

Capturing the market Vendors exploit migrants, but charities intervene

After the March 11 end of Title 42, which requires asylum seekers to remain in Mexico while their request is assessed, a number of migrants crossed the first of the two existing border walls between Mexico and the United States. Small groups started to gather along the wall, and as the word spread, women, children, and families joined the crowds. Eventually, around 300 people got trapped in between walls by migration agents. The migrants set up an improvised camp while waiting for their cases to be processed, and

started figuring out how to survive with the few belongings they'd carried.

At first, the only way they could get food was to have it delivered. The market was quick to respond, and vendors approached with chicken, pizza, sandwiches, burritos, or other food ready for sale. Then at some point, vendors raised their prices considerably, up to 200 pesos (11 U.S. dollars) above

ships was common among local activists and volunteers. Karen Olvera, a midwife and social worker with a non-profit, handed out formula and dehydration solutions for children, plus blankets, and diapers, and said she was ashamed of how some people were getting profits.

Mondragon said that his organization was "giving two meals for four days, until

they were taken. Mainly, we gave burritos, atol [a traditional hot drink made from corn], coffee, and fruits, daytime and nighttime. We noticed later there were other groups formed by Muslims and Africans which were located in really difficult spots to access. A residential housing area denied us permission to walk through it and hand out meals to the migrants." Casa de la Luz, along with a member of the mosque in Playas de Tijuana, worked to adapt meals for the Muslims.

At one point, several vendors intimidated one of the female volunteers who was giving away dinner, saying that the area could be dangerous that late. But other non-profits like Al Otro Lado showed solidarity, offering food and clothing. Helped by groups of journalists, community kitchen projects, or other non-profits from both the U.S. and Mexico, the migrants stayed warm while they were trapped in between the walls.

City sours on Suites But threat of fine is stopped by state

El Cajon planning commissioners last week voted 4-0 to revoke the "deemed approved" status of a motel where adults had rented rooms for minors, and a teen was found shot in the head. The motel can stay open, but will now have to operate under a conditional use permit, which allows the city to impose stricter conditions.

It all began last December 12, when a mother received a call saying that her daughter had been killed at a motel on East Main Street, south of Madison. That led police on a harrowing search that took them to the El Cajon Inn & Suites, where they found the girl badly injured, but alive. "It was this

tragic event that became the catalyst for where we find ourselves tonight," said Sally Schifman with HWL Planning & Engineering, representing owner Nilesh Patel, who owns three hotels in the city.

The investigation of the crime revealed other violations at the motel, which included a long list of medical and "nuisance" calls for service - 24 during 2022, and 10 through April 30 of this year. El Cajon police Capt. Rob Ransweiler said they discovered several runaway juveniles with illegal firearms, drinking and partying in two of the rooms. The rooms, initially rented by adults, were being paid for by two teens.

Besides the shot teenager, there has been a surge in hotel-related crimes in El Cajon, some involving recipients of the county's hotel voucher program for

the homeless. At the Motel 6 on Montrose Court, two men were alleged to have molested a 16-year-old girl and videotaped the act. Both men were registered sex offenders and

wore ankle monitoring devices. Police believe they also assaulted at least two other minors.

Both that Motel 6 and the El Cajon Inn & Suites were among the hotels the city had threatened with fines of up to \$1000 per day for accepting so many vouchers that they were in effect running unlawful emergency shelters. The other was the Best Inn & Suites on Oakdale Avenue. But that move brought negative attention from Sacramento, which sent a warning to rescind the notices.

Schifman said that the city may feel it is carrying an extra burden in the county when it comes to the hotel vouchers, "but we maintain that we can hardly pinpoint the problem to one establishment or one location or one operator." El Cajon has already revoked the status of two approved establishments, she continued on page 3



added. "Four or five more may come before you after the one tonight," she added, "and perhaps there is a nuisance threat to the public health and safety" tied to the influx of hotel vouchers. But, she insisted, it doesn't stem from the El Cajon Inn & Suites. "We ask that you not punish business owners for struggling public policies."

Commissioner Shannon Edison replied that it's not about vouchers, and that the city isn't out to shut down a business. "What we're saying is, we need to clean things up."


Schifman answered that the owner has been working diligently with city staff since the violation notices were issued, and that the motel is on track for a 40 percent reduction in service calls this year because of changes they've made - things like adding more security cameras and lighting, hiring a guard to walk the property, and using a new guest registration form. In addition, motel staff will undergo training on human trafficking and sexual harassment, and will have to submit reports to the city about how many people are renting rooms with outside assistance, including those using county vouchers. "We ask that rather than revoke the 'deemed approved' status, that they be allowed to retain their status — and that therefore you would not need the CUP," she said. CUP stands for conditional use permit. Commissioners said that anybody who wants to run a business in the city gets a conditional use permit (CUP). But many businesses don't have one due to their age, which is why the "deemed approved" status was put in place - to grant owners the right to do business under a set of guidelines. However, "the deemed approved status is just a baseline," said city planner Noah Alvey.

The CUP gives the commission the ability to add more terms of approval. Without a CUP, he added, "things could go back to conditions earlier this year, and the city would not have the ability to hold them accountable for more than the 'deemed approved' status regulations."

Another hearing will be held in 90 days to review the motel's management plan. SHEILA PELL

Toni and Rupert's political

romance Controversial right-wing commentator Tucker Carlson is out of a job, and Fox News is poorer by \$787.5 million, thanks to its settlement with Dominion Voting Systems over defamation charges arising from the network's coverage of alleged vote stealing from **Donald Trump** — but that doesn't mean Fox is out of the political game. In California, the

Rupert Murdoch-controlled Fox News parent company, Fox Corporation & Affiliated Entities, came up with \$5000 on May 23 for the 2026 Lt. Governor campaign of liberal San Diego Democrat Toni Atkins, currently state Senate pro Tempore. The same day that Fox's gift arrived, utility giant Edison International & Affiliated Entities of Rosemead gave the Atkins cause the same amount. Fox's cash was reported

as coming from the corporation itself, not its FOXPAC, as detailed in the company's January 2023 Political Activities Report posted online. "FOXPAC solicits funds from permissible Company employees (except those in news gathering functions) and in turn uses those employee donations to make political contributions to candidates in support of the Company's policy priorities. No corporate treasury funds are used

for contributions from FOXPAC. FOXPAC is committed to maintaining an even 50/50 balance between the two major political parties in making federal political contributions. In 2022, FOXPAC disbursements totaled \$258,000, evenly divided between Republicans and Democrats." Regarding Fox's direct corporation giving, the document says, "Where permissible by law,

any corporate contributions to a candidate campaign, political party or political entity must be approved by the FOX Government Relations office and our Chief Legal and Policy Officer. FOX does not make corporate contributions to political campaigns for federal office. Corporate political contributions are made in support of the Company's policy priorities."

Last year, the company came up with \$40,500 for the

California Republican Party and \$15,000 for the California Democratic Party. San Diego Democrat Chris Ward's Assembly committee picked up \$1500 from Fox, and the Atkins Lt. Governor committee got \$4900. "In 2022, FOX Government Relations advocated on a wide array of policy issues impacting the Company, including the First Amendment guarantee of a free press, retransmission consent and programming carriage, business insurance, and liability protection, children's educational TV


programming, advertising and corporate taxes, spectrum, intellectual property and copyright, media ownership, online privacy, Section 230 of the Communications Decency Act, antitrust enforcement and reform, and sports betting and sports futures," the statement continues. "In 2022, FOX's federal lobbying expenses, as defined by the Lobbying Disclosure Act, totaled \$3,830,000, which includes the relevant por-

> tion of employee salaries and travel expenses, and outside expenditures associated with lobbying activity."

Fox's latest California lobbying disclosure, filed May 1, shows the company spent \$15,000 for the services of Capitol Advocacy, LLC. And gave \$4900 to the campaign fund of Assembly Democrat Sharon Quirk-Silva of Fullerton on February 9.

Toni Atkins knows that Fox is fair and balanced - in donations, anyway.

> Styro-foaming money As a bigmoney proxy war between San Diego Republican and Democratic politicos ramps up - in the form of competing anti-homeless initiatives being hyped by GOP ex-mayor Kevin Faulconer and his Democratic successor Todd Gloria — cash from out-of-town special interests has already begun arriving in local coffers. A May 18 disclosure filing with the California Secretary of State's office by the California Business Roundtable Issues Political Action Committee reveals that the Sacramento-based group kicked in \$30,000 to fund Faulconer's San Diego Safe Shelters and Clean Streets ballot measure committee on May 4. The same report shows that the PAC took in \$3000 from Mason, Michigan-based Dart Container Corp., the

Nathan's flight cash In addition to yearly pay of more

than \$208,000 for his former job as a county supervisor, resigned politician Nathan Fletcher also got \$150 per meeting as a member of the Metropolitan Transit System board, for a grand total of between \$1000 and \$2000, according to the county's online Agency Report of Public Official Appointments, dated January 4. And the same accounting shows that Fletcher was set to pick up even more as a member of the San Diego Regional Airport Authority board. At \$200 per meeting, his annual haul from that single agency would have amounted to between \$2000 and \$3000. "Welcome Supervisor Fletcher, Mayor Sanchez, Ms. Martinez, and Mr. Perez to the Airport Authority Board," read a February 1 statement by Airport Authority Board Chair Gil Cabrera. "These Board Members come to the Airport Authority at an exciting time. Their leadership and insight will be very helpful as we continue to build the New T1, which will meet the current and future transportation needs of our region." Cabrera has known his share of controversy, having been reprimanded by the state's Fair Political Practices Commission for his role in setting up a political committee to raise money attacking fellow Democrat Lori Saldana's bid last year for a city council seat. "Your actions violated the [California Political Reform Act]," because "the email failed to include 'committee major funding from' with the names of the top contributors to the committee," according to a January 20 so-called warning letter sent Cabrera and his New San Diego committee, from FPPC enforcement chief Angela J. Brereton. — Matt Potter

There are no bookstores in Fashion Valley, but mightn't you be more likely to pick up Burning Man: Art in the Desert while lounging in the living room of a globetrotting sophisticate?

Sure, the focus in on image; these are coffee-table art books. But such images! The "attractive people doing attractive things in attractive places" in Slim Aarons' Women. The gorgeous taxonomy of pioneering botanist Anna Atkins (and others) in Phaidon's Plant: Exploring the Botanical World. The glories of Paris, the thrills of Miami. And among those images, there is still much to learn. Take it from Chinese artist/activist Ai Weiwei in his book

on Andy Warhol: "Understand him and you will understand the United States, for he is the most tragically beautiful legend in the history of American art — a unique artist of purely American values." Or consider the huge posters of suffering faces pasted in public spaces that are captured in Can Art Change the World? Or the moral horror of Jenny Holzer's Redaction Paintings, based on the harrowing testimony of detainees as recorded in declassified American intelligence documents.

I thought of the late, lamented P.J. O'Rourke and his delight in stumbling upon Emily Post's book of etiquette as a youngster - bored and casting about, he found himself suddenly fascinated: this collection of good advices taught him that "manners are the small coin of morality." As for me: lounging on a cream couch, I found myself transported by a collection of Stanley Kubrick's work as a photographer before he made his way into movies - in particular, his photo-essay on a New York City shoeshine boy. The photo of his subject posing confidently with his many brothers and sisters against an alley wall scrawled with graffiti was a long way from the curated comfort of Fashion Valley, but if I hadn't come here, I might never have seen it. Funny old world.

And other risky schemes

he first time I lay down on a waterbed, I thought, "Who wouldn't want one of these?" The undulating motion of the water, the evenly distributed pressure against my body — so relaxing, and sensual too. And with a waterbed heating pad warming the water from below, it was pure pleasure.

It was the early 1970s and waterbed sales in the U.S. were starting to heat up. I was a customer myself, having been introduced to the product by a friend who would let people (plural) spend the night on his own waterbed in a sort of "try before you buy" operation. I bought mine the very next morning, and slept on it that night in my garage studio in La Jolla. But in Europe, not so much. My most recent business endeavor had involved finding vintage European cars overseas and sometimes helping to ship them back to the U.S. - I still remember the Morgan three-wheeler roadster I found in a field next to a pub in Sussex, smashed up but still magnificent, and maybe salvageable. But amazingly, I didn't see or hear anything about waterbeds while I was abroad. Bingo: forget trying to ship old Morgans and Peugeots back to the states. I just knew I could make a killing selling waterbeds in Europe. It was time to contact my good friend Giovanni.

I knew Giovanni from our time together at university in the UK. We had kept in touch, and at that point, he was living in Paris with his girlfriend. I sent him a letter explaining my plan for waterbed sales in Europe, and it wasn't long before he called

me and said he was in. He wanted to know how soon I could get to Paris with the merchandise. Like me, Giovanni, was in between jobs - that is, unemployed — with not much desire for a nine-to-five solution to that problem. I knew Giovanni would be a good partner because we had run a couple of small moneymaking ventures during our time at university; these included ghost tours and poker parties. The poker parties were particularly successful, with a waiting list of students eager to pay our hefty fee to sit at the table. It was always surprising to me how much students loved to gamble, especially because many of them could hardly afford their books.

Just a few days after my first conversation with Giovanni, he called me again and told me he had several waterbed buyers lined up. He said we could sell them for 10 times or more what I paid for them, and told me to bring as many as I could. There would be no need for graduate school now, nor a nine-to-five job, for that matter. I quickly scraped together about \$800, which was enough to buy 10 waterbeds from a small San Diego manufacturer and a cheap charter flight from Los Angeles to Europe. I packaged two of them together and tied them with heavy rope that also served as a handle. Each package of two was about the size of a medium suitcase. I knew shipping would be too expensive, and that there might be a problem getting them through French customs. But if I carried them like luggage, I could probably scoot right through.

With my toothbrush in my top pocket, and a change of underclothes packed into my newly purchased business briefcase, I was all set to make some easy money — and have a lot of fun, too. I was definitely on one of those highs that one gets when the future looks really promising. What could go wrong? I knew my way around Europe, I totally trusted Giovanni, and I had good business sense. Heck, I already had a college degree in urban planning, so I was sure I knew how to plan.

I got a friend to drive me from San Diego to the Imperial Terminal at the Los Angeles Airport, from which all the cheap charter flights left for Europe — sometimes several each day. I called Giovanni again to tell him I was on my way. He assured me that he could sell all the waterbeds I could bring, and that he had already taken some deposits. Then I hit my first snag: the next flight to Paris was two days away. However, there was one to London leaving that evening. I knew London pretty well, and more importantly, I knew it was fairly easy to get from London to Paris. But most importantly, I knew how to travel in those long-ago, less regulated days.

That evening, I watched as the London flight boarded. As the line at the counter grew short, I rolled over with my cart full of waterbeds. When I reached the counter, I said to the agent, "Hi, I am late, and I haven't checked my bags yet, and I can't find my ticket. But I know I am scheduled to be on this flight. Can you check for my name?" This wasn't the first time I had used that line to take a "no reservation or ticket" charter flight to Europe. I knew the drill. There was a long pause, during which I placed my arm and hand

across the counter, opening it slightly to show that I held several folded \$20 bills — three, to be exact.

Without any hesitation, the agent took the money, then lowered his hands down below the back of the counter. He paused, then looked straight at me and said, "There are no more seats." I knew this meant more \$20 bills were needed; fortunately, I had one more, folded up in the watch pocket of my Levis. I handed it over the counter and voila, the agent asked me to please step over by the departure door and said he would be right over to help me board. And he was: he walked me out the door with my cart, helped me carry all the waterbeds onto the plane, and even helped me put them in the overhead compartments. He then told me to sit wherever I wanted since the plane was only about half full, shook my hand, smiled, and said, "Have a nice flight." Within a few minutes the doors were secured and we were off to London. Clearly, I knew how to plan.

I had an entire row to myself, so I stretched out and slept for most of the flight. I dreamed about cruising the beaches of Southern California on my new BSA 441 Victor motorcycle, which I was planning on purchasing when I returned — along with a couple of new surfboards, and a VW Van for trips to surf in Mexico. And, of course, more waterbeds for my next trip back to Europe. When I woke up, we were on the gray, rainy approach into London. I had no problem with UK immigration, because I told them I was just passing through on my way to France. And with a serious expression on my face and a determined posture, I rapidly

rolled my cart through the Nothing to Declare area for UK customs.

I changed some dollars for pounds, and bought some French francs in the airport. Although it was a bit pricey, I took a taxi from the airport to London's Victoria Station. I wasn't sleepy, but lugging all those waterbeds around was already starting to be a bit much. Once at the station, I loaded my beds back onto a cart and got in line for my ticket to Paris. I overheard a couple behind me speaking both English and French. After purchasing my ticket, I approached them and asked them if they would help me carry my packages in exchange for a free waterbed. After I quickly explained what a waterbed was, they quickly said yes.

It was a short trip to Folkestone, where I would catch the ferry to Calais. It was a night ferry, which was fine, because I was getting tired and had already started to indulge in some pints. Besides being friendly and eager to try my product, it turned out my luggage handlers were also French citizens. That was great: I would get them to declare the waterbeds with French customs and do all the talking.

I knew from experience that French people were quite good at negotiating. I always enjoyed it when the check for a meal would come in a French restaurant; there was often a lively conversation over the charges. By lively, I mean that I always thought someone was going to punch someone. But I never saw that happen, and after everything was settled, everyone was always unbelievably polite. I thought of that dynamic when we

ran into some trouble with French customs. Happily, my two new friends took the trouble on as a kind of challenge, and after a little back and forth — which sounded not unlike the argument over a restaurant check — a deal was struck. One waterbed would go to the customs agent, for further inspection.

After purchasing a couple of bottles of wine, some baguettes, and some excellent French cheese, we were on the train to Paris. Next stop, Gare du Nord. I thanked my new friends and gave them their waterbed. I told them they would need to build a wooden frame box, and that they could use a normal garden hose to fill it up. I also told them that waterbeds are very heavy, so putting it on a higher floor in an older building was not advisable. And I briefly

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In La Mesa: Sandiego@velocityclinical.com 619-492-5446 noted that there was always the possibility of a leak. That last word brought forth a rather concerned look, but my spirits were undampened.

Once in Paris, I called Giovanni, and in about an hour, there he was - driving one of those old fourdoor Citroens with the cloth roof. He spotted me standing on the curb, stopped, jumped out, and gave me a big hug. He was totally excited to start making bundles of money — but far less excited to learn that I was down to eight waterbeds. Nevertheless, we loaded our goods into the car's cramped back seat and set off to deliver and set them up for our brave European pioneers. It took about two days to deliver all the waterbeds. It also took a good deal of negotiating, which thankfully, Giovanni was able to handle. No one seemed to care much about the setup. Questions of weight and possible leaks issue didn't seem to arouse much concern, either. However, my warnings about possible electrocution arising from the use of an electric blanket received serious attention.

Within two days, all eight waterbeds were sold, and we had made around \$6000. Even after deductions for expenses and the initial investment for 10 waterbeds, this was a



really hefty profit. I was ready to be rich. Therefore, I was ready to head straight back to the U.S. to get more waterbeds. But Giovanni had another idea: he thought we could do much better selling waterbeds in Switzerland - not as a two-man operation, but as the heads of an entire sales network. What was needed now was not inventory, but infrastructure. And after a few expensive nights out in Paris with Giovanni, his girlfriend, and his friends, I was convinced.

Although Giovanni came from a workingclass background like me, he sure seemed to know how the upper class lived. All of our dinners out seemed like special occasion celebrations, ceremonial events presided over by attentive waitstaff. There were always several courses, including an *aperitif* to start and several different wines — always changing to the correct type of wine glass — during the main courses, and ending with a digestivo, usually cognac. It was the first time I had ever tasted cognac, and I liked it. This was a very long way from standing up while eating a torta and drinking a Fanta purchased from a street vendor in TJ. As for shopping, I liked the Galeries Lafayette on the Rue du Rivoli, which was this huge old building with a beautiful glass dome. I remember buying a couple of longsleeve fitted shirts and a nice tweed blazer. And I couldn't resist some stylish beige low-top boots with a little zipper on the side. They looked so good on me!

Soon we were off to Zurich, traveling first class by train and stopping for



a few days in Chamonix to work on our business plan. What was the plan? Make as much money as possible as fast as possible, and have as much fun as possible with the profits.

We checked in to one of those big old palace-like hotels right on the lake in Zurich: Baur au Lac. Today, it will cost you about \$1400 a night. Shortly after checking in, I bought a beautiful Swiss watch on the Bahnhofstrasse. It was from one of those shops where you are invited to sit down to try on several possible timepieces - and to sample the complimentary coffee and chocolate truffles, of course.

After a couple of days of partying, Giovanni arranged a business dinner with the roughly 20 people who we thought would be our distributors in Switzerland. And what a dinner it was: held in a big private dining room with a big round table and huge crystal chandeliers, the kind of dinner with plenty of food, Champagne, and waiters — the kind of waiters who stand just back from the table so they can clearly see if you need a top-off for your Champagne. Giovanni had even hired a string quartet to play classical background music. The whole thing was like dining in a palatial palace. I had this thought that maybe we should have all dressed in 17th or 18th century costumes. We were going to be the waterbed kings of Switzerland, and maybe all of Europe.

Everything was going perfectly - until I noticed Giovanni staring at me with one of those "something is wrong" looks. I looked down at my new watch and noticed that it was just about midnight. I thought that maybe he was worried because we were supposed to finish up the dinner party by then. No problem: we could just go some other place to keep the party going. Then, like a bolt of lightning, a question hit me: Do we have enough money to pay for this dinner? For the hotel? For travel back to Paris? To the United States? Was I a great planner after all, or had I ruined everything just as it started getting good?

We signed the meal check with our room numbers and names. I kind of lost track of Giovanni during all the goodbyes, during which we assured all of our new business partners we would be in touch with them soon. I guess Giovanni and his girlfriend retired for the night, but I wasn't finished yet. I retreated to the lounge with a couple of my new business associates for some expensive cognac. Again, I signed my name and room number on the check - no sense quitting now. As I sipped, I recalled that just a week or so earlier, I had been sitting in a Tijuana bar drinking a pitcher of very cheap beer. I had come a long way in one week.

But every magical night gives way to morning. When Giovanni and I met the next day, I learned that I was right about his "something is wrong" look — he'd been hit with the same question I had. We reluctantly headed to the check-out desk to get the bad news. There were the room charges, the business dinner charges, and other food and drink charges. The total was over \$2500, and I think that was before tipping for all those attentive waiters. I wasn't exactly sure how much money we had, but I didn't think it was that much. About then, Giovanni whispered in my ear that we had only about \$1500.

Running for it was out of the question; we were in big trouble. We came right out with it and told the hotel we had made a gross miscalculation and could only cover a portion of the total bill. We were quickly ushered to the hotel manager's office, and the Zurich police were called. Surprisingly, everyone was very nice and polite – and somehow, thanks mostly to Giovanni's negotiating skills, we agreed on a price that was less then what we actually owed. Even so, it would totally wipe out our resources. Personally, I had been ready to work off the balance in the hotel kitchen.

Returning the watch got me enough money to get back to the U.S., and Giovanni's girlfriend's parents got them back to Paris. Somehow, in less than a week, we had spent around \$6000. It was a fun ride, but to be honest, not being able to get the BSA 441 Victor was the ride I was going to miss most. However, we did accomplish one important part of our business plan: have as much fun as possible.

Next stop, Tijuana, for some pitcher beer and a few good rights at K38½. — Jerry Olivas

A MONTH IN COUNTY

Hard guards and ping-pong diplomacy

"**BE STRONG!**" said my brother as I was led out of the courtroom. I had just been sentenced to 90 days in the county jail for possession with intent to sell. I had hired the best attorney I could find, and had received a light sentence for the felony I had committed. Having my father, in his Navy Captain's uniform, with me in court certainly helped.

I had been a lousy cocaine dealer. Really, I was not so much a dealer as a college kid with an expensive coke habit. If you worked in Coronado's top restaurants in the early '80s, you were exposed to coke on a nightly basis, but especially Fridays and Saturdays. Closing time would come around, and the real dealers would show up at the bar, pockets full of weighed-out product. I'd buy an eight ball, break it up, and sell it to my fellow SDSU students at parties. I snorted up every bit of profit I might have made — "Don't get high on your own supply" was a rule I did not follow. One night, I was out

on El Cajon Boulevard, out of my mind on coke and planning to go surf Trestles at dawn, when a cop pulled me over and noticed a jar in the open space between the seats. "What's that?"


Thankfully, I was placed in the jail's "trustee" ward, which seemed to

house the less dangerous criminals. Men with too many DUIs, men in for drug possession and sales, white collar crimes, etc. There were probably 100 of us in the trustee ward, and we had it much better than other inmates: TVs, ping-pong, and generally fewer rules and restrictions. And jobs. Jobs in jail were highly sought after, as they kept you out of trouble, and you would always have money "on your books" to buy cigarettes or candy or hygienic essentials.

Because I had been a waiter at a Coronado restaurant, I was employed in the ODR (Officers Dining Room), a plain square room with windows, maybe ten tables, and stainless steel kitchen equipment. I was basically a busboy for the guards; I would bring them food, drinks, and silverware, and clean their tables when they finished. Many of those guards were nice, and would chat me up from time to time. They seemed to really care, and wanted me to get my life straightened out and for me to make something of myself. One in particular, a guy named Prendergast, would often say, "You don't belong here." Other guards were not so nice; they seemed bitter, and did their best to make things uncomfortable for me and the other inmates — as if they were looking for a fight.

During any particular meal shift, I was the only inmate allowed in





the ODR. But when the room was empty, and I was cleaning up or making iced tea, inmates would pop their heads in the door and ask for things. "Hey Holmes, get me a bottle of hot sauce." I declined all such requests: one infraction would cause me to lose my job in the ODR, plus my bunk in the trustee ward. I'd be "rolled up," transferred to a less desirable ward in the jail, with much worse offenders for company and no amenities whatsoever.

I declined requests, yes — but that doesn't mean I never took risks. I soon realized there were politics and hierarchies in jail that went beyond where you slept. The guy who ran the laundry had a great job; he washed and handed out clothes to every inmate in the trustee ward. "Luis" was a short stocky Hispanic, covered in tattoos; not the kind of person you'd want to cross. Early on, he pulled me aside: "Listen Holmes, here's how it works here. You scratch my back, I scratch yours. You bring me some hot sauce when I ask, you get the cleanest clothes that are perfectly starched and pressed. You will also stay on my good side." I was okay with his proposal, especially the "good side" part.

Luis was even kind enough to give me smuggling instructions. While at work in the ODR, I would make iced tea in large plastic containers that must have held five gallons of liquid. If I made the tea dark enough, you couldn't see the bottle of hot sauce rolling around on the bottom of the container. This tea was popular in the trustee ward, so I made it almost every day. I'd put three or four containers of tea on a rolling cart, walk the cart past the laundry room, and my new compadre Luis would reach his hand in, grab his hot sauce, and give me a set of clothes so clean and pressed, you'd think I was going to a wedding. This was how jail life worked. Give and take. Money was hard to come by, so cigarettes functioned as the standard currency. Everybody seemed to smoke, as there was nothing else to do. I saw violent fights over cigarette debts that weren't paid.

I assimilated quickly, and was able to make friends with some of the popular and powerful people in the trustee ward. There were groups and cliques: Mexicans hung with Mexicans, blacks with blacks, whites with whites. But I had friends in all the groups. My years of waiting tables helped me read the room: I could spot the nice guys, the sketchy guys, and the scary guys, no matter what color they were, and that proved beneficial.

I was also a very good ping-pong player, and we would have tournaments that gave the inmates something to bet on. This wasn't familyfriendly ping-pong. This was knock down, drag out ping-pong. I entered jail with a brand new pair of Adidas Superstars, and wore them out in 30 days. "Pack of smokes on the white dude!" was something I loved to hear.

One of my ping-pong fans was a tall, young muscular Mexican guy named Ernesto. He was probably 6'6", and would knock you out if you looked at him wrong. He liked to bet on me, and we became friends. Once, I was roughhousing with another inmate, "Juan," who was known for getting in fights with the guards. Juan was getting rough, and had me in a pretty tight headlock. All of a sudden, his grip on my head loosened. Ernesto had him up against the wall, fists clenched, ready to pound him. "Leave the motherfucker alone!" he screamed at Juan. I said, "Thanks Ernesto, but we were just playing." Juan never roughhoused with me again.

Our tournaments were well attended, and they would always end up the same way: me and a tall black guy named TJ, would battle it out for the trustee championship. He was better than me, but I think he let me win to keep the attention going. He was really funny, had a high pitched giggle, and became my best friend. He said he was in for pimping, but who knows? Nobody tells the truth in jail. (My other friend said he staged robberies in his home and then collected the insurance money, only to be ratted out by a buddy.) TJ took me under his sizable wing. He would point out the guards and inmates who were nice and approachable, and those who were not.

One day, out of the blue, a very large guard with an even larger chip on his shoulder marched into the ODR during my shift and barked, "Come with me. You're getting rolled up!"



"What?" I replied, dumbfounded. "Why? I haven't done anything wrong."

"A knife was found in the C block, and it came from the ODR."

"It wasn't me, and I had nothing to do with it."

This was major. Even a butter knife can be ground into a shank, which can then be used to stab another inmate - or even worse, a guard. And the guard had this much right: the only place a butter knife could be found was in the ODR, and I was in charge of it. Though I insisted I was innocent, the guard took me out of the trustee ward and put me in some part of the jail I had never seen, with inmates I had never met. I was shocked, pissed off, and a bit scared of my new surroundings.

I asked to talk with the head guard of the new block, and explained that I had nothing to do with an inmate having a butter knife. Something about my plea must have convinced him, because they sent me back to the trustee ward, and I got my ODR job back. Or maybe it was just that he knew the other guard was a complete a-hole. I still think that other guard was just trying to mess with me. A long time later, I heard that he was shot and killed in the East County while investigating a robbery



I never saw any rapes or anything sexual, but there was a gay ward, and the inmates had to wear special wristbands that identified them as such. I did see many violent and bloody fights. Usually, it was inmate vs. inmate. Usually, for nothing more than a denied cigarette, a disrespectful comment, or people looking at each other the wrong way. The fights could also have been racially motivated, as it was rarely the same race fighting each other. The guards would also get rough with the inmates, especially the ones who liked to disrespect and provoke them. With some inmates, that seemed to be the reputation they sought: "Look at my swollen black eyes. I got my ass kicked by the guards."

There were alcohol and drugs in jail. "Pruno" was a popular alcoholic drink. They made it in the same containers I'd use to make tea. But I'm not sure *how* they made it, and I never drank any. There was weed too, that I imagine was smuggled in by visitors. But it always smelled really bad, and I never tried that either. Getting caught would get you immediately "rolled up."

I was released after 30 days. It was a life-altering experience. The absolute worst part was the loss of my freedom. I recall looking out onto Front Street, and just wishing I could be there walking with the other "free" people. I swore to myself I would never do anything to jeopardize my freedom again. The nice guards supported this resolution: they would ask what I did on the outside, and try to point me in a positive direction. The shit guards would say, "You'll be back."

60s this month, perhaps to reach the low 70s in July or August. The usual early summer cool weather along San Diego's coastline, disappointing to many tourists, is mostly caused by the sluggish warming of the ocean water. The payoff will come later: as the ocean gives up heat absorbed during the sunny summer months, we'll enjoy warm days and evenings well into autumn.

June 3 Will Be the Last Full Moon of Spring and the first of summer. Some native tribes called it the the "Strawberry Moon," because ripe strawberries were ready to be gathered at this time. The Anishinaabe people called it the "Blooming Moon," because it is indicative of the flowering season. The Tlingit used the term "Birth Moon," referring to the time when certain animals were born in their region. "Egg Laying Moon" and "Hatching Moon" are Cree terms for this period.

Destiny of Desire

The subtitle for Karen Zacarias' musical is "An unapologetic telenovela for the stage," and while it is indeed unapologetic, it's also defensive to the point of being prickly. At the outset, the cast announces, "We are here to change the social order — deal with it." Um, okay? And throughout the marvelously melodramatic story, you the viewer are reminded that if you think Latin soaps are crazy, just wait until you hear about American reality. In the first scene, a wealthy new mother conspires with a doctor to switch her sickly baby for the healthy one just born to a peasant, and the action pauses for the announcement that in the United States, one in eight babies winds up with the wrong family, at least temporarily. After a daughter shoots a man she sees attacking her father, we learn that 4.6 million American children live in a home with a loaded and unlocked gun. When adultery enters the storyline, it's "68% of women in the United States say they would have an affair if they would never get caught."

And so on and so on, a level of self-consciousness over and above that indicated by the placards announcing each scene's theme and the occasional. hilarious "take two" of a diva-centric scenes. It's all right as far as it goes, until it goes too far and inserts itself into the story - subtext rising unnecessarily to the level of text. But that's not until the second act, which is where most of the show's troubles lie (songs, movement, momentum, mechanics, etc.) Before that, in the beautiful and bonkers first act, the commentary feels positively Shakespearean: the thing giving weight to the madcappery and mayhem of the story about two families intertwined by the titular destiny and desire.

The song and dance are positively transporting: Bianca Marroquín's performance of "Pain Makes Me Beautiful" is some of the most fun I've ever had in a theater. The talent on display points to Broadway ambitions, and it's not hard to imagine it getting there one day. Besides being frantic and funny, it manages to keep its heart in the right place: on its sleeve.

Lost in Yonkers

If you're a regular at Scripps Ranch Theatre, you might be wondering what exactly they were up to when they decided to follow Charlayne Woodard's Neat with Neil Simon's Lost in Yonkers. Yonkers is worlds funnier than Neat, and its actors are both game and good (those teenage boys!), but there's a complication at its heart, and the similarities are too strong to avoid comparison. A refresher: Woodard's play is a memoir of her family's life with her aunt Neat, brain-damaged and so possessed of a childlike innocence - for good and ill. Simon's play recounts the Kurnitz family's life with Bella, who was nearly sent to "The Home" because, as the doctors put it, she would always be a child. There are plenty of other characters - and yeah, they're characters, including a gangster uncle, a quietly monstrous matriarch. and a couple of teenage brothers who serve as our ticket into the story - but it's Bella who drives the drama. And while she is portrayed with appealing, wide-eyed, just-shy-of-manic energy by Katee Drysdale, her dialogue is not that of a child, or even a childlike adult. Not the way Neat's was. It's too smart and too good, laced with too much understanding - of herself and others - and brimming with too much grownup compassion. Maybe that's what Simon was thinking: that any grownup who can actually say what they feel, tell the ugly truth with loving honesty, and not choke on the pain and bitterness brought on by their own suffering, must be a bit touched. And that such a soul would be the only one who could ever step outside the crushing

cycle of generational dysfunction the sort wrought by Grandma Kurnitz, whose foot was itself crushed by antisemites in Germany, whose husband and two of her six children died shortly after she made it to America, who had no more love to give but still had to raise a family. Anyway, it was enough to win Simon a Pulitzer in 1991, SRT mounts a fine production, and the juxtaposition is fruitful.

MOVIES

Fast X — The 10th installment of the auto-action-adventure franchise opens strong, flashing back to the credulity-straining but undeniably thrilling "dragged vault" scene from Fast Five, but telling it from the bad guys' perspective and prefacing it with a speech about how there is nothing a father wouldn't do for his son Wait, bad guys love their families too? But if family is ultimately all that matters, then how do we tell the good guys from the bad guys here? But then it slows down for those struggling to catch up, and gives us a speech from Abuelita about how Vin Diesel's Dom Toretto has created a legacy that will go on for generations, that no one can take away, not now, not ever. Foreshadowing! And then it slips up and gets meta, via a snarky speech from a new Mr. Big, who laments that Dom's "family" is like a cult that recruits devotees via barbecues and beer, and that "if it violates the laws of God and gravity, they did it - twice." Oof. There are a lot of thudding lines here, some of them delivered by unlikely suspects - Hellen Mirren grumping to Dom, "It ain't no Roman Holiday, and you're no Gregory Peck" - and some of them by very likely suspects - Dom asking his wife how she just keeps getting more beautiful, and assuring us that with faith, "nothing is impossible," And now that the film has gotten selfconscious, they thud all the harder. Set against all Dom's preening regularguy decency is the preening irregularfellow indecency of Jason Momoa's villain. See, Dom took away his daddy, and now he's not just evil and vengeful, he's flamboyantly, fabulously so, even going so far as to give pedicures to the corpses of his victims and to swoon that Dom is a "big brute." But villain or no, he's still got faith on his mind, assuring Dom that "to become a real saint, you have to perform miracles or die a martyr." He's got a plan to ensure the latter - after he's done trashing the aforementioned legacy - but of course, as long as there's something he can drive, Dom is up for the former. That's the central dynamic, but there is so, so much else going on. So much, in fact, that nothing much gets resolved here (though somebody does die). You'll have to come back for the next installment to find out what happens with Dom, his wife, his kid, and the rest of the crew, plus Charlize Theron, Jason Statham, Brie Larson... It's overlong and over-the-top, but the real trouble is that when a series like this acknowledges its own absurdities, they become harder to enjoy. 2023 - M.L. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

The Little Mermaid — Plot: a teenage girl develops an obsession with the group of people who murdered her mother, to the point where she falls in love with one of them after seeing him be kind to his dog. Behold the danger of improving your source material by adding backstories. The girl's father hates those people for what they did, but it's not like Mom was his one true one: to judge by his family reunions, he's got six other daughters with six other mothers. Behold the danger of improving your source material by adding diversity for its own sake. The teenager's beloved is a good bit older, but not terribly mature: he's so addled by FOMO that he's terrified of his island kingdom getting left behind in isolation, despite that island's marketplace boasting a wildly multicultural array of people and products. Behold the danger of improving your source material by adding motivations from your studio's last hit about an island people. (The wanderlust didn't make much sense in Moana, either, since there was no need to go exploring once the sea blight had been cured, but never mind.) Once she gains access to her beloved's world, our Little Mermaid sees a painting of fish on hooks, wonders if her kind are "only food for slaughter," then rhymes that with, "But you were lonely underwater!" Behold the danger of improving your source material with new music. Her goal is to get her beloved to give her the kiss of true love without ever saying a word, but in order to dodge any possible criticism about such an arrangement, she is bewitched into forgetting her goal. Some may find this a satisfactory solution, others may say the dramatic takeback just points to the danger of trying to make a rom-com out of a fairy tale. But really, all this is quibbling: the real problem here is that the film looks and sounds terrible, at least in the screening I attended. The sunlight under the sea is less dim and watery than the sunlight above. The sound under the sea is weirdly echo-y. The famous wave crash behind Ariel as she hits her big note cuts to a shot of calm waters. Her hair switches from free-flowing strands to thick

dreadlocks, depending on whether or not the underwater CG animators are working on it. Underwater book pages rustle. The list goes on, overwhelming star Halley Bailey's winning performance. Part of that world of lazy remakes, alas. At least Sebastian is still fun. (2023) — M.L.★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Master Gardener — Paul Schrader's 2017 film First Reformed gave us a solitary man who is keeping a journal, who deals with an intense and intimate crisis before learning that the real enemy is larger, more powerful, and less personal, and who just might find salvation via a compassionate woman. Then, 2021's The Card Counter gave us a solitary man with a violent past, who deals with an intense and intimate crisis, before learning that the real enemy is larger, more powerful, and less personal, and who just might find salvation via a compassionate woman. And here? Here we have a solitary man with a violent past who is keeping a journal. The pleasure is not in the innovation, but in the variation. This time, Joel Edgerton takes up the mask of composure and control, even as he lectures us about wild gardens that only appear to be wild, but still grow according to plan. That's not the sort of garden he's growing, however: his employer (Sigourney Weaver, imperious) likes things more regulated. She's eager to discuss the upcoming charity event at her grand estate, but first there is the matter of her grandniece (Quintessa Swindell, luminous), a young woman from a troubled background who needs a break. She's of mixed racial heritage, but that's not a problem for our gardener, despite what his severe haircut, black sweater,

and knee-high boots might suggest. He's more concerned with her drug use, and the unpleasant people from whom she gets them. The film is as careful and restrained and handsome as Edgerton's character, and as rigidly structured as the garden he tends. But of course, that does not mean it is without feeling; plenty of blooms thrive on severity. Its only misstep may be its overly sweet portrait of a damaged addict - but then, it's not the girl's story. And while she may be our man's salvation, she's no vessel of cheap grace: their quiet confrontation in the dark is one of the most affecting scenes in recent memory. Schrader loathes violence, but he understands it, which is what makes the film's concluding monologue - about a garden's embodiment of what should be, a manipulation of nature achieved through subtle adjustment - so profoundly hopeful. I arrived for the screening of Nicole Holofcener's new film, I was asked, "Are you here for the grown-up movie?" It's easy to see why: here we have a story about ordinary people dealing with ordinary problems in ordinary fashion -well, almost. (Can anyone living in NYC luxury really be called ordinary?) Julia Louis-Dreyfus is a memoirist, attempting to make the jump to fiction; Tobias Menzies is her therapist husband, attempting to maintain interest in the problems of his clients. But he just feels tired -- and looks it, thanks to those bags under his eyes —and she's having trouble with her manuscript, so much so that she's devastated when she overhears her spouse telling a mutual friend that he doesn't like it

one bit. The film is handsome without being showy, stately without being sedate, and mostly amusing without being ridiculous. It's also slight, and slightly silly — like Menzies when he receives a demand for a refund from a couple he failed to help, it's hard to say just how seriously we should take the goings on. I guested in a couple of venues and met some great musicians over there. I first met Chris at a Beatles convention in L.A. in 2016, and he gets the whole Beatles-Liverpool thing. So much so that he practically lives here [in England]. As soon as he suggested the popup Cavern idea, I knew the project was in safe hands. He knows The Cavern."

gathering will also feature British cuisine, including fish & chips and the famous Liverpool scouse, with a curated mixology menu ranging from classic gin and tonics to Guinness beer and Jameson whiskey. Memorabilia dealers will man merch booths, authors



and guest speakers will make appearances, and the live music performers include Leyva with Falling Doves and Beatles Fair host Bart Mendoza. "What makes this event special for me is that the Beatles festival gave me my first show as an artist — at a Beatles Fair with [one-time Beatles collaborator] Tony Sheridan back in early 2000s," says Leyva, who has also recorded and performed with original Beatles drummer Pete Best, and who brought his band to play at the Beatles' early '60s German home base, the Kaiserkeller in Hamburg.

"Beatles Fair will not only be a Beatles tribute show," says Leyva, "but also a celebration of the music and performers who created The Cavern's legacy, like Adele, Oasis, and many more modern Brit rock artists." (Over a dozen Beatles Fair performers have appeared at The Cavern itself.) Acts coming to North Park include locals True Stories performing a custom Beatles set, 63eatles, and Brian Jones Rock 'n' Roll Revival, as well as tribute acts Headmasters (the Smiths and Johnny Marr), Oasiz (Oasis), Syler (Adele), and Allie Ames (Amy Winehouse). The bill

also features FM Era playing U2 and British rock, Darnell Cole & the Vibe doing Jimi Hendrix and psychedelic covers, and LA band Acoustic Universe playing folk versions of Beatles tracks. Author

> John Borack (Goldmine Magazine) will discuss his new book, The Beatles: 100 Pivotal Moments In Music History. Plastic Soul will perform a set called "From The Cavern to the Ed Sullivan Theatre," and Cantua will pay a Flamenco tribute featuring the music of The Beatles, Eric Clapton, and Santana.

> This year's event also offers two notable film screenings, including the local premiere of *The* Cavern Club: The Beat Goes On, a comprehensive history of the original nightclub, which hosted the Beatles 292 times. Founded in 1957 as a jazz venue, The Cavern ended up being demolished, only to later be rebuilt brick by

brick. Its current incarnation regularly hosts international touring artists such as Adele and Artic Monkeys. Also showing will be the world premiere of Grapefruit, a 16-minute short directed by Mike Rogers that serves as a cinematic adaptation of Yoko Ono's early artwork and poetry efforts, specifically her book Grapefruit, originally published in 1964, two years before she met John Lennon.

"Like the book, the film isn't for everybody," says filmmaker Rogers. "Those who enjoy comic book movies or space war movies will most probably not like the film. People who are against war, against commercialism, and pro-freedom for everyone to live their lives as they choose will most probably love this film." (It should also be noted that anyone expecting Beatles content in the movie will come away disappointed: the band is $S_{\rm H}$ never mentioned.)



Getting loud under the clouds

Belmont Park Beach House is cool — and chilly

It's Sunday morning: the sun is out and the sky is blue — perfect weather for a visit to the Beach House at Belmont Park in Mission Beach. But by the time I arrive at 2 pm or so, the sun has vanished into the May Gray and the air is decidedly cooler. Oh well; I'm here anyway, smiling as I get close enough to start hearing the rickety rattle of the Giant Dipper rollercoaster. A couple more years, and it will turn 100.

I'm limping a bit, thanks to a bicycle crash a few days ago, and I hobble past a gaggle of bikers of a different sort, all delighting in each other's rides. Happily, there's no line at the Beach House entrance: I get wanded by security, pay my \$40 to get in, and make it to the bar for a beery respite. It's hard to hear over the thumping bass, but I think the bartender mentions Shock Top, Miller Lite, Modelo, and a few IPAs. I wind up paying \$11 plus a 55-cent surchange for a Modelo — Mexican banditry or just inflation? — and stake out a spot at the bar with a view of the waves crashing on the beach and the girls walking past on the boardwalk. The event for the day is

for a few raves in my early twenties, this could be considered my first EDM show. For the first hour, it's just me and ten or so others, so I do a bit of exploring. The Beach House's neighbor is the Plunge, another recreational wonder from 1925. At the time, it was world's largest saltwater pool, holding 355,000 gallons. (It was converted to fresh water in 1940.) Today, there's a retractable roof and an inflatable obstacle course. Families are having birthday parties for their kids; a few folks are slipping out for a smoke break. Cigarettes, joints, or vapes, who

knows? Another Beach House neighbor is the Belmont Skatepark. But there's no skating today; the place looks more like a storage area. What I don't see is a restroom, until a security guard points out the white trailer that's right in front of my face. Inside, it's very clean, with polished floors, bright white toilets, and a shiny sink. I wonder what it will be like at the end of the evening.

Earlier, I had declined a friend's offer of pasta because I planned to eat here, but for that first hour, I don't see any food options. Then I see the vendors coming in to set up for the evening: either pizza from Round Table or Concert Tacos. Two carne asada tacos for \$12, two chicken for \$10, two carnitas for \$10, and add guacamole for \$3. My choice is a slice of pizza, \$5. As I munch, I notice people starting to arrive, even as the temperature drops further. There's a wooden walkway that connects the bar and the wooden dance floor; other than that, the floor is covered in sand. Palm trees line the outside edges. There are people sitting on the boardwalk wall, bouncing their heads up and down to the music, enjoying the free show. I overhear a few of them trying to figure out how to get as close as possible.

The dance floor is starting to fill up with twentysomethings. Some of the men wear shorts and T-shirts, because this is the beach, but most of them come bundled up in jackets and hoodies, because this is May Gray. Still, the cold doesn't seem to bother the women in their halter tops and miniskirts. Maybe their dancing helps them keep warm. The scene is enough to give you hope for the future; everyone seems well mannered, fun-loving, and happy to be there with their friends. As for me, I can see how enjoyable it would be to see a concert here on a warm and sunny day. But just now, I'm a bit chilly, and so I head off to my next adventure.

A deli cool people dig

Ryes and Grind, 236 S Coast Highway, Oceanside; Oceanside's Ryes & Grind is a West Coast Jewish Deli that gives off upscale coffee shop vibes, underlain by a tinge of surfer grunge. Most people

French toast: part of this well-balanced breakfast!


I saw dining-in either wore beanies or had full body tattoos. My server Ginger sported vibrant purple hair with thick rimmed black glasses. A glowing neon sign in the dining room read "damn, you look good;" a sign in the ladies room said, "don't be a dick." There was definitely a sense of "cool" here. I guess cool people dig deli meats, carbs and caffeine. As I eyed the menu, I watched the man across from me happily dunk his brisket sandwich into a cup of steaming broth. A couple at the bar ordered coffee nitro stouts and thick pastrami sandwiches with fries. Popular songs by Beyonce and Rihanna played overhead.

To start, I ordered the Almond Challah French Toast (\$18) and a Hippie Speedball Craft Coffee (\$7). While the French toast's description promised a sugar overload (espresso/caramel sauce/white chocolate sauce/macadamia nut syrup), the coffee drink was not overly sweet. The bartender explained that their Nimbus reverse osmosis filtration system allowed for the best tasting espresso shots. Besides coffee, beverages on offer include cold pressed juices on tap, matcha and chai options, and a selection of sophisticated coffee cocktails. Had I not needed to work that afternoon, I would have ordered a Dirty Polar Bear (cold brew/vodka/kahlua/ breve) or a Drunken Arctic Monkey (cold brew/ whiskey/chocolate liqueur/coconut milk) — both \$13. When it arrived, I was happy to find that my French toast, which featured pillowy homemade challah bread decorated with berries and chocolate shavings, was, like my coffee, well balanced and not too sweet.

Next, I ordered a potato latke (\$6), which tasted

as though a baked potato and tater tot got together and made a hockey puck-shaped baby. It was dense and starchy, with a crunchy exterior and a sprinkling of salt. Alone, it was mild, but its virtues became apparent when I tried the four homemade dipping sauces: sour cream, ginger applesauce, and red and green Zhug - "Jewish salsas." Each bite yielded a completely different experience. The green Zhug was fresh and spicy (jalapeno/herbs/lemon), while the red was earthy and robust (roasted red pepper). The delicate homemade ginger applesauce acted as a cool, slightly sweet palate cleanser. And if you want to forgeo the traditional English muffin, you can also order latkes as the base to your Pastrami or Lox Eggs Benedict (\$17-18).

The servers all raved about GG's Famous Matzah Ball Soup, so I couldn't leave without a sampling (\$10). GG is Chef Daniel's grandmother, and is, the menu claims "responsible for teaching me how to cook." The soup was exactly what I craved on a dreary day. The broth made me want to cozy up on the couch



with a fuzzy blanket and a good book. Shredded chicken, celery, carrots, sesame and dill were the predominant ingredients. The Matzah balls, roughly the size of golf balls, were doughy dumplings crafted from unleavened flour.

Finally, I ordered a Reuben Sandwich on rye (\$16). Did I mention that all the bread is made in house? Deli sandwiches can be made on rye, challah or Dutch crunch (a torpedo-style sandwich bread with a crunchy exterior). I was intrigued by the Dutch crunch, but had to go for my favorite. The rye was buttered and toasted to perfection, with a generous sprinkling of caraway seeds on the exterior. The meat was slightly sweet, with a dry, jerky-like consistency. I was most excited for the house-made Thousand Island dressing (pickles/ onion/mayo/horseradish), but was slightly disappointed when I couldn't taste it on my sandwich. No problem — the server brought me an extra side of sauce.

If I come back on the weekend, I'll take Ginger's advice and order the Hot Pastrami Tots, a play on San Diego's famed Carne Asada Fries, made with tater tots, shaved pastrami, Thousand Island dressing, yellow mustard, everything

spice, and egg (\$15). She said they're ideal for sharing while drinking cocktails with friends.

Reuben: like all the breads here,

the rye is baked in-house.

Just "make sure you bring a breath mint for after... it's got that deli mustard," she warned. If you're passing by on a weekday or craving a quick breakfast on the go, I recommend a simple everything bagel with cream cheese (\$6). Rye's & Grind is open daily until 3pm.

rriving at Sandpiper just in time A for happy hour, I find I can't resist ordering a tempting Tiramisu Martini that General Manager Evan Vallée says is his twist on the extremely trendy espresso martini. "It just became so popular... It's a little more fun and playful

than a straight espresso martini, which definitely has more focus on that coffee flavor. This has a bit more of a dessert approach, but you still get the caffeine, and you still get the booze."

He first created the recipe for an Italian restaurant years ago, but he has continued refining it over time. "It's replicating the flavors you would find in the dessert," says Vallée, "with the Amaretto giving that kind of almond-y, orange peel, citrus element and your Frangelico, connecting with that hazelnut nuttiness. You need chocolate in your dessert, and then the Irish cream is more of something to lend the texture, and help with the espresso in creating that coffee-Irish cream marriage that you're familiar with. So, all that being the heart of your flavor profile, and then, of course, espresso and vodka to round it out."

Most of the frothy top comes from the crema you get when brewing espresso. "We do Lavazza pod espresso. I think medium and dark roast work the best, because you definitely want that coffee flavor to shine through." He stresses using plenty of ice and giving it a strong shake, "because you really want to create that layer of foam when you pour it into the glass. Get it frothed up real nice. That's the fun part, watching it all come together and settle out to create

those two beautiful layers." For those trying the recipe at home, "If you don't have an espresso machine at home, and you're trying to sub, say, cold brew or just coffee — it'll work, but it's not going to be quite as good. You really do need real espresso."

For this, his most recent iteration, he's replaced milk chocolate with dark chocolate liqueur. "I'm always trying to find that right contrast of flavor, with your creams and everything, to make things stand out, or to provide a better balance of the ingredients."

Am I buzzed already, or do I detect a hint of cinnamon? "I don't add anything like that. One of those liqueurs could have something in there ... " Vallée considers, and then indulges my curiosity. "I like the idea of cinnamon syrup, to replace the regular simple syrup... Let's make another one!"

SANDPIPER'S TIRAMISU



- 1 oz vodka
- •.25 oz Amaretto
- •.25 oz Frangelico or hazelnut liqueur
- •.25 oz Irish cream
- •.25 oz Mozart dark chocolate liqueur
- 1.5 oz espresso (double shot)
- •.5 oz simple syrup

Brew an espresso shot and mix with all ingredients in a shaker. Add lots of ice for froth, hard shake, and strain into a coupe. Garnish with coffee beans. Option: Swap simple syrup with cinnamon or vanilla syrup. Add a sprinkle of cinnamon or grated nutmeg.

Great mixed-bag fishing off the coast - Lake Hodges reopens

Dock Totals 5/14- 5/27: 5081 anglers aboard 247 halfday to 3-day trips out of San Diego landings over the past two weeks caught 1 barracuda, 2849 bluefin tuna (up to 186 pounds), 30 bocaccio, 73 bonito, 366 calico bass, 3 halibut, 14 lingcod, 1 opah, 11,123 rockfish, 1 triggerfish, 175 sand bass, 162 sanddab, 140 sculpin, 51 sheephead, 25 Spanish jack, 232 whitefish, and 2363 yellowtail.

Saltwater: For a predicted El Niño year, it sure has been a cool start, considering water temps and breezy conditions. Still, folks are getting out there, with angler counts going over 5000 for the first time in a two-week period thus far in 2023. By July, that should be about the weekly haul for the 1/2-Day to 3-Day fleet. Though within full-day range, bluefin have been off and on, sometimes mauling everything from jigs to weighted live bait, other times metered but tightjawed and reluctant to bite. Schools are ranging in size from a little under 30 pounds to fish pushing 200 pounds and are being found from the corner down to off Ensenada. Gear recommendations are thus ranging from light-medium 20-30-pound live-bait setups to heavier gear with 100pound braid to 80-pound leaders or more for sinker rigs and heavy jigs.

When the bluefin aren't cooperating, yellowtail have often been picking up the slack. And when both aren't in the mood, excellent rockfish action can be found on the deeper edges of the banks where the tuna are. Many offshore trips targeting bluefin are returning to the dock with a mixed bag catch of pelagics and groundfish. That can be a nice alternative to the long rides of albacore fishing back when they were starting to show in May or June, before their migratory pattern shifted north where they are within 50 miles of the coast more toward the Oregon/Washington border. Then, reports of fish outside would spur boats to be the first to find them, and usually if you didn't, there weren't many opportunities for other species.

Inshore, calico and sand bass are biting well on the kelp and flats, respectively, while halibut in the bays are being caught rather steadily for those targeting the channel edges. Surf perch are still on the chew, and many of those caught are females in the spawn mode and loaded with fry. I touched on this as far as releasing them or making sure the fry is put back if mature enough. Some will birth in the bucket, and though it's a gray area, newborn baby perch might count toward a limit if a DFW officer checks the catch. Realistically, I

into the water — or the pregnant females are released. South of the border, fishing is heating up around Ensenada as bluefin are within panga range, and the yellowtail fishing gets better as you go south. San Quintin has been very windy this spring, and though reports are few, there are some tuna and vellowtail outside off the banks if boats can get to them. That said, it has been a good early season for large surf perch, with some spawning halibut and an occasional corbina as they begin to show in the surf and up into the ghost shrimp flats in the littoral zones of San Quintin Bay. Once past the cool water trend and south of the Vizcaino peninsula, fishing has been excellent for grouper from La Bocana south, with more exotics like roosterfish showing well off Cabo and around to La Paz on the Sea of Cortez side, where yellowfin tuna, dorado, and even wahoo are biting well for *pangeros*, while the inshore fishing has produced quite a few yellowtail in the mix for the guys targeting sierra from the beach.

Moving on up the Sea of Cortez, Bahia de Los Angeles is just beginning to warm up for cabrilla and yellowtail, while a little ways north at Gonzaga, gulf grouper, cabrilla, and yellowtail fishing has been excellent since late April and throughout the month of May. So far, and though it has been mostly a cold, wet and windy start to the year, angling options in saltwater are many — and the season is just beginning.

Freshwater: Bass have been biting well at most lakes as trout season changed to catfish in those lakes that stock, with Cuyamaca being the one lake in the county that plants trout year-round. Though a few trout are still being caught at some lakes, the freshwater catch is now more channel catfish, perch, and bass. Of import, especially to the bassangling community, is the news that as of May 31, Lake Hodges will reopen to recreational activities. The 105-year-old dam failed inspections last year, and the lake was closed in May 2022, citing safety concerns with the dilapidated dam.

Though the lake will be open, the dictated low level is too low for use of the boat ramp. But rental boats are available, the tackle shop is fully stocked, and float tubes and kayaks will be allowed. Slated originally as a five-month repair, further inspections last fall and this past March prompted the Department of Safety of Dams (DSOD) to call for keeping the water levels where they are until major repairs are completed, or the dam is completely replaced. Newer estimates for completion of either repairs or replacement

You Had One Job

- Residents in Halethorpe, Maryland, are frustrated with the progress of a new bridge on U.S. Route 1, WBAL-TV reported. They've been waiting for months for the bridge to fully open, but a tiny error stands in the way. The bridge crosses over CSX railroad tracks, which require a minimum of 23 feet of vertical clearance, and it was built 1 1/2 inches too short. CSX has halted the remaining construction to complete the bridge, according to a Maryland Department of Transportation engineer. "I understand you get hiccups, but ... this is not a hiccup. This is a mistake. Somebody needs to be held accountable and it needs to be taken care of," said resident Desiree Collins. "You have engineers. This should not have happened." The State Highway Administration now estimates completion in late 2023 or early 2024.

Florida

- When the Brevard (Florida) Public Schools board met on May 9, the topic of

dress codes came up, but it went way beyond hoodies and beachwear, ClickOrlando reported. Vice chair Megan Wright told board members that she has heard concerns about students dressing up as "furries" – people who anthropomorphize animals. District 5 Rep. Katye Campbell weighed in: "I'm not a big fan of the furry movement, but ... if 'ears' means a headband with pointed ears on them, it's a hair accessory. Tails are different, and students meowing and barking at other students - that's not cool. But that's not dress code." Chairman Matt Susin said his daughter is "tired of furries" at school and the subject comes up at least once a month at his dinner table. Leave it to District 3 Rep. Jennifer Jenkins to cut through the kitty litter: "This is not rocket science ... If you don't want tails on kids, just say you don't want tails." She said among middle school students, the new thing is barking and meowing at each other, unrelated to furry costumes: "It's weird, but they're doing it.'

Unclear on the Concept

- Jerry Martin had what he thought was a winning idea for a retail shop: The Drug Store, where people could buy cocaine, heroin, meth and MDMA that had been tested for fentanyl. *Vice* reported that Martin's mobile shop, in Vancouver, Canada, was open less than 24 hours when he was arrested for drug trafficking. The store, housed in a mobile trailer that Martin parked next to a police van, featured bright yellow boards with prices listed for all the drugs. Martin wore a stab-proof vest as he sold the items from behind a plexiglass window. According to him, his plan included getting arrested so that he could challenge "laws that prevent a safe supply and result in death by poisoning" in Canada's Charter of Rights and Freedoms.

Weird Science

- Spring weather can be unpredictable, but a man in Ankara, Turkey, got an up-close glimpse of exactly what intense winds can do on May 17, *Metro News* reported. As Onur Kalmaz looked out his window, trying to check on his car during the storm, he captured on video a sofa flying from a balcony of a 35-story block of apartments nearby. Kalmaz said the sofa crashed into other buildings before falling to the ground. "No one was hurt, but we were pretty scared," he said.

The Happiest Place on Earth

- Two families went at each other on May 15 at Walt Disney World's Magic Kingdom, Fox35-TV reported -- all over who could stand next to a sign commemorating the 100th anniversary of the Disney Co. According to police, one family was standing in front of the sign when another group wanted to snap a photo. When the second group asked the first to step aside, punches were thrown. At least one person was treated for injuries at the site, but they didn't want to press charges. Two people were removed from the park.


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
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
