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
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

CORONADO

What Crehore created, he cannot destroy

Despite bans, his Facebook group keeps growing and spawning

When Richard Bailey was elected mayor of Coronado in November of 2016, Charles Crehore was delighted. So were most members of his Coronado Happenings Facebook group, which Crehore started in 2012. Previously, Crehore had posted an image of Bailey and himself climbing down a tall building in support of an Over the Edge fundraiser. And he had posted about Bailey's meet-and-greet

when Bailey opened the Coronado beaches early in the pandemic, a move that drew partiers and the criminal element to the island, according to Crehore. The open beaches on the island drew national news, and with the influx of folks — some from Los Angeles — the Coronado Police Department staff was swamped. "We were having to pay overtime for an increased police presence," read Crehore's post. "Someone wants to tell me how that makes good fiscal sense? Bailey,

at McP's Irish pub. And Bailey himself was a regular poster to the group. Then came covid and the lockdown. Coronado Happenings grew to more than 20,000 members, and somewhere along the way, Crehore began to see Bailey differently. "I thought he (Bailey) was a great guy," he said in a recent *Reader* interview. "Now I think he was manipulating me to get my support. It was one of the biggest regrets of my life that I supported and endorsed him."

On October 23, 2022, Crehore explained in a lengthy post to the group how his relationship with the mayor went sour. It began

who claims he's all about the bottom line, cost our city taxpayers a lot of money with his antics." Crehore also commented on Bailey's statements about the mask mandates, Bailey's religious associations, and his other political positions.

I reached out to Mayor Bailey for a statement via direct message on Facebook. Here was his reply: "I am I unaware of what Charles is posting on his page bc he removed me from the group, without explanation, after I posted an update from the San Diego county health officer in 2020."

At that time, Trump supporters were

than they had been in previous years. The rules and regulations imposed and regulated by Crehore state, "No partisan politics: this applies to state and national elections, but local elections are definitely a 'Coronado Happening." But people, including Biden supporters, kept posting political posts and memes. Crehore pulled them down. If they persisted, he banned them from the page. Crehore was called snowflake, a convict (because he had served a 20-year stint in federal prison "for marijuana conspiracy"), and other derogatory terms. He almost gave up the page, but found he couldn't: when a Facebook group surpasses 10,000 members, the page's founder cannot disband the group. Besides, the page raises money from its 27,000+ when there's an emergency or folks are in need. Further, it's a real community, with plenty of insightful dialogue about the island, and helpful self-promotion from Coronado-based small businesses.

Still, the political ugliness got to be exhausting. Eventually, Crehore posted: "Because of the recent unfortunate events, monitoring Coronado Happenings for inappropriate content and comments has become essentially a 24-hour-a-day job, and I am being overwhelmed with having to endlessly weed out the unnecessary vitriol and posts which violate the group's rules. Coronado Happenings is now averaging over 200,000 posts, comments, and reactions every 28 days,

or over 7000 a day. The volume is enormous, but I don't mind that. What I do mind is people who break the rules and exhibit rude behavior to other members. So I am asking everyone to step back, take a deep breath, and think before you post. There is simply no need for the garbage. If you don't get that, you'll leave me no other choice than to remove you." Not everyone was pleased: one person wrote Crehore: "I find your postings on Coronado Happenings boring because it lacks a vibrant exchange of ideals and is a quintessential example of the cancel culture. It's an exercise in groupthink, mindless and without merit."

Many of those who were removed

nado Happenings group — nearly 100 -started their own groups. One of those is Coronado Happenings 2.0, a private Facebook group that, according to its group description, "grew from the commonality of those who weren't treated with respect in the original version. While the original version seemed to start on a good path, it has now become something most of us do not want to be associated with. However, we continue to wish them well and hope they, too, find peace and prosperity. We take the elevated path for our great city and respect each other for the love of our great country and community."

For his part, Crehore has said that "if people get banned but then contact me and apologize or let me know they're sorry and would like to rejoin the group, I almost always re-add them." But that offer does not extend to Mayor Bailey; Crehore said Bailey could join "Coronado Happenings 2.0, and there's another, Coronado Forever. I will not put [mayor] Richard back in our group. I would never give him that platform. He can go to KUSI if he wants; he doesn't need my little Facebook group."

Beholders beholden to Commission

Good fences make good neighbors, but they also make lousy views

The Coastal Commission has sided with neighbors who say the city's plan to relocate a six-foot tall, 1000-foot long chain fence topped with barbed-wire would ruin one of the only uninterrupted water views at Kendall Frost Reserve. Most of the 20-acre marsh is already corralled by chain link fencing topped with barbed wire. In its current location, the fence in question is tucked away at the bottom of a slope, leaving a rare slice of sidewalk along Crown Point Drive from which the public can view Mission Bay and its wildlife without obstruction.

But the city proposed to tear down the old fence and put in a new one upslope. "That sounds like not only would it cut off any public access to the area, but would become an eyesore," said local Crista Mathes. She was not alone in her opinion: more than 30 people signed a petition opposing the "prison-like" fence.

The city said the move was needed to allow for the expansion of saltmarsh habitat — part of a habitat enhancement project the city is mandated to complete as compensation for the discharge of untreated raw sewage into Tecolote Creek during heavy storms in 2016. Under a settlement agreement with the Regional Water Quality Control Board, the city must restore 2.2 acres of disturbed habitat in Kendall Frost, including the entire

slope along Crown Point Drive south of the Crown Point Villas Condominiums. In addition to moving the existing fence out of wetland habitat, the work involves removing debris and invasive species and planting native vegetation. According to city staff, the parks and recreation department is responsible for long-term management of the preserve.

The commission suggested the city consider a lower fence, like the one at the Tijuana River National Estuary, or consider relocating it halfway up the slope, so that the public could still see over it when looking out at Mission Bay. But the city said the six-foot fence, topped with a foot of barbed wire, is needed to keep out pedestrians, homeless camps, trash, and predators that threaten nesting birds. And

it argued that building it mid-slope would harm native plants and reduce the area being restored to the point where it would not meet the requirements of the settlement order.

The commission disagreed, saying a lower, visually permeable fence could protect both habitat and views, and still deter pedestrians from crossing down the steep slope into the marsh. The commission added that it has never been notified of homeless camps in the reserve or in Mission Bay Park. As for predators, the nesting platforms have covers that birds can enter but animals that prey on


Approval of the coastal permit last week came with several special conditions to protect coastal waters and nesting birds during construction. The city agreed to submit a new final plan that replaces the six-foot fence for one no taller than four feet, with no barbed wire.



UNDER THE RADAR

Buried in bureaucracy Unnamed UCSD professors have been improperly hoarding human remains and relics of Native American tribes for their personal use, says a new state audit of the University of California's compliance with the federal Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act, otherwise known as NAGPRA. "Two of the campuses we reviewed — Riverside and San Diego have recently discovered large portions of their NAGPRA collections," says the Novem-

ber 17 report by acting California State Auditor Michael S. Tilden. "These discoveries are associated with researchers who, in some cases, chose to retain the remains and cultural items to further their personal research instead of reporting them to campus officials for return to the tribes to which they belong." The audit lays much of the blame on similarly unnamed university administrators. "Following the pass-



to return their collections in a timely and consistent manner."

The document continues, "Because the Office of the President has not ensured consistency in how campuses respond to newly discovered collections, tribes have reported having different experiences when working with campuses to reclaim their ancestors, which created an unnecessary level of frustration and complexity for those

tribes." According to Tilden's cover letter, "The Office of the President has not ensured that campuses prioritize completing their repatriation implementation plans. Since July 2020, the Office of the President has required campuses to create these plans, but it did not set a deadline for their completion. In the absence of a deadline, the four campuses we reviewed have yet to complete them as of mid-October 2022. Finally, campuses have not formally committed to providing long-term, sustainable fund-

ing for their repatriation-related activities. Nor has the Office of the President dedicated funds beyond fiscal year 2022-23 to support campuses' repatriation activities. Because of the uncertainty surrounding the funding necessary to support campuses' repatriation efforts, we believe this approach is shortsighted and may undermine recent efforts by the university to further repatriation."

September, two staffers from the office of South Bay House Democrat Juan Vargas raised evebrows by going along on separate tours of Israel, paid for by the American Israel Education Foundation, an affiliate of the lobbying group American Israel Public Affairs Committee. Now comes Amy Surber, a Senior Policy Adviser to Congressional Republican Darrell Issa, with a disclosure report of her

own special interest-sponsored trip to Beirut, Lebanon, from October 23 to 28. Paid for by the American Task Force on Lebanon, transportation costs were \$1395.72, lodging ran \$660, and meals cost \$166.66, along with an \$88 visa processing charge. "Rep. Issa is the co-chair of the Congressional US-Lebanon Friendship Caucus and is a senior member on the House Foreign Affairs Committee," wrote Surber in the justification for going on the trip. "In my role as senior policy advisor with the foreign affairs committee assignment and defense portfolio, this trip will prove indispensably educational and broaden my understanding of the region as a whole." Surber's

to Beirut, thanks to a freebie from American Task Force on Lebanon. A self-made superrich car alarm magnate, Issa's free travel cost the task force \$4766, with lodging running \$888 and meals at \$315. Said Issa's disclosure: "Traveler is a member of the House Foreign Affairs Committee and a member of the U.S.-Lebanon Friendship Caucus. accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act, the U.S. Navy has prepared a Final Environmental Assessment (EA) to evaluate the potential environmental impacts associated with the realignment of two segments of the Navy's existing Miramar fuel pipeline in the Clairemont Mesa area of San Diego. Current fueling operations do not pose a risk to public or environmental safety.

Based on the analysis presented in the EA, the Navy has determined that implementation of its Preferred Alternative, Alternative 4, would not significantly impact the quality of the human or natural environment or generate significant controversy within the Clairemont Mesa community in the areas of the two encroachments. "When I saw the news, my first thought was for the victims," says Assemblyman Randy Voepel (R-Santee) of the Club Q shooting in Colorado Springs. "My second thought was for my poor grandson, who may have done something really terrible. And my third thought was, 'Well, here they come.' And sure enough, the next day's newspaper has a long piece about my right-wing views, so-called 'hateful rhetoric and lies about LGBTQ people," and a link to an op-ed that calls my city 'Klantee.'

"Let me ask you something. There are a lot of gang murders in South Central LA, right? So when you meet a fellow from South Central LA, do you wonder if maybe he's a gangbanger? Or do you find that

morally abhorrent? Yet when you hear about somebody hailing from Santee, you feel totally comfortable lumping them in with some joker wearing a Klan hood with a Confederate flag on his truck. That's placism, pure and simple, and it's the kind of societal evil that keeps America torn asunder. Just like when I go to visit family in Missouri, and they ask me if I've turned gay yet from living in Southern California."

Lasso-Faire?


Heroic fictional soccer coach bumps up against real-world football villainy

A few years ago, Jason Sudeikis scored a surprise hit for Apple TV with his show Ted Lasso, the story of an American football coach possessed of a relentlessly cheerful disposition and an abiding sense of moral decency who journeys to England to take charge of a floundering soccer team. In short order, Lasso became America's Good Guy, a sort of secular patron saint of positivity in the face of daunting challenges. In one particularly inspiring episode from season two, one of his players publicly rejected the sponsorship of a company responsible for neglected oil spills in Nigeria — a story that has its roots in real-life case of Shell Oil vs. a tenacious group of Nigerian farmers. Lasso and the team's ownership were quick to support the player's decision.

So it was perhaps a touch surprising when billboards sprang up around the country prior to this year's World Cup soccer tournament, featuring

letters of encouragement from Lasso to members of the U.S. team — surprising because host nation Qatar has been credibly accused of horrific human rights violations with respect to the migrant workers hired to help that nation prepare for the 2022 event. (*The Guardian* estimated the migrant death toll to be over 6000.) And it was perhaps a touch *unsurprising* when those billboards were used to send a message back to Coach Lasso.

Reached for comment, Sudeikis was quick to condemn the billboard vandalism a "crude and morally simplistic rendering of a complex situation, and a total killjoy to boot." He then reminded the activists that whatever the real-life inspiration for the sponsorship storyline, Ted Lasso remains the made up coach of a made-up football club, while Ted Lasso is very much a real television show that needs real viewers, "so please don't screw this up for me."

Confessions of an Amazon Flex driver

uring Christmas of 2013, Amazon fired UPS as the courier of their packages, because UPS could not keep up with their volume. Soon after, Amazon decided to implement its own delivery infrastructure. It is estimated that Amazon will soon deliver more packages than UPS. As it is, Amazon ships 22% of packages in the U.S., while UPS ships 24%.

I began working for Amazon Flex as an independent contractor in January 2022, after a three-month stint working for UPS as a seasonal driver. (In both cases, I used my own vehicle and phone. UPS made a company-owned device available to its seasonal drivers, but it was an old Samsung Galaxy that was slow and crashed after each delivery stop.) In my experience, Amazon had their shit together and offered a more efficient and careful delivery experience than UPS. The training at UPS consisted of about 45 minutes standing in a circle while another temporary worker gave eight of us instructions on the correct delivery codes we should use, how to hold a package safely (a weird way which you have never seen any professional do in real life), and other minutiae that had nothing to do with actually delivering packages to customers. Still, that training was 45 minutes more than what you receive as an Amazon



I once encountered a large sign on the front door of a single-family home in San Marcos that read in block letters: "DELIVERY DRIVER. KNOCK WHEN YOU DELIVER A PACKAGE. IS THAT TOO HARD TO UNDERSTAND!!!!!!!!!" It was 4:15 in the morning when I read that message.

Flex driver. In either case, it seems understood that everyone will make a delivery mistake during their first days on the job. The only question is the magnitude of the error.

During the 2021 Christmas rush, I once delivered five large packages to the wrong address while gigging for UPS There was a new apartment complex in Chula Vista that had the same address as a house across the street — the only difference was a dash between a couple of the numbers. I realized my error only when I received a call from UPS dispatch saying the house I reported delivering packages to claimed they did not receive any of the packages. People do sometimes lie about not receiving their packages, but the UPS dispatcher told me this particular person was a regular UPS driver. I went back to the place where I delivered the packages in error and knocked on the door. Then pounded on the door. No answer. I took a photo of the house and its number so the dispatcher could see the similar address. That way, the UPS driver could follow up directly with their neighbor.

That mistake would be harder to make as an Amazon driver. The Amazon app's drop-off pin takes you right in front of the customer's door, no matter if it's a house or apartment. If you try to deliver the package just one door down, you won't be able to complete the delivery, as you will be outside the GPS's geofence. (If you ever want to "get over" that fence, you usually need to call Driver's Support and explain yourself.) And unlike UPS and FedEx, Amazon drivers take a photo of where the package was dropped off, so that both the customers and Amazon have evidence of the

package's delivery. Amazon deliveries are handled by their logistics department, which is broken down into Amazon DSP and Amazon Flex. The major San Diego hub is in Rancho Bernardo. Unlike Amazon DSP (Delivery Service Partners), Amazon Flex drivers don't drive Amazon-branded vans, but their own vehicles. They are independent contractors who pay for their own gas and maintenance. I've seen Amazon Flex drivers using everything from duct-taped beaters to new Teslas. (What are their stories?)

Amazon Flex drivers receive their work orders from an Amazon app. The work is available in what are called blocks, as in blocks of time, ranging

from two to five hours A rule of thumb is that you are able to deliver 10 packages in one hour, give or take. If your delivery route is very compact and closer to Rancho Bernardo, you'll be delivering more packages in that hour. If you get a rural route where you will be doing a lot of driving, you could do as little as 2 packages per hour. The only control you have with your route is the block of time you choose to reserve. You know where you'll be delivering only when you're physically in front of your cart of packages and looking at the shipping labels.

All drivers hate delivering to apartments and Downtown. Apartments because units can be difficult to find, often require dealing with access codes, and sometimes require a lot of walking. Downtown for its parking. One morning at 8:30 or so, a parking enforcement lady told me, "You Amazon guys just park wherever you feel like it. This is a no stopping lane. The ticket is \$55, You're lucky you weren't towed." I protested that there was no signage where I parked and there were parking hashmarks on the street. "You're welcome to see the judge," she replied. Yes, Amazon Flex drivers park "where we want," as there is no reserved parking for gig workers. And our personal vehicles don't have commercial signage. Most of us do wear an Amazon vest, but some are dressed in your basic shorts, sandals, and T-shirt.

When I see Amazon Flex drivers doing their work in sandals, I flash back to stepping in a huge pile of dog shit Downtown at 5 am and not realizing it until I was in my car. The shit ran up the sides of my sneakers, and I decided the best plan was to just throw



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my rubber car mat in the trash. I spent 15 valuable minutes washing my shoe with water from my bottle as best I could. We have time commitments. We have deadlines to keep. If we don't finish within our block's schedule, we get the following email: "We've noticed that you've had a few late deliveries within the last week. Our customers love receiving their packages on time, so please attempt to deliver all packages assigned to your route by the time specified in the app or by the end of your scheduled block time, whichever is earlier..."

We are graded on a scale that runs from "you're about to lose your job" to "you're doing fantastic." The better your rating, the better perks you receive. I particularly like the cash back on gasoline purchases: if your rating is fantastic, you get 6% cash back. If your rating is great, you get 4%. If your rating is you're on the verge of losing your job, just be glad you're still driving for Amazon.

We are constantly looking at the clock. There are two great time sucks for a Flex driver: apartments and calling Amazon Driver Support. We

gan delivering, one particular package took me 40 minutes to deliver. That meant I was 6.67 packages behind schedule. It's very difficult to make up that many packages in four hours or less, so as you get more seasoned at driving, you realize you cannot let that happen. You make adjustments; you compromise top quality delivery for the sake of efficiency. Now, I could deliver that package in less than three minutes. But back then? When I arrived at the Casa Mira View mega apartment complex in Mira Mesa at 4 am, I was hoping it would not be as bad as it looked. It was worse. The usually reliable Amazon GPS was taking me to an underground parking lot. I got out with my flashlight and walked. And walked. And walked. And walked. The place was huge, and no matter how much I walked, I could not locate the building number. I called Driver Support, and after even they could not help me locate the building, they told me to just mark it as undeliverable and go on to my next stop. Mercy.



Not all apartments are

a drain on your time (and sanity). Deliveries outside big city centers are usually relatively easy to complete. Sure, I will complain about delivering to North County, but at least it won't be like San Diego's city center. I now find Casa Mira View easy, because I know they have very large and lighted numbers at the corners of their buildings, with stairs adjacent. The numbering of doors makes sense and the halls are easy to navigate - no corners or curves. However, there are unpleasant exceptions. UTC, you suck. Villages, you suck. And density is increasing. When I visited Chula Vista in the 1990s, it was mainly wilderness, some factories, car junk yards, warehouses, and farms. Now there are apartment complexes with parking woes that rival Downtown.

A driver can also tell they will have trouble if the delivery notes look like a magnum opus. We start delivering as early as 3:30 am; at that hour, more than three lines of delivery instructions is beyond what the brain can absorb. I just skim the delivery notes and then figure them out once I'm at the location. Sometimes, the notes



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make it clear that people don't know that we deliver from 3:30 am to midnight, seven days a week. "Oh, just call us when you're here and we'll open the gate." "Please knock hard as the doorbell doesn't work." And too often: "the leasing office will let you in." The leasing office people have life easy. The early ones start at 9 am, but 10 is more common. By 9 am, I'm at home, people.

I also know a delivery will be trouble if I see a note that says, "Do not package dump." "Package dump" means drivers just throw packages to the ground in a designated spot: a room, package lockers, a reception area, a lobby, etc. Package dumping is a clear indication that someone hasn't organized a way to get packages to residences easily and efficiently. Reasons why drivers package dump: no clear directional signage as to where the building unit or apartment is located; no access to the elevator or gate due to need of a fob or code, no access to locker code. (Although the lockers might be Amazon lockers, Amazon Flex drivers can't access those lockers unless a code is provided by the resident). If it's a helluva confusing stop, and I have to spend 15 minutes trying to deliver your package, I'm in trouble. Better to package dump. (I recall one Amazon consumer who shared with me the "trick" to access her unit for next time. But unlike UPS drivers, who have regular routes, I will probably not be sent to her complex again for several months.)

I remember being overwhelmed my first few times delivering for Amazon Flex. I remember a three-hour block in 92108 that took me five hours to complete, simply because I tried to get the packages to

the customers' front doors after discovering that I could not deliver packages to the package lockers because I didn't have the access codes. I walked for miles through the winding corridors of modern apartments in Mission Valley, thinking all the while of Dorothy and all the adventures she had on the yellow brick road. I spent so much time walking and on the phone with Driver Support that my phone died. I went to Taco Bell and ate while waiting for my phone to get back up to 20%.

As I said, although it's called Driver Support, drivers try to avoid it unless absolutely necessary, because it's such a time suck. The most common reason to call is because you have access problems at the location. This is especially true with the morning shift (called "Breakfast" by Amazon), which starts at 3:30 am and ends at 8 am. If it's a gated community and you don't have a gate code or fob on your phone, your best bet is to follow someone in who has access. But not many people are arriving in the wee hours. Sometimes, people are leaving, but you can't always sneak in through the out door, due to tire spikes.

Here's a conversation with Driver Support:

"Hello, thank you for calling Driver Support. Are you safely pulled over and in a safe location?"

I explain that I'm un-

able to deliver the package, and Driver Support asks if I mind staying on the line while they call the customer. Although I have already called and texted the customer before calling Driver Support, they are still required to call the customer twice. I have just burned five minutes. Ten packages an hour. Five packages per half hour. Two and a half packages every fifteen

minutes. I should be at .83 packages by now. I'm starting to slip into a time hole.

"I'm sorry to keep you waiting, Yes, so I tried to call the customer, but no answer. I will try again. Do you mind holding?"

"Do I have a choice?"
"I'm sorry?"

I ask her to continue the routine.

"Hello, driver? I'm sorry to keep you waiting but I was unsuccessful at reaching the customer. I will ask you to continue your route and if you have time, return and attempt again."

When I inform Driver Support that I will be across town and can't return, she says ok, then just mark it as not able to deliver. I fell for this trick the first couple of times. What happens is this: after I deliver my last package, I find that the app will not let me mark the earlier package as "undeliverable due to access issue" because I'm nowhere near the delivery location. And when I call Driver Support to please mark the package as undeliverable, they insist that I return to the location, even though my block of time is about to end. The next time I was in a similar scenario, the Driver Support person insisted that Driver Support would never ask me to return to the location to close out the delivery. When I told her this had happened to me already, she insisted it had not.

Some customers leave rude notes or messages for drivers. Why? I once encountered a large sign on the front door of a single-family home in San Marcos that read in block letters: "DELIVERY DRIVER. KNOCK WHEN YOU DELIVER A PACKAGE. IS THAT TOO HARD TO UNDERSTAND!!!!!!!!!" It was 4:15 in the morning when I read that mes-

sage. There were no lights on in the house, and I'm sure they were asleep. And I'm sure that when they inked that sign and placed on their front door, they did not know that Amazon Flex delivers long before the rooster starts its song. I rang the doorbell incessantly until I saw a light turn on, and then ran to my vehicle. I haven't been back there since, so I'm not sure if that sign is still there.

Another sign, this one in the backcountry, read: "Drivers: are you stupid? Toss the package over the fence so it's not stolen." I had to drive up a dirt road in almost pitch darkness to be greeted by this? What a waste of time. I couldn't locate their package in my vehicle. No package for you today, dummy.

Ah, the backcountry. When you receive just 13 packages for a 3.5 hour block, it probably means you're driving somewhere like Jamul or Dulzura. While there's less labor involved, it means more gas and mileage on your vehicle. I drive an SUV, but I do not know how sedans make it on some of the dirt and broken roads found on some of the backcountry trips, particularly on wet

days. And as with apartment units, some locations are hard to find — homes are often not visible from the road. I understand why people might want a certain degree of anonymity and isolation, and maybe that's why they live out there. But if you want your package delivered, maybe post a clear house number by the road.

I used to think people who lived out in the sticks would take the trouble to get to know their neighbors, just in case they needed each other in an emergency. Now I'm not so sure. I was in Dulzura. delivering a package just inside the gate of a home, as the delivery note instructed. The woman who had just driven through the gate asked who the package was for. When I told her the name, her expression became one of anger and bewilderment.

"I don't know who that lady is but you guys keep delivering her packages here."

I told her this was the spot where the GPS indicated the delivery address, and asked her to confirm the address number. She said that wasn't the correct number — I was two digits off. I asked if she knew

where that house was. She replied, "I don't know where that address is, and if you leave that package here, my dogs will shred it to pieces. I'm holding three packages for that lady and I already called the post office. I don't have time for this, because I'm already late for my son's school."

I left a detailed message for the woman whose packages were being held by her neighbor. I asked her to leave a more specific note in the Delivery Notes section so future packages could get to her, and wrote that her neighbor was holding three of her packages. I also indicated that since her address was difficult to find, she might want to get her packages delivered to an Amazon hub station — they're located all over the county — where she could pick them up during normal business hours. My messages to Amazon customers are often like this, full of detail and laced with a hint of condescension. If someone left me messages the way I leave messages, I would wonder, "Is he being helpful or just an asshole?"

I often talk to myself when delivering — loudly, in hopes that I'm over-



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heard saying passive-aggressive things like, "Guidance in the delivery notes would be goddamn helpful right about now!" as I look around for the right direction to an apartment unit. Usually, people don't hear me, as I'm usually delivering packages before sunrise. If they do hear me, it may be because they've been woken up by a dog who is barking at me. Once, I used the fword like a gangster rapper upon not finding a house number: "Ok, we have 7123 here, and 7127 there, so where in the FUCK is 7125?" Whereupon, someone at 7123 said, "Oh, I believe that address is in the alley." I could not see the gentleman who provided me this guidance, but I was grateful and slightly embarrassed.

I've discovered that people appreciate receiving their packages; no matter how inconsiderate or even rude I am, my work is appreciated. I have also discovered a sadistic quality I did not know I possessed: I find I like waking people up early in the morning. The earlier the better. No gate code at 4:45 am? Let me call the customer to get that. But even after almost 6000 packages delivered, not one soul has expressed annoyance at my waking them up.

Fortunately, there are many more considerate and kind people in San Diego than angry ones. People who leave water and snacks on the porch for drivers. I make sure their packages are placed down a little more carefully, out of street view. This cuts down on the risk of stolen packages. No one likes when package theft happens: not the people ordering, not Amazon, and not the drivers. Amazon drivers get their rating downgraded each time a package

tomer. Here's what Amazon sends: "A customer recently reported not receiving a package you marked as delivered on 08/20/2022. It's important to take steps to ensure customers can find the packages you delivered. To make sure customers get their packages, always double check the delivery address and place packages in a safe location that can't be seen from the street. Taking photos of where you left packages also helps customers find them. If you can't find a safe place to leave a package, call Support. We understand such events are sometimes beyond your control. Repeated instances of this type of event may impact your eligibility to participate in Amazon Flex." Emphasis mine.

Penalizing drivers for something not fully in their control does not make sense. The driver is not the criminal, even though It would be easy for a driver to take a photo of the delivered package but then pick it up and steal it. Or to have an accomplice follow them on their route, swiping packages along the way. Most experienced drivers will place the package away from street view by placing it behind a column or plant or other large object on the porch. But I've also encountered drivers who leave packages in plain view, so it's a good idea to remind drivers to avoid that in the Delivery Notes. Personally, I've placed a large wooden planter on my porch so that packages can be placed easily out of sight.

The American Task Force on Lebanon is led by ex U.S. ambassador to Morocco from 1997 to 2001 Edward Gabriel, who has of late been lobbying for the United States to help topple the current Hezbollahlinked government in upcoming presidential elections. "The Hezbollah-allied coalition has its own client candidate — or candidates — lined up," writes Gabriel in a September 7 op-ed piece for The Hill. "Unfortunately, the reformist opposition coalition is less centralized and has yet to agree on its preferred candidates. It is imperative that this coalition try to agree on an effective strategy and identify presidential candidates to leverage votes in parliament and block the election of another Hezbollah client. The election of an independent, reform-minded president could help turn the country's fortunes around."

So far, though, per a November 11 Associated Press report, stalemate has resulted. "Lebanon's parliament failed to elect a new president in five attempts after the term of President Michel Aoun, a strong ally of Hezbollah, ended on Oct. 31. That left Lebanon in a political vacuum with a caretaker government that does not have full powers as the country is roiling in the worst economic and financial crisis in its modern history."

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

San Diego's Earliest Sunset (4:42 pm) Occurs Sunday, December 4, a date that is not coincident with the shortest day (winter solstice - December 21) because of factors relating to the noncircular shape of Earth's orbit around the sun and the tilt of Earth's rotational axis. Because of the elliptical orbit of the earth, when the earth is closer to the sun, its orbit is quicker. Because of the rotational axis of the earth, a solstice occurs when one of the poles is leaning towards the sun, while an equinox occurs when neither pole is leaning towards the sun. Our clocks are set so that every day is exactly 86,400 seconds, but in reality, the solar day can be up to 22 seconds shorter or 29 seconds longer


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



As You Like It

Christopher Ashley and Will Davis's re-imagined As You Like It bills itself as "a celebration of the limitless possibilities of love and humanity." In Shakespeare's comedy, Rosalind and Orlando meet by chance in court and feel an immediate connection. When they are both banished, fate brings them together again in the Forest of Arden. That's when Rosalind disguises herself as the boy Ganymede and, upon meeting her beloved, proposes to pretend that he is himself Rosalind so that Orlando can practice his wooing. A complicated and highly comedic business, here complicated further by the casting of non-binary actor Esco Jouley as Orlando and transgender actor Peter Smith as Rosalind. Or perhaps, in the view of the co-directors, the opposite is true: if the forest is a place of naturalist self-discovery outside the regulated world of the city - if gender is just a construct imposed from without — then the corkscrew



courtship can be read as much more straightforward. And the comedy comes, not from the hidden truth about Rosalind/Ganymede, but from the transformation of traditional understandings. It's a bold venture, aided by the obvious talent of the cast, and perhaps undermined by the occasional whiff of camp. (If a person was not entirely on board with

A stretch of English coastline has been decimated by a nuclear accident, but Lucy Kirkwood's play aims to tackle something even more toxic and enduring than fallout: aging boomers. We open on Rose as she nurses a bloody nose; it seems she paid a surprise visit to the cottage of fellow former nuclear physicists Robin and Hazel, and Hazel, who had heard Rose was dead, and who has complicated feelings about her old colleague besides, had a rather violent reaction. Oops, but not really that rather sets the tone for the polite/prickly conversation that follows. The tension increases once hubby Robin shows up — he's been off tending irradiated cows, because what else is there to do once you've ruined the world? — and starts pouring homebrew. Kirkwood's chain reaction builds slowly, patiently gradually revealing character and consequence, and Moxie's cast has her creation well in hand. The twoword adverb-adjective for this one? You all know the story, the sweet simple plot/ Of how the old Grinch learns what Christmas is not/ For twenty five years now, this show has been playing/ So surely there's nothing new that's worth saying?/ It's fun for the kiddies, the sets are outstanding/ And yet, something's odd in the whole

Whoville branding...
Ok, enough of that — though it's worth noting that the Old Globe's adaptation of this Christmas classic plays fast and loose with the rhythm of Seuss when it suits. But the point stands: after you hear the Who kiddies scream "Mine!" as they fight over their toys, and see the Who grownups sing about how it's the thought that counts even as they chase madly after every on-sale gift item, you may be tempted to conclude that the Grinch has a point in his hatred of Christmas. You may even start to like the old Grinchy rotter (played as a cross between Jim Carrey and Tim Curry by Andrew Polec, resplendently made up and costumed, and nailing it in the facial expressions department). And if that happens, well, it sort of takes the wind out of the dramatic sails.

Still, At least his conversion at play's end still makes sense. For their part, the Whos could use a cometo-Jesus (well, come-to-Cindy Lou Who) moment to explain their astonishing response to losing everything they've worked so hard to achieve. They assure us in song that Whos like Christmas, but maybe that's just their jam? The planning, the presents, the party? That's what they tell us, anyway. But even as I type this, I can hear

the "Bah, humbugs" echoing in my brain, warning me against dimming the Christmas cheer and urging me to laugh and sing along. (The sing-along is a great touch, by the by. Playwrights Steve Rosen and Gordon Greenberg have decided that if some familiar ity is good, then more is better, and set Scrooge's story right where the theater stands today. They keep the setting in olden-days 1919, the better to preserve the mutton-chop facial hair, the top hats, and the lack of furnace heating. But they're happy to go present-day for the sake of a joke. They're happy to go all sorts of places: meta, silly, clever, even weird. But while you can play Tiny Tim for laughs by making him a puppet with a live, adult human head - just one clever bit of prop work in a production that makes the absolute most of a few crates, chairs, ladders, and window casings — there's only so much humor a show, even a feel-good show, can get from the plight of a dying child. Or, for that matter, from the haunting of an old man's loveless heart. It's to the cast's great credit that they are able to execute the massive shifts in tone when the rim-shot rat-a-tat of jokes must give way to the story's pure feeling without giving the audience emotional whiplash. Oh, what fun: Backyard Renaissance artistic director Francis Gerke has given us a brand new play that looks back at the '80s the way the '80s might have looked back at the '40s. You couldn't set this story in the present, because then you'd lose The Phone: a tan plastic wall-mounted job - well, it used to be mounted

with a cord and cracked handset and a finicky way of not working when it's needed. It's damaged, this phone: the duct tape is enough to tell you that, along with the fact that it's propped on the floor, not far from the stainless steel bowl that's been set out to catch the drips during the thunderstorm that has brought high school basketball star Johnny Grimes into the Pinnolini home. It seems Franky P. is his biggest fan — pictures on the wall and everything — so he's happy to let Johnny make a call, as long as mother Barbara doesn't catch them spending a quarter to call information. Make that three quarters... and down comes Barbara, wondering what's the fuss and where's the Chablis

Gerke has written a gangbuster part for his wife Jessica John, and she throws herself into it like a dog chewing at its leash, all frustration and funny, frenetic energy. Barbara is trapped trapped: by her past, by her pain, by her poverty, by her motherhood, and oh yes, by that Phone, the one she's been stuck waiting by for...well, let's not spoil things.

And happily, it's not just the Barbara Show: if she's a dog on a leash, bad penny Franky is a puppy trying not to drown before it makes it back to the bank. He ain't right, but he's not wrong, either. And Johnny isn't just the normie audience's introduction to this domestic prison, nor even merely the catalyst for conflict. There's a reason he can't bring himself to just leave, even if the house is haunted. Maybe fun isn't the precise word here, but there's an undeniable element of entertainment in amid the pathos and pain.

Prairie Lights

Between 1854 and 1929, so-called orphan trains ran regularly from the cities of the East Coast to the farmlands of the Midwest, carrying thousands of abandoned children whose fates would be determined by luck or chance. Would they be adopted by a kind and loving family, or would they face a childhood and adolescence of hard labor and servitude? Prairie Lights tells the story of a Jewish brother and sister who journey west on an Orphan Train in 1905. Arriving with other homeless youths in a tiny Nebraska town just before the holidays, Benjamin and Rose are adopted by Wellspring's only Jewish couple. Devout 12-year-old Benjamin clashes with Abe, a successful shopkeeper who has abandoned his religion. Meanwhile, 15-year-old Rose falls secretly in love with a fellow orphan, thus upsetting Sophie's marriage plans for the girl. Townsfolk are further divided by the fearful banker, Maxwell Ryder, who wants to send all of the orphans back to New York. psychology is more or less the exact equal of Dr. Seuss (e.g., the Widow Scrooge who vows to capture a troublesome mutt and put him in her spin-dryer). But it's rather as if Dr. Seuss had decided to supplement his reputable pediatric practice and peddle mind-altering, brain-damaging substances to the older kids on the school playground: the animated stuffed animal, when gotten wet, spawns egg-sized fur

balls that grow up to be sharp-toothed batlike hellions who like to smoke, drink, break-dance, throw open the classic trenchcoat and expose themselves to females, and much, much worse. To find, or to imagine, the ideal customer for this concoction is a chore. The problem, in part, would be to find someone young enough not to be bothered by the cuteness and not to notice the total insincerity. (The horror element, much diluted by the two aforementioned qualities, would not be part of the problem for the indicated age group, though a number of presumably grown-up critics professed, or pretended, to be bothered by it.) Such restrictions, of course, would not leave anyone around who could appreciate the cinematic in-jokes, but those are inappreciable anyway. The Amalgamated: ska, stability, sobriety

Some bands can count their lineup shifts on one finger, like ZZ Top or R.E.M. (one each). Then there's San Diego skamaniacs The Amalgamated. "About ten years ago," explains guitarist/singer Reggie Costa, "I made a list

also wrote the band's original tunes. As Costa recalls, "We formed when the Hi-Lites broke up. There was a big parking lot fight, and half of the band quit. We got some players to fill out the new group from other bands that we knew. We thought of this as an Amalgamation. There

of every horn player, bass player, drummer, etc., that has played in our band, and it was over 100 players. I am the only original member left. I must be difficult to be in a band with."

But, he adds, "in the last five years, we have had very few lineup changes. The band now is more stable and better than ever." This stabilized roster is also fully integrated, both racially and gender-wise. Costa is a San Diego native who grew up in Ramona before moving near UCSD, then to La Mesa, and settling finally in Lemon Grove. He names his formative musical influences as "Chuck Berry's album The Great Twenty-Eight, Pantera's Cowboys From Hell, Sublime's Sublime, No Doubt's Tragic Kingdom, and The Aggrolites' The Aggrolites. [Also] MTV when they played music videos. Green Day had the best videos."

The band was founded in 2007, after five members of the Hi-Lites - an eightpiece ska band — left that group due to a falling out with bassist James Trent, who was also a record label in Jamaica called Amalgamated Records. We ultimately decided on 'The Amalgamated,' because we figured it would be hard to spell and impossible to remember."

Costa says he always wanted to play ska, but the band stayed instrumental for its first two years. According to Costa, the group was trying "to be as much like The Skatalites as we could." Then, circa 2009, fate brought singer Raphael "Rip" Peña a-calling. "I was in a band called The Scotch Bonnets," says Peña, "which went on to become The Night Doctors. The band was just getting started and had a bunch of shows booked. Right afterward, I went on a bender that ended up with me checking myself into rehab. I felt really bad that I let down the guys, but it was the best decision I could have made. I have remained friends with The Night Doctors and we have played lots of shows with them over the years. I've been sober for fourteen years now, playing with The Amalgamated for

the last thirteen years. Lots of the songs I write are about overcoming adversity and going through heartaches."

The Amalgamated cut their new album, True Tone, at Ramona's After Hours Studios — owned and operated by Jon Hasz - in the back of the Ramona Music Center shop. Hasz, who also recorded the band's first two releases, was assisted on this one by Brian "Dub Robot" Wallace. "We recorded the album in August 2021," says Peña, "during a monsoon and a freak tornado that hit

> Ramona. It was a tiny one, but it still counts."

According to Peña, "For this album, we really wanted to push ourselves. We wanted to add some elements of reggae and dial in our sound. Reggie [Costa] and I admire Brian Wallace's work with See Spot — The Robbery is one of the best ska albums ever produced — and the Western Standard Time Ska Orchestra.

Brian was also the saxophone player on Sublime's 40oz. to Freedom. Jon and Brian are actually friends, and Jon stayed to help us get all the equipment ready."

Peña says his favorite selection from the new set is called "Can't Hold You Down." It's "about a boxer; it's a groovy reggae tune. One of the major themes in rocksteady and reggae during the 1960s was boxing, so this tune pays homage to that." Another new tune, "You Don't Have To Do It," isn't quite so cheerful. Peña set that one down "after my friend that I got sober with killed himself. It was tragic. The dude just couldn't stay stopped. He was Native American and a really gifted artist. It hit me hard, so I wrote a song about being there for your friends and choosing to ask for help instead of suffering alone."



IMMORTAL BEAUT`

Excellence in Escondido

The best concert I've been to in a while took place on Friday, November 18 at The California Center for the Arts Escondido Rafael Pavare proved, yet again, that the San Diego Symphony is a force to be reckoned with — at least when he's on the podium.

The concert began with the "Prelude and Liebestod" from Richard Wagner's Tristan und Isolde. Wagner himself approved this concert version. The performance was all anyone could hope for. When a legendary piece of music receives a competent performance, it can be magical. When the performance itself borders on legendary, then the goosebumps begin to appear. Such was the case on that evening.

Unfortunately, the performance was marred by the most aggressive speaker feedback I've ever heard. One might even say that it was Wagnerian in

nature. The body language of the orchestra confirmed their disappointment. They knew they were making a spectacular statement as an ensemble, and an unforced technical error had interrupted that. Why the speakers were on at all is beyond my comprehension. I understand the microphones being on for a recording, but the house speakers were not needed for that.


Still, the performance carried on, and suffered little from the circumstances. The conclusion carried the full force of Wagner's five-hour exploration of day and night distilled into about 20 minutes. Credit must be given to the musicians for delivering this masterpiece in the face of adversity.

Wagner's great friend Franz Liszt was up next with his Piano Concerto No. 2. There is a chasm between Liszt and Wagner when it comes to writing orchestral music, but the piano part

was another matter. The raw athleticism associated with Liszt was absent in the opening section, being replaced by a lyricism that pianist Marc-André Hamelin expressed admirably. And when it came time to flex the pianistic muscles, Hamelin was up to that task

The final piece of music was Johannes Brahms's Symphony No. 1. Brahms had previously made several attempts at writing a symphony, one of which became his Piano Concerto No. 1. What held Brahms back was the sound of Beethoven's giant footsteps. He once claimed, "I shall never write a symphony! You can't have any idea what it's like always to hear such a giant marching behind you!" The symphony literally starts with the ominous footsteps being pounded out of the timpani. After the Liszt piano concerto, the imposing structure of Brahms's symphonic



writing was all the more obvious. The feeling was like standing at the base of the **Empire State Building for** the first time. Payare and his San Diegans were up to the task of scaling Brahms's symphonic argument, which opposed the overt emotionalism of Wagner's Tristan. I found it to be a masterful stroke of programming.

Maestro Payare gave the orchestra everything he had, and they reciprocated. There were a few dodgy moments from the brass, but they were there to deliver the victory when it mattered most in the closing bars. It looked as if Payare was going to begin levitating on the stand as he rampaged to the conclusion, leaving the audience overwhelmed by a concert that delivered the goods from start to finish.

Master of Mondays

Visiting the Acid Vault at Amplified Ale House

I step into the frigid November air, bundled up in sweaters, gloves, and a knit cap, rushing to meet the Uber that is to escort me to down the hill to East Village. It's my first post-time-change evening out, and even though it feels like midnight, my watch reads a quarter to eight. The driver arrives rocking a brand-new Tesla, and I feel like the village idiot because I can't figure out how to open the door.

Ten minutes later, we're pulling up to the Amplified Ale House at the corner of 14th Street and Island. It's a split-level design, with the top floor holding dozens of youngish patrons getting their drink and food on. I, however, am looking to get downstairs, there to check out the Monday night music scene, curated by guitarist and impresario Louis Valenzuela. A friendly bartender exacts

my five-dollar cover charge and personally escorts me down a long staircase into a long rectangular room, where I'll be setting up my mobile office for the night. Valenzuela arrived several hours earlier to set up his equipment. He's got a multimedia thing happening called Electric LouieLand, and on this November night, he's hosting a show featuring Karlos Paez, founder of the B-Side Players. Paez sings and plays guitar, and his band features Emmanuel Alarcon on lead guitar and vocals, Abraham Lacen on percussion, and Stephen Gentillalli on bass.

I settle into a seat in the second row, just behind local watercolor artist Brian Meyer, who has already set up his paints and easel. Chances are, if you've been to a jazz show, you know that Meyer is a familiar fixture. The band hasn't quite arrived, so I check in with Louie V. He'll be in constant motion throughout the night, but always returning to his cubicle off to the side, where's got a small mixing board and a laptop monitoring the video feed from four digital cameras placed around the stage. He's livestreaming tonight's set in multiple formats on several platforms, including YouTube, Facebook, and Twitch.

Glancing down, I find it easy to understand where the "Acid Vault" moniker came from. The floor is made of decorative concrete, displaying alternating strokes of pastel brushwork. Also, there

are two large faux trees sitting atop split-barrel oak kegs. The room was designed by artist Aubree Miller, who carved the dual tree trunks during the pandemic. The painted upper structure of the trees reaches out into the ceiling, and the whole place has kind of an Enchanted Forest meets Kid Charlemagne feel to it. There's an overhead projector connected to another laptop which is sending trippy images careening around the room, and once the music begins, I find I wouldn't be shocked if one of the trees started dancing. "What Aubree created is amazing," says Meyer, clearly appreciating the work of another artist.

Around 30 people have arrived by the time the band begins to play. I'd estimate that 80 percent of them might need to show identification to verify

legal drinking status. The band morphs from Mexican grooves into Jamaican sounds and other quasi-Latin feels, but they are also competing with the ambient noise of the crowd. At times, it's tough to say who's winning. Happily, by the time Paez steers the band into Bob Marley's "Them Belly Full," the audience seems to have shifted their attention from the drone of multiple inebriated conversations to what's happening onstage. Oddly enough, I notice at this point that the crowd has grown to about 50 patrons, which is just about capacity. For the rest of the evening, the sound from the stage is louder than that of the crowd. For his part, Paez navigates the noisy assemblage with an easy rapport. At one point, he gleefully announces, "I love Mondays, unlike the Bangles," a reference to that band's 1986 radio hit "Manic Monday."

Paez has a strong, powerful voice, and his dialogue with Alarcon's lead guitar makes for consistent highlights throughout the night — although Gentillalli's bass solos almost steal the show on more than one occasion. Special kudos go out to Valenzuela, who wears many hats from start to finish, from curator to videographer to soundman and social-media master. There's a different band every week down here, and after the first set, it opens up for a jam session featuring some of San Diego's heavy hitters. Not much competition from other venues on Mondays, and the vibe at the Acid Vault is singular.

Rabbit redux

I felt bad for the rabbit, but grateful for the bird.

t took me years to realize that Welsh rarebit wasn't eating about bunnies at all. A little while after I learned the truth, I was up in Oceanside — Mission San Luis Rey — at dusk,

and saw that its fields were hopping with rabbits. Beautiful sight, but it got me wondering if anyone in San Diego actually serves rabbit on a plate. Because it seems to me that everybody says rabbit is pretty much the healthiest meat you can eat: the highest percent-

Spain, China, and France, rabbit is just about a

age of protein, the lowest percentage of fat, and the fewest calories per pound. In places like Italy,

once-a-week meat choice. But in places like the U.S. and, UK, it seems like there's a certain vuk factor. Rabbit has broken out of our food chain.

It's not just the "What's Up Doc?!" lovable rab-

bit thing, or even the rabbits-as-cuddly-pets thing. In our minds, we think of them as fellow-creatures, like dogs and cats, mammals not meant for the dinner table. Plus, there's a cultural hangover, the idea that rabbit is only for when you're desperate, since rabbit stew kept Americans from starving during the Great Depression. But never mind. Today, I'm determined to give rabbit a fair trial. They say that if you're catching them in the wild, only hunt them in the months with an "R" in them: September to March, in other words. The cold of the winter months kills parasites in the rabbits' guts. Me? I'm hunting in the menus.

So here we go. It's half-twelve and I'm half starved. No brekky yet. But hey, we're right on time for lunch. And here's this place I've been hearing about, The Rabbit Hole, a

> kinda workaday pub with bench seating outside, but the main action inside, around a big U-Bar. I plonk myself down in front of a trophy of a jack rabbit with — huh? — horns?

"Norman the Jackalope," says Josh. Manager. "Part jackrabbit,

part antelope."

And yes, they do have rabbit on the menu, in the form of a "Norman Burger," natch. Only prob-

> lem? It costs \$17. But they also have two sliders, a "Slider Duet," for \$12.50. First slider's beef and the other is rabbit, cut with pork. "We do that to take any rabbit gaminess out of the flavor," says Liz, who's the barkeep and server. I mean, they have a ton of other good bar stuff, like Impossible vegan tacos, two for \$13.50; butter prawn tacos (\$9); a Cubano sandwich — pulled pork and smoked ham, plus Swiss cheese — for \$15; or blackened salmon...talking

> I go for the sliders. "Any other nibbles?" asks Liz. Hey, we're still talking rabbit here, and it does put me in mind of maybe a salad to counter all this protein and carbs. I almost go for The Wedge (\$12.50), but then I see the G.O.A.T. Salad, same price. (What's that stand for? Goats On A Trampoline?) Whatever, it promises lots of goat cheese, which sounds good with rabbit.

While I'm waiting, can't resist ordering a beer. They have a nice long list of drafts with lots of black beer for the Black Friday season. Love dark beer. Go for the Eppig 6th Anniversary Imperial Schwarzbier, partly because it's Eppig. Eppig family brewers have been six years here in 'Diego, but they go back 150 years in Brooklyn,

New York. They survived Prohibition and hit the refresh button out West, here in San Diego. Mmm. This Schwarzbier is chocolatey, malty. And it pretty much works when the goat cheese salad arrives, because there's surprising substance to the G.O.A.T., what with its candied walnuts, nice fresh strawberries, and oodles of goat cheese.

But my Schwarzbier really works when the sliders arrive. Their sweetness just kicks up the beer. The crispy, blackened, caramelized onions go perfectly with it too, but Nirvana arrives when I bite into the rabbit-and-pork slider, with its sautéed blond-but-black-burned chunks of the meat mixing with the crispy bun, and underneath, the mango chutney. Wicked.

Oh man. Then I have another thought. I suddenly remember the only other rabbit I ever

ate. It was in Qatar — Persian Gulf, where the World Cup is going on just now. My friend Mr. Hamad invited me to go falconing. He was a school teacher who had this kinda wild side, and he owned and trained a fiercelooking falcon. We drove out into the Qatari desert in the late afternoon, as the heat settled and the light faded. Mr. Hamad steered his Range Rover with his free hand, and held his gauntlet hand out the window, while the falcon on his glove scanned the horizon with his superior eyes.

All I remember next is Mr. Hamad releasing the bird into the air. It shot up high, disappeared, then rocketed down to earth, far away. In the silence, we could hear the scream of the rabbit, then nothing. Ten minutes later, we were making a fire. Mr. Hamad skinned the rabbit, and we had one of the most delicious meals of my life. We sat there, huddled by the fire in the cold night, chewing away at the hot, fresh meat as the darkness set in. "This bird," said Mr. Hamad as he stroked the

hooded falcon, "has become my life."

I'm thinking of that now as I take my final mouthful. I still have the beef slider to finish, but this rabbit is the meat of the moment. Back in the desert, I felt bad for the rabbit, but grateful for the bird. I've never had such fresh, tender meat. Or a feeling of such awe.

This rabbit slider runs out too fast. Next time, I'll have the Norman Burger for the full-on rabbit-pork patty experience. It sure beats Welsh Rarebit.

The Pensacola News Journal reported that shortly before demonstrating his rusty football skills, Taylor had become enraged upon seeing his son being overpowered by the victim during a one-on-one tackling drill. The tackled youth was not seriously hurt, and Taylor was booked to the Escambia County jail on a first-degree felony count of aggravated child abuse and a misdemeanor count of disorderly conduct.

Awesome!

- When your horse runs off with a herd of wild mustangs, let him go, because man, he's gone. That was the reality Shane Adams of Fielding, Utah, had to accept when his 10-year-old horse, Mongo, joined a passing herd in the middle of the night during a camping trip eight years ago. Adams reported his horse missing and searched the area regularly for years, to no avail. But Yahoo Insider reported that the Bureau of Land Management recently contacted Adams with incredible news: Mongo had been found. The horse is seriously underweight due to the scarcity of food in the region where he and the herd were roaming, but Adams said Mongo is in good health and has not forgotten his training. Adams said his life had taken a downward turn in the years since Mongo disappeared; he and his wife divorced, and an auto accident in 2021 left him disabled. However, he now feels things are looking up: "My life is like down in the dumps, like the car accident. I lost my house, I lost everything. I got my horse back, though."

But Is It Art?

- The city of Cheadle, Alberta, Canada, is the temporary home of a newly revealed shrine to snacking. A 17-foot-tall statue commissioned by Frito-Lay was unveiled in early October. The work memorializes the signature Cheetos experience: three fingers holding up one of the crunchy snacks, their tips covered in the powdery orange residue the brand has christened "We're excited to be celebrating Cheetle and Canadians' cheesy, Cheetle-dusted fingertips on such a grand scale and in such a uniquely mischievous way," said Lisa Allie, senior marketing director at PepsiCo Foods Canada. CNN reports that the Cheetle Hand Statue will be on display in Cheadle until Nov. 4, when it embarks on a tour of Canada.

Ewwwww

- WRGB in Albany reported the arrests of Chrystal Thomas, 33, on Oct. 4, and Austin Smith, 20, on Oct. 15, for the duo's part in the illegal tattooing of a 10-year-old boy. Thomas, the boy's mother, claimed she was not in the room when Smith permanently inked the child's name on his arm "in fullsize block letters." Authorities were made aware of the situation when the boy asked a school nurse for Vaseline to apply to the tattoo. Both Thomas and Smith were charged with endangering the welfare of a child, and Smith was additionally charged with seconddegree unlawfully dealing with a child.

Court Jester

- A municipal judge in Cleveland, Ohio, was ordered to be removed from the bench on indefinite suspension on Oct. 18 and will undergo evaluations for her physical and mental health after a long series of bizarre incidents and behavior, the Columbus Dispatch reported. The Ohio Supreme Court took action after Judge Pinkey S. Carr wore sneakers, spandex shorts, T-shirts and even tank tops while sitting the bench -- a bench that had become littered with so many cups, dolls and novelty items that Carr's own attorney described it as "resembling a flea market." The 58-page complaint filed by the Ohio Supreme Court states that, among many other incidents, Carr repeatedly discussed the television show P-Valley and joked about giving lenient sentences and accepting kickbacks with attorneys and defendants while court was in session. When a prosecuting attorney had not yet arrived for a hearing, Carr is quoted as having stated, "The prosecutor's not here. Let's see how much we can get away with." A temporary replacement for Carr will be appointed by Governor Mike DeWine and will sit the bench until voters elect a new judge in a future election.

Smelly Situations

- An overturned semi on I-95 in Cumberland County, North Carolina, on Oct. 18 gave commuters more than the usual traffic accident inconvenience. That's because when 22,000 pounds of catfish and 150 gallons of diesel fuel hits the road ... it stinks. State troopers told WBTW-13 that the semi driver was unhurt in the crash, which was caused by another driver pulling in front of him.

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Bluefin still holding out, Yellowtail missing at Coronados

Dock Totals 11/13 – 11/26: 2424 anglers aboard 126 half-day to 3-day trips out of San Diego landings over the past two weeks caught 1571 bluefin tuna (to 140 pounds), 2 blue perch, 12 bocaccio, 360 bonito, 87 calico bass, 19 lingcod, 23 rock crab, 3,687 rockfish, 1 rock sole, 249 sand bass, 74 sand dabs, 967 sculpin, 216 sheephead, 1 Spanish jack, 1 spider crab, 124 spiny lobster (140 released), 1599 whitefish, and 5 yellowfin tuna.

Saltwater: As the season turns to a more normal winter-style fishing for San Diego anglers, bluefin tuna continue to put a strain on the gear and backs of those making it out to San Clemente Island. After the last front, the bite only got better, and the counts for the last two weeks nearly doubled from the two weeks previous. That said, this is the first time I can remember with not one yellowtail in a weekly report, much less over two weeks. Granted, not all boats report their catch, and I total only those that fish up to three-day trips, but still, not one yellowtail over a two-week period is a rarity, even in the winter.

Yellowtail were going off at the Coronado Islands just before that first rainy front in early November, biting well on surface irons and fly-lined bait. Then, as the boats made it back out after the blow and rain, nada. The bite went away and seemed to reappear off the coast of San Quintin. Even the Ensenada fleet reports went from a solid yellowtail bite to mostly rockfish and lingcod at the end of the first week in November. The turn in conditions has been rapid this year, considering the standout late summer/fall action that saw dorado being caught in huge numbers north of the border, with some even making it as far north as the albacore grounds 60 miles off the Oregon coast in September and October.

Other than the bluefin bite off San Clemente, the pelagics have basically vanished to points south. Along with the missing yellowtail in the counts, not one dorado and only a handful of yellowfin tuna were reported caught by the short-to-mid-range fleet over the past two weeks. Inshore, the calico bite has slowed with the cooling water, while sand bass are starting to heat up off the flats off Imperial Beach. Sheephead, rockfish, and sculpin are making up the bulk of the catch for half-day boats when they aren't targeting sand bass.

On the beach, surf anglers are finding barred surf perch willing to bite on grubs and bait, while those anglers working the cuts and rip edges with crankbaits and spoons are catching occasional legal-sized halibut. Like bluefin, halibut

seem to be able to show whenever they feel like it. California halibut can be hard to figure, and as batch spawners that normally spawn between April and July in our area, they can have a two-week spawn any time of the year. Sliding up and down the beach at various depths, halibut are opportunistic feeders that can be hard to get to go on one day, and wide open the next. The edges of reefs, channels, and holes are likely spots to find halibut lying in wait.

I tend to have my best halibut days during the slower part of a dropping tide in bays and channels, and either the bottom or top of the tide when targeting them in the surf, depending on the slope and style of beach. Where there are deeper shore breaks or alongshore cuts that fill in, high tide and the following hour or two are best, and on flatter beaches with the break further out, low tides can be good as you can reach holes you cannot fish on high tides. Other than spawning, a lot of bait in the surf will draw halibut into the shallows, as is often witnessed

during grunion runs. With many local species of gamefish, we have a firmer grasp on when and where they will bite and what conditions are most favorable. Though California halibut prefer feeding in shallows to around 60-feet deep, they can be caught from warm knee-deep water on out to chilly depths at 300 feet. Halibut are a much-appreciated catch for San Diego beach and bay anglers, especially when the glamour fish head back south and winter fishing sets in. As the winter sand bass bite warms up, I expect to see more halibut in the half-day counts through winter and into spring, as boats will target the flats more than the kelp edges.

Freshwater: Trout season is heating up as usual between Thanksgiving and Christmas. Several County lakes have begun their seasonal stocking programs, including Lake Jennings, Santee Lakes, and Dixon Lake. So far, it seems the larger trout are coming from Santee Lakes, while Jennings is producing limits of smaller fish in the 10" to 14" range. Dixon plants normally include a good percentage of larger trout in the 2-3-pound range, but my shore fishing trip there after their first plant in mid-November did not produce much, nor did I see many fish caught. Dixon Lake can be slow to go early in the season as the trout acclimate in the deep canyon lake, but once settled in, it can produce very well. This weekend, December 2nd-4th, the Kiwanis will hold their annual trout derby at Dixon Lake. By then, and after a second plant, the trout should be biting well. Dixon will be closed November 29th-December 1st to allow the freshly-planted trout to settle in for the event.

Whether on the open ocean, beach, lake, or bay, they're out there, so go get 'em!

11/15 – The Sea Watch called in with 42 whitefish, 18 rockfish, 7 sheephead, 2 sculpin, 1 calico bass, and 1 bonito for the 26 anglers aboard their afternoon half-day run.

11/18 - 18 anglers aboard the New Lo-An 3-Day trip boated 47

bluefin tuna.

11/20 – 50 bluefin tuna were caught by the 27 anglers aboard the *Legend* 1.5-Day trip, while 29 anglers aboard the Pacific Islander 1.5-Day trip caught 58 bluefin tuna.

11/22 - 9 hoop-netters aboard the *Alicia Twilight* trip kept 17 spiny lobsters along with 3 rock crab and 1 sand bass. 11 anglers aboard the *Fortune* 3-Day trip caught limits of 66 bluefin tuna.

11/25 – The *Chubasco* II fishing out of Oceanside on a ³/₄ Day trip with 20 anglers aboard called in with 150 rockfish, 25 whitefish, and 5 sculpin in the gunny sacks.
