

Beacon's vs. bluffsBeach lot will be brought back from bluff edge, despite appeal

It's not as major an undertaking as moving trains or houses away from the edge of crumbling cliffs, but plans to move a small Leucadia parking lot and access trail have faced stiff opposition. Two weeks ago, the Encinitas City Council unanimously voted to deny an appeal of the proposed project at 948 Neptune Avenue, which is located within a residential neighborhood and just blocks from the beach where three people died when a bluff failed four years ago.

by stabilizing the existing parking lot and making public access a "long term solution." Slavens called for strategies such as beach nourishment, saying that Beacon's has been named "one of the most unique beaches in the world." Opponents said the work would cause illegal wastewater and stormwater diversion, a concern unaddressed by the city.

the bluff to the sand — will remain open during removal and construction of the lot. Access will continue to be off Neptune. To accommodate beach-goers, temporary pedestrian access will occur in phases during construction, the city said.

"When I saw my car, the window was shattered but still intact in the window frame," Normal Heights resident Hannah Healy told me in a July 3 interview. "They didn't try to push the window through to steal anything. My neighbor's car window was also broken, and she found a marble inside her car. I also saw a marble on the street near my house the next day."

Healy runs the popular local food blog *Healy Eats Real*; the repair cost her \$400. "Having my window broken definitely impacted

my limited budget as someone who is selfemployed as a content creator," she continued. "Not to mention it took at least half of a work day to take my car window to get repaired."

Word on the mid-city streets is that the glass marbles are flung "with a slingshot," Healy noted. "The marble vandals have not been caught or identified."

The project will move the 26-stall parking lot seven feet back from an active landslide plane, removing eleven parking spaces in the process.

According to a city report, Beacon's Beach and the path to the sand were created long ago by a series of huge landslides between faults that run through the beach's access path. The most recent bluff failure was in May 2022. The project will move the 26-stall parking lot seven feet back from an active landslide plane, removing eleven parking spaces in the process.

The appeal, filed on behalf of neighbors by coastal land use consultant Chandra Slavens, argued that the best way to ensure safety is Mitch Silverstein, policy coordinator for San Diego Surfrider Foundation, supported the decision to deny the appeal, saying it stemmed from a small group of seawall advocates. Councilmembers said they supported sand replenishment, and that the project is exempt from environmental review because the parking lot is considered a minor structure. They said the appeal incorrectly stated that there is no established bluff failure plane at the parking lot. A geotechnical report has

identified one.

The city also said the project will provide public access to the beach, as well as public parking. The dirt trail that provides a foot path down to the beach isn't part of the project, other than the connection point at the top of the bluff.

Construction is expected to start at the end of the summer. The current public access path — a dirt trail beginning at the parking lot that leads down across the face of

Shooting marbles used to mean flicking them with your thumb, trying to knock your opponents' marbles out of a circle. If you were serious, you'd play for keeps. Now, it seems the stakes have been raised. On June 14, NBC 7 News reported that multiple marbles had been used to break car and business windows in North Park, shattering glass and causing thousands of dollars' worth of damage.

About a mile or so south of Healy's home, a blue glass marble was the cause of another shattered car window on June 13. "Last night, just a few minutes past midnight, I was driving down University Avenue, on the corner on 36th street, and as I'm moving, I hear a loud smashing sound," recounted a Hillcrest resident online. "I looked back, and my rear side window was shattered." I reached out to the victim, but he did not reply. He did, however, post photos of the marble and damaged window and continued, "I looked around to see if there

was someone on the street or sidewalk, but I didn't see anyone. I thought maybe I was getting shot at or attacked, so I immediately drove off... I called 911, and the

cops came, and they found a marble in the back of my car." A Corridor resident posted, "I have collected about 20 marbles from the front of my house in the past year. It has been going on for a few years now."

Al, a local Army vet, said the vandals are "using paintball pistols/guns to fire the marbles at high speed, [as they are] easier to conceal and aim than a wrist-rocket slingshot." Jerry Valdez, who repairs and tints windows in the mid-city area, agrees with Al. "Paintball guns got larger barrels; the kids and young adults are copying the other people on TikTok and online."

Valdez noted that people could save money buying used windshields and side windows

from window repair shops that install used windows "at the Otay Mesa and Chula Vista junkyards. If people Google and find used glass shops, they'll save a lot of money. Also, you can negotiate the prices. And some of the tints and films we install on businesses protect the glass from shattering."


Facebooking the money Meta Platforms Inc., which used to be called Facebook, came up with \$5500 on June 30 for the 2025 Lt. Governor election campaign

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Catching Yellowfin and Bluefin on the same one-day trip

Dock Totals 7/2– 7/8: 4852 anglers aboard 190 half-day to 3-day trips out of San Diego landings over the past week caught 150 barracuda, 2737 bluefin tuna (up to 240 pounds), 85 bocaccio, 29 bonito, 526 calico bass, 1 halibut, 7 lingcod, 1 mako shark, 4938 rockfish, 2 rock sole, 274 sand bass, 87 sanddab, 12 sculpin, 70 sheephead, 1 thresher shark, 2 white croaker, 77 whitefish, 607 yellowfin tuna, and 216 yellowtail.

Saltwater: Bluefin counts are edging down while yellowfin are starting to show more for the fleet as summer progresses. This has been the pattern for a few years now, as the bluefin move north toward San Clemente Island and the Tanner/Cortez banks and yellowfin move up with warmer water. Still, there are plenty of bluefin to be caught off northern Baja and the banks west of Ensenada up to the Corner and 181 area, giving the not-so-common chance at both a yellowfin tuna and a bluefin tuna within 1-Day trip range of San Diego. Boats out of San Diego landings are beginning to head toward San Clemente, targeting the larger bluefin while those working offshore and south are getting a good mix of both species.

Yellowtail have been hit and miss so far this season, showing one week as though coming on strong then thinning out the next. Still, the average size of the yellowtail caught this season has been a little larger than the schools that normally move in, with quite a few fish in the 20 to 30-pound range. Since the depth increase to 600-feet, rockfish fishing has been excellent for boats venturing out toward the deeper edges of offshore banks from the 9-Mile Bank and south from there.

As the sportfishing operations have also been affected by post-Covid inflation, higher fuel and other costs have

caused average ticket prices to rise. In an effort to to ease the pain, some of the operations have been tailoring their pricing to be more affordable, and as a result angler counts have been on the rise. One example: Captain Rick Slavkin of the *Oceanside* 95 out of Point Loma landing has set special pricing for the boat's Overnight and 1.5-Day July trips at \$300 and \$400, respectively, including Mexican permits.

The main four landings operating out of San Diego, Fisherman's, Seaforth, H&M, and Point Loma, have comparative pricing and trip lengths. Here is a basic breakdown of the 2023 pricing: Half-Day runs are about 5.5-hour AM and PM trips and average \$70. Full-Day trips are about 12 hours, depart in the morning and return in the afternoon and cost around \$240. Overnight trips leave at night and return the following evening, allowing more range and time at the rail, and cost about \$340. 1.5-Day trips depart in the evening, fish the next day, and return the following morning, again extending range and time at the rail. Those trips cost between \$440 and \$550, depending on load size. 2-Day trips run around \$600 and allow for two full days of fishing time. Multi-day trips from 3 to 8 days run about \$450 per day.

One can save a little money by driving or flying down to Mexico and hiring a local panga or cruiser, but generally—given the travel cost, FMM for legal entry to Mexico, hotel, and boat price—unless well-planned, that too can be a bit pricey for the average working-class angler. Sportboats out of San Diego are very accommodating, usually with a kitchen and chef, bunks, bait, and high-end electronics to get one on the fish. A trip south allows for some "landlubber" time and generally a shorter run to fishing grounds, with local operators

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



LIVING AND FISHING IN BAJA'S LITTLE HEAVEN

SOUTH SOUTH

Moving to the San Quintin area in 2015 was more accident than planned, but it wasn't entirely random. Whenever I've pulled up stakes and moved on, for whatever reason — be it work, family, relationship, or a dart thrown at a map — I have been quick to find the fishing in my new environs. This time, I was basing my decision on distance: I needed someplace from which I could make the round trip to San Diego in a day. Say, four to five hours drive-time. That way, if I timed my border crossings well to avoid sitting in traffic, I could make it from home to

Downtown San Diego — there to pick up the bi-weekly check that paid for my life in Mexico — and still sleep in my own bed that night. I aimed for someplace between Ensenada and El Rosario, drawn, as ever, by the water and what was swimming around under its surface.

The easiest way to search for a place to live is to go online. But when is the easiest way ever really the best? I knew I would find better deals speaking the with locals. My normal M.O. when I'm planning on an extended stay in Baja to find an area, make a deal for a week or maybe

a month at a cheap motel, and then start looking through local channels; people you meet while out and about, notes posted outside of tiendas, that sort of thing. So I started driving south. A two-bedroom house for \$600 in La Misión was tempting, but overbudget. A trailer by the Rosarito Beach Pier was within budget, but I wanted to be south of Ensenada and in a more rural setting. There were possibilities in Camalu, Colinet, and in the San Quintin Valley, but I found that the further south I drove, the further south I wanted to be. I decided to push my one-day round-trip requirement to its limit.

I was thinking El Rosario, but thanks to all my stops along the way, the sun was setting, and I typically avoid night driving in Baja. Besides, the cat started yowling — Mollison McReedy, the stray I found when she was more mouse-sized than cat-sized, and starving in the rocks on the Mission Beach Jetty. She'd lived in Mexico before, back in 2005-2008 when she was a younger, better murderer of scorpions and mice, and I was plunked down

outside of La Paz. Tired from the road, I pulled off the highway at the Los Piños Pemex station and headed four miles toward the beach and the Cielito Lindo Hotel.

A little Hollywood in the history

There's a story that Mark Armistead, after he invented the instant replay for television, took his million-dollar check from NBC and tried to cash it at the bar of his favorite restaurant, Newport Beach's El Pescador Restaurant and Bar. He was kidding, but the money was serious, serious enough that in the late '60s, Armistead was able to buy Rancho War Two, or during one of their many fishing trips down the coast after the war. However he found it, it seemed like the perfect spot to recreate El Pescador and invite the same Hollywood heavies with whom he'd dined there. Armistead named his recreation Cielito Lindo, Spanish for "pretty little sky." Or it could be "nice little heaven." The point is that the view is nice.

Large hotel rooms

were added in three single-story fourplex units, floored with onyx tiles sourced from the once-famous and largest onyx-producing quarry in the world, El Mármol, located inland and about a third of the way down the Baja Peninsula. Armistead, a naval pilot and photographer during the war, installed an airstrip, and soon he and Ford — along with other Hollywood notables, including John Wayne, Henry Fonda, and Jimmy Stewart — started flying down to escape the everpresent paparazzi and fans in Los Angeles.

Mexico abounds with tales of famous visitors, from writers who loved fishing, like John Steinbeck and Ernest Hemingway, to actors who loved loving, like Elizabeth Taylor and Richard Burton. The Lover's Bridge in Puerto Vallarta is so

named because of their affair during the filming of Night of the Iguana, a tryst so public that it was condemned as "erotic vagrancy" by the Vatican. As it happened, Liz and Richard's affair is also pointed to as the beginning of the public "craze" of fandom - which is why Armistead and company desired a private getaway out of the public eye.

It seems they achieved their dream: there were no pictures or signed headshots behind the bar. What stories might have been told about the Hollywood crowd while at Cielito Lindo, if there were any, circulated far away from the eyes and ears of historians, the press, or any other public record. What is known is that when the highway was paved and RVs full of tourists began venturing south beyond Ensenada,

El Manana, 400 acres of sandy flat scrub land between the sloughs of Bahia San Quintin and the dunes fronting Playa Santa Maria, about 180 miles south of San Diego. Maybe his buddy the director John Ford had spotted it while spying on Japanese vessels in coastal Mexican waters in the late 1930s before the outbreak of World

Mark Armistead put the place up for sale, and it was bought by Juanita Fitzpatric in 1975.

Though she sold the restaurant, bar, and hotel to a ranching family from Mexicali prior to my moving here, Fitzpatric still holds title to the leased properties on the remaining acreage, where some 37 residents have built off-grid homes. A lot runs \$100 down and \$65 per month. Most of the homes are on solar and have generators as backup — as do the bar, restaurant, and hotel. Water is delivered to storage tanks, or pilas, by truck at a reasonable price. Every day, rain or shine, at 4 pm, happy hour draws the residents to the outdoor seating area, where locals, dogs, and guests all mingle.

El Pescador

Affordable rates a halfday from San Diego; it was time to assess my other nonnegotiable: a decent kayak launch. I found one at the bay mouth, or Boca, a few miles up the spit. The fact that the place was walking distance to the beach was just a bonus. Cielito Lindo soon became my home base, even though I hadn't yet realized the potential of the area. Having previously lived in La Paz and Mulege, and having spent my vacations somewhere between Gonzaga Bay and the East Cape, I associated Baja with Tuscon-type warmth and near-tropical Sea of Cortez water. Exploring and fishing the Pacific side of the peninsula was going to be a new adventure in an almost foreboding place,

what with its not-so-ancient volcanoes, shallow bay, and shallow sloping beaches. It almost seemed more like Central California: gray and cool, with a long paddle to the fishing grounds. The fishery held good rockfish, yellowtail, and white seabass — if you had the boat to do 25-40-mile round trips. But it seemed less than ideal for kayak-angling. I had gotten a little spoiled on the east side, where I could paddle out and chase dorado and tuna within a mile of the beach — and catch yellows just by chucking iron from shore.

My first launches at

the bay mouth resulted in lots of sand bass and a couple of small halibut, and my first sand crabchucking beach trips produced some barred surf perch and corbina. But then I started to learn more about the history of the place and the fishery, much of it from Captain Juan Cook, who runs a sportfishing operation out of The Old Mill, a hotel on the upper bay on the site of a mill built to process grain grown by British wheat farmers in the early 1900s. I began taking trips on pangas — the small skiffs that are the working boats of Mexico.

Catches on the 15 and 240 banks, as well around Isla San Martin (see photo), were the expected seasonal targets: rockfish, lingcod, and yellowtail from the high spots, seasonal tuna and dorado offshore, and white seabass, halibut, and really good calico bass on and near the kelp around the island. Often, large sheephead and whitefish were in the mix, too.

The panga fishing was good, but I still made time to explore the bay from the low perch of my kayak, and I made sure to talk to local fishermen - commercial and

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ARDx-Research@Abbott.com 619-210-9882 or (619) 240-4815 recreational - about what it held. What I found was a huge nursery for all kinds of gamefish, choked with bait — from finfish and to unending ghost shrimp beds in massive natural littoral zones, or "false bays." A local handyman who fished for extra money told me of the large green and white shrimp —the latter known as cameron de leche or "milk shrimp," due to their naturally white tail meat — that inhabited the bay. He caught them by casting his net in the sloughs after a high tide had dropped and left pools he could access. He brought me a couple kilos of them; the would be sold as extra-large at U.S. markets.

Over the first few months of kayak fishing within the bay -from the Boca up to the Old Mill, my catches included bonefish, young black seabass, juvenile gulf and broomtail grouper, halibut, sole, sand bass, spotted bay bass, numerous rays, a large spawning white seabass, juvenile white seabass, and California corbina. I even found I did not have to paddle very far for yellowtail: I caught one in the shallows near the launch at the Boca, and several within the mileand-a half-paddle from there to the point.

Over the years since first fishing in the San Quintin area in 2015, I have caught my personal best California corbina (5.7 pounds) and barred surf perch (3.17 pounds) from the beach; and from the kavak in the Boca, white seabass (55 pounds), and kept black seabass (75 pounds). Fun fact: a kayak can act as a bobber might for a perch; a large fish that would take all your line from a

boat will often just wear itself out towing a kayak. The angler can button down the drag and not be broken off. Once I've gaffed the fish, I normally use a bat to knock it out. Then I can remove the hook and store it in my forward hatch, or leash and tow it if it's too large.

Bed and board

But all that came later. After first arriving, tired and accompanied by an aging, grouchy cat, I made a deal with the owner of Cielito for a monthly rate for one of their spacious rooms. I was in no real hurry to find a house, and I still wanted to check El Rosario. But I soon became very comfortable there, given the large room and everything provided, along with a restaurant and bar just steps away. I paid about \$300 US per month plus my restaurant tab, which was adjusted to accommodate the fish I provided. The owners, Jose Raymundo Aguirre (known as Bebo) and family, have a ranch in Mexicali, and maintain Cielito as a summer getaway. They do not fish often, but they love halibut, corbina, white seabass, and the like.

Cielito, I had adopted a puppy born to one of Bebo's dogs and named him Flash Gordon, caught my personal best halibut by kayak at 44 pounds, and made up my mind to stay in the area. I started looking for a place with a yard. Flash Gordon was growing fast, and I was getting tired of the cat being 100% indoors as well. I preferred her usual set-up as an in-out cat that didn't need a litter box, one who would happily show off her good work by depositing mortally wounded scorpions or mice by the front door. Though she was pushing a decade by then, she still had her murderous instincts, and I did not want to deny her the pleasure.

I put out some feelers and found a rustic house on a well-manicured, treed, and fenced half-hectare a couple miles from Cielito Lindo in San Simon, a small neighborhood off the old highway. (The highway was moved about a mile east at San Simon for a stretch of about five miles, after flooding in the '90s convinced the government

that a bridge made a practical alternative to constant road repairs.) Several dozen houses (mostly occupied by farm workers) and a couple of stores remain along the old stretch, just out of the flood zone.

This new place, with its

fig, guayaba, and shade trees ,was only a few miles from the water. Including rent, electric, gas, water, and internet service, my bills ran about \$200 per month — or about one-sixth of my average monthly pay.

About that: my folks had always told me to spend no more than one-quarter of my takehome pay on rent or a mortgage. Once upon a time, this was the standard for the blue-collar middle-class: a single provider could rent an average house on twentyfive percent of their pay. And from post-World War Two into the early 1980s, this was the case. For a few years during the later part of that period, I worked as a journeyman carpenter, and I could easily rent a house. Even when I was working for minimum wage in a kitchen, I could afford a small apartment. That's part of why I headed south: I knew that in Mexico, outside of the gentrified touristy places, the local economies were more like what we once enjoyed in the United States.

As in the U.S., rents and pay vary by location in Mexico. In the San Ouintin area, an average skilled construction worker earns about 500 pesos per day. The average house rents for around 2500 pesos. My four-bedroom house on the shaded fenced lot was 2250 pesos, or about \$140 dollars, given the exchange rate at the time. My water bill was 50 pesos, electric averaged 200 pesos, internet was 400 pesos, and I used about 150 pesos' worth of propane each month. Cell phone with unlimited service in Mexico, the U.S., and Canada ran 200

pesos per month. Farm workers make about 350 pesos per day, and apartments in one of the many small communities throughout the San Quintin farming region start at around 800 pesos per month. In Mexico, the working classes are much better off when it comes to housing and bills than their U.S. counterparts.

Baja bumps and blessings

Given the cost of living and my 12-hour or so weekly commitment online for work, I enjoyed a lot of free time for fishing. I would haul my kayak out to the Boca launch or run to the beach most days of the week, depending on the weather. After a few months, my employer began direct deposit, so I no longer needed to run north once every other week. To remain legally there, I only had to go north to re-up my Forma Migration Multiple, or FMM, once every six months, at a cost of around \$30. I spent much of my time exploring the bay's fisheries by kayak or on foot, and eventually bought a little boat on a trailer for cheap and traded some unneeded fishing gear for a 15-horsepower motor. That way, I could take my dog Flash Gordon fishing when on the water instead of locking him in the yard while I was gone.

I stayed in that house in San Simon for about 18 months, until I ran

into my first issue with the landlord. When I moved in, I noted that the water pump pressure tank — improperly installed and unprotected from the weather — was rusting and would need replacement soon. He agreed at the time, but when the tank finally burst, he said replacement was my responsibility. On principle, I decided not to give him the \$200 for the new parts and quickly found another place within my budget; a modern two-bedroom, two-bath house on a large, fenced lot fronting the bay on the east side about a mile south of the Old Mill. It was owned by an American and the rent was \$200 per month. My utility,

internet, and cell phone bills ran about the same as the San Simon place, so the total of around \$260 per month was still within my budget. And I had steps to the bay just twenty feet from the back gate. While in San Simon, most of my fishing was

from the Boca or the beach; I had not spent much time in the inner and upper bay. Given constant action, it was hard to wrench myself away to try other spots. When I moved into the bayside house, I tossed a piece of shrimp out just to see what might be feeding in the littoral zone during the high tides. Walking the flats when the tide was out, I could see signs of fish "blowing" out the ghost shrimp, and even the impressions of smaller halibut and large rays in the clay. Within a couple minutes, I was on a 20" corbina and knew I had found a fisherman's paradise of a house. Soon, I was walking a few strides from my back door with coffee in hand and enjoying some of the best corbina fishing I have ever

experienced sitting there on the steps while taking in the fantastic view of the volcanoes and the upper bay.

The bay is oh-kay

On a six-foot high tide, the water came up to the top of the second step, while on a minus tide, it was about a hundred yards walk from the steps to the water's edge. Much of Bahia San Quintin is flat and shallow in the littoral zone between the tides, the bay growing and shrinking up to 20% or more in area daily. On larger tide swings, the vast volume of acre-feet of water rushes through the narrow bay mouth, which is why the main channel is cut so deep. Like arteries, channels feed from the main channel into each false bay, creating an image of a lung expanding and contracting, filling and depleting the littoral zones daily. Rays, bullseve pufferfish, bonefish, and corbina flood into the clay above the eelgrass line on each high tide to feed on the ghost shrimp beds. Spotted bay bass, young grouper, and halibut

lurk in the channels and along the rocky edges in the deeper water beyond the lowest tideline.

Though I occasionally hauled the little boat to the point launch at the Boca or the launch at the Old Mill, I began launching my kayak right from my back steps and exploring the mid and upper bay. In doing so, I quickly learned to lock the thentwo-year-old Flash Gordon in the house while gone. He would get anxious, escape the yard and swim out after me. Once, he swam over a half-mile to a sailboat anchored in the channel. After picking him up at the sailboat and scooping him out of the water onto the narrow kayak several times, I realized there was no keeping him in a fenced yard if he really wanted out, so indoors he went on the days I kayak fished.

Once the dog situation was addressed, I found that the upper bay channels and rocky edges held plenty of gamefish action.

The quote about San Quintin Bay from The Baja Catch — the highly touted "fishing bible" covering Baja's inshore



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Dr. Torres, Dr. Lutz, Dr. Mora, Dr. Lujan & Staff 1866-804-1877 and 619-489-7022 • pacificimplantcenters.com waters of the Pacific Ocean and Sea of Cortez - reads, "Fishing inside the bay is a bust, due to weeds, shoals, and lack of fish." This, in spite of the authors' exhaustive research and decades of Baja experience, is the opposite of the truth. I found the bay choked with fish and a nursery for larger species. My average spotted bay bass has been around three pounds, though I am sure there is a world record in there at over 4 pounds 15 ounces, which is the standing mark to beat. Though much of the shoreline can be prohibitive to fishing, if you use a float tube, small boat, or kayak, the numerous ghost shrimp beds, the miles of channels and edges, and the plethora of bait makes Bahia San Ouintin an excellent fishery for anyone who takes the time to explore it.

As the farming community has grown over recent decades, so has the available sportfishing fleet. Along the road leading into the Old Mill there are several sport-

fishing operations where one can hire anything from a small panga to a fully fitted Parker. All the operators are excellent guides and know the fisheries inside and outside the bay well.

For surf anglers, the quality of barred surf perch and corbina fishing along the beaches outside the bay to the north and south is first rate, in my opinion. Shore-pounding the accessible areas of the bay with lures or bait on high tide can produce some fat spotted bay bass, halibut, small broomtail

Lorenzo Sky Park for those

The tournament will be held on August 5th, with registration and captain's meeting on August 4th. With several panga and cruiser options on "panga row" on the road in, you don't need your own boat to enter this Baja tournament. Pangas run around \$280 and can carry up to 4 entrants each; entry fee is \$125. For information and a full list of participating pangas, see: bajahookup.com.

As they say, "fishing is called fishing and not catching because there are no guarantees," but there will be no catching if you don't go fishing. And right now, whether from the beach, in the bays, just off the coast, or down to the semi-tropics of Baja Sur, the catching has been very good. They're out there, so

and gulf grouper, corbina, and bonefish. Inshore and offshore fishing for yellowtail can be "off the hook" seasonally, and the calico bass fishing around Isla San Martin is excellent.

Neil Kelly and Gene Kira, the authors of The Baja Catch, are rightfully respected, and I have found their accounts of fisheries on either side of

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the peninsula to be accurate. But I am happy to report that they got this one wrong.

A sort of homecoming

Flash and I lived at the house on the bay for a couple years, and enjoyed every bit of it. As my work and pay waned, I continued to search out affordable spots in Mexico, and after spending some time

in Baja Sur off the Vizcaino coast, I have returned to San Quintin, my old haunt and my dog's birthplace, and to Cielito Lindo. The old cat Molly passed at 18 years old while here last fall, and is buried nearby in a pleasant spot with a view of the volcanoes and the beach.

Even when I was not living here, the old Hollywood hangout was a required stop when passing through. It is my home port in a lot of ways, and many of the folks here are like family. As with anywhere, the San Quintin area does have some drawbacks: there is a persistent onshore wind, and the cold-water zone weather can be gray and chilly. And on the days when the wind dies during late summer and early fall, mosquitoes and gnats can be horrific. But sitting out a few breezy days per week or donning a hoodie and mosquito repellents are minor inconveniences, considering the great fishing, broad uncrowded beaches, good people, and amazing intertidal biosphere that is just a half-day's drive from Downtown San Diego.

very knowledgeable of their fishery.

Species targeted can also make a difference in the cost of fishing. If targeting wahoo and dorado, for instance, one needs to ride a multiday trip out of San Diego or fly into Baja Sur and hire a boat there where those species are most commonly found. Yes, we had a dorado invasion last year, with more dorado caught close to San Diego and in U.S. waters than I can remember, but much of that was young fish in the 32-inch to 40-inch and 8- to 15-pound size range. I expect we might see such an invasion by the end of this summer as well, but if you want to catch some big bull dorado, a trip south will put you on 30-to-50pounders right now, as big dorado are being caught in good numbers within a short

panga ride out of Ensenada de Los Muertos near La Paz in the Sea of Cortez. Wahoo are biting well Off Bahia Magdalena on the Pacific side, along with some bruiser yellowfin tuna to 300 pounds.

Speaking of going south, a popular yellowtail, white seabass, and lingcod tournament that ran out of Don Eddie's Hotel in San Quintin has been re-established under the new owners. Situated next to El Molino Viejo, Don Eddie's offers newly-revamped pet and family-friendly accommodations, with amenities including bayfront rooms, bar and restaurant. various tours — including motorcycle, kayak, and oyster farm outings - and more. Given the 4- to 5-hour drive south of the border, this can be a great option for a family getaway. There is also a landing strip adjacent to Don Eddie's at Campo

San Diego Reader: What is the mission of your church?

Colorful hibiscus decorates older neighborhoods, Native lilies bloom

Colorful Foliage Along San Diego's Coastline Lingers, despite the lack of rainfall and warmer, drier days. In the older, landscaped neighborhoods of Coronado, Point Loma, Pacific Beach, and La Jolla, you'll find oleander and hibiscus blooming in many shades and colorful bougainvillea creeping over garden walls. Look for the magnificent clusters of red flowers adorning the crowns of the flame eucalyptus (red-flowering gum) trees.

Native Lilies, Such As The Humboldt Lily, Are Blooming This Month in widely scattered, moist locations throughout San Diego County's higher mountains. To find them, take a walk on the

Noble Canyon Trail in the Laguna Mountains, or explore the pine woodlands of Palomar Mountain State Park. The large, nodding flowers of the lilies — orange or yellow with brown spots — grow in clusters on stems two to eight feet tall.

July 13, If We Have Clear Skies, Check Out Mercury as it's poised just to the left of the thin crescent Moon, with Venus a bit further to the left. This is a great opportunity to view some of our closest planetary neighbors.

July 17 at 11:32 AM Will Be the New Moon. According to the age-old practice of planting by the Moon, the ground is the most fertile the days leading up to and the days following the new Moon. It might be a good time to plant another round of Summer veggies — or your first round, if you live along the coast and have been waiting for the marine layer to burn off.



Television's Sam the Cooking Guy famously opened a joint in Little Italy called Not Not Tacos. "Well, they're not not tacos." Passengers, a trainbased show staged by the Montrealbased troupe The 7 Fingers, is not not the circus. I mean sure, you've got your twirled hoops, your juggled balls, your climbing silks, your climbing straps, your climbing pole, your hanging trapeze, your dancers and acrobats, your routines and skits... But as the program informs us, the troupe's founders "set out to redefine circus by stripping down the spectacle to its thrilling essence." That's both true and not. True, there are no bright colors to distract the eye, and few gags to fill the space between routines. (There's a reason for the somber tone and look; writer/director/choreographer Shana Carroll lost a friend and collaborator shortly after beginning work on the project.) Instead, we get songs about lovers meeting and separating, monologues about traveling in an effort to find oneself, and an extended attempt to explain Einstein's famous "man on the train" thought experiment about the way time moves differently for bodies in motion. (That one gets punched up with jokes, thank goodness.) The props are limited mostly to suitcases, chars, and luggage carts, with decoration served up via monochromatic train-themed projections. So yes, stripped down, so as not to distract from the genuinely breath-taking physical feats of dexterity and strength. (Reader, I gasped - repeatedly.) But also gussied up with vague intimations of significance — performative meditations on bodies in motion. Speaking of bodies: the feeling that endured as I left the theater was something akin to awe at the glory of the bodies at work here — both the feats they achieved and the innovation and grace with which they interacted.

(mostly) artfully weaves original musical material in and around the catalog of Gen X ambassador of angst Ben Folds, chooses the latter path, offering up a dizzying array of storylines among the employees, regulars, and newcomers at the sort of small-town bar that still puts the local high school football game on the big screen. Speaking of "among" - you the audience are among the bar's denizens, buying drinks from the cast before the opening curtain, and watching them careen through your midst as they belt out their lamentations and (occasional) celebrations. It's an engaging tactic, one that's much needed, due to the muchness on display - with this many stories, it would be easy to get overwhelmed and pull an emotional check-out. It's all recognizable and real enough - Folds knows his business, and the cast knows Folds — but it's tough to stuff so many dramatic arcs into one night at a bar. Adding to the overwhelm (though maybe just mine): the space is small, and the music is big. I'm not sure the mics were necessary. Still: if local theater needs new blood in the audience to survive, this counts as a big step in the right direction.

MOVIES

Asteroid City — Wes Anderson looks to the heavens. Mostly in the material sense: the story here concerns a gathering of Science Kids for a convention in the desert adjacent to the titular space rock, and it turns out they're not the only interested parties. But also, and perhaps more importantly, in the immaterial sense: the father of one of those kids has his wife's ashes in tow, and finds at the outset that the time has come to tell his kids that Mom is dead. And since she was Christian, maybe in heaven, but probably not - he doesn't believe in all that. She's dust in a Tupperware container, and he's a widowed war photographer who always gets his shot, and that's that. The kids, however, are more inclined to make meaning — as is Anderson. As with The Grand Budapest Hotel, the story here is nested: we begin with a television program about the making of the play we're seeing - though it's not an actual play, just a reasonable simulacrum for illustrative purposes. It's worth asking why, and what's being illustrated -and worth paying attention to the seemingly bonkers scene in which the play's cast cries out, "You

can't wake up if you don't fall asleep.' As ever, the mannered speech and meticulous framing lend a certain unreality to the proceedings -to say nothing of the brightly saturated image — but it's hardly style for style's sake. (2023) — M.L. ★★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Elemental — Once, Pixar made us cry, because there is sadness in life. Now, Pixar gives us a character who cries, because that's funny. A character whose family plays a game where the object is to make each other cry. "Butterfly. Windshield wiper. Half a butterfly." Ho ho - recreational emotional manipulation, get it? Just like going to a Pixar movie! We cried because Pixar gave us consequences, many of them having to do with the passage of time and the inevitability of change. Here, the change - assimilation - is hardly inevitable, even if it's probable, but the film's whole project is the removal of consequences. Absolute absolution. Fire Dad wants to keep alive the flame that holds all his cultural patrimony, but all that seems to mean to dutiful Fire Daughter is taking over the family shop in Element City (which, despite its name, was "not made with fire people in mind"). Daughter also has trouble with her hot temper, which her chill new water buddy explains as "me trying to tell me something I'm not ready to hear." Is this really why angry people are angry — because they are mysteries to themselves, and not because the world wounds them? Or is it just a setup for our heroine's journey of self-discovery, from "I'm a bad daughter!" to ... well, something else? Of course, the occasion for assimilation is often intermarriage, so all

this "tradition of our people" nonsense can easily be made into background for a Water-Meets-Fire romcom that, alas, is more soggy than steamy. And even there, the cultural differences get reduced to commercial — the couple's big fight hinges more on questions of economic class than anything anyone might want to pass on to their kids. Lynch/Oz — Cracking the enigma of David Lynch is as simple as watching The Wizard of Oz, so claims Lynch/Oz. Divided into six chapters, the video essay features a range of critics and filmmakers engaging in discussions about the thematic and visual parallels between David Lynch and the iconic Victor Fleming film. While a few commentators, notably Jon Waters, offer insightful observations, most meander aimlessly as the film cuts between Fleming's Oz and Lynch's work, attempting to evoke a sense of continuity that eludes its narration. The result is an overemphasis on Lynch's indebtedness to Oz, creating a distorted and narrow perspective that fails to do justice to Lynch's artistry as a director who blurs the boundary between the ordinary and the extraordinary. Attempting to bring that boundary into sharp focus feels inherently wrong, akin to forsaking the technicolor magic of Oz to return to a sepia-toned Kansas. (2023) — R.B. ★ (DIGITAL GYM)

Mission: Impossible: Dead Reckonging: Part One — The Summer of Echoes continues in surprising fashion: who woulda thunk that the much-lauded Mission: Impossible series would trot out so many of the same elements as the

to start, besides a lengthy runtime and a half-finished storvline? How about the return of a villain from our hero's past, a villain who specifically delights in causing suffering even more than he delights in killing? And in both cases, he's portentously presented as the satanic opposite to our sainted hero - Fast X's baddie gets called "the Devil" and taunts "Saint Dominic," while MI:DR:P1 gives us a "Dark Messiah" going up against Tom Cruise's Ethan Hunt, who must not only save the world, but must do while bearing his particular cross. There's the extended car chase through Rome - but perhaps that's just de rigueur at this point, and the climactic explosion isn't quite the same. What's perhaps most troublesome is the dramatic fatigue indicated by going meta: Fast X acknowledged its cheerful rejection of the laws of physics, while here we get an extended exchange on the absurdity of a rogue superagent who is offered missions that he may or may not choose to accept. (All because he was once a bad boy who was offered "a choice" — make sure you pronounce it with sufficient gravitas and grandeur!) Cruise the stuntman is reliably spectacular here, but Cruise the actor seems a bit scattered, perhaps because he has two women to care about this time 'round, and an enemy who is more machine than man. And Hunt the character? He fails personally when it counts, but suffers not a single consequence. Sigh. As for director Christopher McQuarrie, he relies a bit too much on hey presto sleight of hand and the pleasing jolt of watch-

No Hard Feelings — 2010's "it girl" Jennifer Lawrence makes a bold return to the big screen in a raunchy sex comedy that harkens back to the mid-2000s. Too old to be the hot girl next door, Lawrence plays a 32-year-old vamp trying to seduce a 19-year-old at the behest of his helicopter parents. But instead of a hookup, this Gen-Z virgin just wants a real connection. With a paper-thin plot, No Hard Feelings is held together by the charisma of its two leads who skillfully deliver enough vulgar gags to leave audiences laughing throughout most of the film's runtime. (2023) - R.B. ★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Past Lives — An aching tale about the bonds of love, Past Lives explores the magnetic connection between Nora, a married playwright who immigrated from Korea to New York, and her childhood sweetheart Hae Sung. Spanning 24 years, the film traces the inexpressible threads that pull people together and the fateful realities that unspool their tender desires. There are no sweeping romantic gestures. Instead, the characters maintain an emotional decorum that is profoundly human as they come to grips with the sweet seduction of nostalgia and the inability to get out of it. For those yearning for another installment in Richard Linklater's Before trilogy, I suspect they will find Past Lives to be a worthy spiritual successor. (2023) — R.B. ★★★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

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The Sess: revived band welcomes vinyl revival

Styrofoam cuts vinyl

David McHank of Styrofoam Records is an artist whose 30-year career includes illustrating posters and album covers, as well as venturing into animated shorts around a decade ago. Mike Molina is a videographer for Robles Productions. The two make up half of what partner (and local brewer) Jeff Wiederkehr calls "a four headed monster of art, music and vinyl nerds" with photographer Ben Heiderich rounding out the company.

"When Mike joined us, we said to him, 'This is a fun way to lose money every month," says McHank of the group's formation — the organic result of friends with a common passion. "We started it, in theory, late in 2021, but we didn't get a physical release out until March 2023. By then, Jeff from Burning Beard Brewing Company joined in, and Mike Molina joined our family about a month after that." According to Wiederkehr, "I was trying to start a Burning Beard record label, but I was having difficulty pulling it all together by myself. And while waiting for a few pressing houses to get back to me, McHank called and asked if I wanted to start a record label with him."

Named after a Fugazi song, Styrofoam Records' records are hand-made from an eight-foot sheet of plastic that has been cut and shaped to size, and then recorded in real time at Tennessee-based Funky Fran-

kenstein. "Real time" means exactly what it sounds like: if a record contains 40 minutes of music, the recording will take 40 minutes to manufacture. Audiophiles report an increase in sound quality results. Products are limited to 100 copies and released in batches of 50. Bands sell the records at their shows and, when they run out, another batch can be created and the process repeated.

Wiederkehr's ties to the local music scene meant he brought a performer's insight to the label, having been a member of Brick Bath, Mud Hound, and Mildred Pierce (whose opening acts included Stone Temple Pilots). When signing bands to the label, "We look for the diamonds in the rough," he says. "Gems that might be undiscovered or might need a little help creating some really cool collectible merch." McHank is the one who collaborates with the performers to hand create stickers, patches, and a custom 'zine that accompanies the vinyl. His enthrallment with the scene from a fan's standpoint complements his partners' expertise. All that resulted in the label's first signing: The Sess.

"Our dear friend McHank has been a dedicated supporter of our band right from its humble beginnings," says Sess guitarist/vocalist Sam Rivera. "Ever since we reunited and started playing music together again, The Sess has ignited a renewed passion within us to keep performing and creating.

Our plans include playing more live shows and, for the first time, releasing our debut album on vinyl." The record sold out at the release party, prompting Styrofoam to issue cassette tapes for purchase at the Burning Beard Brewery location. The label also provided tapes for South Park's Vinyl Junkies and Reanimated Records in La Mesa.

"We got the cassettes so people could buy an analog, tangible copy until we get more records in," says McHank. "It's also an economical option for the budget-conscious punk rockers of today." On his own social media, McHank offers advice on where to purchase a cassette player — a true crusader for the cause of physical media. Streaming platforms have made more music accessible for less money, but that has come at the expense of artists, and arguably, lessened people's connection to the material they're hearing. A large segment of listeners can't say what album a song is from, and have never spent time staring at a record sleeve, reading the lyrics, and immersing themselves in the experience.

Regardless, Rivera at The Sess feels there are still customers for all media. "We're at a point where both digital and physical formats can coexist harmoniously," he says. Still, "physical media, especially vinyl records, has experienced a remarkable resurgence. As a passionate record enthusiast, witnessing this revival has been truly amazing."

The label's operations stand in opposition to those of the all-encompassing conglomerates. But rather than being a nostalgic throwback, it's a continuation of the DIY ethics of Dischord, Epitaph, and SST. "Business-wise, this isn't feasible at all," says Wiederkehr. "This is more of an art project than a business."

McHank echoes that sentiment. "It's hard to think of it as a business. Really, we just want to make things. So we do."

If frogs had wings

The musical universe expands at Observatory North Park

"Some guy jumped from the top balcony onto the speakers and then down onto the floor. And then some other guy dove off the stage onto his face on the floor and had to go out to our merch table. They gave him a T-shirt to wipe the blood off his face, and he ended up right back under the pit. It was crazy." Les Claypool is speaking of an early '90s Primus show at the infamous south-of-the-border venue Iguanas — where they also played with tonight's hand-picked opener Fishbone, whom Claypool describes as "heroes of ours."

No millennials are jumping off balconies at Observatory North Park tonight, where Colonel Les Claypool's Fearless Flying Frog Brigade is playing. But it's still fun: a collection of music nerds of all ages and genders show up in garb depicting everything from extreme death metal to prog obscurities like Haken, peppered with acts like Zappa and King Crimson. The Crimson references will make their way from crowd to stage when the band opens with a cover of Crimson's "Thela Hun Ginjeet (Part One)," a 1981 song that Claypool counts among his favorite tracks. There's even a couple in the crowd dressed in frog outfits; they tell me they will get their wings and become flying frogs soon.

Fishbone frontman Angelo Moore sets up at the band's merch booth, chatting with fans after a set that sounded tough to follow. His kindness and availability are the antithesis of the meet-and-greet packages that have become the industry norm, wherein bands charge up to two grand for a brief photo op and pre-signed swag. Neither Moore nor the fans are in any rush, and a line forms. I've never developed the "skill" of leaving my inner fanboy at home and conducting myself professionally, so my face hurts from smiling as I wait my turn. Watching Angelo interact with the fans in such a gentle and accommodating fashion is such a pleasure. Speaking of smiles: when my turn comes up,

Moore recognizes Mr. Sardonicus on my shirt, and we chat about that film in particular and monsters in general. He points out new music and other merch for sale, including a comic he created. In the past, I would have happily shelled out cash to the merch booth because it supported the bands directly. But I know that now, promoters take up to 30 percent of merch sales, which creates a conflict for me. Before snapping the inevitable selfie, I tell Moore I have to think about it, but that I will probably get it online.

When I chat with Les Claypool, I learn that his memories of San Diego are limited to local sailing being "kinda cool," so I spend a chunk of our time being a bass nerd. It's one thing to

hear an artist parrot lines about loving music and playing for themselves. It's quite another thing to witness it genuinely and firsthand, as when Claypool expresses shock upon learning that he inspired Geddy Lee of Rush, one of his influences.

After he hits the stage, I start hearing snatches of conversation around me. A common refrain: "When are they going to play *Animals*?" The Pink Floyd album is not the most accessible release, and its complete performance by Claypool and company came about when Claypool decided that, if he ever picked up a keyboard player, the band would do that Floyd album track-by-track. That the

Mainly Mozart owns the Ninth, and other 2022-23 highlights

With the Mainly Mozart Festival now over, the 2022-2023 season has come to an end. I know it is possible to view Mainly Mozart as the beginning of the summer festival season, but to my mind, it is the big finish. There were some great moments in the 2022-2023 season. Let's take a look at a few of them.

I went to two San Diego Symphony concerts at The California Center for the Arts Escondido, Both were excellent. This first featured Johannes Brahms's Symphony No. 1. It is the new standard by which I will compare all future Brahms Firsts. Rafael Payare was in particularly good form. In the famous final movement. Payare was exuding so much energy that I thought he might start levitating.

The second concert was anchored by Jean Sibelius's Symphony No. 2. Finnish conductor Tarmo Peltokoski

made his U.S. debut with a resounding victory. When the big theme came back in the final movement, it was a moment I'll never forget. At the time, I was convinced this was a legitimate top-five concert experience. But as I look at my list, I realize that there are at least 11 top-five experiencees. An embarrassment of riches

With its production of Giacomo Puccini's Tosca, the San Diego Opera proved itself to be willing and able to present traditional opera that is powerful and tasteful. Very few things turn me off more than opera productions that have been updated for modern audiences. I've seen a few that do work. such as Willy Decker's "Big Clock" La Traviata and the Barenboim Ring Cycle from Bayreuth circa 1991. However, on the whole, I find them to be misguided and lazy. They appear as

clever — and often, not so clever — ideas, as opposed to organic developments of the operatic tradition. San Diego Opera's Tosca was well-produced, well-conceived, and most importantly, well-suna.

Of course, The Mainly Mozart Festival provided a few great moments. The performance of Gustav Mahler's Symphony No. 4 and the closing night performance of Beethoven's Symphony No. 9 are also vying for a spot in my top five. The Beethoven Ninth is probably in there.

My own personal five-fetish aside, I cannot imagine a better Beethoven Ninth.

Really, Mainly Mozart owns a few pieces in my mind. The Ninth is simply the most recent. Mainly

Mozart also owns Sergei Prokofiev's Symphony No. 1, Ralph Vaughan William's The Wasps Overture, Beethoven's Violin Concerto, and Beethoven's Symphony No. 8, to name a few.

keyboardist for this tour is Harry Waters - son of Floyd co-founder Roger Waters, the primary architect of Animals — is monumental. Hearing him sing his father's words is as uplifting as hearing the entire audience sing along with him.

I try to get a look at how Claypool delivers the bass lines, but he turns his back to us at key moments. I'm sure he's communicating with the drummer, but I personalize it and call him a fucker in my mind anyway. Remarkably, for all the skill and legacy onstage, it's Beatle-spawn Sean Ono Lennon on guitar who commands my attention the most. The mild trepidation I feel at hearing someone besides David Gilmour playing Pink Floyd music evaporates when the lead break for "Dogs" comes in. It's not so much that Lennon nails it, it's the way he *means* it, and his presence onstage commands attention.

Fellow Reader scribe Gabe Garcia materializes near me, and we share a few shorthand words, watching Angelo Moore from Fishbone join the group on electronic theremin and vocals. It's a hypnotic near-finale that leaves me feeling like I've seen parts of the musical universe anew, and am wiser because of it. ■

Havana Grill makes this Mission Valley mall a Cuban dining destination

Havana Grill Mission Valley; 1652 Camino Del Rio N, San Diego. There are quite a few reasons to visit the new location of Havana Grill, but two features in particular convinced my wife to join me for lunch.

Bear in mind, she's tagged along on enough of my foodie misadventures to know that not all the restaurants I want to write about turn out to be winners, and she's content to let me uncover the losers on my own. It did help that I could already recommend Havana Grill based on previous visits to its first location, in Clairemont. And it didn't hurt that the Cuban counter restaurant pledges a focus on "organic," "naturally

But what tipped the scales was, first, being able to show her a photo of the restaurant's seafood paella

raised," and "non-GMO"

ingredients.

menus, the founders of Havana Grill employ the recipes of a mid-century restaurant they operated in Havana. In addition to that wifeapproved paella, the menu offers plates of wine-braised oxtail, ropa vieja stewed beef, and roasted chicken.

Other Cuban mainstays you find in plate orders also turn up on sandwiches. In the case of the roasted lechon pork, you'll find it on several variations of the classic Cubano sandwich, whether you want to stick to its best-known construction with smoked ham, mustard, and pickles; opt for a Hot Cuban (with jalapeños); or take a chance on the Crazy Cuban, which owes

\$4 cheaper (\$15). I went with sandwich over plate because Havana Grill doubles as a bakery, and its baked-on-premise breads make for outstanding sandwiches.

A surprising benefit? Sand-

Whether you aim for sandwich or plate, the last-but-not-least impor-

wrong nabbing any of the empanadas, stuffed with the likes of pork, chicken, and beef (\$4.25 each). And I can't even do justice to the colorful array of desserts displayed at the service counter (prices vary). Let's call it enough to say that a pair of eye-catching tarts — key lime mango (\$8.75) and salted caramel chocolate (\$8) tasted even better than they looked.

My wife will never agree with all my decisions, but I'm told we can have a lunch date at Havana Grill anytime.

It may help Mexican Food enthusiasts to think of vaca frita as Cuba's beefy answer to crispy carnitas.

Here at Havana Grill, the same terrific beef goes on a sandwich, dubbed "the Cuban American." Ordered over this year's long 4th of July weekend, mine even came garnished with a tiny American flag. But that's not why I ordered vaca frita on a sandwich. And it wasn't because it's

That said, I'm delighted to report that it's possible to visit the restaurant without technically setting foot inside Westfield Mission Valley mall. Havana Grill faces out to the parking lot from the shopping center's northeast entrance, the one next to Nordstrom Rack. It even offers a window

counter where you may quickly order a Cuban coffee to go.

But it's worth going inside, if only to see what you get when a locally owned business, rather than a chain restaurant, takes up occupancy in a mall. Tasteful tile and brick surround an island bar and airy dining space, where vintage streetlamps, window shutters, and trees create the illusion of courtyard dining. The servers add Cuban flair by wearing straw

- German artist Werner Hartl of Reichersbeuern paints stunning agriculture and landscape scenes, mostly of cows, Oddity Central reported. What sets Hartl apart is his medium of choice: diluted cow manure. Hartl places a canister beneath a cow's rear end as it poops, then mixes the dung with water. "I use watered-down dung for the light shades ... I use dung with no water mixed in for the dark shades," Hartl explained. "When it is wet, the 'paint' is a bit funky, but when it's completely dry, it doesn't smell anymore," he said.

The Aristocrats

 A Brooklyn-based art collective called MSCHF created a teeny tiny handbag that sold for \$63,000 at auction on June 28, CNN reported. The neon green bag, measuring less than 0.03 inches wide, is fashioned after an iconic Louis Vuitton bag called the OntheGo tote, but it was not sanctioned by the designer. It was made using technology that prints 3D microscale plastic parts and was sold with a microscope so the owner can see it.

- The Bridge of Flowers between Shelburne and Buckland, Massachusetts, draws walkers from both cities to view the flora alongside the footbridge, Mass Live reported. But now the Bridge of Flowers Committee is asking residents not to scatter loved ones' ashes there. "It's not healthy," said Carol Angus, co-chair of the committee. "The gardeners and volunteers are then exposed to the human remains," and the leaves and roots of the plants are damaged. "It's very upsetting," Ängus added.

It was part of Grandparents Weekend, where nanas and pop-pops received free admittance and could participate in prize drawings. 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
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
