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
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

Tempest over Torrey

"Because of that tree, we can't see the sea!"

Owners of an endangered Torrey pine in Del Mar have hired a lawyer to try to save the tree, which the city says must be removed. It's the latest tactic in a battle that officially began in 2021 over trees that the neighbors have long seen as a curtain blocking their ocean views. And while Del Mar has an ordinance protecting Torrey pines — among the rarest pines in the world — it also has an ordinance that guards private property views. So there was tension when the neighbors who live behind the Ocean View Avenue property owned by Harvey and Sheryl White filed a Trees, Scenic Views and Sunlight application, asking the city to help restore their views.

Beer business may get bump

More music, more munchies in 2023?

The brewery tasting rooms located in the Vista business park near Sycamore Avenue may be getting an added boost in early 2023. The Vista City Council is set to vote in January on a resolution that would permit up to 12 outdoor events for these establishments annually. Currently, the limit is four. "The nature of the business park, it's a lot different from our breweries downtown where there are different places to eat nearby," Vista City Councilmember Corrina Contreras explained. "Whether the brewery has a kitchen or not, there are a ton of other amenities around. In the business park, it's not necessarily like that. You have these industrial tasting rooms/ breweries, and they don't really have

access to food. So live entertainment ends up being a huge component of their ability to attract folks beyond just having really good beer — because we have some of the best beer in the world here in Vista."

The events would also come at a dis-

The Planning Commission agreed that five of the trees pose an unreasonable obstruction, and worked with the owners to carve out a 5-year pruning plan that would reduce the largest tree by 40 percent and the others by 20 percent. Three days later, a limb broke off the biggest tree, effectively reducing its live foliage by 40 percent — but not in the right place to

the Whites' arborist said that pruning during this trimming cycle could harm the tree.

There's only one way to restore the view fully, as the Deftos see it: remove the tree. At a meeting on November 14, the city council agreed, with Mayor Dwight Worden and council member Dave Druker opposed. ("I disagree immensely [with] the decision to

open the matter in full," said attorney Scott Williams, calling for a new public hearing. An environmental review is needed, he added. "The CEQA exemption simply does not apply to removal of a healthy, mature tree."

Despite being one of the most critically endangered pines in the world, Torrey pines receive no federal protection. Threatened by the loss of genetic diversity, beetles, and climate change, they grow naturally only on a sliver of San Diego coastline and on Santa Rosa Island.

count: the tasting rooms currently must pay \$1009-\$1500 for outdoor events that feature amplified music. Outdoor events with no amplified music are charged \$150. The new resolution pins a \$150 fee to every event, with our without amplification. "The whole point of a fee is just to cover staff costs on the city side," Contreras said. "That's the reason we went forward with amending the specific plan, because it allowed us to have a fee structure where we're essentially utilizing less staff time, because there are less steps needed. It becomes more administerial

versus a really in-depth plan check. I don't think we need to have a super in-depth plan check for some of these live entertainment venues and events, as long as all the people know that need to know — like fire, the sheriffs, and the city. I think that's plenty of people knowing."

Tristan Faulk-Webster is a co-owner of the Aztec Brewing Company, one of the breweries in the Vista business park. In fact, Aztec already benefited from bonus events during the lean year of 2021, when Faulk-Webster estimates they held

being able to have that sort of thing going on." He credits the move with helping to create a new music scene in Vista. "Before the breweries, there was no live music scene in Vista. With the whole brewery/tasting room thing going on, there has been a significant increase in events all over the place. A lot more people are getting into the 'go local' mindset. So, go local with breweries, with crafts, with artists and local music too. There's a lot more appreciation that kind of came out of this."

Councilmember Contreras likes the way the tasting rooms have changed the vibe of the business park. "It creates a different type of atmosphere, where there are people there during the day for the business and then people there later in the

at least seven or eight outdoor events under special circumstances. "During that time period, there was an emergency order which essentially let us have outdoor events any time we wanted to," he explained. "After they took the emergency order away, one of the justifications [for official expansion] was, 'Hey, we have been doing this without any problems.' So, I think it's totally reasonable for us to be able to do it again for at least once a month." Because while the pandemic might be easing, there is still the matter of attracting customers in a heavily saturated market. "With the amount of breweries and all of us kind of fighting over the same crowd, the market is totally oversaturated," Faulk-Webster said. "So, for us, it's been a smart business move to be able to have events that draw a significant amount of people and help us stay afloat through it all. Me and my family all being musicians, that's a huge deal for us music-wise. Just

afternoon and at night for the breweries," she said. "So, you have more activation and more eyes on the street. It just lends itself to a better community where you are actually utilizing the space in the community for different types of operations. I think that's important to have a more diverse way of being in a business park that just doesn't end at five o'clock. Now we have our breweries, so you give life to this area that would have been kind of stale after five pm." To help with that atmosphere, she has worked closely with the Vista Brewers Guild, and she viewed the tweaks to outdoor events as "lowhanging fruit" - changes which would have a positive impact and could be made quickly. More complicated issues, such as temporary and permanent structures built outside the establishments, dining and food truck options, and parking fixes may be addressed in the future.



UNDER THE RADAR

La Jolla ear boxing A torrent of hype from high-flying La Jolla biotech investment outfits like Avalon Ventures continues apace, despite a growing stream of bad news for public investors. A sad case in point: the pending demise of the oddly named Otonomy, Inc. The company, which was "working on treatments for middle and inner ear diseases," per a December 21 *Union-Tribune* report, "is shutting down after failing to find a buyer over the past few months." It's a far cry from the outfit's glory days, when much-touted Avalon took Otonomy public in the late sum-

mer of 2014. Otonomy "pulled off a \$100 million Wall Street debut, lining its pockets as it works to get a late-stage ear treatment through the FDA and onto the market," wrote the website *Fierce Biotech* on August 13 of that year. "The company moved about 6.3 million shares at a top-of-the-range \$16 each, earmarking another 937,500 shares to cover over-allotments and setting its maximum deal



The buying frenzy was stirred up by online stories like a puffy March 2009 pre-Initial Public Offering piece by the website *Xconomy.com*, quoting Otonomy's founding CEO and Avalon managing director **Jay Lichter**. "The potential is to be the world leader in treatment of the ears. I like to say that we'll be the Alcon of the ears,' Lichter says, referring to the Switzerland-based eye care company. "That's our goal, and we can

do it." According to the *Xconomy* post, "Avalon has invested \$3 million to get the company going in its first year."

In April 2017, Lichter related in another *Xconomy* post his searing personal experience with an ear malady. "In January 2008, while driving along Wall Street in La Jolla, I suddenly got so dizzy and disoriented that I had to pull over. I thought I might be having a stroke or a heart attack. After 20 minutes,

when I was still alive (and still in a free fall), I called a friend, and she picked me up and took me to the emergency room. I eventually ended up in the office of **Dr. Jeff Harris**, division chief of otolaryngology at UC San Diego Health. He said, 'You have Meniere's disease." Adds the account: "After that appointment, I experienced the full throes of the disease. I would have two or three vertigo episodes a week, each one lasting between eight and 10 hours. I could not sleep through it. I would just close my eyes and lay there. Once the vertigo was

over, I would get a vertigo hangover — a brain fog that would last several hours. I didn't feel the spinning, but my mind was not as sharp as normal."

Lichter's health crisis marked the beginning of Otonomy, he wrote. "I feel extremely lucky because I was in a position to realize that treatment options were lacking, and I could actually do something about it. And that is what has always driven me — turning lemons into lemonade. At Otonomy, we are bringing new treatments for ear disorders like Meniere's disease to thousands of people, and eventually, to hundreds of thou-

sands (perhaps even millions) of people." Harris, who still practices at UCSD, became a co-founder of Otonomy and now shares several ear drug patents with Lichter, assigned to Otonomy and the University of California, per the website *justia.com*. But Otonomy never delivered Lichter's long promised miracle drugs, and the price of the firm's stock has cratered, last week falling to 11 cents

a share, reports Fierce Biotech.

But in the super-rich realm of La Jolla biotech investors, hope and hype are never far from each other, and without acknowledging past failures, Lichter is back drumming up investor cash, based on what he says are the latest putative cures. "On Dec. 6, partners from Avalon announced a firsttime \$135 million fund from Avalon BioVentures, L.P., a new venture capital firm dedicated to earlystage biomedical innovation," the San Diego Business Journal reported December 20. "The new firm is a spin-out from Avalon Ventures - a San Diegobased VC which has raised approximately \$750 million through 11 funds for both high-tech and life science companies." The story quoted Lichter as saying, "announcements about companies funded by [Avalon BioVentures] are 'coming soon'

and that the goal of the fund is to invest in about three per year on average over the next four years. Despite the recent downturn in life science markets, Lichter said the partners and investors in Avalon BioVentures are bullish about the outlook for the fund's future investments. 'We've had a very consistent strategy over the years – early-stage investing, big ideas, new disease indications, novel targets, whole platforms. And if



public market exposure for three or four years. [The market] is going to come back around so we don't really worry about that, he said." Added Otonomy's founder: "Our strategy works great because when times are bad, valuations are down, and we get better prices on companies."


BEFORE I ENTERED JUNIOR HIGH, my family moved inland from Del Mar, the mellow, upwardly mobile surf town north of San Diego name-dropped in "Surfin' U.S.A.," to Rancho Santa Fe, a wealthy and conservative realm of citrus groves, migrant Mexican workers, and geriatrics in golf carts. Stone-cold Reagan country, and me and Senzo Moe would escape into the weed, toking up in so many lemon groves that the sharp tang of citrus peels still conjures up bud...

The public high school I attended — imagine an open-air Ridgemont High surrounded by sagebrush and rocky arroyos, with seagulls diving for your lunch meat — was a mosaic of pot-smoking cliques, their turf demarcated as succinctly as the multicolored regions in maps of the cerebral cortex: skateboarders, metal-heads, punks, death-rockers, stoners, and the various flavors of surfer — the long-haired Zep fans, the cue balls that dug ska, and the dread-headed ones we called Waspafarians....

We knew from Leary and Alpert the importance of set and setting, advice we both followed and blatantly ignored. Outdoor Dead shows were a cross between the bardos of the Tibetan afterlife and romper rooms, but North County's unspoiled zones were the greatest backdrops. The summer we were gobbling all of Squiggles's white blotter, we'd time our doses to hit at sunset.

We'd kick back on the coppery cliffs of Red Rocks beneath a hunchbacked pine and watch the sun melt into the immense, resplendent sea. The sky struck the total chord of the


San Diego is a truly special city, a chosen city: we San Diegans know — as no others do, as no others can — that all earthly victories are hollow. How

Well, I guess we showed them what's what — because that's exactly what we

did. So, yes, we'll be paying Atlanta around \$11 million over the coming years to help offset Kemp's gargantuan salary — close to \$22 million a season. But believe it or not, the deal actually saves us money. Plus, there's the incalculable feeling of freedom and release that comes from simply not having Matt Kemp in your dugout every night, serving as some kind of nightmare reminder of your stupid attempt to buy a division title."

with the King and then bid him farewell. There is no romance in winning, no story — even, dare I say it, no meaning. And deep down, we know this.

How do I know we know this Because our city has had a great sports franchise: the San Diego Gulls of the late '90s and early aughts. Five — count 'em, five, back to back championships — and how did we reward them? By staying away in droves, so much so that they shut down due to lack of business. We wanted no part of that pyrrhic victory, because we were the faithful. And faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen.


But of course, we are only human. Even God's chosen can forget. The Israelites, God's original chosen people, forgot him over and over. When they suffered, they cried out against him. When they prospered, they imagined it was because of their own greatness, forgetting what we read in Ecclesiastes: "The race is not to the swift or the battle to the strong, but time and chance happen to them all." Or again in Deuteronomy: "You might say in your heart, 'The power and strength of my hands have made this wealth for me.' But remember that it is the Lord your God who gives you the power to gain wealth." Or in the Psalms: "Unless the Lord builds the house, those who built it labor in vain."

It's a lesson we've had to learn time and time again. Remember August, when people said we were trying to buy a World Series run, as if it were some bold new strategy? Seven years ago, we spent untold millions to put together what looked like it would be an all-star outfield: Matt Kemp, Wil Myers, and Justin Upton. Everyone thought we were finally wising up and spending what it took to succeed. And what came of all our spending? We said goodbye to Myers last week after a traveling long and rocky road together. Upton lasted just one season. And Kemp — oh, Kemp.

Looking back, the fate of the what was then the biggest deal in team history should have been clear from the outset, when the x-rays came back and showed arthritis in both of Kemp's hips. We dealt for

Kemp because of the speed and power of his bat, and as every hitter since Ted Williams has known, batspeed and power come from the hips. But we ignored the signs and pressed on, spending all the way. Buying Kemp was an attempt to build our own golden calf, with that deal, we became men striving with God, who alone giveth the victory. And when man wrestles with God, where does he get injured, according to Genesis account of Jacob and the angel? That's right, the hip. We were warned. But did we learn? We did not.

We went right out and spent again, this time on Fernando Tatis, Jr. We made ourself another golden calf. And we wound up with another wounded joint. Of course, that injury wasn't Tatis' fault. It was ours. He didn't anoint himself our savior. We did that to





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him. But he suffered for it, and we suffered because of his suffering.



San Diego Reader: What is the mission of vour church?

He ran off to his beat-up car and came back with a binder full of all these pictures of his life. He had been living the roughest life I ever heard anyone tell me: crime, drugs, motorcycle crashes, hospitals, jail. He didn't know why he wanted to show me these pictures, but it made me realize that sometimes I disregard people who live so rough. Those are the exact people whom Jesus hung out with and wanted to

MOVIE LISTINGS

Avatar: The Way of Water — A person might argue that once you've figured out how to download a person's consciousness into a lab-grown, giant blue superhuman body, you don't absolutely need to travel across the galaxy to hunt whales that produce minute quantities of stuff that stops human aging. But that person would be missing the point of director and co-writer James Cameron's sequel to Avatar, a sequel that deploys even more high tech (or at least, high frame rate) than its predecessor in service to its message that happiness lies in reconnecting to nature. Because once humanity lost sight of that, erm, native truth, what else was left but the itch for innovation, expansion, and conquest? It would also be missing the point to lament the incessant addition of "bro!" and "cuz!" to the ends of lines spoken by the dreadlocked blue teen offspring of gone-Na'vi soldier Jake Sully, or the weird dramatic and personal vacancy of their torn-between-two-worlds human friend Spider. Because dialogue and character and even plot mechanics must here bend the knee before spectacle and dynamics. And those are things Cameron knows well

enough to make you feel them in whatever part of you has made him so unerringly successful at the box office. Here, it's the spectacle of a well lighted life below the ocean waves, and the dynamics of fathers

and sons, of hosts and refugees, of hunter and hunted. And it would be missing the point in truly special fashion to call the proceedings indulgent to the point of self-infatuation: Cameron has built a new world from the remixed bits of this one, and he seems determined that we should not simply visit Pandora, we should, for at least three hours, live in it. However, it might not be missing the point to note that the devotion to ever-higher CG resolution and ever-more immersive 3-D has a tendency to drain the drama - the visceral, vital impact - from hand-to-hand combat, and to make the biggest battles feel like video-game cutscenes. To reduce, ultimately, the experience's sum total of felt life. But then, there is more than one way to see this particular movie, so your mileage may vary. 2022. — M.L. ★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Babylon — Does Damien Chazelle like the movies? His big splash, La La Land, told the story of a gal who gives up true love with a true artist (a jazz man, as it happens) to pursue stardom, because c'mon, it's stardom. (Come to think of it, it's all there in the first line of the song that opens the show, in which a girl sings about leaving her own true love for the lights of LA.) A sad story, but still sweet and wistful and fun to look at. Here? We open with shit (from an elephant on its way to an Early Hollywood orgy) and follow with piss (from a Champagne-swilling ingénue at said orgy) before moving onto ersatz semen (from a bazooka-sized member wielded by a performing dwarf) getting sprayed all over the riotous crowd. Projectile vomiting is held in reserve until the film's middle, but still: the magic of the movies, people. A party like this attracts a certain sort of someone: in this case, Nellie (Margot Robbie), the daughter of a con man and a crazy woman, on the run from home and bound for cinematic glory. Within minutes of her arrival, she's hoovering up cocaine and listening to errand boy Manny (Diego Calva) yammer on about how movies are meaningful,

bigger than life. Maybe so, maybe not, but the industry that produces them turns out to be, surprise surprise, a money-making machine that runs on people — emphasis on machine. The coming of sound is the big technical advance here — the torture of Nellie under the sound man's tyranny gets especial and excruciating attention — but as the crazypants closing montage makes it clear, technology is god in Babylon, and the artist onscreen is at best a handmaiden, at worst a sacrificial victim. (One guess as to which sort of artist is the only one to make it out with his dignity intact.) What comes before that montage is long and frequently unpleasant, but at least there's a point to all that decadence and despair: first time as tragedy, second time as hit musical. Of course, there are consolations along the way — Chazelle knows his business, after all. Casting Brad Pitt as a big shot on the wane is both bold and engaging. And a visit to the "asshole of LA" doubles nicely (and nastily) as a journey into moviedom's carney roots. But for all the parties and pretty people, it's not a fun ride. 2022. — M.L. ★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Empire of Light — Watching writerdirector Sam Mendes' latest, it's hard to shake the suspicion that he fell in love with the setting — an achingly beautiful old movie house/general nightspot in an English seaside town — and set out to make a movie around it. Because while the place looks fantastic — Roger Deakins' camerawork has the interior's Art Deco woodwork radiating color almost as richly as the exterior's neon trim — the story skips from this to that with all the depth

and impact of the stone that frustrated new employee Stephen (Micheal Ward, beautiful) sends skipping across the local lido during his conversation with his mentally unstable fellow worker Hilary (Olivia Colman, sympathetic). He's frustrated because he has to deal with rising racism in late '70s England; she's unstable because - well, causes are tricky when it comes to mental health, but it's clearly the case that she's had a bad time of it in the Men in Authority department, Just now, she's trapped in a tawdry office-visit affair with her boss Donald (Colin First, seedy), who begs her to suck it when she just wants to wank him and get it over with. She'd much rather share a secret tryst with Stephen, and what do you know, he's happy to play along. Is it a young man's coming of age tale of life lived and wisdom won, or a middle-aged woman's journey through adversity to something approaching peace? Is it about the magic of the movies and the escape they offer, or the need to cast fantasy aside and face the duller adventure offered by reality? Maybe with a little more craft and care, it could have been all of them, but as it is, skip, skip, skip. Late in the film, Hilary asks projectionist Norman (Toby Young, appealing) why he made a particular momentous decision: his mystified reply may match the viewer's own as to what Mendes had in mind here. 2022. — M.L. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Patton's plan pays

off When vocalist Leonard Patton decided to launch a jazz venue in the midst of the pandemic — and in La Mesa, of all places — many

wondered if he had lost his mind. But when The Jazz Lounge opened its doors in July 2021, Patton had a plan. Now it's a year and a half later, he's produced some 160 shows, and that plan seems to have justified the risk.

"It's steadily grown since we opened it," says Patton. "You know, at times, it's not easy, but it is rewarding. The musicians love the venue, naturally, but we've also developed a regular patronage that have come to

multiple shows, which is cool. The Jazz Lounge is small: it seats about 40 people. We could always try to pack them tighter like a New York club, but we want people to

be comfortable." Patton says own his busy gig schedule didn't hinder his ability to build up the Lounge: "I've always wanted to have a space of my own. Sometimes I'd just rent spaces here and there and put on events, so having my own venue meant I could do my thing and bring in people who could do theirs as well. Obviously I've been to a lot of different clubs. Most of all, I wanted it to be a listening room. So, I looked at Dizzy's as a model, and any room that Holly Hofmann has curated for. I know that there is an audience for a place where music is the prime attraction, rather than an afterthought." The Jazz Lounge has

mostly featured local San

Diego musicians over the last year and a half, with the occasional player coming down from LA. But on January 17, Patton is featuring a nationally known trio from

New York City: the Goldings/ Bernstein/Stewart Organ Trio, featuring guitarist Peter Bernstein, organist Larry Goldings, and drummer Bill Stewart. Players of this stature usually play much larger venues, such as the Jazz at the Athenaeum series. How did he land them? "Well, I'm always going online and checking to see who's doing tours, not necessarily for booking purposes, but just tracking out of curiosity. I saw that Larry Goldings was doing some dates in LA, and I just wondered what it might take to get him to come down here. So, I got in touch with his booking agent and we started to have a dialogue, and it just worked out. They're going to come down. I've got someone to provide a Hammond B-3 organ, and I'm providing the backline [amps and P.A.], so getting them turned out to be easier than you might think."

It's easily the highest profile band the Lounge has hosted. "It's funny, because I get emails all the time, from people all over the world, but I have to be cautious, because I can't just start booking everybody, knowing that I could lose money. I'm still in the process of building this thing, so I must be careful. That's not going to be an issue with these guys, though. We're doing two shows and

> we're already almost sold-out, and I barely adver-≟ tised it."

Typically, landing an act of this stature would depend on squeezing them in before or after a Los Angeles show, but Patton is optimistic — and tightlipped — about booking future national-touring artists. "There's a couple of things I'm working on. A lot of this is just in the timing of things. But if we can get a handful of those acts, it would be good for the Jazz Lounge.

That's a good amount. We don't need to fill the calendar with them, because we've got a lot of great local artists, and there are regional people up in LA I'd like to feature as well."

Aside from the January 17 Goldings/Bernstein/Stewart Organ Trio, upcoming Jazz Lounge concerts include the Matt Dibiasi Quartet on January 14 and occasional Rugburn Gregory Page on January 21. "Most of the concerts so far, I've been there," he says. "My wife helps out and we have a little team." But he still keeps at least one eye on his on-stage work: "I'm trying to build it up to the point where I could take off, if a certain opportunity for a high profile tour came my way." — Robert Bush



Deb Heads' delight

Pop wunderkind brings Winterlicious to Viejas

Debbie Gibson's *Winterlicious* concert at Viejas Casino & Resort in Alpine was an early Christmas gift bestowed to local "Deb Heads" on Thanksgiving weekend. "That's Debbie's name for her core group of fans," Jenny Corriveau told me outside the Oak Ballroom, where the concert was held. "I have been a fan since '87. She is the soundtrack of my life. Damn it, I'm going to cry." Corriveau showed me a photo she'd taken a few minutes prior with Gibson at the VIP meet and greet. "If 40 people stand outside the door, she will talk to, sign for, and hug every single person."

A VIP ticket, which allowed attendees to sit close to the stage and enjoy a meet-and-greet with the bubblegum pop songstress, cost about \$200. Regular tickets, like the one I purchased for a spot near the venue's rear, ran \$30. Parking was free. The Saturday event was Corriveau's fifteenth Debbie Gibson concert. While she was talking to me, she realized that her fellow Deb Heads had made their way inside, which cued us to follow. "Tonight, you're going to see the pure joy with a couple of her hits," said Corriveau as we walked

towards the ballroom, "and songs from *Winterlicious*, a new album. It's a holiday album, because it's got Christmas, Hanukkah, and New Year's Eve-themed songs." The LP, Gibson's eleventh, was released on October 22.

Most concertgoers were fellow Gen-Xers. A few people wore throwback attire reminiscent of the '80s — Madonna-esque garments with lots of holes, or sweaters tied around their necks *a la* Alex P. Keaton from *Family Ties* — but most dressed conservatively, many in Christmas colors, with scarves and beanie caps.

Gibson opened with "God Rest You Merry, Gentlemen," wearing a sweater that looked like a Life Savers candy wrapper. After the Christmas

intro, Gibson doffed the sweater and revealed a bright green mini dress. "I feel a little Barbarella," she said into the mic, "I love all of that holiday music...I've been waiting to wear this dress for, like, months." The 52-year-old '80s icon had the same physique as back in the day, according to a person sitting in my row. "I remember seeing her on MTV, singing 'Shake Your Love' while dancing in a convertible oldie car." Next, Gibson performed "Electric Youth," hitting the dance moves on cue with her male backup dancers. "They can't keep up with her," continued the same person in my row. Then suddenly, one dancer did a back flip as Gibson was singing near the Christmas tree on the left side of the

stage. The crowd "oohed" and "aahed" at the display of energy, but stayed seated.

Gibson addressed to crowd to recount the story of her early success — before she even graduated high school. "The rotary phone rang, and my mom was, like, 'It went number one on the Billboard charts'...and it went a little something like this." Gibson gently played the piano keys, then sang, "Oh, can't you see I'm not fooling nobody?" from "Foolish Beat," off her 1987 Out Of The Blue album. A groupmate walked out with a saxophone in hand and played along with the famous synth-pop jam that got so many '80s teens through crushes, puppy love, and breakups. Some in the audience sighed, others sniffled. Gibson made history with the track as the youngest artist to produce, write, and sing a song to top the Billboard Hot 100 list — at 16.

Gibson took a short break and returned to the stage wearing a long black dress. On the jumbo screen on the right side of the stage, a man's image popped up, and he sang with Gibson. "That's Debbie's duet with and tribute to her dad, Joe," explained Corriveau. "It's a lovely rendition of 'White Christmas."

The nearly one-and-a-half-hour *Winterlicious* concert played like a Broadway show, including a few outfit changes, onstage dialogue, solilo-

quies, and even props. At one point, all the performers left the stage, and a team carried out a king-size bed. Then the musicians, backup dancers, and singers got onto the bed and surrounded Gibson. "Welcome to our slumber party," she said. Everyone on the bed wore pajamas and sang "Christmas Dreams" (with a country twang), a song from her new album.

One of the last songs performed was "Cheers." "Her mother died earlier this year, and 'Cheers' is a tribute to her," Corriveau said. As Gibson sang, people stood and held their drinks up in the air. "Here's to the end and the beginning," Gibson sang. "What a year. Cheers!" ■

IMMORTAL BEAUTY

The big dogs of Christmas Classique

We've looked at a variety of classical Christmas music over the past few weeks. We considered somber music for a solstice of solitude, and little-known Christmas operas such as Hans Pfitzner's Christelfein. Now we come to the big dogs of Christmas Classique. There are three.

The first is Messiah by Georg Frederick Handel. This comes as no surprise. Messiah has a tradition beyond any other piece of classical Christmas music. The popularity of *Messiah* is due to its excellent yet accessible music. The orchestra requirements are modest by modern standards and the choral music can be adequately performed by almost any civic or church-based choir. Even the vocal solos can be mastered by local undergraduate vocalists.

The second piece also comes as no surprise. Piotr

Tchaikovsky's The Nutcracker has been a staple of the American Christmas since The New York City Ballet gave its first annual performance in 1954. Tchaikovsky's ballet is a melodic masterpiece. Almost every single section of music is instantly recognizable by even the most casual of listeners. The Nutcracker, along with A Christmas Carol by Charles Dickens, has been instrumental in the development of the modern Christmas. The Nutcracker is an atmospheric tale that is quintessentially about Christmas, but without any reference to the holiday's religious traditions.

The third piece is a quintessentially religious tale about Christmas: Hodie by Ralph Vaughan Williams. It is the greatest Christmas composition. It draws its text from Catholic, biblical, and poetic sources. The opening

"Hodie" section is from the service of Vespers and uses the Latin text. The rest of the piece is in English and uses text from The Gospels, John Milton, Thomas Hardy, Martin Luther, The Common Book of Prayer, George Herbert, and the composer's wife Ursula.

Musically, Vaughan Williams uses a children's choir to narrate the story of the birth of Christ. There are solos for soprano, tenor, and baritone, along with massive choral sections. Hodie is not as accessible as Messiah The orchestra is huge, and the choral singing is more demanding than Handel's.

Hodie was the last large-scale composition for chorus and orchestra that Vaughan Williams was to write. It premiered in 1958 and was immediately out of step with the current compositional practices,

which were post-modern and generally dreadful. The critical response was tepid, and Vaughan Williams was condemned for the sin of nationalism.

Vaughan Willimas was an Englishman, and Hodie is very much what we would expect from such a person-

ality. Fortunately, we can now listen to Hodie on our own terms, and not worry about whether or not it is culturally appropriate. If you are into the English traditions of Christmas — and I am — then Hodie is a gift as valuable as those given by the Magi.

Because the sign says "Hob Nob Hill," and it has been here and open since — get this — 1944. That's nearly eighty years. I start imagining sailors and soldiers 80 years ago, trooping into this very place for a drink with their hot dates while World War II was raging across the sea. They say this is the oldest restaurant still in the same location in all of San Diego.

One good thing about covid: the closure gave the owners an opportunity for a major facelift. I pop my head around. Ooh. Sure looks fresh. And they have a happy hour from 3-6 every weekday. "Let's just go in and see," I say to Annie. "Because, hey, happy hour can't be bad, right?"

"Long as it's not just dried-up chicken wings,"

says Annie.

We risk it. Inside the place is all black, gray,

and white, except for one nice touch: the cushions and the waiters' aprons are a bright teal green. Tabletops are marble. Classy. My one worry: this is gonna be above my pay grade. My one hope: this is happy hour.

We sit at one of the gray and silver booths and look at the Happy Hour menu. At first glance, it seems standard fare. They have \$4, \$5, \$6, \$7 choices. The \$4 includes a Bud

> Light, Coors Banquet, and mimosas. The \$5, Stella, house Cabernet, and a basket of frings - French fries and onion rings. It's only when we get to \$6 that we start talking serious nosh, like soup of the day — today's is minestrone — or an avocado special. Natch, you get most food in the \$7 section, like a quarter-pounder "Carlito's Way" burger, or a half-order of fish and chips.

Jeff's got his order book out. Annie knows what she wants. "I'll take the \$7 salad, the \$5 frings...and the \$6 minestrone soup." She also takes a Moscow Mule for eight bucks. So it does add up. Me, I go for the \$7 burger. This is when

I notice the \$6 happy hour boilermaker in the HH list. Hmm. Beer, shot of whisky, \$6. Not a bad price...what da heck. I order one.

We split the frings and the salad (delicious pilings of chicken, bacon, tomato chunks, scrambled eggs, chicken and bleu cheese), and I have at the burger. For starters, that quarter-pound is surely enough, and second, there's a little sausage flavor in there, along with a sweet BBQ tang. Plus the bun is nicely toasted.

But the real news for me in all this is the nice full shot glass of whiskey. Confession: I never really liked that danged heathy, peaty liquid. Until now. This one is rich and sweet like a liqueur, oh-so seductive.

"It's a peanut butter whiskey," says Jeff. Say what?

"Yes. It's a peanut butter whiskey. An invention from San Diego."

It turns out that this is an extraordinary story. This guy Steven Yeng is a Cambodian-American who lived his childhood through the Khmer Rouge period in Cambodia, and despite contracting polio and being confined to a wheelchair while growing up in the refugee camps, he made it with his family to Ocean Beach. From the early care baskets his family received, he started to improve — and to fall in love with peanut butter. It was while he and his family were operating a couple of restaurants in OB that they came up with the idea of incorporating peanut butter into every-

thing from drinks to wings to fried rice. They launched Skrewball Peanut Butter Whiskey in 2019, say they have sold an incredible million cases in their first two years, and are already known for the charities they give to - including helping mothers and children fleeing the war in Ukraine.

Whatever the story, this is probably the first whiskey I have actually liked. And for your six bucks, you get this can of Mother Earth Nitro Vanilla Cream beer to drink as the chaser.

The sweetness of the PB whiskey really works with the burger. In fact, this whole place really works. Yes, old school, laced with history, but at the same time, new, and bright. And, turns out, it is open for breakfast every day from seven. Next time: brekky, and outside in the sun on the patio. Or maybe dinner, if we're feeling flush. "We do a prime rib, Thursdays thru Sundays," says Jeff.

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Dock Totals 12/11 – 12/24: 828 anglers aboard 49 half-day to 3-day trips out of San Diego landings over the past two weeks caught 184 bluefin tuna, 24 calico bass, 5 lingcod, 2161 rockfish, 25 sand bass, 24 sanddab, 338 sculpin, 194 sheephead, 14 triggerfish, and 684 whitefish.

Saltwater: As 2022 winds to an end, bluefin tuna are still hanging around Tanner Bank 120 miles due west of Point Loma. Most of the mid- to long-range fleet is fishing along the Baja peninsula; those who occasionally make the long run west are finding a good grade of tuna willing to bite. With the plethora of squid in the area, expectations are that the tuna will remain within range of 1.5-day and longer trips. A few long-range boats are heading north on their return leg to get a day in on the action at Tanner, such as the *Intrepid* on their 11-Day Soft Steel trip south.

After getting some school-sized yellowfin, dorado, yellowtail, and grouper off Baja Sur, and with the larger yellowfin not cooperating, they headed up the beach. Captain Bill Cavanaugh decided to top off the trip by taking a shot at the bluefin out west. The results were good, albeit after a slow start on the big brutes. From Captain Cavanaugh: "Our first day fishing Bluefin we had scratch fishing, but all the fish were quality 60-140 lb.-class fish. Most of our bites came from fly-lined baits and sinker rigs. At the last hour of our trip, we managed to get on a school and had wide open action on beautiful grade Bluefin. It was every drop with the knife jigs for a whole hour. We ended our trip with a bang and returned home with a great mixed bag of Yellowfin, Yellowtail, Dorado, Grouper and Bluefin."

Local boats are focusing on rockfish, sheephead, and whitefish, and those not going into maintenance mode for the winter break will be fishing just south of the border during the closure until March 1st, or working in US waters for sand bass and calico bass. Halibut are also a viable winter target, especially along the Point Loma flats and off Imperial Beach. Anglers fishing the bays from private boats and kayaks are reporting a solid spotted bay bass bite and quite a few keeper halibut over the minimum 22".

Surf fishing has been steady for barred surf perch, mostly, with a few corbina and croakers mixed in. That bite improves as you go north into Orange County and up. Weather and Christmas activities has slowed the lobster trips for the fleet over the past couple weeks, though hoop-netters from private boats, and piers, along with free divers are getting decent results, with legal-sized 'bugs' representing about a quarter of the

catch. Remember to check all regs before going out, as a report card, gauge, and license are required.

Also, there is a change for California fishing licenses in 2023 that should make most anglers happy. Finally, the 365-day licenses will be available beginning January 1st. This means no matter when you buy your license, it will be valid for 365 days from the date of purchase. This makes much more sense: now, a seasonal angler will not have to renew a license purchased in, say, June until the following year in June. Before this, all anglers had to buy a new license at the beginning of each calendar year.

Looking back: 2022 has been a banner year for the fleet. Bluefin opened the show last spring, and along with some solid yellowtail fishing along the coast, dorado moved north of the border in masses rarely (if ever) seen before, and were caught all the way up to the albacore grounds 60 miles off the Oregon coast. Though studies show that bluefin tuna are out there somewhere year-round off the Southern California and Baja coast, they have seemed to settle in on the Tanner/Cortez banks for the winters. This could be a new normal, or as Rob Tressler reported from the *Tribute* on a recent 1.5-day trip to Tanner. "More and more it's clear that weather permitting, we are fortunate to have what may very well be a yearround fishery for bluefin within 1.5-2.5 day range in Southern California." Let's hope the trend continues into 2023 and beyond.
