


# CITY HEIGHTS Car vs. bar Police-pursued Prius plows into punk venue

On November 29, a person driving a white Toyota Prius crashed into the Tower Bar on University Avenue. The 90-plus-year-old punk rock concert venue — which has also done time as a diner, a beauty shop, and a tattoo parlor — was struck so hard that the bar inside moved a couple of inches, but nobody was injured. San Diego Police reportedly said that 19-year-old driver Ahmed Shire initially ran a stop sign and then fled when a traffic stop was initiated. He was later arrested.

Bar owner Mick Rossler said that the Prius driver was evading police and running red lights westbound on University, then lost control and hit a Honda that was heading the other way just east of Euclid. "Westbound, there's poor visibility coming up that hill," he noted. "A lady was hit by there as well."

This was the third time someone had crashed into the circa-1932 Art-Deco building, which Rossler purchased in 2002. "The night that it happened," he said, "the fire department sent out an inspector, and the car missed the corner of the building by half a foot, which would've been bad." The second time the bar was hit, back in 2017, "that was a lot more damage. From what I understand, the second time, someone [collided] into the back of a police SUV, and then the police SUV crashed through the front of our building. I was about three blocks away, and was able to run over." The first time, in 1964, a car smashed into the entrance, killing a patron sitting in the cocktail lounge.

Black and white images of that first crash, scanned from the *San Diego Union-Tribune*, are posted on the Tower Bar website. For the 2023 edition, a video was posted on the dive bar's Instagram page and captioned, "Third time's a charm." In the video, the Prius has already smashed into the building, and police sirens are blaring in the background while a police officer assesses the car. Looky-loos and additional police are on the scene. One commenter noted that someone had recently crashed into a nearby nail business. Another wrote that in 2017, a truck crashed into the Lotus Garden, a now-defunct Chinese restaurant across the street and just west of the bar.

into University, and by Euclid and University. Drivers have too little time to turn when the lights turn red, so people speed up a lot, trying to beat the lights." Peters noted that the intersection lacks left-turn arrows, and further, "there are lots of blind spots, plus very poor lighting. Why hasn't the city improved this area, even with the increased taxes for street/ traffic improvements?"

Owner Rossler agrees with Peters' assessment — mostly. "University Avenue, [particularly] to our east, was the number one street for pedestrian fatalities. They decided to put roundabouts, and it looks like it's finally getting close to being finished — with additional crosswalk lights. A lady by the bus stop, too, was killed, then to the left of us, two cars went into that [building]. Driving west on University, there's bad visibility on the hill."

Tiffany, a local motorcyclist, said the Tower Bar is a "prominent-looking building and is a distraction." But other locals say the problem is that the city doesn't tend to City Heights' streets and lighting as quickly as other parts of town. Said Peters, "Bro, with GetItDone, take a look; they take forever to assess our broken street lights and potholes. If this [same] shit is happening in North Park to the west or Kensington, they are quick to fix the problems."

Rossler was pleased to report that as

of press time, the Tower Bar had re-opened for business, and the punk shows will go on. MIKE MADRIAGA

THE ROAD **Car wars** Will exemptions defeat Complete Streets? Last Monday, the city council voted unanimously to pass the Complete Streets policy, a plan for revamping streets to make them safer for all modes of travel. The plan emphasizes features such as the buffered bike lanes on Park Boulevard north of University Avenue and speed reduction elements like the roundabout in Florida Canyon. All around, the thinking encourages what it calls "street connectivity."

The policy can be used in the context of city projects, new construction, private development, and mobility projects between jurisdictions. It will be part of community plan updates, adding linear parks, landscaping, and bike improvements. In the midcity, it will mean circulators, direct shuttles, smoother transit through key areas, and hopefully, greater safety. "A Complete Street project can be the difference between life and death," said Manny Rodriguez, a volunteer with BikeSD. (In 2015, the city pledged to reach zero traffic fatalities by 2025. Since then, 428 people have been killed - including a pedestrian struck today by multiple cars on Interstate 805.)

But bike advocates argued that the proposal still puts developers in the driver's seat. "The latest language rips the teeth out of the policy," one caller said. The city has now heard the plan twice. Critics of the draft policy had insisted on an overhaul based on exemptions they said would allow private developers to steer around its street design plans. Additional outreach between the first and second hearing wasn't enough to satisfy those critics, who asked for a checklist from projects explaining how they matched the city's climate action goals, as well as the ability to appeal publicly. And at the most recent meeting, they complained that the exemptions remain, arguing, "Basically, anything can qualify for an exemption."



streets. Other exceptions could be made for things like benches, trees, and other green street features. One example: along Park Boulevard, the city was unable to continue Bay Drive and Garnet, "50 years ago, the traffic backed up maybe one block; today it's one mile."

# UNDER THE RADAR

**Back to the border?** More than 13 months after *Union-Tribune* border reporter **Wendy Fry** departed for a new gig at non-profit *CalMatters*, the paper, these days operated by MediaNews Group — a chain owned by vulture investing outfit Alden Global Capital — is advertising for a replacement. "The *San Diego Union-Tribune* is looking for a Reporter to cover border life and immigration issues affecting the San Diego-Tijuana region," says a job notice posted by *MediaNews* Decem-

ber 7. "We are looking for a versatile journalist who can take an enterprise approach to the beat, focusing on deeply reported, high-impact journalism. At the same time, the successful candidate must be able to juggle aggressive beat work and breaking news."

Adds the announcement: "This is an incredibly dynamic region to cover, and this reporter must be able to identify stories that resonate

with a cross-border/U.S. readership. The beat is broad and covers both sides of the border." The wording is nearly identical to an online job notice for the position posted by the U-T — then owned by Los Angeles biotech billionaire **Patrick Soon-Shiong** — after Fry left in the fall of 2022. But there are two telling differences. The Soon-Shiong-era job notice says the new hire "should be able to tackle stories that make a difference and hold accountable institutions and people in power."

Not so Alden Capital's version, which instead relates "this reporter should be able to cut through the rhetoric on border and immigration issues, and bring context and nuance

to the beat, all while carefully navigating a complex reporting environment." Regarding compensation, the Soon-Shiong ad said pay would range from \$65,000 to \$75,000 a year. Alden Capital is offering a more modest \$27.64 to \$32.45 an hour, which converts in annual terms to between roughly \$57,000 and \$67,000, significantly below the current average San Diego salary of \$69,495, per *ZipRecruiter.com*.

Meanwhile, unionized reporters at Alden's Southern California Newsgroup have conducted a one-day protest, says a December 14 message on X, the site once known as Twitter, by **Emily Holshouser**, a scribe at the *Los Angeles Daily News*. "Tomorrow, my colleagues and I at @SCNGguild are walking out of work to advocate for a fair contract. I make ~\$40k a year after taxes. That is insane considering the amount of stress, danger, and expectations reporters are under to do our job. And some make less!"

Added her colleague **Brian Rokos**: "If there is any big crime news in the Inland Empire on Thursday, you won't hear it from me. SCNG reporters are on strike today because of low pay and unfair labor practices by hedge fund Alden Global Capital. AGC has been dragging its feet in negotiations for two years." The *Union-Tribune* isn't part of Southern California Newsgroup, it's been reported, but instead reports directly to

> MediaNews Group, another Alden-controlled chain, keeping it union-free.

Bry redux Ex-San Diego

City councilwoman **Barbra Bry**, who lost a race for San Diego mayor and later another for county assessor, has been low-profile of late. But she has been cleared by California's Political Fair Practices Commission of suspicions that she illegally used her city coun-

cil seat to benefit her wealthy husband **Neil Senturia**'s investment in Deckard Technologies, Inc.

Deckard offered its services to city governments, promising to root out miscreant shortterm rentals, one of Bry's favorite targets during her council tenure. Questions arose when Bry's leaving office statement of economic interests, filed on January 4, 2021, disclosed she had been a consultant to Deckard, for which she got \$10,000 to \$100,000 a year from 2018 through 2020, per the filing. Reached by phone at his office that February and queried about the matter, Senturia declined comment and abruptly terminated the call.

> Two months later, Bry quietly amended her original disclosure, labeling the Deckard consulting as being done by her husband Senturia and his Blackbird companies. Bry's updated disclosure identified money gleaned from Deckard as "spouse or registered domestic partner's income."

Now, in a September 25 letter to Sacramento lawyer **Richard Rios**, recently posted online by the FPPC, the agen-

cy's senior counsel **Artin Berjikly** declares that Bry's city council actions did not violate state law. "The Enforcement Division found that Bry did not have a material financial interest in Deckard Technologies, Blackbird Ventures, and Blackbird Special Projects because they are the separate property of Bry's spouse, and Bry did not derive any financial benefit from the business entities," the missive says. "Additionally, Bry's participation in governmental decisions did not have a material financial *continued on page 4*

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# **U**NREAL **E**STATE by Dave Rice

Can vou believe it's been almost four months since we've taken Unreal Estate for a tour in La Jolla? That's a long time to stay away from one of the most established enclaves dedicated to housing San Diego's wealthiest denizens. Let's check in on the priciest pad currently up for grabs in the seaside village.

"Introducing The Experience@Vista d'Oro, Americas premier contemporary 180 ocean view estate," opens the *realtor*. com pitch for 2585 Calle

Del Oro, a 7800-squarefoot mansion constructed in 2020 on a half-acre lot overlooking the Pacific. We've got a lot of ground to cover here, so let's

jump right into the tour. We start off with an al fresco dining area looking out over the ocean. Even though we're a half mile inland, the hillside loca-

tion still affords a pretty darn pleasing whitewater view. From there, we get a couple of aerial shots before moving to the backyard. I like all of

the exterior woodwork, which seems so much warmer and more inviting than the typical stucco and "any color you want, so long as it's gray" aesthetic that has plagued modern design for the last decade-plus.

The cactus and succulent garden out front is also a quirky departure from the palm-heavy tropical landscapes we usually see near the beach. I'm also a fan of the terraced gardens out back next to the infinity pool — I did something similar in my own yard, but not nearly as opulent, and minus the pool, infinity or otherwise.

Staying outside for a bit, we get some sunset shots of a firepit lounge area that melds with the living room, thanks to "multiple motorized Fleetwood doors seamlessly blending 90 of indoor/outdoor living." I know we've seen these disappearing walls of glass before, and while I might mock them sometimes, I've got to admit I'd love to have a set facing my back deck - if money was very much not an object. The motorized part is new to me, though — are all of these setups electrified on remote control and I never noticed, or is this a particularly fancy set of disappearing doors? 

There's a hilltop house in Cardiff, at 959 Cornish Drive, that is not like the others in the tony seaside neighborhood. The house itself resembles a giant box, light yellow in color, with the front door flanked by a pair of painted columns. Near the top of columns are murals that look like pieces of ancient Egyptian art, complete with profiles of Pharoahs. The walls next to the columns feature ornate, bas-relief columns. Winged suns hover over each of the two front windows.

The house was built in 1923 by a developer named O.L. Steel, who had apparently taken a fancy to the Egyptian Revival school of architecture that briefly flourished after the 1921 hit movie *The Sheik* and the discovery, just a year later, of the tomb of Tutankhamen, which sent Americans clamoring for all things Egyptian. Architecture was not immune, and among the famous buildings constructed in the Egyptian Revival style are the recently restored and reopened Egyptian Theater in Hollywood, and the Pythian Temple in New York City, which is now a high-end condo complex.

Developer Steel built the house on Cornish Drive as something of a prototype of what he hoped would become a tract of Egyptian-style homes surrounded by avocado groves. He built a second, smaller home down

the hill in the 1200 block of San Dieguito Drive, but his ambitious plans for a whole community of similar homes never materialized.

\* \* \*

Historically, residential construction in San Diego has come in waves, often following a distinct architectural style and generally centered around the single-family home. First, in the early 1800s, came the adobes, the best known example of which is La Casa de Estudillo in Old Town State Historic Park. These were built by the Spanish and Mexican settlers who displaced the native Kumeyaay. Then came the Victorians, some grand and ornate, others more toned down — a style known as Folk Victorian. A handful of both Victorian styles still stand and may be seen in Old Town, on Golden Hill, and as far north as Highland Street in Carlsbad.

Next, in the early 1900s, came the quaint Craftsman bungalows, with their thick wooden casings around the doors and windows and wide front porches flanked by stately columns supporting the protruding roof. Craftsman-style homes still dominate such old-San Diego neighborhoods as Mission Hills, University Heights, Bankers Hill, and Hillcrest.

A little later, from the 1920s up until World War II, came the Spanish Colonial Revival-style homes, generally white, with textured stucco walls and red terracotta tile roofs. These were inspired by the Balboa Park buildings of the Panama-California Exposition of 1915-1917, which in turn had been inspired by the designers' travels through Mexico and their romanticized ideas of the Hispanic heritage of the Canal Zone. The homes sprang up in communities

such as North Park, Kensington, Talmadge, Mission Hills, Point Loma, and Burlingame. Years later, they influenced the building style in large, masterplanned communities such as Rancho Bernardo. The Spanish Colonial Revival style was so popular, says preservation architect Ione R. Stiegler, "that one of our leading architects at the time felt the style was so appropriate to our local climate that he simply called it 'Southern California Architecture."" (At the same time that the Spanish Colonial Revival style flourished, some builders drifted toward the Mediterranean Revival style, a mixture of Spanish and Italian architecture characterized by a rectangular floor plan with massive, symmetrical primary façades, windows shaped like arches or circles, and wrought iron balconies.) The post-World War

II housing boom saw the first vast housing tracts as San Diego crept outward into suburbia: Clairemont and Allied Gardens being among the first suburbs. Some tracts, such as those in the oldest parts of Clairemont, featured boxy, cookie-cutter cottages and duplexes of the kind derided by folksinger Pete Seeger in the song, "Little Boxes." Little boxes on the hillside/ Little boxes made of ticky-tacky/ Little boxes, little boxes/ Little boxes all the same ... Others consisted of singlestory ranch-style homes.

Wealthier homeowners in communities such as Point Loma, Del Cerro and La Jolla built custom ranch homes that often stretched the width of the property. Builders also went with the Mid-Century Modern style, the architectural manifestation of the design movement that was popular in the United States as



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The 1970s saw the ramping up of masterplanned communities, where the common thread was not so much style as it was color: vast seas of beige, white, and even pink stretching out over acres of private homes. This continued through the 1980s all the way into the early 2000s, with prime examples in what was originally called North City West (now Carmel Valley and Del Mar Heights). "My brother, who is nine years older than me, grew up in San Diego, left town for Northern California, and then came back in the 1980s," says Bruce Coons, executive director of the Save Our Heritage Organisation, a non-profit organization founded in 1969 that is devoted to the preservation of the historic architecture and landmarks around the San Diego. "He told me one time, 'I wish I could get the contract for paint in San Diego, because nearly everything I see I what I call San Diego beige.' It wasn't like that when he left in the 1960s."

With the Great Recession, residential construction all but ground to a halt, and recovery was slow. But in recent years, the housing shortage created by years of little to no construction has led to a boom in residential development, this time growing out and up into multi-family dwellings, primarily apartments. You see them everywhere, all over downtown and as "in-fill" projects in older residential communities from Chula Vista to Vista. And, once again, there's a prevalent look: boxy buildings that overpower the parcel of land on which they sit, sometimes resembling an oversize Amazon package, other times looking like something a toddler might have built with a set of building blocks, and almost always painted in varying pastel hues. Examples include the massive new 840-unit

Town and Country project in Mission Valley, the 442-unit Vive Lux apartment complex in Kearny Mesa, and much smaller complexes of the kind that over the last couple of years have been popping up in Pacific Beach, North Park, Rancho Penasquitos, Poway, Rancho Bernardo, Carlsbad's barrio and village, south Oceanside and Vista.

Roger Showley, the former San Diego Union-Tribune architecture critic who is still considered the city's chief arbiter of good taste, isn't a fan. "I'd say it's 'No-Style Style," he says. "There's no reference to place or context. They could be built anywhere, which is the guiding principle of Modernism. Most of these are high-rise apartments and the common element is balconies. That's a nice amenity for residents, who often use them for storage. But it makes for a monotonous appearance from the street or distance. The downtown high-rises built by Bosa are basically transplants from their Vancouver high-rises. In dense cities like that, these blocks of 20-60-story towers can resemble a field of aspara-

gus." Showley maintains that architecture "lost its way in the 1970s with the advent of Post-Modernism, which mashed up historic styles and painted them in pastels."

\* \* \*

Despite the power of prevailing currents, over the years, the architectural styles of San Diego's waves of residential construction have been augmented by several outliers - styles that embraced exoticism, such as Polynesian, Oriental and, of course, the aforementioned Egyptian. "People notice them as they drive around," says Coons, "but they don't give much thought to the style, because they don't see a lot of them. It brightens their journey to work or the store, to see these whimsical styles. But if you study them, they can be of great interest."

Architect Stiegler, whose firm, IS Architecture, has been doing business in San Diego for 35 years, agrees. "I'd say the mild climate, through every design era, has allowed for experimentation," she says. "And, thus, our city is graced with some wonderful, oneoff gems — gems that if you keep an eye out for them, you are rewarded by seeing someone's idyllic dream once upon a time."

The two Cardiff Egyptian houses are not the only local surviving examples of Egyptian Revival architecture in San Diego County, but there aren't many others. Two apartment complexes at 3772 and 3783 Park Boulevard, near the zoo, also look much as they did when they were built in the 1920s; the latter building was recently repainted to highlight its Egyptian elements. The building itself is white with red trim: the bas-relief columns on either side of the main entryway have been painted black, and the Pharaoh heads that sit atop each column are now a bright mustard. When the sun hits them just right, they look like gold.

There's no telling how many more homes and apartments built in the Egyptian Revival style have been lost to time. As a 1992 Journal of San Diego History article noted, "the Egyptian craze especially flourished in Southern California. Fantastic architectural designs were accepted more readily there because of the specific influence of movie-making in Southern California, a lack of 'old money' blue-blood families, a general 1920s atmosphere of 'anything goes,' and an upsurge in the construction of 'period revival' homes and buildings." San Diego's climate also was a factor, the article maintains: "Sunny days and snow-free winters actually made this style a sensible choice for San Diego. Egypt's hot, dry climate had allowed her temples, stores, and homes to be built with flat roofs and open courtvard gardens."

"The Egyptian Revival style is a personal favorite of mine," says Coons. "I have a great affection for it, as it harkens back to the Egyptian love of life, with elements from nature embodied in their stone architecture. Carved stone architecture is a discipline that they invented. I'd love to own one."

Another architectural style that flourished briefly here in San Diego is Polynesian. Triggered by World War II soldiers returning from the Pacific Theater and sweetened by Thor Heyerdahl's 1950 best-seller *Kon-Tiki: Across the Pacific in a Raft*, tiki culture was all the rage in the 1950s into the '60s, and has recently experienced a resurgence — spurred, in part, by the craft cocktail trend. The Tiki Oasis, launched in 2001, is an annual festival that each year draws thousands of attendees to Mission Valley for four days and five nights of exotic tropical cocktails, live entertainment, educational seminars, and a marketplace of more than 150 artists and makers. There's also been a flurry of homeowners building their own backyard tiki bars, some of them profiled in a June 2023 San Diego Magazine feature.

But the Polynesian style of architecture, like Egyptian Revival, was popular only for a brief period in the 1950s and '60s. It's an offshoot of Mid-Century Modern, with A-frame roofs, post-and-beam construction, and floorto-ceiling plate-glass windows. Shelter Island is ground zero for this architectural outlier, largely because of a "special overlay zone," created when the former sandbar was developed in the 1950s, that required all buildings to have a Polynesian theme. This played right into tourism marketing campaigns that touted San Diego as "a little bit of Hawaii," according to a brochure published by the

Save Our Heritage Organisation (SOHO).

The SOHO brochure paints a quite compelling word picture: "These .... buildings' outward appearances were supposed to evoke the architectural traditions gleaned from various Pacific Islander cultures: truncated-roofed jonglos, circular huts, or soaring A-framed halau *loa* (big meeting house) and halau wa'a (canoe sheds). The latter were often featured on swayback roofs, projecting out over porte-cocheres, with plain or highly decorative corbelled wood pole or squared ridge beams or rafters. Sometimes the latter ended in decorative canoe-bow finials or extended like outriggers all the way to the ground, down into brick or rock planters. Close up features included exterior wood plank siding, natural stone (especially lava rock), and earth-colored concrete bricks. Located on or near large bodies of water, their landscape details were meant to accentuate a South Sea Island's land-water interface. Lush, semi-tropical plants, including palms, hibiscus, plumeria, and impatiens,

were located on little manmade islands surrounded by flowing streams, waterfalls, pools, and/or lagoons set amid real or faux-lava rock boulders. Shade-loving philodendrons, bromeliads, ferns, and orchids completed the effect. Strategically located throughout the gardens were the style's eponymous Polynesianinspired wood, stone, or cast concrete Tiki totem poles or moai statues...."

Prominent Polynesian structures on Shelter Island that are still standing include the Bali Hai Restaurant and the Half Moon Inn, home of the popular Humphreys by the Bay concert series; the Catamaran Resort Hotel in Pacific Beach; and much of Vacation Village — now known as Paradise Point - in the heart of Mission Bay. Another landmark, the Hanalei Hotel in Mission Valley, known for its gigantic A-frame entryway, lost its look during an extensive remodel in 2006.

As with the Egyptian Revival style, homes built with the Polynesian theme are hard to find, although Coons estimates up to 200 residential examples remain, "less, if they're full-on tiki." Several Polynesianstyle homes built in the late 1950s and early '60s can be found in the older part of Clairemont, near the intersection of Barnhurst Drive and Charger Boulevard, Coons says. More homes can be found on Point Loma and in Del Cerro. The grande dame just might be a gorgeous single-family home on the southeast corner of Cornish Drive and Monaco Street in Sunset Cliffs. "Another major one is the Kalama Kai Apartments at 4444 West Point Loma Boulevard," Coons says. "The popularity of the Polynesian style in San Diego represents our final realization that it is indeed an integral part of the Pacific Rim."

Closely related to the Polynesian Revival style is Oriental: homes with pagoda-like elements such as upturned corners of roofs. Stiegler says this style dates back to the post-Victorian, pre-World War I days, with Coons noting that it was popularized in San Diego by returning servicemen, including some who fought in China before World War II when that country was under siege by Japan. These "secondgeneration" homes often feature Chinese decorative motifs on door entry handles and soji-like screens in the interiors. Homes with Oriental elements are scattered around the county, with one on Skyline Drive in Carlsbad and several in La Jolla, near where the Green Dragon Colony — 12 artists' cottages built in the late 1800s in the heart of the village by Anna Held, a former governess for the family of Ulysses S. Grant Jr., the 18th president's son — once stood.

"In fact, there's one for

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call (619) 658-5418 **California Research Foundation**  sale right now in La Jolla that's pretty terrific," Coons says. "There are very few of them left, but this one's pretty pure." Located at 1428 Soledad Avenue, what's known as the "House of Dreams" was built in the early 1900s and was profiled last May in the La Jolla Light newspaper. According to the article, the home was built by a "world traveler" named Florence Howard, who had a keen interest in Asiatic art and style. The house is currently listed for sale at \$6,245,000. The Zillow listing calls it a "1911 Asian Arts & Crafts style 4BD/2.5BA ocean view home topped w/ crow's nest bonus room plus a matching studio over garage."

"I was just in this one the other day," Stiegler adds. "It was just one woman's vision with a great carpenter to execute."

The Art Deco style that flourished in places like Miami in the 1930s and 1940s also touched down in San Diego, although it was modified to reflect the area's ties to the aircraft industry. "We call it Streamline Art Moderne," Coons says. "We were known as the aircraft capital of the world, and the aircraft industry was centered around Pacific Highway, with plants like Rohr and Convair. Streamline Art Moderne was a pretty major substyle for San Diego during the early 1940s. Streamline buildings were prominent along today's Pacific Highway, and then it spread into the nearby neighborhoods, especially Loma Portal, which is where many of the aircraft industry executives lived. They saw the style and it was the modern thing, the trend. It denoted the future."

Streamline Art Modern homes were characterized by flat roofs and steamship railings along the parapet, Coons says, "and what they call speed lines - horizontal lines in the stucco. While San Diego is no longer thought of for its Art Deco architecture, it once had a significant inventory, with literally dozens of great Streamline Art Moderne homes and commercial buildings lost to the dozers over the years." Coons says the community of Loma Portal, in the northeast part of the Point Loma peninsula, has several remaining Streamline Modern homes, with

Southern California, and

a particularly strong example on the southwest corner of Kingsley and Locust.

One final odd outlier in San Diego architectural styles is the Tile Neo-Mansard, a twist on - some would say bastardization of - the Spanish style, with flat roofs and tiles that hang below the roof line like bangs. It's a look that flourished in the 1970s, the same era as bad fashion, bad cars and bad presidents. The Tile Neo-Mansard style was popular with both apartments and commercial buildings throughout in San Diego, it is strongly identified with the myriad apartment buildings — most with six to nine units and no front yards, just concrete parking spaces — nicknamed the "Huffman Six-Pack" after the developer who put them up. "I hate those things," Coons says. "They look like boxes with tile fringes tacked on."

According to the Huffman Properties Inc. website, builder Ray Huffman began focusing on apartments in the 1960s when most of his fellow developers were concen-

trating on single-family homes. "After he got the building process down to a science, Ray was able to construct a property in approximately 110 days," the website says. "Ray had created a 'Ford Assembly Line' for San Diego apartment construction. There was a period where Ray would have as many as 70 apartment buildings under construction at one time, all at different locations spread throughout San Diego County."

A 1982 *Reader* article noted that "North Park contains so many of his apartments that the entire area is occasionally referred to as "a monument to Ray Huffman." The Tile Neo-Mansard isn't the dominant architectural style Huffman employed for his apartments, which often are a mish-mash of styles. But it's the one that stands out, Coons says, because it was so distinct — distinct enough that other developers took note, and by the early 1970s, the Huffman Six-Pack became the model for other apartment builders. "So not only do we have those lousy Huffman Six-Packs, but we also have knockoffs that went up all over the place: Ocean Beach, City Heights, University Heights. They stuck them in all sorts of neighborhoods as in-fill. Eventually people rose up and fought those and ultimately forced the [San Diego] City Council to issue a moratorium."

While the Tile Neo-Mansard style here in San Diego was used mostly for apartments, "there are also some private homes, unfortunately," Coons says. "I've seen them in Pacific Beach and some in Point Loma. They're exceedingly ugly."



# Poinsettias are triggered, Winter Solstice, and a Christmas moon

**Poinsettias, A Favorite Of Backyard Gardener**s, are now exhibiting their scarlet, petal-like bracts, just in time for the holidays. The onset of 14-hour-long nights triggers their scarlet behavior: In San Diego this condition is met just before the date of winter solstice — Thursday, December 21.

Winter Solstice, When The Sun Reaches Its Southernmost Point on the celestial sphere, occurs this year at 4:04 am, Sunday,

December 21. This event signals the beginning of winter in the Northern Hemisphere and the beginning of summer in the Southern Hemisphere. With only about ten hours of daylight, San Diego must endure its darkest and gloomiest nights this week and next. During the day, the sun takes its lowest arc in the sky, struggling to an altitude of only 34 degrees (as seen from San Diego), then quickly sinks toward the horizon. Conversely, it's the longest night, and the Moon takes its highest path along the sky and is above the horizon longer than any moon.

Not Only Is The December 26th Full Moon The First Full Moon of the Winter Solstice, it is also a Christmas Moon. It will rise around sunset and appear full to the naked eye on December 25, 26, and 27. A Christmas Full Moon happens on average every 19 years. It happened in 2015, and will happen next in 2034. The image of Santa's sleigh and reindeer flying across the night sky, backlit by a full moon, is common on Christmas cards and holiday advertisements.

Tennessee Williams, our reigning kind of hothouse family drama, just sending himself up onstage as the narrator of a memory play and opening wide the spigot of self-loathing over...well, there's a reason he wrote family dramas about people trapped in desperate circumstances and their even more desperate efforts to escape them. But that was a long time ago. Nowadays,

when we run into a young man who doesn't like his job and would rather spend all his time staring at a screen and dreaming of adventures he doesn't get to have, we're less likely to be moved to pity for the eternally frustrated artist. Get in line, pal. Did I say self-loathing? Yes, but there's a healthy dollop of self-pity there, too, one that drags the spotlight off the story's alleged victim and back onto its author — even as he absents himself from great swaths of the second act. Perhaps as a result, it's Mom who commands the stage, our attention, and even our sympathies here, thanks in no small part to a command performance from Shana Wride - and this despite her tendency to let her ravenous regret and overwhelming fear drive her to awful efforts at control and coercion when it comes to her sorry son and disabled daughter. Oh, for a gentleman caller! The caller, when he comes, is played with huge decency and tenderness by Kirk Brown; it's not his fault that he is, as Williams tells us a the outset, a symbol and not a

The Iron Claw — Writer-director Sean Durkin broke through in 2011 with Martha Marcy May Marlene, the story of a young woman who has escaped from a cult and must now find a way to reconnect with her family. But here, the cult is the family, and the only hope lies in escape, which proves all but impossible. (There are frequent mentions of a curse in this based-on-real-life story, and the seemingly endless parade of disasters, some random, others less so, serve to give the claim some weight. They certainly don't square with Mom's blunt reassurance of God's love.) The four Von Erich brothers are caught in the crushing grip of their father Fritz, a pro wrestler turned venue-owner who never got his shot at the championship. (His signature finishing move was called the Iron Claw — how terribly fitting.) Fritz doesn't have to punish his sons to get them to follow in his footsteps and succeed where he failed. He doesn't have to threaten them, or fight with them, or do anything but ask and instruct. They are his, and content to be so. And they have each other for support and consolation. (A big part of the film's appeal is the brotherly love on display between Zac Efron's big brother Kevin, Jeremy Allen White's brooding Kerry,

Harris Dickinson's good guy David, and Stanley Simon's tender Mike.) The women may have thoughts on the matter, but they keep them to themselves. Only Kevin manages a hesitant bleat here and there, and even then, he's not about to defy Dad. So they march on, their ranks thinning, their bodies breaking alongside their hearts, under Durkin's watchful (and frequently very close-up) eye. The only thing we get by way of relief is regular doses of the brightly colored phantasmagoria that was '80s pro wrestling. And that's not nothing - even if it does get indulgent in places. (Gosh, but we get a lot of talk from Ric Flair.) Until. But that's where things get weird: at the end, where the real-life drama ought to take over from the scripted contests in the ring and pin us to the emotional mat, Durkin wriggles free of his own story and brings on not one but three happy endings - one in real-time, one in eternity, and one in posterity. If it feels like a bit of a slippery move, well, this is wrestling we're talking about. (2023) — M.L. ★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

The Holdovers — It's tempting to call director Alexander Payne's latest a kind of Dead Poets Society for grownups. Not that Peter Weir's film was childish. But Payne's is definitely adult. There's the obvious similarity of setting: a private school for boys in New England, filmed with aching loveliness and care. But here, it's the '70s. The American innocence of DPS's '50s has been seen to by the war in Vietnam, which has claimed the life of Curtis, the ambitious son of school cook Mary Lamb. And there is the similarity of dynamic: the story concerns the relationship between a teacher who loves the classical tradition (Robin Williams' John Keating

had Horace and his aspirational cry of Carpe diem, Paul Giamatti's Paul Hunham has Marcus Aurelius and his stoic love of virtue despite the circumstances) and a student with a strained familial situation. But Dominic Sessa's Angus doesn't want to chase his dreams and act, he just wants to go home for Christmas - and maybe avoid getting booted into military school. Both teacher and student are sour, sullen, surly, sarcastic, and smart In a way that wins them few admirers - and with reason. The two wind up trapped together for the holidays, and it's a testament to both actors that the thaw between them happens so gradually that it's hard to notice until it's obvious. (Giamatti has a ball here as a glasseyed grump, but he's a known quantity. The lupine Sessa is the revelation; it's a gutsy move putting him in a theater watching Dustin Hoffman, but it's no accident.) And while DPS' Keating had to learn the price of his principles, Hunham's work has more to do with finding the limits of their value. Payne is happy to amble; there are points where you may feel the 2 hour, 13 minute runtime. But he's always going somewhere, and the destination is worthwhile. (2023) - M.L.  $\star \star \star$ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

**Wonka** — The flaws in Paul King's prequel are obvious, starting with the fact that he's taken the anarchic and unsettling confectionary overlord given to us by author Roald Dahl (and famously embodied onscreen by Gene Wilder) and turned him into a human version of his previous star, the wonderfully polite and sweet young bear named Paddington. (The human in question is Timothée Chalamet, who at least manages to convey some of the character's uncommon character.)

You remember Paddington: the sort of fellow who genuinely believes he can win through pure decency. When an orphaned waif tells young Wonka that the greedy beat the needy and that's just the way of the world, he responds with unutterable sincerity that they'll simply have to change the world. Of course, it helps that despite his utter destitution — a plot point that puts him in his primary predicament here — he still carries a portable version of his chocolate factory, one capable of conjuring vast quantities of enchanted edibles from something very close to thin air. He sings that all he's got are a hatful of dreams, but his sales sheet says otherwise. Oh yes, there are songs The good news is that they mostly fit seamlessly and harmlessly into the narrative, and when they don't, as in the big production seduction number "Have You Got a Sweet Tooth," the show-stopping makes sense. The less good news is that Chalamet sounds weirdly tamped down when he sings, almost as if they did something to his voice in post. The virtues are obvious as well: King's love for his characters and their world is palpable, his story mechanics tick away as precisely as Wonka's marvelous candy contraption, and his trademark whimsy is in plentiful supply. Hm, well — perhaps too plentiful, sort of like an action director who finally gets the budget to do a 20-minute car chase. Oh drat, I seem to be back to flaws. But here's the truth of it: for the most part, they didn't come to me until after I'd left the theater. Because the great virtue here is charm - which has a way of covering a multitude of sins in the magic of the moment - followed by, yes, sweetness. 2023. — M.L. ★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

I moved my fingers and toes and thought, I'm not paralyzed. I didn't notice my left wrist for a minute or two. Then, upon seeing my whole hand not where God had intended, I realized my wrist was broken. I remember remembering, I am or was a guitar player."

That was September 2016, shortly after Nielsen turned 50. The multi-instrumentalist, whose bands include Maquiladora, High Mountain Tempel, and Buzz or Howl, recalls, "I used a walker, then a cane can do some things better with the new angle. I can reach with my pinky and have a wider spread with my hands. I'm at about 95 percent of where I was before."

Nielsen has a new EP called Allele. It's credited to Sen K — that's the last three letters in "Nielsen" and the first letter of his wife Krista's first name. She plays bass alongside Morgan Doctor on drums. "We started dating following a show [that Krista's band] Chinchilla played at St. Cecilia's in downtown San Diego. My friends were performing a shadow show behind the scrim, full of props and nudity. I was filming onstage behind Krista's bass amp, and we struck up a conversation during the show. Yes, during the show."

Nielsen and his wife workshopped all of the songs together. The album's six-song run begins with "4:33 Infinity." Nielsen says the song's message is that it's not about what happens; it's the space in which it happens that is important. "All sounds can bring harmony, joy or whatever you're looking for when listening to music. Let it all surround you."

"Arunachala" is one of the five famous holy mountains in the Hindu faith. Explains Nielsen, "Ramana Maharashi was a guru who lived at the foot of the mountain, and people would make pilgrimages to learn from him and be with the holy mountain. However, Maharshi didn't speak. The only thing he encouraged devotees to do was to meditate on the phrase 'Who am I?' over and over. Trying this method, I found myself coming up with all sorts of answers."

"Call to Prayer" draws inspiration from the traditional *adhan*, which calls Muslims to worship. "How wonderful it must be to hear a sound that reminds you of your etherealness multiple times a day. I wanted to remind myself to ring the bell as Thich Nhat Hanh did at Deer Park Monastery in Escondido, to breathe, to chant, to walk in a way that left my mind unclenched."

"[The song] 'San Joaquin' has been brewing for a long time. It's my homage to what I consider California's holiest of high holies. The repeating chorus, floating down the Merced River to the San Joaquin, is often what I imagine myself doing as I drift into dreams."

The big finish, "Black Jaguar Nayeli," is based on a Nielsen novella-in-progress. "It's a sci-fi spiritual dystopian piece about an underground cult that has perfected the ability to remove souls from the human form. They've also invented a process to ingest souls into bodies."

Don't look for *Allele* in a record store bin — it's only available online. "Having released twenty or twenty-five albums, it's a relief and a shame that we may not feel the need to make a product that you can hold. One of the greatest parts about making music is that, unlike other forms of art, you create a wave, and when the sound finally dissipates and disappears, it's gone. There is nothing to hold."



# Drumming up a date

# Dinner and a show at Madison

I booked 6:30 reservations for two at Madison on Park Boulevard. I had decided to ask a date out for the evening, and to my amazement, she had accepted. Our Lyft dropped us off under the big red & white neon University Heights sign that hangs above the Park Boulevard Business District. Madison was just across the street, and we approached what appeared to be the entrance — you know, the door at the front of the building. There was a vintage vibe about the place; four lights lit up the restaurant's marquee: steel letters mounted on a pastel blue building. Walking in was an experience unto itself — that front door wasn't the whole story. We proceeded down a long dark hallway; halfway down, we started hearing the music that was playing within. We walked toward the light and passed through a lounge music portal before getting spat out into the restaurant — a space they call their indoor patio. It reminded me of an old gym, or maybe an airplane hangar, because of the high arched wooden ceiling.

The entertainment for the evening was Irving Flores and Joe. This was only halfexpected. Per the website, I was anticipating Irving Flores on keyboards with Kaylee Daugherty on vocals. Instead, I got Irving Flores on

keyboards with Joe on percussion. The website also promised that the musical portion of the evening would run from 5:45 to 8 pm, but the nice girl who took my reservation said the music started at 6:45. So I got there at 6:30, expecting a few minutes for chit-chat before the show. But when I arrived, the duo was already playing.

After being seated, we were immediately greeted by our server, one Tony Isaac, who took our order for the first drink of the evening: the Mr. Nice Guy. The cheerfully named cocktail was made from Humboldt

hemp-infused vodka, Illegal Mezcal, matcha, pineapple, coconut milk, and lime, with CBD oil dotted around a hemp leaf floating in the middle. For \$19, it provided an explosion of alcohol, sweet, and sour, with a medicinal aftertaste from the CBD. The hemp leaf tasted sweet, as if candy-coated. I enjoyed the beverage and the conversation with my date, all the while waiting for the performers to go on a set break so I could talk to them. But the conversation proved so engaging that I didn't even notice when the music stopped. When I finally did pick up on the pause, I saw that the performers were eating their dinners, and thought better of disturbing them. Instead, we followed their lead and ordered dinner for ourselves - plus another cocktail.

I went with the sliced skirt steak in jalapeno-mint tzatziki chimichurri sauce with guacamole for \$19, and the warm tomato and burrata - cherry heirloom tomatoes, kalamata olives, garlic, white balsamic, basil, and olive oil, served with grilled sourdough

> bread. Another \$19 added to my tab. Our next drink choice was the Motor Bike: Pueblo Viejo Blanco Tequila, watermelon, Aperol, ginger and lime. This drink was a little cheaper at \$16. When I got up to go the restroom, my date looked at me and said, "Uh oh you're going to break the seal." Fair enough. I walked past the performers finishing their meals, under an archway covered in vines and...into the kitchen, which is where you end up if you overshoot the restroom doors. Once I found my desired destination, I was treated to a framed black and white photo of the pool at City Heights Skatepark to contemplate as I relieved myself.

As I was walking back to my table, I noticed that Irving Flores and Joe had finished their meal and were shooting the breeze. I stopped by and introduced myself before inquiring innocently, "I read on the website that there's supposed to be a female singer, Kaylee Daugherty, on the bill?" Irving Flores gave me a look that hinted at details he didn't want to get into before replying, "We got Joe instead tonight!"

After those two, the popular well runs dry. but there are still several imposing settings of the blessed virgin's text. Some of them are by well-known composers — such as Edward Elgar. Elgar's version was written for the death of a family friend when Elgar was about 29 years old. While Elgar was a Catholic, this version feels so very, very English.

Another famous composer with a little-known "Ave Maria" is Anton Bruckner

"A lot of breweries will use seasonal or one-off beers as a way to brew beers that may be expensive or difficult to brew all year, but make sense during the right time. And while San Diego is beautiful all year, its residents still enjoy the changes of the seasons."

First up on Fowler's Christmas list is Fall Brewing's 2am Bike Ride, a 5.0% ABV stout brewed with vanilla and Dark Horse Coffee. The low ABV makes it drinkable any time of day without leading to a nap - or, as Fowler puts it, "Picture drinking this beer from a thermos standing on the driveway Christmas morning as the kids ride their new bikes. If I'm your neighbor, I'm not judging." Although, 2am Bike Ride is a year-round offering, it suits cooler weather and baked goods - Fowler suggests it would "be pretty phenomenal" with cinnamon buns.

Culver's Meltdown Brown is a one-off, rotating seasonal brew - a toasty ale with notes of toffee. Fowler says that "this is a balanced malt-forward beer perfect for SD winters. Culver has released big barrel-aged beers in place of this seasonal in

to drink the style that arguably put the brewing scene on the map. Or, as Fowler puts it, "You didn't think you would get through this without seeing an IPA listed, did you?" His final suggestion is Pizza Port's Finding Paradise, a 7.0% ABV West Coast IPA. He continues, "This dry and balanced bitter IPA with notes of citrus-like hoppy aromas is all that's good in the world of San Diego beer. Often called 'cheater hops' for how good they make IPAs, this beer showcases Citra and Nelson perfectly." Fowler believes this beer pairs best with roasted poultry, "Try it with a thyme- and rosemary-forward roasted chicken."

In conclusion: Fowler believes that San Diego's beer scene is unique because of the experience and relationship between brewers and imbibers, "The beer drinker tends to be more educated in San Diego than in other cities, and it requires breweries to be at the top of their game."

# With each location, El Pollo Grill has gotten more colorful

*El Pollo Grill; 7836 Broadway, Lemon Grove, 3041 Bonita Rd., Ste. 105, Bonita, 2015 Birch Rd., Ste 2003, Chula Vista.* Chargrilled chicken with warm flour tortillas, rice, and pinto beans. A simple, sustaining meal that efficiently feeds a family, best when made after an old family recipe. And for those who haven't got such a recipe, the Lopez family can give us a taste.

Per its web site, El Pollo Grill (sometimes called EPG for short) has a backstory that starts sometime prior to 1987. But that was the year Rafael and Constanza Lopez bought an existing "hole in the wall" Mexican grill in Lemon Grove, which they would refashion with their own familial recipes, behind the prowess of "Queen of the Kitchen" Constanza. The decades since have seen the family restaurant and catering enterprise expand incrementally as additional family members have joined the fold.

First came a larger restaurant in busier downtown Lemon Grove about 20 years back, then a second location in Bonita 7 years ago, and Otay Ranch just before the pandemic.

I only recently happened upon the Lemon Grove location, and quickly became a repeat customer for that grilled chicken. Though it offers a pleasant little dining patio and cafeteria-like booth seating, the place strikes me as an operation streamlined for people taking one of EPG's several combo meal options home to their families (ranging from \$33 to \$165 for chicken and sides). Once I realized the concept had branched out, I decided to drive south to pay each newer location a visit.

In Bonita, I found another small counter restaurant, part of a freeway adjacent shopping strip. Though its tiny dining room is livened up by a vibrant mural of a mariachi serenading an amorous couple on a boat weaving though mangrove trees, it's likewise well-situated for grab and go.

It's also where I spotted a sign advertising the 619 Cali Quake Burrito: a 6.19 pound behemoth made with your choice of meat or meats for \$59.99. That one is not so much grab and go as it is grab and haul away. I take it the burrito has been subject to one of those eat in 30 minutes or less challenges. I can't hang.

Big burritos do feature heavily at all three locations. While plenty of San Diego taco shops are happy to add ingredients to your burrito, EPG may be the first I've seen to promote a Build Your Own Burrito option, allowing you to mix and match proteins and add beans, rice, French fries, guacamole, salsa, and sour cream (\$12.99 Lemon Grove), \$13.99 Bonita and Otay Ranch). For another \$3, you may even add a couple of rolled tacos.

You can go nuts, but you probably won't come up with anything crazier than you'll find on EPG menus. As Ed Bedford found when he visited a couple years ago, their specialty burritos include a Philly Cheesesteak inspired burrito (\$12.99). There's also the overloaded San Diego Burrito (\$16.19) which doesn't come anywhere close to six pounds, but does get stuffed with carne asada, shrimp, bacon, fries, rice, guacamole, cheese, and tartar sauce.

The Otay Ranch location takes the idea a bit further, offering a mysterious burrito listing called the SY Mikey (\$16.19). According to the server I asked about it, this thing gets packed with carne, chicken, chorizo, shrimp, rice, beans, fries, guacamole, and two types of cheese. And I may be leaving a few things out.

A half chicken "Special C" from El Pollo Grill, with rice, beans, and warm flour tortillas for \$15.99.

Though the Otay location is also set up for brisk takeout service, it's is more colorful still, loaded with murals and décor celebrating Mexican culture, homegrown chefs, musicians, and sports figures, including the San Diego Padres. It also boasts a shaded patio with plenty of seating. I'd definitely call it the best of the three locations for hanging out.

But whichever location I visit, I'm more than content to stick to the crazy-enough-for-me California burrito (\$12.99 Lemon Grove/\$13.99 Bonita and Otay). Sticking to the conventional combination of carne asade, fries, guacamole, sour cream, and salsa, EPG makes one of the best California burritos in greater San Diego.

# Spotted Bay Bass – it's what's for dinner! Maintenance season for much of the fleet

**Dock Totals 12/3 – 12/9**: 364 anglers aboard 21 half-day to 3-day trips out of San Diego landings over the past week caught 8 barracuda (released), 4 black seabass (released), 158 bluefin tuna, 1 cabezon (released), 14 calico bass, 2 halfmoon, 10 lobster (31 released), 6 rock crab, 1965 rockfish, 38 sand bass, 12 sculpin, 36 sheephead, and 42 whitefish.

Saltwater: Along the beaches, surf perch have been biting well on plastics, bait, and spoons while halibut and corbina action has slowed substantially. In the bays, however, halibut have been biting very well on plastics, crank baits, and live bait. Most fish caught have been shorts - under the required 22-inch minimum length - but there have been a few nice legals to maybe 30 inches reported. Working the outside or deeper edge of eelgrass and along channels has been the ticket for those targeting the halibut. Along the bay riprap rocks (where accessible), anglers have been getting mixed results on shortfin corvina and spotted bay bass. Most of that shortfin action is on heavier, more castable stick baits like Lucky Craft's 110 Flash Minnow, but I have also found success on shortfin with many lures more traditionally fished in fresh water, such as smaller Rapalas and even Rat'l Traps. A slow steady retrieve over the top of the eelgrass on the high tides of five feet or higher (and especially during gray light hours) is optimal, though fishing the channel side of the eelgrass on the low tide will also get results.


As for spotted bay bass, this is the time of year when finding a structure and presenting a lure along the structure in a vertical drop will get results on the bigger fish. It can be great fun to sidle in (where allowed) on a kayak or even in a float tube on our warmer winter days. I have plucked quite a few, again, on freshwater lures most commonly fished for largemouth bass. For spotties, my go-to when fishing pilings in the winter is a ½ to ¾-ounce skirted bait with a spinner or flasher, as they just seem to draw those big ones out from under the docks and along the pilings where they seem to prefer to hang, while smaller spotted bay bass can be found in good numbers in the eelgrass holes, depressions, and especially clam beds like the ones just outside the anchorage at Glorietta Bay along the Coronado Bridge. So, it can be a choice of hunting the pilings for hogs or the clam beds for big numbers, but in my experience, I haven't found many hog spotted bay bass hanging out with the little ones, nor many little ones hanging out with the hogs.


Of the three bass caught in our area — barred sand bass, calico bass, and spotted bay bass — spotties are my favorite table fare. Though they are fairly closely related, each bass has a different texture while their natural flavor is similar. Calico is the most delicate, with a clarity to the filets, and if you like your meat moist, it cooks up well for tacos and also makes a great ceviche. Sand bass has a firmer but drier consistency, and while it's good in ceviche (isn't everything?), I prefer that drier meat in my tacos. It's just my opinion here, as taste is subjective, but spotted bay bass not only fight harder, but have a firmer, more grouper-like texture to their meat.

Since they live in bays for the most part, spotties can be a little more prone to pollution or heavy metals, so the best eating size is from the minimum limit of 14 inches to 16 inches or so. That said, as they usually inhabit the mid-water column, heavy metal build-up is not as much of a concern as it is with the bottom-dwelling rays and such. Also, our bays are deep and flush well with the tides, and most fish tested from either bay are fine to eat. Heavy metals tend to sink into the benthic mud, and that is why it is more often found in the species that live mostly in the bottom foot of water. Halibut can be an exception to that, since even though they spend

most of their time on the bottom, their prey is mainly finfish swimming higher in the water column — as opposed to rays, which blow ghost shrimp and clams out of the muck to munch.

Half day boats the *New Seaforth* and the *Dolphin* have been fishing deep and limiting on rockfish nearly every outing, while the *Polaris Supreme*, one of the few boats still chasing tuna, has had good success on bluefin outside on their 2-day runs. Most of these fish have been in the 20-40-pound range with a few larger tuna in the mix. At this time of year, every year, many of the normal mid-range 1.5-day to 3-day boats are in the dock or drydock for annual maintenance and Coast Guard certifications. Thus, angler counts are low, though the fish counts reflect very good fish for those getting out there.

Long-range boats are working far south off southern Baja in the normal zones for wintertime yellowfin, wahoo, and grouper, while most reports from the mid-peninsula are coming in from the local Mexican operations from Erendria to La Bocana. Working north to south, rockfish, bonito, whitefish and a few yellowtail are being caught in the Ensenada area south to around San Quintin, where more yellowtail are showing in the mix. The further south from there one goes, the better the yellowtail bite, until once past Bahia Asuncion or so, where yellowfin tuna and wahoo begin to show more on the high spots from the Polaris Bank, Alijos Rocks, and the Ridge outside of Bahia Magdalena. In the Cabo San Lucas area and around to La Paz, dorado has been the main catch, along with yellowfin tuna and striped marlin offshore, while inshore fishing for roosterfish and sierra has been very good. wood to be found in the staircase, and the furniture — including a big retro-futuristic couch near the wet bar that looks more "amusingly designed" than "actually comfortable" - adds enough color to keep my gripes at bay. There's another liv-

There's another living area off the open kitchen/dining area, and beyond it, we see the second outdoor dining space, the one we saw in the first photo on our tour. What's interesting about this spot is that the walls disappear in two different directions; when open, they leave just a solitary corner post to remind us that part of this space is a house and the rest backyard.

Would you like to see more pictures of the patio and view? You're going to get more. Many more. These are indeed selling points and everything we're seeing looks great, but we're running out of time, and we've

barely spent any of it inside!

Okay, time for a quick peek at the "unrivaled home office" that I suppose is fine — while also, despite the adjective, being no rival to some of the wood-paneled, Gilded Age-esque studies we've seen in the past. There's a bathroom with a vanity that seems to be carved, sink included, from a solid piece of stone, which I like.

Then we get a couple of peeks at secondary bedrooms and some more baths before getting to what I believe is the "resort-style primary suite with awe-inspiring vistas and a spa-inspired bathroom." Next we're on to what I think the listing describes as a "teen lounge," with its coupe of computer desks and a guitar-pick-shaped game table. There's another bedroom that I want to mention because

it appears to be mostly occupied by a large platform housing two beds - one that would be appropriate height were it not for the platform that makes it look like a mattress thrown on the floor, and another that's sunken into the platform and sits at ground level. This setup makes no sense to me, but I can't say that I hate it, either. (My wife has informed me that the smaller one may be a dog bed.)

More bathrooms (nice), more bedrooms (unremarkable), more views (we get it already). On the way out, we briefly pass a home gym that's better-equipped than most, and a miniature soccer field on a terrace below the main backyard space. We're told there's a yoga room and a "meditation sanctuary," but I don't think we've seen either of those spaces. Never mind, let's go back outside for one last reminder that you can see the ocean from here.

Public records list a Klein family trust as the current owner of Vista d'Oro; it last sold for a reported \$3.9 million in 2010, a decade before the current estate was built. It was listed for sale in mid-December with a tenfold asking price of \$39,977,000 that remains unchanged to date.

The sculptor, Ed Hamilton, suspects the hat was stolen: "It was anchored down into that monolith rock," he said. "I don't know what they could have used, maybe some more manpower or some crowbars. Bring the hat back, because you can't wear it," he warned potential thieves. Police and park officials are investigating.

# **Bright Idea**

- An unnamed 22-year-old man from Taiwan was detained on Dec. 5 at the Suvarnabhumi International Airport in Bangkok after he was found to be transporting two Asian smallclawed otters and a prairie dog, Metro News reported. The man had the animals stuffed into three separate socks and taped into his boxer shorts; security officers became suspicious about the large bulge below the man's waistband. They believe he purchased them at a market in the city. The animals were taken to the Wildlife Conservation Office; the smuggler was arrested. "We will catch anyone who tries to take animals on planes," a Thai customs department spokesperson said.

## **Suspicions Confirmed**

- Cops in Genoa, Italy, were stumped by a drug-trafficking case in their city, BNN reported on Dec. 1 - that is, until they noticed a large number of bald and beardless men visiting a local barbershop. Investigators initiated surveillance and searched the shop, where they found 100 grams of cocaine, precision scales and packaging materials. They also found hashish at the barber's home and evidence of ongoing communication with inmates in a Genoa prison. The 55-year-old barber is awaiting sentencing at the Marassi prison.

- The Burnside Shelter in Portland, Oregon, hit the jackpot earlier in the year when workers discovered a pair of gold sneakers at the bottom of a donation bin, United Press International reported. Turns out, the Air Jordan 3 kicks were commissioned by Spike Lee to wear at the 2019 Academy Awards -- and they're valued at more than \$10,000, according to Sotheby's. The auction house will donate 100% of the proceeds, expected to be as much as \$20,000, to the Portland Rescue Mission, which operates the shelter. Bidding continues through Dec. 18.

## Wait, What?

Sergey Vladimirovich Ochigava was arraigned on Dec. 5 in Los Angeles federal court after a bizarrely uninterrupted trip from Denmark to L.A., the Associated Press reported. The Russian flew in November without a ticket, passport, visa, or seat assignment. Flight crew members told investigators that he wandered around the plane and switched seats while talking with other passengers. When U.S. Customs and Border Patrol searched his belongings, they found "Russian identification cards and an Israeli identification card," court documents

outlined. Ochigava gave a variety of explanations, including that he hadn't slept in three days and wasn't sure how he got through security in Copenhagen. A trial is scheduled for Dec. 26.

# **Least Competent Criminal**

- Leonard Thuo Mwithiga, 52, a Kenyan executive, followed his wife of 22 years to the United States, hoping to convince her to return home to him, Oddity Central reported. But when she refused, Mwithiga allegedly decided she must die. During an Uber ride, Mwithiga told the driver he was "very, very mad" and needed a hitman. The Uber driver got in touch with Connecticut State Police, who enlisted him as an informant. Between September and December, the two engaged in multiple conversations about the plot, all of which were shared with authorities. Mwithiga wanted his wife "injected with something to make her very sick, 'like a cancer,'" and he wanted her to die a slow death. Finally, on Dec. 4, the informant introduced Mwithiga to a "hitman," *i.e.*, undercover cop, who was paid an advance on the job. Mwithiga asked that she be killed while he was away in Kenya, so he would have an alibi. Instead, he was arrested and held on \$5 million bond.
