept out to sea, but their efforts failed for four days, the Guardian reported on Jan. 20. But one of the rescuers thought of dangling a sausage from a drone and flying it over her. "It was a crazy idea," said Chris Taylor, chair of the Denmead Drone Search and Rescue team. "If we hadn't got her away from that area the tide would have come in and she would have been at risk of drowning. The sausages were the last resort." Millie's

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owner, Emma Oakes, confirmed that Millie "really likes food and she'll eat anything you give her... but she much prefers sausages."


Mistaken Identity
