



The rave wave rolls on A new generation seeks the secret scene

On August 13, locals took to TikTok to post about a recent underground rave in town. While the location on the video posts was undisclosed, it was clear that the partygoers, who looked as if they were in their teens and twenties, accessed the rave via a long, graffiti-laden tunnel. Last month two other illicit EDM parties made local news: a woman reportedly overdosed; and a man who

on patrol. I was on Hotel Circle and just by the golf course. That's crazy." The rave was being held underneath a Morena Boulevard bridge, just east of the I-5 and Mission Bay.

619newsmedia posted a video online of five paramedics carrying out an unidentified female raver who reportedly "overdosed." The first responders used a patient mover, which resembles a stretched-out blanket with

appeared much older than the other ravers was busted with a knife. The other rave lasted through the night, even though the police department knew about it.

The first rave, held on July 16, was so loud that a man named Antonio who was working the night shift near the Riverwalk Golf Club in Mission Valley posted on Instagram that he could hear the bass from two miles away. "I was wondering why I heard loud music

"Officers called for backup, and air support was requested... The man with the knife was taken into custody, questioned, and released."

Two weeks after that, another rave popped off in a canyon underneath the 805 freeway in Sorrento Valley by Carroll Canyon Road. The event featured a DJ up on stage and a truss system with a light show, all "powered by a generator ... on Caltrans property," reported CBS 8 News. And because the rave's location was off the beaten path — deep in the brush and "down in a ravine, a canyon area that we cannot safely access," according to a police radio transmission — the rave proceeded as planned until early Sunday morning. Continued the police,

"So, unless we get any 911 calls out here with any emergency assistance, we'll be clearing from here." A few hours later, a CBS 8 News reporter hiked to rave's location; it was cleaned up, with "no trash left behind."

"Yea, I'm one of the kids," posted one raver on Instagram. "I had so much fun last night - the same way you go to clubs and party, same thing, just underground. Fuck off."

During this reporter's days of attending San Diego's underground raves as a '90s teenager,

attendees would receive codes on their pagers, or be given fliers that provided numbers they could call from pay phones. This pre-internet subterfuge was an effort to keep the location relatively secret — as in, we knew but the cops didn't. Part of the allure of being a raver was the experience of enjoying the party before it got raided. "Back then, if you were in the scene, it was word of mouth to get into the raves," said Jesus "Jesusdapnk" Diaz in a recent interview with me. Diaz - a local EDM music producer and resident DJ at Bang Bang, a popular EDM club downtown - began attending raves as a teen in 2008. Around that time, the music-friendly MySpace platform was the place to push events, while Facebook

to the "treasure hunt" aspect of the scene as Gen X ever was - maybe moreso.

Of course, a rave may also be aboveground, that is, legal, depending on how and where the event is held. Some promoters and partygoers call EDM festivals raves, because they are legit and open to the public for the price of a ticket, although folks still sneak in drugs. But while partying all night is not illegal, many of the activities associated with raves are — things like underage folks staying out after curfew, illicit drug use, and trespassing on private property.

"The drug use at the underground raves is still the same," Diaz added. "E [ecstasy] is the primary choice, and many people nowadays are micro-dosing with shrooms and acid, and a lot of people smoke weed. But, unlike back in the day, you can't really see anybody that's super f'd up." But what about the girl at the July 16 rave? "When you have to go way out of your way to attend the rave, you have to be careful and not get super f'd up," Diaz advised. The treks to some underground raves are nearly a mile long and over rugged terrain. For some newbie ravers, it might be overwhelming to hike back to their vehicles after a long night of dancing. "But that happens even at the legal Las Vegas events. Also, nowadays, ravers must be extra careful with those pills because now they can be laced [with fentanyl]."

was just picking up. "Now, it's easier for people to know about the raves because of social media." Diaz continued.

Diaz, now 31, said that "the underground events are still popping up in sewers or underneath bridges and warehouses. It's pretty insane! In fact, those people - I can't mention any names, the same promoters from the 1990s — still book me for [both underground and legit] raves today. And they promote the old school way," as well as dropping locations on the Stories section of IG and Facebook an hour or so before the party begins. "These guys do it out of love and admiration for the music; it's not about the money," Diaz added. "It keeps the true rave scene alive." And it seems that Generation Z is just as attracted

VALLEY CENTER

No assurance of insurance As private companies bail on fire coverage, rural residents must reckon with state plan

Valley Center resident Steve Sedio says that he has noticed a few brush fires in his area over the last three weeks. "We did have one fire that alerted us quickly because it was very close to my [PurpleAir] sensor," he said. "It was even closer to the CalFire Valley Center Fire Station on Vesper." And according to fire officials, there were also two other, larger fires recently in Valley Center. On July 16, Cal Fire San Diego assessed an 8-acre fire that threatened buildings by Couser Canyon continued on page 3



Road and Lilac Road, and on August 2, Cal Fire San Diego responded to and put out a 5.5-acre blaze by Calle Oro Verde.

North County residents are especially

worried about these fires because many of them have lost their fire insurance coverage. Sedio, a retired engineer turned inventor, was able to keep his fire insurance, but not for too long, he says, as it "is leaving California. Last year, our area went from a mix of [moderate to] high fire risk to all high fire risk." His home insurance rates doubled. Sedio's neighbor Leslie Grimes adds, "I do know that most Facebook groups are filled with people posting about their insurance being canceled and being forced onto the California FAIR Plan. I didn't get canceled, but the amount I paid tripled in cost,

and even with that, it left me underinsured. The insurance uses a rating system the government assigns."

The Insurance Services Office provides a fire rating score backed by the fire departments and insurance companies. The score generally reflects how prepared given areas and communities are for fires by assessing things like fire departments and water supply in the vicinity. The better the score, the lower the insurance premium. On the flip side, a low enough score can result in a denial of fire coverage. back from these markets." Rachael's post garnered 98 comments; many live in North County and don't have fire coverage.

John O. updated his Facebook group about how he was able to get fire coverage on his insurance policy with a 20 percent price increase. "Got a letter from Progressive, my current insurer, that I had to document my house was fire safe with defensible

space. Some of the standards they quoted were pretty much impossible to meet, but I did my best. I had the Valley Center fire department come out and give me a complimentary inspection for defensible space. I followed their instructions to the letter, sent in their report and pictures of the work that was completed, and today, received acknowledgment that they will continue our policy."

For his part, Steve Sedio took a proactive approach in the home-defense department after he heard that his insurer would

Commenter Rachael posted that she's been trying to get home insurance covering fires so her family can rent out their home. "We checked with 23 companies today, and none offer new policies in California. They said we could get home insurance that doesn't cover fires and then get California's FAIR Plan to cover fires, which would probably cost double what we're paying now." The FAIR plan's website describes it as "a temporary safety net." It's a fire insurance pool made up of insurers licensed to conduct casualty and property business in California. The site notes, "In the last decade, more Californians have turned to the Plan as wildfires have devastated California and some insurers have pulled

be leaving the California market. "I'll need state fire insurance augmented with a company-sourced loss and liability insurance," he said. So he recently purchased and applied some wildfire-blocking gel around his home, and has looked into the WEEDS wildfire protection system. And as mentioned, he has installed PurpleAir exterior smoke detectors, funded by Valley Center Wireless. The fire intel gathered by his sensors is relayed to the AQISPY/TwisterKat phone app he helped develop. "The system was established to provide early warning during Santa Ana-driven fires," he said. "One night, there was a structure fire one mile upwind of a sensor."

UNDER THE RADAR

Rudder and stick A San Diego aviator whose company made the seaplane featured in **Kevin Costner**'s movie *Waterworld* has lost his appeal to the National Transportation Safety Board of an administrative judge's ruling in June 2022 that revoked his commercial flying license. The decision was handed down in a July 24 Opinion and Order against **Michael Steel** of San Diego Seaplanes. The saga began back on February 27, 2020, when Federal Aviation

Administration inspectors cited a raft of maintenance issues with Steel's Helio H-295 seaplane, in which he piloted tourists on sightseeing trips around the harbor and coast. Instead of grounding the plane until the problems were fixed, according to the NTSB document, Steel took off on March 1, 2020, from El Cajon's Gillespie Field to San Diego Bay. The same day, according to the

opinion, Steel "served as the pilot-in-command of [the seaplane] on an air tour with four passengers aboard, taking off and landing in San Diego Bay." He "concluded that day by serving as the pilot-in-command on a flight from San Diego Bay back to Gillespie Field Airport."

Two days later, FAA inspectors returned to inspect the seaplane's logs, subsequently determining that the plane "was not approved for return to service prior to the flights on March 1, 2020."

A so-called sanction hearing was held by an administrative law judge on June 22, 2022. At the hearing, Steel, according to

the NTSB document, "began his testimony by explaining his piloting career. He stated that he flew his first solo flight at 16 years old in 1977 and obtained his private pilot license in 1978. He stated that he obtained his commercial pilot, ground instructor, and flight instructor certificates with multiple ratings in 1979-1980. He stated that during that time, he flew aerobatics and did aerobatic training.

"He indicated that he 'aced' his written tests and saved lives when he was flying search and rescue. He added that he has 'literally taught thousands' of people to fly safely, including military personnel. His aviation career also included flying for Hollywood movie productions and piloting a replica of the A-1 Triad in the centennial celebration of Naval aviation." In addition, Steel "noted that during all his years of flying, he has never had a single incident where an aircraft was damaged, had an insurance claim or any passengers were injured."

On cross-examination, according to the NTSB ruling, Steel "testified that the rudder on [his seaplane] was not broken, but there was a crack on it. He further stated that if the crack was substantial, then you should not fly until it is fixed. He testified that the crack on his rudder had been there for two years but was small and the rudder

agreed that he continued to fly [the seaplane] with passengers onboard, knowing the crack was there for two years, but insisted the crack did not affect the functioning of the rudder. He also agreed that when he was instructing new pilots, he would advise them to repair a cracked rudder." He also "testified that he disagreed with the February 27, 2020, condition notice and

was still fully functional. He

insisted that [the seaplane] was airworthy."

In denying Steel's appeal, the four-member NTSB board (there is currently one vacancy on the panel) concluded: "We have explained that 'an airman displaying such negative compliance disposition lacks the care, judgment, and responsibility required of a certificate holder because the likelihood of his adherence to regulatory requirements adopted to promote air safety cannot be predicted with any degree of confidence.' In addition to the non-compliance disposition, [Steel] had multiple violations concerning inspections and flight review and recency requirements, which the law judge appropri-

> ately found to 'further bolster the basis for revocation."

Reached by phone last week, Steel blasted the NTSB and FAA, questioning the agencies' integrity and disputing the accuracy of charges related in the NTSB ruling, over which he threatened to file a series of lawsuits against the government.

Daniel Hendy, in his book *Noise: A Human History of Sound and Listening*, writes of the aural confusion in an airport terminal, "its burbled announcements, the steady tread of feet on linoleum floors, the squeak of luggage trollies, the piped music." He quotes the literary historian Steven Connor, who draws a wider arc: "the murmuring emulsion of sound, compounded of all the sounds of rush and hurry, mechanical and human." Those two words, "mechanical" and "human," put me in mind of what they excluded: "animal." Coyotes may yip, but the other wild creatures that come out at night to forage — raccoons, skunks, rats, snakes, possums and the like — do so in admirable silence. I envy them their working hours. Come the urban daytime clamor, I want to flee with them into the wilderness.

I'm not sure why, but lately, my ears have grown scarily sensitive to noise, to the point where I am — and this is putting it mildly — often irritated by the sounds of the world around me. I find myself wishing I could annihilate many of them — even somehow silence their obnoxious producers. The rifling of popcorn from a plastic bag behind me at the Rady Shell. The vibratory, quaking menace of subwoofer speakers in the car stopped beside me. But no can do. All too often, I cannot help but hear it all, the soft and the loud, the aural invasion of my everyday life. Sometimes, there are measures I can take: on planes, I listen to Wayne Shorter via my earbuds and affix, over them, form-fitting earmuffs that are not unlike those worn by the workers outside guiding the aircraft along their tarmac. My ears need their privacy, so I dress them behind a twofold curtain. If I don't, I go screwy from the dopey chatter, the squalling babies, the engine rumble, and, for me, the *audible* internal terror — set to buzz, like a Geiger counter — of turbulence. No wonder I prefer the part of my life I spend writing alone in my double-panewindowed home office.

Noise pollution is a curse of our urban realm, a necessary obscenity, I know, but still: there are too many people running too many machines too often, concentrated

into one cauldron, boiled and boiled again. We have no choice but to adapt to this noisome stew. No exceptions, unless the government enforces its regulations — sleep laws in 17 states are the latest pushback — or we're rich enough to buffer our interior walls from the onslaught.

We measure sound in decibels, dB. The audible range is set logarithmically, like the Richter scale: Every 10 dB increase is twice as loud. Thus, 30 dB is very quiet, like a library you might remember from childhood, while 40 dB is twice that, the way most libraries sound these days. There are research chambers designed to absorb all sound at 30 dB and below, like the one where John Cage heard his heart beating and blood flowing. As we move up the ladder to the top, we find the alltoo-common bleats and blares: vacuum cleaner at 10 feet, 65 dB; full restaurant, 80 dB; 747 on a runway 1500 feet away, 85 dB; food processor, 90 dB, car honk and truck blast, 100 dB; chainsaw, 110 dB; live rock and roll band, 130 dB; fighter jet, 150 dB; and a shotgun in your ear, 160 dB.

Speaking of 747s: San Diegans know the upper limits of unwanted sounds, given the roaring airplanes that take off over Point Loma and Mission Beach and land over Little Italy, and the Miramar aircraft rocketing over Carmel Valley and Mira Mesa. Oh, and the leaf blowers, Gaslamp bars, jackhammering street repairs, high-speed highways, Fourth of July fireworks (4 in 10 dogs suffer trauma), alarms that blare *meep-meepmeep* from a bumped or vandalized car, and the terror-inducing throb of a hovering helicopter.

What San Diegans may not know is that such noises are often "violations" or "illegal" or both. They should incur fines and cease, but they don't. One can read either the regulations listed in the County's Ordinance 9962 or the City's 2015 policy document, Noise Element. The two concur. Residents are entitled to these "applicable limits": 7 am to 7 pm, no more than 65 dB and 7:01 pm to 6:59 am, no more than 55 dB. For single residential properties adjacent to each other, the nighttime limit is 40 dB. But some of the over-the-top sources I cited above get special treatment. For example, gas-powered leaf blowers run between 75 and 110 dB. After decades of letting these things hobble our ears, a few fed-up state legislators got the gas-belching, deafening blowers banned as of 2024. The "softer" battery-driven ones will replace them.

In my office, it's quiet right now. But that wasn't the case for all of 2022. Last year, my partner and I endured building: banging next door on one side and two doors down on the other side — at times intermittent, at times continuous. Additional dwelling units. Lots of apologies, but what can we do? It was our neighbors' homes!

Other times, I hear the steel-on-steel grind that trains make on tracks and the "air turbulence

Call (619) 658-5418 California Research Foundation noise," that is, the vortical or whirling motion of air molecules disbursed by a turbine engine's passing. (A tornado's approach, say those in its path, sounds like a freight train.) The city's policy states: "When operating in residential areas, trains are required to travel at a reduced speed to minimize noise." Minimize noise? Not true in Encinitas, where the Coaster comes clattering through at 50+ miles per hour. And federal law requires the trains to blare their horns at all "roadway-rail grade crossings." Which they do, loud and clear. And what do the people of Encinitas do in response — call the police? Hardly. They curse the din and comply. It's the price of living in paradise.

* * *

Not all things aurally noticeable are offensive. A good way to think about noise is on a spectrum, from the worst and most maddening noises — like the 95 dB of a car alarm or the band headlining at the Casbah — to the friendly get-along-with-it chatter among neighbors in their front yards, or the crowd at a wedding, or even the happy squawk of a parrot flying overhead; to the barely bothersome hum of an overhead fan gently oscillating, or the hypnotic babble of a brook near a campsite. My sense is that we do this without thinking about it; we're innately good at segregating ugly from benign noise, the latter is hardly painful. But in the end, noise is noise - one-dimensional, repetitive, its effect irritating to insufferable, and, studies show, sometimes life-threatening, a sort of silent stalker.

The two worst noises are the two we've endured since 1950: interstate road surfaces and the jumbo jets. People who rattle these noisy cages - with civil complaints, op-eds, or dosimeter research — must play a long game. One such crusader is trial lawyer Anthony Stiegler. He and two other local activists have sued the San Diego County Regional Airport Authority, or SDCRAA, for its new airline routes that have now increased along the coast. Over a latte in Bird Rock, he tells me these routes, more widely dispersed of late, will probably never be quieted. Instead, he joins a legally rearmed redoubt who, across generations, have tried and failed to move the airport to Miramar or to tamp down the roar even a little bit.

This time, the big-donor nudge may be working. His organization, Quiet Skies La Jolla, has been grappling with a new federal dragon since 2017: the FAA's NextGen Southern California Metroplex project. This colossus has created binding new air-traffic patterns whose reach now jostles residents from South Mission Beach to Bird Rock, adding their anxiety to that of those in Point Loma. Bringing a lawsuit against the SDCRAA and hoping for quick results, he says, is like "trying to move an aircraft carrier by leaning against it." The feds wield ultimate power. They mandate airports nationwide abide by their edicts. And they insist our region's refurbished air-traffic "highways in the sky" are too complex to alter once pilots are trained and the FAA's verification of its own program has, well, verified its own program.

In 2020, Quiet Skies settled its lawsuit with the SDCRAA, but it was

a Pyrrhic victory. The feds agreed to evaluate different flight patterns (i.e., turn west and south once over the ocean); and they say they'll reexamine their current procedures in 2026. For its part, Quiet Skies has agreed not to be thorn in the side of the new Terminal 1 construction, even though the estimate is that San Diegans will, by its completion, wake up to a 20 percent increase in daily flights. This, Stiegler says, will mean some 50 flights an hour, all day, thundering up into the sky as late as 11:30 pm.

As our conversation winds down, Stiegler and I bat around the terms "annoyance" and "intolerable." I find the former term milquetoast, a useless private peccadillo. Lots of things in modern life are annoying: cleaning my pool, paying \$4.59 a gallon for gas. When the beach communities get sick and tired of overhead noise and organizes, it's a sign that the source of the din has been born again; a new constituency finds the level intolerable. For his part, Stiegler remains diplomatic, trying to tame the regulatory tigers. He says in an email that regulators "did not appreciate the negative impacts to human health from repetitive and concentrated flight paths over the communities below, nor the resistance they'd encounter nationwide to the NextGen flightpath rollout."

One more note: a new organization — the 67-member Aviation Impacted Communities Alliance, with ear-weary neighborhoods in Atlanta, Los Angeles, Honolulu, and others (my favorite group: "Keep It Down Up There") — is marshaling evidence about plane noise and emissions and lobbying Congress for federal enforcement. As Stiegler wrote in a recent La Jolla Light column, the idea of what's bearable and what's not is getting a retrofit: one now-andagain overflight at 65 dB is nothing, not when compared, he says, to the nerve-racking effect of "10 overflights in 30 minutes," which soon may be our new normal — and which may enlist a new legion of pissed-off locals.

* * *

The deeper I descend into the sound abyss in search of innovative abatements (aka American ingenuity), the more I find a burgeoning science that's busy cataloging the deleterious effects of noise pollution on our bodies. Alas, pollution by sound is no different from the environmental problems of climate change; local action can only do so much against the onslaught. According to The New York Times, a bevy of brain scans reveal how the damage is done: the amygdala over-activates, the endocrine system reacts with too much cortisol and adrenaline, stress hormones weaken, factory workers suffer tinnitus and their deafening accelerates, kids' reading scores fall and their attention declines, stadium and theater surroundsounds and arena spectacles frazzle our nerves with brain-sloshing video effects and skull-jarring blasts. (I realize some masochists pay money to experience such aural chaos, thus, like extreme sports, cleansing the gene pool.) Among the biggest consequences: one in three American workers suffers hearing loss and/or other health and safety effects due to machines, traffic noise, and

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

Noise pollution is the number one occupational illness in the country. Aural menaces contribute to American's shortening life expectancy - down two years since the pandemic began, down to levels last seen in 1996 — a fact unequally shared by biological sex. Today, life expectancy for men is five years less than for women, in part, because of the nailgun bulleting job sites where, overwhelmingly, it's guys doing the work.

The city cites four "attenuation methods" designed to increase our peace and quiet: reducing the sound level of the noise generator, interrupting the noise path between the source and receiver, increasing the distance between the source and receiver, and insulating the receiver (building material and construction methods). All of the methods help to reduce interior noise levels, but only the first three help to reduce outside noise levels — with the exception of aircraft noise. As mechanically apropos as these ways to quiet, interrupt, distance, and insulate may be — note, there is no *eliminate* — attenuation stipulates sufficient spatial separation and financial outlays. It's true that if you build near a noise source (freeway, airport, turbine hub), California codes mandate contractors to mitigate intermittent or continuous sounds that rattle common walls and wobble floors. This is what the acoustician Ionathan Brothers of Eilar Associates in Escondido tells me. "That's where you have a fitness center and the weightlifters drop the barbells on the floor or the super-loud HVACs,

the air-conditioning units, whirl and buzz all day." Typically, high-end projects have space to cordon or decenter the HVAC, while sardined apartment complexes (now countywide) have no such "luxury." Noiselowering regulations instruct builders to erect buffers; consequently, says Brothers, "you start losing floor space while the construction material cost goes up." The costs for such changes are passed on to the customers who visit or inhabit these commercial properties.

* * *

As I say, for a century, we hapless citizens have diligently complied with noise. But relief may within sight — or within earshot. There are forces making inroads against the racket. Today, managers facing health liabilities with employees welcome OSHA to measure the din at venues and facto-

ries, a practice which has sparked a lucrative business in noise abatement. One such, up the road in Los Angeles, is Innovative Noise Consulting, which is currently advising locals about the clamor at the Padres' Gallagher Square — a complicated, lawyer- and councildriven affair, says project manager, Jasmine Chow. Nothing's been signed as yet. So I ask her what kinds of noises clients bring to her company for acoustic fixes. Noise sources are multiple, she replies. Among the less intrusive is "echo reverberation," sound transferred "between rooms in apartment buildings, movie theaters, condos. Usually because contractors don't understand how things should be acoustically built." Her company repairs slipshod construction or creates muffled environments from scratch. Pre-planning may help avoid snafus such as a gun range

being built in a warehouse across the street from an animal hospital. (Yes, really.) One pooch lover asked the veterinarians whether the shooting might distress the caged hounds. What a question. The dogs shake and wither from the pops, so the sounds must be stifled with slabs of impervious acoustic foam.

After acousticians run a noise audit, the company installs new stud-braced second walls with insulation, or a new roof, or windows, double- or triple-paned. Chow describes one case that earned her firm its name. In a suburban home, there lived a special needs child who yelled and threw things, breakable and resonant, day and night. The neighbors, scared and at wit's end, organized; they called Innovative, and the parties approved a solution: a double-frame window. In effect, a dry-walled space in front of one sealed window with a second sealed window. The redundancy did the trick.

The most difficult are the loud-by-design venues: music festivals and nightclubs. And then there's the machine-mad factories; the loudest in Chow's tenure was a printing press in El Monte. Workers complained that the wailing press exceeded California law, so much so that the sound pierced their ear muffs. "It operates at night," Chow says. "Guys come in and out with trucks to load and unload paper. And there's the sound of the press itself. Our solution was to build a very thick plenum between the printing press with its constant roaring and the dock itself." A plenum is an air shaft that walls in an air duct or chamber. The space sealed the two competing noises from each other and cut the noise for workers in half. The best incomplete solution available, she notes.

It could be worse. California has America's toughest noise codes and ordinances, Chow says. Our state's OSHA possesses "the strictest policies." Complaints arise from lawsuits or government audits. She's heard of scams back east that are rare out west. For example: a person buys a rundown house for \$200,00, next to a grating fracking operation or factory, sues the noise producer for infringing on his or her tranquility and health, and collects a sweet \$1 million.


A noise-reducing business works to *sound*damp or *sound*-deaden, the former to mute using berms, the latter to bulwark a material mass that's impenetrable. Clearly, the latter rarely happens if the source re-

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fuses to tone down. We both laugh at why, prelawsuit, any offending venue can't self-regulate or be told to simply lower the volume. Turning serious, she says the Gallagher Square dogfight "is going to be tricky." It's not financially possible to insulate high-rise condominiums, window by window, porch by porch, from bottom-heavy rap, punk, or metal — apparently, the worst culprits. Nor will large baffles around the square work, because such mitigation would add a new layer of "visual pollution," which is, interestingly, forbidden by the original design.

The proposed fix for Gallagher is, according to the Padres' memorandum, "improved noise mitigation measures during events, including updated technology, such as delay towers and directional speakers." To my ears, this sounds specious. If the towers "delay" the sound, it's hardly diminished. And I wonder in which direction those speakers direct the sound. Away from the assembled masses? Seems the opposite of what the masses are there for. Good luck with any Gallagher redesign. I doubt anyone wants to turn the volume down because, well, at the risk of letting my geezer flag fly, the point of the "music" is to be as aurally disruptive as possible.

Whatever inspires the opprobrium of one group may be a boon to another. Not a perversity but an opportunity. Thus, noise *music*, whose composers use the extreme spectrums of tone and timbre healthily, fearlessly, to create sculpted sound work, often to a meditative end. One wizard of the noise biz is Christopher Warren, San Diego State music professor and head of their sound design department. Warren is a graduate of the school of New Music, anchored by professor and Pulitzer Prize winner Roger Reynolds at the University of California, San Diego. There, he helped design and utilized the music department's Prebys-funded venue, with its black-box experimental theater. He tells me that he built a room that composers could "play" as a musical instrument. The room can handle any kinds of acoustic or electronic sounds: for Warren, such sound chambers allow him to shape "acoustic responses that the real world cannot provide us with." In this sense, he's a philosopher of engineered sound. At UCSD and a new venue being built at State, he sets up a room so it is whisper quiet - around 30 dB. One's breath becomes audible. Warren

says that the deader the room, the more it's responsive to made electroacoustic sounds, many noise-worthy.

In his San Diego State office, with a semi-absorbent sound panel against one wall (to benefit his neighbor), I ask him to define noise. He hesitates. First, he won't "denigrate" a sound by calling it a noise - a word, like "delinguent," loaded with bad connotations. He notes that "order wouldn't exist without chaos and music can't exist without noise. It is the unstructured stuff that gives the structured stuff structure." Noises, he continues, "are in the service of the creation of something else. It's the sounds that no one intended to make, but they just kind of come out as byproducts of my interests."

His noise bent began in two places. Originally a bass player, he's been "seduced by software." Meaning that the bass whetted his appetite for possibilities of sound production in the electro-acoustic realm of "extended" techniques and amplification. He introduced computers into dead rooms, where he discovered far more spectral potential than the finite traits of traditional instruments. Second, his East Village residence has stoked his noise jolly.

Ten years ago, he and his eventual wife, the clarinetist Arianna Warren, relocated to the city's clamorous center, now known for "nothing but noise." He's adjacent to a fire station. Sirens peal day and night. Windswept cars on nearby I-5 buzz constantly. Plus, there are the parties and Petco Park and Gallagher Square. Add in the Gaslamp Banshee, a great howling wind sound produced by an architectural configuration (not on purpose) at the top of the Downtown library — which, he says, can be heard as far away as the Coronado Bridge.

When the Banshee gets going, he's on site, recording the howl. The sound, the noise — they're indistinguishable. "Material for composition." He says at first he was put off by the East Village bedlam, but now he loves it. He peppers the soundscape himself by powering his Fender Princeton amp to the top setting, #10. "It only sounds good when it's dimed." Luckily, he says, East Village is chockablock with artists like him and his wife, who know that musicians need to uncover the audible limits of their instruments and machines.

One of Warren's primary captures is the glissando, that is, a fastmoving slide between tones nearby or far apart. The classic case: the clarinet's 17-note run-up the scale at the opening of Gershwin's Rhapsody in Blue. Downtown, Warren hears "a glissando in just about everything." Another idea that emphasizes improvised noise music he learned from Pauline Oliveros, who taught in the UCSD music department in the 1970s and died not long ago. "Tuning Meditation" is her text piece, whose recipe instructs a group of people to assemble in a highly resonant environment, take one, two, three deep breaths, and on the fourth breath, sound a tone, hold it for a while, listen for a tone close by and sing it. Then, sing a tone they don't hear. Let the whole slowly cook for five or ten minutes. Warren: "You get a whole group of people doing this, and it is a beautiful study in not only the resonance of the space, but watching something self-assemble because this starts out as the most clashing clusterfuck you've ever heard, right?" Another name for that clusterfuck is artful noise.

The emergent tone is pure Zen — of the moment and, as such, unreproducible. A temporary stifling of life's distractions, the vocal-and-room resonance churchlike, rough edges softened via improvisation among strangers. To assemble in such groups and create this dense, dignified drone is, Warren notes, "about listening to noise and making a music out of it."

* * *

In the end, I still think of noise as a necessary pest; it's like a college buddy, a

porcupine for whom you have to make adjustments when he stays overnight in the guest bedroom. I may be hypersensitive, but I wager mine is a common trait. For instance: why is it that when someone with whom we disagree is talking with someone with we agree, we hear the disagreeable stuff as mindlessly bothersome and the agreeable as music to our ears? It's confirmation bias, our noise-meters homing in accordingly. We are more often more tolerant of the "life-saving" helicopter rotor blades than the "sound-of-freedom" jet engines whooshing overhead.

I remain perplexed at the existential contour of noise. It's personal, it's preferential, it's societal, it's uncontrollable and it's unhealthful. Indeed, the International Commission on Biological Effects of Noise now defines noise as "unwanted and/ or harmful sound." I'm on board with this, because my list of intolerables just keeps growing. Read any government tract or online user's agreement, even the city's Noise Element document, and you'll hear the numbing grind of bureaucratese. Listen, as we must, to the "visual noise," aka the "snow" of reporters analyzing the news on CNN or Fox: they speak in breathlessly spun, syntactically muddied semisentences as if they need to get to the restroom. Bear, if you dare, basketball at University of San Diego's Jenny Craig Slim Gym and the TVish commercial interruptions plus the sphinctertightening air horns. Soak in the mindlessly busy entertainment of the Jumbo-Tron at Petco or Snapdragon stadia. The noisome online popup



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ads. The spam, the trolls, the fake cancellation notices. The nagging pulsation of pop rock in coffeehouses. The pinging or ringing cellphone during live theater. The Blue Angels, the KGB Sky Show, my printer, our Vitamix. The local news updates at the gas pump, which come on only after you pay! Having bought the gas, haven't I paid for silence? The story, I realize, in the end, is also how noise, incompatibly, is paired with consumption and profit. Incompatible because many of us just hear the noise; we don't hear the message.

The truth is we will never be free from our learned adaptive patterns to harmful sounds, which, like social media, have colonized our social space. Those hits of the Eagles from the Sprouts store's tinny speakers are no longer background. They are the foreground of our existence. Nostalgic tunes demand, grab, and affix our attention. Until we start wearing sound-silencing earmuffs or order everything from Amazon and never leave home, or else give up and just dwell in the din.

continued from page 3 backing ex-United Nations ambassador **Nikki Haley**'s 2024 presidential campaign bid, the *Washington Post* reported in an August 11 post.

Meanwhile, Smith and Alden Global co-owner Heath Freeman have put a swanky Montauk, Long Island oceanfront mansion on the market for a cool \$27.5 million, according to an August 10 dispatch by Rupert Murdoch's New York Post. "The six-bedroom home, at 40 Deforest Road, looms over the public Ditch Plains Beach — on the site of the former East Deck Motel," per the story. "It's one of four lots that are about an acre each where the low-rise motel, formerly populated by surfers, once stood."

Added the item: "Designed by architect Boris Baranovich, details include white oak floors, two gas fireplaces, sliding glass doors that open to decks, plus stairs that lead down to the iconic beach and surfer haven." But the lavish spec house, the first of possibly three, did not come without political skullduggery, the paper noted. "The town of East Hampton changed zoning laws to allow the homes to be built despite public opposition that had already shut down a prior investment group's - led by Vitamin Water's J. Darius Bikoff — plan to build a private club on the site of the former motel, which was demolished in 2016."

The mega-mansion was the target of a *New York Times* expose last September 2. "The house is not the size of the mansion belonging to that fictional Long Islander Jay Gatsby, but it's close. It looms over the public parking lot where the Ditch Witch food truck has served egg wraps and burritos since 1994. It looms over the surfers who ride the clean, consistent waves that break past the jetty."

Added the Times: "In its branding, Montauk Colony echoes Malibu Colony, the beach community near Los Angeles. Once a charmingly bedraggled surfer's Mecca, Malibu is now one of the most expensive and celebritystudded communities in the world. This spring, Michael Eisner listed a house on the Malibu bluffs for \$225 million. If Montauk becomes another Malibu, the roughly \$30 million spent in recent years on the land overlooking Ditch Plains Beach may turn out to be a bargain for the LLCs and executives affiliated with Alden, Smith Management and Elliott Management."





Barbie — In the enchanting realm

of Barbie Land, every day is the best day. That is, until midway through a dazzling disco-dance when Barbie (Margot Robbie) asks her fellow Mattel-mates, "Do you guys ever think about dying?" What follows is a philosophical voyage that leaves behind a pink-hued Oz as Barbie and her not-boyfriend Ken (Ryan Gosling) embark on a real-world adventure in an attempt to reconcile her identity. It's a fitting twist for a doll that has spent over six decades inspiring young girls (and boys) to look inward and explore their identity, now having to confront her own existential crisis. Yes, Barbie may be a plastic toy, but she also symbolizes the unrealistic standard of feminine beauty and embodies the prescribed roles in a patriarchal society. As Barbie struggles with the problems that women in the real world have to handle daily, director Greta Gerwig uses the opportunity to delve into some weighty themes uncommon in typical summer blockbusters - most notably the lack of autonomy experienced by women in a male-dominated world. The message of womanhood is not discrete nor does it need to be. There's no peeling back the pink-hues to get to the subtext. Gerwig effortlessly unveils the profound truth of patriarchy's harmful impact on both women and men, as if unboxing a cherished Barbie doll. (2023) - R.B. $\star \star \star$ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Oppenheimer — Small men, big bombs. Not for nothing do the three main movers and shakers in writerdirector Christopher Nolan's very magnum opus refer to themselves as "a humble physicist," "a humble soldier," and "a humble shoemaker." (The first is Robert Oppenheimer,

director of the American effort to beat the Nazis to weaponized nuclear reactions; the second is Leslie Groves, Oppenheimer's military overseer; and the third is Lewis Strauss, the former chair of the Atomic Energy Commission, whose confirmation hearings for Secretary of Commerce - long after the bomb's invention and use - provide the occasion and framework for the time-hopping narrative.) Naturally, none of them mean it, but it's the truth: here, they're just frail cogs in a mighty historical machine. Robert Oppenheimer may have quoted Shiva when he said, "Now I am become death, the destroyer of worlds," but the film treats him as more of a brilliant organizer and pitchman than as a god or even a genius — a brainy strategist in the mold of Steve Jobs. He may get the title — and the cover of Time — but he joins the rest of the characters in the scrum of a story of ordinary men and women caught up in extraordinary times. What they created really did, as the movies like to say, "change the world," but no one here rises to the level of hero, or even tragic hero, and even the villainy on display is more vanity than anything else. Oh, the humanity, indeed. As a result, the three-hour runtime involves an awful lot of talk about impersonal science and highly personal relations, punctuated by one truly spectacular, overwhelming happening. Nolan is a past master at cutting up events and fitting them together to dramatize the former, and also at the kind of grand-scale visuals that do justice to the latter. But the inevitable affect is somber bordering on sour: a well acted, gorgeously shot downer. (2023) (2023) — M.L. ★★

A Weekend with Pablo Picasso

by the ocotillos' root system.

Writer/performer Herbert Siguenza keeps it light and laugh-y at the outset: you want an intimate session with an artistic colossus? How about we start with him in the bathtub? Verv intimate! It's a good thing, because while the script is liberally peppered with Picasso the Performer's self-amused commentary on work, women. art. children, etc., the story is heavyhearted: the Soviets have decimated Hungary, and the communist Picasso must reckon with the fact that the fascists aren't the only ones deserving of a modern nightmare like his anguished Guernica. He's not about to repeat himself, but neither can he keep silent and still adhere to the vision of himself as an artist that he established after losing a high-stakes bet with God. Fortunately, he has obligation to help with his inspiration: a wealthy client has asked for six paintings and three vases by Monday morning, and while he insists that is not a factory, he very much believes in both work and success. The show is scattershot

but never slack, serious but never somber — and it makes first-rate use of the theater's projectors, especially in the sequence tracing one painting's evolution from curious child to anguished artist. Siguenza gives us a man who, like Whitman, is large enough to contain multitudes; viz. his vacillating attitude about his power over a painting vs. its power over him during the act of creation. He is also on his best behavior here - a rascally great-uncle instead of a brilliant monster - and so he remains a reliably entertaining host.

But women talk, don't you know, and in no time, they're plotting to prank the lumbering lothario. The telling line: "Wives may be merry, and yet honest, too," That helps makes sense of the setting: ten years later, that sort of honesty might have been seen as submission, or denial, while a night with the Knight might have come across

as brave, or at least adventurous. And the jealous husband would have been a bad joke, while here he's a good one. The really bold bit comes in the script department, via frequent insertions of era-appropriate lingo. "A soda jerk is a good trade." "Razz my berries." "Tuna casserole? Nummy nummy nummy!" But it's all so frothy and free of consequence that it hardly seems like violence to the Bard's genius even if it only occasionally feels like a genuine addition. (Shoutout to Schlitz.) The actors follow the script's lead and play it big and broad, but this is the good old Globe, so it stops short of over the top. Jenn Harris shows special expertise in this department as Mrs.

Quickly - and boy howdy, is she. A regular Benzedrine queen, all tics and quirks and reliably funny. Tom McGowan's bumbling rascal Falstaff practically comes off as straight man by comparison.

Fish Guts; 2222 Logan Ave., San Diego. Logan Avenue didn't seem to be lacking for taco shops, but then along came Fish Guts anyway. And while the recent addition to Chicano Park's casual restaurant row may bear a dubious name, there's no questioning its noble intent: crafting street tacos, made from scratch, using fresh, local seafood.

Though it presents as a counter shop, grab a menu anyway. Fish Guts offers casual table service, including beer and cocktails, at any of its three rows of countertop. Packed into a small, corner location, its indoor/outdoor patio dining setup manages to squeeze in a lot of seating. And if you're willing to sit upon what are possibly the shortest stools in town, you'll have front row seats to the lively avenue, with a glimpse of the Coronado Bridge up the street.

The surprise to this guy is that it's set up more as a dinner spot. On Wednesday or Thursday, you may order a fried fish sandwich all afternoon, but the tacos don't come out until 4pm. On weekends, however, tacos are served all day, from a mostly ocean-based menu that covers a lot of tasty ground.

Like the fish sandwich, my Baja-style fish tacos were made with a local whitefish. During my Saturday visit, that meant vermillion rockfish: a pleasant and plentiful local catch occasionally named as red snapper or rock cod



on local menus. I cannot stress how much my inner snob prefers this fish over budget-friendly tilapia or swai. And it doesn't disappoint when beer battered with Modelo and dressed with cabbage and chipotle aioli.

If the word aioli didn't tip you off, these are you might call elevated, or gourmet street tacos. Meaning you get two small tacos for \$10-12, and each one is sauced as the chef intended.

I'd probably be fine smothering any lightly seasoned local fish with the contents of your basic salsa bar, but I have no complaints with regard to the chipotle on my Estilo Baja tacos. Nor with the achiote and guajillo chili sauce coating the cubes of salmon filling my al pastor fish tacos. Nor with the deftly applied char visible on the pineapple in the al pastor.

Of course, the salmon al pastor are not made using a local catch, but the blackened swordfish tacos are, and the coconut battered shrimp hails from Baia. Local catch or otherwise, it all comes by way of Tunaville Market and Grocery, the Point Loma seafood market with deep ties to San Diego's fishing community.

All that makes this place something of a fish taco lover's dream: just grab a stool, and start ordering tacos by the pair until you can't eat any more.

Pleasure Pill born from the pain of Covid Jonah

Paz started playing in his first local punk band in 2013, when he was 13 years old. By the time Covid reared its ugly head in 2020, he had cycled through a myriad of groups

and was playing in an experimental trio called JINX! where he served as the sole songwriter. With time on

his hands during the lockdown, Jonah continued his experimentation, and his songs began to mutate. "My songwriting took the turn to what it is now," he says, "of just being a more conventional rock and roll kind of thing, rather than being experimental. I started writing with guitars rather than using synths and stuff like that. It was only a three-piece before: it was bass, synth

and drums. So we needed two guitars. That was pretty much how the new band came to be. We started rehearsing for it in the summer of 2021 and started gigging in September of '21."

This new incarnation of JINX! was notably different than the pre-pandemic version. Paz's songs not only leaned into rock, but also veered quite heavily into Britpop. "We all love that kind of stuff. I think, before the pandemic, I was really interested in finding new music and searching for new bands. What turned me on was stuff that was really avant-garde and kind of insane, because I was young and in college and just excited by that. But then the pandemic was going, and I think subconsciously I just wanted to resort back to things that I have always known. Bands like Stone Roses, Primal Scream, Oasis, Blur, and Suede were definitely bands that I

grew up listening to with my parents. Then I also had a bit of a mod phase, and I was super into that whole culture and early to mid-'60s stuff." And while their overall sound is far more reminiscent of Britpop, the mod element comes across

in the band's sense of fashion and visual aesthetic, as evidenced in their video for "Get There Soon?

Since they started playing in 2021, the group has morphed. The arrival of a new drummer, Dom Friedly, coincided with the more Google-search-friendly name: Pleasure Pill. Members have also retooled their instrumentation, with Jonah now serving solely as the lead singer and ditching his rhythm guitar duties. "It was either that I would fumble guitar lines, or I didn't sing to my fullest potential," he explains. The band's former keyboardist (Jonah's brother Ethan) has picked up the rhythm guitar slack. So, no more keys, right? Not exactly. "We didn't fully sacrifice the synth, because we have a little drum pad that has backing tracks, because some of the songs have more electronic dance beats to them. So when

we switched over, we just put the synth on those live tracks. It doesn't really sacrifice the sound at all. If anything, it makes the guitars scream a bit more when you're just focused on that, rather than what we were doing before."

The band currently has five singles available on Spotify (three of which include B-sides). Even though they have recorded an album's worth of songs, Jonah seems comfortable with the singlesgoing-steady approach. "I

think for the time being, we are just going to be doing the singles game, because that's what people seem to pay attention to right now. Especially for an unsigned band like us."

An interesting aspect of Pleasure Pill is that, even though they have only a handful of songs officially released, their live shows are akin to those of a band that is building setlists from multiple albums. "We can play up to an hour," says Paz. "We have

loads of songs. We can do however long anyone wants us to play. We usually try to keep it to 35 [minutes], to keep people wanting more. We have three releases, five songs out, but I have album two — if you count the original batch of singles as album one - ready to go as well. There's a lot of material, and if you want to hear it, you can just come to the show. We play it all the time and switch it out. We still have enough songs for sets to be different. We can play one set one night and then switch it out and do a whole other batch of songs. People still freak out over them, and it's super exciting and cool. It's a good problem to have." Pleasure Pill will play the Casbah on August 24, on a bill that includes Trit 95. - Drvw Keltz

The objection of Eddie's daughter

Dr. Know recalls a powerful lesson at The Casbah

"Fuck Greg, gimme that white shirt," I tell Dr. Know's merch person. Greg Gonzalez is like a brother to me, and I'm attending this show at The Casbah because Dr. Know is one of his favorite punk bands. And tonight, he's replacing his classic design shirt with a new one. The one I wanted. I love Greg, but I will be damned if I'm risking being twinsies. Irate at the stifling of the expression of my individuality through the purchase of mass-produced band gear, I go to check out the bands. But before I can do that, I find myself engrossed in conversation with Bart Mendoza, a man who was immersed in music at a young age and who seems to have done it all, writing and producing songs as well as working for record labels — including his own. He's got Iron Maiden stories, which I soak up like Spongebob Fanboy, but our conversation on the future of music and journalism results in a respectful disagreement. Eventually, the chatting gets me anxious, because I realize I've heard most of the Strychnine 99 and Pancho Villa sets from just outside the performance room. I'm starting to feel like one of those twits who just wants to say they were there — to be seen, instead of being in the moment and supporting the bands.

Moments before Stalag 13 comes on, I'm still replaying conversations I've had with people during the opening sets and prior to the show. The pop culture references tonight were myriad, but their vintage has relegated most of them to modern obscurity. None of that matters

when the band starts playing and the crowd responds with a mania of crashing bodies and the congregational screaming of every word. The energy multiplies through covers of 7 Seconds'

"Young 'Til I Die" and Minor Threat's "Filler," songs I've played myself in 86Fix; I start to feel a kinship with bass player Danny Altimara, who nails the lines with an attack I envy. Then, akin to a raging fire sucking in oxygen to fuel itself, the music draws a group of underage fans who burst through the side door, jump on the stage, and dive off it before being escorted out. The laughing doorman gives a "Whatcha gonna do?" shrug, but still makes sure he guards the door more attentively after that.

After the set, the band hangs out at the venue, and I snag a vinyl reissue of their classic album In Control. I'm pleased that original singer Ron Baird recently rejoined the band after a relocation to Australia, and I ask him and the rest of the band to sign my new acquisition. The guitarist is reluctant. That may be because he's not on the record, and doesn't look old enough to have been in kindergarten when it was released 20 years ago, never mind whether or not he's seen Hogan's Heroes, the source of the band's name. But after some

encouragement from his bandmates, who tell me he's never given an autograph before, he steps up and signs it.

Speaking of old TV shows: I've seen Brandon Cruz walking around the venue tonight; he's impossible to miss because, even at 61, he's got that earnestly curious smile I remember from reruns of The Courtship of Eddie's Father. Back in the '80s, when "Where are they now?" shows were all the rage, co-star Bill Bixby - who played Eddie's father — was greeted by a grown Brandon in full punk regalia. As the audience laughed, Bixby asked a simple question: "Are you happy?" Cruz said he was, and they walked off into a fake sunset, talking about the things that were important in life. My young brain translated the exchange as, "Fuck what other people think, be yourself."

That memory plays in my mind as Dr. Know starts its set, and I'm seeing nine-yearold Eddie's smile on Cruz as they tear through their classics — with the exception of "Fist Fuck," which is sung by an audience member because Cruz' daughter is disgusted by it.

Alas, it turns out the saying, "If it's too loud, you're too old" is bullshit. Because no matter what your age, it's too loud to even make out the songs until a few bars in. It's bad enough that the band requests a sound correction, but it doesn't happen.

When the show ends, I get to the stage and Cruz takes a selfie with me. I don't get to tell him the impact that long-ago TV interaction with Bixby had on me, but the moment still makes my night. I meet Greg outside the venue and show him my shirt, which he loves. I think he intends to go purchase one, but it turns out the excessive distortion from the volume may have thrown off his equilibrium, and he's dazed. I tell him my cool shirt will always be known as the "Fuck Greg" shirt, and he sug-San gests stenciling it on the back. ^t Like a genuine friend. ■

Opera's decline and an opera star's death

It's been a rough summer for opera. For starters, Opera News, a publication of the Metropolitan Opera Guild, has announced that its operations will be folded into the British publication Opera Magazine starting in December. Opera News started in 1936 and had a circulation of about 43,000. It generally focused on covering opera in the U.S. — the Metropolitan Opera, specifically.

The event that sparked the end of Opera News was, as it happens, the end of the Metropolitan Opera Guild itself. The Guild was established in 1935 with the aim of supporting the Met during the financial downturn known as The Great Depression, Guild membership started at \$85 per year and included a subscription to Opera News.

However, I will save the rant that is building in my heart for a future article because I want to note that on August 16, Renata Scotto died. Scotto debuted at La Scala in 1953. She continued to sing on the world stage for another 50 years. She is the Butterfly on my favorite recording of Giacomo Puccini's Madama Butterfly. Scotto died in her hometown of Savona, Italy. She was 89.

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this past week. The yellowfin tuna count went up, but it's still just a fraction of the 'normal' August catch. Yellowtail held at a steady but slowish pace, while the persistent bluefin numbers nearly doubled and rockfish tripled. Go figure; but remember that there is no figuring these fish.

Now, as I am writing this report a couple dozen miles away from the disintegrating Hilary's passing eye, I am wondering if the fast-moving storm will have any effect at all on the catch next week. Often, hurricanes will churn warmer water deeper into the water column and inspire more tropical species to move along with them. The warmed deeper currents tend to move pole-ward, or north in our latitude. If a hurricane's path is northbound, then we might see more dorado, yellowfin, and maybe a few marlin and wahoo a bit closer to San Diego than normal. Normal. Again, that word. What is normal anymore? It seems that sometimes, the most normal thing about the fisheries is their unpredictability on any given week, El Niño year or not.

That hurricanes push warmer water deeper, and are themselves created in warm water of 80 degrees or more, does not mean they always leave the surface temps warmer in their wake. Hurricanes will actually cool the surface temps for a while until the sun comes out again and warms the upper water column. With warmer water deeper, and given a few days of sunshine and light winds, average temperatures throughout the water column will generally rise a few days or a week after the passing of a major storm. But predicting an effect on the fishery is still a guess, as there are too many variables for the average layman weather-watcher to make an accurate analysis.

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The Intrepid had to cut their five-day charter short a day due to approaching Hilary, but had "epic fishing" on quality bluefin tuna to 185 pounds, along with nice grade yellowtail and even some rockfish in the hold.

Hilary didn't have much of a chance of hitting north of the Vizcaino Peninsula as a category 4 storm. Once she entered the 72-degree water off the coast of the mid-peninsula, she dropped substantially, from a Category 4 to a Category 1, and as of this writing is a tropical storm dropping steady rain with little wind off San Quintin. This has all happened in less than 36-hours. From off Los Cabos as a major monster of a storm to a dwindling but very widespread and wet rain event off north Baja. That's not to say she didn't cause damage along the way: on the contrary, there has been a lot of coastal flooding and wind damage along the Vizcaino coast, and on the Sea of Cortez side, flash floods have been very bad with at least one life lost in Santa Rosalia.

In spite of the tendency for San Diegans to scoff at northbound hurricanes, they are as unpredictable

as our fishing has been of late. Thankfully, the cool water trends along Baja took a lot of the teeth out of this storm; it could have been much worse.

That said, by the time this report goes to print, Hilary will be done and gone, and we should see if she had much effect on the Sea Surface Temperatures (SSTs) off the coast of northern Baia and southern California. - and how that might affect the fishing going forward. It is early in the hurricane season for the eastern Pacific, and the warming trend should continue. With dorado reported caught as far north as Oregon and a striped marlin in the counts here, it seems semi-tropical pelagic species aren't off the menu just yet. As with Kay last year, Hilary's northbound path was well within the predictions 48 hours ahead of her passing. That warmer average water temps will bring more and stronger hurricanes is a given, but the path a hurricane takes can vary from storm to storm, as Hilary's predecessor Fernanda did what the majority of hurricanes do in this part of the world; move north out of the tropics then make a left turn toward Hawaii.

The sportfishing fleet took notice, and a few boats out on longer runs cut their trips short, while others canceled Sunday and Monday outings to allow the worst of the weather to pass. I am looking at a marine vessel live chart right now, and the Baja coast from mid-peninsula out a couple hundred miles and up to just south of San Diego looks eerily empty, except for the military vessels that moved out of San Diego Bay to deeper water where they can better ride a storm out if they need to. Here's hoping the fishing only gets better in Hilary's wake. They're out there, so go get 'em!
