Down kids rising Syndrome sufferers socialize through soccer

The Diestro Soccer Down team, which is composed of Tijuana athletes with Down Syndrome, will represent Mexico in the World Championship Futsal Down in Lima, Peru next month. According to Cristian Acosta, director and coach of Soccer Down, the team started four years ago at El Romero Manzo field in the Otay area. Acosta was inspired by one of his friends who has Down Syndrome, and he noticed how the sport can help those who have it on a social level. He speaks of "moms that used to keep the kids in their

just to play soccer. They also can dance or do basketball. Imagine how many talents are hidden in those houses."

Acosta agrees: "If people get informed and change their perspective regarding this syndrome, doors of inclusion will be more open for these kids. We think we learn more from them than they do from us. I have so many more magical moments with these kids

Silvia Navarro, mother of select team member Josue, explained that she was one of those mothers who kept her son at home, just helping her around the house. But now, Silvia has changed her mind about giving Josue more freedom and trust. "They are pretty capable," she says. "I would like to see more parents bringing their kids, and not

than I ever had in my years of coaching." The team's coaches are being paid through fundraising, but sometimes Acosta pays from his own pockets. He charges families 300 pesos (\$15 USD) monthly,

Just 12 of the more than 50 team members will fly to Peru to vie for the championship. The expenses — for everything from uniforms to airplane tickets — will be raised through events, raffles, or competitions. "We are struggling a bit with uniforms," says Acosta. "We found some support with businessmen from town, because we don't like how the govern-

ment manages inclusion. We'll be leaving on March 30 and we still have issues with buying flights for two players. Every player on the team needs \$1500 USD, so we are constantly coming up with ideas to gather money or get sponsored."

Before their departure to Peru, the players will have a chance to prove themselves in a regional games in Tijuana from March 21 to March 25. Josue Navarro, one of Acosta's students, expressed his excitement. "I feel so happy to go to a World Cup. We want to bring the cup home. I want everyone with the syndrome to get motivated because we can have bigger and bigger dreams."

For his part, Acosta dreams of having a school. Most of the players on his team are not enrolled anywhere.

THE URBAN JUNGLE **The coyotes are coming Boldly breeding and broaching barricades**

Last month, throughout San Diego County, there was an increase in coyote sightings. Ramona Facebookers reported that coyotes attacked their ducks and chickens. Rabbits near the Tijuana Estuary in Imperial Beach living around us humans. The pups are being raised in an environment where they are used to seeing humans a lot more, and they are getting more bold and brave. The covotes don't think, 'Oh well, that dog and cat live there, and those people in the house love them.' Instead, coyotes view them as prey if they're small enough to attack. Coyotes almost killed our dog and did kill three of my cats. I think coyotes nowadays realize that residential areas are an easy place to get food, especially cats." In 2019, the National Park Service did research study of coyote scat found in the urban area of Los Angeles. The analysis showed that the urban coyotes' diet consisted of 26 percent fruits from ornamental trees, 26 percent human and pet food that was left outside, 19 percent pet cats, 19 percent insects, 18 percent rabbits, and 9 percent gophers.

As adults, coyotes — part of the dog family, weighing between 22 and 25 pounds — can scale fences quickly. Martinez's neighbor, Michael O'Connor, posted photos from his video footage of a coyote that scaled his six-foot fence, then fearlessly leaped down. To prevent her dogs from escaping their facility, and to hinder coyotes and other

were mauled. My NextDoor neighbor in City Heights warned us on February 4 that "in Olivia Canyon, there were at least three coyotes communicating. I'm so glad our kitties are all asleep in our beds — all 'snoodled in' nice and cozy. I hope everyone else's are safely inside as well. Remember, the coyotes out in the daytime too. Just most active from dusk until dawn. These coyotes sounded like they were having a coyote meet-up for drinks and looking for dates."

Lori Martinez has lived in Valley Center for 11 years. She owns and runs Two Paws Up, a dog boarding facility on North Lake Wohlford Road by Bates Nut Farm. "This is the time, from January to March, when coyotes are having a lot of babies," she told me on March 6. "Coyotes are adapting to

predators from coming in, Martinez installed double coyote fencing, which juts out at an angle at the top of the fence. "In my opinion, it is not a very expensive thing to do: you can buy the extension poles bent, or bend them yourselves. Then, you attach them. It's a straightforward way to extend the fence and make your backyard more secure. In addition, there are solar-powered animal repellers, where if the coyotes come up close to the fence, the red lights turn on, and the coyotes think the red lights are the eyes of a predator. There is also urine spray. Coyotes are territorial, so if you can claim territory around your yard, through scent, that should also work." Martinez paused, then continued, "It's unfortunate; sometimes humans are under the impression that they own the



planet, versus living on it with other creatures. And coyotes were here long before us."

On March 6, I spoke with Brian Sodeman, a Valley Center dweller with a master's in biological science. In the 40 years that he's lived in San Diego County, he's noticed an interesting

relationship between cats, coyotes, and birds - "where even though covotes will eat birds given a chance, [ironically,] birds species are more diverse and abundant when associated with the presence of coyotes. This is likely attributed to covotes preving on species that prey heavily on birds, notably house cats. People will keep their cats inside when coyotes are in the area, which the songbirds appreciate."

A couple of locals I spoke with who live closer to downtown San Diego attributed the "increase" of prowling coyotes in North Park, Normal Heights, and City Heights, to the "appetizing rat population" brought about by the

combination of heavy rains and overflowing trash receptacles in December and January. "As far as the rats, any increase in resources can contribute to increases in population," added Sodeman. "They reproduce quickly and are more prolific. In addition to rats, covotes prey on squirrels, rabbits, opossums, raccoons, and many other small to midsize prey."

The Project Coyote website looks at it this way: "Coyotes provide benefits to both urban and rural communities by keeping rodent and lagomorph populations in check. City dwellers

enjoy cleaner environments (and avoid having to use rat poisons that can impact non-target animals). Ranchers benefit from coyotes controlling micro-herbivores (such as rabbits and gophers) that otherwise compete with their grazing animals for food." In addition, when covotes naturally control rodent populations, they reduce the spread of rodent-born diseases, and farmers suffer less crop loss or crop damage. And because they are scavengers, they help remove animal carcasses

throughout the county.

Lynsey White of the Humane Society noted, "Seeing a coyote out during the day is not a cause for alarm, especially in the spring and summer when they're looking for food for their pups." The humane society's website continues, "If a coyote displays no fear of people, he's probably been fed. You can re-instill his fear by raising your arms and yelling to drive him away. This is called hazing." MIKE MADRIAGA

Pradeep's new palace Will UCSD

Chancellor Pradeep Khosla have better luck the second time around building his botched behemoth Triton Pavilion, a pricey new office and alumni complex with posh space for university executives that has yet to get off the ground, despite years of hefty spending? "In 2018, the campus engaged a progressive design-build team to design and deliver a project referred to as the 'Triton Pavilion for Student Resources and Community Engagement," recounts a report by UC's Office of the Presi-

dent to the Regents Finance and Strategies Committee. Regents approved \$15.2 million of "preliminary plans funding" at a May 23, 2018, session, minutes show. But massive cost overruns ultimately tanked the project, per the latest report, prepared for the March 16, 2022 meeting of the Regents. "Upon completion of the initial planning effort, it became clear that the target budget and schedule could not be achieved, and the University removed the

contractor. Immediately after removing the contractor, the COVID-19 pandemic began, and the campus elected to pause all efforts related to the Triton Pavilion project."

Now the school, honing a more politically correct pitch, is seeking approval of more funding, this time intending to spend \$16.3 million for planning and development before settling upon a final cost for the complex, to be approved down the road. "The proposed funding would allow the campus to complete preliminary plans, competitively select a Construction Manager/General Contractor, and confirm the total project budget," per the

report. The total anticipated price remains unknown, but is guesstimated by insiders somewhere north of eight figures. "The campus plans to fund the proposed Triton Center with a combination of State, campus, and gift funds and external financing," according to the document. But just how much 2018's false start cost taxpayers is not revealed. "The campus anticipates returning to the Regents in fall 2022 to request approval of the full budget, scope,

and design following action pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act." Besides what's called an Alumni and Welcome Center, the school now "plans to construct a new building for Student Health, Mental Health and Well-Being at Triton Center, which will include urgent care, primary care, wellness, and counseling and psychological Services." The university also wants to create unspecified "campus support and administration" space and "retail, public realm improvements, and accessible parking," as part of the deal. Notes the report: "The project would replace a collection of 1940s-era, one-story buildings currently occupy-

ing the geographic center of the campus, an area known as the University Center." Though unmentioned by the Regents report, some of the allegedly dilapidated structures there house the so-called Chancellor's Center, offices for the school's top brass for years.

> Diego and Mayport reported that cannibalization has occurred to support the ships. For example, the USS Little Rock (LCS-9) had a faulty radar during its deployment, and the crew cannibalized a radar from the USS Detroit (LCS-7)." Both ships are Florida-based. On the other hand, per the report, San Diego's training is better off. "The [training] facility in San Diego is operational, and as of the fiscal year 2017, crews were able to complete 55 percent of their training. According to Navy officials, crews currently attend training courses provided by a contractor to make up the remaining 30 percent. Navy officials told us they planned to have the training facility in Mayport

> > fully operational by the end of the fiscal year 2021." Still, the report says, "The Littoral Combat Ship fleet has not demonstrated the operational capabilities it needs to perform its mission. Operational testing has found several significant challenges, including the ship's ability to defend itself if attacked and failure rates of mission-essential equipment." Worse yet, the Navy "does not have a comprehensive plan to address the various deficiencies

identified during testing and deployments." In addition, cost estimates of fixing the litany of problems are badly out of date, the findings show. "Without complete information on the cost of implementing the revised operational and sustainment concepts and the use of actual cost data, the Navy will not be able to analyze the differences between estimates and actual costs - important elements for identifying and mitigating critical risks."

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OCEANSIDE Levin's leverage GOP candidates seeing red in a

blue district

As the March 11 deadline for candidates to file to run in the June 7 primary to unseat two-term Democratic incumbent congressman Mike Levin approaches, ethnicity, guns, and accusations of being a business failure are all being used as weapons — and that's just between the Republicans. Orange County Supervisor Bartlett of Dana Point has shown that she is not afraid to lash out against former San Juan Capistrano councilman Brian Maryott, noting, "He still claims to be a financial planner, but he can't be, because he is no longer licensed. You can't be a financial planner without a license. He used to be a city councilman in a small city. But he isn't elected to anything. He doesn't have a job. What's he going to put on the ballot under his name?"

Along with Oceanside city councilman Christopher Rodriguez, Bartlett and Maryott

heritage, and his self-described status as a "businessman/farmer."

"You show me a photo of a Marine in combat regalia and I will show you \$1 million," says one Republican political operative who did not want to be named about Rodriguez's "storyboard" fundraising value. "The problem with that... sure, you raise the money, but those people who raise that kind of money keep a huge percentage. The net is almost non-existent." He says that Rodriguez's Latin roots and Bartlett's candidacy as a Japanese-American woman are "absolutely what the

are the three prominent Republicans hoping to finish in the top two in June to represent the new 49th district, which runs from San Onofre to Del Mar. It is expected that Democrat incumbent Levin will move on to a November run-off. The newly-drawn district is 35.7 percent registered Democrat and 33.7 percent Republican. Rodriguez showed \$466,000 cash on hand as of December 31, while Maryott had \$1.2 million to Levin's \$2.4 million. Bartlett had not yet raised money for this race.

Maryott did not respond to Bartlett's comments about his competency for this article, but it is thought that he is the Republican front-runner, since he ran against Levin two years ago. He has already secured the endorsement of both the Orange County and San Diego Republican central committees. But, says Bartlett, "We kept him from getting endorsed by the state GOP... they knew he doesn't have a job."

For her part, Bartlett admits she doesn't currently have much name recognition in San Diego County, which represents about 60 percent of Levin's congressional district. (The other 40 percent is in Orange County.) Maryott maintains a campaign office on Coast Highway in Oceanside. Rodriguez has been an Oceanside councilman for three years, yet most of his stated \$466,000 campaign cash-on-hand has come from donations from across the country made by people drawn to his service in the Marines, his Hispanic Republican party is looking for." Yet he thinks Maryott may be seen as more down-to-earth and credible. "As far as Lisa Bartlett, we just don't know her down here."

On his congressional candidate website, Rodriguez does not go into much detail about his accomplishments on the Oceanside City Council. He instead focuses on "The American Dream." He likes guns and fracking. He hates abortion. Bartlett is much less Trumpian and says she is a moderate "common sense" Republican. I reminded her that the last time a moderate Republican ran for this congressional seat was in 2018, when State Assemblyman Rocky Chavez of Oceanside came in sixth place in the primary. "His candidacy did not resonate," she replied. "I have a stellar track record. I have done a lot in eight years (as a county supervisor)."

Last year's redistricting tanked the candidacy of retired USMC Colonel Doug Applegate, who had announced he was gunning for the San Diego Board of Supervisors District 5 seat currently held by Republican Jim Desmond. "I just got mapped out," says Applegate, whose hometown of Carlsbad was carved out of District 5 and added to District 3. That supervisor seat is already occupied by Terra Lawson-Remer. (It was Applegate's surprisingly strong showing against Darrell Issa in 2016 that many say helped encourage Issa not to run two years later, though Issa later ran for and won the inland district formerly held by Duncan Hunter.)



Lisa Bartlett: a GOP dream?

The best example of non-partisan local elections morphing into classic Dem vs. GOP battles may be the upcoming Vista mayor race. Longtime Mayor Judy Ritter chose not to run again; running to replace her are Deputy Mayor John Franklin and Vista Unified School District President Cipriano Vargas. Franklin's Vista-based Pacific Political provides campaign advice for state and local candidates throughout the west; his most famous client is Darrell Issa. Vargas was asked by the two Democrats on the Vista City Council to run for mayor. His full time job is as "advisor" to Lawson-Remer. On March 7, Franklin sent out a citywide email blast, paid for by his campaign, addressing the evacuation that day of Rancho Buena Vista High after a student reported that another student had brought a gun to school. Sheriff's deputies swarmed the school. Students were told to leave their classrooms and eventually were sent home. The email urged parents to write

to school board members — including Vargas. Franklin wrote: "Students' safety was threatened." He blamed the school district for discontinuing the hire of two sworn sheriff's deputies who worked exclusively as school safety officers. They were partially paid by the city of Vista. Franklin said

the district eliminated the officers even as they brought on "almost 40 new non-teacher hires." Sheriff's Lt. Meleen says it is the belief of the department that after an investigation, it was determined there was no gun, and no threat to the campus.

Vargas says that the school district has done everything possible to work with the sheriff's department to make Vista schools safe. "This happened before school even started," he said, adding that he's running for mayor because in his seven years on the council, Franklin, "hasn't done much. I think there is a better pathway for the city of Vista." KEN LEIGHTON

DOWNTOWN City sours on Sugar Factory made too much noise too soon

It was slated to be the loudest live music venue in the Gaslamp Quarter, residents said. So loud, the rooftop bar proposed for the Sugar Factory on 5th Avenue would have violated San Diego's noise ordinance. In fact, it already had. Last week, due to opposition from neighbors and the police, who say live outdoor entertainment was occurring before it was even approved, the Planning Commission denied the restaurant

a permit for such use.

But the clash between residents and businesses is far from over, as the city strives to promote a transit-friendly, mixeduse downtown. "Every room in our small condo faces this venue," said a letter from Justin Brookshier, a resident of the Alta building on 6th Avenue. He claimed that having DJs and sound directed their way was "like having a live band right outside your window." Another neighbor described all-night parties and loud music coming from "who knows where that can be heard with the windows closed. No let up. The *continued on page 47*

It may seem like we spend a lot of time here at Unreal roaming the same few neighborhoods. La Iolla, Rancho Santa Fe, Del Mar — lather, rinse, repeat. But that's because we're here to gawk at rich people's houses, and by and large, those are the places toward which our wealthiest fellow San Diegans gravitate. As of this writing, there are 46 homes for sale in the county with an asking price topping \$10 million, and 33 of those are concentrated in the three primary ZIP codes for the

aforementioned cities. So this week, we're headed back up I-5, to where the turf meets the surf, for a peek at 1616 Camino Del Mar, a 5295-square-foot ocean view estate, set on just under a half-acre, that was originally built in 1982. "With panoramic ocean views spanning the coast-

line & located walking distance to the beach, restaurants, shops, L'Auberge Hotel & the world-famous Del Mar Racetrack, this exquisite estate is a oneof-a-kind opportunity!" Or so the home's Zillow listing promises, going on to describe a "masterpiece" that "offers the very best indoor/outdoor living year-round." Let's have a look for ourselves.

We start in the backyard, where the "extraordinary pool with jacuzzi" seems to be flanked on three sides by the home's exterior walls and on the fourth by some terraced artificial grass. There are a couple of second-floor balconies that appear to face west (the correct direction, given our location), and a confusing series of stairs and passageways that lead from them to the pool deck below. Above the pool, a glass-covered walkway runs from one side of the house to the other.

Next we get a few shots of a kitchen that appears to have been recently upgraded and features a full suite of commercial appliances, including a built-in fridge, oversized

range, heavy-duty restaurant vent hood, and even a flat-top griddle. For some reason, the oven doors are painted orange, and I like how the countertop from the center island has been extended out to include something more akin to a built-in dining table than the typical bar seating we've seen so many times before. A sunny living room features plenty of windows, through which we're able to get a peek at the promised views of the ocean, less than a quartermile from the edge of the property. And it looks like we'd enjoy that view even more from a dining set outside on the square balcony. Next we're into what I'm assuming is the main bedroom suite, which opens to the rounded balcony we saw on the other side of the pool before we came continued on page 13




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

Captain Jackson knows when something smells fishy

Travis Jackson has been here before. Good times and bad. And he still has faith in the sport fishing business. Proof? He's refitting a 62-foot boat, Patriot, to take passengers down to places like Cabo - as soon as folks feel secure enough to come aboard.

Right now, we're on Patriot's bridge here at H&M Landing in Point Loma, talking about Jackson's secret weapon: he can smell fish. No, truly, Captain Travis Jackson can smell fish when they're swimming beneath his boat. Especially albacore. He is famous for his "fish nose."

It doesn't hurt that he has been seeking them out for 40 years. Jackson, who hails from Mission Hills, started early. "When I was 12 years old, I bought a ticket on this boat over here, the Vagabond. I paid \$13 as a junior, and went on an overnight trip to fish the Coronado Islands. And when we returned, the fellow who I went with ran into a friend named Tom Gillette, who was working on a boat called the City of Imperial Beach. I had just quit my paper route, and we started riding [the boats] several days a week. There were three or four of us kids. They called us 'Deadheads'. And all the fish we caught would go in an empty bait tank. And if the passengers didn't want their catch, they gave them to us, and at the end of the day, we'd throw the gunny sacks into the back of our Ford Pinto station wagon, and head down to Woo Chee Chong's and sell the fish for cash. The most we got was like \$87. But back in the 1970s, that was a lot of money. So I got hooked, and started working on all these boats around here."

Back in the day, there was a lot of cash generated in the commercial fishing industry. "Two thirds of the world's tuna-fishing industry used to be based out of San Diego," he says. "There

went up 70 cents a gallon, to \$4.60. That could destroy this industry. Back in the 2008, 2009 crisis, guys were just walking away from their boats. When I had my boat in the '90s, I had groups who would charter me three or four times a year. And then '08, '09. It was brutal. I had to get a job fueling cruise ships, and then have rough weather for a week, and you don't get your rest, and you get bruises everywhere because you're being slammed around. It's a tough gig. It's not for everybody. And covid shut down this industry for a while. It literally tied [boat owners] to the dock. Now, I think boats like ours are probably going to do better

the price of fuel went up so much, they were having a hard time. Then add the cartels down there, shooting each other in turf wars. A lot of people didn't want to go to Mexico, even on a cruise ship."

Since then, he has worked on tugboats, oil tankers, and for ten years with the Navy on support craft. "We would deploy and retrieve targets around San Clemente island." Now, with

were three canneries here. But the tuna seiners got a bad name for killing dolphins. Also, there was a crunch with the price of fish, and it wasn't economical for them to continue fishing here in California. This was around 1982-4."

A lot of the boats went off to Samoa, but, says Jackson, even more of them somehow sank right here. "They just mysteriously sank. Somewhere off this coast, there's a pile of boats. "Tuna reef, they call it," says his business partner, Kerry Rooney.

So what future does Jackson see for San Diego's commercial fishing boats? "Right now, it's really uncertain, not just because of covid, but also because of the rise in the cost of fuel," says Jackson. "Fuel has just gone through the roof. They're talking \$300 a barrel. I purchased 1000 gallons two weeks ago, and it was \$3.90 a gallon, plus tax. And in the week following, it what keeps people like him from walking away from their life at sea again? Captain Jackson sighs. "It's the freedom. Patriot, for me, is my retirement job. I'm 58 years old now, and I figure I've got about 10 years left. But this is a really tough business. It takes its toll on your person. The long hours, the uncertainties. You can get out there at sea and just

difficult times back,

because we take smaller groups. One family could [hire] this boat and keep it to themselves, versus going on a boat with 30-35 strangers. That's the plan. Also, this life is all I know. And besides," and there's a twinkle in his eye, "I've always prided myself on having a little edge on the next guy when it comes to finding the fish." He does get help from instruments like this brand new 360-degree gyro-stabilized sweeping sonar he's showing me. "Plus, I'll have a 48-mile radar and a 64-mile radar mounted on my mast when we're done."

Kerry leans in. "But when it comes down to it, the thing he trusts most is his nose, right, Travis?"

Jackson looks almost guilty. "Sometimes, I can actually smell the fish under the boat," he says. "Live, swimming fish. One particular time, Jerry Herman, who used to own a restaurant up in La Jolla called The Spot, called and said, 'Let's go fishing.' So we were cruising outside the Coronado Islands, southbound, and I go, 'Jerry, you smell that? I swear that's albacore.' And I turned the boat into the wind, and we drove about 100 yards, and we loaded the gear, and caught enough albacore for the entire day. Albacore have a distinct smell when they swim. You can recognize their oil if you're sensitive. Barracuda have a different smell. It's not something I brag about. But Jerry always bragged. 'This is my boat captain. He can smell where the fish are!‴ ■


That possibility was too boring to be real, so I shrugged and pointed down the canyon at an outdoorsy looking couple who were walking their dog.

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
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Author's note: This story is non-fiction, but certain elements are romanticized. Think Hunter S. Thompson.

require little water except when in active growth, and help to hold soil in place during heavy rains.

The Pleasantly Pungent Odor of sage is filling the air wherever native vegetation grows on the county's coastal and lower-foothill slopes. Most common are the black sage, with tight clusters of small, white flowers; the grayish-leaved white sage; purple-blossomed, sweet-smelling Cleveland sage; and California sagebrush, characterized by soft, needle-like leaves.

The Full Moon on Friday, March 18, is set to rise dramatically over the East County horizon only a few minutes after the time of sunset, weather permitting. Subsequent full moonrises, late April through August, may be quite obscured by the usual evening low clouds near the coast — so enjoy the show now. Some folk names for March full moons include "crow moon," "moon of winds," "plow moon," "sap moon," and "seed moon."

The Batman — With but one The Batman (Robert Pattinson, his costume overacting) to keep tabs on dozens of criminals, the signal that brands the night sky takes on the dual-function of batsummoner and criminal-beware alarm. As sure as the sun never shines anywhere in Gotham City - given their accumulated wisdom, the dumdum detectives can't figure out how to flip on a light switch at a murder scene - all characters, good and bad, speak in the same voice. Even when they yell, they do so in whispers, as though someone other than the audience might be listening. Holy convenience-plotting, Batman! Cyrano suffers from a severe inferiority complex whenever he's around Roxanne. Surely a man capable of conquering 10 men with a sword can win the heart of one woman. Unlike those around him. Dinklage's libertine is scruffy and unpowdered. In a performance that is so powerfully seductive, Dinklage didn't even bother to attempt an accent. Drive My Car — In the shadows of their bedroom, a Japanese power couple actor-director Yûsuke Kafuku (Hidetoshi Nishijima) and screenwriter Oto Kafuku (Reika Kirishima) - take advantage of their post-coital glow to hatch an idea for a TV pilot She is always with him: while driving, he runs lines off a tape of Uncle Vanva that she recorded for him. One day. he furtively happens upon Oto making love to her young protege Kôji (Masaki Okada) and says nothing. Two years after a cerebral hemorrhage takes Oto's life, Yûsuke accepts an Artist-in-Residence position to direct Chekhov's tragedytinged comedy. There are scars in life that refuse to heal. He still listens to Oto's tape. and would prefer to drive himself. But a fatal accident involving another visiting dignitary adds a contractual provision for the services of driver Misaki Watari (Tôko Miura) that is non-negotiable. (If they go to the expense of hiring a driver, why not supply a car as well?) A master at mounting multilingual productions, Yûsuke can't find the words needed to make sense of his own life. Add to that the appearance of Kôji's headshot in the stack of audition forms, and an unexpected bonding with Misaki... all that's missing is a will to survive. 

Abigail's Party

El Borracho

All the ingredients are there, starting with David Israel Reynoso's inspired set, which surrounds the play's small-apartment setting with a moat of boozy empties. All those bottles Dad drained, long since tossed but still hemming in our troubled trio: Mom, Dad, and their son the collegiate playwright. (The program's interview is titled "Making Art Out of Life," and in it, breakthrough writer Tony Meneses says that the story is based on "a lot of autobiographical stuff," and is what came to mind when his teacher talked about writing "the play that scares you.") Meneses' setup is another excellent ingredient: Dad is sick, so sick that he needs a caretaker, and the only real option is his long-suffering ex-wife, who was so adamant that she would never see him again that she missed her son's first play just to avoid any encounters with El Borracho, the loteria game's Drunkard come to loathsome life. Everyone is



trapped — Dad by his illness and macho denial, Mom by her pain and resentment, and son by his broken family and oh, yes, the big secret he is afraid to reveal to his immigrant parents. And the cast is capable; you can see it from the moment they appear, Dad and his swooping limp, Son and his sympathetic tones, Mom and her tightening jaw. All that remains is to stick them in a room together, either in pairs or all three at once, and let their mingling bring things to a boil. But ingredients are not a finished dish. Too often, the dialogue feels less like talk and more like expository writing, such that the characters have to act through the wordiness. Too often, the humor feels jokey instead of integral and leavening. ("Why is La Sirena, the mermaid, topless?" "Because Mexican men made it!") More than once, Dad insists he's changed, but he doesn't say or show how or why. And the big secret is...not that big, at least not in the world of the play. But the play is pleasingly ambitious, taking in as it does immigrant enculturation, familial drama, and generational mores, and slipping as it does into occasional flights of cleverly staged fancy (the slow-strobe effect at the climax is a bit of lo-tech wonder.) The Great Khan

Playwright Michael Gene Sullivan has said that "this play does not have a traditional villain." There are bad guys involved: the play's story is set in motion when a group of young men attempt to rape Ant, a girl who was a friend of theirs, up until the day she got titties and so became a target. Their attempt is foiled by our protagonist Jayden — a gamer at heart, a stinky teen boy in body — but by

the time the play opens, fear of violent repercussions has led his mother to move him to a new, considerably less Black school in a new part of town. The real villain, according to the program, is "the racist society that births stereotypes... which lead to a flattened expectation of people." But it's a tricky business, writing a play about racism without any racists or racist acts (unless you're going to count the white history teacher who can't manage to name 20 famous Black people who aren't athletes or entertainers). It can wind up getting pretty speechy - which is not to say preachy, since Sullivan is a good enough writer to make his monologues sound like genuine cries from the heart, and the show's polished and engaging cast can put that across — and those speeches can work to turn the play from a consideration of characters to an argument about History. What parts of whose history gets told, and who gets to tell it? Worthwhile questions, but perhaps a trifle academic, which is probably why the play's action centers around a presentation for a high school history class. It helps some that one of the characters is himself historical: the Mongol Temujin, who eventually became Genghis Khan. The Great Khan, who lost his family, who was enslaved as a boy, who loved what was his own, and who slaughtered his enemies on the way to conquering more land than anyone else ever. An attractive character to a boy living in fear. But that part gets tricky as well: Sullivan is canny enough to have one character compare Temuiin to Hitler - a man who rallied a suffering people to take vengeance on the world - but his defense...well, perhaps viewers ought to judge for themselves. Drama-wise, it's worth noting that the characters themselves are spared a reckoning, even as the audience is threatened with one. SAN DIEGO REPERTORY THEATRE.

There is a good deal of violence against women described in Nobel Laureate(!) Harold Pinter's sour, seething The Homecoming, much of it in friendly, conversational tones by canny Lenny, as he chats up his older brother Teddy's wife. (Teddy's the one doing the titular homecoming; for the past nine years, he's been as far from London's workaday West End as possible - Dad may have followed Grandpa into the butcher business, but Ted's left that fleshy world behind for the airy realms of philosophy and academy.) But the violence we get to see? That's done to the men, both then and now. Lenny may be a monster. Teddy may be a ghost, and younger brother Joey may be a dumb brute, but as Old Man Max declares, his sons learned everything they know about morality at their mother's knee - Max's dear, departed "slut bitch of a wife." Not for nothing do the only memories of actual physical affection involve, often uncomfortably, father and sons. Not for nothing does the play's opening include Max's fond recollection of his best friend Mac, who always had a kind word for Max's missus. Observations like these (such as they are), are not likely to occur during the actual performance, however, as its cavalcade of conflicts, hairpin turns of emotion, adventures in absurd humor, and barrage of self-serving stories amounting to a tragedy masquerading as a history - are likely to prove a bit dizzying. Perhaps calculatedly so. Richard Baird's Lenny is apt to attract the most attention, if only because fear is perhaps first among feelings, but Frank Corrado's Max, more riveting than attractive, still makes it clear that the story here is about him. And despite that emotional black hole at the center of things, most everyone gets their moment in the sun, even

Don't knock gnocchi

There's a kind of purring contentment about this place.

ome bars just get it. They know who they are. They make you feel you know who you are.

I walk into this place on Cañon Street in Point Loma and I feel congeniality wrapping

around me like a warm cloak. The space a cross between an elegant salon and a Cheers. Somehow, the name "Old Venice" fits. And the customers are not just oldies, but young arty types, mixed with people talking plumbing, electrics, franchise politics - at least here, tonight.

But I have to ask this gal Erin, because I notice they don't do lunch: "Do you guys have a happy hour still, since covid hit?"

"Oh yes," says Erin, "a good one if you're hungry."

Huh. Guess they had to drop lunch because, like everybody, they probably can't get enough staff. Whatever, I'm glad they let HH sur-

vive. In times like these, such little gifts to us working stiffs mean a lot. So, where to settle in? I know they have cute patios outside, and this bar isn't too big, but it is warm, and the cool outside has turned to a biting cold. Indoors is the scene to make. Specially as it looks like an interesting bunch hunched up there at the black marble bar.

I look around. This place is definitely classy. Some parts even have framed art on the walls and fluted columns. Makes you think of some Venetian aristocrat's drawing room. So I haul up to the last empty bar stool and order a house red. Erin brings me a glass of Bogle Cabernet. Costs \$9. Not sure if we're talking a HH price. Could be, this being Point Loma and all. But hey, they subtract \$3 on the check. So s₀ all. But hey, ☐ yes, HH \$6!

Erin also drops off a HH menu. Boy, not 👷 the cheapest, but certainly extensive. Right

off, being cold and all, I order a bowl of veggie soup (\$8. Cup would have been \$6. Garlic bread's \$1 extra. And this garlic bread! Crunchy, tender, a big golden stain of butter and garlic and green basil wiped into it. Deeelish. The actual soup becomes

secondary). But now it's a question of the main plate. Most expensive HH dish is the delicious-sounding stuffed shrimp in a Parmesan crust, \$17. Shrimp and artichoke

is \$16, and steamed mussels go for \$13. Of course, I could've just asked for more of that scrumbo garlic bread and called it a day at that. But tonight I'm determined to stuff myself like a cannoli. D'aaagh, lessee: Meatballs

(or sausage) in marinara, with Parmesan cheese, \$8; a garlic bulb with Brie cheese, \$11; focaccia with pesto, mozzarella, and Parmesan, \$14. But I have already made up my mind. For the first time, I decide to give gnocchi a chance. I know this is crazy, but I don't remember ever having had it, even once. I just know

it as some kind of

Another solid HH meal: meatballs, two for \$8

stuffed pasta. Think I thought it looked like a roll of tasteless carbs. But I find out that gnocchi got its name because it looks like a "knot" of wood. And that we can blame a particular Roman, Marcus Gavius Apicius, for inventing gnocchi, back in the 1st century AD. He created this mix of semolina, water, and milk, fried it, and seasoned it with honey and black pepper. "Gnocchi Romana" today is still pretty much exactly that same combination. Potato? I guess the potato stuffing came back to Europe with Columbus. When you think about it, these are really just mini-dumplings - very Italian, and yet quite Chinese, too.

There's a kind of purring of contentment about this place. You know people love it here when Larry, a music teacher sitting across the table, tells you he has been coming in for 42 years. He's eating the focaccia dish. And two seats up, Susan is singing the praises of the HH shrimp and artichoke. Her dinner buddy Gloria swears by the focaccia/pizza she got, and she should know: she teaches cooking herself.

This is about when bar guy Omar picks my gnocchi up from George the cook and gives it to Erin, who swings it over. My first gnocchi! The plate is stuffed with potato knots in a marinara sauce, topped with Parmesan and basil. Looks colorful, tasty. Costs \$11. And I

don't know why, but I'm surprised at the potatoness of the flavors. Oh, and of course: the whole Polish dumpling thing. That's what these are! Pierogi.

Potato adds a lot of volume to each bite, and hey, cheesy! That Parmesan topping just seals the deliciosity. I mean, yes, it's mild, in an Italian way. I miss a bit of bite, until I find the li'l jar of dried crushed peppers to shake out, and discover the herby sausage chunks that ended up under all the cheesy

The kitchen god arrives

Grandpa Táo Kitchen's beefed-up broth

1190 N 2nd St, El Cajon. Thank the kitchen god, our days of mediocre phở have come to an end.

One year ago, my family moved from central San Diego to East County. Though we occasionally miss the walkability of our old, urban neighborhood, the dearth of quality phở has proven

our most challenging adjustment. The noodle

BBQ pork spring rolls. soup is the preferred comfort food of my Vietnamese-American wife, so I've come to view any break of bad news, chilly weather, or malaise as opportunity to try out one of many phở shops nearby.

There've been more than a few such days, and we've tried more than a few local shops — none worthy of a repeat visit. Until the arrival of Grandpa Táo Kitchen.

Note that the place is not called Grandpa Táo's Kitchen. As the staff pointed out to me, Grandpa Táo is not the business owner, but a nickname of the Vietnamese kitchen god. At the beginning of Vietnam's annual Tet (lunar New Year) holiday, tradition holds that households burn paper votives in tribute to Ông Táo, a unique, mythic character said to wear rubber boots and ride a carp to heaven at the end of each year to report on each families' earthly goings-on to the Jade Emperor deity.

Which sounds like a pretty wild tradition to someone who grew up leaving cookies out for the portly, bearded man in a red suit who climbs in through a chimney in the middle of the night. But I digress...

Grandpa Táo opened a few weeks ago, in the former El Cajon location of Kip's Café, a Chinese restaurant that recently closed due to retirement after some 65 years doing business at multiple locations in El Cajon, plus a brief sojourn in Hillcrest. Kip's had added a sushi component at some point, and Grandpa Táo keeps that going with a limited menu of maki rolls. However, we happily stuck to the more robust Vietnamese menu. Because, aside from such items as bread and noodles, it's all made from scratch.

In the case of its \$10-14 phở, that means broth that spent ten hours drawing flavor from beef bones and brisket, plus onions, ginger, and aromatic spices. We spent the past year tasting what comes from a quick and easy approach to *ph*^{*ð*}, and this tasty, clear broth was nearly good enough to right all those wrongs.

Grandpa Táo prepares its own meats and pickled vegetables, too, which yields a satisfying \$7-8 bánh mì, as well. All the standards are there: spring rolls (\$6.50), bun vermicelli noodle salads (\$11-12), and shaking beef (\$14), each offering protein choices of BBQ pork, chicken, beef. shrimp, and tofu.

the inside track



BJ Jezbera wants to absorb from everyone and play everywhere.

The view from Chula Vista Asked for his most colorful stories about gigging around town, singersongwriter BJ Jezbera gives the impression that he knows just a little bit more than he's telling. "I feel like a question like this," he explains, "really deserves a face-to-face conversation in a dimly lit dive bar, over cheap beer and some Skrewball. Because that's the only way I can piece together the many memories I have made in this scene. A couple of my favorite stories are about the time I went on tour with Quel Bordel and we played Drinking Dreidel in our hotel, or the times I played the Anime Conji conventions and partied with people dressed as characters from every cartoon."

A lifelong resident of Chula Vista ("West of the 805!"), Jezbera recalls that he "started by stealing the acoustic guitar my older sister had in her closet, while she was out of the house. Eventually, I just stopped putting it back and she let me have it. The bands that influenced me as a 14-year-old to start a band and write my own songs were groups like Blink 182, Alkaline Trio, and Green Day. I've always been drawn to bands and musicians who can craft a story into their songs, where the lyrics are something you can really dive into. As I've gotten older, I've drawn

influence from so many artists who I view as storytellers, everyone from Johnny Cash to Snoop Dogg. I try to absorb as many different kinds of music as I can to stay inspired, sometimes even a jingle from a TV show like King of the Hill makes its way into my set."

As for songwriting, that too started out close to home. "I began when I was about thirteen or fourteen with my friend Indy in our band Element-X. The songs were exactly what you expect young teenage boys who were into Blink-182 and NOFX to write. Our two biggest songs were 'Army of Skanks,' plucked from the movie Mean Girls, and 'MILF.' I think I have always sung to myself, just whatever gets stuck in my head, but never considered myself a 'singer.' I was a theatre kid growing up, and, although I had to sing in the occasional musical, I never really liked it. It wasn't until I started playing in bands and getting to write my own lyrics and sing them how I wanted that I began to enjoy it. Right now, one of my favorite songs to sing is a song I wrote called 'Don't Go,' a sassy little emo-punk tune. Either that, or my death metal version of Britney Spears' '... Baby One More Time."

Jezbera describes his most recent release, the Canciones Con Queso EP, as a "very fun mariachi-infused folk album,"

recorded at Mannequin Vanity Records with both American and French players. He promotes his work by gigging as often as ten times per month, all while holding down a day job in Miramar at Cutwater

Spirits. "I just love what I do, and I am driven to keep pushing by peers and all the hard work I see them putting in. I'm not a very competitive person, but there is a part of me that wants to play every show, every venue, every night. That part of me keeps me hungry for more. That, plus a copious amount of coffee." – Andrew Hamlin

Recalling the

agony of XTC "I recall the show went very well, the band seemed to be in good spirits," remembers XTC drummer Terry Chambers about the final concert that band ever played — in San Diego, circa March 1982. None of them realized at the time that it would be their last public performance. "The audience was electric, everyone was on their feet and cheer-

ing throughout. It was the first date of our first major U.S. headlining tour, playing decent-sized venues, and the future looked good. I had no idea that Andy [Partridge, singer] was in such bad shape. Even after the gig, when we were travelling to LA, we had no clue that anything was wrong." He recalls that

XTC had previously played San Diego in 1980, a one-off date at the North Park Lions Club that has achieved somewhat mythic local status, given their rising stardom at the time. "In those days," recalls Chambers, "we never saw much of the cities we were playing in. We drove straight to the hotels, then from the hotels to the venues, then from the venues to the next town.

I would have loved to explore San Diego, but never had that opportunity." XTC would only play that one show of their 1982 American tour, April 3, before canceling the rest of the dates, reportedly due to frontman Andy Partridge's stage fright.

A stage-crashing incident during their song "Melt the Guns" may have contributed. Several people rushed onto the stage during Partridge's spoken-word anti-gun rant in the middle of the tune. One of the crashers managed to hand the singer a copy of a local radical alt-newspaper that had been littering the venue and parking lot all night, which Partridge flipped through while security removed the interlopers from the stage. After the show, the band cancelled their LA

A vet of local bands such as Secret Seven, Divided by Zero, Ghoulspoon, and octogenarian Weezer tribute Geezer, Zach Goode has been announced as the new lead singer of 1990s alt-rock icons Smash Mouth, replacing original vocalist Steve Harwell, who retired due to health issues. "I saw somewhere that they were looking for a new singer, so I sent an email as a flyer, not even expecting a reply," Goode tells the *Reader.* "They actually responded pretty quickly and had me send in a video of me singing 'Walking on the Sun' and 'All Star.' They liked what I did and I started talking to management about flying up to San Jose to meet bass player Paul to see how we vibed. I learned a bunch of songs, flew up, and sang while he played bass to a live recording with the vocals removed. We got to know each other, everything went great, and I started to think that this might actually be a possibility! It's my understanding that they had hundreds of applicants and narrowed it down to a final four. We all went back up to San Jose and auditioned and, the next day, they told me I was the unanimous choice." On March 1, the band premiered their new single, a cover of Rick Astley's "Never Gonna Give You Up." "Our first big show is May 21 and 22 in Mexico with the Strokes, Blondie, Kings of Leon, the Hives, and Death Cab For Cutie."



DARING GREATLY

Originally from Calgary, AB Canada, before relocating to OB, Daring Greatly has a new member from Wisconsin, bassist-singer Matt Spatol. In addition, "We have a new record coming out March 6," according to bandleader Dail Croome. "During the two years of lockdown, we played far less shows, which gave us a lot more time and space for writing and recording. We were lucky enough to live in a perfect house in Gird Valley, the name of this album, our fourth, for live broadcast shows and for recording." Regarding the album title, "Gird Valley is in the small town of Fallbrook, which is in North San Diego County. Fallbrook is full of fruit tree covered large properties, vineyard yards, and rolling hills. Nature is the dominant energy. And that is prevalent in the lyrics in most of the songs. Nature is our guide. Not the television or the government, but all the energies within the ecosystem of the Earth. Another dominant theme in the album is a call for freedom. Not in a political sense, but the transcendent form of freedom that calls us to cooperate on a deeper level, and especially with our own self, so that we can collectively move out of this 'mitote' and get back to our true nature." Their album *Could It Be Magic*, released last month, features guest contributions from Jacquie Bazinet (The Fictitious Dishes, Sleepy Hollow) and Sean Con (Bat Lords). According to Hugh J. Noble, "The sound references John Carpenter's soundtrack work, sad boy pop punk, Haircut 100 style synthpop, Jesu-esque dronery, and several points in between. There's a weird Heaven's Gateinfluenced website and a couple of DIY music videos online." The referenced videos are for the tracks "I Saw the Light, and It Looked a Lot Like an Existential Crisis" and "Nothingness Itself (feat Sean Con)."

His album *Past Forward* was nominated Best Pop Album at the 2014 San Diego Music Awards. Early 2016 saw Guld appearing on a vinyl-only local band compilation from Blindspot Records, *Sounds From the Stratosphere*, also featuring Manual Scan, Super Buffet, Pony Death Ride, and Satanic Puppeteer Orchestra. The record was released on splatter color vinyl in a deluxe sleeve, limited to 500 copies. Way back in October of 2018, Valery Gergiev stopped by San Diego with the Mariinsky Orchestra and performed Shostakovich's Symphony No. 7: Leningrad. The symphony was written between 1941 and 1942, during the German siege of Leningrad.

Today, Ukraine is under siege from Russia, and Maestro Gergiev has not made any public comments condemning Russia's actions. Long a favorite of Vladimir Putin, Gergiev has come under scrutiny in the past because of Putin's politics. Now the scrutiny has become definitive action: Gergiev has been released from his positions in Munich, Rotterdam, and Milan, He has been released by the Edinburgh International Festival and removed from

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Tchaikovsky's life? Does anyone even care who the Tsars were during Tchaikovsky's life? I don't. Similarly, Does it matter who conducts Tchaikovsky? It might matter in the moment of the concert, but ultimately, it does not. Should Gergiev never conduct again, Tchaikovsky will remain — and remain undiminished.

I am using Tchaikovsky as the example here because his Symphony No. 2: The Little Russian holds a pertinent position in the context of this struggle. Tchaikovsky used three different Ukrainian folk songs in his second symphony. At the time, Ukraine was often referred to as "Little Russia." The inclusion of the folk songs is what makes this symphony The LIttle Russian. In other words, this is the Ukraine

Symphony by Tchaikovsky. Tchaikovsky received veneration from his Russian colleagues for including those folk songs. Previously, he had shown little interest in the nationalism favored by composers such as The Five: Mily Balakirev (the leader), César Cui, Modest Mussorgsky, Nikolai Rimsky-Korsakov, and Alexander Borodin. The Ukrainian folk songs suggested that Tchaikovsky was open to creating Russian music as opposed to absolute music — that is, music composed without any intention to represent or illustrate anything except itself.

The symphony had its premiere in 1872 and was an immediate hit. It is Tchaikovsky's happiest symphony, and has remained popular, if often overshadowed by his fourth, fifth, and sixth symphonies.





Drinks All Around

NICK GERGEN Juniper & Ivy 2228 Kettner Boulevard Little Italy



Berries and cream, berries and cream, I'm a wee little lad who loves berries and cream," sang a colleague of Nick Gergen's when he told her about the strawberries-and-cream-flavored cocktail he was creating for Juniper & Ivy. "I was trying to come up with a name," he recalls, "and she started singing the 'berries and cream' song from Starburst... and that just kind of stuck." What he doesn't quite

recall is the precise inspiration for the Wee Little Lad's recipe. "I think I might've just been perusing the vast expanse that the internet is, and I came across strawberries and cream, and thought it might be a cool idea to turn that into a cocktail." He does know that he wanted to experiment with clarified milk punch. "It was a new technique for me. I had been trying to tinker around with it via other people, and then I really just wanted to get my hands dirty and try it myself."

He says he was surprised to learn that "it's a super old technique: the process of bringing milk to a steam and then removing it from heat," before adding the mix of other ingredients. "You pour it over the milk and it instantaneously curdles. And at that point, it looks very unappetizing," he jokes. "Then you let it sit for a period of time, and then you strain it through a fine strainer. And from there you begin the slow process of coffee filter straining... and it slowly starts to drip all the particles out. And when you're done, you get -" here he pauses, noting that the concoction would ordinarily end up clear, but since his version uses strawberry, "it's not the most

clear. But it has that cool little pink hue to it, which I was looking for — to play on the strawberries and cream characteristics."

Since the cocktail is pre-batched, he simply pours the finished product over a large ice cube that is copper-stamped with the Juniper & Ivy logo. "This one is [made with] Malahat spiced rum, milk, lemon juice, pineapple juice, and strawberry syrup." He chose Malahat spiced rum "because it had a lot of the ingredients that strawberries and cream call for, like vanilla and cinnamon, and other characteristics like that," And because, bewilderingly, "I also found out recently that vanilla, in particular, is more expensive than gold, presently. Pirates are stealing it off ships, and it's really hard to come by. This was a cool way to circumvent or side-step that issue and still get those same flavor profiles."

Leftover lactate certainly makes this drink non-vegan, but, Gergen clarifies, "the milk is more of a textural component, you don't really get much of the flavor behind that. It is more of a tart expression of the strawberries, rounded out by those warming spices like vanilla that you get from the rum."

JUNIPER & IVY'S WEE LITTLE LAD



- 16 oz. Malahat Spiced Rum
- 4 oz. strawberry syrup
- •10 oz. lemon juice
- 10 oz. pineapple juice
- •12 oz. milk

Pour milk into a saucepan and bring to a steam (do not boil). While the milk is heating, combine other ingredients in a pitcher. Once the milk begins to steam, remove it and pour into a glass/ metal mixing bowl. Then pour the rest of the ingredients into the milk; the milk should instantaneously curdle. Let sit for 30 min, then pour through a fine mesh strainer into a new bowl. Pour again through a fine mesh strainer lined with a coffee filter over another new bowl, and set in the refrigerator for up to 12 hours. Repeat 1-2 more times for a clearer cocktail. Once fully strained, pour into a resealable bottle and it will keep in the fridge for 1-2 weeks. When ready to drink, pour 2 oz. over a large ice cube and enjoy.





calico bass 120 halfmoon 3 halibut, 11 lingcod, 10 lobster (26 released), 1 perch, 3.012 rockfish, 76 sand bass, 21 sanddab, 363 sculpin, 161 sheephead, 1 triggerfish, 731 whitefish, and 115 vellowtail.

Saltwater: The weather cleared enough for boats to extend their range, and the Old Glory out of H&M Landing decided to check out the waters some 60 to 70 miles west of Ensenada while out on a 1.5-day trip last Fridav-Saturday with 23 anglers aboard. The gamble paid off, with limits of yellowtail and one 150-pound bluefin tuna. Though one might assume that, like all tuna species, bluefin tuna are annual migrators and will be gone from our waters

when they spawn through the summer in a small area of the Sea of Japan, the truth is that they are around all year, and at the same time, they spawn annually. This is due to their feeding grounds, which result in juveniles being here off the coast of North America, from off Oregon south to off the southern stretches of the Baja Peninsula. As Pacific bluefin are endothermic, or warm-blooded, they are not subject to certain temperature ranges that triggers migrations of other pelagic species that the San Diego fleet targets. With freedom from the bonds that keep cold-blooded fish more predictable, bluefin tuna can be hard to find.

That they become sexually mature at a broad age range, from 3 to 9 years, and can be 120-300 pounds or more in that age range, means some stay in the eastern Pacific, and some return to Japan, travelling over 5000 miles to spawn every year. Once they return to spawn in the Sea of Japan, Pacific bluefin remain on that side of the ocean, and they can live up to 25 years. As they continue to grow throughout their lives, they can reach upwards of 900 pounds. (This is why we don't see many caught over 400 pounds.)

The world-record Pacific bluefin tuna landed unassisted (IGFA requirement for a record) was caught in the western Pacific by angler Donna Pascoe on February 19, 2014. The California record was caught this past summer by San Diego angler Floyd Sparks and weighed 395.4 pounds. Larger fish weighing just over 400 pounds have been caught in US waters, but those did not qualify for record submittal.

Though Pacific bluefin are from the same stock, there are many schools that migrate annually, based on sexual maturity. Think cattle from one bloodline on a ranch. You can have one stock, but many herds. Studies were few before the turn of

the century, but more recent tracking efforts using pop-up beacons that can be monitored by satellite shows that the bluefin tuna schools that remain in the eastern Pacific can be just about anywhere from a couple miles off the coast to over a thousand, and anywhere between Eugene. Oregon and Cabo San Lucas.

That they are widely-ranged and relatively unaffected by water temperature is why we don't see many caught during the winter months when fewer boats are running, and weather and distance makes looking for them unsustainable for sportfishing vessels. But, as with the Old Glory, when there is a sighting or a catch within range, they will go take a look. Bluefin tuna are not solitary swimmers and are typically caught in schools that ahve migrated together, so where

there is one in the hundred and fifty-pound range, there are more in that area. The one fish caught aboard the Old Glory was plucked out of a large, metered school of fish 250 feet below a hot yellowtail surface bite. It may have been just one fish hooked and landed, but seasoned Old Glory captain Kley Williams' decision to go offshore paid off with a brute.

As we had our first week of the season with over a thousand anglers and Spring Break is near, along with the great seasonal rockfish numbers. I expect we will see more yellowtail, bonito, and bluefin in the counts in the coming weeks with more boats out looking.

Freshwater: As the trout season is winding down, anglers who want to continue catching the tasty stockers through spring and into summer can focus on the one lake in our county that stocks trout 10 months out of the year: Lake Cuyamaca. Trout fishing is still good at the other county lakes being stocked, but that bite will wane quickly once the last plants are delivered by late March through early April and the lower elevation lake waters warm.

Cuyamaca does not publish its trout stocking schedule as do most county lakes. But as it stocks most of the year and has cooler water at over 4600 feet in elevation, trout can be caught there in any month. The lake also offers good largemouth bass fishing, along with a small population of smallmouth bass, plenty of channel catfish, bluegill, crappie, and occasionally, white sturgeon, making Cuyamaca one of the more species-diverse lakes in our area.

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police won't respond. Also within earshot are a five-story condominium and fourstory apartment."


"Rooftop noise has been a huge issue for us," said Tony Khalil, the city's noise administrator. "It truly is a nuisance." Enforcement is hit or miss, since code enforcement from being brought in for events, require a noise study, and establish a process for revoking the permits of bad actors. But neighbors say noise pollution in the area remains extreme, from pedicabs to live street musicians on 5th and Market. At least one bar violates the ordinance by keeping their windows and doors open.

No permit is required for ambient or background noise, which is higher in

ment staff doesn't work at night when the racket occurs, and the San Diego Police Department often has bigger priorities than noise complaints.

According to a report, the city has approved only six conditional use permits for outdoor live entertainment over the last 15 years: Andaz; Omnia; Quartyard II; Pendry Hotel Pool Deck; Fifth & J Restaurant; and AC Hotel. The permits set strict requirements on sound system levels, prohibit outside sound and amplification equipurban areas — and that includes recorded music played by DJs. The city's noise ordinance limit is 50 dB, which they compare to "Quiet Urban Daytime" outdoors. The Sugar Factory's 3000-square-foot rooftop deck has a permit that allows ambient recorded music no later than 1:30 am. Hours for live entertainment were proposed until 2 am, seven days a week. Permits were also sought by the owner, Oliver McMillan Gaslamp Theatres, LLC, to allow live entertainment indoors on the ground floor and



second floor, as well as sidewalk café and street-level outdoor dining.

The project had the support of the Downtown Community Planning Council, which praised the new venues it would bring to the Gaslamp and recommended limited hours for live entertainment. Commissioners approved everything except the amplified outdoor live entertainment, citing the unneighborly history. According to Javier

Nicholas, a San Diego police detective who fielded multiple violations by the restaurant from April to October, the business blatantly ignored warnings. Live entertainment was going on the entire time they were applying for a permit. During one visit, the plainclothes detective was met by security who told him to move aside as they rushed to pull the DJ off the stage.
