



Paddlers in peril Popular pandemic pastime ups rescue requirements

On September 24, shortly before 2 pm, Erica was eating lunch at Eddie Vs on Prospect Street in La Jolla when she noticed a fire truck crane extended over La Jolla Cove across the street. She pulled out her phone and started filming. "Two kayakers seemed to have gotten stuck and had to be lifted out," she told me on September 26. In her video (reposted by sdfirebrigade on Instagram), the two kayakers and the kayak can be seen being hoisted out of the cove together via cable.

On August 27, San Diego Fire-Rescue Department lifeguards at La Jolla Cove saw a distressed kayaker close to the notorious Emerald Cave. The lifeguards called for backup, and several other lifeguards in a rescue boat and a rescue watercraft responded. "Fourteen kayakers were rescued and, fortunately, did not suffer any injuries," read a Fire and Rescue social media post. "One kayaker reported an injury which resulted in a response by Rescue 44, the lifeguard cliff rescue vehicle. The injured patient was taken to the hospital."

According to an Outdoor Foundation report cited by the Water Sports Foundation website, in 2020, the pandemic brought out an estimated 2.5 million new paddlers — including folks who are now kayaking, kayak fishing, canoeing, and stand-up paddle boarding — to

the activity," Emmons continued, "And over one-third (38.8 percent) had less than 10 hours experience."

While it's not clear if the recently rescued kayakers in the La Jolla waters were beginners or not, the area's water conditions remain unpredictable, even for seasoned paddlesports enthusiasts.

U.S. waters. "However, it increased accidents to 331, and fatalities to a record high 202 – accounting for more than 26 percent of all boating fatalities that same year." said Jim Emmons, executive director of the WSF. He noted that boating, in general, is one of the safest recreational activities available, and that the paddlesports deaths transpired because of a lack of experience and safety training. "We know from analyzing U.S. Coast Guard data that in 2020, nearly three-quarters (74.6 percent) of people who died in paddling accidents had less than 100 hours experience in

San Diego Canoe Kayak Team Coach Chris Barlow and his team, many of them former lifeguards, teach boating safety and train both their junior racing team and older folks in the members-only club. "Most of our on-the-water activities take place on Mission Bay," he told me in a September 26 email. "The boats we paddle are different from the recreational sit-on-top kayaks used at La Jolla Cove and the shores, and we only take our most experienced paddlers out into the ocean."

The decamping Campa-Najjar Will bunking in Banker's Hill bust South Bay scheme?

Ammar Campa-Najjar campaigned for votes from Temecula to El Cajon as an East County congressional candidate in 2018 and 2020, and has now shifted south to ask Chula Vista voters to elect him mayor this November. But is his heart actually in San Diego's upscale Bankers Hill?

Chula Vista fourterm city councilman John McCann, Campa-Najjar's opponent in the mayoral race, held

a press conference September 27 outside a condominium in Bankers Hill which he says is Campa-Najjar's true residence, rather than Chula Vista. McCann says former FBI counterintelligence agent Lawrence Hamilton produced video evidence proving that Campa-Najjar lived in the multi-milliondollar condo belonging to his girlfriend, Congresswoman Sara Jacobs, for almost a month. "The photos and videos were taken daily and represent almost a solid 23 consecutive nights that were spent in the San Diego condo. During the investigation, his girlfriend Sara was in Washington D.C. the vast majority of the time, so Ammar was not there to see his girlfriend."

In a San Diego Republican Party press release accusing the Democrat of felony voter fraud, former Chula Vista mayor Shirley Horton stated, "Campa-Najjar has a pattern of misleading voters for his own personal gain by using his family's addresses to run in different districts; for example, he used his mother's Jamul address for 2018's East County's 50th Congressional District, his aunt's Bonita address for 2020's California State Assembly race, and now his cousin's Chula Vista address for 2022's Chula Vista Mayoral race."

In 2018, I reported that Ammar Yasser Najjar changed his name to Ammar Joseph Campa-Najjar when he first ran for public office, getting rid of his father's name Yasser and adding his mother's Spanish last name to his own.

Last year, *Voice of San Diego* reported on Campa-Najjar's hop from running for office in East County to running in South Bay. "When Campa-Najjar filed paperwork to run for mayor of Chula Vista, it caught some people by surprise. After all, none of Chula Vista is in the 50th Congressional District... It is true that Campa-Najjar hasn't exactly been public about his South Bay roots – he has mentioned Chula Vista in just two of his 5,375 tweets."

Former Los Angeles District Attorney Steve Cooley, first elected in 2000, tells me

he established a public integrity division a month after taking office and started prosecuting politicians who lied about living in the districts they ran to represent, almost all in municipal races. He says, "The jurisdiction where the office is held sets the require-

City seeks real estate expert in wake of debacle

After getting badly burned by the 101 Ash Street building scandal, San Diego's city council is looking to hire a real estate consultant to assist the city council's independent budget analyst in an effort to avoid such embarrassing financial



meltdowns in the future. The longed-for contractor "shall provide the City of San Diego's Office of the Independent Budget Analyst asneeded real estate advisory services," says a September 30 request for proposals posted online. "Contractor will work under the direction of the [Independent Budget Analyst] and will assist the IBA and the City Council in evaluating a variety of real estate-related proposals and options." The consultant is to "evaluate potential real estate proposals and transactions such as building purchases, lease administration, and agreements, and disposition of City-owned property," the document goes on to say.

As explained by the solicitation, "The mission of the [Independent Budget Analyst] is to provide clear, objective, and unbiased analysis and advice to the City Council and the public regarding all legislative items bearing financial and policy impacts to the City of San Diego." The possible cost of the consulting services is not given.

In late July, the council voted 6-3 to approve a controversial \$132 million-plus deal to settle litigation and acquire 101 Ash and nearby Civic

Center Plaza, a move championed by Democratic Mayor Todd Gloria. The mayor subsequently set up a so-called citizens committee, tasked with the ostensible mission of advising him on how the city should exploit the six blocks it now owns. "We have this opportunity, now that we control this rather large part of downtown San Diego, to invite ideas, suggestions and a path forward for addressing not just the needs of the city, but to try and put this publicly owned property to better use for the general public," the mayor was quoted as telling the Union-Tribune.

Unlike most of the city's bureaucracy, the **Independent Budget Analyst reports to the** city council, not the mayor, and so the work of the new real estate advisor could serve as a balance to proposals cooked up by Gloria's committee of downtown insiders, chaired by Jaymie Bradford, chief operating officer of the San Diego Regional Chamber of Commerce, one of the mayor's key political money backers. Real estate lawyer, lobbyist, and Gloria donor Donna Jones, whose clients have included La Jolla's Bishop's School, developer and ex-city manager Jack McGrory, labor union representatives Carol

Will Cox's Axios clobber the Union-Tribune? San Diego's news and politics landscape may get a lot more interesting with the imminent arrival of an online outfit owned and bankrolled by Atlanta, Georgia-based Cox Enterprises, owner of Cox Communications, the giant cable TV and Internet provider with a big local footprint. On August 8, Cox Enterprises announced it had purchased Axios Media, Inc. in what Axios said was a deal

valuing Axios at \$525 million. Begun in 2017 by ex-Politico honchos Jim VandeHei, Mike Allen and Roy Schwartz, Axios bought the online Charlotte Agenda of North Carolina's largest city in 2020, for close to \$5 million, per a December 17, 2020, New York Times account. "There is an audience - and real revenue in cities," VandeHei told the Times in an email. "It's a



the San Diego area as part of our growing local news initiative, which is extending our mission to America's hometowns," says a current job posting by Axios. "This reporter will create a meaningful local presence in their market, getting readers smarter, faster on the news that matters to them. This reporter will connect the dots between local, national, and global developments to

make readers aware of the narratives shaping their lives."

But just how well some dots get connected could depend on the influence of Axios's new owner Cox Enterprises and subsidiary Cox Communications, which was until January registered as a lobbyist with the city of San Diego. According to Cox's January 27 disclosure filing, last November Government Affairs Director Cassandra Weinlein gave \$100 to Vivian Moreno for City Council

2002, and Cox's Alberto Velasquez gave the Moreno committee \$650 the same day. Weinlein was listed as lobbying Simon Tse of the city's Development Services department to "expedite permitting for telecom equipment." In the quarter before that, Cox was lobbying for "permitting, including permitting level for cabinets and pedestals." The big future money to be made by Cox, though, appears likely to come from providing connections to local municipalities in so-called Smart City deals,

> raising controversial questions of privacy. Cox "could add technology that would give the city information on vehicle recognition and vehicle traffic counting, as well as pedestrian traffic in the area," the company's Michael Socha told the El Cajon city council, according to an October 5, 2020, Union-Tribune account of the meeting. The San Diego Axios initiative comes after word that the *U-T*, the city's

sole daily newspaper, owned by Los Angeles billionaire Patrick Soon-Shiong, may soon drop some print publication days in favor of posting a replica of the paper, obtainable online only. Says Cox's news release regarding Axios: "Cox Enterprises' current media companies — The Atlanta Journal-Constitution, Dayton Daily News and other Ohio newspapers — are not impacted by the deal and each will continue to operate independently."

ments for holding office including residence or domicile. In order to establish residence in a district as required by ordinance, they have to fill out a voter registration form. When they lie on the form under penalty of perjury, they are committing a felony. Most cases proceed by voter fraud. During my 12-year tenure, we probably had twelve to fifteen of these cases; all were convicted. A couple went to trial, but most pled guilty. It's not that hard to prove whether the address they had given is where they reside. The operative concept is domicile, not residence. You can have multiple residences. Domicile is where you keep your stuff, spend time, get bills, go to sleep. You also look at, 'What's their motivation?" Cooley says just because a candidate is approved for the ballot by an election agency doesn't mean they have proven their address is valid. "It just means they've been defrauded, also."

In response to the alleged video evidence showing Campa-Najjar living in San Diego for a month, Cooley says, "You may be away from domicile for a length of time. They need more than that, like where they get mail, where their car is registered. It's not just where they are at for a length of time. It's the whole picture. More questions have to be asked."

McCann tells me, "Ask Campa-Najjar to see his driver's license to show you his address — he won't have it." On September 28, McCann stated in a press release the U.S. Postal Service certified Campa-Najjar's primary address for mail is Jacobs' condo in Bankers Hill, and that Hamilton has several pictures of Amazon packages addressed to Ammar delivered to that residence.

Campa-Najjar did not respond to a request for comment.

Mobile homers made to mobilize

City v. state to decide their fate?

The city of Imperial Beach has battled oil companies, cross border pollution, and the San Diego Association of Governments. Now it's tackling...a mobile home park? "We've gone out on a limb before," said Councilmember Ed Spriggs last week, as the city discussed what to do about the Miramar Mobile Home & RV Park, where tenants say they face unfair evictions and other problems. Further, those other city battles "don't affect real people quite the same way this does," he added.

Miramar park residents packed the chambers to hear city manager Andy Hall discuss the latest efforts by staff to reach an agreement with the owners. "The problem is, we've circulated an agreement to them and we have yet to hear back if this is the direction they

short-term move: \$2,500 for a hotel stay, just for the weekend, said Oscar Toscado. Others pay hundreds just to move their trailer in and out. According to residents, the park owns about 15 percent of the RVs.

The city was told the routine move-outs

state law, separating them from other rental units. Nevertheless, he said, "Because they are renters, we believe they should probably have the same protections that all the other renters in the community have."

Julie Pauley, with the Western Manufactured Housing Communities Association, a trade association that represents park owners, said it's important to manage expectations. "I don't know that every point is going to be resolved in agreement. Also, every issue is not going to be resolved if you pass rent control," she added. "As a core value, we're against rent control ordinances." Pauley called the policy "really harmful" to mobile home communities, creating a regulatory environment in which attorneys do all the talking. "It's just

want to go," said Hall. The city got involved months ago, after hearing complaints from tenants of the Palm Avenue park, but residents say the problems continue. "The 48-hour notices, the rent increases, sewer problems," and more, said resident Connie Villapondo.

Perhaps the most vexing and "unique" issue, as another resident described it, is faced by some of the park's RV tenants. Miramar contains both mobile homes and RV spots, and in order to maintain the park's RV status, some tenants are forced to move out every six months for at least 48 hours. "I feel like I'm homeless," one woman said. It's a costly

are for the purpose of making improvements, Hall said. He suggested that a better option might be to have people move within the park. But the city's wishes butt up against another reality: mobile home parks fall under the

jurisdiction of the state, and are regulated by the Mobile Home Residency Law. Even so, the city has to look out for the safety and wellbeing of community members. "So," said Hall, "we thought the best way to address it was with an agreement directly with the owner."

The city's proposal included anti-harassment or retaliation provisions; an immediate moratorium on evictions; a three percent rent cap; mediation through the city, not a third party; and that all complaints sent to management get sent to the city within 30 days. Among those, rent control may prove to be the big hold up. Its parameters apply to other rental units in California, Hall said, but the state decided to exclude mobile home parks from rent control, partly because they have their own chapter in

not a win." But rent control doesn't seem to be the real issue at Miramar, anyway, she said. "It's the moving of the trailers," which she added is new to her — and she's been doing this for 13 years. "I'm really here trying to broker peace," she said. "I think we're close."

The council didn't entirely agree. Councilmember Paloma Aguirre said she met with residents and the new owner at the park in January. Now it's September, and despite ample opportunity to enter into an agreement, there has been no response. She made a motion to include everything in the agreement and have it be an ordinance, which the city will do next. "Mr. Hall alluded to patience running thin," she said. "Patience has run out."

San Diego locals probably don't think much about "city living." Sure, there are no fewer than 19 locales within the county's borders that bear the "City Of" moniker, but we're not New York, Chicago, or even Boston. Skyscrapers and penthouse suites aren't our thing; we're more a beach bungalow and suburban tract kind of town.

Still, that's not to say that we don't offer a bit of metropolitan flair, and whether you regard the effort in recent decades

to gentrify the downtown area as exacerbating our housing crisis or earning us a seat at the grown-ups' table in terms of prestige, it would be a foolish to

ignore the fact we now have a decent collection of big, shiny buildings that come just short of blocking the airport flight path along the coast. And though the Harbor Club towers across from the convention center were built just 30 years ago, given the city's historically-stunted development, that's old enough to make them elder statesmen among the town's glass-walled high rises.

So, who's ready to "enjoy breathtaking 360-degree ocean, San Diego Bay, Downtown cityscape and surrounding landmark views?" Because that's what the opening Zillow line for our visit today — a \$5.5 million condo at 100 Harbor Drive — invites us to do. We begin our tour in a glass-walled dining area, with a massive orange chandelier hanging down and a rock patio wall obscuring our view of the convention center while still allowing us with a panorama of the bay, Coronado, and beyond to the Pacific.

From there, we head outside for a view of that stone-lined deck, with outdoor dining and liv-

ing areas larger than the yards of some houses elsewhere in the city that I've toured with clients. Radiant gas heaters mounted in the ceiling look like they'd be more than sufficient to ward off any chilly ocean breezes in the winter, and while I can't tell for sure, it looks like we're at least as high up as the top of the Hyatt, visible off in the distance. A sunset view looking off the edge of the patio is particularly impressive, with the buildings and marina below all alight. The eastern skyline, looking over the rest of the city, is nothing to sneeze at either.

After a bit, we make it back inside, to the "grand foyer that leads to the main living floor with its formal living and dining rooms, gourmet kitchen,

THERE HAS BEEN A LOT OF TALK in various places about the government throwing up gigantic new defense industries, bringing in thousands of people to run them, yet providing no places for these new people to live.

Here in San Diego, for instance, men are actually driving eighty miles a day to work. Homeowners are buying double-decked bunks, putting them in their garages, and renting them out to aircraft workmen.

The greatest congestion is in the area around the aircraft plants. It seems single men don't like to travel far to work, so they are jammed up as many as four in a room in rooming houses near the plant. But the government is doing something about it here. It is, in fact, building the biggest government housing project in America.

It is creating a whole new city just outside of San Diego — yet within the city limits — a city of three thousand houses, which will hold at least ten thousand people. It is up on the

mesa above San Diego, and you can see a long way from there. The place, so far, is called the Kearny Mesa project.

It wasn't started until last February. When ground was broken, it was absolutely untouched mesa, covered with high bush and lousy with sidewinder rattlesnakes. Today the houses stretch almost as far as you can see. The first families have already moved in. Building goes steadily on.

More than three thousand men are working on it.

The rattlesnakes, incidentally, are putting up a fight for their domain. They tell me there have been ninety workmen in the hospital this spring with rattlesnake bites.

This new city will be two-and-a-half miles long, a mile and a half wide. It will have parks and playgrounds and churches. It will have two elementary schools and one junior high school. It will have stores at each end and in the middle.


It is six miles from downtown San Diego, and there will be bus service. The whole thing is costing a little under ten million dollars. The contract calls for completion within three hun-

dred working days, which means by midwinter.

The houses are permanent — not of the semipermanent Army-cantonment type. They are compact and furnished with all modern contraptions. No two houses of the same design are put side by side. They sit back from the street with ample lawn space. Two or three years from now, when grass and trees and shrubbery have their way, the city will be nice to look at.

There isn't a house with a garage in this new city. Cars will have to stand out, the idea being, apparently, that when people start buying these houses after the war, they can build their own garages.

For after the war the government intends to sell the whole thing — not by the individual house, but to private companies continued on page 38

two en-suite bedrooms and the first of three balconies," which the listing would like to remind us is equipped with a full outdoor kitchen. Proceeding through the foyer, we see the entryway with a staircase leading to a second level. Leaving that alone for now, we pass to a living area with curved glass walls and a fireplace/ television wall lined with stone tiles that look both retro and modern at the same time — like the old stone wall fireplace my childhood house had, but classier. I like this.

Back outside, we get some more deck shots, including one highlighting the sort of outdoor pizza oven that for a while was an ubiquitous feature of *Unreal* columns. I am no longer impressed by these, though I certainly still believe they're likely very expensive, and probably make great pizza.

The next shot takes us back to the staircase. which I assume means it's time to head upstairs, where "the second floor is dedicated to the expansive primary retreat that provides sitting and office areas, luxurious spa-inspired bath and two balconies." Wow, two balconies just for the main bedroom, while the rest of the house only gets one? Okay, I have now learned that separate spousal balconies are a thing - maybe not as much of a thing as separate bathrooms in an owner's suite, but still a thing, since I have seen it once. Up here, we get another small living

room with no fireplace but an even larger TV, an office space, and a bedroom where the television monitor blocks a significant chunk of window space. One of the balconies sports a pair of wicker loungers and even more views. Then we look at the bedroom a few more times before we get to the bathroom, which has a tile and handrail-lined hallway just to get to the massive shower, which looks spacious enough at first glance to house half a baseball team. The soaking tub looking out at the city is nice, though.

After a trip through a bedroom-sized walkin closet lined in wood, we get even more view photos and a shot of the third balcony (which looks rather pedestrian in comparison with the others) before getting to the kitchen. It's a double-galley style: spacious enough and nicely appointed, but the circular bar at the end of the kitchen hallway leading back to the common areas is probably the highlight here.

Bouncing around the rest of the unit, I think the most striking thing is the powder room, lined floor-to-ceiling with tiny square tiles ranging from beige to brown, featuring a circular vanity and vessel sink. This room would weird out a lot of my guests, but I like it, nonetheless.

The remainder of our tour is of the Harbor Club grounds. A low building fee of \$1765 per month gets you access to three private garage parking spaces, a storage unit, pool, spa, sauna, fitness center, clubhouse, firepits, and barbecue areas that mark "just a few of the ways to relax in comfort and style!"

Public records list the owner of unit 4102 as William Trzos, a "financial services and insurance related verticals" professional. The last time we visited a Harbor Club unit, back in 2020, the seller was seeking \$5.25 million for a combination of unites 3803 and 3804 of roughly the same size as this place, albeit a few floors lower. They never got it, and the property is now offmarket. Our current unit was listed at \$5,999,000 in late August after last selling for a reported \$4.1 million a little over a year ago. Public records list the total living area at 3714 square feet, but the listing claims 4400 square feet — perhaps this includes the outdoor deck space? In September, the price was cut by a half-million dollars to \$5,499,000, which remains unchanged to date. ■



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A half-century of San Diego stories from the Reader

o much of identity is memory. There's experience; maybe we chase it, maybe it just washes over us. But memory is what makes experience stick, what makes an anybody slipping through life into a somebody who has lived. And it's what makes San Diego more than a sprawling no-place with a beach and a zoo and an excess of sunshine. I work a few steps away from the *Reader* archives: 260 square feet of wallspace occupied by rows of

black cardboard office drawers nestled into a steel framework, each one labeled with a date. The first reads simply: 1972. The first cover feature, "South of Bdwy," published October 5, 1972, is by John Milton (!) and begins, "The city, only a few years ago, only wanted to expand Horton Plaza. You know Horton Plaza, south of Broadway, across from Westgate Plaza, San Diego's Hyde Park: Hare Krishna...black-and-white fundamentalists...the pitifully inebriated..." Over the

50 years that followed, the *Reader* told the San Diego stories that helped to form San Diego's story. That wall of drawers is more than an archive; it's a storehouse of memory — the identity of a city, the answer to the question, "What's San Diego like?" Over the next four weeks, we'll be running brief excerpts from just a few of those stories, selected by the paper's founder and owner, Jim Holman. Links to the full pieces are online.







San Diego Reader: How long do you spend preparing your sermons?

Pastor Karla Halvorson: I love the idea of having a newspaper in the one hand and the Bible in the other. I spend about ten hours

a week putting my sermons together, which includes Bible study with members here at the church where we look at the upcoming gospel reading... But then of course, the whole sermon usually gets changed by about Saturday!

SDR: What's your main concern as a member of the clergy?

PH: St. Mark's is very aware of whatever prejudice of the day comes up. We have four languages in which people worship here. We, St. Mark's, are Spanish and Englishspeaking. So we have two services, one in Spanish and one in English. We also rent

the church space to Glory Lutheran, which has services in Chinese and Mandarin. We also have another rental group, a Korean group, Areumdaun Church, which means "beautiful" in Korean. We have good relationships with all these congregations. Under one sanctuary roof, every Sunday, God is worshipped in four languages. We do some youth events together with the Chinese congregation, and we're good friends with the Koreans.

SDR: What is the mission of vour church?

PH: In celebrating God's love and forgiveness, we serve others. We say that every single week, right up front at the beginning of our Sunday service. The vision right now is to live into what I call our tagline: "Two languages, one congregation." We're welcoming anyone who comes our way. These are the kind of people we have in our congregation — and all are welcome. I keep experiencing that with the people here, and they are very loving, welcoming people.

SDR: What one book has had the greatest influence on your ministry?

PH: A cousin of mine, who is also a pastor, Cindy Halvorson, wrote a wonderful book, Real Faith, Real People:

Preaching Biblical Characters. The book helps us enter fully with all five senses into the gospel characters' lives, and as a result of that, they come to life and we see how much we have in common with them. Their encounter with the living God is then something we feel we can also experience.

SDR: Where do you go when you die?

PH: I'm not at all concerned about hell. In last week's sermon, there was a very horrible description of hell that Jesus gives. But the point is, what do we do here and now? We come from love, we live this life, we try to bring as much love as we can into this life, and in the end we return to love. I expect warmth and happiness and joy and peace and serenity in the next life. If I really keep doing diligently what we're doing now, I truly expect to hear, "Well done, good and faithful servant." As for hell, there's nothing





Amsterdam — Director David O. Russell returns from an extended absence (after the oddflop Joy) with an extended...well, it's hard to say what, exactly. A spoof on the hard-boiled works of Humphrey Bogart? That would explain the Maltese Falcon voiceover, the Big Sleep meetup with the rich family trying to control its wild daughter, and of course, the strange Casablanca triangle of dear friends overseas, two white (Christian Bale, Margot Robbie) and one black (John David Washington). Bale works pretty well as an anti-Bogey: a half-Catholic, half-Jewish doctor with a glass eye, a back brace, and a pain pill problem thanks to the Great War who is nevertheless unembittered and a regular champion of kindness and decency. He'll stick his neck out for anybody, if he can manage to stand up. And a spoof would explain the weirdly weightless character of the drama, which ought to feel more dramatic, given the film's urgent warning against anti-democratic forces at work right here in the good old USA, even as it bares its teeth at American businessmen who are willing to profit off fascism. Those who refuse to learn from history,

etc. And it would explain the almost embarrassing sincerity of sentiment and nigh-inhuman displays of virtue. ("Whoever is shooting at me right now is a coward!") Ambitious merger of live action and computer animation, with at least one groundbreaking 3-D effect: English subtitles for the language spoken on the celestial body of Pandora inserted on a plane in the middle distance between a foreground figure and an upstage figure, as if the foreground one could look down and

read the subtitle himself. This effect is silly, is pretentious, is pointless, and nonetheless is fun. Much the same could be said of the movie as a whole.

Silly, pretentious, pointless, and fun is surely less than writer and director James Cameron had in mind for his first feature film since Titanic twelve years before, a two hour and forty-five minute "visionary" science-fiction epic that dishes up an allegory on globalism, a warm-over of the old science-versus-military debate, a dose of Noble Savage romanticism, a Capt. Smith and Pocahontas culture-clash romance, an ecological message, and a tree-felling that insistently recalls the toppling of the World Trade Center.

There appears little doubt that Cameron drew upon all his mental powers, yet happily those powers prove too feeble, too reliant on convention and stereotype, or if you wish to make it sound better, on tradition and archetype, to ruin the fun. The powers themselves, with their rumble of self-importance and their straining for significance, are part and parcel of the kitschy fun. Drag Me to Hell — Sam Raimi horror film for those who like their sadism to be gleeful. An old-fashioned gypsy curse, cast by an old gypsy of unprecedented repulsiveness (rotten dentures, coughedup phlegm, milky eye, etc.), falls upon a girlish loan officer (Alison Lohman) who already has enough troubles in her life — a glass ceiling at the bank, her boyfriend's disapproving mother — without the upchucked insects, the projectile nosebleed, the sacrificed kitten, and so forth. It's all in a spirit of fun, looking for laughs as much as chills, though both searches somehow taking away from the other. The philosophical debate between the psychologist boyfriend (Justin Long) and an Indian fortune teller (Dileep Rao), strictly for laughs, may be the least adulterated scene in the movie. Halloween — A spectacular opening: a circuitous single-take which travels, a little unsteadily, up the walkway of a modest Middle American home, all the way around the side of the building, through the kitchen door, briefly into the cutlery drawer where a hand reaches in from offscreen to select a fearsome butcher knife, up the staircase, into the bedroom of a teenage girl who is swiftly slashed to death at her vanity, back down the stairs and out the front door.

Partway through this shot, just prior to the stabbing, the same hand that earlier selected the sturdy murder weapon reaches in to pick up a Halloween mask from the floor and fit it over the subjective eve of the camera, and then the shot continues with the entire screen blocked out except for an aperture in the center which is cut in the shape of the mask's eveholes. (As this device of blocking out part of a movie image is technically called a "mask," the use of it here is quite a witty visual pun.) After the virtuoso opening, though, the movie drops to a lower level. For a story set on Halloween night in a Midwestern smalltown, there's a conspicuous thinness of atmosphere. Americana, sociology, or however you care to classify the peculiarly profane trappings of this religious holiday. Where are all the trick-or-treaters, the costumes, the candies, the pumpkins? 

Come Fall In Love The DDLJ Musical

Globe artistic director Barry Edelstein writes that Come Fall in Love the theater's ginormous new musical based on the hit Indian film DDLJ (and directed by the film's writer/director Aditya Chopra), "delivers a gentle and sweet story of star-crossed love, family, and tradition. And music. And dance. That mention of "star-crossed love" brings Romeo & Juliet to mind, and what do you know, the play gets mentioned early on, as part of our Harvardeducated heroine Simran's sung thesis rejecting "storybook love" in favor of something more active and heroic. But while there is a star set against the union of the mutually stunning Simran and Rog, it's not the enmity of two families. Quite the opposite: it turns out that Simran's immigrant father left his heart back in India, as well as a promise to his dear friend that their children would one day marry.

Oddly, it seems that his plan to raise a perfect Indian bride involves getting her a top-flight American education and sending her on a cultural tour of Europe before taking her back to the old country. And it's there she gets to know Rog, the rich kid with a heart of gold to match. But don't fret: the culture clash and generation gap are just a scaffold for goings-on that really are gentle and sweet. You're here for the comedy and costumes, the fun and froth, the music and dance. The first act delivers in fine fashion, especially the title number, a brilliantly backdropped siren song from hedonist Rog as he squires the

museum-minded Simran around the Continent. (A close second is "Like You That Way," in which the pair adorably start to realize what the audience has known all along.) What the second act's songs lose in craft and catchiness they sometimes make up for in humor, notably "Hot and Independent and Hot," the intended groom's fantasy of what his American bride will be like. And while the inevitable turn toward dramatic tension and resolution may not make you weep, the preceding proceedings will almost surely make

Kristina Wong: Sweatshop Overlord

When covid hit and the lockdowns descended, a lot of people were left feeling uncertain, unsafe, and unconnected. Self-declared "self-obsessed performance artist" Kristina Wong maybe felt that way more than most. Uncertain: besides being essentially inessential as an artist, she declares early on in this, her only semi-comic (but still frequently funny) reflection on her pandemic experience, "I have no genetic legacy. I chose to forego children. You receive my repackaged pain and suffering in a way that makes you feel loved. I gave up children for you!" (Laughter, applause.) Unsafe: even before masking/not-masking became an issue, she had to deal with the mask she could not remove. Some people thought "Kung Flu" was funny. She found it a scary expression of anti-Asian sentiment. Unconnected: two of the three things she cites as an inheritance from her retiring, play-it-safe mother are a Costco membership and guilt. But the third thing was sewing, and so begins her transformative work, making masks for underserved com-

munities, essential workers, and um, Walter Reed military hospital? ("Is America a banana republic disguised as a democracy?" she asks, not for the first or last time.) By pandemic's end well, show's end, anyway - she's more certain, more safe, and more connected than she might have imagined possible, given the circumstances. The show is front-loaded with jokes: early on, she riffs on the calling of "Joan of Arc, Maid of Orleans" — she's "Kristina of Wong, Old Maid of Koreatown," on a mission to find elastic ("If it stretches, it fetches"), enlist volunteer aid from an army of aunties, and if need be, go down sewing. (Her no-man's-land crawl to the post office is just plain good stuff.) But jokes or no, she's horrified by what the next years bring, from anti-maskers to Asian hate crimes to George Floyd to RBG to January 6 to anti-vaxxers, and her frustration shines through like sunlight through tulle. Not surprisingly, the stronger moments are those that are more personal, such as her remembrance of Corky Lee, a famed photographer who spent his life making other Asian-Americans visible. "What a lovely home!" Phil leads with "All this house and one son?" After all, the result is the same: fewer Jews! Not to be outdone in the Department of Outrageous, Outlandish, and Outre, Mark is ready with his own riff on the restaurants at an imagined Holocaustthemed addition to Disney World. Vietnamese? "Never Pho Get." And it goes on from there. Of course, it's not all arguments over history and Israel and right living; it isn't even mostly that. Playwright Nathan Englander only turns to an issue when it helps to illuminate a person, or, failing that, their worldview. It's fast and furious going, almost too much at times for the cast to fully inhabit — unless maybe it's a directorial choice to take it easy on the audience by not letting them luxuriate in the emotion inherent in their dazzling, devastating words. Even so, it's a riveting ride, ably depicting both those who have found a happy home in God and tradition and those for whom those things feel like a perverse and primitive prison — right up until the curious, even frustrating ending. "IZOLA Bakery will not exploit this local artist any longer," reads a recent Instagram post from local singer Fre3sty13, "as they expect us to art inside their shop for free; that's modern-day slavery... You want to know why the nation is in this position? It's because of establishments like this that promise to

above his former photo studio, during the 2020 pandemic. Named after his grandmother, the business thrived despite his contracting Covid.

"Recently, they've become popular and just plain rude!" alleges Yvonne in the post. "They don't value their musicians that come in and provide good vibes for their clients.

properly compensate us for our effort once they have reached their goals, but once they get that money they turn cold." (Fre3sty13, whose real name is Yvonne, has been singing for 22 years, everything from a cappella hymns to Disney tunes, and you can sometimes find her performing at the Farmer's Market in Little Italy. However, she wrote in a recent email to the Reader, she's also had issues with another venue. "I am unable to share [performances] at the Hillcrest Farmers Market; banned by management for having 'too much love' and 'too much soul.")

When contacted by the Reader, Bakery owner Jeffrey Lamont Brown did not initially respond to Yvonne's derogatory comments about his business 🚊 on her Instagram. However, he admits to seeing the negative post, which pulled on local musicians' heartstrings and garnered many supportive comments and shares. "It hurt," said Brown, who opened the bakery south of City College at 13th and G, on the third floor

Every Sunday for the past eight months, I have shown up and sang to a patron-less room for up to six hours, to help them grow without being properly compensated, and many others have joined me."

Among the hundreds of five-star Yelp reviews commending the bakery's treats and coffee are comments that indicate musicians are indeed part of the venue's attraction. "[I] went on a Sunday morning," commented Yelp Elite member Anthony D. "There was also a live singer, which added such a great energy to an already amazing place. It was almost as if we stumbled upon an open mic night that happens to serve some of the best baked goods!"

Great energy doesn't usually come free of charge. "I worked multiple days during the week [at the bakery] without compensation," Yvonne told the Reader. "On Sundays, I was required to bring my own PA, sing quietly, and share personal equipment with other artists." Yvonne says Brown promised

her \$100 if she brought other singers to the bakery on Sunday and sang as well. "Artists consistently canceled and failed to show up," she said, "especially when they discovered they wouldn't be compensated."

Brown told the Reader that poets and musicians are still welcome to perform at the bakery, stating that they do get compensation, but not in cash. "Doesn't matter if they're amateurs or professionals," he said. "People bring in their instruments and play whatever they want for an hour, and they can eat all the croissants and sourdough they can eat and make whatever tips they can make." He says that Yvonne walked out of the bakery without saying anything to him, and suggested, "You should just come in and speak to everyone here, including the musicians."

When I talked to other performers who've played at the bakery, no one said anything negative about Brown, the bakery's employees, or its pastry payment policy. "We've never asked to be paid at IZOLA," said Fatima of State Park, a local duo who write, record, and produce indie music at their home studio. "My sister, Leila, the other half of the band, and I love the croissants there

"It's worth it," said Aaron Bowen, a local guitar player. "My wife and I traveled all over France, and IZOLA makes the best croissants worldwide. Not only does Jeff [Brown] provide us with the best treats, he lets us play whatever we want."

"I love IZOLA," says Rachel Jay, a local musician. "The owners are super kind and accommodating, and the energy of the bakeshop and all the people who work there is just awesome. I did hear about the misunderstanding. I think it was just an error in communication between parties."

But songwriter Julia Sage doesn't buy into any of it, "It was already a no when I heard they were paying with pastries instead of fair compensation, I guess, but now even more of a hard no?

Woodstock on Lake Murray

Navajo Live's open mic night draws an eclectic lineup

Navajo Live is nestled in a remote corner of the Navajo Shopping Center on Lake Murray Boulevard. The place has been on my radar for a while now, because every Thursday night is Open Mic Night, hosted by Jeff Ousley. I met Jeff a couple of years ago through a former girlfriend who's a friend of his wife. He told me about the gig over beers at his house; the news piqued my interest, because I was fresh off my own personal experience playing at an open mic at Proud Mary's on Kearney Mesa Road. Fast forward to a year later: I'm at Jeff's house again for a BBQ and pool party. I tell Jeff I have to get out there to Navajo Live and check it out. He says, "You said that the

last time you were here, so I don't believe you." That did it: on Thursday, September 15th, 2022, I turned my intentions into reality.

I took a Lyft to and from Navajo Center. Upon my arrival, I didn't immediately see the bar, maybe because I was looking for a sandwich. Navajo Center has a clean, spacious parking lot, and stores like Albertsons, Jersey Mike's Subs, Domino's Pizza, and Wendy's. I found my sandwich, ate it, then found my way to the bar, just a couple doors down from where I dined. I found it by spotting the Navajo Live sign: "Navajo" in big white letters and "Live" in smaller red letters, with a red arrow pointing in the direction of the entrance. Very helpful.

Once inside, I walked past the elongated kidney-shaped bar, glancing at the TV sets lining the back wall of the bar next to the liquor (all playing the Padres-Diamondbacks baseball game) and then engaging the friendly bartender Brenda. The walls were covered with big pictures of past performers. I recognized two of them: one was Ousley, and the other was a local who is also the touring drummer for the Rick Springfield Band — Jorge Palacios. The lighting kept the bar from being dark and drab; really, an excellent lighting system in my opinion. I spotted host Ousley getting the stage ready for the performers, the way he's been doing every

Thursday since February 2015 when Chris Heaney became Navajo Live's owner. (That night, Heaney had to step in to do the sound, because their current sound guy Greg Bartusch was on vacation in Italy.) Ousley told me the music started at 7:15, which gave me time to belly up to the bar and order a cocktail. \$6.75 for Tito's & Soda. Beers go from \$6-9. Reasonable drink prices. Sure enough, the music started at 7:15, with Ousley and his backup band doing a song. Early on, there were only six musicians

and three people at the bar, possibly because the Chargers were playing on TV. Jeff finished his song and then the other musicians got their chance to play.

Each musician got to play three songs. The evening usually starts off with an acoustic set. Then the bands come on after that, and finally, the featured artist gets to play 30 minutes. The first gentleman was a big burly bear of a guy; he stepped up with his acoustic and started off with a Warren Zevon song. Ousley MC'd and ushered the performers on and off the stage from the back. The musicians waited their turns, tuning their guitars, appearing excited and antsy at the same time. I could tell by the way they were pumping their legs up and down that they were eager to share their craft. Ousley told me he lets anybody play who signs up and so he gets folks of various skill levels, from beginners to professionals. Some have their own material. There's a mixture of older and younger generations, all sharing respect and admiration for each other.

As the night progressed so did the number of musicians with hopes of playing. Professional singer songwriter Sandi Lollis, accompanied by Ted Stern on violin, finished off the acoustic set with a bout of Americana. I discovered that lot



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The best news I've heard in months, nay, perhaps years, is coming to fruition on October 12, 14, and 15. The Mainly Mozart Festival Orchestra is returning to the great indoors for the first time since the 2019 Festival. The venue is the brand-new Centre Theater at the Del Mar Fairgrounds.

I've taken a look at the repertoire being performed and have decided that An English Autumn is the theme. Each of the three concerts features a key piece of music by English composer Ralph Vaughan Williams.

I was pleased when Mainly Mozart Music Director Michael Francis presented The Wasps Overture during the June 2022 Festival. I

have long lamented the lack of Vaughan Williams in San Diego concert halls. I would vote in favor of Mainly Mozart creating a subsidiary festival entitled "Very Vaughan Williams." With three Vaughan Williams pieces scheduled, I am quite giddy with anticipation.

The opening concert, on Wednesday, October 12, has five balanced pieces of music. The first is J.S. Bach's Concerto for Oboe and Violin followed by Mozart's Adagio and Fugue. Then we get Fantasia on Theme by Thomas Tallis by Vaughan Williams. Georg Frederic Handel's Royal Fireworks Music and Felix Mendelssohn's Midsummer Night's Dream Overture

complete the show.

The concert on Friday. October 14, has four pieces of music French composer Jacques Ibert is first in line with his high energy Divertissement. Then we have Mozart's Piano Concerto No. 23 and The Lark Ascending by Vaughan Williams. The final piece is Maurice Ravel's Piano Concerto in G. All four pieces are astounding and work well together to create a diverse musical tapestry.

The Festival concludes on Saturday, October 15. This concert has three pieces of music on it. I like the tidy way the concerts move from five to four to three pieces. It suggests that Michael Francis has programmed a coherent festival, as opposed to three

concerts that happen in the same week.

The pieces for the final concert are Vaughan Williams' Fantasia on Greensleeves. Mozart's Violin Concerto No. 5, and Slavonic Dances Op. 72 by Antonin Dvořák. These three pieces are quite famous within the classical music universe. And "Greensleeves" is probably even a little more

famous than that, owing to its being retconned into a Christmas carol and the myth that King Henry VIII wrote the lyrics for Anne Bolyn.

These concerts are well worth attending for anyone who loves classical music and enjoys hearing it performed at the highest possible level. Visit mainlymozart.org for more information about The Mainly Mozart Festival.

of the people liked to hang out more toward the back of the place, because it gets loud up front. I had the pleasure of having a conversation with Emily Bartell outside of the bar; she is the promoter for Navajo Live and Bar None Productions. I asked her what makes open mic special. She replied, "It's eclectic. You get to hear different genres of music."

I walked back into the bar to find Ousley rushing the current band off so the next band could get started. Later, he told me, "It's like Woodstock, with me needing to rush acts on and off the stage, and they're all playing different styles such jazz, funk and blues." Then on came John January, playing some smoking hot boogie blues slide guitar. He got people dancing. The artist of the week was Cold Craft: high energy '80s music, with songs such as "Devil Inside" by INXS and "Cult of Personality" by Living Colour. The band added a harder edge to the evening, and singer Tyler Hazen had the range to match. They even brought a smoke and light show. After their set, it was back to the hodgepodge of musicians to finish off the night, and time for my departure. But I think now I need to play Navajo Live. ■

Gnarly Girl Pizza trades in garlic knots, beer, and nostalgia

2302 El Cajon Blvd., North Park. I made it nearly nine years and a thousand Feast stories without ever having to reference the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles. But that all ended the moment I walked into Gnarly Girl Pizza.

The New York-style slices and sandwiches counter recently took over a corner suite on the Boulevard in North Park. Some may remember the location as the original home to Georgian restaurant Pomegranate (now occupying a larger space two doors down), then later Twisted Taps and Tacos La Mezcla. With due respect to all those eateries, the property now looks more colorful than it ever did before, covered inside and out with cartoonish mural work.

about those pizza-loving

heroes in a half shell, plus other characters from their universe. I've never read the comic, never watched the cartoon, and never sat through any generation of the movies, and yet I still somehow recognize the woman in the yellow outfit as the turtles' journalist friend, April O'Neil. Cultural osmosis never taught me a single accurate thing about world history, yet somehow, this I know.

Fortunately, the counter shop offers alternative whiffs of nostalgia to go with the aroma of baked dough and pepperoni. I feel a little more in my element when I notice both high- and low-top dining tables are surfaced with rock and hip-hop album covers, including Led Zeppelin, Talking Heads, and Run DMC. Above the entrance, I spot a collection of vintage boomboxes.

More important is what's on display inside the glass pizza counter. New York and Sicilian style pizzas are available as whole pie orders, usually for \$22-25. But for drop-ins, it's about 3 or 4 bucks a slice, featuring usual suspects such as pepperoni or any of Gnarly Girl's cleverly named originals. Ham and pineapple get dubbed "The Controversy Pizza," while "The Fred Flintstone" features five kinds of meat. On the veggie side, the "Rabbit Food Pizza" manages seven kinds of vegetables, including broccoli, while the "Betty Boop" boldly adds cranberries to a white pie with spinach and gorgonzola.

That one seemed almost too kooky even to write about, let alone eat, so I stuck with a slice of the "Forgettaboudit," a white pie with bacon, cheddar, ricotta, and splashes of tomato sauce. It reminded me of something I might eat at Pizzeria Luigi, the decades-old pizza counter only two blocks away. For those already in the habit of ordering at Luigi's, I honestly don't see a lot of reasons to switch — toppings aside, the pizzas are pretty similar, meaning good.

There are a few more beers to choose from here, and there are hot sandwiches ranging from chicken parmesan to Philly cheesesteak, but judging by the ho-hum cheesesteak I ordered, the \$9-11 sandwiches are more snack attack remedy than lure to walk an extra couple blocks.

If you're looking for a non-turtle related reason to drop by, I could point you to the garlic knots. When this shop was originally announced a year ago this month, it was slated to open as Knotty Girl Pizza, presumably to emphasize its utterly snackable garlic knots. At a buck apiece (or six for \$5.50), they're great, chewy fodder to wash down with a couple of those draft beers I mentioned, during or after happy hour. The garlicky, buttery knots, dipped in ranch dressing or marinara, prove the ideal appetizer, certain to keep you around

long enough to order some 'za, dude.

The evacuation of Soon-Shiong's **Dunkirk**

Union-Tribune owner's medical enterprises look sickly

More unsettling news regarding hiring at Union-Tribune owner Patrick Soon-Shiong's array of business ventures, this time on the medical side. The **Buffalo News is reporting that** Soon-Shiong's ImmunityBio, Inc. will lay off 38 workers on December 1 at its Dunkirk manufacturing plant in upstate New York, citing a Worker Adjustment and Retraining Notification filing with the state. ImmunityBio assumed the \$200 million state-subsidized plant's lease in August 2020, from Athenex, another biotech outfit, concluding the deal in February of this year.

According to the paper's October 6 account, "Immunity-Bio must hire 450 employees at the Dunkirk facility within the first five years of operations and also must spend \$1.52 billion on operational expenses during the initial 10-year lease term, which started a year ago. It's not off to the best start. It's unclear how many workers are left at the Dunkirk facility," the

Like virtually all municipal undertakings, the future study has already acquired a political flavor, with prospective consultants asked to "aggregate evictions and foreclosures at the smallest geographic unit possible and produce 'heat' maps that visualize housing loss across the city of San Diego, including by City Council district." The document also calls for the consultants to "review existing outreach, education, and direct legal services provided under the City's Eviction Prevention Program and, using a diversity & equity lens, identify activities to meaningfully increase the number of unduplicated clients impacted by the program."

Leon texted back that she was "heading out ... because her mother paid for an Uber to take her back home and it arrived ahead of time," an arrest report said. Leon told the mother she had locked the door, and requested her \$168 payment. The mother checked her Ring doorbell recording and saw that Leon had actually left at 9:45 pm, leaving the child alone for more than two hours. On Aug. 22, Leon was charged with child neglect and transferred to jail, where she's unlikely to be able to leave early.

Bright Idea

- Ryan Boria and Amy Schaner were really hoping for a slow night at the Wendy's where they both worked on Aug. 26. So as they drove to the restaurant in Tilden Township, Pennsylvania, they made a short stop, WFMZ-TV reported. Along the train crossing at Industrial Drive, Boria "placed a shunt on the track. He got back in the car with (Schaner) and they proceeded to Wendy's," Officer Frank Cataldi of the Tilden Township Police Department said. "They told us that their intentions were that if the gates could malfunction and they could somehow block traffic, then that would prevent people from getting to Wendy's, and they could have a slow night at work." Both were arrested on multiple charges, including causing or risking a catastrophe.

No Longer Weird

 Behold the cautionary tale of Eric Merda, who shared his harrowing story with WTSP-TV on Sept. 5. Merda was at the Lake Manatee Fish Camp in Myakka City, Florida, when he became lost in the woods on July 17. When he found the lake, he decided to swim across: "Not the smartest decision a Florida boy could make," Merda said. As he swam, a gator got hold of his forearm and dragged him underwater three times, he said, and "when we came up the third time, she finally did her death roll and took off with my arm." Merda, suffering indescribable pain, returned to shore and started to walk, trying to find his way out of the swamp. Three days later, following the sun and power lines, he found a fence and a man on the other side. Merda told the man what had happened, and he summoned help. Surgeons amputated what remained of Merda's arm; now he's speaking out about the danger of alligators. "You guys know who you are, throwing rocks at them. Leave them gators alone."

Fly the Friendly Skies

— A Chinese man in his 40s, identified only as Hu, and his partner were picking pine nuts in a forest park in Heilongjiang province in northeastern China on Sept. 4 using an unconventional method: They were perched in the basket of a tethered hydrogen balloon. Which might have been fine, but the balloon became untethered, CBS News reported. The second person jumped to the ground, but Hu was aloft in the balloon for two days and traveled more than 200 miles before rescuers reached him by cellphone and instructed him about how to slowly deflate the balloon and land safely. By that time,

he was close to the border with Russia. Hu was reportedly in good health aside from having back pain from standing so long.

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
