UNIVERSITY CITY

Four-year neighbors fought UCSD = uncomfortably confronting student density

Housing-starved students in University City say they're fighting for elbow room with older, more established residents. "They're calling us transient — the new word is 'migratory' now," said Aidan Lin at a city workshop last week, where he played a video of a rowdy planning committee meeting in an effort to show how far things have gone. Students were talked over loudly, and a voice denounced the



Update subcommittee, is also the executive director of Our Time To Act United, a youth group that has been calling for even higher density than is now being planned. Unfortunately, he said, the group's opponents are actively trying to exclude them from the process. Further, group members

The University Community Plan update is unfolding amid a housing gap that somehow has to find room for employees of UCSD — the region's largest employer — as well as thousands of students who can't find housing on campus. According to the city, the university had 25,000 full-time employees and 38,000 students in 2018.

Lin, who is on the Community Plan

have been accused "online and to our faces that we were either paid or manipulated by developers and lobbyists, simply because we are active and caring about our community's future."

It is true, however, that density has a coalition of advocates who are seeking to adhere to the city's Climate Action Plan and make the most of the \$2 billion dollar trolley investment. "It's not every day you see the Labor Council, the

Chamber of Commerce, Climate Action Committee and the Housing Federation all speaking together on an issue," said Jessie O'Sullivan, with Circulate San Diego. Earlier in the process, he said, the density goal was going to be higher, but opposition over the course of the discussion draft

has caused it to shrink. "The city has been whittling down the number of homes allowed in the newly proposed scenarios," he continued. And that doesn't help affordability: a single family home in University City costs about \$1.5 million.

O'Sullivan pointed to a new apartment building, where a twobedroom costs \$4000 a month — market rate. Expensive, he granted, but by splitting rent, it could be affordable for someone earning San Diego's median income of about \$75,000. "We need to recognize that those market rate apartments are middle-class housing for my generation."

Melanie Cone, speaking for Biocom California, said she was one of the few members of the plan update subcommittee who was representing

the university, with its many life sciences employees. "We want to make sure our employees don't have to live in Temecula or Fallbrook and commute into the city every day," she said.

Those against the proposed density increase say the city is already built out — bursting at the seams, yet being tasked with taking on as much as 30 percent of the city's housing. "The density proposed in the discussion draft is still too high," said University City resident Linda Beresford. The plan would more than double the population, she said. "But the city has no guarantee it can or will build any of the proposed infrastructure." She also objected to the video shown by Lin, saying the clips weren't representative of the "hours of meetings" — and "certainly not the most recent meetings."

At a meeting in March 2022, Beresford said that allowing "transient UCSD students to have as much say as people who have invested here is not a true representation of resident desires." SHEILA PELL

MISSION HILLS Social media smackdown A different sort of Lucha Libre match-up

A recent verbal altercation at a local Lucha Libre-inspired restaurant in Mission Hills

was the real deal, and not the professional wrestling skit many onlookers thought it was. In a viral TikTok video taken at the popular Lucha Libre taco shop and posted by user brendapenda783 on May 7, a female customer can be heard yelling, "Ma'am, give me my receipt, you f***ing bitch. You f**king c**t." According to brendapenda783 account owner Brenda, who was the reluctant cashier *continued on page 3*



in the video, the irate customer ordered six Mexican dishes online, ate half the order, returned to the taco shop with the food, and demanded a \$73 refund.

It's unclear if Brenda's co-worker, who filmed the footage from behind a drink dispenser, presents the whole spat or edits some parts out. "I want my receipt," the customer yells several times as Brenda and the coworker tell her to please leave the restaurant. pulled down the viral posts. For its part, the restaurant commented, "No employee should ever have to face an attack or any form of disrespect, particularly when they are dedicated to providing excellent service. Please be assured that we are taking this matter seriously while maintaining the spirit of our beloved taco shop."

In the comments on social media, most viewers sided with Brenda, but the customer also had a few backers, many of whom asked, "Why didn't Brenda just hand over a receipt?" In a followup post on TikTok, Brenda explained, "That's not even her receipt; that's the ticket order we

In the original video, Brenda asks the woman to leave again, and the customer says, "Not until I get my receipt." Brenda then looks at the "receipt," and the customer reaches over the counter and attempts to grab it from Brenda's hand. From the camera's vantage point, it's difficult to see if the customer touches Brenda. But as the customer's hands move towards Brenda's chest area, Brenda smacks them away and then yells, "Don't do that f**king shit to me, bitch! Get out! Don't touch me!" After another heated exchange, the customer leaves.

The alleged name of the customer was posted online, but finding an active account to verify her identity was challenging. Many people online said the customer deleted or pulled all her social media accounts. As for Brenda, her accounts are still active, but she received in our printer, and we tape it on top of the order. This was an online order she placed on our website that only gives you text/email receipts, so she already had it." This prompted commenter Lovegoodsxv on TikTok to wonder, "Why don't old people ever want to look at online receipts? Many places email them or sen[d] them through text; they don't even have print machines."

Over on Instagram, commenter Christoper wrote, "The husband's side that the restaurant clearly isn't telling: 'One of their workers overcharged my wife and used her credit card to make purchases. When she asked for the receipt, the worker refused and started taunting her. They filmed her when she became enraged and posted it on social media to make her look bad. She lost her cool, but it was only because she was provoked."

UNDER THE RADAR

Sara's care package It was off to Kenya for a week starting April 8 for House Democrat **Sara Jacobs**, who hasn't been wasting any time catching up with her predecessor **Susan Davis** in the free road trip category. Cooperation for Assistance and Relief Everywhere (CARE), Save the Children Action Network, and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation anted up \$9509.35 for Jacobs' travel, plus \$1250 worth of lodging, \$417.49 in meals, and \$741.62 to cover miscellaneous costs,

including those of interpreters, security, airport services, travel insurance, and a medic, according to her May 9 filing with the Clerk of the House disclosing her excursion to Nairobi, Kenya and Burao, Somalia. She was part of a party of six House members. "This trip will inform my work as a member of the [House Foreign Affairs Commission]," says the congresswoman's filing. "Flights within Africa will

be by chartered plane to expedite travel, avoid long drives over difficult roads, and maximize time spent at program sites." Guests on the free ride were put up at the posh Villa Rosa Kempinski Nairobi, which describes itself online as a "luxury five-star hotel," touting "a rich culinary experience accentuated with Italian classics, Arabian flavors, and international cuisine," and Somalia's five-star Hotel Mansoor. Between gourmet meals, Jacobs and House colleagues embarked on a tour featuring "the successes and the challenges of [the] hunger crisis in Kenya and Somalia."

A letter to Jacobs from CARE and Save the Children Action Network, which bills

itself as "the political advocacy arm of Save the Children," adds, "Somalia currently teeters on the brink of famine. The record-breaking drought, compounded by the Ukraine conflict, has affected half the population, and the United Nations predicts Somaliland could suffer its worst famine in half a century without urgent intervention. Kenya also sits on the front lines of the hunger crisis, experiencing both

chronic food insecurity and acute humanitarian need. More than a quarter of young children in Kenya are stunted, an indication that they have had too little to eat over a long period of time."

Known as SCAN for short, Save the Children Action Network was started by **Mark Shriver**, son of **Eunice Kennedy Shriver** and **Sargent Shriver**, according to a January 2016 profile by *The Hill*. The group also lobbies regarding border issues, as exemplified by a March 20 *Washington Post* letter by SCAN executive director **Christy Gleason**, panning the Border Patrol's newly released mobile phone application. "The U.S. government is again causing family separations, this time because of the improper rollout of this app, causing children and families to become victims of extortion and abuse." Gleason also attacked the December 2023 Supreme Court ruling to uphold so-called Title 42 expulsions of migrants. "We condemn this ruling, which

> is a disingenuous affront to our nation's legal and moral responsibility to provide asylum protections to those seeking refuge within our borders," said her December 28 statement. "Seeking asylum is a basic human right, and many of the children and families looking to exercise this right are fleeing unimaginable violence and disasters in their home countries. Yet, Title 42

has denied them their right to safety for nearly three years." According to *OpenSecrets.org*, Save the Children and its SCAN affiliate spent a total of \$230,000 in lobbying expenses last year, and employees came up with \$13,057 for the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee.

Soon-Shiong's U-T bell unrung As advertisers continue to flee the *San Diego Union-Tribune*, keeping it on track to go online-only when the lease runs out at the paper's Los Angeles printing plant at the end of this year, *U-T* owner **Patrick Soon-Shiong** has run into big trouble in the biotech industry that made him a billion-

> aire in the first place. "Soon-Shiong sold Abraxis Bioscience to Celgene back in 2010, but since then he can't catch a break," reports Wall Street website *Evaluate Vantage*. "His latest venture, ImmunityBio the rebranded Nantkwest with a reduced focus on NK cell therapies — just fell flat, failing to get the IL-15 superagonist Anktiva approved for BCG-unresponsive non-muscle invasive bladder cancer."

Adds the May 11 post: "The FDA's complete response letter, citing manufacturing deficiencies and CMC problems, came two days ago, but ImmunityBio only slipped the news out today via an SEC filing, causing its stock to plummet 56%. Even after the fall, ImmunityBio carries a \$1.2 [billion] market cap -- remarkable considering its dire financial situation. ImmunitBbio has so far burned through \$2.5 [billion] of investor funds, *continued on page 4*

and carries \$91 [million] of cash against \$717 [million] in debt — \$471 [million] falling due in the next year — owed to entities controlled by Soon-Shiong, its chairman and main shareholder. Anktiva's failure comes amid growing interest in pre-metastatic bladder cancer, where Ferring's Adstiladrin saw a surprise U.S. approval in December."

Although ImmunityBio is headquartered in San Diego, the U-T failed to report the company's setback. The stock's plunge has already enticed a New York law firm to announce an "investigation" of Immunity-Bio's management. "Bronstein, Gewirtz & Grossman, LLC represents investors in securities fraud class actions and shareholder derivative suits. The firm has recovered hundreds of millions of dollars for investors nationwide," says a May 11 news release.

UNREAL ESTATE

As regular readers already know, we look at some pretty nice houses here at *Unreal*. But if you're wealthy enough to be looking at homes in one of the country's most expensive communities, property that could be described accurately with as simple a term as "a house" might seem a bit pedestrian.

"Experience a sprawling Mediterranean estate situated across 4.71 acres in coveted Rancho Santa Fe!" opens the Zillow pitch for 6314 El Apajo. "Estate"

isn't bad, but really, the place is best described as a housing complex designed for use by just one family. There are nearly 22,000 square feet of indoor living space spread across four different buildings, along with another 4000 feet of covered patios and passageways. That's more than a half acre of space, just under a roof! Let's take a look, shall we?

We open with an aerial shot of the grounds, and "sprawling" is absolutely the right word for this property. There's what looks to be a guard shack leading into a turnaround in the center of a compound that is flanked by multiple structures, along with a separate gated drive that leads to the back, where garages provide housing for up to eight cars. There's also a palmlined pool in the background, which I assume we're going to get to soon.

"A private gated entry leads to your own Tuscan villa through a circular drive with a serene fountain surrounded by four separate stone & vine covered structures with lush greenery," is how the listing remarks put it, not inaccurately. But before we get to the "meticulous attention to detail with a grand foyer, rustic stone tile, exposed wood beams, archways, soaring ceilings, abundant natural light with

expansive windows & skylights, imposing fireplaces, and high-end fixtures & finishes throughout," we're detouring immediately to the pool. It's certainly a pretty picture of the backyard — shot at twilight and heavily touched up - with a purple sky, green lagoon water, and light shining through at least a dozen doors and windows that look out onto the scene. There's "beach entry [and a] cascading waterfall with a backdrop of boulders, palms, and verdant landscaping," which appears to consist of copious amounts of carefully manicured grass.

Back in front, we pass through the entry tower to the main courtyard. The brick drive and fountain are pleasant enough, but what I really appreciate is the bold move of letting *continued on page 13*

Pickleball For all

Has there ever been another sport like this?

As I recall, it was around the middle of the last decade when I first encountered pickleball. My friend Andy Cox and I were nearing the end of a game of tennis at Collier Park in La Mesa when I noticed a group of people waiting for us to leave the court. When we did, the group started in setting up smaller, portable nets, dividing our single court into several. As Andy and I lingered in conversation near our cars, the group began playing doubles games that seemed straight out of the mind of highly imaginative gym teacher — a sort of compact tennis, played with paddles instead of rackets and what looked like a whiffle ball. Andy immediately identified it as pickleball. I'd never heard of it, but he said the word was that it was the fastest-growing sport in the country. Come to think of it, around the middle of the last decade is when the Astiz Tennis Ranch in Spring Valley ceased operations. Their website hasn't been updated since 2013, and their Twitter account boasts only two tweets, one of which, posted in 2010, reads "ASTIZ TENNIS RANCH is in Twitter!" One of the things you usually read in stories about pickleball is how its adherents are often in conflict with tennis players — hardly surprising, given their common playing surface. So it seemed somehow significant when, earlier this year, I was driving west on the 94, looked off to my right, and noticed that Aztiz Tennis Ranch was now The Hub, a 100% pickleball facility with, according to their website, "26 Dedicated Pickleball Courts, Pro Shop, Restaurant, World Class Instructors and MORE!" No competition with tennis players here, just total victory.

In early March, I spent an hour or so sitting on a tree stump at La Mesa's Highwood Park, soaking in the action on the tennis - sorry, pickleball - courts below in an effort to figure out the game and its appeal. There were four courts, and all were active with doubles games. I counted five other players sitting off to the side in lawn chairs, waiting for their turn to play. Most of the players were men, and most appeared to be over 50. I learned that the crowd fit with the sport's history - until recently, it's been dominated by the seniors, 55 and over - but not its present. This year, the 18-34 crowd has become the largest demographic. of players. Has there ever been another sport that owes its early success to retirees and then gets accepted and adopted by younger players? You don't see the kids lining up for shuffleboard. Maybe bocce.

The courts were stacked north to south, with the best gameplay happening on the two northernmost courts. It was pretty simple to figure out who was winning points, but the scoring system was mysterious, with the servers calling out three different numbers, e.g. "2-5-2." Not very tennis. Also not very tennis: one player beaning another in the shin with an overhead slam. But Jim Gahen, a 60-year-old who is part of the group that's been playing at the park for about four years, says such beaning is just part of the game. "It's engaging when we hit each

other with the ball," he explains. "We try to, because it's just part of the fun of it. I'm gonna aim for your right shoulder and your right hip."

Gahen discovered the sport in March 2019 while on a business trip in St. Louis. The people he was staying with invited him to try a new sport they had just discovered. "It was so much fun to have that much fun that quick," he says. "I had played tennis when I was in high school, so I had a little bit of hand-eyeball coordination. Later, I played softball and even racquetball, but this was so much easier — and it was fun. I fell in love with it immediately." He was so hooked that within a month, he became a regular fixture at the La Mesa pickleball group meetups — at that time, held at Collier Park. It took him about a year to develop the skills to move from Collier's beginner courts to competing with the advanced players. Eventually, he even became an instructor.

"Here's the thing," says Gahen, "I love to teach. My mission as a man is to empower, motivate, and inspire others by sharing my love and experience to create a world where people love life and dreams come true. I have been doing success coaching for the past 26 years. My wife was a collegiate swim coach, so she took me into the swimming world. I don't know how to swim, but I've worked with gold medalists and Olympians in helping them do their best. As I was learning pickleball, so many other people were kind and gracious, and they were patient with me. All I wanted to do was smash and win, and they would be kind and gentle and guide me. I found it really easy to give back to people on the pick-





leball court. Then I got an email from the athletic director at the Kroc Center saying they were looking for a pickleball instructor. I joined one of the local organizations, enrolled in the pickleball instructor class, said, 'Count me in,' and she hired me."

In late March, I observed two hours' worth of Gahen's life mission at the Kroc. His skills as both instructor and motivator were on full display. He came across as a wiry ball of energy as he guided a group of older women through basic pickleball skills such as volleying, defending against slams, and working on a surprisingly difficult aspect of the game — the lob. Around the same time, I started to see him around Highwood Park as I dipped my toes into actual gameplay with the La Mesa pickleball crew. At first, I was directed to the beginner/social courts; there, I would learn the basic logistics of the game, just as Gahen had. I had experience in both tennis and ping-pong, so I felt fairly confident that I wouldn't entirely embarrass myself. I was only

partially right.

My initial days of playing offered some bright spots, mostly involving decent power shots, but more of my time was spent hitting serves into the net or outside the box, being generally confused by the score and flow of the game, miscalculating shots, and letting my partners down. I thought I would have an advantage, since I was usually at least a decade younger than most of my opponents. But I quickly learned that my late-40s "youth" was no match for senior shot placement.

"Placement over power is really what I have come to learn," Gahen explained, "and it's also what I teach. I teach intermediate students, and I'm like, 'It's not about being able to hit the ball hard. It's being able to put the ball where you want, or to put the ball where your opponent is not.' It's an easy sport to learn. It's difficult to master. I think that is part of what makes it so attractive." (In my case, it's likely a coin toss as to whether the easy to learn/difficult to master aspect of pickleball outdid the joy of competition. Progressing skill-wise in any activity is always satisfying, but the rush of notching wins is often tough to beat.)

Lindsey Alper, a psychologist who is part of the La Mesa pickleball group, plays about six times a week - sometimes, two sessions in a single day. She offers has an interesting take on what makes the sport so appealing to people over 60: "When I was a kid, I would go outside and play all day with my friends and neighbors. As adults, we don't do that anymore, and pickleball feels about as close to that as any sport I can think of. It's fun. People laugh a lot. You meet people and, if you play at a place like Collier, most of the people are kind of your neighbors that live in the community. It's the closest thing to playing like a kid and just having fun."

I found I agreed: it *was* fun. But it wasn't *just* fun.

After I had been going to Highwood for a couple of weeks, I got really, really into pickleball. I progressed from playing occasional games to watching tutorials and competition footage on YouTube, researching and purchasing my own paddles, and even considering the addition of lead tape to the side of said paddles to increase their weight, control and power potential. And as I played more at Highwood, I started looking for opponents who would really challenge me. Psychologist Alper explains the phenomenon: "You end up gravitating toward the people who are at your level, or ideally, a little better than you are, so you can get good competitive games going. Then you find groups that you like and enjoy playing with, because they are fairly even, competitive games."

That competitive quality is evident, and at times quite surprising, given Gahen's comments about gentleness and the age of the players. When I first heard about pickleball gaining popularity with seniors, I envisioned something like a book club, where gatherings would devolve into socializing and gossip. But all the older players I observed - at all skill levels - were playing to win. A handful even overexerted themselves to the point of injury — remarkable when you consider that part of pickleball's appeal is that it offers physical activity that isn't quite as rough on the body as tennis, while still providing a chance to compete.

Deanna McDonald works at the front desk at The Hub, and instructs there as well. She started playing pickleball in 2018; before that, she had a long history of playing volleyball and racquetball. But once she picked up a paddle, pickleball soon became her primary sport. "When I first started, I would only go maybe once a week, because I was still playing racquetball and volleyball," she says. "Eventually, I started going two days a week, and then I was going three days a week, and then I wasn't playing racquetball anymore. Then my pickleball friends were like, 'Don't go to volleyball. You don't need to go to vol-

She grants the appeal of pickleball friends: "You can exert yourself as much as you want to and still have fun, and it's social. And the social aspect is one thing that, across the board, everybody enjoys. That's why doubles, I think, is so much more fun than singles."

But again, it's not a book club. "It's the ageold question of, 'What makes pickleball so addictive?' It is literally an addiction. I don't know if you've ever golfed, but people say you have a good day and a bad day, and they can never quite grasp it and perfect it. I think that's how pickleball is. There's always something to work on. 'I just need to work on my dink,' or 'I just need to get better at my drop shot.' And there are so many creative things you can do with the game, so many different strategies and skills you can keep trying to master."

Eventually, my own skills improved to the point where I was confident enough to start exploring other courts. Among the Highland crowd, Big Rock in Santee seemed to be mentioned most often, so I decided to head there first. The park is located south of Mission Gorge Road near the Big Rock Trail trailhead on the north side of Cowles Mountain. It features eight permanent pickleball courts, none of which are tennis/pickleball hybrid courts. The area is pretty exposed to the sun, so mid-afternoon play during peakheat days in Santee would likely require roughly a keg of Gatorade to endure. But on my first visit, the weather was simply pleasant, and I was able to enjoy some doubles games with three other randoms who were also looking for some competition. About those randoms: it's worth mentioning that at every spot I played, I joined games with total strangers. Most facilities have "open play," which means you can put your paddle in line and wait for a game. The players I encountered generally seemed very inviting to novices like myself, and even were willing to deal patiently with newbies who had challenges grasping the general flow of the game and its rules.

My friend Andy and I had played tennis at La Mesita Park (near Fletcher Parkway and the 125), so I invited him there for an evening session of pickleball. La Mesita now has eight pickleball courts, all of which were active with doubles games when we visited. The court we played on had both pickleball lines and tennis lines, not to mention a noticeable dip on the south side that complicated play. (Not all courts are perfect; Highwood has cracks on a couple of its courts that are severe enough to alter the ball's trajectory.) But even with the slope, Andy and I still had some fun doubles games with Michael and Mary, a duo who were also new to the sport. Andy had recently battered me during a marathon run of singles games at Highwood (on just his second day playing), but I had to walk him through the logistics of doubles as we played. He still played great.

Coming from tennis, I was surprised to see

how much more dominant doubles play was, compared to singles. Once you get inside the game, though, it makes a bit more sense. The court is smaller, but the ball has far less bounce than a tennis ball, and you have to run a ton when you are playing a skilled player in singles. Andy broke it down like this: "Doubles is more like big ping-pong, and singles is more like small tennis." That seems pretty accurate, especially when you watch expert doubles players bashing the ball back and forth in close proximity just outside the "kitchen" (the no-volley zone) near the net.

As we were leaving, Andy pointed out how the side of the park with two tennis courts was completely empty, while the side with the pickleball courts was packed with approximately 45 players. You can see why tennis court conversions are happening — the pickleball numbers don't lie. And the crowd at La Mesita was the youngest I had seen in my researching/playing so far. The average age seemed to be mid-30s, and it might have been even lower.

Jim Gahen says that at the Kroc, he's starting to get people showing up for lessons who are in their fifties, and even a couple in their forties. So, while his clientele is still very much on the older end of the pickleball spectrum, even he is seeing a drop in the average age — though only so much. He noted that many of the other staff members at the Kroc are in their twenties, and when he asked one if he had tried pickleball, the staffer said jokingly, "No, I'm too young."

"I think the sport's average age is getting younger and younger," adds Lindsey Alper. "Somewhere, I heard the average age is 37 now, but I would say at your typical pickleball, you're gonna have at least half of the people over 50. Probably 60-70%. But if you go to retirement communities or Florida — places where it's sunny like Palm Springs — you are going to find the average age is much higher. Because that's where people go to retire."

The final stop of my tour-de-courts (at least the ones where I would actually compete) was Chula Vista. This place was a full-on scene. I arrived one evening to find eight packed courts, several with four or more players waiting. It was a younger crowd, with some serious skills on display. Lots of power hitters with youthful legs that could propel them to get to a ball that might seem unreachable to us middle-aged players. Undaunted, I hopped onto a court with some locals, who proved to be great hosts, and enjoyed several games with them. My only gripe, and it's a small one, was that there were more "ball on court" stoppages there than at any other place I played. Maybe it was just that all those pickleballs were flying all over the place on that particular night. Regardless, it's an excellent venue, with the bonus of great competition if you're a skilled player.

play when I attended the tourney's final day, and I was not disappointed. One highlight included a successful "around the post" (ATP) shot. An ATP occurs when a player catches up to a ball that has bounced inbounds on their side of the court but has then veered out of bounds, forcing the player to hit it around the net post and back onto the opponents' court without it travelling over the net. So far, every time I had seen a player pull off this shot in clips online, it turned out to be a winner. This was the first ATP I had ever even witnessed in person, but it was actually returned by the opposition, which made the point even more impressive.

Judging by the some of the top-tier matchups I caught, it seems that at that level, the hits are more powerful. Also the players are faster (and younger). But they still maintain the soft touch and speedy reaction times that are so vital to gameplay near the kitchen area of the court. I was so blown away by some of the rallies that I decided to check out tournament footage from 10 years ago, just to see how far the game had progressed. I found the USAPA Nationals V Gold Medal matches for open women's and open men's doubles from 2013. Both looked like what I would call very mid-tier, local rec center-level games by today's standards. The pace was more sluggish, power shots were nearly non-existent, and mishits were far more common. Judging by this footage, modern pickleball at elite levels is, at the very least, much more entertaining to watch. (It's also worth noting that Lindsey Alper and her partner, James Merrill, snagged a silver medal in their mixed-doubles division. La Mesa pickleball represent!)

In late April, I was knocking out a little pre-game stretching near the courts at Highwood when I heard the players start to sing happy birthday to Roy Ahrensberg, who had just entered the courts. It was Roy's 97th birthday. He's a bit of a legend with this crew, and he still has game, even as he pushes closer to the century mark. You try not to dink (drop shot) on him while playing him, because his years of sprinting toward the net are behind him. But if a ball lands in his vicinity, he can still hit back a smart, calculated shot with ease.

Jim Gahen explains how Roy has managed to stay such a great player all these years: "In pickleball, you have to be able to serve, because if you can't serve, you can't score. The serve is a controlled environment. You have the ball, you have the paddle, you get to set your stance - you just have to stand behind the baseline. You can drop it and let it bounce, or you can hit it out of the air, whichever one you prefer. You've got to be able to serve, and Roy can serve fantastically. He has a number of different serves, and occasionally, he can still pull off an ace — because nobody expects this old boy to send the ball that fast. Also, you have to be able to hit the ball wherever you are. Let's face it, the court, when you play doubles, we're talking about only 22 feet from baseline to net on our side. So, 15 of that is the receiving area and seven of that is the kitchen. So, you need to get from the baseline 15 feet up. It's four steps for some people, five for others, depending on how big of a step you take. Once Roy gets up there, he can defend his area very well and every once in a while, out of nowhere, he will hit that shot where you are not and still get the point."

creeping vines grow up pretty much all over the exterior walls of the buildings. The entry fover displays all of the features we were promised earlier, and the marble fireplace in the living room situated off to one side is indeed imposing. But what's most interesting are the arched passageways from room to room, as it seems that different types of stone have been used to line each.

The open kitchen has perhaps the most breakfast bar seating of any house I can remember writing about to date, along with a dining table that seats eight (it's the second dining area we've seen so far). The stone tile and stained cabinetry contrast nicely with the deep color of the exposed ceiling beams, allowing me a welcome break from complaining about the gray-and-white sterility of so many modern mansions. Before leaving this section of the house, we also get a peek at a brick-ceilinged wine room with more bottles on display than I'm going to try to count.

The "palatial" primary suite features a bedroom that occupies more than 600 square feet just by itself, along with his-and-hers bathrooms, a sitting area, and an "intricately-crafted closet" lined in wood and filled with more outfits and pairs of shoes than I have cumulatively owned over the course of four decades of life. The rich not only have more money, they have more stuff.

A wood-paneled study features another massive fireplace, plus beautiful built-in shelving stretching nearly to the raised coffered ceiling. The gray floor feels a little out of place with all this wood, but it does something to lighten up the otherwise dark space, so I'm not going to gripe.

Our tour picks up pace from here, quickly rushing us through a handful of bedrooms and baths, a billiards room, a home theater (that reportedly occupies a whole building of the compound by itself), a gym "with threebed carriage house," and a separate two-bedroom guest house.

Public records list a Dykmans Family Trust as the current owner of the El Apajo estate; it was last sold for just over \$8 million back in 2012. After an aborted attempt to sell in 2020, the most recent listing went live in late April with an asking price of \$16,980,000 that remains unchanged to date.

Land Bird Migration is in Full Swing next month in San Diego County, with warblers and fly catchers among those most commonly seen. Warblers crawl along tree limbs and branches to dine on their favorite insects, while fly catchers, as the name suggests, catch their meals on the wing. Riparian areas such as the San Diego River through Mission Gorge and Marian Bear Memorial Park in San Clemente Canyon are favored by both birds and birdwatchers.

This is usually triggered by a "Catalina eddy," in which moist marine air drawn inland from the area around Santa Catalina Island forms low clouds over a wide area. In the absence of Catalina eddy conditions, San Diego's inland areas, at least, experience plenty of midday and afternoon sunshine.

Spring Wildflowers May Have Largely Dried Up in most areas of San Diego County, but in the cooler coastal enclaves such as Cabrillo National Monument and Torrey Pines State Reserve, several kinds remain. Look for paintbrush, purple nightshade, coreopsis, sea fig, popcorn flower, and red monkey flower, among others.

Enjoy the Increasing Daylight! By the end of May, we'll have over 14 hours between sunrise and sunset! The days will continue to get longer until the summer solstice on June 21.

Lost in Yonkers

If you're a regular at Scripps Ranch Theatre, you might be wondering what exactly they were up to when they decided to follow Charlayne Woodard's *Neat* with Neil Simon's *Lost in Yonkers*. *Yonkers* is worlds funnier than Neat, and its actors are both game and good (those boys!), but there's a complication at its heart, and the similarities are too strong to avoid comparison.

A refresher: Woodard's play is a memoir of her family's life with her aunt Neat, brain-damaged and so possessed of a childlike innocence — for good and ill. Simon's play recounts the Kurnitz family's life with Bella,

who was nearly sent to "The Home" because, as the doctors put it, she would always be a child. There are plenty of other characters - and yeah. they're characters, including a gangster uncle, a quietly monstrous matriarch, and a couple of teenage brothers who serve as our ticket into the story - but it's Bella who drives the drama. And while she is portraved with appealing. wide-eved, just-shy-of-manic energy by Katee Drysdale, her dialogue is not that of a child, or even a childlike adult. Not the way Neat's was. It's too smart and too good, laced with too much understanding - of herself and oth- $\operatorname{ers}-\operatorname{and}$ brimming with too much grownup compassion.

Maybe that's what Simon was thinking, that any grownup who can actually say what they feel, tell the ugly truth with loving honesty, and not choke on the pain and bitterness brought on by their own suffering, must be a bit touched. And that such a soul would be the only one who could ever step outside the crushing force of generational dysfunction, the sort wrought by Grandma Kurnitz, whose foot was crushed by anti-semites in Germany, whose husband and two of her six children die shortly after she makes it to America, who has no more love to give but must still raise a family.

Anyway, it was enough to win Simon a Pulitzer in 1991, SRT mounts a fine production, and the juxtaposition is fruitful.

Fast X — The 10th installment of the auto-action-adventure franchise opens strong, flashing back to the credulity-straining but undeniably thrilling "dragged vault" scene from Fast Five, but telling it from the bad guys' perspective and prefacing it with a speech about how there is nothing a father wouldn't do for his son Wait. bad guys love their families too? But if family is ultimately all that matters. then how do we tell the good guys from the bad guys here? But then it slows down for those struggling to catch up, and gives us a speech from Abuelita about how Vin Diesel's Dom Toretto has created a legacy that will go on for generations, that no one can take away, not now, not ever. Foreshadowing! And then it slips up and gets meta. via a snarky speech from a new Mr. Big, who laments that Dom's "family" is like a cult that recruits devotees via barbecues and beer, and that "if it violates the laws of God and gravity, they did it — twice." Oof. There are a lot of thudding lines here, some of them delivered by unlikely suspects - Hellen Mirren grumping to Dom, "It ain't no Roman Holiday, and you're no Gregory Peck" - and some of them by very likely suspects - Dom asking his wife how she just keeps getting more beautiful, and assuring us that with faith, "nothing is impossible." And now that the film has gotten selfconscious, they thud all the harder. Set against all Dom's preening regularguy decency is the preening irregularfellow indecency of Jason Momoa's villain. See, Dom took away his daddy. and now he's not just evil and vengeful, he's flamboyantly, fabulously so, even going so far as to give pedicures to the corpses of his victims and to swoon that Dom is a "big brute." But villain or no, he's still got faith on his mind, assuring Dom that "to become a real saint, you have to perform miracles or die a martyr." He's got a plan to ensure the latter - after he's done trashing the aforementioned legacy - but of course, as long as there's something he can drive, Dom is up for the former. That's the central dynamic, but there is so, so much else going on. So much, in fact, that nothing much gets resolved here (though somebody does die). You'll have to come back for the next installment to find out what happens with Dom, his wife, his kid, and the rest of the crew, plus Charlize Theron, Jason Statham, Brie Larson... It's overlong and over-the-top, but the real trouble is that when a series like this acknowledges its own absurdities, they become harder to enjoy. 2023 - M.L. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

The Little Mermaid - Plot: a teenage girl develops an obsession with the group of people who murdered her mother, to the point where she falls in love with one of them after seeing him be kind to his dog. Behold the danger of improving your source material by adding backstories. The girl's father hates those people for what they did, but it's not like Mom was his one true one: to judge by his family reunions, he's got six other daughters with six other mothers. Behold the danger of improving your source material by adding diversity for its own sake. The teenager's beloved is a good bit older, but not terribly mature: he's so addled by FOMO that he's terrified of his island kingdom getting left behind in isolation, despite that island's marketplace boasting a wildly multicultural array of people and products. Behold the danger of improving your source material by adding motivations from your studio's last hit about an island people. (The wanderlust didn't make much sense in Moana, either, since there was no need to go exploring once the sea blight had been cured, but never mind.) Once she gains access to her beloved's world, our Little Mermaid sees a painting of fish on hooks. wonders if her kind are "only food for

slaughter," then rhymes that with, "But you were lonely underwater!" Behold the danger of improving your source material with new music. Her goal is to get her beloved to give her the kiss of true love without ever saying a word, but in order to dodge any possible criticism about such an arrangement, she is bewitched into forgetting her goal. Some may find this a satisfactory solution, others may say the dramatic takeback just points to the danger of trying to make a rom-com out of a fairy tale. But really, all this is quibbling: the real problem here is that the film looks and sounds terrible, at least in the screening I attended. The sunlight under the sea is less dim and watery than the sunlight above. The sound under the sea is weirdly echo-y. The famous wave crash behind Ariel as she hits her big note cuts to a shot of calm waters. Her hair switches from free-flowing strands to thick dreadlocks, depending on whether or not the underwater CG animators are working on it. Underwater book pages rustle. The list goes on, overwhelming star Halley Bailey's winning performance. Part of that world of lazy remakes, alas. At least Sebastian is still fun. (2023) - M.L. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Master Gardener — Paul Schrader's 2017 film First Reformed gave us a solitary man who is keeping a journal, who deals with an intense and intimate crisis before learning that the real enemy is larger, more powerful, and less personal, and who just might find salvation via a compassionate woman. Then, 2021's The Card Counter gave us a solitary man with a violent past, who deals with an intense and intimate crisis, before learning that the real enemy is larger, more powerful, and less personal, and who just might find salvation via a compassionate woman. And here? Here we have a solitary man with a violent past who is keeping a journal. The pleasure is not in the innovation, but in the variation. This time, Joel Edgerton takes up the mask of composure and control, even as he lectures us about wild gardens that only appear to be wild, but still grow according to plan. That's not the sort of garden he's growing, however: his employer (Sigourney Weaver, imperious) likes things more regulated. She's eager to discuss the upcoming charity event at her grand estate, but first there is the matter of her grandniece (Quintessa Swindell, luminous), a young woman from a troubled back ground who needs a break. She's of

mixed racial heritage, but that's not a problem for our gardener, despite what his severe haircut, black sweater, and knee-high boots might suggest. He's more concerned with her drug use, and the unpleasant people from whom she gets them. The film is as careful and restrained and handsome as Edgerton's character, and as rigidly structured as the garden he tends. But of course, that does not mean it is without feeling; plenty of blooms thrive on severity. Its only misstep may be its overly sweet portrait of a damaged addict - but then, it's not the girl's story. And while she may be our man's salvation, she's no vessel of cheap grace: their quiet confrontation in the dark is one of the most affecting scenes in recent memory. Schrader loathes violence, but he understands it, which is what makes the film's concluding monologue — about a garden's embodiment of what should be, a manipulation of nature achieved through subtle adjustment - so profoundly hopeful. The Great — It's a period piece in every way except the script, which is spliced with modern mannerisms. Set in 18th century Russia, it follows the rise of Catherine the Great — I cannot attest to its historical accuracy, only that the genre bending approach really works here. The juxtaposition of people in powdered wigs casually cursing is pretty funny. Seeing a full-dressed royal court shout "huzah" just tickles me. Season 3 is underway, definitely give the series a shot if you haven't seen it yet. (2020-2023) — A.T. (Hulu)

Fatal Attraction — If you liked the movie, you'll probably like the show. It even pays homage to the original and that's respect. If you haven't seen Fatal Attraction, you've likely seen some rendition of it — the crazed, jealous mistress who comes back to haunt the cheating husband. It's obviously been done before but I'm still enjoying the new series, in part because they threw in a touch of mystery. It's also nice to have an 'erotic thriller' on the roster, something that's less draining to watch than a drama. (2023) — A.T. (Paramount+)

Boy genius on the

bass The upright bass is in some ways the most essential instrument in a jazz ensemble. The trouble is that there just aren't enough bass players to go around, and the really good ones end up working all the time in a myriad of difworking pro Rob Thorsen, and playing on a weekly basis with his brother in the Young Lions Unity Ensemble.

Hobson says he enjoys the music the ensemble creates. "I just love jazz so much, and basslines. Making music with my brother is important. We

ferent ensembles. One culprit: when school budgets for band and orchestra classes were decimated in the 1980s, an important pipeline for young bass players suffered.

So it's can feel like something of a miracle to see things opening up again through programs like Gilbert Castellanos' Young Lions Jazz Conservatory, which has nurtured a handful of young bassists - including young Ned Hobson, a polymath 11-year-old multi-instrumentalist from a musical family. (His dad Chris is a prolific recording engineer and pianist, and his older brother Henry plays a mean trombone.) "I've been playing music for seven years, something like that," says Hobson. "I started out on the piano, which I'm taking a break from. Five years ago, I started playing the violin, which I'm still involved with." He became interested in the bass after seeing John Murray performing with Castellanos less than a year ago. Now he's studying with

have a different connection than anyone else. We can practice at home and make sure we're in sync, and that can help guide the rest of the ensemble." He also enjoys the private lessons from Thorsen. "He interprets the music in a way that other people can't, because we're both bassists, and a lot of things are different. We play walking lines, which is something no one else in the ensemble does. They are all playing melody or chords or rhythmic hits. We have a completely different mindset, because we have to bring everybody together."

Perhaps because of his background on other instruments, Hobson took to the bass pretty easily, although that doesn't mean hard work isn't necessary. "I practice every day. I practice scales, jazz tunes, and of course, walking. Soloing is also a key part of my routine, but walking is very important. I usually practice that with my brother, because his melody instrument and my walking combine for a complete picture. I just want to be the best that I can be. No, make that better than the best I can be. I currently practice a half hour a day on the violin and a half hour on the bass, but I've been trying to increase that so I can get better."

As if splitting time between two different instruments wasn't enough, Hobson is also committed to weekly ballet classes. "I've been interested in ballet for nine years," he says. "I think that one of the main connections that helped me learn jazz was my experience in dance." Another key element in Hobson's routine is carving out listening time. "I like listening to Mozart violin concertos; we have a ton of classical vinyl, and rock vinyl, and quite a few classic jazz records, like Kind of Blue by Miles Davis."

He cites Charles Mingus, Ray Brown, and Paul Chambers as key influences, along with John Murray, from whom he recently took a lesson. All this leaves him few opportunities for doing normal kid stuff, "but I can still find time for video games. I'm basically a lazy person, so I don't like the effort I have to put into it. But I'm satisfied with the final product of creating music and dance. It's worth it."

"Ned is an extraordinary young bassist," says Rob Thorsen. "He's got a wonderful feel for the music, a very good sense of rhythm and harmony, and an intuitive approach to music that belies his young age. When Ned performs, you can feel his energy and joy. The future of jazz is in very good hands with him. I think he's a genius."

For his part, Hobson grants that "Tve got a quick brain. I'd say that the main thing with my brain is making connections. I just make very quick connections, especially with math. With math, I've got this whole network of numbers in my head that I can chain together. Things like how 64 and 8 are linked, or 512 and 16. I can see a lot of connections between math and music, and I hear them." — Robert Bush

Non-toxic talk and tunes

Punk nirvana approached at Burning Beard Brewery

"What made you think the world needed another brewery?" I ask Burning Beard Brewery cofounder Mike Maass. He doesn't miss a beat, laughing as he explains the art of brewing, and the environment he and Jeff Wiederkehr had in mind from the inception of their El Cajon operation. What he describes is a place where all toxicity and division gets left at the door. It's a lofty goal, and I'm curious to learn just how close to nirvana (the state of mind, not the band) they get. As I find out, pretty fucking close.

It's the seventh anniversary of the business, and there's plenty to celebrate. Things like surviving the pandemic and working with the San Diego Natural History Museum to honor a locally discovered 38 million-year-old sabretooth tiger with a beer called New Fang, featuring product artwork by Mike Weeks. Weeks also designed the packaging for Fleet Beer, which celebrates the 50th anniversary of the Reuben H. Fleet Science Center and Space Theater. The graphics are striking: an astronaut suit fitted to a skull, an image that kicks off Pink Floyd's "Set the Controls for the Heart of the Sun" in my noggin. But that sound is light years away from

the bands that are playing this afternoon. It's all about punk and energy, featuring Poison Hearts A.C., Quazimofo, The Focke Wolves, and Spider, a band I've been waiting to see for several years.

As promised, the division that reigns in the realms of social media remains outside, while indoors, the exchange of ideas and art springs to life. As I enter the venue, I'm spotted by my wife's friend Barbie Gaulin, who asks me to give her my regards when I get home. She's hanging out with another person I've "met" on social media: Knikki Royster of Wabash Cannons greets me,

and we chat about what the band is up to before she gives me a history lesson about women in the San Diego punk scene. It's a thread that will run through the event: discussions about music from diverse viewpoints.

Sometimes, these meetings-of-like-minds start because of a mutual love for a particular band. Maass' partner and co-founder Jeff Wiederkehr is a fellow member of the KISS Army, and very few things elicit enthusiasm like two people who can recall the exact date they discovered an old favorite. Other times, they begin with pseudo-confrontation. A youngish red-haired woman asks me what my shirt is about. It's a souvenir from the Temptations bio musical *Ain't Too Proud* that she thinks might be a political statement, either pro or con, regarding the conservative group The Proud Boys. Relieved to be told that it's neither, she shares that most of her upcoming wedding playlist, which features loads of Motown, was met with derision by the DJ, who snidely asked her how old she was. I was happy to hear the DJ was subsequently told to "just play the fucking songs."

An obviously drunk man interrupts our conversation, telling me, "Don't even try it." Before I have the chance to wonder if this is the redhead's betrothed, he tells me, "I've been trying to pick up chicks all day, and it doesn't work here." I inform him that I'm happily married and refrain from listing all the probable reasons he's been unsuccessful. As it happens, there's no time for discussion, as his one-man mosh pit soon ends in a spiraling descent to the ground. It's a testament to the environment that he's immediately surrounded by Maass and several patrons, who try to help him up. They also attempt to make sure he's not driving.

The stimulus of the event doesn't wear me down, because the copacetic atmosphere keeps *continued on page 34*

Symphonies searched and sifted

Very few composers have all of their symphonic utterances consistently performed. Of course, Beethoven sits atop the heap, even if his first, second, fourth, and eighth symphonies don't get the adoration received by his third, fifth, sixth, seventh, and ninth. Gustav Mahler also gets all of his symphonies regularly performed

- except for his seventh. Johannes Brahms gets all four of his symphonies performed on the regular... and that about does it. All other composers have half or even fewer of their symphonies performed.

Tchaikovsky's fourth, fifth, and sixth dominate his first, second, and third. Anton Bruckner doesn't get performed very much, but

when he does, it is usually his fourth, seventh, or eighth. With Jean Sibelius, it's one, two, and five. Franz Schubert is eight and nine. Dimitri Shostakovich is five and ten. Antonin Dvorak is seven, eight, and nine. Even Mozart is often limited to 29, 35, 40, and 41.

There must be some good symphonies that we are missing. I decided to go find a few.

Felix Mendelssohn wrote five symphonies, but only his fourth gets consistent attention. His third gets a nod now and then, as does his fifth. Yet his first symphony, written when he was only 15 years old, is a satisfying symphonic sojourn. It opens with all the energy of youth in the first movement before sinking into a sweet melancholy in the second. The third movement is a charming little dance, and

Anton Bruckner's Svmphony No. 3 concludes with what might be the most epic minute-and-a-half of music ever written. The third opens with a nervous string section, while the brass gathers themselves for a massive jump-scare about a minute into the music. The slow movement is not the colossus that appears in the seventh and eighth Symphonies, but it is no slouch. The third movement scherzo has all the energy and drive that we lovers of Bruckner expect, and then it's on to the monstrous final movement.

There's food — an entire cooked pig, whose smiling head persuades me not to eat the pork — and artwork in the hallway that connects to the interior bar. A highlight: I'm able to chat with Toothless George and Tatiana Mac of Poison Hearts A.C. about Ronnie Spector and Darlene Love, and about jazz versus precision basses.

Come showtime, not only does Spider not disappoint, they leave me ecstatic; their live performance gives me a pump of adrenaline that surpasses their recorded offerings. To wrap the event up with one final rush, I get introduced by Barbie to frontman Hector Martinez, and a discussion ensues concerning what makes a perfect record, followed by a mutual recitation of our top five. He leads with The Wall, considered by many to be Pink Floyd's magnum opus, and the mere mention of that band sets my controls for the heart of the sun again. 🔳

Bright Idea

 Éco-activist Rob Greenfield has stopped using toilet paper, and he wants you to, too. People reported on May 4 that Greenfield is touring the country as part of his Grow Your Own Toilet Paper Initiative, introducing people to the blue spur flower plant. The leaves are "soft as can be," he said. "They're durable. I call them the Charmin of the garden." Greenfield sets up a compost toilet in a busy area and gives his spiel: "Hey, did you know you can grow your own toilet paper? I want to show people that another way is possible. We just buy (toilet paper) at the store and we never think twice about it." Each leaf is about the size of a piece of toilet paper, and the plant supplies an abundance of them. They can't be flushed, but they can be thrown in the trash or buried in the yard. Passersby who get sucked in will also hear Greenfield's views on composting human waste rather than using flush toilets.

Field Report

— Nina Jochnowitz was alerted on April 26 by a fellow citizen in Old Bridge, New Jersey, about an odd deposit near a stream, *NJ.com* reported. When Jochnowitz investigated, she found 500 pounds of cooked pasta -- spaghetti, ziti and elbow macaroni -- dumped along a 25-foot-wide area. She posted photos on Facebook, alerted the town administrator and public works department, and two days later, the carb-y mess had been cleaned up. Jochnowitz pointedly remarked that Old Bridge is the only town in the county without bulk garbage pickup. Days later, the mystery of the pasta's origin was solved: A man moving out of his mother's home after her death discovered a stockpile of dry noodles and allegedly dumped them there. A weekend's worth of heavy rains softened the pasta, making it look as if it had been cooked. Old Bridge's mayor declared no harm, no foul, and the few stray noodles left on the ground are the only sign of the great pasta caper.

Recurring Theme

It's happened again. Minnesota state Sen. Calvin Bahr of East Bethel garnered some unwanted attention on May 1 after he cast a vote via Zoom – camera on, lying shirtless in bed with, inexplicably, an "I'm Just a Bill" character from "Schoolhouse Rock!" on the wall behind him. The Associated Press reported that immediately after casting his vote, Bahr switched off his camera.

Family Values

- An unnamed 67-year-old woman in Russia was charged with hiring someone to murder her 48-year-old daughter just so she could inherit the younger woman's Krasnoyarsk apartment, *Oddity Central* reported. The murderous mom told an acquaintance about her plan, and that person said they knew someone who could pull it off. The would-be assassin and the mom met in a park, where she offered about \$1040 for the job. But the hit man went to police, who helped him stage the murder and engaged the help of the victim. On May 3, the hit man contacted the mom and told her he had repeatedly stabbed her daughter with a knife, then provided her daughter's bag as evidence. She then transferred the money to his account, and police swooped in. Her new home won't be the apartment she was hoping for.

Least Competent Criminals

- The BBC reported on May 4 that three burglars broke into a shoe store in Huancayo, Peru, in the middle of the night and made off with 200 shoes. Unfortunately for them, they were all right shoes. Surveillance video captured them using a tricycle to remove the boxed shoes. The shop owner estimated the value at more than \$13,000, although the thieves may have trouble selling the shoes for only one foot. The local police chief was confident that they would be caught.

Suspicions Confirmed

On April 29 in Groningen, the Netherlands, police pulled over a driver who had mowed down a post on a sidewalk, Oddity Central reported. The unnamed 35-year-old man refused a breath test, but he did produce a Ukrainian driver's license with a familiar name and photo: Boris Johnson, the former prime minister of the United Kingdom. The license had Johnson's correct date of birth but had an expiration date of 3000. Apparently, such fake licenses are popular at Ukrainian souvenir shops.

Meanwhile, Across the Pond...

 London has been all abuzz with coronation pomp, and chocolatier Jennifer Lindsey-Clarke wasn't about to be left out, Sky News reported on April 26. She created a life-size bust of King Charles III using about 2900 melted Celebrations chocolates. "The team studied hours of footage of the king to capture his true likeness, and the resemblance is uncanny," said Emily Owen, senior brand manager for Celebrations. The bust weighs about 50 pounds and took four weeks to create. The chocolate king wears the uniform that the actual king wore for his coronation, including epaulettes on the shoulders made of Twix, Milky Way, Galaxy and Bounty confections. The sculpture is on display at Mars Wrigley UK's headquarters in Slough.

Awesome!

- From the too-good-to-pass-up file: photographer Ken Pretty of Dildo, Newfoundland, had the extraordinary luck on April 27 to capture a 30-foot-tall iceberg floating in Conception Bay. (Nearby towns include Spread Eagle and Placentia.) *Live Science* reported that the berg, "a column with a domed head protruding up from two oval rafts of ice," resembled a phallus. "I knew I'd get a lot of comments," Pretty said, "but I didn't expect this much." Sadly, the "dickie berg," as locals named it, didn't last: It collapsed the next day.
