Fighting back against Fishbach

Neighbors unite in opposition to shortterm rentals in their midst

There are those who say that living in a \$7.5 million beachfront home can be downright scary — at least, if you live next door to a short-term rental. "There's so many scary people hanging out in the streets," says Ashley McDermott, who lives on the 2000 block of South Pacific Street in Oceanside. "I don't want to sleep in my own house if my husband is not home. That's because there are so many sketchy people sleeping all around me. We call the police but they don't come."

McDermott's house, which has been in her family since 1957, was featured in the November issue of Architectural Digest. The article invites readers to "Tour a French Normandy-Style Compound on the California Coast." But it doesn't mention the house next door at 2031 South Pacific Street, which began hosting short-term renters four years ago. Money from those guests helps generate \$300,000 annually for David Fischbach and his Oceanside-based Beachfront Only vacation rental business. According to the city records, Fischbach and corporations connected with Fischbach operate 77 legal short-term rental homes in Oceanside. Fischbach himself owns several of those properties, including 2031 South Pacific Street.

What's more, Fischbach says he will turn in plans soon to tear down the 90-year-old, three-bedroom residence and replace it with a ten-bedroom house that will accommodate many more short-term renters. The city of Oceanside's occupancy maximum for short-term rentals allows for two people per bed-

room, plus an extra two. This means that this new home will increase its overnight short-term rental occupancy limit from eight to 22.

Ashley McDermott's husband Jeffrey isn't having it. He just filed a 50-page lawsuit against Fischbach that claims that his South Oceanside neighborhood is zoned R-1 (residential only) and that Fischbach is actually a hotel operator who has a history of violating zoning laws. "If it was a Marriott or Hilton coming to do this,

South Oceanside. Fischbach says he expects the beachfront neighbors to recoil at the thought of the public descending onto the beach in front of their houses. But he reckons that the city at large and the state Coastal Commission will appreciate the beach access angle and help him get approved.

the city would stop them in their tracks," says McDermott. "But because they are using the fiction of being an individual property owner, they are getting away with it. He is infesting our neighborhoods with short-term rentals."

On a recent Saturday afternoon, McDermott invited some 30 neighbors to another neighbor's house. There, he unveiled his Neighborhoods are for Neighbors group, formed to fight back against short-term rental businesses operating in residential zones. "We're not against residential homeowners having their own STRs. We're against corporate-run STRs that are destroying neighborhoods. We're against STR slums." McDermott has had yard signs made, put up a website, and hired lobbyists to help torpedo Fischbach. When asked why he is suing Fischbach instead of the City of Oceanside — which is allowing Fischbach to run all these beachfront "hotels" - McDermott said he preferred not to comment on

Another part of Fischbach's proposal may help to placate the city even as it further outrages neighbors on South Pacific Street. He says his plans call for the installation of a walkway which will provide public access to the beach. Currently, there is no beach access in access advocate. She notes that walkways at Cassidy Street and 1919 South Pacific are either closed or do not lead to the beach. "I whole-heartedly support the opening and dedication of land for public beach access." For his part, McDermott says that a rumor that he filed the Fischbach lawsuit because of the public access issue is not true. McDermott says he has no problem with a public pathway to the beach next to his house.

The real problem, says McDermott, is that the city has long been overly cozy with the short-term rental industry. He says its biggest champion was former councilman Jack Feller. From 2010 to 2020, Fischbach donated \$25,000 to Feller's re-elections. (The McDermotts and another family member have contributed \$16,000 to councilman Ryan Keim's current campaign for mayor, and the McDermotts contributed to a PAC called Friends of the Coast that gave Keim an additional \$5500.) However, the Oceanside city council showed a sea change with regard to short-term rentals in December, after councilman Peter Weiss instructed city staff to come back with an ordinance which would prevent any new short-term rentals in residential zones. The council unanimously agreed. As of December, there were 719 legal

short-term rentals in the coastal district and 1013 in the entire city.

Fischbach, a retired anesthesiologist who lives in Rancho Santa Fe, has long been the target of neighbors peeved with the high-density vacation rentals and sober living group homes he dropped in their neighborhoods. Five years ago, 20 neighbors who lived in Oceanside's Fire Mountain neighborhood claimed Fischbach used deceptive means to open a sober living facility. "He lied through his teeth," claimed one neighbor. "They've taken a crown jewel of a home and made it into a fortress of people living up there."

Kim Dillon, owner of Oceanside Beach Rentals, has a different view of Fischbach. "Before David came, we were all managing [short-term rental

beachfront] homes that were rundown. He came in with decorators and remodeled his homes. We had to up our game. Oceanside would not have enjoyed the turnaround it has experienced without David's decision to make Oceanside a top destination. These fine restaurants we have now depend on our [short term rental] customers."

Dillon says beach-front vacation renters have a real impact on Oceanside's bottom line. She says they typically pay between \$250 and \$350 per night during the off season, and \$900 to \$2000 a night during peak summer months. So it's possible that the city may be reluctant to cut back on its short-term rental business. In the 2022-2023 fiscal year, the city took in about \$16 million in Transit Occupancy Tax. Of that, about half was from hotel guests, while the other half was from short-term rentals. The city's Visit Oceanside marketing efforts rely almost entirely on transit occupancy taxes to pay the bills.

However, McDermott claims that if shortterm rentals were eliminated from residential districts, it would amount to only a six percent reduction in transit occupancy tax revenue. It would not impact, for instance, North Coast Village near the harbor, which is almost entirely populated by short-term renters.

The short-term rental issue will come before the Oceanside planning commission again March 25, and before the city council, tentatively, April 24.

THE WALLS

Riff raff spreading graf? Or is it just bored kids who should be on their bikes?

Nearly 7000 graffiti reports have been logged on San Diego's Get It Done app since the start of the year. Many of them cite graffiti where parents take their kids: parks, playgrounds, libraries, BMX tracks, hiking trails, skateparks, and little league baseball diamonds.

"Last week, we were tagged three times!" Nicole Rick posted online on February 28. "We recently received a \$25,000 grant from Ballpark Buns to create our 'field of dreams.' One of our coaches donated paint and services, and we repainted all of our buildings—only to have them tagged fiti on the top floor of the nine-story San Diego Central Library, noting that it was "very dangerous for whoever did it. [I'm] reporting, as employees may not be able to see it, and may want to know so their security can keep an eye out and prevent it in the future. Hard to see the red graffiti in the pic, so I've circled it." Almost a week later, the report was still listed as "new," meaning the tag hadn't been assessed.

On March 2, a local reported that someone tagged back wall of a building where

Rick, a Serra Mesa Little League board member, was especially concerned because their March 2 season opener was just a few days away. She sent me photos of the baseball field restrooms south of Montgomery-Gibbs Executive Airport. One wall was covered with blue spray paint. Among the unreadable scrawl was the unfortunately legible "fuck lamers." Rick continued, "It's disheartening to see some try to ruin it for us all. We utilized Diamond Designs to refurbish all four of our fields and have spent countless hours fixing up our community park of Cabrillo Heights."

When some little league parents attempted to get help through the city's Get It Done app, they were notified "estimated Resolution Time (public property): 6 days." Too late for the season opener. Luckily, a local painter who once played in the same little league program saw the defaced walls on Facebook and volunteered his services. "Quick update!" he posted online. "Graffiti is covered! The bathrooms look presentable, and the fields look top-notch. Good luck for the season opener. Play ball, kids!"

But while one problem was solved, many others persisted. On March 5, someone reported a tag on the Sherman Heights Community Center. That same day, a downtown dweller reported grafSan Diego cops hang out. The building was once home to the San Diego Neighborhood Watch teams of Normal Heights and Kensington, which used to help bust taggers. The tagged wall is just feet away, and faces the Ward Canyon Park playground.

Get It Done suggests reporting live graffiti in progress to 911. It notes that "photos are essential for graffiti reports to help crews identify the issue ... The City of San Diego removes graffiti from City property and, in some cases, graffiti visible to the public that is located on residential property of four units or less." Sometimes, a City employee will bring a power washer machine to spray off the paint. What many commercial property owners, private property owners, and utility companies don't realize is that they are responsible for graffiti removal on their own property.

Back in Serra Mesa, by the Serra Mesa Rec Center, another form of what residents call vandalism is showing up on both the internet and Get It Done. "For some time, there have been four or five teenage boys riding electric off-road motorcycles through the neighboring streets; they shoot out of nowhere," one resident posted on NextDoor. "Well, recently, they started tearing up the hillsides at the rec center and turning the children's play structure

Bligen wrote on his disclosure filing for the freebie. (Travel cost \$6019, lodging was \$2322, and meals were \$1223. "Other expenses" were reported to be \$3375, per the document.) "In my position as Legislative Assistant, I advise him on matters pertinent to national security, international economics, and foreign policy. Israel is a trusted trade and defense partner to the United States. This experience will provide

a hands-on understanding of the domestic factors that influence Israel's economic and defense ties with the United States."

Ink dries up Joshua Emerson Smith,

longtime environmental reporter at the San Diego Union-Tribune prior to taking a buyout at the beginning of the "vulture" capital outfit Alden Global Capital's takeover last July, left the ranks of journalism this month for a new public relations gig at the California Coastal Commission, per his LinkedIn profile. While at the *U-T*, per Smith's blurb on the paper's website, he "wrote about everything from public transit and housing to climate change, drought and wildfire. He won numerous statewide journalism awards, unpacking complex, often political issues using data analysis and vivid storytelling."

The Los Angeles Times has officially joined its former sister paper, the U-T, in being printed at an aging plant in downtown Riverside owned by Alden Global Capital.

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

OSHA rules wall falls our fault

Between October of 2023 an January of 2024, Border Patrol agents encountered over 120,000 migrants in the San Diego sector. Combined with the Trump administration's decision to increase the height of the border wall from 17 to 30 feet, it should come as no surprise that there has there has been a huge uptick in the number of people sustaining injuries after attempting to scale the wall and then falling off. The county reports that already this month, it has transported 18 migrants with fall-related injuries to area hospitals. "What does the government expect?" asks OSHA Department of Migrant Protection head Natasha Trigger-Warning. "People not to climb? Honestly, if they didn't want people to climb the wall, they shouldn't have built it. Anyone would think we didn't welcome migrants into this country. But what's really outrageous is that in many places, there are no warning signs indicating that falling is even a danger. And until very recently, what signs we did have were solely in English. It's the worst kind of xenophobia, and it creates an obvious safety hazard. We are opening channels for the injured migrants to

Navy solves San Diego homeless crisis by retiring four locally moored ships

Faced with a tight budget, the United States Navy announced last week that it was retiring four San Diego-based ships: the USS Lake Erie, the USS Germantown, the USS Jackson, and the USS Montgomery. Also faced with a tight budget, the city of San Diego announced last week that it was scuppering plans to provide permanent housing for people experiencing homelessness, partly because it would "only

encourage people who struggle to pay rent to give up and take to the streets, confident in our assistance," said Mayor Todd "Law & Order" Gloria. "It was the way the one announcement came right after the other that made the lights go on for me," says Navy Head of Recycling Ray Anker. "Those ships still have a lot of life in them. 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

THE RACCOON WAS HOMELESS

and pregnant and wanted to live under my house. But since it's really my *landlord's* house, I couldn't allow her to keep scratching and chewing her way through the splintering wood. Regretful but resolute, I stacked some bricks up against the spot where she'd been making steady progress — and hoped the whole thing was over.

It wasn't. Although she couldn't move the bricks, she wasn't about to stop trying. She kept coming back for another whack at them. When I could bear it no longer, I worked out a plan and silently proposed it to her. I placed some food a little ways from the house, and hoped she'd understand that if she agreed to find somewhere else to sleep during the day, I would gladly provide a breakfast of raw eggs and dried cat food for her at sundown. She understood.

This went on for about two and half months. As we kept company, we got to know each other. I started looking forward to her visits under the porchlight. It was so cool the way she swept up the cat food with her long, delicate fingers, bringing each piece to her mouth in such a ladylike fashion. She never dropped a crumb. And when she broke an egg on my walkway, she licked the cement clean. After she was finished eating, she headed over to the big bowl of water I always left for her and cleaned herself up. It was a complicated ritual. My cat is plenty persnickety, but even she would never go to that much bother.

Then, one chilly night in early December, my raccoon showed up with three little ones. Their arrival broke my heart, because I knew the time had come to stop the feedings. Mom had to start teaching her offspring what she knew about foraging. She seemed to realize it, too, or at least, she got the message the following night, when there was no breakfast waiting. All four vanished in a twinkling.

Where did they go? Have they stayed in the area? Are they managing to dodge the merciless traffic around here? Or are they being slaughtered one by one on

the highway?

I know this much: Mama Raccoon was intrepid, a quality I admire. And I missed her, almost the way I would miss my cat Pumpernickel if she were to disappear. But then, everything in Hillcrest is fleeting, almost to the point of seeming illusory. I've been "camping" here for the past twelve years, haunted by the fact that I have absolutely no security beyond an unmistakably false sense of it, brought on by a glass of cheap wine and an old record on the turntable.

Like most backyard granny cottages in this area, the one I rent is very old. You could just about knock it down with a shovel, which means that sooner or later, someone will. I'm surprised and grateful each time I wake up hearing a chirping bird instead of a thundering bulldozer. Glory be! Another day vouchsafed for taking picturesque walks through the neighboring neighborhoods of University Heights, Mission Hills, or North Park. Or through the lush ravines of Hillcrest itself, or all the way to Old Town or Kensington—not to mention Balboa Park.

But while these perambulations usually raise my spirits, there's a danger in them: when you've been taking those walks long enough that you get to know and love the territory: you risk running into the black dog. Not a literal bowser; Winston Churchill's black dog: depression. That can hound vou for weeks. Whenever I discover a fresh patch of demolition, I feel almost physically sick. Charming old houses and apartment buildings, shops and places of business imbued with history and character — what are their chances for preservation anymore? scratch out a living. But concrete and steel can't be dug into like the rotting wood of my home's foundation. Cubbyholes for wildlife, as well as for low-income people, are at a premium these days. So, whenever I see possums, skunks, coons, and sometimes even foxes slinking through the alleys after dark, I find myself thinking more about what is

common between us than what is different. They're nervous. Running scared. So am I. I know that living on the edge isn't the same thing as falling off. That's an important point to remember, whether you have any faith in tomorrow or not.

Still, if my landlord were to sell this property — and he talks about it — where on earth would I live? Or at least, where in San Diego? With wretched hovels like mine becoming scarcer by the day, I'd be up a creek without a boat, never mind the paddle. I live on Social Security and my dwindling savings account; I can't afford to rent an apartment in an up-to-date building where water bugs don't poke their ugly noses out from the cupboards, and where the kitchen floor doesn't sag under the weight of the refrigerator.

Speaking of refrigerators: I actually unplugged my antiquated one a few months ago, just to see how SDG&E would react. They reacted sportingly. My next bill was almost half the usual, so I left that plug dangling! All I had to do was get used to putting Kroger's powdered creamer in my coffee instead of milk. As for chilled salads and yogurt, I just walk over to Ralph's a few blocks away and pick up what I need. Ralph's is great about putting half-price stickers on ready-made salads, which even contain little packets of dressing. And if I don't finish a whole yogurt in one sitting, it can perch by the window screen overnight and still be cold

for breakfast.

Seriously, who really needs a refrigerator? Covered wagons didn't have them, and people still came west. Now I'm the only one on the block who laughs when we have a power failure. Not one thing stored in my freezer is going to be wasted, because apples, vanilla wafers, and tortilla chips don't melt.

All that aside, though—the beautiful walks and the relatively cheap digs—my reason for coming to Hillcrest in the first place was my aging mother. She'd already been renting a tiny studio here for nearly twenty years when I decided to leave Oceanside and look for any affordable place I could find in her neighborhood. There was never any thought of our living together; Mama adores her privacy as much as I do mine, and her small room is still perfect for her. Now that she can barely walk, she braces herself against the sink or the walls while moving about. There are dangers in living alone at her age, but she is extremely lucky to have two close neighbors, Russ and

Ken, who really seem to care about her. I believe they would hear - and respond to - a cry of distress if she let one fly. Plus, she wears a medical alert pendant. But as a rule. I'm her first recourse whenever help is needed. Even if she happens to call in the middle of the night, it takes me only a few minutes to sprint over there — and you can believe I do sprint, what with all the two-legged vermin prowling the streets. Fortunately, my mother's calls for help are rare, but I always sleep in my clothes just in case, like

a firefighter expecting to slide down the pole.

I don't have any wheels, and Mama has only the two on her wheelchair, but it's okay. Mama weighs only eighty-seven pounds, so I can easily trundle her over to her dermatologist's office six blocks away. Her dentist? Only two blocks. That kind of convenience is one of Hillcrest's finest features. Because it's a medical beehive swarming with specialists, I'm never at a loss for what to do about my mom's myriad afflictions. Anything from skin cancer to pyorrhea gets dealt with

right away. The rickety little wheelchair is also ideal for recreational outings. Mama loves browsing in thrift stores, the way some women like to fawn over jewelry and purses at Nordstrom. So when the mood strikes her, I roll her over to Father Joe's on University Avenue. The only difficult part is avoiding certain sad situations along the way — things I'd rather Mama didn't have to see. Sometimes we inadvertently end up on sidewalks that are buried in garbage. More often than not, there are halfclothed human beings wallowing in this defilement. Some of them are screaming, flailing their arms and legs, or picking relentlessly at suppurating wounds. It's hard to believe that this kind of squalor has become commonplace in the sort of urban playground that Hillcrest has become. Just a stone's throw away, there are noisy, crowded bars and popular outdoor restaurants. The close proximity to laughter and frivolity only deepens the shock.

Naturally, my confused Mama never knows how to take this.

"My God, what's wrong with this world?" she asked me just last week. "How come nobody helps these poor hobos?"

Hobos. To hear her talk, you'd think that every destitute person in town had just jumped from the cattle car of a moving train. But she means well in her struggle to understand the grotesque side of the carnival.

I always give her the same lame answer. "Sometimes they do get help, Mama. The police have an outreach program, and I've seen the locals offering food and blankets."

"The locals? Who are the locals? Oh, watch out. There's a pile of dog poop on the sidewalk. Right ahead of us."

"That's not dog poop, Mama," I assured her.

"Well, what is it, then?"
"Guess! Anyway, I see
it. Don't worry."

"I'm not worried. But I still say it looks like dog poop."

"Say what you will."

Nobody, not even my opinionated mother, can educate me on the subject of fecal matter. I worked for too many years in North County nursing homes not to know doggie doo from the human sort. Prior to that job, I'd found real camaraderie and good times in a couple of Ocean-side massage parlors. I loved being a masseuse, so I dragged that gig out for over a decade. Then my age began to show in subtle ways — apart from arthritic hands and an aching back. I realized what was happening to my face, neck, and svelte figure when customers started asking me if they could choose a younger girl. A question like that bodes ill in a massage parlor. When I didn't feel pretty anymore, I knew the time had come to leave my fun iob behind.

So it was goodbye to loud rock music, vibrating waterbeds, spinning disco balls, and mirrored ceilings. I traded in my long glittery dresses and high heels for dull scrubs and sturdy (but staid) white nursing shoes.

It was a rough transition, and yet strangely enough, both types of employment helped me to face what's on my plate today. My move to Hillcrest brought little or no cul-

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ture shock. The lively strip I found on University Avenue seemed practically the same as Oceanside's main drag, where those long-gone massage parlors used to be. Of course, the fluttering frenzy of rainbow flags altered the picture somewhat, but not significantly. I mean, partying is partying, right? Just like a hangover is a hangover, and a score is a score — or not. It's all good, as they say. And working with the frail elderly for so many years well, that definitely prepared me for taking care of Mama. While we were moving on towards Father Joe's, I patted the top of her curly white head and smiled. Things were going okay for us. We had no complaints — at least, not today. But Father Joe's turned out to be overcrowded with shoppers, so I pushed the wheelchair to Balboa Park. There, Mama could admire the rose garden and chuckle over the feisty crows and squirrels. Every time she sees a squirrel these days, she asks me how mine is doing, forgetting that my nocturnal visitor was a raccoon. As usual, I have to give her the whole story all over again — how the raccoon had taken her babies away so they could learn to survive on their own. Of course, Mama was intrigued by the recap, because she thinks everything I say to her is breaking news.

Then, while we were heading back home via Park Boulevard, she spotted something on the grass that really excited her. It was a large bag of women's clothing, apparently left for anyone who felt like digging into it. The used articles were clean and neatly folded, so I shared her delight in rummaging through them. Treasure troves like that are always a terrific find.

Inveterate walker that I am, I snatched up a gently worn pair of Nikes for which I had immediate need. Mom pulled out a straw hat decorated with gaudy plastic flowers. Almost viciously, she started ripping the flowers off the hatband, saying, "I'll take these over to my neighbors so they can make corsages."

"Are you talking about Russ and Ken? What would they want with corsages?"

"They can give 'em to their girlfriends for Christmas."

I laughed. "Mama, Russ and Ken don't have girlfriends. They're married."

"Well, then, they can give 'em to their wives."

"No, I mean they're married to each other. Russ and Ken are gay. Surely you've known that for a long time."

She stared at me incredulously. "I most certainly don't know it."

"Well, it's true. This has been a gay neighborhood for years and years. I guess you've forgotten that, but some people even call it the gayborhood."

"The what?"

"The gayborhood. Get it?"

"Stop talking nonsense. I don't like it." Tossing the hat and the mutilated flowers back into the bag, she mumbled, "Take me home, Georgeanne. I'm tired."

I complied—gladly. I was starting to feel pretty worn out myself.

Sometimes I find myself wondering if Mama remembers anything at all about the past. Is there, in some locked chamber of her mind, some vague recollection of the gay son she once had? She kept no photographs of Mark that I know of, nor does she ever mention him. But is

it possible that he shows up in her dreams from time to time? And what about all her years of debilitating alcoholism and the messy divorce from my dad? Has any of that stuck? I doubt it. All while my brother and I were growing up, she appeared to be lost in a fog, and today, she relates only tentatively to what's directly in front of her. Perhaps her permanent vacation from reality is for the best.

My father, far more alert to everything, was always spewing running commentaries on life as he saw it. I'll never forget a particularly stinging remark he made one time when my brother and I were young adults. He'd been grousing about the various setbacks in his life — this, that, and the other — when he finally concluded with, "I just don't know why everything had to go sour. Now I've got a daughter working in a massage parlor, and my son's a homo."

Nice going, Daddy.

I've always believed that if Mark had felt more accepted by our dad, he never would have committed suicide. I could be mistaken about that, but I don't think so. The first time I ever saw the Pride Parade in Hillcrest, there was a man walking all by himself amid the steady progression of floats and marching bands. He was an older guy with a big smile on his face, and he was holding up a sign that said, "I LOVE MY GAY SON." Reading those words, I burst into tears and struggled to run away, but I was blocked by the cheering throng. It was all so overwhelming that I almost screamed with grief and rage. If only my dad could have borrowed a leaf from that man's book.

But you know, we all have our own book. There were simply no chapters on tolerance and understanding in my dad's, and I don't condemn him for those missing chapters — or at least, I try not to. Because his igno-

rance wasn't entirely his fault. He was just lugging around the flawed volume that he'd been handed as a kid.

Like Mark, my dad is gone now. So it's just Mama and me, hanging on by a thread in a place that seems far away even when you're there. Oh, we've got a few relatives scattered about the country, but I certainly wouldn't know any of them if I saw them. They probably wouldn't recognize me, either, what with my lived-in face and some of the ratty outfits I wear. I feel lucky that Hillcrest isn't one of those buttoned-up burgs where you have to worry about people sizing you up! Anything goes in the gayborhood — purple hair, lacy tutus, outrageous tattoos — whatever you believe is you. Who around here is going to criticize any of us for being ourselves?

Personally, I feel most like myself when I'm just out walking, either alone or with my favorite companion — who doesn't happen to be my mother. The two of us are always searching for the Hillcrest of the early 1900s, because that's the era that really stirs my imagination. There is a calm allure about antique Hillcrest — the parts of it that remain, anyway. You might like to know that on the southwest corner of Essex and Vermont, there's still a metal horse ring embedded in the curb. The iceman used to tie up his wagon there while making deliveries. I step on that ring for good luck whenever I pass it.

But I'll need a lot more than luck to face the unknown that I know is coming. I'll need hope. That's why I'm glad I met Mama Raccoon.

Emily Dickinson wrote, "Hope is the thing with feathers that perches in the soul." Well, for me, hope is the thing with fur and a ringed tail. So I'll just follow her.

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sandbox into a race course. I have very little faith in city staff taking action. Please keep your children safe. If by chance you might know the parents/grandparents of these teens, notify them what their kids are up to."

The NextDoor photos show tire marks on the grass and sand. "As teens, they have no idea of the cost of sod or city park maintenance workers' labor (\$27 hour each)," commented one neighbor. "This is probably thousands of dollars in landscape repair cost to taxpayers."

However, neighborhood resident Lorenzo Almodovar argued that "we did the same thing when I was a kid" in the '70s. "So much of the time, we were outside. Most of the boys and a few girls played in Mission Village Little League. We had some vacant lots with jumps and drop-offs for bikes or hanging out at our elementary schools or the rec center. At Cubberley Elementary School, we would put all the outside cafeteria tables together — either in a straight line so we could ride our bikes on them and drop off, or in a figure eight so we could play chase. That usually didn't last too long; someone would fall their bike and crash hard."

Anthony A., a former little leaguer from Linda Vista in the 1980s, agreed with Almodovar. "Let kids do more outdoor shit," he said. "They should ride BMX bikes and skateboard everywhere, like we did. We didn't have cell phones and Uber Eats, and we'd ride to 7-Eleven, which was so rad. Our kids and grandkids nowadays get bored real easily and might be the ones tagging our own neighborhoods."

To that point: Jim K. from Mission Valley recently saw "two female teenagers tagging the wall under the I-15 freeway overpass on Rancho Mission Road — who must have been around 14 years old. I gave them both the stink eye as I drove by and later. the graffiti to Get It Done. I used to think all the graffiti in

our area was gang-related, not realizing that a lot of it just may be from some teenage kid living in your own community."

NATIONAL CITY **Flood muddies** the waters **Tenant situation** unclear in wake

of damage The county's 60-day ban on evictions and rent increases, put in place after historic flooding in January,

ends this month. But uncertainty about the situation lingers. National City officials voted 3-2 recently to continue to rely on the existing county ordinance, rather than create local tenant protections that might include provisions such as relocation assistance and the right to return after repairs.

"It's clear the county's moratorium will end at the end of the

ban on evictions and rent hikes for the hardest hit neighborhoods. Spokesperson Melanie Woods said property owners should not have to pay relocation and temporary benefits after the disaster. "The vast majority of tenants have qualified for emergency aid. They don't need relocation assistance to find stable housing while their units are being repaired."

Property owners are making large, unexpected repairs,

The city has now twice held back on enacting an emergency rent protection ordinance that would help renters if, say, apartment remodeling leads to big rent hikes. According to the city attorney, there have been no evictions. Not that this was always clear as the disaster unfolded on January 22.

"Nearly 200 units were completely flooded, many of them tenants," said Rodriguez. The next day, as city crews

month," said councilmember Jose Rodriguez, who urged the city to act now, given the low apartment vacancy rate. But other council members wanted to hold off on an emergency ordinance, saying that the city needs more information about what landlords need to rebuild, how long repairs will take, and whether the county might extend the moratorium. "We can always call a special meeting and have an urgency ordinance," said mayor Ron Morrison.

According to city attorney Barry Schultz, the county ordinance doesn't address whether tenants must pay rent while not in their units, or if they have a right to return without a rent hike. The displaced tenants have, however, been advised to keep paying rent in order to hold on to their rentals.

The industry trade group California Apartment Association opposed any new ordinance protecting tenants in National City — just as they did when the county imposed its

she added, often without collecting rent. The group also objects to the delay of rent increases, which typically occurs when signing new leases. Blocking that, she said, would just delay signing new leases. "They're gonna push back until they can increase it to the desired amount. Tenants would be put on monthto-month leases until the rent cap is lifted, she said. "This short-term cap could actually result in less housing stability."

To date, the county's emergency measure has provided temporary lodging to 770 families, according to Carlos Aguirre, the city's housing director. Both the state and National City declared a state of emergency, which helped bring funding to those who were flooded out of their homes. Six weeks on, most of those families have been helped, Aguirre said. But in a city where, according to mayor Ron Morrison, there are almost zero vacancies, the end of the moratorium may not allow a soft landing for all.

assessed the damage, they realized a cluster of mobile homes and apartments by Division Street and the 7th Street channel were severely flooded. Apartment managers in the area said everything was fine, that tenants would be taken care of. "Then what happened was, people were ghosted for two days." Twentyfour families had been given a two-day voucher, then were not contacted at all. When they finally were, on January 26, tenants of the hard-hit Highland View apartments were told the repairs would take months, and they would have to seek new homes. They received checks for two months' worth of rent. The county hadn't yet acted and, amid the confusion, dozens of families were facing eviction.

Mayor Morrison agreed there "really wasn't a plan." The city has an earthquake plan, he said. "But this one, there really wasn't a plan for there to be a flood in San Diego."

the border crossing, according to the March 1 report. Matamoros, Tamaulipas is in first place among the border cities, with 400 asylum hopefuls.

But certainty of passage is not guaranteed and the path to a presumably better life in the U.S. is complicated. "Grupo Beta and INM officials verify asylum seekers' CBP One appointment confirmations or walk up approval before they can enter one of the two ports of entry. If individuals do not have a CBP One appointment or are not previously confirmed walk ups, they are not permitted to enter."

The document goes on to say that "the majority of migrants in Tijuana" are backed up "in shelters and motels, which are currently at or past capacity. Shelters have also reported insufficient funds and increased insecurity in recent months. Most migrants in the city are from Cuba, Haiti, Venezuela, Mexico, and Russian speaking countries."

With burgeoning demand for asylum, the document says, hurdles remain for would-be border crossers. "The first challenges are related to accessibility, as asylum seekers need to be literate, speak one of the application's three languages (English, Spanish, and Haitian Creole), have access to a cell phone with either cell or internet service, and have basic knowledge of the application. If these hurdles are surmounted, the next set of challenges center around the application's registration process. Despite numerous updates, some asylum seekers continue to report error messages. Yet, the most pressing issue continues to be that the number of daily appointments is less than the number of waiting individuals. This means that individuals may wait for up to several months before receiving an appointment."

SDR: Why Unitarian Universalism?

PP: I went church-shopping. There was nothing broken about me that

needed to be fixed and nothing about me that needed to be addressed. I was allowed to be, explore, and wonder with people...and it was affirming to be told I was fine just as I

SDR: Where's the strangest place you found God?

PP: Even before I heard the call to ministry, there was a woman who came into a job I worked at. It was a customer service job and I was doing an intake for her. She was telling me about herself and she suddenly said, "My husband died a year ago and I feel like I'm crazy and I feel like no one listens to me." Then she stopped, stared at me for a second and threw her hands over her mouth. "Oh,

my God, I can't believe I said that to you!" I paused and said she wasn't crazy and she happened to say what she did to someone who knew what it was to lose someone. (It was four or five years after my boyfriend died.) To be able to sit in that compassionate place with her and help her be heard and see her feel relief for the first time—that was one of the most spiritual experiences I've ever had. I think that's what God is-those moments of connection that feed our souls. I like to hope that's what she got that day.

SDR: Where do you go when vou die?

PP: As a non-doctrinal faith, our church has a number of congregants who don't think

that there is anything after death—we have a number of humanists, atheists, and agnostics. We also have Christians who believe they'll go to heaven, and we have Jews and Muslims who believe their own various version of the afterlife. All of those things are equally welcomed in our space. There will never be an

right or wrong; that's just a truth for each individual. For myself, I hope we get to go somewhere. The earth is incredible, so my idea of heaven is that we get to go someplace like this but without all the horrible things—no illness, death, anger, hatred, pain. I hope we get to go someplace like this and see our loved ones again. If we don't, that's OK too. I like to think I've lived a life good, happy, and worth living here. So, if I don't get to go somewhere, I get to experience some of that here on earth.

India Hawthorne is very happy in San Diego, Citrus trees blooming

India Hawthorn (*Rhaphiolepsis indica*), is one of the most common flowering shrubs used in landscaping as hedges and dividers in San Diego. It is blooming best right now, with blossoms ranging in hue from pinkish white to vivid pink. The bloom will be followed by dark blue berries that will remain through winter. The plant, which has several varieties, is an evergreen, and is not only drought resistant but also resistant to salt spray — so it is common in coastal gardens.

The Sticky-Sweet Odor Of Citrus Blossoms is wafting on the spring breezes this year, as it has in every year since the 1870s,

He chooses the right name, he rides a huge sandworm, he...well, he does what saviors do. By this point, it should come as no surprise to learn that director Denis Villenueve is very good at shots and scenes that capture scale and scope - big images for big stories for the big screen - and he keeps the long and layered story rolling along like windswept dunes in a desert. He's a little less surehanded when it comes to getting up close - maybe too many close-ups of stars Timothée Chalamet and Zendaya, and maybe too few conversations to illuminate Paul's (gradual?) acceptance of his destiny - and the action at the very end saps the impact of what's come immediately before. (It plays almost like a TV teaser: tune in next time!) Anyway, about those references to '60s classics at the outset: the real news here is that our

hero is not exactly a good guy. His father may have been noble, but his father was also defeated. The result is a blockbuster space opera that plays like a downbeat drama - we're a long, long way from that famous galaxy far, far away. (2024) — M.L. ★★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)



A funeral is a fine setting for a play: a static location where a great deal can happen, given the occasion of gathered family and high emotion. Maybe people can make nice at Thanksgiving, but funereal grief makes things messy in the best of circumstances, and since when is getting everyone under one roof the best of circumstances? People are likely to say things - at least, if they're not the sort who take all their emotions and bury them deeper than any grave ever dug. And the members of the Mabry and Jenkins families, gathered to mourn fallen patriarch (and pastor) Ber-

nard Jenkins, are not that sort. Really, it's only gay grandson Kenny who has obvious trouble speaking his mind — or rather, his heart, since he's brought his (white and Jewish) boy Logan along to a Black Christian funeral, in hopes of finally gaining some acceptance. (It helps that grandpa was affirming, whatever his religious convictions and/or pastoral duties.) Logan's outsider status makes for a good running joke in which even his allies mangle his name, but there's a steady stream of humor running throughout, affectionate sniping often serving to cover genuine rancor. Matriarch Baneatta really

does disapprove of her younger sister, but it's hard not to laugh when she complains about Bev's titties bulging out of her dress.

It's a good thing, because it turns out that Logan and Kenny aren't the only folks with secret sadness: everyone gets a moment here, though some are more momentous than others. (The sisters' sincere reckoning could have closed the show, so deeply did it sound the play's theme of love that endures all things.) The drama takes some time to get going, in part because Baneatta does not come across as the force of nature one might expect; rather, Kimberly King plays her as a bit defeated, a bit embittered - at first, anyway. Hand to God If Robert Askins' puppet-based play were a puppet itself, it would be stitched together from raw leather scraps (trauma), latex (sex), felt (childhood), muslin (death), and raw silk (a certain tough beauty), There would be googly eyes to signify humor, and big sharp teeth for violence, and the seams would be showing, and it would look much better from some angles than others. Angry young puppet Tyrone opens the play with a bit of silly narrative straight from the id about how we used to rut and shit as we pleased until somebody invented the group for the sake of better hunting and protection of the young, and that gave rise to right and wrong (right = good for the group, wrong = good for the individual). Okay, fine, but then we get this: "The same motherfucker who invented the group kill and team virtue...invented the devil. When I have acted badly, in order that I may stay around the campfire, all I have to do is say 'The devil made me do it." That's nonsensical on the face of it: the devil in that scenario would be the invention of a guy who hated team virtue, not its creator. It also doesn't have much to do with the play that follows, which despite the many gag lines is a seriously painful depiction of a mother and son who are both reeling from the death of Dad, and who are working through their grief in dramatic and inappropriate fashion - largely because the church to which they belong doesn't really know how to help them, even if Pastor Greg's heart is (mostly) in the right place. (He probably shouldn't be pitching woo to mom, no matter how sincerely. And it might be more believable if he mentioned Jesus on the cross now and then to a Christian trying to comprehend suffering.) The Roustabouts' production is strong, especially in the acting department. The scene where two puppets bone is little short of astonishing in its demands — the characters having a meeting of minds and hearts even as their creations have a meeting of genitals - and Adam Daniel and Samantha Ginn carry it off with such skill that it quickly ceases to be "shocking" and becomes genuinely touching. It's a shame the writing can't keep up: Tyrone's closing speech about letting ourselves off the hook for the stuff we do contradicts not only his opening rant, but everything that's just happened. King James

When basketball superstar LeBron "King" James decided to star in an ESPN special called The Decision to announce his, wait for it, decision about where he would be playing basketball after seven ultimately frustrating seasons with the Cleveland Cavaliers, many people thought it was a bit much - the millions raised for charity notwithstanding. Some sports fans may have - may have! - muttered the term "drama queen."

Not playwright Rajiv Joseph. I'm guessing he shouted "Drama king!" before getting to work on this marvelous portrait of friendship between a couple of regular guys (well, except one of them wants to be a writer) that tracks in unsubtle but intelligent fashion with James' career with Cleveland — his happy arrival, his heartbreaking departure, and his triumphant return.

"Unsubtle but intelligent" works pretty well as a descriptor for the guys in question, Matt and Shawn, the former a bit of a blunt-force screwup from a solid middle-class family, the latter a driven dreamer from more difficult circumstances. Why ves. one is white and one is black; how else to address the charges of racism that swirled around the negative response to The Decision? (The phrase that Matt uses to describe his frustration over James is the only thing that keeps this from being a perfectly built work — dramatically, it has to be there, but it sounds strange coming from his character.)

There's a grinning, astonished pleasure to be had just watching them interact, thanks in large part to the way they're embodied by Caleb Foote and Joshua Echebiri. Most good performances require the players to make us believe in the precise character of their relationships, but I can't remember when I've seen it done better. Which is good, because the relationship is the thing; basketball is just what they talk about. Well, that and the problem with America.

Ordinary People

What's left of young Conrad's family, with his successful, well-intentioned father and his beautiful, organized and remote mother, is in terrible jeopardy, as is Conrad himself. They are all "ordinary people" and each is fighting a hard battle. This play goes to the essence of a young man, his friends and family, their relationships and survival.

La Jolla Playhouse's star continues to rise, or maybe it's that the stars keep shining on La Jolla Playhouse. Having brought in film and stage star Matthew Broderick for Babbitt, they now turn to his musical counterpart, film and stage star Idina Menzel, for a musical about a woman who is literally up a tree.

Wracked by grief following the death of her son, Jesse flees her New York job, apartment, and wife Mel, and keeps fleeing until she reaches a patch of private redwood forest overseen by aging hippie Finn and justice-minded Becca. There, she learns a bit about redwoods - they're tough in a fire, and while their roots are shallow, they stay standing by intertwining them with the roots of their fellow giants - and charms her way onto a platform high up in the canopy. Once there, well — it is California.

The Playhouse has done right by Ms Menzel, in part by surrounding her with voices that can hold their own against hers; Nkeki Obi-Melekwe's "Becca's Song" comes close to stealing the show, and Zachary Noah Piser makes the very most of his 11 o'clock number. Also by going about as far as they can go with projection; calling the digital forest a backdrop doesn't do justice to its immersive power. The songs, however, are less consistently good; the cheek-by-jowl juxtaposition of the Boomeresque anthem "A Little Bit Wild" and the poignant lament "Back Then" may have you feeling like you're watching two different shows. It's not that they have different tones and subjects, it's that they have different qualities of being.

While the concept and resolution work fine, there are moments where the drama falters and the emotion becomes awkward. almost as if the actors aren't sure they can embrace what they're portraying. Oh - and there's a tree. A great big breathtaking tree. You can't ever see all of it at once, but that's part of its glory. Tartuffe

About midway through 17thcentury French satirist Moliere's splendid study of a scoundrel, my companion leaned over and whispered, "So that's where Dr. Seuss got it." Mais bien sur! Not just the rollicking rhythm and rhyme, of course — though Richard Wilbur's translation displays a master's touch in its combination of fidelity and invention. I caught maybe a single rhyme that felt ever-so-slightly out of place - a late pairing of "absurd" and "word," funnily enough, given that wordplay and absurdity are the foundational strengths of the play. (Foundational, but hardly final: As with great Shakesperean comedy, the admirable wit on the page becomes genuinely funny when spoken by a canny actor, and properly hilarious when enfleshed in smartly directed physical comedy. Special notice here to Katie Karel's sapient servent Dorine for the former and Bruce Turk's religious rogue Tartuffe for the latter — he tears into the role the way his character tears into a chicken — though the entire cast knows its business.)

So yes, Seuss sussed out the way an audience may be carried along and carried away by verse - but he also picked up a thing or two about where to carry it and why. If satire is what closes on Saturday, then you'd better show folks a good time while you feed them their medicine. Think of the unteachable Sneetches, or old Yertle the Turtle.

And yes, given the passage of a few centuries since the play's creation, and a few decades since the rise of the televangelist, we can smile and nod as poor nobleman Orgon gets so caught up in his enthusiasm for the sainted Tartuffe that he bends reason into knots for the sake of his misplaced faith. But folly is man's best friend, or at least his closest companion. and Tartuffe remains everywhere with us, despite the playwright's regis ex machina at the end.

Bonus points for making the voice of reason into something of a speechy windbag; the truth hurts, and can even take a toll on those who bear it and share it. It takes some genius to turn it into a good time for those on stage and in the audience.

stride Archie Thompson's music-intensive life is back in full swing after being derailed by Covid for a couple of years. His trio, The Archtones, plays weekly threehour sets at Eddie V's Prime Seafood in Seaport Village on Tuesday and Thursday nights, and they bump that up to four hours on Saturweek and another 20 million after that, and I don't know what it's up to now. That was great, and really kind of a fluke, too. I had done a batch of '50s-inspired tunes four or five years ago for my in a post-apocalyptic world. In the game, the bomb went

days. He's still doing the Jazz Vespers on Sundays at the First Presbyterian Church downtown, where his band performs 30 minutes of blues, jazz and gospel music before the service begins. Further, he has recently released two albums of original material: one focused on old-school soul, and the other exploring the wide-ranging roots of country music.

However, the recent writers and actors strikes did throw a wrench into his film and TV licensing endeavors. Thompson's music has been placed in TV shows such as Archer and films like The King of Staten Island. But 2023 was slow on that front — until a song that he considered to be a bit of a throwaway ("My My My Little Baby") was suddenly being heard by the millions of people streaming the Bill Burr film Old Dads

"The movie was number one on Netflix and had 30 million views in the first

stuck in the '50s. They wanted a '50s tune, and I did one and it turned out really good, and they really liked it — but they didn't use it. After I did it, my publisher was like, 'You should do a whole batch of those.' So I cranked out like twelve that I did really quick.

"At the end of the project, I was like, 'I need a doo-wop with a Frankie Valli sort of vocal on it.' From concept to being finished was probably three hours. I sang in this really dumb voice, and I sent it off to my publisher. My wife and I would listen to that song and just laugh and be like, 'That is so silly.' Of course, that was the one that got placed in Old Dads, which is probably going to be my best-paying royalties. We got a really nice placement. It plays in the movie for over two minutes. Hopefully, that will help make up for the fact that we didn't get many other placements last year."

On the album front, Thompson's Raw Soul: Vol. 3 is a gritty take on classic

soul, gospel and R&B music in which he cedes most of the lead vocal duties to local singers he admires, people like Dave Stanger and Ed Graves. (Don't go searching for volumes one and two, as Thompson says they currently exist only "in my mind.") But he tackles all the vocal duties on the country album Permanently Gone, backed by a band he has christened 94 West.

Though he's mostly known as a lounge guy, Thompson says he grew up with country music performed by the likes of Buck Owens, George Jones, and Loretta Lynn, and is very comfortable playing in

> the genre. The Archtones even play Patsy Cline and Johnny Cash songs in their lounge sets. "Real soul music has a lot of twang to it and a lot of country to it," he says. "To me, it's just not all that different. It's just subtle differences that really define the genres. So, what I wanted to do was go on

this trip and kind of hit all the bases. Some classic country. Some vintage country. Some spaghetti western. Some real Memphis-sounding stuff. Some Tex-Mex and some soundtrack-y stuff."

Thompson wants to put together some shows to showcase Permanently Gone live this year, and already has plans for a follow-up that will focus more on soundtrack music. He also has new soul songs in the works that may land on Raw Soul: Vol. 2 as that series reverse engineers itself. "I would like to put out a jazz album, too. The trio is so tight. We have been playing for so many years together. So, maybe a country, a soul and jazz album this year. It's fun to jump genres. I love it all."





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The pumping heart of OB

Half Hour Late starts late but finishes strong at the Template

A text message buzzed my pocket as I stood outside of the Template, waiting to see Half Hour Late in Ocean Beach. "You're in OB," read the text from my colleague, "and the heart and soul of OB is in Mission Bay right now." I didn't know whether to believe fellow Gonzo Report writer Gabe Garcia or not. In an attempt to back up his claim, he sent a video of the show he was watching. Was he trying to insinuate that his crowd would be better than mine?

As I listened to waves crash nearby, a healthy line began to form outside the venue/ coffeehouse, which stands just footsteps from the ocean. The doors were supposed to open at 7 pm. After standing around outside listening to the opening band Dolphins on Acid do their soundchecks until nearly 7:45, I decided to

dip out for a moment and run around the corner for a couple of slices at Pizzeria Luigi on Newport. When I returned to the Template, the doors were still closed. When I took a better look at the crowd of people, I noticed many young cats who had most likely been dropped off by their parents, or who were actually accompanied by older adults to the show.

The doors finally cracked open, and we were let inside. A rainbow of abstract colors showered the interior, and the place filled quickly. After

grabbing a cup of joe, I planted myself on a seat next to a friendly amigo named Fernando who was wearing a mustache. He told me it was his second visit to a Half Hour Late concert. "The only other time I saw them was at a birthday party for three pugs," he said. Pugs? The smashed-faced lovable little dogs? Seemed as if Half Hour Late was down for any gig. I respected that. However, this night was special, in that it was the opening show a West Coast tour for the flavorful rockers.

First, Dolphins on Acid played to the youthful crowd, which was amped with enigmatic energy. The three-piece-band gave off some Blink-182 undercurrents, only with more

echoing effects to accentuate their raw, yet cool songs. As I was getting into the music with my own movements (dancing, if you want to call it that), I felt somebody grab my shoulder. My concert mate, Neekol, had found me. "How did you get in?" I asked. "I have your ticket."

She said she'd bought her own at the door, and it had been a bit of an ordeal. "Stay here," she said, "I'll be right back." Five or ten minutes passed, and she approached me again. She said she had found somebody outside to buy the extra ticket we now held.

Back outside, the surfer dude who Neekol had talked into buying a ticket stood waiting. For twenty bucks, the guy scored a cosmic conversation with Neekol and a ticket to the rest of the show. I'd say he got himself a hell of a Saturday night deal. Then we got back into a line that seemed, mysteriously, to keep growing. "You guys can go inside without me," the surfer guy said. "You've already got your wristbands."

We told him that we'd stay outside with him until he wanted to go in. "We're okay, brother, we won't make you go in alone," I told him. "You see, there's all sorts of loons out here that want to feed you to the sharks and throw your surfboard from the cliffs, but we won't let that happen. We're your friends now. Would you like a mushroom gummy?"

After we got inside again, Half Hour Late grabbed the stage and began jamming some catchy songs. "These guys remind me of The Grateful Dead a little bit," I yelled over the crowd to Neekol. Coincidentally, a song or two later, the quartet covered a Dead song. That's when I busted out my phone and clicked record. I texted the video to Gabe in MB, who's a well-known Deadhead, letting him know he was missing out on a new breed in which he might be interested. Then I asked whether he had noticed the jam-packed crowd in my video. Bouncing up and around were bodies — many young, some not so young, but all happy. An artery from the heart of Ocean Beach may have trickled some love over Mission Bay that night, but it was pumping heavy on Niagara Avenue.

Looking forward to spring shows

The opening of The Jacobs Music Center at Copley Symphony Hall will not be taking place this spring. The hall was initially scheduled to open in November of 2023, and then in March of 2024. Delays in the process have resulted in a complete reshuffling of the concert deck for the remainder of the 2023-2024 Jacobs Masterworks Series.

Conductor Michael Tilson Thomas was to make his debut with the SDSO this March, but a mutual agreement was reached to postpone that until next season. Happily, pianist Lang Lang will still be performing with the symphony on Friday, April 12, at The Rady Shell at Jacobs Park. Lang Lang will be performing Camille Saint-Saëns' Piano Concerto No. 2. That concert will also include Pytor Tchaikovsky's Swan Lake Suite. International cello legend Yo-Yo Ma is joining SDSO at The Civic Theatre on Tuesday, May 7. Ma will be the soloist in Edward Elgar's Cello Concerto. Tchaikovsky's Symphony No. 5 and Richard Wagner's Prelude to Act III of Die Meistersinger von Nürnberg will also be performed. It's hard to imagine a more robust program than that.

While those promise to be fine, fine concerts, the crown jewel comes on Saturday, May 18, at The Shell. The first piece is Felix Mendelssohn's Violin Concerto. Mendelssohn's effort sits between Beethoven's transcendent violin concerto and Johannes Brahms's offering in the idiom. While Mendelssohn may not have the same stature as his German counter-

parts, his violin concerto is a gem of the romantic era that has remained popular since its premiere in 1845.

As fine as the Mendelssohn is, the headliner for this concert is Act I of Wagner's Die Walküre. It is often performed and even recorded as a standalone piece. I used to have a recording with Placido Domingo in the role of Siegmund. For this concert, the role of Siegmund will be performed by tenor Viktor Antipenko. When I YouTubed him, the results yielded a video I watched at least a decade ago. I was going through the roster of AVA (Academy of Vocal Arts) and trying to listen to all of the artists who were studying there at the time.

AVA is the premiere opera program in the United

Try Tchaikovsky, part of this robust program!

States. Founded in 1933, it is extremely competitive. In any given year, there are only about 30 singers at the school. Emerging artists from around the world apply for this immersive program, which is provided free of tuition, due to the generosity of its founders.

Playing the role of Siegmund's fraternal twin is soprano Jennifer Holloway. Soon, she will be making debuts at both The **Dutch National Opera and** the Vienna State Opera. For both houses, she will be performing the vocally and dramatically demanding role of Salome in Richard Strauss's Salome.

The role of Hunding will be sung by bass Peter Rose. He is the best type of opera singer — mature and seasoned. Rose has been performing internationally for decades, and is an established Wagnerian singer.

Barn House arrives as the last smoked meat standing in **Lemon Grove**

The Barn House BBQ, 8099 Broadway, Lemon Grove. I had not yet heard that Lemon Grove was about to lose its best barbecue restaurant, when I walked into its newest. Last week, Coop's West Texas BBQ announced it would close its retail counter on Lemon Grove Avenue, and shift its focus to catering.

But I can't pretend Coop's didn't cross my mind when, only a few days earlier, and just a few blocks to the northeast, I sat down to a tableful of the Kansas City style barbecue offered at newly opened The Barn House BBQ. This much larger restaurant takes over the space previously occupied by the short-lived Italian eatery InPasta, and in fact, the charge for my feast of smoked meats still registered as InPasta on my credit card bill.

And yet, there was no mistaking the changes inside. Frosted glass and greenery had been replaced with whitewashed brick and vintage auto repair shop imagery, and the gelato bar had been replaced with the promise of smoked cheesecake.

We needn't get caught in the weeds over the differences between Texas and Kansas City BBQ, but a quick menu comparison shows that Coop's brisket, jerk chicken, and hot links are replaced here by beef ribs, smoked chicken, and kielbasa.

The availability of beef ribs are what convinced me to show up, to be honest. Most of the promotional press I'd seen beforehand highlighted the restaurant's so-called Grove Burrito: "Smoked BBQ pulled chicken, BBQ aioli, fries, cheese, avocado, and pico de gallo." Obviously, this is a BBQ-inflected take on the California burrito, and maybe it's enjoyable. But I love burritos too much to sully their name with BBQ sauce, wherever it may lie on the spectrum between sweet and tangy.

Unlike burritos, beef ribs are a rarity in San Diego, so I ignored the fusion and stuck to plates featuring a few BBQ standards: pork ribs (\$26 half rack, \$31 full), smoked chicken (\$14 half, \$25 full), and a smoked turkey sandwich (\$16), to go with those beef ribs (\$21 for two). Plus a kielbasa for \$8.50, because clearly, I was hungry. And the beef ribs definitely stood out: well-trimmed and tender, with subtle smoke and...a tangy sauce?

Yes, indeed: a bit more vinegar than I expected from a Kansas City sauce, but I prefer it that way, so I approached my spareribs with the same optimism. However, these were not as tidily trimmed as I'm accustomed to, nor were they even chopped into individual bones. Rather, the half rack arrived with a layer of meat and fat thick enough to obscure any signs of the ribs themselves.

Armed only with a plastic knife and fork, I asked that the kitchen slice them for me,

> surprised when I asked for sliced ribs than I had been to receive an unsliced order. Maybe there's a KC pitmaster out there who can straighten this out for me, but in the meantime, the rib meat proved so tender that a plastic fork could tear it apart. Put that on a California burrito, and I may bite.

I walked away feeling that Barn House offers more highs than lows, but

needs to add a bit of polish to its BBQ game. And I mused that it would play second fiddle as long as Coop's was around. Which wasn't very long, as it happened. So, given that Barn House gets to move forward as the top BBQ spot in Lemon Grove, I'll leave you with a word about the restaurant's secret weapon. It's not the (less intriguing than it sounds) smoked cheesecake, but the game room in the back. Head past the dining room and you'll find a spare room featuring foosball, two pool tables, vintage arcade games, and walls covered in vivid spray paint murals.

Named after the Seals' mascot, Salty's Escape is a Mexican-Style cerveza brewed with corn and puffed Jasmine rice, lending it a light body and a mild biscuit flavor. At 4.8%, this light-bodied beer is ideal for casually sipping throughout a game without getting too much of a buzz.

Previously, the Seals had partnerships with local breweries Coronado Brewing Company

and ${\bf Kings}$ and ${\bf Convicts}.$ While those breweries would host viewing parties and occasionally offer a beer on special at Seals games, neither went as far as brewing a special beer just for Seals fans.

Speaker describes Seals games as raucous events that needed their own beer. "Our fans come to Pechanga Arena and they like to have fun. They like rock and roll, dive bars, and a good beer with friends. Our games have a highenergy, action-packed party atmosphere. That

environment goes perfectly with a few cold beers, and Salty's Escape really embodies that." An easy drinking beer - not unlike the Mexican beers often found in coolers at house parties and incognito at the beach — Salty's Escape makes a good pairing for San Diego's box lacrosse franchise.



Mid-range fleet scoring bluefin limits off Ensenada – rockfish to open at all depths April 1st (no foolin')

Dock Totals 3/10 - 3/16: 903 anglers aboard 40 half-day to 3-day trips out of San Diego landings over the past week caught 24 bluefin tuna, 13 calico bass, 6 halibut, 24 lingcod, 11 lobster (39 released), 42 rock crab, 337 rockfish, 625 sand bass, 610 sculpin, 107 sheephead, 3 triggerfish, 1069 whitefish, and 6 vellowtail.

Saltwater: Checking in on the 1.5-Day to 3-Day fleet this morning, it looks like the bluefin bite has turned on for the few boats running trips south to the grounds. The fish are spread out in several large schools from near the Corner of to off of San Quintin. Last week, the fish were too far out for pangeros, but as of March 16, Jaime's Pangas running out of the Old Mill reported the first pangero-caught bluefin tuna this year from outside the 240 Bank, about 20 miles offshore from San Ouintin.

Though no bluefin made it into the official landing counts yet (as the boats are still out), San Diego boats working the area were calling in with limits. The Tribute, Polaris Supreme, and Pacific Dawn each had limits of two fish per angler per day from 30- to 150-pounds and were wrapping up their trips in the search of yellowtail and rockfish. Next week's report should have at least 100

bluefin in the counts, and the word is out, so book your trip now. The Polaris Supreme is booked full through mid-April, but there are spots available on both the Tribute and the Pacific

The Tribute is running 1.5-Day trips departing on Fridays and the Pacific Dawn is running trips departing on Friday and Sunday. Both boats will be adding trips in April, or sooner if the demand calls for it. The Old Glory is running two-day trips beginning Friday departing at 10 in the morning so they can take full advantage of the nighttime bite that has been producing the larger tuna. During the daytime, schools tend to run 30- to 60-pounds, while the night bite is resulting in most of the 100-pound plus units.

As with the other mid-range boats targeting bluefin, the Old Glory will be adding trips in April. As they have been having good luck on bluefin since the beginning of March, their trips are 'bluefin or bust' and run directly to the grounds offshore. The Old Glory trips will fish outside of Mexican waters, so no passports are required for those runs. Always check with the landings for any changes on that, as a shutdown in the offshore bite may result in coastal

yellowtail fishing, which would require a passport and Mexican license. More 1.5to 3-Day mid-range boats will be coming online in late March and early April and will be most likely targeting bluefin, including the Legend, Relentless, Vendetta, and

While the bluefin are heating up offshore, yellowtail have been showing a little closer to home. Along with a couple caught on local half day boats, The Mission Belle reported a handful caught at the Coronado Islands. That and a continued bite off San Quintin and Colonet are good signs of more to come for extended trips along the northern Baja Pacific coast.

While the long-range boats are still doing very well on big yellowfin tuna and wahoo down south off the high spots along the Baja coast near Bahia Magdelena, winter trips of 8 to 22 days will be winding down this month as the boats turn their attention to shorter runs of 2 to 5 days targeting bluefin and yellowtail for the spring season. Many of those trips aboard the larger vessels are already booked, but one can get on the waiting list in case any anglers drop out. Beginning in April through June, the Intrepid, Red Rooster, Royal Polaris, and Shogun have plenty of trips scheduled to get folks out there and on 'em, so there will be more options going forward. With the fish thus far cooperating

nicely, it looks to be an excellent fishing year ahead for anglers heading out of our world-class

After a slow, wet, and lumpy winter, angler counts are beginning to shoot up from a few hundred per week to nearly a thousand. It won't be long before the landings will be abuzz with activity as thousands of anglers per week take advantage of the excellent fishing indicated by the early the season. With rockfish opening on April 1 in all depths, it will be a very busy April for the 1/2-Day to 3-Day fleet.

Surf fishing has been heating up for anglers working the beaches, with a lot of spawning perch, a smattering of halibut, and California corbina in the mix. Sand crabs, plastics on a Carolina rig, or jerk baits have been the go-to methods for those doing well on the sand. Spotted bay bass and halibut are on the chew in both bays for folks working the docks and eelgrass in float tubes, kayaks, and private or rental boats. Swim baits and grubs seem to be doing the trick best in the bays. Spring has officially sprung, and it is drying out, warming up, and getting fishy out there — so go get 'em!

- Arthur "Jack" Schubarth, 80, of Vaughn, Montana, pleaded guilty on March 12 to two felony wildlife crimes after the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks conducted a years-long investigation, Business Insider reported. Schubarth was accused of buying, selling and breeding "alternative" livestock, such as mountain sheep and mountain goats, for captive hunting operations. Between 2013 and 2021, court documents said, he conspired with others to create a large hybrid species of sheep that would garner higher prices from shooting preserves. To do so, he brought parts of Marco Polo argali sheep from Kyrgyzstan to the U.S. without declaring them. His other crimes include forging veterinary documents and shipping hybrid semen to other breeders. He faces jail time, fines and supervised re-

- At the Goodwill store in Du Bois, Pennsylvania, workers found a treasure in a box of old Lego pieces, United Press International reported on March 12: a 14-karat gold Kanohi Hau mask from Lego's Bionicle collection. Originally priced at Goodwill at \$14.95, the piece eventually sold for \$18,100 to an anonymous collector. "We didn't know it was worth anything until people started asking if they could buy it for \$1000," said Chad Smith, vice president of e-commerce and technology for Goodwill. Lego created only 30 pieces in gold in 2001.
- LAD Bible reported on March 5 about two unacquainted Brits who were headed to a holiday in Bangkok, Thailand. At the airport, Mark Garland, 58, of Wiltshire, tried to check in, but gate staff told him he already had. After some sleuthing, they realized there was another Mark Garland (62, from Bristol) on the flight -- and the look-alikes were seated next to each other. As it happens, they live only about 15 miles apart and sometimes ride the same bus. They even have a friend in common. "We were so shocked by how strange it was," said the younger Garland. "It was crazy -- I have never known anything like it," said the older. "I've made a friend for life."

That's Disappointing

The Pittsburgh Penguins planned to provide prized playthings to their passionate patrons on the evening of March 14, ESPN reported. (OK, that's enough of that.) NHL legend Jaromir Jagr bobbleheads were promised for the game against the San Jose Sharks – but the cargo was stolen during transit. Penguins president of business operations Kevin Acklin said the team is looking forward to "resolving this theft and delivering the prized Jagr bobbleheads to their rightful homes, with our fans." The hockey great commented, "The legend of Jagr continues."

Field Report

New Orleans Police Superintendent Anne Kirkpatrick told city council members on March 13 that rats had infested the department's building so thoroughly that they made their way into the evidence room and were eating confiscated marijuana. "They're all high," she said, according to the Associated Press. "The uncleanliness is off the charts." She elaborated, saying the building is full of mold and cockroaches, and staff suffer broken air conditioning and elevators.

The Golden Age of Air Travel

- Indonesia's National Transportation Safety Committee reported this week that on a Jan. 25 Batik Air flight, both pilots fell asleep for about 30 minutes as the plane flew off its "correct flight path." Sky News reported that when the plane, carrying

153 passengers and four flight attendants, reached 36,000 feet, the 32-year-old pilot asked his co-pilot to take over while he rested. But the 28-year-old, whose wife recently delivered twins, also nodded off, and the plane flew itself for 241 miles before they woke up. They were able to get the plane back on the flight path and land safely in Jakarta.

The Passing Parade

- On March 5 in Green Bay, Wisconsin, a 42-year-old man was charged with battery and disorderly conduct with a weapon after his daughter called 911, saying her dad was naked and had a gun. The Smoking Gun reported the story -- and the much more compelling backstory about Deez-Nuts Lee Kroll, the defendant. In 2011, Derrick Lee Kroll, then 29, petitioned the court and paid \$164.50 for a name change. On the form, Kroll, who seems to be spelling-challenged, wrote his preferred name: Dez-Nuts Lee Kroll, and said his reason for the change was that "I with out a dout HATE MY NAME." Six years later, it occurred to Dez-Nuts that he had spelled the name wrong, and he went to court to change his name again.
