

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

Ghost buses?

Imperial Beach locals not thrilled with 30-foot, high-frequency giants

The new rapid electric buses seem to check all the boxes when it comes to transit: no long wait times to get a ride, limited stops, lots of elbow room.

But to many Imperial Beach inhabitants, the 30-foot long articulated buses are noisy, view-blocking, street-clogging misfits in the small city — with hardly any riders. “Ghost buses,” they call them.

Rapid Route 227, launched on Oct. 15 by the Metropolitan Transit System, is

part of the agency’s efforts to transition to an all zero-emissions bus fleet by 2040. It connects riders in Otay Mesa, Nestor, and Imperial Beach to the Iris Avenue Transit Center. The buses travel along Imperial Beach Boulevard, 3rd Street, Palm Ave., and Seacoast Dr. The city recently managed to reroute the rapid route off 3rd Street, and now MTS is proposing 9th Street — a collector road with an existing bus route — as an alternative. That route also faces opponents.

It all began after encroachment permits were processed by the city, and residents complained about not getting notices. The buses just arrived — often. High frequency transit (every 15 minutes) started blocking businesses in Pier Plaza, coastal views, and driveways. Often, the buses appeared to be empty.

“It’s a shame to see the buses go by with nobody,” said 3rd Street landlord David Neering, who dislikes the noise and disrupted parking for his tenants. Transit officials expect to have ridership data by the end of this month.

The city met with Metropolitan Transit Services — which determines bus routing, stops, frequencies, and hours county-wide — in a community forum in late December to address the concerns. They decided to move the rapid route off 3rd

Street and eliminate queuing in front of Pier Plaza. But the possible addition of 9th Street had neighbors speaking out at last week’s city council meeting.

Officials said it would only run north-bound from Imperial Beach Boulevard to

Palm Avenue, and that no new bus stops are planned. Also that notices of the proposed rerouting will be sent to those living along 9th Street, inviting comment.

One local suggested getting rid of the bus altogether, before the city is “in too deep.” Some fear that moving it to 9th will just end up in its being moved to 13th, because the one-lane street — which is getting new bike lanes and now buses — will mean traffic bottlenecks on side streets, and a whole new fight.

Others said outreach to locals regarding the 9th Street reroute should extend to those who live south of Imperial Beach Boulevard and have to travel 9th Street regularly.

No bus riders (who might not yet be familiar with the new rapid buses), spoke at the meeting. Mayor Paloma Aguirre said the city would try not to preclude them getting to their destinations.

The city council, in their advisory role as planning commission, still has to review the proposed 9th Street route before seeking changes.

Beverly Neff, transportation planner with MTS, explained that there are only three service change periods every year, so the city will have to move quickly on it or wait until September.

Battle of the buskers

The rapper vs. the tap dancer

A January 13 video of a confrontation between known buskers — a local tap dancer and a rapper — at the Little Italy Farmers Market has gone viral.

The clip starts with Pat the Tap Dancer kicking Joseph Harrison’s golden tip bucket so hard it flies out of the video’s frame. Money flies out of the bucket as well. That Saturday early morning, by happenstance,



Harrison was recording a selfie video while singing and standing atop his metallic-gold-painted speaker.

“You want fucking trouble?” yells Pat. “I’ll give you fucking trouble [for] stealing my spot.”

Pat was peeved that Harrison took the street corner he liked to work.


Harrison, a Lyft driver who goes by the Joe Dreamz moniker on Instagram, continues singing. *I remember your name and where you came from...*

“You are not fucking playing here,” yells Pat into Harrison’s body camera. “I’m telling you again; you are not fucking playing here.”

Harrison then requests Pat to call the bi-weekly farmers market’s manager.

Harrison explained to me on January 21 that “the tap dancer

has been performing at the Little Italy farmers market in the same spot for years. What [Pat] does is he gets there at 4-5 am, leaves his equipment there, and comes back when the farmers market begins.” That Saturday at around 7:30 am, the market was already filled with other performers. “It occurred to me that it’s neither fair nor right for someone to leave their equipment overnight in a public place and prevent anyone else from getting a chance to perform,” Harrison explained. “So I relocated [Pat’s] equipment and began performing.”

The confrontation began when Pat the tap dancer returned.

But this wasn’t the first time, said Harrison. “The feedback I got from the farmers market manager, who remarked that the tap dancer has had similar issues with other performers.”

Another local tap dancer, Claudia Gomez, saw the viral video. “I know Pat,” she said to me. “He is typically a very nice person. Pat is a busker and pedi cab driver. This is what he does for a living.”

A busker is a street performer who generally sets up at the same spots where there’s a lot of foot traffic, which improves the chances of receiving tips.

Gomez wondered, “Was Pat there before the other artist arrived? I was a busker myself in the past, and in busking culture, there are underground rules.”

One of the underground rules listed on various busker websites and Reddit is that if the busker has performed at the same spot for a while, as Pat the tap dancer has “for years,” it’s generally his spot.

However, “If two buskers want the same spot, they can negotiate a schedule,” suggested another local busker on the San Diego Buskers and Artists Facebook page. “I have done that before, and it’s not hard, and it benefits civility.” Another person who saw the video said, “This was one of the reasons Balboa Park went to the permit system. In the ‘80s, there were five spots that everyone wanted. There were constant fights going on.”

Even today, the same type of busker beef happens at Balboa Park, as some people who don’t have permits set up camp. It’s not just conflicts between the performers. Sometimes, it’s performers vs. park rangers.

“Balboa Park still gets artists messed with [by park rangers] on occasion, from magicians, to musicians, to people making balloons or doing soap bubbles in the park,” William Dorsett said at a January 9 city council meeting.

Dorsett, who has sold his paintings at Balboa Park in the past, advocates for buskers’ rights. Around Thanksgiving weekend, he set up a Balboa Park Bubble Rally.


“Park rangers have written a couple of arbitrary citations to bubble performers in Balboa Park,” Dorsett continued. “We would like to rally as a group of adults, and perhaps children, to blow bubbles for a couple of hours and see if we get warnings

for citations. They are citing people for littering who are just blowing soap bubbles. So be aware that you could receive a citation for doing this. This would be group activism, to rally for the right to perform, or just to enjoy the act of blowing bubbles.”

Forty-four people responded to the rally’s Facebook invitation.

(In 2018, two bubble performers argued over a grassy spot by the Ocean Beach Pier.)

And while San Diego County buskers request the city to do less governing, many neighbors say

it would mean chaos in the popular tourist spots mentioned above, plus the Gaslamp, Pacific Beach, and Mission Beach.

The video incident between the rapper and the tap dancer, may be an indication that self-governance is the answer.

“I apologize for kicking your can,” says Pat after the initial confrontation. “I was that angry.”

Harrison responds, “If we keep doing this, it’s not good for the people here. It’s hard for them to enjoy your performance or my performance. What if you tap-danced to my songs? We can be synchrony, and we both can props.”

Pat responds, “Can you play anything upbeat?”

The clip ends with the two performing together, and they split the tips 60/40 in favor of Pat.

UNDER THE RADAR

DeSantis blues Now that Florida Governor **Ron DeSantis** has dropped out of the Republican race for president, some wealthy San Diegans will have to write off their losses. They include General Atomics chairman and CEO **Linden Blue**, who kicked in \$6600 to the Ron DeSantis for President campaign on June 23 of last year, according to federal disclosure records. **Linden Prause Blue**, CEO of General Atomics Aeronautical Systems and son of **James Neal Blue**, brother of Linden Blue, showed up last June with wife **Chollada C. Blue** at a Biden White House state dinner thrown by the president for Indian Prime Minister **Narendra Modi**.

The Hindustan Times reported in June 2023 that General Atomics was working on a deal to sell the Indian government 31 of its MQ9B HALE drones. According to a November 13, 2023 dispatch by the *Press Trust of India*, “India is looking at sealing a landmark deal to procure 31 MQ-9B Predator long-endurance armed drones from the US under a government-to-government framework by March with the US Congress expected to clear the supplies in the next few weeks, people familiar with the matter said.

“American and Indian government officials will hold the final series of negotiations on the procurement after Washington responds to India’s Letter of Request for the acquisition of drones from US defense major General Atomics, they said. India is procuring the long-endurance ‘hunter-killer’ drones to crank up the surveillance apparatus of the armed forces, especially along the Line of Actual Control with China.”

Besides cash from the elder Blue, DeSantis took in \$3300 on September 13 from San Diego political consultant **Stephen Puetz**, one-time chief of staff to Republican ex-mayor **Kevin Faulconer**. Retired real estate mogul **Malin Burnham** came up with \$2000 on September 30, and painting contractor **Onofrio Pecoraro** of Little Italy, a Faulconer backer, gave \$1000 on December 28.

Political grease The first donor to kick in for the newly announced gubernatorial campaign committee for San Diego state Senate Democrat **Toni Atkins** is La Jolla **Alan Viterbi**, with \$30,635 on January 18, state disclosure filings show. Viterbi, a one-time West Hollywood mayor, is the son of Qualcomm billionaire co-founder **Andrew Viterbi**. Alan Viterbi once ran toxic waste handler Liquid Environmental Solutions with the current

chair of the University of California Board of Regents **Richard Leib**.

Alan Viterbi also used to call the shots at red light camera provider U.S. Public Technologies Inc. After one of its workers died in April 2019, Liquid Environmental was cited by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration for gross negligence. “This tragedy could have been prevented if the company had followed proper safety procedures, such as air testing, communication systems and non-entry retrieval devices for employee rescue situations,” wrote **Loren Sweatt**, Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary of Labor for Occupational Safety and Health, in an OSHA statement cited by the website EHS Advisor in October 2019 following the grease-trap tragedy at Austin-Bergstrom International Airport.

“Liquid Environmental Solutions of Texas, LLC, did not provide appropriate equipment, procedures, and should have prevented an employee from entering a permit-required confined space, according to the agency. While the airport’s owner, the city of Austin, is not subject to OSHA regulations as a public sector employer, its contractor, Liquid Environmental Solutions, is.”

Earlier, in February, 2016, Liquid Environmental and executives had come under scrutiny by the *San Antonio Express News*. “Since 2002, Liquid Environmental executives Alan Viterbi, Rich Leib, **Peter Crane**, **Patrick Reilly**, **Dana King**, **Brian Bidelspach** and the company itself donated a total of \$38,500 to Texas legislators’ campaigns,” according to the story, which quoted Liquid Environmental competitors as saying the company “has worked relentlessly behind the scenes in Austin to manipulate state law.”

Added the story: “Liquid Environmental spent between \$925,000 and \$1.7 million on lobbyists from 2004 to 2015, Texas Ethics Commission records show. Two of its hires were former [Texas Commission on Environmental Quality] executive directors, **Glenn Shankle** and **Jeffrey Saitas**.” Liquid Environmental’s environmental policy director **Jeff Thompson** told the paper the critics were trying to deflect criticism of their own operations “Every time this comes up, they try to make us the issue.”

Throwing more bull The wealthy head of Alden Global Capital, a controversial vulture investing fund that took over the *San*

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UNREAL ESTATE

The spectrum of writing quality in the real estate world, in terms of both quality and density, is, to put it gently, broad. Some agents let the photos in their listings speak mostly for themselves; others will craft a narrative around a handful of selling points and unique features; a few go as far as attempting to shoehorn a sort of novella into the comments section accompanying the bed/bath count and list of amenities.

Today we're going to look at one of the latter creations. Join us as we "embark on an unparalleled living experience at 17176 Calle Serena — a sophisticated Villa seamlessly blending modern luxury with international allure." That's the opening salvo of the Zillow pitch. We're going to encounter that descriptor, "unparalleled luxury," a total of three times. We'll also get three uses of "sophisticated," and three more references to "seamless" living. Remarkably, "masterpiece" shows up just twice.

To be fair, this does seem like a house worthy of these terms of endearment. Constructed in 2021 and sitting on the shore of one of two manmade lakes in the Fairbanks Ranch community adjacent to Rancho Santa Fe, the home features five bedrooms and seven baths sprawling across more than 11,000 square feet of living area.

"This newer construction masterpiece offers a lock-and-go lifestyle,"

the listing continues. This is a new term for me, but Google suggests that it refers to low-maintenance landscaping and other features that would allow an owner to simply lock up and leave for weeks or months of leisure travel without much worrying about the house and grounds falling into disrepair.

Our tour begins with an aerial shot of the backyard, featuring "a BBQ island, pool deck inspired by Versailles' inner courtyard, and glass-tile swimming pool inspired by the Hearst Castle outdoor pool, all adorned with hand-carved marble features," along with a small private dock for mooring a rowboat or simply enjoying "serene moments by the water." From there we move to the front entry, passing through "wrought iron entry gates inspired by Elms in Newport, Rhode Island" to a cobblestone driveway flanked by a fountain featuring a cherub stabbing a fish in the head with a trident.

We next stop off at the small dock for a view across the lake, pause and take a peek at the outdoor kitchen, and peer at a detailed shot of the pool tile before heading inside to the living room.

I like the raw wood on the French doors and the exposed ceiling beams (apparently reclaimed from a 19th century barn in Virginia). But I'm confused by the set of chairs facing one another with a giant fake plant on the table between them: who is going to sit down for a chat with that thing in the way? Staging is a strange business sometimes.

Before moving on, let's take a moment to hear about some of the features included in the listing in order to make this house sound special. "Throughout the home, high ceilings, Siberian larch windows, hand-distressed solid wood floors, and hand-carved marble arches create an atmosphere of timeless luxury. Italian marble countertops, hand-cut crystal chandeliers, and solid mahogany doors further enhance the opulence." Siberian larch!

Now we're headed down to the lower level. I believe you enter the home on the second of three stories, and can head up or down from there. Down takes us to the pool level, where we've got another living area with one of those retractable walls opening to a patio and an unstocked bar in the back-

ground. The photo tour seems to jump around a bit, so I'm trying to piece things together as we go.

Our next stop is the "European-style chef's kitchen" that "features a lake view, a 5-burner La Cornue stovetop, Miele appliances, and Bosch dishwashers." It's sufficiently fancy for a house like this, and I appreciate the way the blue center island and range bring a little color to the otherwise all-white affair.

After a stop in the dining room — which is "adorned with unique floor design" and "seamlessly connects to the gourmet chef's kitchen" — we see another shot of the empty bar before entering the wine cellar, "a masterpiece in itself" that "holds approximately 2000 bottles and features reclaimed brick 1920s, hand-distressed Jerusalem stone, and custom mahogany racks." The brick is nice, but I'm not sure how one would go about hand-distressing stone.

Moving on: "Entertainment options abound, with a nine-seat theater strategically located near the game room, bar, and wine cellar, all designed for easy access to the swimming pool and

BBQ area," the listing continues, and we quickly peek at a room with a pool table and another bare bar before glancing at the strategically located theater. Then it's on to the office, which "exudes elegance with a 19th-century French antique mantel, intricate built-ins, a coffered ceiling, and water jet-cut walnut and maple floors." It's fun to think of what excellent work I would accomplish in such a space.

Now we're finally headed up to the top level, stopping to admire the staircase and upstairs landing before heading into the primary suite. "The main bedroom and spa-like bath provide expansive lake views and luxurious features, including a glass-walled shower/sauna, Italian marble shower with rain showerhead and body sprays, solid brass Italian Rohl hardware, and a true Scandinavian sauna crafted from Nordic Spruce with Finleo heater." It's not mentioned, but there's also a walk-in closet that, by itself, is larger than most ensuite bedrooms.

Here at the end of our tour, we at last arrive at the foyer. "Upon entering through the beautiful solid mahogany front door, an impressive 24-foot-high groin ceiling welcomes you, complemented by custom-designed water-jet white and gray marble floors featuring blue lapis accents." I have to admit, water jets or

no, this is a good floor.

We leave the house with a shot of a red Ferrarri in the driveway (I don't think it's included with the sale), and then take a quick look at some of the luxuries your \$890 monthly HOA dues buy, including "a range of amenities such as a clubhouse, world-class equestrian center, walking trails, tennis courts, twin lakes, parks, fitness courses, and security."

The listing concludes, "This exclusive sanctuary beckons those with a discerning taste for the extraordinary. Elevate your lifestyle by seizing the rare opportunity to make 17176 Calle Serena your haven. Every detail reflects refined living at its pinnacle. Discover the epitome of sophistication and year-round activities in this captivating residence... Your dream home beckons — answer the call to a life of unparalleled luxury."

Public records list a Sacramento-based LLC as the Calle Serena mansion's current owner, the property last sold on the open market for a reported \$2.45 million, back when the lot hosted a 1991-built home badly in need of updating (or, in this case, demolition). Originally listed in late 2022 for \$12,495,000, the price has been reduced to \$11,295,000, but even at that price, it's still looking for a buyer after eight months. ■

Finn's FlexWave: the next wave?

Forty-four-year-old Finn Madsen grew up two blocks from where I lived in Cardiff. I would see him around when he was a young man; he rarely spoke to me or anyone else, and I figured — correctly, as it turns out — that he was often stoned. But he wasn't simply a checked-out pothead. He was smart, but he was self-medicating, numbing the anxiety that seems to plague so many American youth instead of dealing with it.

Later on, I became friends with him while flying little remote-control planes in Cardiff's Glenn Park. Noting that my plane tended to crash land, Finn taped a dime onto the fuselage in just the right spot, an adjustment that, from then on, allowed me to bring the little plane down for soft landings on the grassy runway. My wayward plane provided the occasion for my first significant conversation with Finn, and I realized he was both a tinkerer and a thinker.

And a builder. As we got to talking, I learned that Finn built everything from beautiful fiber-

in hindsight. Paul Harris, who lived down the street, had a shaping room, and Josh and Joel Tudor always hung out there." (Joel would go on to become a world champion longboarder.) "We shaped and glassed our boards in Paul's garage until the fire department shut us down. After that, we'd shape at Paul's, take the shaped blanks to my house, and glass them in our garage."

The family connection helped shape Finn's interest. So did the family home; the old real-estate mantra of "location, location, location" takes on new meaning here. "That house was built in 1919. I moved there when I was 11, and have lived there ever since. The house was five blocks from the beach. The surf check required walking to the corner and looking down the street. Back then, there was nothing between the house and the ocean. We had goat trails running across the tracks, right into the surf. When my grandpa lived there years ago, he would go scuba diving every day, and if my grandma wanted him home, she would hang a red towel on the garage door."

Today, duplexes and roadways have filled in the space. But way back when, "my mom learned to ride horses up the street from there, in the canyon where

the freeway is now. My grandma sometimes rode her horse on the beach from Leucadia to Torrey Pines. I had the tail end of that life, and even as a kid growing up in Cardiff, my best friend and I could walk the train tracks above the lagoon with loaded pellet guns over our shoulders. We were on our way to the bird sanctuary to hunt ducks. Fortunately, we never got any ducks, and nobody said anything or tried to stop us until my grandma came down and pulled us out."

It sounds idyllic, but "nobody said anything or tried to stop us" has its downside. "By age 17," recalls Finn, "I began having crazy panic attacks. I had no idea then, but I now realize it was because I was smoking too much pot, drinking every day, and not eating well. I became an automotive machinist at that time, which saved me. I have an engineer-

foot. "To build custom surfboards," explains Finn, "you must understand the person you're making them for. There's a lot to consider in making a board: rails, bottom contour, concaves, fins, and outline. One problem in buying a board that is not made for you is that some surfboard models are made for surfers who can surf a table. Whenever I ride a board not built for me, I think, *That's nice, but it's not my thing.*"

What is his thing is still thinking and tinkering, which led to his invention of the FlexPlane. As he writes on his Instagram, "my love

ing and mechanical mind, so that worked for me. I continued building various things and did handyman work, but shaping surfboards was my dream job. After getting sober a few years later, I ran into Dave Daum, the owner of King's Paddle Sports. He noted how clear-eyed I was. He hired me and showed me how to spray boards with automotive paint. I also began finish shaping for Dave, while also focusing on my own boards."

"My own boards" here means "custom boards for others." A custom board is shaped with your height, weight, and surfing ability in mind, and will set you back about \$100 a

Finn loaned me one on a recent frigid morning, and it allowed me to access areas of a wave that I had never explored in my 60 years as a surfer. It would be presumptuous to call Finn Madsen the new Tom Morey — the surf-tech genius and former Carlsbad resident responsible for the Boogie Board and other soft-board innovations. But it does seem fair to say that he's carrying on Morey's spirit of innovation in the pursuit of stoke. ■

glass canoes to lowrider bikes — but his passion was surfboards. The fascination had been passed down from his dad, Steve, a descendant of one of the oldest families in Cardiff. Steve's company, California Surfboards, did reasonably well for a few years after its launch in 1962. But the '60s surf boom did not bless everyone equally, and within five years, Madsen closed up shop. However, while Steve was over building surfboards, his son was just getting started.

According to Finn, "Some of my earliest memories are of seeing my dad's unused power planer in our garage and hearing the stories of the surfboards he built with it. At 15, he helped me shape my first board in the garage. I was happy with it, but it was crude

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TIJUANA JAIL BREAK

A bad night in Baja

A POWERFUL BLOW to the side of my head sent me sprawling on the sidewalk. Then a strong hand seized the back of my pants and lifted me up from the sidewalk. About that time, I noticed the dark sleeves on the shirt above the hand. Tijuana has long been a place where you can find all kinds of trouble. This was the wrong kind.

As a teenager living in Chula Vista in the early 1960s, just a few miles from the Mexican border, I was often in Tijuana. Most of my friends and I were addicted to the place; it gave us the freedom to do practically anything we wanted, and the thrill of always being on the edge. I had witnessed some crazy things there: fights, robberies, even shootings. And it was not unusual to witness a police arrest in the aftermath of these events, and to witness in the police beating the crap out of the person being apprehended with their batons. Those dark sleeves I saw were police sleeves.

* * *

That night, we went to a dance in Chula Vista. Maybe we didn't like the band, maybe we weren't meeting any girls. What-

ever the reason, we decided to head down to Tijuana to finish the night. Strange: we usually started the night there, drank as much as we could, then headed back to a dance or party in Chula Vista. Strange too that we decided to drive across the border. Normally, we would park on the U.S. side and walk in. There was a good reason for this: if you got into an accident in Mexico, there was a strong possibility the police would confiscate your car. And there was always the chance of being taken to jail. And for sure, all the money you and your friends had, and all your valuables, would be taken by the police. The rule about having an accident in Mexico was that if you were not hurt, you should tactfully remove yourself from the scene, drive away if possible, and get yourself back across the border as fast as you could.

We made the normal rounds of the usual places. First, the El Patio bar on a side street off Avenida Revolución, the main tourist street in Tijuana, for a couple of cheap pitchers of beer. Local Mexicans

patronized this bar, and it echoed with the distinctive sound of domino tiles being slammed on the tables. After a couple of pitchers at the El Patio, we headed to the Long Bar, a common gathering place for young people from the U.S. Often, we would see people we knew there, a number of them surfers headed down into Baja for the waves. Talking with other surfers meant bragging and lying, arguing over who was the best (and worst) surfer, and stories of near-death wipeouts and secret surf spots. And there were always some good stories about exciting encounters with Mexican locals, with at-gunpoint robberies topping the list. One oft-told tale warned of a guy who would show up out of nowhere at the popular surf spot K38½ with an old rusty rifle to charge money for parking and camping.

The Long Bar meant more beer — in a bottle if you could afford it. The 40-ounce bottles of Suprema or Superior were my favorites. Also, shots of Jose Cuervo white (the cheapest option) and whatever mez-

cal could be had, as long as it featured a worm at the bottom for whoever got the last pour. No one ever had much more than a few dollars, which was a good thing, because it limited our consumption. We smoked cheap Mexican cigarettes, unfiltered Fiestas. Occasionally, we paid for a song or two from the live Mariachi bands that were always roaming around. The loud sound of the horns and squeeze box accordeons always got everyone fired up.

Around midnight, we headed for Mike's A-Go-Go Bar on Avenida Revolución near the Jai Alai Frontón Palacio. Mike's was a good place for loud rock bands; the dance floor was always packed. Mixed drinks were the preferred option; the Tom Collins with tequila was my favorite. Cheap, sweet, and went down fast. Sometimes, we stayed in Tijuana all night.

On this night, we left Mike's at 1 am, pretty messed up, but still thirsty. We headed for The Jungle Club, which had just about the cheapest pitcher beer in

Tijuana. Plus, you always got a bowl of little round Spanish peanuts. The Jungle Club was pretty entertaining, because it had a dance floor where the locals would pay the ladies to dance. The loud oompah Mexican dance music, the strong smell of cheap stale beer, and the occasional cockroach in your peanuts made this place perfect for a last stop before leaving town.

We were all joking around, shoving each other and talking loudly. Just then, my head bumped into a banner hanging over the sidewalk. I thought it was one of those "Big Sale" signs that hang all along Avenida Revolución, luring tourists. I swatted at it — then grabbed it and yanked on it, as did everyone else. It fell on the sidewalk, and we all proceeded to stomp on it. That's when the hand hit me. And after I noticed the dark sleeve, I noticed the green, white, and red of the "sign" I had pulled down. A Mexican flag. And then I realized that it was Mexican Independence Day.

I tried to apologize in both English and Span-

ish, and tried to say I would put the flag back in its place. But there would be no easy out here, no payoff and on my way. Fearing that they might be scooped up as well, my friends backed away — all except one. I heard him say the word *dinero* several times. But the two officers told him to *cállate* — shut up. The officer who had a hold of me roughly escorted me down the sidewalk to the corner. I did not resist. My hands were free, and as I was walking, I reached into my front pocket, pulled out the keys to my 1952 Willy's Jeep Station Wagon and dropped them on the sidewalk. I knew someone from my group would see that and grab them.

Within a few minutes, a panel truck drove up to us. One of the officers opened the back door, pushed me in, and pointed at the metal bench along the side. The driver came around to the back door with a chain in his hand, then wrapped the chain around both of my wrists and the leg of the bench. He secured it with a nor-

mal padlock. I could tell it was not very secure, but also that trying to make a run for it was not a good idea. Both of the two officers and the driver had revolvers in holsters on their waists. I kept saying "*lo seinto mucho*" and "*mucho dinero*," but it was useless. As the panel truck drove away, I looked out the back window. The image of my friends, helplessly standing there on the curb with no expressions on their faces as I was taken away, is one I will never forget.

I assumed I was headed for jail. My immediate thought was that my friends would all chip in, head over to the local Tijuana police station in my Jeep, and pay whatever fine was necessary to bail me out. But as the panel truck drove through the streets of Tijuana, I quickly deduced that we were not going to the local downtown police station. I had been there before to bail out a couple of buddies. Instead, I could see that we were headed out of town.

I was already scared. Now I was more scared. There were plenty of stories of people being

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tortured by police, even people disappearing. I kept thinking that while it was a bad thing to tromp all over a country's flag, especially on that country's Independence Day, I hadn't been robbing or assaulting anyone. But I wasn't sure it mattered. I decided I had to escape.

I had quickly figured out how I could get out of my chains. (If this happened today, I'm sure they would have used handcuffs.) And it was just the driver and myself in the truck. And there was a handle on the inside of the back door. I thought about jumping, but we were going pretty fast. Subduing the driver wasn't a possibility, either, not with the mesh screen separating us and the gun on his hip. So I stayed put for the moment.

Eventually, the streetlights gave way to darkness. Then we were climbing up a hill on a noisy gravel road. Then

we reached a level place and stopped. The driver came around, opened the door, saw me sitting there without my chains, and smiled as if to say, *That's what everyone does.* He motioned for me to get out, and as I stepped out into the quiet darkness, I saw what looked like a big building with no windows, just a door. But soon I realized it wasn't a building; it was the outside wall of La Mesa, the Mexican State Prison.

The driver took me inside and up to a counter where he motioned for me to empty my pockets. The guy behind the counter went through my possessions: I had one dollar and some change in my front pocket, and in my wallet, I had my driver's license and school ID. The guy behind the counter noticed my Spanish surname, and started speaking to me in Spanish. All I could do was repeat, "*Lo seinto*

mucho, por favor." I'm a pretty good talker, but not in Spanish.

The guy behind the counter motioned to the driver to put me in a little room opposite the counter. I figured this was some sort of holding cell, a long rectangular space with bench seats along the walls. The benches were outfitted with arm rests; the arm rests were outfitted with metal rings. I sat down in the seat closest to the door, and the driver picked up a chain from the floor and slid it through the ring of one armrest. Then he wrapped the chain around both of my wrists, and slid the chain through the ring of my other armrest. It was as if I were tied up by the chain, but with no lock of any sort. He then slammed the door, which I noticed closed with a loud metallic bang and then bounced slightly open. I then heard the driver

leave through the prison wall's door, which he also slammed. I was the only person in the cell.

As I was sitting there, I could hear the guy behind the counter slowly typing something, which I assumed was a record of my arrest. The sound of the slow *click, click, click* of the typewriter sounded like a time bomb ticking down the last seconds of my life. It was clear to me I was being processed for incarceration into the La Mesa State Prison. I started to think about how mad my parents would be when they found out I was in prison, but that didn't last long, because I knew I had much bigger problems than my parents being pissed off at me. This wasn't the Tijuana jail that the Kingston Trio sang about. This was prison. And from what I had heard about prisons in Mexico, they were not a nice place for young kids like me.

I kept thinking, *I have to get out of here.* Once again, I easily and quietly freed myself from my chains. I stood up and cracked open the cell door. I could see the clerk typing away sitting with his back to the counter, and I could see the door to the outside. It looked closed, but I could not tell if it was locked. I didn't remember seeing the clerk's gun, but I figured he must have one nearby. I figured there must be more people around somewhere — prisons had guards, didn't they? — but I hadn't seen any. Guards or no guards, I knew, then and there, that I had to make a run for it.

I figured I could slowly open the holding cell door, quietly creep the few feet to the outside door, and if it was not locked, open it quickly and run like hell. (The driver had not had to unlock it when he brought me inside.) If the clerk ran after me, he would first have to jump over or go around the counter, which would give me a little head start. Also, I was pretty sure I could outrun him. If he had a gun, he could easily shoot me, but it was still dark and maybe I could get far enough away before he started shooting.

Then I thought about the possibility of guards on the prison walls. They surely had guns. I hoped they wouldn't notice me running until I had put some distance between us. And even if they did start shooting, how good is anyone's aim in the dark? If I could just get far enough away from the prison, I could hide somewhere until it got light, then make my way to the border.

I knew it was a huge


gamble, but I was a fast runner, and thought I could outrun someone if they chased after me. I thought that I would be able to hide out there in the country. I *also* thought that I was maybe smarter than the Mexican police, even though I was the one in their custody. But whatever my thoughts, they weren't going to get me free. I had to move. The clerk was still typing away. I gently pushed open the door and slowly took a couple of steps toward the outside door. Then I bolted. I put my hand on the handle and turned it. Unlocked. I took one quick step back to let the door open inward, then ran like mad.

For a few seconds, I didn't hear anything. I thought maybe the guy behind the counter was letting me go. Then I thought maybe I was being set up for the Mexican death penalty. Mexico did not have a death penalty, but criminals often died during their attempted escape. But it was too late for that thought now. I was on my way.

It was still dark. I had made it about 100 yards when all hell broke loose. *Pop, pop, pop* rang out, which I was sure was gunfire. I didn't look back, but I could see from the corner of my eye that some rather dim spotlights had started shining from the top of the walls. This made me run even faster. By this time, I could hear even more gunfire. Oddly, what I noticed was the variety of gun sounds. Some sounded like firecrackers, others had an echoing sound, and I even heard a couple of blasts. It sounded like the whole arsenal was being used: pistols,

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


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rifles, and shotguns.

I had been running through the large gravel parking area for maybe 20 seconds when I came to a small downhill surface. I tripped and fell flat on my face, but I was quickly up on my feet and running down the hill. It was dark, but my eyes had adjusted some, so I could pretty much see where I was going. I got to a gravel road that appeared to be the main road to the prison and started to run down it as fast as I could. I didn't hear any more gunfire by that time, nor did I see any cars. Then I saw two headlights coming up the road. I crouched down behind some bushes on the roadside, and as the car got closer, I could tell that it was a taxi. I had been raised around people who loved cars, and I knew the sound of the six-cylinder, early 1950s Chevrolet that was favored by taxi drivers in Tijuana.

This was my chance. The taxi got within about 25 feet, and I jumped out into the road and raised both of my arms in the air, imploring it to stop. I hoped there were no

passengers, that the taxi was on its way to pick up a fare. The driver stopped. Without saying anything, I opened one of the back doors and jumped in — luckily, there were no passengers. But by this point, my fear had transformed into rage, and I honestly think I would have taken on any hostile passengers, and even the taxi driver.

I hollered, “*La frontera rapido, la frontera rapido, mucho dinero, mucho dinero.*” The taxi driver whipped a U-turn in the gravel, and off we went. I did a quick glance out the back window towards the prison. By this point, it was awash in light. I continued to holler about the border, and the driver sped along through one street after another in that direction. The 6-cylinder engine revved up and down; it sounded like a kid's bike with cards hitting the spokes of the wheels. There was hardly any traffic and no people around, so the taxi driver didn't stop for lights or stop signs.

After about ten minutes, I saw we were nearing the border. I

motioned to him to drive up as close as he could. It was just starting to get light, and everything outside looked normal — just a few cars and people around and no police in sight. There was just one lane open, and a U.S. Immigration and Customs Officer at the crossing checkpoint, questioning a motorist.

I had no money or valuables of any sort with which to pay the driver, and no ID to show the Customs Officer. I knew I would have to jump out of the taxi and make a run for it across the border, and that is exactly what I did. When the taxi driver got within one car length of the checkpoint, I jumped out and ran along the passenger side of the car at the front of the line. As I ran, I could hear the taxi driver hollering some swear words in Spanish at me, but I didn't look back. The Immigration and Customs Officer looked up and stared at me for a moment, but said nothing. I think he recognized me as one of those crazy teenagers from Chula Vista.

After I made it onto

U.S. soil, I slowed down some, but I didn't stop running until I was out of sight of both the checkpoint and the taxi driver. No one on the U.S. side came after me or even called out for me to stop. When I did stop, I thought for a moment that I was going to cry. But then that feeling was replaced by a rush as I thought about what I had just pulled off. What a story this was going to make for my friends in Chula Vista! Now I just needed them to have picked up my keys, headed home, and then set out on a rescue mission at first light.

I walked a little ways over to the border crossing for people entering Tijuana and sat there for a while on the curb, watching. Sure enough, it wasn't too long before I spotted my white Willy's Jeep Station Wagon, with my friend Gary driving it. He pulled over and I jumped in and said something like, “You won't believe this.” He responded, “We thought you were a goner.”

Gary had gone around to all our friends and collected about \$30, but he didn't think

that was going to help. He thought that maybe someone would be willing to trade my Jeep for my freedom, but he wasn't sure.

I bragged about my Mexico prison escape in Chula Vista until I was pretty sure everyone was sick of it. It would have been easy to embellish the story, but there was really no need. The truth was wild enough. There was just one thing I couldn't get off my mind; was I the one who did most of the pulling on the “banner”? Was I the one who did most of the stomping on it? But in the end, I guess it didn't matter. What mattered was that I was the one who got nabbed. Also, I felt bad about not being able to pay my get-away taxi driver. Several months later, a few of us took a taxi from the border to the Bullring by the Sea. Both the taxi and the driver seemed awfully familiar. I made sure he got a nice tip.

When it came to Tijuana adventures with my friends, I took a couple of weeks off. I was a little gun shy, so to speak.

San Diego Reader: Why did you become a minister?

Pastor David Nutting: Before I answered the call to ministry, I was deep into two different worlds in music; I was a classical musician and a jazz musician. I was a percussion

major in college, so I played in both orchestras, and in jazz ensembles and trios as a drummer. I was on a path to being a professional musician and to potentially teach music at a college as well. Somewhere in the midst of that, I also wanted to perform and play. I would have loved to make a living as a professional orchestra musician, but it's a hard world to make a living in. In the middle of that, too, I was asked to direct music for a couple of churches and interviewed at places to do that full-time. It was through music in the church that I was drawn to ministry in general. I had the opportunity to be a band director at a Christian

school, right after receiving my master's degree. The principal asked me if I could also teach an Old Testament Bible class at the school. I was thrilled and thought it would be tons of fun. I really enjoyed it and found myself being more drawn to teach the Bible and spend time with the students than I was to being a music teacher. So, I had a sense to give ministry a try and seek this opportunity out. That's where the shift happened. But I never stopped being a musician, and music continues to be a part of my life. I still lead music in our church and play occasionally.

SDR: What is the mission of your church?

PN: We talk about three things that are connected to our love for the gospel. We say that the gospel moves us through the free grace of God as a people to worship God, live in community, and serve the world with the gospel. God's grace makes me want to worship him; it is the central aspect of our life as a church. Sunday worship is the pinnacle of our week. It's also a time when we gather. We also gather at other times of the week; we're committed to living in community while people are linked together in shared life together, to encourage each other. So, we have commu-

nity groups, Bible studies, and places where we can be together. I just came off a retreat where fathers and sons came together in the desert. But community is not an end in itself, because the third part of our mission is to serve the world with the gospel of Jesus, which means we'll be sent out in various

ways to our neighborhoods, workplaces and schools to love people and show them the glory of Christ.

SDR: Where do you go when you die?

PN: I have a Biblical view of heaven and hell. The souls of those who have trusted in Christ for the forgiveness of sin, at death their souls go immediately to be with the Lord. As Paul says, to be absent from the body is to be present with the Lord. Those who don't trust in Christ go to eternal punishment. Then there will be a general resurrection of the dead when Jesus returns.

Humming and diving, two more minutes of daylight, Groundhog Day

Hummingbirds Are Zipping Around San Diego County's backyard gardens, scrub-covered coastal hillsides, and the warming Anza-Borrego Desert. Seasonal hummingbirds are making their way back to Southern California in preparation for breeding season in early Spring. Resident hummingbirds like the Anna's often dive bomb invaders to defend their turf. Male hummingbirds tend to patrol larger areas (up to a ½ acre) to defend mating territory. Female

hummingbirds dive-bomb too, but tend to be localized around smaller nesting areas. Dive-bombing tends to be accompanied by a sound which the birds make by fluttering their tailfeathers while diving. Males will also dive as a mating "dance" to impress a female.

The Sun Strides North in February, swinging higher across the sky on each successive day. Already quite noticeable is the change in the time of sunset, currently almost a minute later per day, and sunrise, currently almost a minute earlier per day.

Groundhog Day Comes Monday, February 2. If the sleepy woodchuck sees his shadow, so the story goes, he'll hole up for another six weeks of winter cold. None of this means much in San Diego, where a February warm spell can easily push the thermometer into the 80s.

Intimate Apparel

What’s the harm in dreaming? Funny you should ask. Playwright Lynn Nottage’s story, written after she discovered a photo of her own great-grandmother and started wondering about the person in the picture, gives us a woman who has had a bellyful of reality, to the point where just being able to support herself as a seamstress feels like a miracle. Even so, she has managed to keep a grander dream alive: to someday save enough to open a beauty parlor for her fellow black women in turn-of-the-century New York, a place where they can have some comfort in this life. But hearts are hungry things, with a hearty appetite for any number of fond fantasies, even late-in-life love. And when the letters start to pour in from a lonely canal-digger in Panama, well, hope is a powerful drug. (Plus, he writes like a gentleman.) But while there is an air of culmination to their eventual meeting, it is by no means a conclusion, and reality has a way of setting in. It’s a tough tale, carefully engineered to break nearly every heart on display, some more than once. Still, as director Jasmine Bracey notes, it’s not a tragedy — a broken heart is not the same as a broken person. And now we come to the inevitable clothing metaphor, one that touches on the fact that of course, a play is itself a fantasy, blunt reality gussied up the way lingerie fancifies a prostitute. Nottage’s expertly rendered dialogue serves as the shapely corset that lets the actors cut the required figure, but it’s still up

to them to perform, and that’s the real wonder here. Lead Nedra Snipes, in particular, manages the daunting task of playing someone simple but deep, terrified but determined, and perhaps most daunting of all, human but good. It is a grace to watch her. Lady Day at Emerson's Bar and Grill

Great art may be born of personal pain, but most of the time, it needs to be aesthetically transmogrified — stepped back from and reworked just enough to make it resonate with the audience. Most of the time. But every now and then, someone sings their way out of the warehouse into the history books without changing much of anything. Billie Holiday may have had a smallish voice and a smallish range, but she squeezed a huge amount of feeling out of both, and she was a hell of a lyricist to boot. She may have written “God Bless the Child” with Arthur Herzog, Jr., but it was her experience: an argument with her mother about money. And so: “Mama may have, papa may have, but God bless the child that’s got his own. Them that’s got shall get, them that’s not shall lose, so the bible said and it still is news.” It surely helped (her art, anyway) that love done her wrong, that her “first love/worst love” Jimmy Monroe was not only an addict, but an addict who wanted a companion on the journey down. All this is to help explain why Lanie Robertson’s play, which lets Karole Foreman spill out Holiday’s story in between the songs of a late-career set

in Philadelphia, works better than some other jukebox musicals. It all feels so close to the bone, even when she’s singing other people’s material — even when it’s something as seemingly lighthearted as “What a Little Moonlight Can Do.” She sings it early on, and it’s delightful and optimistic, like “the new Billie” herself. But after a night of drinking, reminiscing, and eventually dancing with her old devil, she slurs her way back to it, and it becomes tragic. What a little moonlight can do to you, indeed. American Fiction — Director Cord Jefferson’s adaptation of writer Percival Everett’s novel Erasure is not so much a comedy as it is an elaborate joke on the viewer. The marketing, which must be considered here, makes the film look like a savage satire of the publishing industry: the story of a frustrated upper-middle-class Black writer who cranks out a pseudonymous thug life novel as a gag, only to see the industry ignore the joke and embrace it in earnest. Oh ho ho! The poor boobies can’t even bring themselves to object when he insists on titling it *Fuck* — and who could blame them? Do you want to be

the white person who tells the Black person that he’s not allowed to keep it real? How delicious. But in truth, all that is a subplot, and a carelessly handled one at that; the real story is something much more conventional, much more delicate, and much more emotionally engaging: a mid-life crisis movie about a man dealing with the potent legacy of his dead father, the sad reality of his fading mother, and the affecting complexity of his sibling relationships. All set about as far from the hood as you could imagine — the love interest lives just across from his family’s beach house. It’s a sign of star Jeffrey Wright’s presence and talent that he’s able to keep the viewer from noticing the bait-and-switch until the ending, which is likely to feel like a bad Player rip-off to fans of the satire, an emotional middle-finger to fans of the family drama, and maybe, just maybe, a clever tell to those in on the joke. *What did you come here looking for, people?* (2023) — M.L. ★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Freud’s Last Session — A note at the end informs us that near the end of his life — and near the onset of World War II — pioneering psychoanalyst Sigmund Freud was visited by a young Oxford don in his London home. Well, home away from home: he still pines for his beloved Austria,

but it’s not so good there for Jews at the moment — even, perhaps especially, famous Jews, and especially especially Jews who are famous for rejecting religion and other traditional bases for morality. But back to the matter at hand: what Matthew Brown’s adaptation of Mark St. Germain’s play (which is based on Armand Nicholi’s book *The Question of God*) supposes is that the young don was none other than C.S. Lewis, a fairly recent convert to Christianity who lampooned Freud in his update on John Bunyan’s *The Pilgrim’s Progress*. Narnia is still a long way off, but the book’s allegorical character hints at Lewis’ sympathy toward myth, which puts him on common ground with Freud, while his Christian perspective sets him in testy opposition to the cancer-ridden, morphine-sipping, emotionally tyrannical atheist. And yet, despite his frailty and failings, Freud largely gets the better of their various sparring matches, mostly because he seems like more of a person, and has stories to go along with his ideas. (His embittered “Great plan, God,” after recounting the death of his wife and child elicits only silence from Lewis, which seems right.) Brown does what he can to keep things from feeling like a filmed play, but he can’t do much, and what he does do — flashbacks, dream sequences, a war scene, and

a trip to an air raid shelter — isn’t always helpful. Anthony Hopkins enjoys himself as the old man, while Matthew Goode seems a bit tentative for a zealous convert. (2024) — M.L. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Mean Girls — If the original *Mean Girls* was a gentled version of *Heathers* — and yeah, that’s probably unfair, since films should be allowed to stand or fall on their own merits, but for viewers of a certain age, the similarities were simply too salient to ignore, what with the plucky outsider sidling up to but ultimately taking down the trio of gorgeous Gorgons who run things around this here high school — then *Mean Girls 2024* is a similarly gentled version of the 2004 original. High school can be a desperate time; no one here feels desperate. The girls just aren’t as mean. The social hierarchies just aren’t as brutal. The betrayals and losses just aren’t as devastating — and it’s not just because we may have seen them before. It *may* be because the world has gotten meaner in the meantime. Social media has made the notion of a secret “Burn Book” full of nasty comments about one’s adolescent peers positively quaint; today, you could just make an anon account and broadcast your bile to all and sundry — to the point where maybe you’d get back to the suicidal darkness of *Heathers*! But no, the book is still here, still somehow wreaking havoc even as it has lost the power to accuse someone of, gasp, homosexuality. Here, outcast Janis is out and proud; her animus toward the popular Plastics has to do with a failure of allyship — which is rather less potent as motivations go. In place of the poison, this version has songs, which is probably what you’re here for, since they provide the “new twist” promised on the poster. Some of them are great fun and actually help move the story along — the wildly energetic “Revenge Party” is a positive delight. Others work like anthemic music videos — Regina George’s spooky/sinister “Someone Gets Hurt,” Janis’s poptimist “I’d Rather Be Me.” But a number of them “Meet the Plastics,” “What’s Wrong With Me?” etc. — do little more than raise subtext to text, and the performances aren’t always rendered with enough feeling to make them feel worthwhile. Never thought I’d be able to say that about a teen musical. (How’s *that* for mean?) — M.L. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

A band without a bass, mostly: Unnatural Numbers


Translating the drummer vernacular

Clayton Payne and Ryan Fischer met when they were both serving as drummers for The Liquorsmiths, a folk-rock trio led by singer/guitarist Drew Thams. After that band's run came to an end, the duo continued to play together. "During the pandemic, when people were starting to create bubbles, Ryan and I loved double-drumming," says Payne. "By day, I'm a school teacher, and my classroom was empty and void of furniture. So, while I was teaching on Zoom, I would bring my drum kit, and then Ryan would come down and we would just jam into the night on drums."

The two began to consider allowing another player to enter the fold. Payne felt that Dennis Sheridan, a singer/guitarist who had played in Blue Goat War and Follow That Train, would be a good fit. "I had met Dennis a good while ago," Payne says. "Both of our children went to the same school. His own material is awesome, and one time I was fortunate enough that he had asked me to record some drums for a solo thing he was doing. So when Ryan and I got going, I was hoping Dennis was gonna say yes, because I really couldn't think of anybody else that I wanted to make music with."

Sheridan did say yes, and Unnatural Numbers was born

at the tail end of 2020. Sheridan was immediately thrust into an unusual setup that required him to think fast as a musician, especially since the band had no bassist. "A lot of times in groups, it's the bass player whose role is to act as translator," Payne explains. "How do I translate the drum language to the

guitar player and the guitar language to what the drummer is doing? With two drummers, poor Dennis. Us chatting away behind him doing God knows what, making our own little jokes and references and inverting beats and doing things that are well within the vernacular of a drummer, but which can be terrifying to lesser musicians."

Sheridan says he embraced the challenge, even though it did generate ample anxiety in him. "The thing that I love the most about the band is actually the thing that stresses me the most about it," he says. "There's an element of adventure to our music. With the stuff we recorded, we dialed it in enough

that we knew what we were gonna do and what to expect from the music. But there is still a lot of unexpected stuff. What I love is that there is a little bit of excitement about it. It can also be a source of stress, but I like that the music is not always the same. It's always moving in a direction towards a vibe that we contribute to together."

Added to the mix are the facts that Fischer often plays organ on a rig he has set up with his kit, and that Sheridan makes ample use of a looper pedal to fill out the band's sound. "The looping is great for me because I really love the bass," Sheridan says. "We sort of compromised. I got a baritone guitar, which gives me something in-between. I can loop the basslines on the baritone and then solo and do some really fun explorations, especially in the live show. It's also very stressful. It's like playing one of those old platform games where you only get so many lives. You get really far and then if you die, the game is

just over. You are just trying not to die." The band has recorded an EP and is planning on releasing it this year. A full-length may or may not be in its future as well. "The one good thing about the current music release environment is that you don't have to put everything out all at once," Fischer says. "We are going to try to take advantage of that and do two to three songs at a time when

they are worked up to where we want them. If that ends up being an album's worth at some point and we cut a vinyl, that would be really cool. But I don't think there is that same pressure to save up all your best material to put out 45 minutes of music at once." Besides that, it's just more shows as they come along. "We're open to playing as often as people want us, but we don't feel the need to go hustle for gigs. We have been there, done that."



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THE GONZO REPORT

Bringing it home to the heart

Oscillating from somber to elated at The Music Box

"I can't even begin to understand what you're going through," says a woman, comforting her friend as we wait in line at Little Italy's Music Box. It's the first emotional moment in a night of full of them here at a fundraising event for violinist Jamie Shadowlight, who is battling stage 4 cervical cancer. My assignment now includes adding a video component to augment the printed story, and it seems simple enough, but I feel ghoulish asking a distraught woman if she could say a few words. She declines, but her consoling companion Elizabeth Vaughan — whose husband Greg is playing with Shamini Jain tonight — agrees when I tell her it's all about Jamie. She says that what I'm looking for are clips of people who support her saying so and sharing their love.

Her statement hits me in the feels; I will oscillate from somber to elated throughout the night. One moment of elation comes when I fanboy — yes, it's a verb — over bassist Jack

Wagner, who is *also* part of Jain's band. We discuss bass for a moment, and I say something nerdy about wanting to play like him when I grow up before he politely excuses himself.

Inside the venue, the conversations are testimonials to the love and respect that Shadowlight inspires. Peppered among the tributes and reminiscences is speculation about her possible appearance tonight. Though Shadowlight does not materialize in physical form, a painting up for silent auction captures her ethereal presence. Entitled *Sunset Music*, artist Irina Negulescu's color and pose choice are not so much a tribute as an embodiment.

When the woman at the merch booth asks me if I want to talk with Runaways songwriter Roni Lee, who is on the bill tonight, I probably reply, "Fuck yeah I wanna talk to Roni Lee." I won't confirm or deny that, because I'm a professional, but that doesn't stop me from getting a selfie with Lee after the interview, or from adding a Lee T-shirt to my collection. Jules Whelpton is providing the low end for Lee tonight, and we get a chance to chat about upcoming shows and do a video interview. Known as "that blonde bassist," Whelpton is a multi-instrumentalist who teaches violin; she says one of her inspirations is Shadowlight (for whom a GoFundMe campaign has been launched to help cover medical bills).

Onstage, Monette Marino leads her band in genre-defying music — elements of funk and jazz processed through a world lens. It gets the audience and the bartenders dancing, though they stop the second I try to take a video of them. The music is infectious, and I later tell

her the band's bass player is one of those musicians that make me feel like I am a total beginner. She laughs and tells me they didn't even play the song where he matches the horns in a call and response, and I make a mental note to attend her next show. Shamini Jain follows, and delivers a hard rock set that concludes with a cover of Iron Maiden's "Wasted Years." A Maiden cover makes sense, as Jain once fronted tribute band Up the Irons. But the song selection seems more emotionally charged tonight. Maybe it's the moment, the purpose for gathering, that does it. More likely, it's because of Jain's intention to heal and comfort through music. It's not lip service; it's a way of life for a woman who got her PhD in Clinical Psychology and Psychoneuroimmunology from the San Diego State University/UC San Diego Joint Doctoral Program in Clinical Psychology.

Out on the smoking patio, a woman named Mercedes Carvajal compliments my Porcupine Tree shirt. As we talk about all things metal, current and former bands come up. Turns out she's the singer for Door 13, a San Diego metal band that I add to my ever-growing list of shows to check out. As we both head in to catch the end of Lee's set, Roni spots Carvajal and tells her to get her ass up on stage during an encore of "Chain of Fools" that morphs seamlessly into "Papa Was a Rolling Stone" and back, with all the singers from tonight's bands trading vocals, and all the musicians intuitively joining in and trading leads. Without warming up, Carvajal delivers some soul-melting singing.

Throughout the night, there have been chants of "Jamie" and declarations of love and

support. But it's this display — this performance that is both professional and organic, born from an undeniable bond and connection through music that transcends words and transforms them into action and power — that brings it home to the heart. ■

IMMORTAL BEAUTY

A few flowers amid the weeds

It is impossible to comprehend the number of classical music compositions that exist. Do we even know ten percent of them? Here's a fair question: of Mozart's 626 compositions, do we know 62 of them?

We might reply that we know his 41 symphonies, but do we? Or have we heard about 41 symphonies written by Mozart, but we only really know the 29th, 35th, 40th, and 41st? By the way, that's about ten percent.

Mozart wrote 22 operas. How many do we know? About four. Maybe eight if you're really into Mozart operas. Giuseppe Verdi wrote 28 operas. How many can we name? Joseph Haydn wrote seven operas. Can we name even one? Beethoven wrote 32 piano sonatas. Let's see, there's "Moonlight," "Pathétique," "Waldstein,"

"Hammerklavier," and—that's it. Beethoven wrote over 90 songs. Well, there's "Ade-laide" and — that's it.


The point of all this is that we can benefit from getting into the classical weeds a little bit, because there's great music just lying there if we're able to do a little gardening. And sometimes, the gardening is done for us.

For instance, I recently came across an RCA Living Stereo album on YouTube that presents three peripheral yet excellent pieces of music. The performances are by Fritz Reiner and the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. The three pieces of music are Alan Hovhaness' *Symphony No. 2: Mysterious Mountain*, Sergei Prokofiev's *Lieutenant Kije Suite*, and Igor Stravinsky's *The Fairy's Kiss*.

Hovhaness composed his second symphony on a

commission from Leopold Stokowski and the Houston Symphony. As the piece starts, you might be tempted to call Hovhaness derivative, since it sounds very much like Ralph Vaughan Williams' *Fantasia on a Theme by Thomas Tallis*. However, Hovhaness moves the music along and it finds its own footing. I must say that I'm surprised to have never heard this in a live performance. Of course, if it were performed more, it wouldn't be in the weeds.

Prokofiev's *Lieutenant Kije Suite* is the best-known of the three pieces here. This suite, based on a Lieutenant who doesn't exist in the Soviet Army is one of the most fun pieces of music ever written. The troika music is especially whimsical. (Ugh, I hate that word.) Once upon a time, I whizzed around

San Diego County playing *Lieutenant Kije* on repeat in my self-styled troika—a 1981 Honda Civic with a four-speed manual transmission. A three-speed would have been more appropriate.

The Fairy's Kiss by Stravinsky surprised me because it

doesn't have that Stravinsky edge, but is, instead, quite lyrical and at times gorgeous. I'm not a Stravinsky expert. I know the big pieces, and therefore this music surprised me with its beauty. Perhaps I should get the weed whacker out more often.



Ooodles of noodles

Ooodles brings The Nood Bar's noodle fetish east

Ooodles By The Nood Bar, 7436 University Ave., La Mesa. What's your favorite type of noodle? If you're not sure, here's where you can go to find out: La Mesa, home to the newly opened Ooodles By The Nood Bar. The name "The Nood Bar" will ring a bell for those who live, work, or carouse around North Park: the pan-Asian noodle counter opened in 2018, nestled into a small, 30th Street store-

front with a menu of build-your-own noodle dishes, incorporating recipes and techniques hailing from Thailand, China, Japan, Indonesia, and more.

Diners can expect more of the same at Ooodles — in fact, I've spotted few major differences between the two menus. The biggest differences

between the two restaurants offering those menus have to do with size and atmosphere. Whereas The Nood Bar leans into its casual nature — Bruce Lee imagery, high-top seating, and bumblebee yellow accents — Ooodles offers a more grown-up vibe. Its slightly larger space finds color in murals of larger-than-life pink and red flowers

contrasting green bench seating, dark woods, and hints of brass.

Oh — it also offers table in addition to counter service. Waiting for my food, I wonder how many Nood Bar customers may now be reunited with the dining concept after moving to the suburbs over the past five years. I suppose I could count myself in that category. But while I used to grab food at Nood Bar after 9pm, Ooodles fits more easily into traditional dining hours.

When I visit, I'm pleased to find much of the food as I remember it: loaded with tender variations of pork, and a bevy of bok choy. Of course, you may still build your own noodle dish, selecting from proteins that also include beef,

chicken, tofu, and shrimp, adding to a base of pad Thai, drunken noodles, *pad see ew*, *rad nah*, or yakisoba. Even that short list of \$14 dishes highlights an assortment of noodles: flat rice, thin rice, and soba. I order the *gochujang udon* stir fry, which combines thick Japanese udon noodles, carrots, and cabbage with South Korea's signature chili paste. The resulting shiny orange stir-fry tastes better than my photo of it suggests.

It's not strictly noodle dishes at Ooodles (or Nood Bar for that matter). Customers may also choose from among an assortment of rice and fried rice dishes, grilled meat plates, soups, and curries. For example, it's tough for my wife to stay away from the so-called Sumo Rice (\$16): it's a Japanese-influenced dish of braised pork belly with hard boiled egg and (like virtually every other dish) bok choy.

But this concept is at its best when you stick to Chef's Selection noodles. It's on this part of the menu that you'll find tried and true favorites including the Indonesia-inspired *Mi Goreng*, which features stir-fried soba with Chinese sausage, chicken and shrimp (\$17); Chinese style *Dan Dan* noodles, with ramen noodles, *char siu*, and ground pork (\$16); and Malaysian-style *laksa* curry noodle soup, with thin rice noodles in coconut curry broth with fried tofu, chicken, and shrimp (\$17). The origins of a dish like the butter garlic noodle (\$17) are tougher to pinpoint, but with slices of grilled lemongrass pork shoulder over steamed soba noodles, it remains a winner.

Still, for my first Ooodles visit, I have to highlight the \$17 *Bamee Pok Pok*, a variation of Nood Bar's *Bamee Hang*. Both are inspired by Thai street food, wherein the word *haeng* refers to dry noodles, and *pok pok* refers to the little

street cart that sells them. Both feature steamed *bamee* (thin egg noodles) and roasted *char siu* pork, but whereas the Nood Bar version adds crushed peanuts and ground pork, Ooodles' *Pok Pok* dish instead features chicken wontons and crispy pork belly.

That makes a clear winner between the two, and makes the *Pok Pok* an altogether new noodle favorite. All things being equal, I still prefer the actual udon, then soba noodles, to *bamee*. But more than anything, I like the idea that it need only take a couple visits to Ooodles to figure that out.

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Drinks All Around

George's at the Cove

It's a fine day for sipping cocktails cliffside in La Jolla. (But then, most days are.) Mike Grave, General Manager for George's at the Cove, slides me a new concoction called the Curioso. "The recipe was actually put together by one of my bartenders, Mitchell Lynes," says Grave. "I asked him to come up with a fun tiki-inspired drink

with mezcal. It's a subtle play off of Curious George, with the banana liqueur in there."

What's unique about it is the layering. "I think it's a super interesting combination of flavors that work really well together," continues Grave. "It changes subtly every time you take a sip, and you're getting different flavor notes. And it's kind of 'curious' how the different flavors work to complement each other."

The aim was more for fruity than in-your-face. "Definitely, you're going to taste that presence of mezcal, but we really lighten it up with the tropical flavors of banana and pineapple as the primary flavor points," says Grave. "And the other ingredients are more like the spices, between the coffee liqueur and the falernum. And even the lime juice is gonna help balance that cocktail out, because everything else is sweet."

Grave does think you should be able to sip a mezcal neat before putting it in a cocktail. "I love mezcal, but it has a dominant character, so we're using a product that still has some of that character that shines through." He praises a small batch mezcal by the name of Cathedral. "It was

founded by a father-daughter duo from San Francisco, and they've won a few different awards over the last year. I think Cathedral does a nice balance of, certainly a smoky presence to the spirit, but also a little sweetness. And some good minerality, too."

The restaurant's signature "super juice" adds acidity. "We have this technique of using water and citric acid to extract flavor from the peels, and we add freshly squeezed juice before straining to create the finished product. You end up with a shelf-stable product... and your yield is a lot more because you're using the whole fruit, so there's less waste."

The recipe also calls for Velvet Falernum, a Caribbean liqueur with "notes of clove, cinnamon and allspice. It doesn't taste like anything else you've had." Plus, Mr Black's coffee liqueur, which has "a nice richness to it, a little bit of sweetness...some caramel, almost burnt sugar flavor to it as well."

As he talks, I start to count the number of liqueurs listed. "It's probably a little more boozy than it tastes, pretty typical of tiki drinks," he allows. "It drinks very punchy and fruity and juice-like. And then you're wondering why you're stumbling."

- 1 oz Cathedral Mezcal
- 0.75 oz Velvet Falernum
- 0.5 oz banana liqueur
- 0.25 oz Mr. Black coffee liqueur
- 1 oz pineapple juice
- 0.5 oz lime juice

Combine all ingredients in a tin with ice and shake vigorously. Strain and pour over fresh ice. Garnish with several sprigs of mint.

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The cows are on the chew down south – Baja trips and tips

Dock Totals 1/21 – 1/27: 286 anglers aboard 15 half-day to 3-day trips out of San Diego landings over the past week caught 1 cabezon, 13 calico bass, 1 lingcod, 18 lobster (46 released), 12 perch, 67 rock crab, 300 rockfish, 177 sand bass, 40 sanddab, 171 sculpin, 8 sheephead, and 403 whitefish.

Saltwater: With much of the local fleet in dry dock or in maintenance mode, rough conditions with passing fronts, and rockfish closed, ½-day to 3-day trips were limited to just over a dozen total runs for the week. Most of that was focused on the great local bass fishing, plus a couple trips south of the border for rockfish. Whitefish are also biting very well, as are sculpin for those on the short runs. Lobster hoop-netting trips have had some success, with a good ratio of keepers to shorts, and a good number of rock crab are also coming up in the hoops. It seems the “bugs” are more active when there is rain runoff creating stirred up conditions in which they can forage, as the numbers and ratio seem to improve after every storm. There’s plenty of good table fare to be caught locally, but the best fishing this time of year is, as usual, enjoyed by those on long-range trips to the southern stretches of the Baja Peninsula.

Trips running from 8 days to 16 days have been reporting great wahoo action off the Ridge outside of Bahia Magdalena, while yellowfin tuna, especially at Hurricane Bank, have been coming in larger over the past couple weeks. Recent runs by the *Excel*, *Royal Polaris*, the *Intrepid*, and the *Red Rooster III* have been getting a good number of fish well over 100 pounds, with a few pushing the 300-pound mark. These trips can be pricey, but it takes four full days of running — 96 hours — just to get into the zone. The longer trips often offer fly-down service, where one can fly down to Cabo or La Paz, catch a shuttle to Bahia Magdalena, and hop on the boat. This way, anglers can avoid the long boat ride. Just go to the landing before departure and load your gear, then fly down three days later and meet the boat for 10 full days of fishing during a 16-day trip. These trips can run upward of \$7000 (plus airfare if one chooses the fly-down option), but generally sell out.

Alternative trips, like the four-day “Riviera Package” offered by *Red Rooster III* in February, can be a more affordable option at around \$2000, but they are more centered on whale watching and inshore fishing. On those trips, patrons will fly down to La Paz, where *Red Rooster* staff will have a shuttle waiting to run the two hours to Puerto Chale. There, a short *panga* ride will get folks to the boat. Activities include two days of whale watching in the calving lagoon, a hiking day on Isla Magdalena, and a day for other recreational activities, like fishing with a local *pangero* (at an additional cost). With staterooms and top-notch cuisine, these trips can be a great adventure for couples or families.

This time of year, most long-range trips are just that, a full 16 days from departure to return. By May, the schedules will be reduced to 1.5-day to 6-day outings, mostly, as the water warms and pelagic fishing improves closer to home port — especially, as has been

the case in recent years, if teh bluefin bite picks up. We San Diegans are very fortunate to have the fishery we do just off our coast, especially with the option of running south along the Baja Peninsula into a fishery dubbed one of the best, if not the best. in the world.

Whether you’re hopping on a sportboat running out of one of the landings, trailering your own boat or kayak, driving down and hiring a local boat, or just pounding the beaches and rocks from shore, the fishing possibilities and varying species from San Diego to Cabo San Lucas in either the Pacific or Sea of Cortes are prolific, and offer year-round action on everything from rockfish and bass to dorado, wahoo, tuna, and marlin. Deciding where to fish, when, and what for can be tough given so many choices, but in general, the further south you go in winter, the better. Even so, there are many micro-biospheres along the coast that defy “normal” seasons, such as the yellowtail fishery along the Vizcaino coast halfway down the peninsula’s Pacific coast, where water temps tend to run cool until late July or August, then stay warm into March. That fishery offers an alternative to the yellowtail fishing, say, off Loreto in the winter that is often hampered by seasonal north winds. When it’s blowing out of the north on the Sea of Cortes, it is usually calm along the Pacific side.

Planning a trip into Baja should always include options given the conditions, as it is hard to guess what the weather will be until within a week or so. Legalities, like a Forma Migration Multiple (FMM), fishing license, car insurance, and such are affordable. Some folks will say they aren’t needed, as they have never been asked...but it is always better to have one’s ducks in a row concerning paperwork in a foreign country. I, too, have never been asked for my FMM or fishing license in decades of travel into Baja, and have never had to call my insurance carrier, but as the license and FMM, together, are under \$100 and Mexican car insurance is very affordable compared to the U.S., there is little excuse to forego the legal requirements.

There does seem to be a lot of confusion on the Baja social media sites about those requirements. Some rules have changed, and Baja can be different than mainland requirements. A brief outline: first, you need an FMM, all ages for any length of trip. FMMs are good for up to 180 days, and for trips of 7 days or less, the document is free. To obtain an FMM, an adult needs to have a passport book or card. Youths under 18 can often get them with a birth certificate if with their parents. Fishing licenses are required for all on a boat when anyone on that boat is fishing, all ages.

A fishing license is required for anyone fishing from any boat or kayak, even float tubes. A license is *not* required for fishing from shore in Mexico. Car insurance is simply a good idea, whether required or not, especially for liability purposes. Though getting one’s paperwork in order is not difficult, if you have any doubts, it is best to go with a Baja-specific travel club that offers convenient one-stop shopping, like Discover Baja or Baja Bound, to make sure all requirements are met. They’re out there, so go get ‘em!



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
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
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Creme de la Weird

Will's manager put spin on the situation: "Society has shifted, and in turn so have modern relationship dynamics. The essence lies in redefining relationships personally, breaking away from the one-size-fits-all approach and societal pressure to conform."

Least Competent Criminal

— Justin Carpenter, 25, really wanted some fried pickles from Buffalo Wild Wings in Lawrence, Indiana, on Jan. 14, but he arrived after closing time, *The Smoking Gun* reported. Thinking fast on his feet in spite of his ankle bracelet from a previous drug arrest, Carpenter offered a barter exchange: marijuana, cocaine, ecstasy and vape cartridges for the savory treats. "If you make us some fried pickles, I'll make it worth it," he allegedly told workers, two of whom were minors. He didn't get his pickles, but left three bags of marijuana on the counter, saying, "Give those bags to the kids." Truth Is Stranger Than Netflix

— Graduate research assistant Jeremy Smalling, 45, faces charges of operating a meth lab at Southern Illinois University Edwardsville, KTVI-TV reported on Jan. 24. In November, a professor noticed something suspicious in the campus chemistry lab and alerted authorities, setting off an investigation that uncovered hundreds of attempts to buy pseudoephedrine over the last 10 years, 45 of which were blocked. The store's description of the item, sold only online, declares, "Reclaim your FREEDOM from the tyrannical English king" and highlights the leather sheath that you can attach to your belt. Strangely, you can also find a sword online at *Walmart.com* and *Academy Sports and Outdoors*. While Home Depot says the sword is for decorative use, one reviewer notes that "just a few passes with a whetstone" can sharpen the stainless-steel blade right up. Charge!

Nope

— At an escape room experience in Barcelona, Spain, participants are given 30 minutes to free themselves from a closed coffin, Reuters reported. The puzzle, called Catalepsy (in reference to a medical condition that can be mistaken for death), requires gamers to collaborate with a partner in a neighboring casket to solve puzzles. Game master Aurora Alvarino, who monitors the action via CCTV, calls the experience "a gym for the mind." Players can customize their escapes, including choosing the type of casket and whether or not they want to be "cremated" in a blaze of virtual fire and artificial smoke. All for the low, low price of 44 euros for two people.

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
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
