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






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

Driveway condemnation

Public promenade and bike lanes both at risk from vehicular traffic

After years of delays, Normal Street's pedestrian promenade, which began as a grassroots effort in Hillcrest in 2015, is moving forward. What was the holdup?

A driveway.

Hillcrest Village Square Partners, who have owned the easement for over 50 years, have until now fought off the city's takeover of the driveway at 1440-1458 University Ave, which abuts Normal Street and is one of two access points to their businesses.

David Snyder, speaking for a partnership of four owners of East Hill 1440, whose businesses use the driveway, said "the center's Normal Street access is critical for the safety of our customers and the pedestrians and cyclists who use this area — the exact groups the city and SANDAG are looking to protect."

The closure of the driveway, "moves vehicle traffic from the lowest point of pedestrian and cyclist interaction to the intersection with the highest count of pedestrians and cyclists," he added. "Increased conflicts are

"probable amount of compensation" for the property is \$85,000. The final amount will be decided by a court or through continued negotiations with the owners.

For now, the city "needs to move forward to acquire the easement of access to meet project deadlines."

The work is currently in the final steps of design; the goal is to start construction in 2024.

Last week, the city council adopted a resolution of necessity to begin the eminent domain process to acquire the property for the Normal Street Promenade project, which will support the San Diego Regional Bike Plan.

A portion of Normal Street will be reduced from four lanes to two lanes to allow for a public promenade with street trees, decorative pavement, expanded gathering spaces, and a separate bikeway.

The new public space was envisioned as part of the Uptown Community Plan in 2016, as well as SANDAG's bikeways project. It was approved as a Capital Improvements Project in 2019.

Both sides say safety is a central concern.

The city says the driveway must close, or else the promenade likely can't proceed, due to vehicles crossing it. In order to use eminent domain, the project has to serve public interest and acquisition of the property must be necessary.

Supporters called on the city to move forward without any more delays.

Several redesigns and accommodations were made at the request of Hillcrest Village Square Partners. The city commissioned a parking study to evaluate impacts to the Partners' parking lot.

Mary Carlson, assistant deputy director of the city department of real estate, said the driveway was appraised for \$50,000. The

Lithium-ion battery fires becoming more common Bird scooters replaced by burnt scooters

On May 18, a Zero electric scooter caught fire at an apartment complex in Normal Heights. The Thursday night fire by the hillside overlooking Mission Valley and just west of the 805 was the fifth lithiumion battery fire in San Diego County reported in 2023. Also referred to as a Li-ion battery, it was the cause of another fire on an airplane that left San Diego International Airport earlier in the year.

News outlets worldwide report that rechargeable lithium-ion battery fires are more prevalent because of the inferior composition of certain cheaper-made batteries. And San Diego County is feeling the heat as well.

"San Diego Fire Rescue responded to a report of an apartment fire near the 9000 block of Idaho Street," reads a 911 VIDEO lithium-ion is a certain type of chemical where it's classified a certain way," said Josh A. in a recent interview with me. "It's Class 9. [The batteries are] manufactured, packaged, and shipped a certain way. And there's a first responder response to those types of Class 9 fires where hazmat responds to lithium-ion battery fires."

Josh, who requested only to use his first name, was a firefighter for a couple of years.

"You can't just spray water on it; if you spray water on electricity and if you mix water with that chemical, it's going to arc even more and create more of a fire."

The 1:45 minute video clip of the Normal Heights scooter fire aftermath depicts a woman getting treated by fire department personnel "for minor burns," which she sustained "while attempting to put the fire out."

"If you see a [e-bike or e-scooter] fire," reads the *SanDiego.gov* site, "leave the building immediately. Don't try to fight the fire.

On April 3, on Dumas Street in the Liberty Station neighborhood, a lithium battery stored in a closet reportedly self-combusted

and ignited a fire, said 911 VIDEO NEWS. The blaring smoke detectors woke up the family, then they, including their dogs, immediately left the house.

A day prior, on April 2, about 8 miles southwest of Liberty Station, 911 VIDEO NEWS reported about another fire in Logan Heights. "The couple was inside their apartment, and they were charging their electric bike inside. The lithium battery overheated and started a fire. The male attempted to put the fire out when the battery exploded and sent the acid all over the male. He was badly burned and transported to the UCSD Burn Center. The female ran out of the apartment completely naked. Neighbors who evacuated the apartment complex gave her blankets to cover herself."

In March, a city of Carlsbad spokesperson reportedly said two fires in their coastal city were attributed to lithium-ion batteries, the latter to an electric scooter and its charger.

Defective and damaged batteries can overheat, catch fire, or explode, adds the city of San Diego site. And on top of that, lithium-ion battery fires emit toxic gases, burn-

ing exceedingly hot.

In February, a lithium-ion battery caught on fire in a cabin on a United Airlines airplane that left San Diego en route to Newark, New Jersey, reported NBC News. Seven people were injured on the flight, and the pilot returned to San Diego.

The city site adds

to look out for "these problems with the battery: unusual odor, change in color, too much heat, change in shape, leaking, smoking, or not keeping a charge." And if you need to get rid of the batteries from your home or workplace, do not discard the lithium-ion batteries in the trash, but instead drop off the batteries at a local battery recycling location or contact your local waste department for disposal instructions.

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

DNA's TJ terror Border Patrol units in San Diego and El Centro rank high on the list of entities that collected the most DNA samples from detainees last year, with San Diego gathering 44,757 and El Centro bagging 29,451, according to a May 24 report to two Congressional committee chairs from Rebecca Gambler, Director, Homeland Security and Justice in the Government Accountability Office. Del Rio, Texas tops the list with 151.843, while the lowest was the Havre, Mon-

tana office near the border with Canada, with only 24.

But House Republicans remain unassuaged. "You asked us to examine [Customs and Border Patrol's] implementation of the DNA Fingerprint Act of 2005," says Gambler's letter to Homeland Security committee chair Mark E. Green and Border Security and **Enforcement Subcommittee** chair Clay Higgins. Though Gambler's report notes that the

Improvement is promised, per the letter. "According to FBI officials, CBP's demand for DNA collection kits has at times led to limitations in the supply of kits available. ance with a rule requiring listed companies to have a minimum \$15 million market value for publicly held shares. The company had 180 days to regain compliance, a deadline that hit earlier this month. Unable to regain compliance, NantHealth on May 11 filed a request for a hearing before a Nasdaq panel. The hearing was set to take place June 8, but more than a week after NantHealth filed its request, the company withdrew it. According to a filing with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission, the company 'determined that it is no longer in its best interest to pursue continued listing of its common stock on the Nasdaq Global Select Market."

Explains the website Investopedia.com: "Playing in Pink Sheets stocks can be fun and rewarding, but also highly risky. These stocks tend to be of very small and financially questionable companies, feature wide bid-ask spreads with low liquidity, and are less regulated than large exchanges. Investors should exercise caution and follow their own due diligence before jumping into trading the Pink Sheets."... California Senate Democratic pro Tem Toni Atkins picked up \$75,000 for her so-called ballot measure committee from the California Real Estate PAC on May 24. The LA law and lobbying firm of Nossaman, LLP gave \$5500 to the Atkins for Lt. Governor 2026 committee on May 30. State disclosure filings show that Nossaman received \$302,178 during the first quarter of this year from a bevy of California state house lobbying clients, including Florida's Bureau Veritas Holdings, Inc. and its subsidiary Bureau Veritas National Elevator Inspection Services, Inc., San Diego-based California American Water, and the Olivenhain Municipal Water District.

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UNREAL **E**STATE

San Diego's original city charter dates back to 1850, the same year California was granted statehood. Two years later, however, the city was bankrupt and the state revoked that charter, handing over control of the fledgling community to a board of trustees. It would take until 1889 for San Diego to regain its cityhood. Coincidentally, that's the same year that the Long-Waterman Mansion, a Oueen Anne Victorian, was constructed in Bankers Hill — so named for

its wealthy early inhabitants — east of downtown. Originally built for local businessman John Long (who ran out of money during the construc-

tion), it quickly passed to outgoing California governor Robert Whitney Waterman. Waterman completed the build and, intending to spend his retirement in the residence, instead died several months later.

According to agent remarks from the real estate website *Redfin.com*,

"the elegant residence, listed on the National Register of Historic Places as site #37, boasts an impressive 6180 square feet on a 14,415 square foot lot, blocks from San Diego's iconic Balboa Park." It continues, 'The exquisite craftsmanship is noted by the turrets and balconies resplendent with ornate iron work," and indeed, the balconies on the first and third floors of the rounded corner tower of the building do look quite impressive from the street. Small surprise that our photo tour begins with several angles of this side of the house.

We pass the original carriage house, which is currently being used as commercial office space, and get a close-up look at some of that ornate iron (along with some stained glass windows and an

ornately carved front door) before making our way inside. "Upon entering the main house, you will embrace the prominence of this true architectural masterpiece," the listing promises. "The grand foyer showcases original carved anaglyph on the staircase's curved facade, creating a stunning focal point." I had to consult a dictionary to learn that "anaglyph" is simply a fancy word for "carved," so we've got a bit of redundancy there. The staircase certainly is grand, however, and given the hours of labor that likely went into it, you probably won't ever see something like this in a modern build.

I'm ready to move on, but before we leave, the listing would also like us to know that "the continued on page 16

Goth rock

There is an underground music scene in San Diego. It begins along a tiny stretch of the Pacific Coast Highway in Encinitas that mimics, in a desultory way, Haight Street or the hipper end of Melrose or Second Avenue near the Bowery. On it there are several used-clothing stores; a shop where you can get leather studs. 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I've been doing tours in Tijuana for more than 11 years. I remember my first client well. Back then, I announced my tours on Craigslist. Back then, my tours and Tijuana were much different than what they are now. His name was Rudy; he was a 40-year-old Italian-American from New York with a thick "I'm walkin' here" accent. Rudy came to Tijuana for one thing only: brothels. But like a proper tour guide, I showed him more of the city than he bargained for. I explained why there were numerous farmacias and dentistas on every corner. He started to see Tijuana in a new light, as more than just a place for sex tourism.

Rudy wasn't much of a drinker, but back then, the available options were mostly dive bars, so it was no great loss. But when

it came to food, I told him I knew of a great seafood place nearby. Alas, Rudy said he didn't eat seafood, and requested chicken tacos. I was baffled and taken aback. Chicken tacos aren't really a thing in Mexican restaurants — at least not in Mexico. Some have *pollo asado*, but it's rare to see chicken tacos in taquerías. Mexicans



usually buy a chicken at a rotisserie, which includes tortillas, rice, beans, and salsa. Some even go to KFC and bring their own tortillas to make chicken tacos.

I took Rudy to a restaurant in Avenida Revolución that I had never been to, but I knew it had chicken tacos on the menu. They were bad, but Rudy seemed satisfied. That restaurant has changed names a dozen times during my years in Tijuana; it continues to be bad. After lunch, I took Rudy to do his thing in Zona Norte. He found a girl that he liked and asked a photographer to take their picture. The first picture was an awkward snap of them standing and holding hands as if they were going to prom together, except she was almost naked. In the second picture, Rudy had his face in the middle of her breasts. Rudy had the time of his life in Tijuana, and paid me more than my asking price. Later, he came back to Tijuana to get dental work and for more sex tourism.

My biggest regret about that day was not insisting to Rudy that we could have had way better food. Even if he didn't think he liked seafood. He didn't know the seafood wonderland that Tijuana can provide. Seafood surrounds me in my Tijuana life. "SHRIMP!!!!" my old roommate used to yell out when he was too hungover to function. Just a few steps away from my apartment in downtown Tijuana, there's a seafood cart named El Buzo. A shrimp cocktail costs around \$12, and it was my roommate's favorite hangover cure (plus more Tecate). El Buzo has been serving seafood on that corner since the 1970s (the owner took over from his father).

Tijuana has nurtured me into a seafood obsession (among many other things). When people contact me for a private tour, I always ask the same question: do you like seafood and craft beer? If they don't, I am not the tour guide for them. Presented here are some of the most unique seafood tacos, tostadas, or other seafood presentations in this town, the ones that I find myself going back to again and again. If you plan a Tijuana trip and love seafood, save this copy of the Reader.



Otto's menu includes some of the best oysters I've found in the city, plus seafood tacos, tostadas, specialty plates, and appetizers, all made in traditional Baja style.

1. La Corriente -Cevichería Nais

I've been coming to this place since before I moved to Tijuana in 2012. Their red snapper tostada was and remains their main feature. The first time I visited, the number of tostadas sold was displayed on a blackboard counter: 8000+. On a later visit, it was around 330,000+. Eventually, the tally was removed; when I asked the manager about it, he didn't give me a reason why. But the tostada remained.

Today, the place has grown; there are multiple locations, including Rosarito, Monterrey, and Mexico City. The menu has expanded and prices have gone up, but the quality is the same. Though some of my favorite items are gone, they have been replaced by items that are arguably better. I used to get a *pulpo pacheco*, half a grilled octopus served with tortillas, rice, and beans. Off the

menu now, but the more popular and bigger plate *pulpo entero zarandeado* remains: a whole chargrilled octopus in adobo accompanied by rice and Cambray potatoes.

Two new items (marked by a red star) quickly became my favorites: shrimp enchilado in flour tortillas, Arabian style with jocoque (fermented milk, inspired by Lebanese cuisine) and a squeeze of lemon juice; and the tostada Pácifico, slices of tuna topped with scallops in black salsa and serrano chiles.

To go with the great food, the drinks and ambiance are also spot on. Their featured drink is the mezcalita, eight flavors of a margarita-like concoction that replaces tequila with mezcal. The roof is made with palm trees, and the whole place makes you feel like you're steps away from the beach instead of the dirty streets of downtown Tijuana. The music, partially curated by DJ Chucuchu, features cumbias mixed with pop songs. The DJ even has a plate named after him: camarones Chucuchu, shrimp filled with marlin and accompanied by rice, veggies, and fries.

I've taken more than a hundred tourists from



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


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all over the world to this establishment, and it has never failed to impress.

LOCATION: The original spot and the one reviewed is on the corner of 6th Street and Calle Madero. Two more locations in Tijuana (La Cacho and Las Palmas).

PRICE: I usually spend \$25-40 on myself.

2. Los Compadres

"I miss eating those tacos, sometimes I dream of it," texts my friend Andrei from Kentucky after I post a picture of my breakfast. When friends or tourists stay in Tijuana for the night and visit me in the morning, I take them to Los Compadres. If I upload a picture to social media, I get flooded with questions as to where to find this taco (and many similarly jealous comments).

Los Compadres is open 7 am to 3 pm daily, except Sundays. They start running out of shrimp around 1 pm, so you need to get there early. They also serve fish and shrimp tacos (with or without batter), caldo de cahuamanta (stingray broth), marlin tacos, and more. But the main reason to go is the *camarón* enchilado. I could write a love song about this taco. It's gigantic, greasy, has lots of melted cheese that gets burnt around the crust of the tortilla, and is loaded with a lot of flash-fried shrimp that have been dunked in buttery chili sauce. It is topped (all optional) with cream, cabbage, tomato, cilantro, and chipotle sauce. It's a complex and messy item to pick up and eat. I go back at least once a month to partake in my shrimp enchilado ritual. I've taken people from all over the world to try it, and every once in a while I get a message that they are thinking about those shrimp tacos.

None of the ingredients are gourmet or fancy. It's a dirty fish taco truck just like the Tijuana gods intended. They have a tip jar in the form of a Tecate bottle. Drop some coins in when you finish your meal and shout "Por la causa!" — "for the cause." The cause is to buy more Tecate.

Los Compadres became El Compadre when one of the two taqueros died during Covid times (his death was not Covid -related). RIP Guillermo Mireles. Angel, the remaining compadre, still slings tacos with his family in the same corner.

LOCATION: On the corner of 5 de Mayo and 4th Street, next to Parque Teniente Guerrero.

PRICE: I spend less than \$10 for two shrimp enchilado tacos.

3. Otto's Grill inside Teléfonica Gastro Park

Teléfonica Gastro Park was originally behind Teléfonos de Mexico (hence the name) back in 2014 when it was founded. It started with a burger truck named Maquina 65 by chef Bernardo González, parked on an empty lot. More trucks like La Carmelita (by chef José Figueroa), Humo (by chef Giovanni Brassea), Don Ramen (by chef Adria Marina), and Otto's Grill (by chef Otto Spohn) joined the project. I have pictures of myself with tourists from this old location.

In 2016, it moved to a bigger location just a couple blocks away that includes a warehouse with a brewery (Cerveza Lírica), more restaurants, a second floor with an art room, and a bigger patio. A family-friendly crowdpleaser with a bit of everything, it's a good place to take groups of tourists

with different dietary wants or needs.

Some of the restaurants that founded the food park have moved on and grown into different projects, but Otto's Grill remains. Otto's menu includes some of the best ovsters I've found in the city, plus seafood tacos, tostadas, specialty plates, and appetizers, all made in traditional Baja style. Its specialty taco is a "taquesos," a taco made with burnt cheese instead of a tortilla, filled with shrimp, fish, octopus, or marlin. But of all the options in Teléfonica, Otto's

spicy tuna tostada is my top choice: fresh chunks of tuna with spicy oil, chives, cucumber, sesame seed, and habanero creamy salsa.

LOCATION: Teléfonica Gastro Park is on the main boulevard "Boulevard Agua Caliente" or "El Bule" not far from downtown (Blvd. Agua Caliente 8860).

PRICE: My favorite tuna tostada goes for \$3.50. The rest is modestly priced and well

4. Tacosteño

The first time I saw Tacosteño, I was put off by

their over-the-top mouthful of a slogan: "Gastro taqueria artesanal & cocina urbana de autor con bases en la cocina Baja-Med casi autosustentable 100% Mexicano." And their tuna tostada fell on the sweet side, while the fish taco was lackluster. But then I tried their black tentacle: octopus with huitlacoche (corn smut) quesadilla on a blue corn tortilla, topped off with a green garlic and cilantro sauce. For the uninitiated: huitlacoche is described as the food of the (Aztec) gods; it's a fungus that grows on corn. Also known as the Mexican truffle, huitlacoche makes a delectable pairing with octopus; but it's a combination I've never seen anywhere except at Tacosteño.

For years, my meal of choice in Teléfonica was a tuna tostada from Otto's followed by a pair of octopus tacos from Tacosteño, and a beer. But on my last visit, I found out Tacosteño had left the park. It took me a while to track the restaurant down, but I found it a mile away in a different food collective called "Food Trucks Express." The space was desolate when I arrived; the other restaurants seemed generic.

I was greeted by chef Rodolfo Luviano, who explained that Teléfonica's market shifted and it wasn't the place for

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Tacosteño anymore. In this new spot, he serves barbacoa on the weekends under the name La Barbacha and he operates as Tacosteño throughout the week (or catering events). Chef Rodolfo served me two of his newest dishes: a spicy white marlin tostada, and a clam prepared with xoconostle (the fruit of cactus, similar to a prickly pear but more acidic than sweet).

Wherever Tacosteño goes, as the city changes, I'll follow for that black tentacle tostada.

LOCATION: Unknown — Chef Luviano recently deleted the social media for his restaurant.

PRICE: The first time I had that octopus taco, it was around \$2, but it is closer to \$4 now. Whatever the cost, it's worth it.

5. From Kokopelli to Tras/Horizonte

Kokopelli started as a street cart on Calle Ocampo in 2011. They served a handful of tacos: one of their most popular was the Kraken, a grilled octopus taco in a charred tortilla. The ceviche de lenguado, "Black Harder," was another big hit. Gringo en Vacaciones con Tuxedo is shrimp inside a chile California (nonspicy). The red shrimp looks like a white

American after a day on the beach; the chile works as the tuxedo.

Chef Guillermo "Oso" Campos worked the truck together with his brother Pablo and a bunch of his friends. I still remember El Grillo's smile as he happily delivered tacos to my tourists back in the day. The menu soon expanded to include more seafood and experimental cuisine, including sweet salmon in a flour tortilla taco, grilled portobello tacos, and a taco with panela cheese and crickets. Yes, the insect.

Kokopelli quickly became notorious in the Baja Med scene, and they tried expanding to other locations, including a venture in one of Chicago's top finedining neighborhoods. The Chicago Reader did not give Kokopelli favorable reviews; they said, "it's lost in the crowd." Kokopelli Chicago lasted less than a year, opening and closing in 2015. For a while, it seemed like Kokopelli was gone, not only from Chicago, but from Tiiuana as well.

But in late 2016, it was reborn as Tras/Horizonte. Chef Oso acquired a big warehouse space next to a giant candy shop, behind the police station in Zona Rio. The Kokopelli cart rests in the parking lot (I miss it dearly). The big open space features a side patio, a large bar and dining room, and an open kitchen with a grill that is somehow also

a fountain. A separate space in the back houses fermenter tanks; Tras/Horizonte makes their own brand of beer.

The bigger space comes with a bigger menu: new plates like the Aluxe, salmon ceviche with mango, tamarind, and local herbs; or the Atun Sangre (or blood tuna), home-cured for 12 hours on worm salt, chilhuacle chile, and jicama.

In 2018, I private messaged Chef Oso for a special dinner for my thengirlfriend's birthday. I told him she loved octopus and spicy food. Chef Oso prepared us a spicy grilled octopus with chimichurri and a mix of chiles on a bed of risotto. And for her birthday cake, he presented a "Terrario Comestible" — a fishbowl that looked like a terrarium filled with mushrooms, ice cream, crumpled sugar to resemble dirt, edible flowers, and other magically delicious sweet things that tasted nothing like what they looked like.

LOCATION: Río Colorado 9680, Marron, 22015 Tijuana, B.C. or near Cuahutemoc statue, head up the hill and find the big warehouse.

PRICE: Oh! I yearn for the prices from before, but Oso's tacos are not from a taco truck anymore. Upscale restaurant feel requires upscale restaurant prices. But well worth it.

6. La Cahua del Yeyo

Tijuana is rapidly changing. I visited Cahua del Yeyo in August of 2022; a month later, it was demolished. The original location — since 1996 — was on the corner of 8th Street and Sirak Baloyan. It moved half a block away, and the new spot looks similar to the original: an unfinished, improvised, dive-y shack with plastic chairs and tables. But now, the construction of a 20+ story building looms in the background.

A staple of Tijuana this place was featured by Andrew Zimmern's Bizarre Foods in 2009. The logo of the restaurant is a loggerhead sea turtle (tortuga caguama) riding an SUV with two palm trees. The turtle was one of the two main ingredients of the cahuamanta soup, the other being manta ray. Alas, the cahua part of the portmanteau has been il-

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legal since 2012; the soup doesn't contain turtles anymore, just manta. Their other main feature is aleta (tuna fin) — the meat is gelatinous with a strong sea flavor. It's an acquired taste that not many tourists can stomach.

La Cahua also has shrimp, octopus, moronga (blood sausage), marlin, and chilpacholi (blue crab stew). All are available in a variety of forms and combinations: a soft shell taco, a hard shell taco (taco dorado), "taco Lalo" (from a secret menu, it's a hard shell inside a soft shell), as an order, or in a soup (named "jugo vichi").

On my latest visit to their new location, a sign outside read "NO HAY ALETA" warning me that there was no tuna fin. I got a taco dorado with chilpacholi on top, a crunchy, delightful disaster drowned in salsas. I followed it with a jugo vichi with shrimp with a touch of red wine (another house secret). And to finish my seafood breakfast, a traditional marlin taco.

La Cahua del Yevo is a morning joint for hangover cures (it closes at 3 pm). They also have your traditional commercial Mexican beers as well as

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LOCATION: Ocampo 1542, Zonaeste, unless they demolish this building as well and it gets pushed some-

PRICE: Regular seafood joint prices, except for specialty items which can add up to way more.

7. Trucha and **Tito's Tacos**

When I first moved to Tijuana, Tito's tacos were my saviors. The cost of a fish taco was around \$1, and their tacos are so big that with two, it feels like

you've had a heavy lunch. Their menu is huge, and includes all of the seafood standards that you could imagine. Beyond that, there is a variety of pastas and even flank steak. But back in the day, I was broke and I got only the cheap fish tacos — until one day, I bit into a taco with undercooked batter and raw fish on the inside. After that, I didn't want to go to Tito's ever again.

With eight locations, Tito's Tacos has been around in Tijuana for over 50 years. But it wasn't

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until late 2019 that they created a spin-off named Trucha (as in "trout," but there's also a Mexican slang meaning, so be alert). Trucha opened in the heart of downtown Tijuana on Avenida Revolución between 5th and 6th. On my first visit, I was unimpressed: their shrimp tacos were small and expensive and the Rockefeller ovsters topped with cream of spinach was underwhelming. I didn't want to go there ever again, either.

But one day, after dropping off my ex-girlfriend in Playas de Tijuana, I got stuck in traffic. I was too hungry to sit in traffic, so I decided to give Tito's one more chance. I discovered that Tito's in Playas also serves the menu from their new

upscale Trucha. So I put Trucha to the test and ordered a shrimp enchilado taco and a poke tostada. As expected, the shrimp enchilado taco was massive, with tons of melted cheese, a plethora of prawns, and a bitter spicy black sauce with peanuts. Not as good as my favorite shrimp enchilado, but still, a promising sign that Tito's was in fact better than before.

The poke tostada was what made me include them on this list: a blue corn tostada topped with chunks of bluefin tuna with shichimi togarashi aioli, peanuts, masago, seaweed salad, and more Asian ingredients. I was so impressed that it became my favorite tuna tostada in Tijuana, even topping Otto's Grill.

famous TikToker from New York named "SoupyGarbageJuice" and his friend. I didn't warn him about how big the tacos were. We ordered so much food. SoupyGarbageJuice ordered tostada campechana: a bowl of shrimp, octopus, clam, tuna, avocado, onions, and cilantro with multiple tostadas on the side. His friend ordered two fish tacos and a "California Tito's" — shrimp inside a chile, similar to Kokopelli's Gringo en Vacaciones con Tuxedo, but three times the size. I ventured forth and ordered the "Taco Trucha," another massive thing in a flour tortilla packed with burnt cheese, breaded New York steak, shrimp, chipotle sauce, pickled red onions, and avocado. I also got a "Taco Chilindrino:" steak, mushrooms, and shrimp inside a quesadilla. I could eat only one taco, SoupyGarbageJuice and his friend ate just half of what they ordered.

On my last visit to

Tito's, I took a quasi-

LOCATION: Tito's has several locations; the original is in Playas de Tijuana. Trucha is on La Revu.

PRICE: Tito's is cheap, Trucha is not. Both have hit-and-miss things on the menu that could be very well worth it. Most items are massive.

8. La Barra Conchita **Raw Bar**

As a tour guide, I feel like it's my responsibility to try out the newest seafood places. La Barra Conchita opened at the beginning of 2023 with chef Diego Hernández Baquedano from Ensenada. Diego Hernández was featured in Anthony Bourdain's episode in Baja when he visited the chef's restaurant Corazon de Tierra, which closed in 2020. "Extraordinary meal chef, thank you. I really really

enjoyed it, it was great." Bourdain tells Chef Diego in the episode while shaking his hand. Later, he observes: "It's interesting though, he clearly knows French technique, but his Iedi masters were all Mexican." Bourdain's meal included: a roasted tuna belly with daikon garnish, kohlrabi, nasturtium, mizuna, and lemon oil; and a black bean braised leg of lamb, with Swiss chard, carrot, radish, and turnip.

Chef Diego's newest project is all seafood, Ensenada style, featuring aguachiles, clams, ceviches, oysters, tostadas, cocktails, seafood cones, and more. I got a clam mixed with a seafood medley of octopus, shrimp, and scallops. And when tiradito is on the menu, I order it. Tiradito is a Peruvian version of sashimi bathed in lemon juice and chiles that many seafood restaurants in Baja have adopted. La Barra Conchita offers tiraditos of tuna, abalone, and jurel (Pacific crevalle jack); when I visited, they had only the latter. Oysters were lackluster, but the sauce rescued them, reminding me of my favorite oyster sauce in Ensenada, at Mariscos el Güero. I finished my visit with a couple of tostadas: one smoked tuna and the other one crab pâté, both with a similar medley of seafood on top. It's hard to not love something when it hits everything I like.

The only issue is that the space is tiny. You've seen tiny houses; prepare for tiny restaurants. No more than eight people can fit in there comfortably. Because of this, I could use it only for a private tour of no more than 5 people.

LOCATION: Av. Rio Bravo 9987, Revolucion, near the Big Boy.

PRICE: Given the chef's background in Valle de Guadalupe and how small the place is, and inflation. I was worried about the prices. But it wasn't as expensive as I thought it would be. I need to go back and try the rest of their menu, especially their main gimmick, a seafood cone.

9. Mariscos Las 5 Esquinas

Like a good millennial, I'm always posting the food I eat. People are always asking for recommendations or telling me where to go. Many friends told me that the best fish taco in Tijuana was Mariscos las 5 Esquinas. Situated at an intersection with five corners on Second Street going west to Playas (before El Soler), it is a seafood truck next to two farmacias.

Though the fish taco is up there with the best the city has to offer, it is similar to many other food trucks. After I posted that it was just an okay taco, my friend replied: "Get the perrón; tell them Gabriel sent you so they make it extra perrón."

The next week I went to try the perrón. And the week after. And almost everv week since I first had it. But do not confuse the 5 Esquinas "tacos perrones" with Rosarito's famous "Tacos El Yaqui Perrones." Rosarito's tacos are flank steak, these are seafood. Two tortillas with melted cheese, topped with plenty of smoked tuna, shrimp, cream, and avocado. Decorate your taco with an arrangement of toppings at your pleasure. Pickled onions and habanero salsa do the trick for me.

The menu of the small food truck is big; it offers eight different tostadas, 15 different tacos, a handful of seafood cocktails, soups, and snacks. Unfortunately, I haven't tried any of them. because I'm addicted to their taco perrón.

LOCATION: Las 5 Esquinas...

PRICE: The taco perrón goes for 65 pesos, or around \$4. The standard fish taco is \$2.50. The rest of the menu is equally cheap seafood truck pricing.

10. Mariscos Los Chilos

"My mom used to take me

there when she was pregnant with me," said Chef José Figueroa when he saw my post about Mariscos Los Chilos. Like a true Tijuanense, the chef's relationship with fish tacos started before he was even born. This food truck houses my favorite fish taco. It's your basic fish taco: simple, yet delicious. Topped with the usual salsa bandera, cabbage, and cream (I opt to not get cream and use the chipotle instead). The fish has a golden crispy batter, crunchy yet soft. Though my mom was nowhere near this food truck when she was pregnant with me, somehow, this fish taco makes me feel at home.

Los Chilos serves the other classic seafood items most trucks have: shrimp, enchilados, marlin, and seafood medley soup. The latter is another favorite of mine: a large styrofoam cup for \$6 filled with shrimp, clam, fish, and vegetables, with tortillas on the side and salsa to taste. Again, it's soup that's not out of this world, but it somehow reminds me of a childhood beach home I never had.

The food truck has been around for 40 years. It used to be named Mariscos San Francisco, then morphed into Los Chilos (for a couple of years, it had both names). In 2023 they expanded to a sit-down restaurant in Playas de Tijuana; they expanded their menu and started serving beer. (It was common for people around the food truck to drink beer in hidden styrofoam cups; their new location fixes that.)

LOCATION: Outside Autozone on Third Street and H Avenue, downtown, Tijuana.

PRICE: Cheap and plenty. I never spend more than \$10 and I walk away full and happy.

Other notables and no-gos

There are seafood carts and restaurants spread throughout Tijuana. There are more than a dozen in downtown alone. Every Tijuanense has a seafood of choice. When I asked my brother what his favorite restaurant was, he said Mariscos El Socio — it was the first seafood place he took me to before I even moved to Tijuana. El Socio's ceviche is cheap and plentiful. Great value for the buck. The restaurant has a garbage can with a ceramic pelican as a lid and a ceramic octopus on the rooftop — as if it were a tourist attraction. My brother's favorite street seafood is Mariscos Puerto Angel; they are similar to other seafood carts on the list, though in my opinion, slightly inferior. But it's the closest seafood stand to his place (near Colonia



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

Independencia), which counts for a lot.

Many Tijuanenses will get angry that I didn't include El Mazateño on this list. Trust me, I've been there. They are great tacos, but not my personal favorite. I'm aware of the existence of Los Arcos, a family-friendly chain and a Tijuana favorite. It is not the best for a single guy who likes to show foreigners around. I had a horrible experience at El Negro Durazo; I will never return. (Even without that experience, that place wasn't for me.) Alga Bien has better and more creative tacos than some other places, and a variety of craft beer in el malecón de *Playas* (the boardwalk by the beach). But they play g pop music incessantly, and u they play it loud. I like going to Mariscos Machatlán to add some variety to my usual seafood taco spots. I've taken tourists; they enjoy the old-school feel and the colorful mural, but they are not impressed as with other spots.

Caldos Don Tony has been running for more than 40 years. This famous soup shop opens in the wee hours of the morning, between 1 am to 4 am, outside Santuario de Nuestra Señora del Sagrado Corazón, a church on 11th Street. I've only been there once, but I was too drunk to recollect how good the soup was. All I remember is that I was incredulous that I was watching a bride in all her white wedding dress glory with the whole party eating seafood broth at around 3 am. That's the type of city Tijuana is; if you crave seafood at those hours, you can find it. All I know about the place is what I hear from taxi drivers. They say that it's not the same as it used to be, but they also say it's still legendary.

My ex-girlfriend loved LionFish; it was her favorite restaurant, mostly because they served as many chiles toreados as she desired. They mimic the menu from La Cevicheria Nais and other restaurants, but at a value. The place is decorated with cheesy neon signs, and it has grown in size and popularity since I started going. They now have a second restaurant "LionFish La Terraza" in the third part of Tijuana. I've visited numerous times with friends, but given the choice, there are many other places I would rather be.

Not C-Biche in La Cacho. I'm not sure if they were having a bad day when I visited, but I left without looking back. Perhaps Puerto Cocina Urbana in Zona Río. They had Belching Beaver's Phantom Bride on tap when I visited, just one of a great selection of craft beers. The oysters were on point, I got a shrimp al pastor quesadilla that had a nice paprika kick with a tinge of pineapple, and a massive tostada with a seafood medley.

There are many places I've never been. I still haven't been to Mariscos Ruben or Erizo Marketo by Chef Plascencia. Mariscos La Guerrerense from Ensenada just got here a few days before I finished writing all this. It is next on my list.

New places open. Classics fade away. And I am sure many more gems are missing. Everyone has their own favorite Tijuana seafood place. But after a decade, these are mine.

intricately designed mahogany fireplace and artisan-stained leaded glass window add to the grandeur" of the room. Oh, and there are three more of those mahogany fireplaces elsewhere in the home. Can we move on now?

No, we cannot: there are more pictures of the staircase, including several that zoom in on the wood carvings, then another couple shots of the foyer, where we see a small table and chairs tucked into a round area behind the fireplace. Then there are more pictures of the fireplace and stained glass. We're a third of the way through our photo tour and we haven't left the entry!

Finally, we are allowed into what looks to be a living room of sorts, though there's a desk just past the entryway, facing away from the middle of the room. The carpet is very busy, though probably the right style for a home of this vintage, and I like the wood trim around the windows and passageways. There are some large posts dividing this portion of the living room from another, cozier sitting area that is focused on one of the fireplaces. I don't know that I like the posts, but perhaps they're structural? Of course, we can't pass by them without looking at some more close-ups of "ornately hand carved wood details," which seem to be everywhere. Did Mr. Long go broke building this house because of how many people he had

only six people at the table. There's a close-up of the "delicate crystal chandeliers" (actually there are several of these), and a small hole in the wall through which servants can pass food from the kitchen before a wooden door is slammed down to keep their prying eyes away from the dinner guests. The kitchen itself is fairly pedestrian, and again, smaller than I'd expect for a house of this size. But of course, the original owners probably built the space more to be functional for the help than for their own use and enjoyment. We move quickly on to what I think is a powder room, where the focus is a sink that has a floral pattern painted inside the bowl and a faucet that someone probably should have cleaned before taking such a focused shot of it. Hammering home our laser focus on small details, we next get to see a picture that shows only a door hinge — even these are patterned, antique affairs, with gold screws standing out against a darker metal face.

Upstairs, we see a

round-walled office that is fairly simply adorned with a single desk, a side table, and another fireplace. I like the look of this space, but the curved outer wall probably doesn't lend itself to adding any bookcases or other furniture. Then another couple of offices and a simple-looking bathroom before going up to the attic. The space here is unfinished, but I like it that way, and would probably make this into some sort of game room. It would be nearly impossible to get a pool table or Skee-Ball machine up here, but if I have the money for this house, I can probably pay someone to figure it out for me.

And that's it. We get a quick peek off the upper balcony, and then we're back outside with our tour concluded. Before we leave, the listing agent would like us to know that the home's historical designation means it qualifies for significant tax savings — it's been owned by the same family for decades, and right now it's assessed based on a value of just \$717,000, Public records list the owners of the Long-Waterman Mansion as an Ernst Family Trust. It was offered for sale for the first time in late May; the asking price of \$6,485,000 remains unchanged to date. ■

San Diego Reader: Why did you become

Pastor Patrick Cho: My whole life, I thought I was going to become a doctor. Since I was coming from an Asian home, my parents were thrilled — it wasn't something they had to force on me. But when I got to college, I

realized it wasn't a good fit. It was in college, too, that I began to take the things of the faith more seriously. I joined a Bible study on campus. It really changed my life. That's when I became a genuine Christian, even though I grew up in church. I knew that I loved telling people about what the Bible says and about the gospel. That's when I started thinking I should do ministry. I had many doubts at first, but talked to the leaders of the church, my family, my parents, and got constant affirmation from people: "Yeah, of course this is what you

should be doing." So, hesi-

tantly, I applied for seminary

and prayed, "God, I want to

do this right. If you don't want me in this, feel free to yank me from it." I trusted God every step of the way, and here I am, essentially 20 years later.

SDR: Why nondenominational?

PC: Lighthouse was nondenominational when we first got planted. We had discussions about possibly joining a denomination, but we took it day by day, saying that if it was something that would help us, we would join a denomination. But along the way, it never got to that point. We stayed nondenominational. We have always since day one had a firm commitment to teaching the Bible and allowing that to be the authority in our lives. It's still our philosophy today. **SDR**: What is the mission of your church?

PC: We really want to live up to our name. We want to be a bright shining light in this community and in the world. Obviously, as Christians we believe this world is in darkness from unbelief and sin, and God provides light through Christ and through the gospel. What an honor and joy to represent that in this world and shine the light of the truth of God in this darkness. That's been a big part of our mission. We want to preach the truth of God in love; that's always been the driving force behind what

SDR: Where do you go when vou die?

PC: There are two destinations; those who have trusted in the gospel and know that Jesus Christ is their lord and savior will go to heaven for all eternity, not on the basis of anything they have done but because of what Christ as done for us. Sadly, the has to make that decision, and those that reject him are going to face his judgment, because they have not walked in obedience to his commands and have not trusted in the Lord... The Bible is clear: our hope is not in ourselves. We can't fix ourselves or try harder. Our sin gets in the way. We need a savior, and God has provided that way of salvation through Jesus. He accomplished what we cannot. Without him, it means eternal damnation an eternity in hell, facing his judgment. – Joseph O'Brien





Western Azalea, a Native Rhododendron, is blooming this month in scattered locations throughout the county's higher mountains. Fond of semi-shade, it's often found growing along creeks and canyon bottoms. Like its ornamental cousins, western azaleas' fragrant white (sometimes pink or yellow tinted) flowers are borne in ornate clusters. Palomar Mountain State Park harbors a colony of them alongside a trail linking Doane Valley and Chimney Flats.

Agaves (aka Century Plants) are Coming into Bloom in many summer gardens this month. After a decade or more (not a century)

of growth, the larger kinds of agave send up a tall, yellow-blossomed flower stalk from a base of fleshy, succulent, thorn-tipped leaves. The stalk and basal leaves die, but suckers make new plants and begin the cycle anew.

This Month, Venus is the Brightest it has Been Since 2015. Because Venus revolves more quickly than the Earth - 224.8 days vs. 365.25 days — it takes 13 Venus years to match 8 Earth years and return to the nearest point in the orbit. The planet will appear in the WNW sky at 100 times brighter than any other star in the heavens. Venus is also one of only three celestial bodies that can cast a shadow. If you are in a rural location free of artificial lights, you'll be able to see your shadow cast by Venus light. This Venus shadow will have very sharp edges due to the lack of light spillover, because Venus is a smaller point in the sky than the sun or moon.

The subtitle for Karen Zacarias' musical is "An unapologetic telenovela for the stage," and while it is indeed unapologetic, it's also defensive to the point of being prickly. At the outset, the cast announces, "We are here to change the social order — deal with it." Um, okay?

And throughout the marvelously melodramatic story, you the viewer are reminded that if you think Latin soaps are crazy, just wait until you hear about American reality. In the first scene, a wealthy new mother conspires with a doctor to switch her sickly baby for the healthy one just born to a peasant, and the action pauses for the announcement that in the United States, one in eight babies winds up with the wrong family, at least temporarily. After a daughter shoots a man she sees attacking her father, we learn that 4.6 million American children live in a home with a loaded and unlocked gun. When adultery enters the storyline, it's "68% of women in the United States say they would have an affair if they would never get caught." And so on and so on, a level of self-consciousness over and above the one indicated by the placards announcing each scene's theme, and even the occasional, hilarious "take two" for a diva-centric scene. It's all right as far as it goes, until it goes too far, and inserts itself into the story — subtext rising unnecessarily to the level of text.

But that's not until the second act, which is where most of the show's troubles lie (songs, movement, momentum, mechanics, etc.) Before that, in the beautiful and bonkers first act, the commentary feels positively Shakespearean; the thing giving weight to the madcappery and mayhem of this story about two families intertwined by the titular destiny and desire. The song and dance are positively transporting: Bianca Marroquín's performance of "Pain Makes Me Beautiful" is some of the most fun I've ever had in a theater. The talent on display points to Broadway ambitions, and it's not hard to imagine it getting there one day. Besides being frantic and funny,

it manages to keep its heart in the right place; on its sleeve.

Lost in Yonkers

If you're a regular at Scripps Ranch Theatre, you might be wondering what exactly they were up to when they decided to follow Charlayne Woodards Neat with Neil Simon's Lost in Yonkers. Yonkers is worlds funnier than Neat, and its actors are both game and good (those teenage boys!), but there's a complication at its heart, and the similarities are too strong to avoid comparison. A refresher: Woodard's play is a memoir of her family's life with her aunt Neat, brain-damaged and so possessed of a childlike inno-



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cence — for good and ill. Simon's play recounts the Kurnitz family's life with Bella, who was nearly sent to "The Home" because, as the doctors put it, she would always be a child. There are plenty of other characters - and yeah. they're characters, including a gangster uncle, a quietly monstrous matriarch. and a couple of teenage brothers who serve as our ticket into the story - but it's Bella who drives the drama. And while she is portrayed with appealing, wide-eved, just-shy-of-manic energy by Katee Drysdale, her dialogue is not that of a child, or even a childlike adult. Not the way Neat's was. It's too smart and too good, laced with too much understanding - of herself and others — and brimming with too much grownup compassion. Maybe that's what Simon was thinking: that any grownup who can actually say what they feel, tell the ugly truth with loving honesty, and not choke on the pain and bitterness brought on by their own suffering, must be a bit touched. And that such a soul would be the only one who could ever step outside the crushing cycle of generational dysfunction the sort wrought by Grandma Kurnitz, whose foot was itself crushed by antisemites in Germany, whose husband and two of her six children died shortly after she made it to America, who had no more love to give but still had to raise a family. Anyway, it was enough to win Simon a Pulitzer in 1991, SRT mounts a fine production, and the juxtaposition is fruitful.

The Little Mermaid — Plot: a teenage girl develops an obsession with the group of people who murdered seeing him be kind to his dog. Behold the danger of improving your source material by adding backstories. The girl's father hates those people for what they did, but it's not like Mom was his one true one: to judge by his family reunions, he's got six other daughters with six other mothers. Behold the danger of improving your source material by adding diversity for its own sake. The teenager's beloved is a good bit older, but not terribly mature: he's so addled by FOMO that he's terrified of his island kingdom getting left behind in isolation, despite that island's marketplace boasting a wildly multicultural array of people and products. Behold the danger of improving your source material by adding motivations from your studio's last hit about an island people. (The wanderlust didn't make much sense in Moana, either, since there was no need to go exploring once the sea blight had been cured, but never mind.) Once she gains access to her beloved's world, our Little Mermaid sees a painting of fish on hooks, wonders if her kind are "only food for slaughter," then rhymes that with, "But you were lonely underwater!" Behold the danger of improving your source material with new music. Her goal is to get her beloved to give her the kiss of true love without ever saying a word, but in order to dodge any possible criticism about such an arrangement, she is bewitched into forgetting her goal. Some may find this a satisfactory solution, others may say the dramatic takeback just points to the danger of trying to make a rom-com out of a fairy tale. But really, all this is quibbling: the real problem here is that the film looks and sounds terrible, at least in the screening I attended. The sunlight under the sea is less dim and watery than the sunlight above. The sound under the sea is weirdly echo-y. The famous wave crash behind Ariel as she hits her big note cuts to a shot of calm waters. Her hair switches from free-flowing strands to thick dreadlocks, depending on whether or not the underwater CG animators are working on it. Underwater book pages rustle. The list goes on, overwhelming star Halley Bailey's winning performance. Part of that world of lazy remakes, alas. At least Sebastian is still fun. (2023) — M.L. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Here we have a solitary man with a violent past who is keeping a journal. The pleasure is not in the innovation, but in the variation. This time, Joel Edgerton takes up the mask of composure and control, even as he lectures us about wild gardens that only appear to be wild, but still grow according to plan. That's not the sort of garden he's growing, however: his employer (Sigourney Weaver, imperious) likes things more regulated. She's eager to discuss the upcoming charity event at her grand estate, but first there is the matter of her grandniece (Quintessa Swindell, luminous), a young woman from a troubled background who needs a break. She's of mixed racial heritage, but that's not a problem for our gardener, despite what his severe haircut, black sweater, and knee-high boots might suggest. He's more concerned with her drug use, and the unpleasant people from whom she gets them. The film is as careful and restrained and handsome as Edgerton's character, and as rigidly structured as the garden he tends. But of course, that does not mean it is without feeling; plenty of blooms thrive on severity. Its only misstep may be its overly sweet portrait of a damaged addict - but then, it's not the girl's story. And while she may be our man's salvation, she's no vessel of cheap grace: their quiet confrontation in the dark is one of the most affecting scenes in recent memory. Schrader loathes violence, but he understands it, which is what makes the film's concluding monologue — about a garden's embodiment of what should be, a manipulation of nature achieved through subtle adjustment - so profoundly hopeful. Spider-Man: Across the Spider-Verse - Dag nab it, not everything has to be Dune, blithely cutting off mid-story because well, it's just that big a tale. It's arguable - more than arguable, it's sort of obvious that you're better off ending your movie with the end of a story - even if it clearly sets up a sequel. Do we really have to hold up James "Avatar Forever" Cameron as an exemplar here? But this "to be continued" stuff that we saw in Fast X and now here and mind you, it's "to be continued" after two hours and twenty minutes - it makes your movie feel less like a movie and more like a ... a ... oh, that's right, a comic book. Well, here's to tipping the hat to the source material, I guess. The thing is, it might not be a problem if your story really is that big: look what happened to poor David Lynch when he tried to pack Dune into one movie. But while this gorgeous, kinetic, engrossing, humane story of Miles Morales' discovery that there are unpleasant and cosmic ramifications to being one Spider-Man in one universe among many does involve big things like universes, it doesn't quite earn the two-part treatment. It's a darned shame when, over and over, the thrill of a chase starts to wear thin — this was so much fun,

why didn't they quit while they were ahead? — because runtime just isn't an issue. It's even more of a shame when that's the chief trouble with an otherwise beautifully made movie, one that tempts you to think Spider-Man was always meant to be animated. Well, almost the chief trouble The other contender is that there's a certain deflation that occurs when you introduce your villain - a bitter casualty of science known as The Spot —and then send him offscreen for most of the movie. But other than that? Satisfying superhero stuff, full of recognizable people and even recognizable families. We'll just have to wait and see if the next installment explains the decision to go long in cinematic, as opposed to economic, terms. (2023) — M.L. ★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

You Hurt My Feelings — WhenI arrived for the screening of Nicole Holofcener's new film, I was asked, "Are you here for the grown-up movie?" It's easy to see why: here we have a story about ordinary people dealing with ordinary problems in ordinary fashion —well, almost. (Can anyone living in NYC luxury really be called ordinary?) Julia Louis-Dreyfus is a memoirist, attempting to make the jump to fiction; Tobias Menzies is her therapist husband, attempting to maintain interest in the problems of his clients. But he just feels tired -and looks it, thanks to those bags under his eyes -and she's having trouble with her manuscript, so much so that she's devastated when she overhears her spouse telling a mutual friend that he doesn't like it one bit. The film is handsome without being showy, stately without being sedate, and mostly amusing without being ridiculous. It's also slight, and slightly silly - like Menzies when he receives a demand for a refund from a couple he failed to help, it's hard to say just how seriously we should take the goings on. 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

The sight of music "I've always associated letters, numbers, flavors, scents, and sounds with colors," says artist Jennifer Mann. "I never knew there was a term for this, synesthesia, until a few years ago. For me, 'A' is red, 'four' is violet, a sweet-smelling rose is always 'peachy pink,' like an Arizona

sunrise. And every song instrumental Jake has created has aroused certain color palettes in my mind." "Jake" is multi-

instrumentalist Jake Allen: the two became friends after meeting at the 2019 NAMM show and discovering a mutual friend in the late fiddler Alex DePue. Allen elaborates: "Although I've always associated songs with various colors, it wasn't until recently that I learned the term synesthesia. It's a condition that many people have, where their senses kind of blend with each other. It can get as extreme as people being able to 'taste' certain words, but one of the most common forms is people linking certain sounds to certain colors. What's really interesting to me is how these associations can sometimes be the same from person to person."

Allen says his music "has always been alternative indie, with a progressive-rock lean. For my next record, I really wanted to lean all the way into a more prog-rock direction. Around this time, Jennifer reached out to me about creating a couple of instrumental songs specifically for her to paint to. By the time I finished the second piece of music, and she painted it, I think we both sensed that the process was moving towards becoming a full album."

As Mann puts it, "I'd asked Jake to doodle a couple of instrumentals as background music for my pour painting videos until his next solo album

manifested. I was so captivated with the first tune he sent, 'Aventurine' that I had to paint it. The next tune was 'Amethyst,' my birthstone, and again, I just had to paint it, not to it. Around holiday time in 2022. we decided to continue and collaborate on a full, ten-song album loosely based around

to a painting." And both found the need to expand their array of tools. Allen, who plays every instrument on the record, found that the use of a dulcimer hammer and harp provided the texture he was hearing in his head. For her part, Mann added mediums and techniques to capture the music on canvas by using palette knives and creating her own metallic and color-shifting paints.

While Alex DePue's death left an unfillable space in many lives, he continues to connect people through art and music. "I have thought about him

crystals and healing stones, since we're both kind of into the esoteric.

The subsequent (and ongoing) creation of Refractions Vol. 1 has been a collaborative process that propelled both the art and the music, depending on what was completed first. "When Jennifer sends the painting first," says Allen, "I'll only look at it for a couple of minutes before ideas start popping up. I've found that the colors inform what instruments I'm going to use, and the composition of shapes in the painting pushes me towards the tempo and mood. There's also a certain 'netting' effect in some of the paintings that I associate with complex time signatures and odd rhythm patterns. I know I have my work cut out for me when there is netting in the piece. "

As the process evolves, both have found their respective crafts moving forward. "My prog-rock aspirations were finding their footing within these instrumentals," says Allen, "and we were both digging the collaborative aspect. Thus began the unfolding of ten proggy instrumental songs, each tied

often during the making of this record," says Allen. "I imagine how he'll react to certain things as I am crafting them. His sage advice and support are things I think of when the going gets tough, as it often does on the musician's path. He was no stranger to that. To have his vote of confidence helps me keep the midnight oil burning, in the studio and on the stage."

Ms. Mann concurs. "I truly believe Alex, like Jake, is an infinite point of light; a beacon connecting artistic souls for the betterment of the collective. Alex was such a stout, loving, supportive proponent of Jake's expression of his talents, and I know that wherever he is now, he is still pushing him forward on his path. I look forward to painting one of Alex's original masterpieces one day soon." Plans for a release date and format are being discussed. In the meantime, experience the process online at Facebook. com/JakeAllenMusic.

On Snapdragon Stadium's opening day, I recall hearing stories about how the sun melted a college football crowd into a dank mess. This much is true: the new stadium, although modern and affable, fails to provide any sort of shade for us first world bitches. Fortunately for us, on this particular day, the May gray is back with full coverage. Our skin remains unblistered. Still, I plan to get melted, not by the sun, but by the Mars Volta and the Red Hot Chili Peppers, who are popping in to penetrate our city's big, new, noisy box.

It's Friday, concert day. Before burning down the I-8 West to Mission Valley, my coworker Victoria and I stop to stock up on beers and tacos for tailgate time. Parking at the stadium costs an eyebrow-raising \$50, but considering the price of food and drinks inside, we agree it's worth it to be able to party by our car. Our friend Chris B. Creme is already waiting for us.

I throw Victoria two twenties for the parking; she'll buy my first beer inside. Deal? Deal. Beers range from \$16-\$19, and food — well, it's typical stadium robbery.

Just outside our gate, I notice a grassy hill behind the merch tent. "Excuse me a minute," I say to my friends, before ripping off a couple of somersaults to the bottom, then going back up and doing it again — because we have the time, and I have the inclination. Brushing off the grass from my shirt, I then enter with the others and orange bands are wrapped around our wrists, indicating we're allowed to go where few achieve access. The pit's entrance is swarming with around a half-dozen security guards, who wave us in. I'm usually the guy looking for alternative ways to the front from my shitty seats, but tonight's different. Listening to a recent Rick Rubin podcast, I heard the famed music producer describe the Chili Peppers as reaching transcendence on a very regular basis. Rubin said, "It's wild being in the room. We just look at each other kind of dumbfounded, because you can't believe what's happening." This is something I want to witness, and the pit puts me as close as I can be.

During The Mars Volta set, a fan wearing bunny ears and a leather bomber jacket keeps shouting for the Johns to assemble. His name is John, and he has found five other Johns. Then six. A short while later, one of the Johns finds his dad, who's also John. I tell the bunny-eared John to make the John gang so big that Mars Volta guitarist John Frusciante hears about it and has no choice but to become a part of the collec-

tive. I believe in him, but lose sight of his efforts when the Chili Peppers hit the stage. We make our way to the middle of the crowd and, once at the center, stop and get comfortable. Then a voice from behind echoes over to us. "Hey, I think the ladies were here first," says a young fella to me. Sure, we budged a little, but it's the pit. You get in where you fit in. We move over a little more to appease them. I still feel their ballistic heat vision on my neck, but I hardly care.

A couple of songs into the set, a person wearing a ladybug costume starts crowd-surfing from behind us toward the stage. As they pass by, they kick the back of my head, knocking off my hat and sunglasses. When I go down to retrieve them, one of the hostile women sees her chance to reclaim her spot ahead of us, rushing in for a calculated blitzkrieg. I make my way back up, start fist pumping to "Can't Stop," and feel a bony elbow jamming my side. The woman is beside me now, chicken winging my ribcage like a xylophone. That's the pit spirit, lady. "I know you and your little girlfriend budged, but we've been waiting here since six o'clock," she spits.

"All is fair in love and war and rock and roll," I calmly reply. To ease the tension, I fire up a joint. After a crackling hit, I extend the fresh doobie to the angry woman as a peace offering. She scoffs at me as I let her by. With her moving back ahead of us, all parties seem satisfied. I tilt my head back, flare my nostrils wide, and begin breathing in forty years of Chili Peppers. No need for blood, sugar, or sex. I'm only here for the magik.

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Payare pushes the Symphony skyward

On Saturday, May 27,
The San Diego Symphony
completed the 2022-2023
Jacobs Masterworks season
at The Rady Shell at Jacobs
Park. The event was a multisensory extravaganza that
maximized the potential
of both the venue and
the orchestra.

The concert started with the Pelléas and Mélisande Suite by Gabriel Faure. Pelléas and Mélisande was a play by Belgian playwright Maurice Maeterlinck and was most famously utilized as an opera by Claude Debussy. Faure's music was written as incidental music for an 1898 production of the play in London. The music is delicate and lyrical and the San Diego Symphony sounded fantastic as music director Rafael Payare led us through the tragedy of forbidden love.

The concert doubled down on the French by then presenting *La Péri: Poème* dansé by Paul Dukas. Of course, Dukas is best known for *The Sorcerer's Apprentice* as realized in Walt Disney's *Fantasia*. One does wonder if that piece would be famous at all if it hadn't featured one Mickey Mouse. *La Péri: Poème dansé* was an entertaining piece of music, but ultimately forgettable, despite the raucous treatment is was given by Payare and his San Diegans.

After intermission, we were treated to Santa Cruz de Pacairigua by Venezuelan composer Evencio Castellanos. Far from forgettable, this was a memorable piece of music, as was the performance. I've listened to it a few times since the concert and continue to be enthralled with the dance rhythms and folk melodies employed throughout.

The final piece of the season was Cantata Criolla by Venezuelan composer Antonio Estévez. This epic composition depicts a singing competition between The Devil and Florentino. The piece is scored for orchestra, chorus, baritone solo, and tenor solo. The text was taken from a mythic poem by Alberto Arvelo Torrealba.

I must admit I found the text, in its translated form, to be too obscure. After the concert, I found a translation that was far more accessible to the simple patterns of my literary tastes.

In the role of The Devil, baritone Gustavo Castillo burst onto the stage with an opening vocal salvo that established he was there to effing *sing*. I raised my eyebrows and thought, "So it's going to be like that?"

I was less impressed with tenor Aquiles Machado in the role of Florentino. The voice was hazy and sounded a bit fatigued from the very start. Had this performance been in a concert hall without amplification, things could have gotten dodgy. As it was, Machado carried

on and turned in a performance that expressed the story well.

Of Rafael Payare and the orchestra, I've said much in the past few months. To say that they are storming the gates of musical glory feels insufficient. The most impres-

sive element of the performances this season has been the consistency. The ceiling has always been high in San Diego, but the floor was low. Now the floor has been raised and the ceiling might as well not exist, because the sky is the limit.

Something to crow about

Royal Rooster, 1717 Quivira Road, San Diego; Stellar fish tacos, excellent craft brews, and a harbor view: welcome to The Royal Rooster, one of my new favorite finds. You can find the eatery tucked away behind a parking lot at the far end of Quivira Basin; the sign with the picture of a rooster lets you know you've arrived. A walk-up kiosk showcases the menu, which is also displayed on multiple chalkboards on the far wall. Tacos dominate, but there are plenty of burritos, along with taquitos, nachos, and several vegetarian options.

I'd been here before and enjoyed it so much, I thought it deserved a second visit. This time, I asked the comrades behind the counter for their recommendations. In unison, they replied, "The barbacoa." Smoked, spiced, and chili-infused beef brisket (that accounts for the smoky aromas I noticed outside the restaurant when we arrived) is slowly cooked, then shredded. Done. Besides the barbacoa taco, we ordered a fish taco, a tri-tip burrito, onion rings, and two beers to tame the heat.

We took a seat on the harbor-facing patio and waited for our name to be called. All the seating is outside, and in cooler weather, they place heaters nearby to keep you warm. I enjoyed the mellow vibe and friendly, low-key atmosphere. Dogs allowed — bonus!

The fish tacos (\$8), prepared Baja-style with locally caught rockfish, are beer batter-fried to perfection, crispy on the outside and steaming hot inside. A mountain of crunchy coleslaw, piled so high it could be a side, adorns the taco, making it a handful. All tacos and burritos are accompanied by a deep red, tomato-forward and medium-hot salsa, plus tangy salsa *verde*.

Once I tasted the barbacoa taco (\$10), I knew this would be my go-to the next time I returned. Simply dressed in pickled onion, jalapeno crema, queso fresco, and cilantro, it met all the criteria: superb flavor, tender and juicy meat, and an overall awesome bite.

The tri-tip burrito (\$23) carries a hefty price, but it is huge, and bursts with tender beef, French fries, avocado, and cheddar cheese — perfect for packing into a fishing trip lunch. (My chopped leftovers made a tasty hash with eggs for breakfast the next morning.) At the other end of the price spectrum, the onion rings (\$6) proved utterly irresistible. Fried in the same batter as the fish, the sweetness of the inner onion shines under the flawless outer crisp. Please order them!

I felt I hadn't explored enough of Royal Rooster's offering, so I went back and looked at the menu again. One thing caught my eye — the spicy squid salad (\$13 for a bowlful) served with large, crunchy tortilla chips. Ginger, Thai chilis, cucumber, sesame seeds, and red onions united with the smoked squid slices. The marriage of sweet, spicy, and sour flavors makes it one sassy dish. I can imagine picking it up to serve as an appetizer

at a home gathering.

Royal Rooster's lineup of beers on tap is extensive, and they also feature margaritas, wine, and local ciders. Save room for the Thrifty ice cream!

Bluefin and yellowtail stubborn? Go heavy and deep for big reds — and bring a descender rig.

Dock Totals 5/28– 6/3: 3466 anglers aboard 126 half-day to 3-day trips out of San Diego landings over the past two weeks caught 24 barracuda, 620 bluefin tuna (up to 200 pounds), 9 bonito, 1 cabezon, 491 calico bass, 3 halibut, 15 lingcod, 1 mako shark, 1 perch, 7202 rockfish, 74 sand bass, 202 sanddab, 78 sculpin, 181 sheephead, 6 Spanish jack, 6 treefish, 690 whitefish, and 274 yellowtail.

Saltwater: Between tough conditions and tight-lipped fish, the counts of both bluefin and yellowtail dropped this past week, though all signs are good going forward, and the average size of bluefin is getting larger, with many fish caught over 100-pounds. Boats are working hard to get the pelagics to bite once on them, and many schools are metered in the normal high spots from the Corner on down to Finger Bank off Ensenada, where *pangeros* are also finding limited success and switching to targeting rockfish, lingcod, and bass when the yellowtail and bluefin bite slows.

Given the availability of deeper water rockfish to 600 feet in depth this season, and the off-and on-again bluefin and yellowtail, the numbers and size of rockfish has increased dramatically. Still, cowcod are a no-catch species and dwell more so in water deeper than 300-feet, which is why that depth limit was set over a decade ago in the first place. This year's increase was due to the improving health of the cowcod population, but they are still off the menu. This brings up the importance of descender rigs, especially with the new trend of heavy knife jigs and 'slow pitch jigging', or SPJ, for those big deepwater reds.

Fish caught and hauled up from the depths quickly will bloat with air due to the atmospheric

change of pressure, and if released, they need a little help getting back down. A descender rig is a weighted device that, once clipped to the fish, will take the fish back down to the bottom where the clip is released by simply pulling up on the line. This helps ensure a higher rate of survival for protected or unwanted fish, and all sportfishing boats targeting rockfish will have descender rigs available for that reason. If heading out on a private boat to target rockfish, especially in the deeper zones, please include a descender rig or two in your

tackle box.

Working south along Baja's Pacific coast, conditions have been frustratingly windy more along the northern half of the peninsula, where usually, I can get at least a day or two per week in late spring of "kayak-friendly" weather. So far, the water has been coolish and warming very slowly, which might explain the finicky pelagic bite for the San Diego boats working the area. And the season has allowed for only a few kayak outings since mid-April in the area south of Ensenada to Punta Baja near El Rosario. Inshore fishing on down the coast south of El Rosario to the Vizcaino Peninsula has been its normal slow for this time of year, as that zone typically runs about three months behind the seasons in San Diego.

Once you get to Todos Santos in Baja Sur, past Cabo and up into the Sea of Cortez, it has been a different story. They have had a great start of the season, with inshore fishing producing many yellowtail caught from the beaches outside of La Paz, and quite a few big dorado and wahoo already showing outside of Bahia de los Muertos and the high spots near Cerralvo Island. In the northern Cortez, anglers are enjoying great yellowtail, cabrilla, and grouper fishing in Bahia de Los Angeles and Bahia de San Luis Gonzaga. There, the normal winter and spring blows have been less than average with many nice calm mornings, which is typical when the wind is howling on the Pacific side.

Action in the surf seems to be getting better in Southern California as well, with a lot of larger barred surf perch caught from the beaches on mini plastics and sand crabs, and decent landbased halibut from both the beach and in the bays on live bait and lures. Spotted bay bass

are warming up for those targeting them with plastics, while shortfin corvina are beginning to eat crankbaits along the rocky edges of San Diego Bay. The season is still young, and though those finicky bluefin and stubborn yellowtail within 1.5-day range seem to have not gotten the message quite yet, it is still looking like it will be another amazing year for the entire saltwater angling community — from the shore-pounders working the local beaches to the long-range fleet's multi-day trips to points south. They're out there, so go get 'em!

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

The Continuing Crisis


