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

Evacuation, eviction, emergency Who pays when tenants have to leave a ruined building?

Following the storm on January 22 that dropped more rain than National City sees in an average wet month, the city declared a state of emergency. "Some were calling it a The attorney argued that the health and safety code states that the owner *isn't* liable for the benefits if the local enforcement agency declares a building unsafe due to a hazardous event, such as flooding. Rather, the *city*, at its discretion, "may decide to issue such relocation benefits to tenants directly."

However, the owner has agreed to work with the city and tenants to pay relocation costs, which they say will be over \$100,000. They have also been providing hotel rooms for tenants since January 22, which has cost approximately \$30,000. Real estate websites show the apartment was built in 1991 and last sold for \$12,150,000 in August 2022.

According to Risk Factor, a hazards assessment tool, National City is considered to have a minor risk of flooding over the next 30 years. The tool places 599 out of 7456 homes at risk.

After Governor Gavin Newsom pro-

storm event that could not possibly re-occur in a thousand years," said city manager Ben Martinez. On Highland Avenue, water and mud surged into apartments, forcing tenants out of their homes and into hotels.

Two days later, city inspectors deemed the gated building at 31-131 North Highland Avenue uninhabitable, issuing the owner an order to vacate and repair or demolish it. What happened next is unclear. Tenants say they were evicted by the landlord. The owner points to the city. "There seems to be confusion that Highland View apartments are forcing people from the Building. This is not accurate," reads a letter to the city from the owner's attorney.

But clearly, the tenants couldn't stay. The city's notice to the owner claimed that the violations were so extensive that their immediate health and safety was "substantially endangered." Residents were to be immediately relocated — "and you are required to pay relocation benefits." claimed a state of emergency in San Diego County due to the historic rainfall, Martinez said the city made the decision to declare a local emergency. A special city council meeting was called to ratify that decision, which would enable the city to apply for county, state, and federal funds to assist tenants and landlords.

Residents had only thirty seconds each to speak at the special meeting, but Mayor Ron Morrison said they could bring up any issues related to the rainstorms at the following Tuesday's council meeting, which would be focused entirely on the emergency. That meeting was slated to include Councilmember Jose Rodriguez's suggestion to discuss an eviction moratorium and the cessation of rent increases. "Many residents are facing evictions," said Rodriguez. "Some have rent increases coming up in February at a time when they've lost everything."

Blind mule bound at border Date leads to detention for unwitting smuggler

On the night of November 17, San Diegan Esmeralda Rocha (not her real name) set out to cross the border back to her home from Tijuana, just as she did every weekend. But while she was in the Sentri lane at San Ysidro's International Port of Entry, she was told to get out of her car by a U.S. border agent. When she did, she was handcuffed, taken into custody, and left to wait in a room until two agents showed up and read the alarmed woman her rights. The

Revolucion and 3rd Street parking lot. She explained to the agents that during the event, he was using his cell phone constantly, and that he even came up with a random story about needing to meet his cousin all of a sudden. Once they were back in the car, he insisted on going with her to Plaza Pueblo Amigo, the last exit right before the border, where he would hop out to meet his cousin. Minutes later, she was in the custody of the border patrol.

"I showed them the chat on my cellphone and his pictures," says Esmerelda. "They told me I would not be the last person that this happened to, and that they have an eye

agents showed her photos of the two people who were found hidden in her car's trunk, and told her she could face federal charges.

Esmeralda decided not to wait for a lawyer, but to answer all the agents' questions. She told them she had no idea about people in her trunk, but admitted that some unusual things had happened earlier that day during her visit to Tijuana. One of the people she had seen was a man she had met on Instagram, gotten to know by chatting on WhatsApp, and then met for a date. "That day," she recalls, "he actually asked me more than once if I took my car with me to Tijuana, and asked me where I parked. I told him I didn't want to drive any longer, so he told me he could drive my car and take us to a restaurant called El Muchacho Alegre in Zona Rio. He would pay for it all, and even put gas in the tank. So I gave him my keys. I guess that was a big mistake".

After dinner, Esmeralda had a performance she wanted to attend, so they went together and parked in the Avenida on him already. But since he's in Mexico, there is nothing they can do. They told me I was used as a blind mule. Because I have a clean record and a good job, and family, it was obvious that it was not worth it for me to take the risk of losing what I have."

But while Esmeralda wasn't charged, she still had to pay \$1200 for the tow fee. Her car was searched for any tracking devices or drugs. She decided to sell the car, but because the vehicle plates were linked to the episode, she lost about \$2000. But the worst part of it is that the arrest is on her record, and she lost her Sentri card. "I don't go to Tijuana now as often as before for sure; without my Sentri I wait in line for about three hours. I used to cross in 20 minutes with it. Plus, every time I cross, they search my car. And the Customs agents told me if I report it to Tijuana's police or try to find the man, it could be dangerous for me, because sometimes, they are working together."

According to the El Cajon Police Department, at about 6 pm on January 23, a woman entered the Walmart in the Parkway Plaza

Officers "quickly arrived and detained the women, and found their vehicle loaded with stolen merchandise," continues the








Six-figure loophole? Republican County Supervisor Joel Anderson is running for reelection this year. He's also campaigning for a seat on the Republican County Central Committee. Anderson is raising big money for the latter effort using a loophole in county campaign fundraising law, allowing him to take in \$341,928 last year for the Central Committee campaign from an assortment of special interests, per a January 27 disclosure filing. The filing reports that \$15,000 came from the Labor-

ers Pacific Southwest Regional Organizing Coalition PAC of Sacramento on September 26. The So Cal District Council of Laborers PAC of Long Beach gave he same November 6. Two \$10,000 donors were the Associated Builders & Contractors PAC on July 10 and the Deputy Sheriffs Association of San Diego County PAC on September 26. Laura Nelson of Cass Construction kicked in \$4000 on July 24. But the biggest sin-



Last May 13, Feder, an ardent foe of rent control, was limited to giving Anderson's supervisor re-election committee the legal maximum of \$2000, \$1000 each for the primary and general elections. "Rent control is a major threat, not just from the property own-

Meanwhile, San Diego Mayor Todd Gloria, widely regarded as an odds-on favorite for re-election this year, is also campaigning for a seat on the Democratic Central Committee. His political consultant in that effort, Jennifer Tierney's Gemini Group of Williamsburg, Virginia, was owed \$2000 at the close of the most recent reporting period at the end of last year, per a January 25 disclosure. "When she isn't working in California," says Gemini's website,

"Jen stays busy in Virginia, where she is chair of Historic Triangle Democrats, a four-locality local Democratic Committee and a member of the Virginia Democratic Party Central Committee for the 1st Congressional District. She is also vice chair for the Eastern Region of the Virginia Association of Democratic Chairs." Gloria's fundraiser Corey Polant was paid \$1800 during the period. The mayor's central committee campaign ended the year with \$23,926.

Political journalism

With the San Diego Union-Tribune, owned by vulture investing outfit Alden Global Capital, already suffering from chronic downsizing, yet another local reporting operation also could be about to take a hit. Back in August, the non-profit iNewsource announced it was using money from the freshly established California Local News accommodates cash Fellowship program to hire Philip Salata as its environ-



ment and energy reporter. "Made possible through \$25 million in state funding and a new state law, the fellowship, run by UC Berkeley Journalism, will provide two-year reporting fellowships to 120 early career journalists over the next five years," said iNewsource. "The fellows will be placed in newsrooms across California." But now a new report by the San Francisco Chronicle says the program may soon fall victim to a looming state deficit, prompting another round of devastating newsroom layoffs. "Prior to publication, California Department of Finance spokesperson H.D. Palmer confirmed that the funding could be part of \$350 million in proposed cuts to 'legislative requests' that

had not yet been specified by [Governor Gavin] Newsom," says the January 23 account "After publication, Palmer contacted the Chronicle saying that he had checked with staff in the department who said the governor was not explicitly calling for the funding to be cut. Budget negotiations are ongoing, and the projected deficit - and, by extension, the proposed cuts - could shrink or grow between now and June

when the final budget is due." In the meantime, reporters and other staffers at the New York Daily News became the latest Alden employees to walk out for a day. "About 40 members of the Daily News union walked a picket line in the rain around a Midtown Manhattan office building where the News maintains a co-working space that can fit only six people, according to union leaders," reported Rupert Mudoch's New York Post January 25. "A Daily News reporter continued on page 32


Into the Multi-Worse New billboard on 94 West takes aim at diversity

"Sometimes, you have to follow where a project leads you," says Message Maker Chief Creative Officer Sam Bluesky. "When the people at Belonging Begins with Us came to us, they said they wanted to use the racially diverse cast of the hit film Spider-Man: Across the Spider-Verse to send kids a message about the value of diversity. Their simple, powerful idea was, 'We are stronger together.' Beautiful. We were happy to accept, and got right to work on design. But after a couple of days, our Head of Diego Continuity Don Downer came to us with a troublesome observation: the whole point of the film Across the Spider-Verse is that

these Spider-Men from different timelines *aren't* stronger together. They have to stay far apart — segregated into their own particular timelines, if you will — or else they risk destroying the very fabric of reality. What's more, the epic chase scene in which a thousand different Spider-Men — and Women! — try to catch one special Spider-Man named Miles Morales, and fail spectacularly at it, also seems to indicate that we aren't stronger together, not when 'we' can all be eluded by a single exceptional person. That got us thinking: *how valuable is diversity, really*? I mean, we'd like it to be true, but looking around the office at Message Maker, I see a lot of people who look pretty similar, and we're doing great. In the end, we had to change the billboard from a poptimist aspiration to a painful inquiry. But we think that's a good thing."

In 1965, the writer Tom Wolfe visited a beach in La Jolla, looking to shine a light on The Youth of Today. He found his subject in a bunch of Windansea locals, many of them surfers, who liked to hang out near the sewage pump house and cast aspersions on The Olds. And he immortalized them in his 1968 essay *The Pump House Gang*, spinning a story which, whatever its embellishments, also gave the world a glimpse of California surf culture as it was coming of age in the mid-'60s: a sport, but also a lifestyle, a cultural phenomenon. The community Wolfe portrayed was suspicious of authority and disdainful of outsiders — including the author himself, adults, tourists and anyone from east of I-5. The account provided a gritty counterpoint to the sunny, sanitized world of films like 1965's *Beach Blanket Bingo* and the cheerful harmonies of the Beach Boys' "Surfin' USA."

Wolfe is gone now, and so is the closed community he portrayed. Today, surfing in San Diego is for teenage girls and their mothers, middle-age guys, prosperous golfers, and the IT guy and the friends he surfs with after work. It's open to soft-toppers, boogie-boarders, foil boarders, kneeboarders, longboarders, and short-board surfers. It's open to *everyone*, which, depending on who you talk to, either marks the end of what was great about surfing to begin with or the beginning of a more inclusive and democratic era. As the 47-year-old longtime surf journalist and critic Charles "Chas" Smith puts it, "The doors are wide open. Anyone can go basically anywhere."

Today, all you have to do is check out a professional surfing contest to see how surfing marketers have pulled a nifty 180 on the gang at the pump house. The edginess and cool indifference and even the bikini contests are gone. The World Surf League's brand seems to be all about sustainability and paying homage to indigenous cultures, while the International Surf League's message is that the simple act of riding a wave can bridge divides and heal the world. Nice sentiments, just vastly different from how Smith and other surfers who came of age in the '80s and '90s felt and were perceived: as members of an exclusive club of mostly guys, engaged in an activity that most people would never understand or experience themselves. There used be an ad that ran in Surfer

Magazine: "Only a Surfer Knows the Feeling." Today, the promise is that everyone can know the feeling, as long as they spend a hundred bucks at Costco on a soft-top surfboard.

Smith isn't thrilled with the changes he's seen, and the co-creator of the satirical, sometimes serious Beach Grit blog and cohost of The Grit podcast isn't shy about saying so. For starters, he'd like the newer crop of surfers to not feel so damn com*fortable* from the get-go; a little trepidation at the outset isn't such a bad thing. "Going to a surf shop as a kid, I would always feel intimidated,"

he says. "You'd go inside and right away get vibed by the shop owner and the kids working the checkout desk, who looked right out of central casting." Smith views the experience as an important rite of passage, just like getting thrown over the falls for the first time. Today, he says, "Surf shops are rarer and rarer. You can go into a surf shop and they're just happy to have your business."

It's worse on the water, where there's less shaming of "kooks" — new, clueless surfers who don't realize they're clueless. They enter the water like they own the place. "All of the kook-jumping you once had to do to feel like, 'Okay, I got this,' has disappeared," Smith says. The sport has been sullied by an "anything goes" attitude in the water, where order and hierarchy have been replaced by chaos, anarchy, and selfishness. "If you just start something you shouldn't be expected to know all the rules right away," Smith concedes. What baffles him is the kooks' indifference; they don't seem to care about learning. Recently, he was out surfing "and the water was choked with kooks like it is now all the time." For a long moment, he just watched them flailing around on

their soft-tops, not taking it seriously. It was almost an epiphany for Smith: "Surfing was just an activity for them," he explains, right up there with playing racquetball or hitting the gym or playing golf. Nothing against having fun and keeping in shape, but the passion and commitment to surfing — to *being a surfer* — seemed to be missing.

If saying all this means coming across as a surfing elitist or purist, that's okay with him, because as he sees it, he's looking out for the larger surfing community. For Smith, the rise in blissfully unaware kooks is making surfing less enjoyable and less safe for the surfers who have paid their dues. "I don't know if it was a magic time or if it can ever be recreated, but I feel surfing needs it again. Surfing's not for everyone. It's for a select few."

But Jana Beresford, a 20-year-old SDSU student, isn't buying Smith's old-school ideas. "The surfing community is pretty open and inclusive now and it's heading in the right direction," she says, noting there are still "lingering stereotypes." Her father Jack Beresford, a kneeboarder and standup surfer who's been a Blacks local for over 40 years, is also accepting: "There's certainly more people surfing and many have different abilities, and that's not a bad thing. There's enough waves for everyone." Well, maybe. Whatever your opinion on kook-shaming, the fact is that they aren't making any more coast, and a more open surf culture means more people in the water. Overcrowding is a real concern, and everyone I interviewed for this story attributed it, at least in part, to the Covid cohort — or what Smith terms "the late adopters." (More cheekily, this particular brand of newbie is sometimes called a VAL — Vulnerable Adult Learner).

Bill Fitzmaurice, 69, who recently ended a five-year stint as president of the Windansea Surf Club, puts it this way: "During Covid, I think a lot of people, when they were kind of ordered to stay home and not go to work, said, 'You know what? I'm doing nothing. I've always wanted to try surfing." This new wave of surfers, one that included many middle-aged men, flocked to Windansea in

Rising pro Titus Santucci was recently selected as a member of the prestigious 2023-24 USA Surfing Junior National Team, along with 11 other surfers from across the country. Even as a nine-year-old "grom," or young surfer, Santucci understood the importance of etiquette, and of using good judgment. When the Encinitas surfer, now 18, started out, "There were breaks that I would surf and feel comfortable at, and there were breaks I wouldn't dare go near because I thought I wasn't good enough to surf there." Even if he had tried, he says, "The locals wouldn't have let me catch waves."

Smith says another part of the current trouble comes from the newbies' grabby attitude. "Like, 'Tm



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
out here, I'm gonna get every wave I can get.' What kind of world is this? If you took your one or two waves and did it properly, there's enough to go around," he says. Smith concedes that surfing "is an essentially selfish pursuit." But the difference now is that at most spots, surfing is unregulated by "a grumpy local," an enforcer who can keep rogue surfers in line.

As Fitzmaurice puts it, "You know, if you don't know what you're doing,



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www.triwestresearch.com patients@triwestresearch.com it makes the water more crowded. But since you are, let me suggest you find a different place to surf. You've got to be a solid surfer to be out here. You're gonna get hurt, or you're gonna hurt somebody else.""

Example: Smith enjoys surfing with his wife Circe and their daughter but worries about the kooks who can't control their boards. He describes a scenario where his daughter will be "on the inside, catching a little bowl. And there'll be people on big boards dropping in on her. They're not doing it necessarily on purpose. They're just so unaware that they don't see her coming down the line."

Jack Beresford, who's the director of public relations and communications for the San Diego Community College District, and also an 8-time kneeboard champion and a founder of Kneeboard Surfing USA, isn't anybody's grumpy enforcer. "You know, it's funny, I hear a lot of grumbling about crowds," he says, "but it's always been crowded. I mean, at least since the '80s. It's like anywhere else. You have busy days and light days." Even at a relatively remote spot like Blacks, "when it's on and people know it's on, it's a busy place." And people know when it's on, thanks to "the technology and information that people have at their disposal. I mean, we've got cameras, we've got surf forecasting. People know days in advance when it's going to be on. There's no real surprises anymore."

And if everybody knows when it's on, you can end up with a lot of bodies in the water — some would say too many bodies. In 1980, the Surf Punks released "My Wave." It was

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Even as a "grom," or young surfer, rising pro Titus Santucci understood the importance of etiquette, and of using good judgment. a parody, sort of: This is my wave baby/Don't cut me off/Dropping down left/Eat the rocks/Gonna break your face/Go back to the Valley/And don't come back. Most spots today, even Windansea, Swamis, and Sunset Cliffs, are nothing like that caricature. And yet, part of that unwritten code is that a given surfer on a given wave at a given time does own it, such that other surfers should stay off said wave and not interfere with their right of way. Bill Fitzmaurice is used to hearing the refrain, "It's not your ocean, it's everyone's." Well, yes and no. "Legally, yes," he says, "you have the right to be out in the water. The waves belong to everybody. This is the United States of America and you have the right to paddle out anywhere you want to. But do you have the right to paddle into a wave that somebody's already on?" No, not really.

Jack Beresford thinks that most often, wavedropping is just a mistake on the part of the clueless.

"It does happen that people are in the wrong place at the wrong time, but more frequently, they're gonna bend over backwards to apologize." But at a certain point, says Chas Smith, who views the Covid cohort of surfers as some of the most selfish he's seen, the cluelessness is cultivated. "Dropping in on someone else's wave is the entitlement of 'I don't care and nobody's gonna say anything about it, because nobody does anymore." And when someone finally does say

something, they're usually pretty upset. "Yelling matches definitely happen" at Encinitas' Seaside Reef and D Street, says Titus Santucci — even if they are pretty rare. And it's always because a newbie put a surfer in harm's way.

"I don't see arguments, conflicts, fights, things like that" at Blacks, says Beresford. "I can't remember the last time I saw a fight in the water. It has definitely changed since the '70s and '80s. I think it was a different attitude, a different vibe, back then," he says. "Thankfully, I think it's much better now." (Technology may deserve part of the credit here. As Fitzmaurice puts it, "It's not worth it to start a fight. You can snap a picture or take a video. You've got lifeguards watching. I mean, you can't even raise your voice without somebody starting to film or video it.")

But that's Blacks, one of the most challenging spots in San Diego, if not Southern California. Not exactly a newbie magnet. In August 2022, a highly publicized incident at Windansea put Surf Punks-style localism back in the headlines. As reported by CBS 8, "A surfer got into an ar-

gument with other surfers in the water, punches were thrown, and the one surfer claimed to be held underwater for 30 seconds." According to Fitzmaurice, who knows the kids who were involved and the lifeguards on the scene ("they saw the whole incident"), this story "got so blown out of proportion" and is not a case study on the dangers of extreme localism. Rather, it should serve as a warning about poor etiquette in general, and specifically, what not to do when you paddle out at Windansea. Fitzmaurice's version is

that "some kid from North County" came to Windansea and wanted to make it clear he was The Man, even though he was "just a decent surfer." He paddled out "right to the lineup and started taking off on waves, cutting a couple kids off, and started yelling at the locals," who Fitzmaurice describes as being between 14 and 18 years old. When one of the local kids paddled up to the cocky newcomer and said, "You just cut me off," the troublemaker "started spitting and splashing water at him." Then a yelling match ensued. What didn't happen? According to Fitzmaurice, there

was no fight: no one ever touched the kid and no one held him under water. He says the kid essentially lied to the cops and to the media.

So maybe that grumpy enforcer isn't such a bad thing after all? "Localism is 100 percent a good thing," says Santucci. "When a spot becomes overcrowded and has nobody to enforce surfing etiquette within the lineup, it gets out of control." Smith seconds the young pro. "I've always been on the record of being a fan of localism. I think that you need to have order in the water. I know it's not cool to have gatekeepers, but I think surfing needs gatekeepers. It's no fun for anybody when everybody's dropping in on a wave."

Swamis in Encinitas, says Santucci, is the perfect example. "When the wave is good, it gets very overcrowded and there is often no one in the lineup to call people out when they do dangerous things." He says that anytime the waves are good at Swamis, he sees a bunch of party fouls that could have landed someone in the hospital — for example, surfers bailing on their boards in heavy traffic. "I try to keep



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a positive atmosphere in the lineup, but there are definitely times when an enforcer needs to step in to keep a surfer in check. Whether they are being dangerous in the lineup or not being respectful, it's nice to have someone at a spot that will remind them that they are ruining other people's sessions."

Enforcers are not random goons. A true enforcer is a trusted local who has the respect of the other locals — and the authority, unofficial though it may be, to deal with rude surfers who transgress the unwritten but inviolable rules of the wave. When Bill Fitzmaurice moved with his family to La Jolla in the early '70s, a friend picked him up at the airport and took him straight to La Jolla Shores for a candid conversation. "Bill, if you're going to survive here, you got to know a couple of things,"

his friend told him. "You'd better think of La Jolla like it's an insane asylum, and the walls fell down and nobody left. And if you can get your brain wrapped around that, you just might survive here."

The inmates who didn't leave were a group of hardcore local surfers who didn't want anything to do with Tom Wolfe. They made a lot of trouble and had a lot of fun, going so far as to create, as an inside joke, the infamous Mac Meda Destruction Company. They were also the gatekeepers at Windansea. "You had to be at least a really solid surfer to paddle out," explains Fitzmaurice, who spent 12 years on the board of the Windansea Surf Club. "A guy we called 'Brud' had to give you permission to paddle out." Brud kept things safe and sane.

Brud is gone now, but as Fitzmaurice noted, will take up his part. "Say there's a scenario where somebody is just being very disrespectful, a jerk, cutting people off, disrespecting the locals —then he shouldn't be out in the water," he says. "A couple guys might paddle over to him and say, 'Hey, dude, you know, maybe split, go to the Shores, don't surf,"" he says. And they might up the ante if the troublemaker doesn't comply. "I strongly suggest you listen. This is not a beginner wave. You're gonna hurt yourself or you're gonna hurt one of us, and we really prefer you get out of the water. Come back a year or two from now when you're a lot better." If that doesn't work, there's a few people Fitzmaurice knows that would paddle up and say, "Listen, this has gone past the point where we're asking you nicely. Get out. All right?

there are still those who



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
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Or maybe you might get dragged out of the water."

Fitzmaurice doesn't want to overstate things or engage in hyperbole. He says for the most part, surfers can come to Windansea, even for the first time, and have a good session and not get hassled — as long as they're decent surfers who conduct themselves respectfully. It's true that, on a visit to the notorious Lunada Bay in Palos Verdes, Fitzmaurice was preparing to paddle out when "I got hit in the head with a rock." But a lawsuit currently making its way through the courts is expected to return Lunada Bay to the people. This isn't Hollywood, which is currently producing a Nicolas Cage revenge pic about an outsider who gets pushed too far by the locals.

In the real world. If you get barked at by a grumpy local, Beresford advises that "you learn from the experience. It's not the end of the world. Hopefully they do it in a constructive way." That's what happened to him. When he was a grom, he was surfing Scripps and paddling back out after taking a wave. As he tried to get to the shoulder and over the wave before it broke on him, he saw a guy take off, heading his way. "He pulls me aside afterwards and he's like, 'Dude, you got to take your lumps, man, you got to take your lumps.' And maybe it was a little hard to hear at the time, but he was right, and

I learned that lesson right then - you know, when you're in that position, you paddle for the whitewater, you take your lumps. I al-

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ways remember that."

And he remembers the more experienced surfer's blunt but unhostile manner. "There's a way to deal with less experienced surfers in a friendly, helpful way that encourages them. Because we're all out there for the same reason."

So, where to begin? The vast majority of new surfers - and many seasoned ones, too — prefer a beach break like La Jolla Shores, Scripps, or Pacific Beach. There's usually less localism at these spots — and at beach breaks in general — and less experienced surfers can usually find a

section that's less crowded. Take the Shores, for example. "It's a kook fest down there," says Jack's daughter, Jana. "So, you got to know that going into it. Normally, the only guys out there that get on my nerves are the middle school boys or the middle-aged men who think they run the place" - wannabe kings of the two-footers.

If you really want to avoid the crowds and practice your craft, there's a wave pool in Palm Springs and another one expected to open in Oceanside in 2026. But wave pools lack what Jana Beresford describes as "the kind of healing and restorative energy that any surfer craves, whether you're competing or just hanging with the seals and dolphins."

Or with your fellow surfers Says Jack, "I think the real story is how there's a family out there, people who see each other and get to know each other over the years. Depending on the time of day that you surf, you'll see the same guys every day or every couple of days."

For her part, daughter Jana surfs with her sister and friends, but says there's nothing like the surfing ritual she shares with her dad. "There's a fun little routine we've gotten into, besides the actual surfing," she tells me. "We have our presurf tunes and post-surf tunes, and enough water in the jug to rinse off after a long session. And there's normally some kind of snack to chase the salty taste on the ride home. It's honestly some of the purest moments of stoke, and it's so cool that we can share those moments together. He catches a lot of the waves that I want, but it's okay, cuz he's my dad." — Adam Behar

R.S. 

Billie Holiday may have had a smallish voice and a smallish range, but she squeezed a huge amount of feeling out of both, and she was a hell of a lyricist to boot. She may have written "God Bless the Child" with Arthur Herzog, Jr., but it was her experience: an argument with her mother about money. And so: "Mama may have, papa may have, but God bless the child that's got his own. Them that's got shall get, them that's not shall lose, so the bible said and it still is news." It surely helped (her art, anyway) that love done her wrong, that her "first love/worst love" Jimmy Monroe was not only an addict, but an addict who wanted a companion on the journey down. All this is to help explain why Lanie Robertson's play, which lets Karole Foreman spill out Holiday's story in between the songs of a late-career set in Philadelphia, works better than some other jukebox musicals. It all feels so close to the bone, even when she's singing other people's material - even when it's something as seemingly lighthearted as "What a Little Moonlight Can Do." She sings it early on, and it's delightful and optimistic, like "the new Billie" herself. But after a night of drinking, reminiscing, and eventually dancing with her old devil, she slurs her way back to it, and it becomes tragic. What a little moonlight can do to you, indeed. John Patrick Shanley's rural Irish romcom sneaks up you, firstly by being more com than rom - no, scratch that, firstly by being more dramedy than - no, scratch that, firstly by being a proper bit of Irish black comedy. You'll have to forgive the

backtracking; the final scene is a long, long way from the first, which gives us an old man and his son, returning from the funeral of another old man who went to war with God after his baby boy died without the grace of baptism. Sorry - went to war with the crows, blasting holes in the sky with his shotgun. These are good Catholic folk, who don't easily make direct war on the divine. On their nearest and dearest, however... So right away, Da is telling his boy that he takes too much after his dead mother, and so he's not sure about leaving him the family farm, and besides, said family farm is missing a crucial bit of land right up front, which belonged to the recently deceased and has now passed to his daughter, which daughter has hated our boy ever since he pushed her to the ground when they were kids. So yeah, there's your glimmer of rom on the horizon, but it takes its sweet time in arriving. The good news is that the time *is* sweet: nobody here hates anyone else, mind you, and they manage to be fastly funny in the face of awful tidings, and lovelily lyrical about the land that sustains them, in proper Irish fashion. More people die, life slips by, and finally, after a lot of nonsense involving a metal detector, boy and girl sit down to share a beer in a farmhouse kitchen and have it out. (When she asks if he's noticed she's a woman, he shushes her, "I see you in church!") It surely helps that our lead couple - and the old-timers who support them — are deeply familiar with one another; Lamb's calls them "two of the region's leading theater couples." Even when they're fighting, they're having fun up there. And about that long, long way: if the first scene inspires a wincing sort of smile, the final one is all head-shaking grins. American Fiction — Director Cord Jefferson's adaptation of writer Percival Everett's novel Erasure is not so much a comedy as it is an elaborate joke on the viewer. The marketing, which must be considered here, makes the film look like a savage satire of the publishing industry: the story of a frustrated upper-middleclass Black writer who cranks out a pseudonymous thug life novel as a gag, only to see the industry ignore the joke and embrace it in earnest. Oh oh oh? The poor boobies can't even bring themselves to object when he insists on titling it Fuck - and who could blame them? Do you want to be the white person who tells the Black person that he's not allowed to keep it real? How delicious. But in truth. all that is a subplot, and a carelessly handled one at that; the real story is something much more conventional, much more delicate, and much more emotionally engaging: a mid-life crisis movie about a man dealing with the potent legacy of his dead father, the sad reality of his fading mother, and the affecting complexity of his sibling relationships. All set about as far from the hood as you could imagine - the love interest lives just across from his family's beach house. It's a sign of star Jeffrey Wright's presence and talent that he's able to keep the viewer from noticing the bait-and-switch until the ending, which is likely to feel like a bad Player rip-off to fans of the satire, an emotional middle-finger to fans of the family drama, and maybe, just maybe, a clever tell to those in on the joke. What did you come here looking for, people? (2023) - M.L. ** (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Freud's Last Session — A note at the end informs us that near the end of his life — and near the onset of World War II — pioneering psychoanalyst Sigmund Freud was visited by a young Oxford don in his London home. Well, home away from home: he still pines for his beloved Austria, but it's not so good there for Jews at the moment - even, perhaps especially, famous Jews, and especially especially Jews who are famous for rejecting religion and other traditional bases for morality. But back to the matter at hand: what Matthew Brown's adaptation of Mark St. Germain's play (which is based on Armand Nicholi's

book The Question of God) supposes is that the young don was none other than C.S. Lewis, a fairly recent convert to Christianity who lampooned Freud in his update on John Bunyan's The Pilgrim's Progress. Narnia is still a long way off, but the book's allegorical character hints at Lewis' sympathy toward myth, which puts him on common ground with Freud, while its Christian perspective sets him in testy opposition to the cancer-ridden, morphine-sipping, emotionally tyrannical atheist. And yet, despite his frailty and failings, Freud largely gets the better of their various sparring matches, mostly because he seems like more of a person, and has stories to go along with his ideas. (His embittered "Great plan, God," after recounting the death of his wife and child elicits only silence from Lewis, which seems right.) Brown does what he can to keep things from feeling like a filmed play, but he can't do much, and what he does do - flashbacks, dream sequences, a war scene, and a trip to an air raid shelter — isn't always helpful. Anthony Hopkins enjoys himself as the old man, while Matthew Goode seems a bit tentative for a zealous convert. (2024) - M.L.

Mean Girls — If the original *Mean Girls* was a gentled version of *Heathers* — and yeah, that's probably unfair, since films should be allowed to stand or fall on their own merits, but for viewers of a certain age, the similarities were simply too salient to ignore, what with the plucky outsider sidling up to but ultimately taking down the trio of gorgeous Gorgons who run things around this here high school — then *Mean Girls* 2024 is a similarly gentled version of the 2004 original. High school can be a desperate time; no one here feels desperate. The girls just aren't as mean. The social hierarchies just aren't as brutal. The betravals and losses just aren't as devastating - and it's not just because we may have seen them before. It may be because the world has gotten meaner in the meantime Social media has made the notion of a secret "Burn Book" full of nasty comments about one's adolescent peers positively quaint; today, you could just make an anon account and broadcast your bile to all and sundry - to the point where maybe you'd get back to the suicidal darkness of Heathers! But no, the book is still here, still somehow wreaking havoc even as it has lost the power to accuse someone of, gasp, homosexuality. Here, outcast Janis is out and proud; her animus toward the popular Plastics has to do with a failure of allyship - which is rather less potent as motivations go. In place of the poison, this version has songs, which is probably what you're here for, since they provide the "new twist" promised on the poster. Some of them are great fun and actually help move the story along - the wildly energetic "Revenge Party" is a positive delight. Others work like anthemic music videos - Regina George's spooky/sinister "Someone Gets Hurt," Janis's poptimist "I'd Rather Be Me." But a number of them "Meet the Plastics," "What's Wrong With Me?" etc. — do little more than raise subtext to text, and the performances aren't always rendered with enough feeling to make them feel worthwhile. Rhea was aware of what was happening, but felt "this extreme state of relaxation. You start to feel a buzzing sensation throughout your body and it feels like you can't move. It takes a real concerted effort to break out of it and move your limbs again. But if you give in to the feeling and let it do its thing, you start to feel like you're rising out of your body, towards the ceiling and even beyond. It was similar to one of those lucid dreams where you suddenly realize you're dreaming but you're still able to continue the dream state. You want to try as much crazy shit as you can before you wake up." That experience factors

to be watching coverage of the Ukraine war when the inspiration-as-alienation hit, but he admits, "I constantly feel more like an observer of humans than a participant. It's like I'm living in the longest episode of Seinfeld in the history of the world. I've felt that disconnection from other events in the news before. but more often, it's the little mundane things that make up our day that get me noticing the absurdity of being human. Ideas for songs are weird. Sometimes it just hits you out of nowhere, and you're like, 'Why didn't I think to write a song about this before?""

A San Diego native in a band made up entirely of lifelong locals, Rhea grew up mostly in La Mesa but clocked time with his grandparents in City Heights. "Different parts of town seem to have a certain feeling based on familiarity. Kind of like learning a new skill. In the beginning, it's awkward and feels foreign, but eventually, it becomes a part of you. My grandfather owned the 7 Seas Locker Club downtown on Broadway. The city seemed so intimidating and exotic

in comparison to La Mesa. Now, it's just where I go see Padres games."

The band name? "We used to be called Scaramanga, named after Christopher Lee's character in The Man With The Golden Gun. For some reason, we thought we needed to change our name when Dusty [Norberg, drummer] joined the band, and our bass player at the time came up with Manganista. It's a combination of the 'manga' part of 'Scaramanga' and 'Sandinista' from the Clash album. I kind of liked it, because it was a made-up word and didn't mean anything. No baggage."

Selected highlights from past gigs include "playing the Pride festival in Balboa Park with A Flock of Seagulls. The singer looked at our six-foot marimba and said, 'You know, they make keyboards that do that.' Getting asked to play 'Rock the Casbah' at a Clash tribute show at the Casbah put together by Adam Gimbel. Some drunk lady at Pete's Place yelling out during our set, 'What's the deal with this cruise ship music?' A show with Deal's Gone Bad at UCSD where the PA and lights were supposed to be powered by people pedaling stationary bicycles. It didn't work."

The band plans to re-work the two new songs into ska, reggae, and dub versions, but has alrady posted videos for the original versions. Rhea directs, smushing together online clips in the public domain, but also including flashes of Frankenstein, Duck Soup, and a dude with werewolf fangs who is definitely not Michael Jackson, prancing around in Michael Jackson's red leather jacket. "The Thriller ripoff is a spoof from Donga, an '80s Indian film," confesses Rhea. "YouTube it. You won't be disappointed." The band's upcoming outings include March 3 at Humble Heart in OB.

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Good vibrations with Jeff

Saying goodbye to a local at Brick by Brick

"The last time I was in here, I went completely berserk on this dude who told my grandson to be quiet," Jeff told me as we dined on some Mexican cuisine at Ponce's on Adams Avenue. "I thought they were going to kick me out, but they [Ponce's staff] ended up apologizing to me. I didn't have to pay for a damn thing that night." It was Jeff's last week as a San Diego resident after a nearly 60-year run. Born and raised. The former drummer/Black's Beach frequenter/Frito-Lay chipman had become yet another casualty, and was soon to be en route to a more affordable life in Arizona. Since it was his last week in the city, he took to getting out and about every chance he could. So when I offered up my extra ticket to the Escuela Grind/Take Offense show at Brick by

Brick on a wet Wednesday night, he jumped at the chance.

Once my Cali burrito had been demolished, I dipped from Ponce's and peeled to Brick by Brick. Jeff took his own ride and said he would meet me there. At the venue, I was wanded at the door and asked if I had any knives, guns, or any other weapons. I contemplated cracking a joke about my arms being weapons of some sort, but refrained. It did feel like there was something dangerous in my gut after killing that massive burrito, however. Could that count as a weapon? Maybe later, after digestion. But even though a nuclear bomb was brewing within, I was granted access.

Once inside, I walked past multiple couples draped in black leather and spelunking the depths of each other's throats with their tongues. I found my way to the front. The joint's smell was fittingly sour. A band from Boston called Bonginator smothered the stage with Dimebag Darrell-type screaming guitars. Then the big long-blonde-haired frontman yelled out the name of their next song: "420-Pound Poop," and began grunting heavily while chanting "Uh uh uh poop poop poop" over a dark, drop-tuned riff. Not quite the "brown note," but close.

After the Bonginator mess was cleaned up, Take Offense kept the energy acidulated. The Chula Vista group was kicking off the beginning of multiple city tour. No better place to

start a tour than at home with a big push from the hometown fans. As I held my own in the front, I could feel the wind — and an occasional kick to the back of the leg— from the pit behind me. Lead guitarist Greg Cerwonka shredded nasty guitar solos, mirroring the '80s thrash metal for which I have a deep and abiding love.

I looked at my phone and saw that Jeff was trying to get ahold of me. He was stuck at the door, waiting for his ticket. Once inside, he bolted for the bar. We watched the remainder of the TO set at a safe distance from the kicking. Stellas were only five bucks, so that's what was lubricating my throat. In classic Jeff fashion, he opted for the red wine.

"I think my friend Matt is here," Jeff said. "He's got one leg. Lost it from hopping a train. It's pretty cool." A short search party for Matt fizzled quickly after Take Offense's set finished. Then it was Escuela Grind time. Frontwoman Katerina Economou's vocals were deep, growling, and powerful. I was not expecting that kind of force to come from Economou's petite frame. The crowd seemed blown away by the East Coast act. We looked on as the sound guy started dancing and getting in the thrill of the music. I felt what I thought were insects crawling up my leg, only to realize it was the vibrations from the ear-splitting EG set.

When the show found its ending and the venue settled, Jeff and I stood at the bar, watching the bands break down and pack up their equipment. It wouldn't be long before Jeff would be packing up himself. As a transplant, it's a gut-punch for me to lose local guys like Jeff. The ones who have deep knowledge of the city's underground pockets, who can tell you where to find a good massage, where the best hole-in-the-wall restaurants are, what beach to go to, when to catch the best waves. Then, as we gathered ourselves to leave, Jeff grinned and asked, "You wanna go to Cheetahs?"

Afghani explorations

Going traditional at Afghani Food International Market & Restaurant

Afghani Food International Market & Restaurant, 5440 Clairemont Mesa Blvd., San Diego. I have learned that when it's too much a challenge to find parking on Convoy, if you drift west across the 805, you can find a smaller, yet no less diverse cluster of restaurants along Clairemont Mesa Boulevard. There you may choose among Cuban, Korean, Thai, Greek, and Japa-

nese cuisines; and for the

past several months,

gyros, chicken shawarma, and falafel.

That's not to say these come off the same as you'll find in corresponding restaurants. The *tikka* here (\$19 lamb, \$18 beef, or \$17 chicken) is far mellower than any Indian version I've tried, for example. And then there's Afghanistan's national dish, *quabli palaow* (\$19). It's a lamb shank and rice dish quite similar to the Iraqi national dish, *quzi*. Both dishes feature lamb, rice, and raisins, but where *quabili* differs most is in featuring plenty of a common ingredient actually thought to have originated in the vicinity of Afghanistan: carrot.

Mantu: beef and onion steamed dumplings smothered in sour cream, mint, and lentils

Afghani Food International Market & Restaurant opened this fall, and though its name sounds handed down from the central office of a global conglomerate, it's a local, family-owned business that leans a little more toward restaurant than market.

That said, I would suggest exploring the retail foods packed into coolers that span the entire left wall of the spacious dining room, if only for insights into the sort of products Afghan expats might wish to find in a grocery store. There are loads of nuts (I spotted walnuts, pistachios, almonds, and black pine nuts); a choice of dried apricots including *chapamamak* (which are twisted and dried on the tree; and packs of oleaster, a wild relative of the olive.

Most fascinating are the traditionally Afghan ingredients, including lumps of the unrefined sugar *gur*, and dehydrated yogurt balls called *quroot*. But most tempting would be the array of sweets: ranging from about \$8 to \$10 a package, these include both ginger and sesame candies, sugar-frosted almonds called *naqul*, and almond cookies called *kolcha badami*. These are a sort of shortbread cookie, typically flavored with cardamom, and nice for dipping in coffee or tea.

Of course, there's more to be gleaned about Afghan cuisine by sitting down to a meal. For example, you probably recall without having to brush up on your geography that Afghanistan sits roughly between India and the Middle East. So, the menu features the likes of *tikka kebab, naan* flatbread, and basmati rice, while also offering Caramelized, shredded carrots conspire with black and golden raisins to sweeten the lamband rice-dish — it might have proven *too* sweet for me had it not been served with a pair of spicy sauces. Whether red or green, these sauces complete the *quabli* the way salsas complete tacos. I might have avoided making a direct Afghan/Mexican comparison, except two of the restaurants more popular appetizers are billed as "Afghani quesadillas". Actually, these are Afghan favorites made with flatbread rather than tortilla. They're called *kachalo* (\$15) and *bolani* (\$16), the first stuffed with mashed potatoes, the second with a chive-like Afghan leek called *gandana*.

Still, I've saved my favorite for last: a shareable platter of *mantu* dumplings (\$18 for twelve). The delicate, steamed dumplings are filled with a stew of minced beef and onions, which make them similar to any number of dumplings served around the world. Less common would be *how* they're served: beneath a drizzle of sour cream and a dusting of dried mint, then finished with lentils that have been stewed in olive oil and tomatoes.

Let this dish be the starting point to exploring Afghani Food International Market & Restaurant. You may always fall back on pizza or burgers (both also on the menu!), but especially if you started out looking for something interesting to eat on Convoy, you'll embrace the opportunity to try something new.

Bluefin tuna thick off the coast of Baja – Runoff and stocked trout triggering catfish

Dock Totals 1/28 – 2/3: 325 anglers aboard 15 half-day to 3-day trips out of San Diego landings over the past week caught 27 calico bass, 34 perch, 275 sand bass, 128 sculpin, 4 triggerfish, and 663 whitefish.

Saltwater: Typical winter fishing punctuated by yet another front passing through kept the numbers of anglers and trips to a minimum. Boats made it out five days last week, and the counts indicate very localized fishing with no rockfish trips into Mexican waters. No lobster trips made it out, either. The majority of fish caught were whitefish, sand bass, and sculpin. That said. reports just down the line indicate a strong spring ahead, considering they are finding yellowtail on the nearshore banks off San Quintin, and some longrange boats are seeing signs of bluefin as they move south. Typically, yellowtail are more active in January further south along the Vizcaino Peninsula. That they are biting well as far north as San Quintin is a good sign.

As for the bluefin, Tim Ekstrom of the Royal Star puts it into perspective: "We

did see quite a bit of scattered bluefin while heading south, consistent with the past few years. Sharing info with the commercial fleet, they mentioned the incredible distribution of fish this winter that is currently spread from outside Ensenada all the way down past Cedros island. To say the least, this bodes well for the spring, summer, and fall to come."

Personally, I got a taste of bluefin action without setting foot on a boat or holding a rod in my hand. Two large seiners were parked in the lee of the weather inside of Punta Mazo off San Quintin, and some friends went out and bought a dozen fish from them, ranging from 50 to 150 pounds. I reckon those guys on the seiners needed a little pocket money for their shore leave while sitting out the storm. Either way, they said the bluefin tuna were thick, and they were fast approaching their quota. The fish we bought were fresh and packed in crushed ice, and I managed to bum a chunk and enjoyed a dinner of seared medallions of bluefin. I expect that as conditions soften up and more boats out for winter maintenance come online, we will soon see bluefin in the counts for the full-day to 3-day fleet. The fish are there; boats just haven't been able to get to them. Yet.

Folks targeting the surf and the bays between the blows have been finding hit and miss action on surf perch, halibut, and spotted bay bass. Those fishing the surf have been having the best success on small plastics on a Carolina rig, as sand crabs are still in their winter

smaller trout in the mix are tasty morsels for larger bass and catfish...as well as from above by the white pelicans that winter in our lakes. Thankfully, brown pelicans tend to stick to saltwater. Brown pelicans are the only of the seven species of pelicans that "dive bomb" to feed, and often do so in large squadrons that can decimate a school of sardines in short order. As fresh-stocked trout tend to swim the shallows along the shorelines in schools, large numbers of divebombing pelicans would quickly consume the freshly-planted trout. I really enjoy watching brown pelicans at work, but I sure am happy they tend to stick to the ocean.

On the other hand, white pelicans tend to feed by herding the fish, with a handful of pelicans working together before plunging down and scoop up a meal. White pelicans are also more driven by the winter conditions in higher altitudes and migrate, as do birds of prey like the bald eagles we see in area lakes in the winter.

Along with bass and catfish from below, white pelicans, bald eagles, and even cormorants tend to take a few stocked trout every season, but with the consistent stocking schedules, there are still plenty of fish left for anglers. Upcoming plants include 1500 pounds February 8 at Lake Poway, 1000 pounds at Santee Lakes on February 9, 1500 pounds between February 11-17 at Lake Wohlford, and 1500 pounds at Lake Jennings on February 19. They're out there, so go get 'em!

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
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LOOKING FOR RIDESHARE

ROAM

I grip my steering wheel in disbelief as I arrive at the trailhead and stare at the row of parked cars along the side of the road. Nearly a decade ago, I hiked this peak with my father, and back then there was only one parked car: ours. Now there are legions. It's an incursion. The dirt strip along the side of the road holds nine cars and further along the road, the cars continue like the long body of a roosting dragon before disappearing out of view around a hairpin turn. Many of the cars have Cleveland National Forest day passes dangling from their rearview mirror — a parking requirement out here that I'm told is enforced with stinging fines - while a few cars have curious orange labels stuck to the driver's side window. Turns out it's a tow warning from a ranger who's been patrolling in the early morning. Many of the cars are parked illegally, and I wonder if the ranger gave up trying to warn them all or simply ran out of stickers.

I park my car a quarter-mile up the road, its back end dangling half-off the embankment. The earth is still full of water from the recent rains, and I wonder whether my car insurance covers landslides before starting down the road towards the trailhead while lathering on some expired sunscreen and tightening my manly fanny pack.

Like a long-forgotten niece or nephew, the little hike from nearly a decade ago seems to have grown up in my absence. In my vanity, I attribute this popularity to my column, but the silent fresh air mocks my ego, and the idea fades like an exposed strip of film. I wonder what would draw such a congregation to the mountain, but not having any real presence on social media or knowledge of its fleeting, fickle trends, I can't say whether Corte Madera has become an Instagram or TikTok sensation without my knowing.


Normally, my backcountry hikes are monkish meditations marked by a steady, unbroken silence, aside from the few "hiya's" and "howdy's" to occasional passersby. But today, I'm curious to see what desperate, foolish people will be out on this lonely road with me. I ponder all those on the path ahead—city folk with itchy souls setting New Year's resolutions to unmoor their souls, single mothers with young kids exposing them to fresh pine scents and decaying oak leaves, sweaty Marines on short leave from the sandy shores of Camp Pendleton. As I follow the undergrowth past a fork in the road with a freshly painted sign pointing toward Corte Madera, I begin to hear voices ahead of me on the trail, and I brim with anticipation.

Two waves of four people speaking Mandarin and wearing matching bucket hats pass by. *No more than two cars' worth of people*, I think to myself while waving and continuing along the trail, which now begins to wind upward. In the distance, I spot the low saddle between two mountains that I will climb, and coming off the side are small specks of colorful shirts. They are other hikers that I will eventually pass, more or less uneventfully, although the man who I catch peeing just off the trail is the exception. I greet him while he is midstream

and quietly laugh at the panic in his voice as he turns red with embarrassment.

It isn't until after a bit of climbing that I hear the low din of several voices crashing upon one another from behind a large boulder. Passing it, I see a massive group climbing up a slope, and because they have the right of way, I move off the trail to let them by.

They emerge from behind the trees, walking in a long, slow march. Some have a spirit of vitality, flashing smiles below the brim of caps gripped by polarized sunglasses, while others seem resigned to fate: heads down, eyes straining forward, guiding limbs up coarse, granite stones. They scrub the trail with their boots and duck under branches that cut into them like long, sharp knives, I am a specter to them, felt but unseen. My prying eyes haunt their movements, and I take inventory of a woman passing by. She has an undercut; her hair is slicked back and dangling over a white backpack that has brushed against the dirt and been stained. Her red gloves make her hands look like those of an organ harvester; the left one holds two trekking poles, onto which she shifts her weight to vault up an indented boulder.

"Hello," we say to one another, me looking at her, but her looking at the path ahead. Then she falls out of my life forever, and there's a man coming towards me. His bald head wrapped in a purple bandana with sunglasses to match. His grey goatee is crooked, and his maroon sweater shows thin bands of sweat.

"Hi," we say, then he's gone too. The next man comes up, a blue Patagonia shell wrapped around his waist. They go well with his beige khaki pants. I greet him and the dozens of others and then let them all go. I am like a fly fisherman, catching and releasing Saturday afternoon salutations that rub against me like rays of sunshine on a foggy day.

Seconds spin into minutes until I awaken as if from a deep stupor. I've lingered for so long that I struggle to pull myself free from the lattice of time into which I was woven while the owners of all the parked cars passed me by. Looking about, I see a few friendly hikers at the bottom of the slope who reward my patience by letting me down the path before they climb up it.

As I climb down, an older man with a scar twisting down his cheek seizes my shoulder and says, "Look, beyond that tree." His brow flares, and I turn away from his glittering eyes to see what he sees, though my eyes land An overlook with a view to the northeast.

"Do you see the mark?" he asks. And I do. Poking up just above the canopy is the top of a petroglyph, but it disappears behind dancing leaves that bob joyously in the wind.

on nothing.

"Continue down the path, and after you've begun to climb for a spell, you'll see a boulder. Stand on it and look again. Goodbye!" Soon the man is halfway up the trail with his companions while I stand blinking at the hidden carving. Minutes later, I come to the boulder and see it in full. A symbol of the sun, perhaps drawn by ancient wanderers who lived here long ago, or maybe by bored kids in the more recent past with lots of time to kill and no MTV or smartphones to keep them gawking.

The trail meanders up and down, and I push through tall manzanitas that tear at my skin until I come to the mountain's crest and rise above it all. I see three rowdy women bounding toward me; they stop and turn off the trail to race up a rough, round boulder while hurling insults at one another in hoarse shouts. I creep past them, bracing as if they will wolf whistle at me. But they don't, and I pass by, ignored or unnoticed, following the trail as it dips down for its final bow before climbing back up to the peak. The peak has no sharp points to point to, but instead sits upon a large granite dome that looks like the sawn-off stump of a tree limb when seen from down below.

Alone on the dome, I look back and see the three women bouncing along the boulders behind me and hear them swearing at one another like sailors. Then I look southeast to Los Pinos Mountain. A rich brown trail cuts through the side of the green velvet mountain, and I espy the fire lookout tower that crowns its peak.

Removing my manly fanny pack, I pull out some nuts and dates and eat them, then peel a ripe orange that drips sticky citrus juice down my fingers. Later, I will rub my hands with dirt to dry them, but for now, I let the juice drip as I watch nearby birds flit and chat with one another, while high above a kettle of vultures soars into a thermal. Wet with sweat, I strip off my shirt and pants and stand in my briefs as the wind cools my body and the sun warms it. Then I switch into a warmer jacket and clean shorts while plugging my ears with headphones. The howl of the wind falls away to melodic tunes that I leap along to, racing down the mountain while abandoning memories that slip away, forgotten. -Ryan Brothers
