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

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

# Do crimes, get money

# Foreign investment pours in as blood

"Lo más seguro mataron a alguien" ("Probably, someone got shot"), I exclaimed to my girlfriend as I was driving down Calle Cuarta (4th Street) in downtown Tijuana on the afternoon of February 15. Yellow tape blocked my way and a motorcycle cop directed traffic.

Later that night, walking to Insurgente's tap room for a beer, I saw a pool of blood on the corner of 4th Street and Avenida Revolución, a touristy spot. Three unlit candles and a plastic water bottle were placed on the corner. Across the street, the LizardBear mascot from the company TaskUs danced happily, enticing people to enter the brewery to be recruited to work for a call center. A heavy police force and the Mexican army covered the perimeter, but other than that, the city acted like nothing had happened.

"I saw the killer run down the street,"

said the bartender inside Insurgente. "A nearby cop, instead of chasing the suspect, stayed with the dying body and did nothing but call other cops." The victim died on the scene. Tijuana news reported that the suspect was not apprehended. Most crimes go unsolved. Despite heavy police and army presence throughout the city, murders happen everywhere, in broad daylight. It is

crimes like fraud and threats have been increasing exponentially."

Despite this, foreign investment hasn't stopped; more than \$2.6 billion USD was invested last year in new and old Baja businesses, an 18 percent increase from 2022. The city's economy and population continue to show steady growth.

Baja California reported more than 400 homicides in the first two months of 2024. Of those, 325 were in Tijuana. "We are having a violent start of the year," says Roberto Quijano, president of Consejo del Ciudadano de Seguridad del Estado de Baja California (Baja's state's safety council). The total of homicides in the state in 2023 was 2455, of those, 1855 were in Tijuana — 197 fewer than in 2022. Downtown Tijuana was the site of 169. As usual, the violence is attributed to narco wars; cartels fighting over turf.

> But it is not only cartels; the rest of the city continues to be a mess. The headline on the newspaper Zeta for the last week of March reads "Wanted Cops for Murder." The subhead reads "More Uncoordinated Road Construction Chokes Alternative Routes." The city is affected by crumbling bridges, abandoned projects, incomplete infrastructure, and a corrupt government that funnels money to shady contractors. "Other crimes are increasing," says a story on Uniradio, "like stolen vehicles, home and

council meeting — including councilmembers who were unaware the agenda item was in the forecast — sent it back for an overhaul that's expected by June. Councilmember Marcus Bush made a motion to bring the issue back after further research, to immediately address unsafe conditions in encampments, and consider a comprehensive approach to homelessness that includes, among other things, the local rental market.

City attorney Barry Schultz defended the ordinance, saying by narrowing the focus to health and safety, the city's ban can be enforced while not "criminalizing homelessness" or undermining the city's efforts at outreach. Under the city's proposal, if an encampment poses an immediate threat or unreasonable risk to any particular individual or to public health or safety, the ordinance will be enforceable regardless of shelter bed availability.

#### Proposal for homeless encampments focuses on health and safety

San Diego's ban on camping on public property, which went into effect last summer, may have pushed more unsheltered people into National City. And while the evidence is mostly anecdotal, National City officials

have used that ban to help hammer out their own proposal, modeled after San Diego's and focused around health and safety. The ordinance would affect public areas within two city blocks of sensitive sites such as schools, transit, or waterways.

Such bans are hard to enforce, since courts have found them to be illegal where there are no available shelter beds. And that's where things get sticky. A planned rescue mission and navigation center has not yet been built in National City, and the entire county is short on beds. "All of the shelters in general are packed," said Qiana Williamson, a member



of the city's HOME team, which helps connect people to housing, aid, mental health and substance use services. "Someone said to me today, 'Hey, I'd like to go into a shelter. Anywhere would do.' I can call tomor-

row morning at 8 am, it's full."

Homelessness has been rising in National City for some time. In 2020, there were 125 unsheltered people found during the annual Point in Time count conducted by the San Diego Regional Task Force on Homelessness. It bumped up to 149 in 2022, and in 2023, grew



and crannies. "We find them in Caltrans areas, under bridges; they're pretty much everywhere." Williamson said the HOME team will often hear things like, "'Oh, we're getting a break from San Diego, and staying here."

More information on the claim that people are coming from San Diego is expected

less individuals." From June through December 2023, the HOME team was able to help 89 people and place 25 into housing. Another 90 refused services, said Williamson.

"It takes time to gain trust," said councilmember Luz Molina. "I'm afraid that National City going from this — the approach the HOME team has taken - to now going towards a

#### No green at tendergreens? Qualms over a cashless future

When D.D. Smith and his girlfriend first went into tendergreens, a cashless restaurant in Mission Valley, he recalls, "I didn't want to get anything. Every time I find a store or restaurant that only takes credit, I don't want to visit or buy from them." Smith sees the rise of cashless stores as "an inevitable

> end, yet I keep pushing my hopeless resistance. We are living in the trend towards a cashless society — unhappily. But I refuse to partake in the digital machine, and continue to pay with cash."

> Going cashless has obvious advantages for businesses: quicker transactions, less risk of cash robbery and theft (which means fewer security.

"Compact, lightweight, and designed for applications ranging from fixed security installations to mid-sized vehicles and vessels, the LRAD 500X-RE easily mounts and transports to provide law enforcement, homeland security, and defense personnel unparalleled long-

range communication and safe, scalable non-kinetic escalation of force," says a description of one of the devices posted on the website of its maker, Genasys Inc., formerly known as LRAD, Inc..

Otherwise known as a Long Range Acoustic Device, the quasi-weapon "emits a focused and directional beam of sound," per SDPD's report. "The sound levels of this device are controllable and range from

a mild public address type speaker sound level, for giving directions, to a high intensity, high pitch sound designed to deter or move subjects from an area." The city paid almost \$87,000 for two of the devices using 2008 grant funds, according to new report.

"The American Civil Liberties Union calls LRADs 'acoustic weapons' and recommends not using them until concerns about their potential to cause hearing loss are addressed," notes a June 19, 2020 account by Austin TV station KXAN when that city's police department was proposing to substitute LRADS for "the use of beanbag rounds and tear gas against protesters."

Expert Robert Auld told the station that "all LRAD models can reach at least 130 decibels.' For perspective, Auld says a normal conversation between two people reaches 60 to 70 decibels, a heavy metal concert can reach 120 decibels, and the threshold for pain in the ears is 130 decibels. When you're getting up to 120, 130 decibels, exposure of just a couple minutes could cause hearing dam-

age, Auld said. 'Being next to a jet engine is 140 decibels, that could damage your hearing within seconds, he added."

Wrote **Don Bauder** in an October 8, 2009 report regarding Genasys, then called American Technology Corp: "The company admits that the perception that LRAD is unsafe may hurt sales. San Diego Sheriff Bill Gore has placed an LRAD device at local town hall meetings. Two candidates opposing him in the upcoming election, Jay LaSuer and Jim Duffy, denounced

the dangers of the device." Why San Diego cops still own two is not addressed by the report.

Also during 2023, San Diego cops deployed 125 .308 Semi-Automatic and 125 .308 Bolt-Action rifle-wielding snipers to an array of public events, including "baseball games, concerts, marathons, golf tournaments, large conventions, etc." as part of the department's Sniper Over Watch program, which also covers selected SWAT actions.

report to the San Diego Historical Resources board by the city planning department identified the site of Todd Gloria's latest proposed homeless megacenter as a "potential historic resource" of the 1960s, casting another political shadow over the project and likely raising the cost of the San Diego Democrat's long-troubled quest to handle leagues of unhoused flooding city streets.

"The building at 3564 Kettner Boulevard is one of several automobile showrooms that were constructed during this decade. Automobile-related businesses such as service stations and garages were also attracted to the Pacific Highway area," says the report's account of historic and architectural landmarks of the 1960s, featuring a photo of the structure.

'This can be attributed to the car culture that blossomed after World War II as well as the development of two freeways in the area, Interstate 5 and 8." The ostensible historical and architectural merits of Gloria's homeless site pick might slow or derail the pitch he has vowed to make for funding from other governmental

> agencies, which often adhere to stricter preservation rules than city hall. Historical records of the era show that the stylish building currently on the site coveted by Gloria for his homeless hub once housed the showrooms of Nelson-Thomas, a prominent San Diego retailer headed by Richard A. Nelson, who as national president of Goodwill Industries of America in the 1950s gave speeches about the Golden Rule and

rubbed shoulders with U.S. Republican president Dwight Eisenhower. Nelson-Thomas was noted for selling what are today known as midcentury modern office furnishings, many of which have become collectibles.

"Mid-century modern architecture is not simply anything that was designed and built in the middle of the 20th century, but in fact an architectural style with a defined set of principles and influences," reported Architectural

Digest in January of last year. "Mid-century modern architecture is a style created by architects in the middle decades of the 20th century. Influenced by the optimism of the post-World War II boom and by the exploration of a range of materials, including steel, concrete, and newly available insulated glass, the mainstays of midcentury modern architecture remain appealing to this day. Though the architects we associate with the style varied in their preferences and creative decisions, there is undeniably a spirit of creativity that unites their creations."

Designer Leo Marmol told the publication: "The style became extremely fashionable in its time. It was something that the media could really kind of sink their teeth into and show these alluring and sexy photographs, and seduce the viewer into this fantasy of modern living."

Many of San Diego's midcentury buildings have of late been under threat. The Drew Ford Roundhouse of Values at 8970 La Mesa Boulevard was demolished in 2018, though Fort Oak, a trendy Mission Hills bistro, preserved elements of the vintage car lot that once occupied the site. "Housed in a 1940's Ford dealership, the exterior of the restaurant, while a recreation of the original building, looks just like the historic space, colors and all," notes the website VenueReport.com. "Once inside, you're greeted with a high contrast, modern interior, notably different from the vintage exterior."

Bay gets slick Environmental damage from flooding during late January's massive rainstorm was not insubstantial, per a report by the California Department of Fish and Wildlife. "On January 22, 2024, an unusually intense rainstorm caused a flash flood to overtop the banks of Chollas Creek in the area around the Gonzalez Crane Service property at 3284 Newton Street," according to an April 10 Technical Advisory Committee report. "The flood caused the release of used

motor oil to be released from containers stored at the site. The oil-contaminated flood water went into the storm drains and into Chollas Creek.

"Patriot Environmental deployed sorbent boom to prevent the further spread of oil at the release. The United States Navy cleaned the downstream portion of Chollas Creek, and the United States Environmental Protection Agency cleaned the property where the release occurred. There were no additional impacts to the environment and wildlife."



# Moonshadow on the mountain

As I make my way up the long and very dark climber's trail toward El Cajon mountain, I can't help but think of ghosts. Part of it is the place: there's another path up to the rock face,

and it passes by the ruins of an old miner's homestead. You can still see the rusty typewriter and decrepit motorcycle left by a past — and probably passed - resident. Part of it is the activity at hand: rock climbing magazines always feature a memorial section honoring my fallen peers, and more than a few of them have died on this mountain. Most were hikers — part of the reason I'm hiking at night is to avoid heat exhaustion — but there was a climber who decided to ascend without a rope. He fell, nearly



I call this hike "The Golden Staircase," because the second half is as steep as a set of stairs, and the boulders are goldenbrown — not that you could tell their color right now. There is no moon, and if I turn off

my headlight, it's pitch black. I can't see a thing, but I'm pretty sure I can hear footsteps off-trail. Ghosts? The summer air is still and hot, but the bugs are not still, and neither are the dogs in the houses below. I don't mind their barking, but I do mind what it may portend. Near the

bottom of the mountain is an old rock quarry that sits above the dam and reservoir. Climbers use the crumbling, overhanging rock face to practice the skills needed to sleep while suspended from the giant walls in Yosemite. Some of the locals don't cotton to the climbers, and while it might not be the dog owners below the quarry who express their objections via gunfire, the fact remains that I personally have been sleeping on that wall and heard bullets hit the rock

of the city lights below.

Close to my hanging tent.

We climb at night because the rock is too hot to touch during the day in summer, and too full of people during the cooler seasons. At night, there are no

the day in summer, and too full of people during the cooler seasons. At night, there are no foolhardy souls cramming the popular routes, lining up at the bottom waiting for their turn to tackle San Diego's most spectacular climb. The rock is still warm, but the air is pleasant, and the rattlesnakes along the approach are sleeping. (The dark does bump that approach from two to three hours, but it's a small price to pay.)

The moon begins to rise as we rack the climbing gear and start our ascent. This route

is called Meteor; we think it's because it is very steep and you climb straight up. Lately, I realized another possibility: while heading east on the 8, I glanced over to the left and saw that when the sun first rises on El Cajon Mountain, the stunning outside corner of the upper part of the climb catches the first rays, and lights up like the streak of a meteor across the sky.

tops out on the false summit of Meteor, he pulls the rope up, and I follow as quickly as I can. Near the top of the face, there is a breeze. The air is no longer stale; it has the fresh feel of the coast.

At the top of the climb is a perfectly flat shelf, just big enough for two or three people. The 125 freeway snakes away to the south,

Beautiful. But we see no meteors or shooting stars tonight as the moon rises, casting our pale shadows onto the granite face.

I am climbing up first, clipping the bolts and setting the rope through the anchors. My right hand grips a thin edge the width of a pencil, and my left hand is feeling around above me, looking for the next move. I am reading the

rock with my fingers like a blind man reading braille. I don't look up much, just enough to see my headlamp shine on the next safety bolt. I keep my attention on my feet. Each move higher is at least as difficult as the last. Some of the holds have me feeling like I've turned over a miniature hourglass, because I must move fast or tire and lose my battle with gravity, which is always working to edge me off my stance, one millimeter at a time. The sands keep on slipping. Time keeps on slipping. I don't want to slip.

I know Mike sees only a bobbing headlight above him; he can spot nothing indicating either my confidence or my fear. But in any case, climbers talk to each other. "You got me Mike?" I ask, my voice echoing off the walls of the canyon.


"I got you," he says, his voice reaching up from the darkness one hundred feet below me.

I pause at the shelf halfway up the first pitch and take pictures of the city lights below. I hum the Cat Stevens song "Moonshadow" as I finish the first pitch. Mike quickly follows up on the long first section, his headlight throwing crazy,

conflicting shadows on the rock wall. We pause at the ledge before the upper corner to share a smoke and the view. Far below us, the dogs are still barking. Mike starts up his section, and the moon is now so bright that we can almost turn off our headlamps, but we don't. Things feel more serious when we rock climb at night, and perhaps they are. We talk to each other more, words of both encouragement and caution. When Mike

curving through the county lights on its way to the hills that border Mexico. From up here, we can see it all, all the way to the great dark expanse of the ocean to the west. We've earned this view, but we still feel lucky to be here.

To get off, we have to slide down our ropes past an overhang that has us hanging in space, 20 feet from the wall and 150 feet above the

base. This part of climbing is the most dangerous — aside from the drive to get to the cliffs. One mistake would mean a fast plunge into the darkness. We don't make any mistakes, but I think of ghosts again as I start down the trail. It's now 4 am, and the dogs are still awake. As we near the car, we are treated to the sight of another sort of meteor: a Starlink satellite launch, rolling through the night sky like an interstellar freight train.

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

In 1968 we headed out west when my dad, who was in the navy, got transferred from Norfolk, Virginia. Mom, Dad, my sister, my grandmother, myself, three cats, and nine G.I. Joes all piled into our Chevy station wagon and hit the road. California, here we come! We landed in south Chula Vista, near Hilltop and Main St.

There were no tracks to grow up on the wrong side of, but there was the Otay River bottom. Illegal aliens, missing children, and worse kept the sheriffs pretty busy. A friend I grew up with was murdered in the river bottom. With an axe. Horrific? Definitely. Boring? Not so much.

About 20 yards over the hill behind our house was a partially demolished house. The Shack, as we called it, was like a gift from the gods to my group of friends. No adult supervision meant hours of illicit fun. Smoking, drinking, etc. Goodbye G. I. Joes. Another 50 yards further down the hill was a lake that had a 30-by-70-foot-long spill-

way. We'd take cardboard and slide down, crashing into the curved wall at the bottom. This led to three of us using the hood of a truck to slide down a hill-side full of barrel cactus. Dangerous? Yep. Foolhardy? Uh-huh. Boring? Nope.


After a year or so, the Shack, the lake, and the spillway were gone, replaced by new houses. But the city of Chula Vista had built the Loma Verde Recreation Center just down the block. Olympic-sized pool, basketball courts, ping-pong tables, and music room. Now, we really had a cool place to hang. We pretty much ran the place. One year at Christmas time, we actually hung joints from the tree. No one noticed. No one except our new pal Little Chucky. We made his acquaintance when he walked over a mile to the Rec Center after observing us through his telescope and thinking, "They look like they're having fun."

One night, we put his smaller stature to "good" use. Four or five of us walked into 7-11 at the same time. Chucky, who was on his hands and

knees, slipped by the clerk and into the storage room unnoticed. Two minutes later we had a case of beer. Each. Thanks, Chucky. Cheers. Illegal? Absolutely. Hilarious? To us, yes. Boring? No.

Chula Vista is also home to, according to the *Guinness Book of World Records*, the largest freestanding flagpole in the world. It's just off the 5 south and Main Street. Off that same exit was the Big Sky Drive-In and the go-cart place where Mojo Nixon got married. Country Dick from the Beat Farmers presided over the ceremony.

We all went to Castle Park High School. The C.P.H. Trojans — yeah, yeah, very funny. It was in my senior year that I decided to be a musician. A year of five-hours-aday practice got me into a rock 'n roll band. That's when the fun really started. We played schools, military bases, and seedy biker bars. By seedy, I mean dangerous. How dangerous? My 9th grade algebra teacher was murdered in the bathroom of one of them. There were bullet holes in the wall by the stage at another.



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At one club, I had to play "Johnny B. Goode" five times in a row. When I say "had to," I mean there was a loaded .45 pointed at my head. I love Chuck Berry, but come on, dude. On another night, I got knocked out with an upper-cut on stage for not playing Aerosmith. Deadly? Yep. Boring? No way.

The most fun we had was playing parties. One year, we threw our own kegger out at Otay Lakes. Thousands of people showed up. There were cars backed up for miles. The sheriffs used both their helicopters to break it up, declaring it an "illegal assembly." Twenty-one kegs and \$800.00 profit. Fun? You betcha. Rock and roll? F\*\*K YEAH. No boredom here, thank you.

By the time Forbes published their story, Chula Vista had grown tenfold. Here are some of the fun, and exciting things Chula Vista has to offer now: there are four different golf courses, four different libraries, a huge water park, The Chula Vista Nature Center, 24 miles of bayfront bikeways, the J St. Marina, the world class Coors Amphitheatre, and the South Bay

Continued from page 8 then had to wake up. My daughter had had enough and moved out, taking a big chunk of my emotional and financial support. Good for her! I'd been skating on her very solid coattails for way more than a year.

And then, we got it! An apartment right across the street from Helix High. Perfect for my son D., who could now wheel across the street instead of taking the special bus. Six units, three up/three down. The parking lot and laundry room faced the street and created a sort of barrier. Together with the narrow walkway back to our middle ground floor unit and the large trees growing on the property behind our back yard, that meant we had a secluded paradise at the base of the rolling La Mesa hills.

During the week, the school across the street was filled with activity. Students coming, going, ditching, smoking, hiding. I usually left for work before D. went to school. By the time I got home, he was studying at the kitchen table, or watching TV. A very secure and comfortable routine. Nights and weekends were the magic time: the Helix High campus with only the rabbits scattering and owls making sounds in the darkness. Sometimes I walked the damp fields of long lush grass. Sometimes I climbed up and down the stairs around the track, or

As the weeks went by and twilight came earlier and earlier, I started noticing Suitcase Man.

ran a few laps.

As the neighborhood segued to black and blue, I would see him. Walking, with his suitcase. Heading to the hills. Mysterious. Silent.

Maybe you're under cover Sucking your cigarette like a lover

Smoke blowing out like gold...

I asked around. His name was Tony. Above dirty white sneakers, dark twill pants, and a trademark light blue linen suit coat. His face was wide, smooth, and expressionless. He was thin. His skin was clear, ruddy. His light blond hair was wiry, reaching to about mid-ear. It stuck out on each side, like a bleached Bozo the Clown wig. Dur-

ing the day, he camped out in the La Mesa Vons Starbucks. I saw that he took notes. Many many notes, written on receipts, napkins, and sugar packets. What were they saying? What was he thinking? Where did he go after he passed our apartment, heading south for the hills?

Bring me to your lips, the same slow way...

D. moved out with his girlfriend. I met a man, and moved into his moldy old mansion less than a mile from the Lowell Street apartments. I still saw Suitcase Man, all the time. Vons. The Grossmont Center Food Court. Heading for the hills up Lowell Street while I walked the other way to 24 Hour Fitness, or as I ran up to where Lowell turns into Orien, finally meeting Yale, venturing to the beautiful wild hilltop due west: the highest point for miles around, with an expansive 360-degree view south to Mexico, west to downtown, north to Cowles Mountain and the hills of San Carlos, and East down to my little neighborhood.

Suitcase Man didn't make that turn, up Orien

to Yale. He continued south, up past the Hill Church. I wondered how he made it past the fences separating the church parking lot from the steep, empty hill beyond. I couldn't imagine him climbing over the chain link fence, throwing his suitcase over first, trying to catch his sneakers into the fence-holes, day after day. It just didn't seem practical. But I found the answer, over to the left of the church's dark driveway. There was a large hole in the fence, right by what I came to call frog heaven. They stopped their croaky crooning only for a moment when their communal space was breached, then started up again — first one, then hundreds. No deterrent at all for a man on his way home.

Take me back to your cave, Suitcase Man.

Ten years later, when the warm glow of dysfunction in the La Mesa mansion had faded to dross, I moved again. Still living in La Mesa, and for the first time ever completely on my own.

I still went to the same Vons. Tony was often there. I went to Grossmont Center. He was still hanging out in the food court, now with one large and one small and very mangy suitcase. When outside, he was always smoking. Same suit coat, which I had never seen dirty. One foot and ankle had grown to three times its normal size. He had cut his pant leg to accommodate it. It had to hurt.

I often contemplated talking to Tony, this man who had haunted my imagination for over two decades. Would he care, or even understand, that I'd written a song about him? Would he let me offer him a chance to shower? A new suitcase? But I ended up feeling that this was all too presumptuous. Who was I to disturb his endless walking and notating? Who was I to judge his second, raggedy suitcase?

Are you homeless, or at home everywhere?

Do you mind when people stare?

Can I talk to you, Suitcase Man?

I live in Lakeside now. I may have missed my chance.

Continued from page 8 Where I'm from, it rains continuously. The trees soak up every bit of water and grow so densely that you never see distant views, only pine trees and maples crowding the landscapes.

Now I spend most days in a dimly lit cubicle at a biotech company. I rarely get to enjoy the weather that is promised to transplants arriving in San Diego. But sometimes, I catch the smell of fresh cut grass outside my neighborhood, and it takes me back to Georgia.

I moved to Normal Heights in early 2021 when the pandemic was at its height. It was the first time I had signed a lease on my own. If you're not familiar with Normal Heights, I'll paint a picture for you. The neighborhood sits high on a hill and is surrounded by highways and bridges. Here, the houses don't match, the buildings are old, and there are bodegas every few blocks that sell liquor and Hot Fries. Some yards are manicured while others have overflowing weeds that cover fence posts.

Normal Heights is an amalgamation of people at different stages in life. The college kids who couldn't afford to live closer to campus.

The baby boomers who bought a house in the '90s and are staying put. The transplants, like myself, who needed somewhere affordable to live.

I've lived alone these last three years. Most days, I sit down at my small wooden table that is pressed up against a window with a view of the neighboring houses and apartments below. When I moved in, there was a palm tree across the street with a thick trunk and fronds that stuck out in a symmetrical halo. The tree reached higher than the two-story buildings surrounding it, so that I could see the fronds pressed up against the skyline. I watched as the wind sent ripples through the palm fronds, each one waving in turn. To many transplants, the palm tree embodies the idea of California. Having a view of one outside my window

felt significant.

But one summer, there was a big thunderstorm, and afterwards, the fronds of the palm tree began to wilt. The foliage suddenly had a part in the middle, like someone had combed the leaves to one side. Each day, the fronds lost more of their color. They started dropping to the ground, until there was nothing left but the trunk. The tree still stood tall after all of its foliage was lost. I wondered if at some point, the trunk would fall over too.

would fall over too.

A few months later,
I noticed a vine crawling up one side of the tree. The vine grew and stretched for several weeks until it wrapped around the entire column. It climbed to the top of the tree trunk and continued reaching out in all directions. The vine cloaked the tree so that you could no longer see

the deep brown trunk beneath. Broad, almondshaped leaves the color of lime growing from thin spindly tendrils. Summer came, and lovely red flowers started bursting out from the vine. If you hadn't seen the progression, you might think the tree itself was blooming.

\* \* \*

When I first moved to Normal Heights, I was excited. My friend lived in the apartment below me and there were bars we could walk to. The price was right, and I signed the lease within 24 hours of seeing the unit. But when I actually moved in and slept there overnight, I started to have doubts about the neighborhood. I didn't know about the unhoused people who called the banks off the highway their home. The first few nights, I feared someone might break in.

I parked in an alley behind the building. I met countless unhoused people there. They could be found sleeping in my parking space or digging through the dumpsters. Getting home after dark meant walking through this alley alone without much light, unlocking the gate, and checking around for someone in the shadows. But I was determined to stay in this part of town. There was nowhere else I could pay this price for a one-bedroom. I would make this place my home.

In the daytime, I walked. I crossed the bridge over the 15 into Kensington, where I found a beautiful neighborhood full of jacaranda trees and jasmine bushes. Sometimes, I'd walk west as far as Park Boulevard, past a park with a view into Mission Valley. At night, I brought the people I loved to my neighborhood. We watched the sunset from the rooftop at Ska Bar before it closed

down, and we drank champagne on New Year's at the Rabbit Hole. We grabbed chai lattes at Dark Horse before walking down Adams Avenue, where we'd stop for breakfast at Jyoti-Bihanga or thrift at HomeStart.

Over time, I got used to sharing my alley with the unhoused people. I thanked them as they held open the dumpster lid for me and I threw my trash in. One day, I realized that the loud banging sound was happening every night at 7:55 pm. It wasn't gunfire after all. From my hilltop perch, the SeaWorld fireworks could be heard,

miles away.

My neighbors watched out for me. Checked on me from time to time. In our building, there are 18 units that face each other across a small courtyard. One neighbor who lived across from my balcony had called this her home for 35 years. She kept to herself, and always wore her hair in a neat bun. The couple next door to me lived here for over 30 years. I smelled their food cooking: the aroma of warm tortillas filling the air as I crossed the courtyard. Laughter rang through their screen door as I walked up our shared set of stairs.

Living alone wasn't so scary anymore. I felt safe. I forgot there was ever a time when I thought moving here was a mistake. Soon, I felt proud to call Normal Heights my home, like it was a badge

I'd earned. I put in a lot of work to make this place a home, but then I found out the building was being renovated, and soon the tenants would be evicted. The first to receive notice was a lady across the courtyard. She tried to fight back and refused to leave her apartment, but she was ultimately forced out. The couple next door were next: a thick stack of no-fault eviction papers were left taped to their door. Sixty days' notice to move out.

Those neighbors had raised their children here and called it home, but last fall, I watched as they carried their lives out in trash bags and Home Depot boxes. Now, the remaining tenants watch as plants disappear from balconies and cars stop returning to their parking spaces. Now, as I walk through the courtyard, I see gutted apartments, hollowed out by contractors who pull every last bit of the past from the walls. My unit is coming up. The apartment I live in now will double in rent once it's renovated, and I won't be able to afford it.

For years, I assumed that a summer storm took down the palm tree. But recently, a friend told me about the palm beetle. An invasive pest that has descended San Diego County in recent years. The beetle lays its eggs in the crown of date palms, and their larvae hollow out the tree's trunk. Eventually, the palm's leaves wilt and drop to the ground. The tree outside my window was likely one of these date palms. A non-native species of palm from the Canary Islands, taken down by an invasive insect from South America. The vine that grew and wrapped around the decaying trunk was not from San Diego either, but a species of trumpet vine from

the eastern United States.

Everything involved, including the tree itself, was a transplant, just looking for an opportunity to root and grow. Always trying to play catch-up. Competing with others looking for the same real estate. As of last summer, San Diego was rated the most expensive place to live in the U.S. For most of us, the idea of purchasing a home is almost out of the question. We must rent and save and rent and save, so that maybe one day we'll catch a break and make this our permanent residence.

When I leave this apartment, they will tear down everything that is inside, leaving a hollow shell. The contractors will rip out the drywall where I hung pictures of my siblings and my grandmother. They will pull apart the built-in bookshelf where I displayed my most loved books. If I were to hide a note, hidden behind a baseboard somewhere, that would disappear too.

Soon, my apartment will be filled with hardwood floors and stainless-steel appliances. I will be living somewhere else. Taking root in some other place. And I wonder, who will be the one looking through my dining room window next year?

San Diego Reader: Why did you become a priest?

Father Roberto Maldonado: In general, I always kind of knew I had the call, but I tried to do what we call in our business

"pulling a Jonah." God said, "Go left." And I said, "Are you sure you want me to go left? Then I think I'm going to go right." Then I was in a situation where I should have been dead, and that got me wondering and questioning what I was doing with my life. I found myself in the middle of a shoot-out and I survived. I was part of a security detail. Let me put it this way: where I come from, politics is a contact sport. So, I evaluated a bunch of things. By then, I had walked away from anything church-related. It was not for me. But God called me anyway. The person is qual-

ified by the call; that means,

no matter who I am in my life journey, if God wants me to do something, he is the one who qualifies me for the call, not me.

**SDR**: What is the mission of your church?

FM: We bring our best to God's table so all might delight in Christ's lifechanging embrace across every generation and culture. We are not a big congregation, but we have people in their eighties to kids 2 to 3 years old. To me that's beautiful. We have a little bit of everything— Filipinos, whites, and Latinos in the community. Our mission plays out in the way we receive people, such as the refugee family that lived on the streets. We fed them and secured a hotel for them for a couple nights. Because they're refugees, they qualify for assistance. I help them to navigate the system. We secured a school for their children and a work permit for the father. That's what I mean by being that table where everyone is welcomed.

SDR: Where do you go when

**FM**: Let me put it this way: I believe in salvation and eternal life, but I don't take for granted my salvation. I need to work on my salvation. Jesus warned us that those who seek to gain their life will lose it and those who lose their

life will gain it. St. Theresa of Avila said to God that she is not afraid of him because of hell. Rather, she moves to love him because of what he did for her, offering salvation. What makes me do what I do is my understanding of how much Christ did for me. The least I can do is love him as much as of hell, not because it's not real, but that shouldn't be a reason to love God either. Reward and punishment are not reasons to love God; but what moves me is the understanding of the sacrifice he did for me. My motivation is to try to be a good disciple of Christ and a good servant of his church to proclaim the gospel of salvation. In that way, heaven almost becomes a byproduct. I am satisfied with what I'm doing today, being what Christ wants me to be. I examine that constantly and don't take it for granted. - Joseph O'Brien

Well, not an opera, exactly, but something close to it: nearly everything is sung, and there isn't much in the way of structured song until the second act.

The opening number a hoot, wherein the cast introduces itself — this is a complicated Russian novel, after all - letting you know that your program lets you know that "Balaga is fun, Bolkonsky is crazy, Mary is plain, Dolokhov is fierce, Hélène is a slut, Anatole is hot, Marya is old-school, Sonya is good, Natasha is young, and Andrey isn't here." Oh, and Pierre is stuck in an existential rut, drinking and reading and growing steadily stouter. He used to be better. He tells you so. Just as Bolkonsky tells you he is really old and mean. Just as Mary tells you she is frustrated by her static life. Just about everybody is ready to tell you about themselves and their thoughts, even as they're interacting with each other.

It starts to feel less like a dramatization of a novel and more like a novel set to music. Some may find the conceit delightful — the play got nominated for 12 Tonys. I found it not so much off-putting as away-pushing; it kept me from feeling with the characters. And you need to feel with the characters, because the plot is simplicity itself (sort of like

an opera). Which isn't quite the same as clarity itself, especially when it comes to Pierre's part in things. Kürt Norby sings the heck out of the role, and it's clear Pierre has some breakthroughs. But his actions and character leading up to them seem...confused.

Be assured, however: the second act is much more fun (and tuneful) than the first, and the cast is having a blast throughout, and it looks great.

As the play begins, Mama, still in her housecoat, sings the old hymn, "This is the day, this is the day, this is the day that the Lord has made." Sweet, except pay attention to that repetition. Also to her reaction

when the neighbor's dog starts barking: "I'm gonna kill that dog. Cut it up and cook it." A bit violent and even unsettling, especially given that Mama is making stew here in the kitchen. Well, not just Mama. Her daughters Lillian and Nellie are on hand — Lillian for the first time in a long time — as is Lillian's tween daughter Lil' Mama, and Mama's real job is to tell them what to do and why they're doing it wrong.

But don't let my talk of ominous hints and familial tensions fool you: Common Ground Theater's revelatory co-production with Scripps Ranch may not be a comedy, exactly, but it is funny. Funny in the layered, interior way that families are funny. The humor keeps conflict from boiling over - most of the time - but it also inflects ordinary interaction. Now and then there are explicit jokes, as when the younger generations start to mirror Mama's familiar speeches. But mostly, it's hidden in the cock of head and look in eye and tone of voice — "None of your business" delivered without venom or condescension, but with an almost friendly warmth. It's people being natural with one another - really, a marvel of acting all around.

Why is Mama making stew? Well, It's for a very important occasion at the church, and things need to be done sooner than later, and why is the phone always ringing, and why isn't Lillian's husband here yet and what's wrong with Nellie's belly, and...? Well, if you believe Mama's claim that Richard III. for which Lil' Mama is auditioning, is really all about the women, then you might want to pay attention to the speech that everybody practices. #### MOVIES

Civil War — It's telling that the two war photographers at the center of Alex Garland's story say they have parents back home in the heartland who are pretending that the civil war that is raging right here in the No Longer United States of America (the reasons for it are unclear and unimportant, but maybe the President shouldn't have disbanded the FBI) is not happening. Because if your harrowing images of human conflict and suffering, obtained at great personal risk and even greater personal cost, can't even rouse Mom and Dad to belief — let alone concern, let alone action - well then, what exactly is the status, what exactly is the point, of the media? Why are you wading into the horror — no, not wading, plunging, immersing yourself in the very worst of humanity. We get it, you're good journalists: you're here to get the story, not to take sides. But really, why? Weary Lee (a scowling Kirstin Dunst) isn't quite sure any more, but she's still game to join gung-ho Joel (Wagner Moura) on a mad dash for D.C. in an attempt to interview a President who might just have them shot on sight, since he views journalists as the enemy. (At

least Joel is honest about his motivations: combat gets him hard, and even after it hits too close to home. he stays on task.) What Lee didn't count on was bringing newbie Jesse along for the ride (an impossibly tiny Cailee Spaeny); Jesse with her oldschool camera and new-kid eagerness, "If I got shot, would you take a picture of it?" she asks, wonderingly. "What do you think?" snaps Lee. Unlike this review, Garland keeps the thinky stuff in the background and concentrates on the brutal, intimate action - like a good war photographer should. (2024) — M.L. ★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

**Dune Part Two** — Lawrence of Arrakis meets Dr. Sandworm, or, How I Learned to Stop Worrying and Love the Bene Gesserit. Paul Atreides, who left the green and pleasant land of his home planet for the desert wastes of Dune, finds himself eager to avenge the death of his royal father at the hands of the rival House Harkonnen (with a little help from a subtle and sinister Emperor). The best way to do that is to harness the "desert power" of the native Fremen. And the best way to do that is to convince the religious skeptics among them that what he wants is their freedom, and the true believers that what he wants is to fulfill the prophecies about a savior from another world. Yes, his visions warn him that the latter might spark a holy war that kills billions, and yes, he's pretty sure that the prophecy is just something cooked up by his mother's religious order to further their own ends — but dang if he doesn't keep doing stuff that makes him look like The Man. He chooses the right name, he rides a huge sandworm, he...well, he does

what saviors do. By this point, it should come as no surprise to learn that director Denis Villenueve is very good at shots and scenes that capture scale and scope - big images for big stories for the big screen — and he keeps the long and layered story rolling along like windswept dunes in a desert. He's a little less surehanded when it comes to getting up close — maybe too many close-ups of stars Timothée Chalamet and Zendaya, and maybe too few conversations to illuminate Paul's (gradual?) acceptance of his destiny - and the action at the very end saps the impact of what's come immediately before. (It plays almost like a TV teaser: tune in next time!) Anyway, about those references to '60s classics at the outset: the real news here is that our hero is not exactly a good guy. His father may have been noble, but his father was also defeated. The result is a blockbuster space opera that plays like a downbeat drama — we're a long, long way from that famous galaxy far, far away. (2024) - M.L. ★★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Immaculate — Michael Mohan delivers a fun if flawed twist on the old argument between faith and science - specifically, which one gets to save the world, and what salvation looks like, anyway. It helps that it's lovely to look at, and not just because of big-eyed star Sydney Sweeney. (If Elisha Christian's camera doesn't quite leer at her - for shame, this is a devout young religious sister we're dealing with here — it certainly does a lot of beholding.) Christian has a whole world of wonderful visuals in the old Italian convent for old Italian nuns at which Sister Cecilia has arrived - what with the

reliquary holding one of the nails that pierced Christ, the pristine countryside stretching for miles in every direction, the catacombs upon which the whole place rests - and he makes the most of his setting. But getting back to the that bit about "fun if flawed." The fun is the flaw, or rather, the lack of it. This is a horror film in which divine rape is treated as a miracle, and in which the second coming is hastened in highly unorthodox fashion, but for much of the runtime (and her mysterious pregnancy), Sweeney is content to shed silent tears over her predicament instead of making legitimate war on the patriarchy. And when the Enemy is revealed, he utterly flubs his big speech. What should be a declaration of war on heaven is instead pitched as a twisted sort of piety. It's as if the film doesn't see the glorious silliness in a woman taking perpetual vows on her first day at the film's outset, or in attempting to make her escape in the midst of labor pains. By the end, you get the feeling that Mohan was so intent on making the (admittedly bonkers) final moments hit that he tried to tamp down everything that came before. (2024) — M.L. ★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Love Lies Bleeding — What is there to say? That Kristen Stewart can act - that she can inhabit a character perhaps more naturally than any actress of her generation? Okay. That if you want some raunchtastic talk and desperate, grindy onscreen sex in the current cinecultural climate, you're more likely to find it between same-sex partners? Okay again. That Ed Harris' face has become such an unforgiving landscape of craters,

caverns, and ravines that it spookily echoes the brutal desert outside of town in which the bodies have been piling up lo these many violent years under his bug-lovin' reign? I say again, okay. And one last affirmative: there is good grit and texture here - perhaps exemplified by the loving attention paid to the world of women's bodybuilding - and a nasty, unsentimental reality that makes the loopy fantasy imagery at the end either a triumphant break from or a goofy undoing of all that's gone before. (The audience at the screening laughed heartilv: I'm not sure that was the effect for which the story was going.) But after all that, there isn't much more to say, except that bad people tend to do bad things, and that whatever happens to love, lots of people wind up bleeding as a result. Not exactly a revelation. Once you get the interior ugliness of everyone involved, you may be able to chuckle at some of the violence, ha ha. (2024) — M.L. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Monkey Man - Early on in director, co-writer, and star Dev Patel's madcap mashup of a movie, his protagonist Kid sets out to buy a gun. "You like John Wick?" asks the salesman. "This is the same gun he had, except made in China." You know: a cheap knockoff. A cleverly self-conscious pre-emptive strike against those who might dismiss this revenge drama — with its black suits, its secret sects, its exotic clubs, and its long, loving depictions of brutal hand-to-hand combat — as John Wick, except made in India. You know: a cheap knockoff. Because it aims to be much more than that. The revenge sought here is against the man who killed Kid's mother - but

since that man was the local chief of police, and since the killing was part of a brazenly corrupt land grab by evil forces operating under the guise of restoring Mother India - well, one mother quickly starts to stand for another. And even more than that, as evidenced by the juxtaposition of word and image during our hero's moments of whispered prayer. (Who really makes you happy?) Which moments bring us back to that "mashup" bit: the scenes between mother and son look and sound like Terrence Malick's Tree of Life. Other scenes recall Guy Ritchie cheekily working the collision of higher and lower classes. And yeah, there's some John Wick-y stuff. (Why yes, our club is hosting an event honoring India's next president, but no, none of our security guards have guns, so all disruptions will need to be resolved with punching; why do you ask?) It makes for disconcerting, uneven ride, sort of like a tuk-tuk that is mysteriously equipped with turbo, threading its way through the streets before slamming on the brakes so as to avoid crashing into a little girl. About those streets: they — or rather, the suffering they contain, and the blunt sympathy with which Patel depicts it — are the film's real strength. That, and the rich imagery and theme provided by the traditional story of Hanuman - the original Monkey Man. Much stronger than his order of transgender warriors in exile, who talk of their devotion to a god who is both creator and destroyer, but don't seem to teach our hero much beyond rope-a-dope rhythm. (The Cruel Tutelage of Pai Mei this ain't.) Their leader mentions fighting with purpose; that much, the Kid already had. (2024) — M.L. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

#### A is yellow like a smell

Formed in Cape Town, South Africa in 2006, live electronic DJ duo Goldfish have since swum into the waters of global popularity. For a seven-year period, David Poole and Dominic Peters took residency at one of the world's most famous dance the event is about happiness, musical escapism, and having a good time with your buddies and meeting new people."

Both Poole and Peters are jazz musicians who started out making live music. But they found they also loved watching DJs do their thing. So they sought to combine the

clubs in Spain: Pacha Ibiza. Once the residency concluded, the pair made their way to San Diego, a place they've called home for the past seven years. "We love it here," says Peters. "I couldn't imagine living anywhere else in America. We are close to Los Angeles. We can get to anywhere in the U.S. in six hours. When we lived in Cape Town, it was thirty hours just to get to LA. It was a no-brainer. Now, you're stuck with us."

Musically, the duo creates a fusion of dance beats and jazz, mixed with effects and synths. Peters holds an upright bass and does keyboard duties, while Poole blows an unhinged saxophone. The intention is to craft a sound that brings people up up up. "Our music has always been about making people feel good," says Poole. "It's our job to harness and push out positivity. If there was any one thing that's a core principle of Goldfish, it's that. That flows through to the event, because

energy of live jazz with that of electronic music — as Peters puts it, "Smash those two things together. A lot of the time with dance music, it can be a little sterile. We wanted to bring that organic, human element to it. That's where those live elements come into it in a way people can feel it. It's not just playback. I always think of music like nutrition for your soul. Do you want to have packaged food, or do you want something cooked fresh off the grill?"

Even after eighteen years of party-pumping, the duo continues to evolve. "We've only ever done music," says Poole. "We've only ever wanted to do music. That's why we're still around. We've luckily been able to develop our sound over the years. It doesn't stay exactly the same. If you continue to do the same thing, it's boring."

Part of the reason the duo has consistently maintained global popularity over the years is by staying true to where they are in their lives. Says Peters, "Dave and I can look back at some of the songs we've made and think, 'Wow, we were in such a different headspace.' But there's still the link and DNA through all of it. What's been amazing for me personally, coming to America and moving to a new country, making new friends, settling into a place, is that your songwriting — and all the skills accrued through epic experiences, and hard experiences — have to come through now. Right now, I think we're in our most dangerous phase, and I'm

> really excited to see what we do next."

One challenge Peters faces as a professional musician and jazz DJ is a condition called svnesthesia. His brain routes sensory information through multiple unrelated senses, causing him to simultaneously experience

more than one sensation. "People experience synesthesia in different ways," Peters explains. "For me, it ties into another thing I have, which is perfect pitch, which means I can hear a note, and I know what note it is in the scale. And for whatever reason, the note correlates to a color on the color wheel. C is blue, D is red, E is purple, A is yellow. Nobody can tell me that A is not yellow. It's like a smell to me."

They've recently returned from a multi-country tour, and are now back on the shores of Southern California. Along with a slot at this weekend's Coachella festival, the duo will be pumping the two-story Beach House here in San Diego on May 4. After that, the South African combo will be touring back east and overseas again.



# Don't hold your applause

Save Ferris encourages clapping at the Belly Up

Ska music has a habit of popping up every decade or so to ride a brief wave of mainstream success before it gets slammed back underwater. Or underground, anyway. Save Ferris was signed to Epic Records in the mid-'90s, after fellow Orange County ska band No Doubt rocketed up the charts via their 1995 album *Tragic Kingdom*. This era, commonly referred to as the third wave of ska, started to run out of gas by the late '90s. Save Ferris's second major label album veered more towards pop-punk, and by 2004, the band was pretty much done. They never really became a household name even during their prime (their greatest success

was a cover of Dexys Midnight Runners' "Come On Eileen") and so I didn't know what kind of turnout to expect at their Belly Up gig on recent Friday night. While I wasn't expecting the club to be empty, I was very surprised to find it quite packed. Maybe Save Ferris was a bigger deal than I had remembered.

I found a spot near the back of the floor for their set. The average age for attendees seemed to be in the thirties or forties, but there were

plenty of twentysomethings in attendance as well. Judging by the wardrobes, there were obviously some punks in attendance, but I probably wouldn't have been able to guess this was gonna be a ska gig by scanning the crowd before the band started. That's not really a surprise, since ska is just one facet of this current iteration of Save Ferris, which includes only one member of their classic lineup — lead singer Monique Powell. After some lawsuits with ex-bandmates, Powell became the sole owner of the group's name in the mid-2010s. This current version of Save Ferris is basically


Powell's stage persona seems tailor-made for a Vegas residency; on this evening, she slipped easily between genres such as swing and pop and proved she could drop entertaining, wisecracking stage banter with the best of them. It was only when this collection of pros reached into ye olde Save Ferris back catalog for songs such as the innocent, silly, and very '90s "Spam" that things seemed out of whack. You couldn't help but wonder how this collection of musicians (sans Powell) ended up on this stage playing this novelty song about Spam. That being said, most of the crowd on the floor seemed to enjoy what the band was offering.

The only real hiccup came when the festivities were derailed for a short time due to a microphone failure. I began to suspect the immanent arrival of technical issues when Powell started marching through a series of James Brown-esque mic-stand tricks that included pulling the stand up off the ground via the cable connected to her vocal mic. It was no surprise when the next song started and no vocals came out of the PA. At least five minutes of switching cables and testing different mics ensued. In the end, it's probably best to treat a vocal mic cable as more of a lifeline than a leash.

I have never been much of a ska fanatic.

Maybe if I had spent my teenage years wearing checkered sweaters, I would have had as much fun as most of my fellow floor-dwellers. And my somewhat lousy attitude almost came back to bite me in the ass near the end of the night, after Powell had instructed the audience to clap continued on page 24



In fact, we don't see much of anything in this movie. What we see are characters talking about incidents that we should be seeing. *Tár* commits the sin of telling instead of showing. Why should I watch characters talk about events that I should be seeing? The pivotal event of the movie is a former student from Accordion committing suicide. That character commits suicide based on her

relationship with Tár — but. you guessed it, we never see that relationship. We hear about that relationship.

I was bored out of my mind by this movie that sought to teach me something by having characters talk about themes that should have been incorporated into something I like to call a story. All the movie gives the viewer is a series of important themes that the characters talk about.

The music in the movie was good but extremely limited. I think there were more scenes of Tár running than there were of her conducting, However, Blancett's conducting was pretty good. It was much better than Tom Hulce's efforts in Amadeus. It was also better than all the conducting in the charming Mozart in the Jungle, but it was still far from an accurate portrayal of a legitimate conductor. However, the character did tell us what a conductor does.

Tár is yet another movie that tries to catch the essence of classical music without focusing on the music. The only great classical music movie is Amadeus, because the leading character of the film, the star of the show, is Mozart's music.

If you're considering spending the time on Tár, don't. Spend it on something useful, such as doing the laundry

# Female-friendly food find

A cafe developed by women for women to get together and eat, argue, and celebrate.

oah. Lotta high-powered people here. Clinking glasses, laughing over-loudly at jokes, standing with

a canapé in one hand and a glass of bubbly in the other, leaning forward to catch inside talk about other people. We're in an engineering building, but the people here are all sorts of academics, celebrating the opening of a cafe developed by women for women

to get together and eat, argue, and celebrate their increasing force in this powerhouse called UCSD. Here is where they will meet. Token men allowed, of course, despite history always traditionally being history, heh heh. No herstory. Until now.

This is the Jacobs school of engineering's 25th anniversary. But it's all a bit too high-powered for me. One, I'm male; two, engineering? I can screw up a screwdriver. Three, I ain't got the namedropping capabilities you've gotta have to make

it's being held in a onetime nondescript corporate cafe that this bunch of high-level academic women have decided to make their own. A place where they can discuss everything from campus politics to the latest movie. A pub, but more female.

I'm back a few days later, just to grab a bite of regular food. And I'm glad to see it's really aimed at students who don't have a rich auntie to subsidize all their meals. OK, it's not the cheapest place, but ten bucks should fill your belly here. That's the word from my friend Diana, who is part of the brilliant group of women who paid for the re-up of what's now being called Cafe Minerva, after the goddess of wisdom, poetry, music, and, uh, also of war

It's in the belly of Franklin Antonio Hall. The good news: anybody can come and eat here. You don't have to show your PhD at the door. In fact, the baristas, Andre and Antonio, both sing out "Welcome!" as I cruise around the corner and into the breezy, modern space. It's loosely filled with smart but scrapily noisy aluminum chairs and tables which sit on a balcony that reaches out over — incredibly! — rolling countryside.

I've also passed by a plaque honoring the ten

women (including Diana) who made this "discussion cafe" happen. They chose this rather than sponsoring something static, like a statue.

> I head straight to the wall lunch menu. I remind myself that these campus-type eateries usually have the same types of offerings, from pizza to salads to sandwiches to bowls to wraps. Except here, I know they'll be more PC, made from healthier

ingredients. Oh, and probably more Asianinfluenced, a clear sign of the times. Hey, we do live on the Pacific.

"Tomato basil soup," starts off the board. Three-seventy-five for a cup, \$5 for a 12-ounce bowl. Same for black bean chili soup with cheese and sour cream. Cheapest salad is the Caesar, \$6.50. The most interesting one looks to be the fried chicken salad (with cheddar, romaine, and a honey mustard dressing). Also the blackened chicken Caesar (\$10) — or hey, save 50 cents and get a roasted vegetable salad, with roasted zucchini, yellow squash, 'shrooms, onions, bell pepper, feta, mixed greens, and balsamic for \$9.50. I mean,

all very safe and non-threatening. We're not eating on the wild side here. Still, we've got all the more substantial dishes to come. And to their credit, most of them are in this same \$10 price range. Antonio says the first one - the kimchi fried chicken sandwich — is about the most popular dish on the en-tire menu. It comes with Japanese spicy mayo, costs \$9.25. Another nice deal is pollo asado burrito with marinated grilled chicken, jack cheese, rice, pico de gallo, and guac in a flour tortilla. Costs \$8.75. Or, for \$8.50, there's a tofu banh mi, with lemongrass

and ginger marinated grilled chicken, do chua (which is pickled carrots and daikon - Chinese white radish), jalapeño, cilantro, and mayo. The cheapest wrap, of course, is the bean and cheese burrito for \$6.50.

Then they offer a raft of sandwiches (including a BLT for just \$6.95). But Andre says you get most bang for your buck with the bowls. "We have a lot of students who always go for the chipotle chicken rice bowl," says Antonio. "It's under ten dollars." Barely: \$9.75. "Creamy chipotle Spanish rice with blackened chicken, shredded cheese, corn, scallions, tomato, and cilantro."

Decision time. Am I hongry? Ha! Who isn't, after they have spent the last three hours fighting their way out of the eucalyptus forests trying to get around campus? So I start off ordering that bowl of tomato-basil soup with toast. Have to say, delizioso! Squisito! It's the nicely sharp basil, of course, and the perfectly-done toast. Just hits the spot. Then I ask for the chipotle chicken rice bowl. Gloopy, cheesy, and filling! More than it looks like. Although I somewhat regret not having that fermented cabbage overtone that the kimchi fried chicken sandwich would probably have given out.

Whatever, I'm full. I sit back, look out over



Minerva's patio terrace, on the edge of

the trees. Think about this new eatery. Yes, it's a variation on a theme, showing an uptick in vegan dishes, plus, natch, chicken, chicken, chicken. (What would we do without the world's most common bird, which our grandmas and grandpas snatched from the jungles of South-East Asia, 10,000 years ago?)

Because really, most of this is pretty healthy stuff. And Andre and Antonio are fun fellers. They just need to build a little atmosphere in this engineers' space. In fact, if I were working on my PhD, or even my DhP (Doctor of hyPocrisy?), I could see this becoming one of my go-to places. ■

## For its pilsner, Stone opts for public hops

"Brewing a pilsner is no different from brewing a lot of our Stone beers, in particular Stone Buenaveza Salt & Lime Lager," says Kris Ketcham, Senior Manager of Brewing and Innovation at Stone Liberty Station, explaining how the brewery produced the latest addition to its year-round line: Stone Pilsner. "There are a couple of slight changes here and there, but the main focus is on fermentation with our house lager yeast. Lagers require more veast and time in the fermentation vessels, which over time allows for maturation, resulting in a crisp and clean quality you would expect in a lager."

The 4.7% ABV pilsner is yet another example of local breweries feeding the growing public demand for lighter-bodied, smoother brews. Stone Director of Communications and Public Relations Lizzie Younkin points out that, according to NielsenIQ, total craft beer sales in San Diego were down 1% over the last 52 weeks, but craft Pilsners grew by 10%. She continues, "Some reasons why lighter craft beer (e.g., pilsners) may be growing while the overall segment declines include consumers opting for premiumization from their typical domestic light beers, as well as a broader macro trend of moderation." Younkin cites the aging core demographic of craft beer customers, along with the more health-conscious lifestyle of newly-legal consumers as key contributors to this macro trend.

Of course, more variety is a good thing — and Pilsners are enjoyed throughout the world. As Ketcham points out, "Pilsner is a style of beer that is world renowned and is frequently requested by our guests that travel from all across the globe. While we do have a delicious lager in Stone Buenaveza Salt & Lime Lager, we find that some guests prefer a style of lager with more hop intensity. We've brewed a variety of different pilsner styles over the years, but found we really

enjoyed the American hop profile in our pilsners."

The hops used in Stone Pilsner, Cashmere and Vista, impart an orangey breadiness with a herbal aroma to the crisp, crushable beer. The choice of public hops — as opposed to proprietary, patented hops — was important to Stone. Jeremy Moynier, Senior Manager of Brewing and Innovation explains, "Proprietary hops are awesome, and have gained the most focus over the last few

years (and at Stone we use a lot of them). But it's important to have a balance of both in the supply chain. There has been a lot of work done on the public breeding side recently to bolster that program. As part of the Hop Research Council and Hop Quality Group, we support public breeding to ensure we have a healthy balance of both public and private. Some of the core Stone hops (Centennial and Chinook) come out of public breeding. Vista has good agronomics and has good sustainable properties. We like to have choices, obviously, when

it comes to hops. It's nice to have an American pilsner with public American hops."

Stone Pilsner is now available throughout the county on tap and in cans.

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# Bluefin still missing in action – Grunion for bait during observation only? - Yellowtail limits a short drive south - Santee Lakes Catfish Opener features tagged fish for prizes

Dock Totals 3/31 - 4/6: 922 anglers aboard 39 half-day to 3-day trips out of San Diego landings over the past week caught 81 bocaccio, 2 calico bass, 14 lingcod, 4598 rockfish, 37 sand bass, 124 sculpin, 44 sheephead, 406 whitefish, and 3 yellowtail.

Saltwater: Bluefin tuna are still missing in action for the most part, though weather has been a bit tossy outside. The full-day to 3-day boats are giving it a look in U.S. and Mexican waters, then heading to the high spots and structure to load up on rockfish so as not to spend the entire trip looking for biting bluefin. Some have been metered and they are out there, but maybe it was the eclipse, maybe Starlink launches, maybe a turn in the water, or maybe folks just aren't spitting on the hook just right to get them to bite. But seriously, it is a bit quizzical that we aren't seeing them in good numbers considering the strong bite so early in the season just a couple weeks ago.

One three-quarter day boat, the Liberty, did find a few willing yellowtail, and reports from the northern Baja Pacific coast is the jacks are hitting hard and steady, with many limits caught. As more boats get down toward

Colinet to off San Quintin, I expect to see the San Diego fleet's yellowtail counts improve. The problem is location. With bluefin still out there and the biggest draw, captains have to make a call: whether to spend time trying to get them or to seek rockfish and yellowtail that are more active on the high spots much closer to the coast than where bluefin are expected. Ah well, now to the sand.

As a SoCal kid, bounding around in tidepools on low tide, soaking a bait from a pier or jetty, and nighttime grunion runs were a good part of my outdoor activities in a day and age when you spent a lot of time indoors only if you had a flu or some other ailment. We never lounged in front of a screen during the day. Once chores and homework were finished, it was almost an unwritten law that the out of doors was where we should be and indoors was basically off limits, except for maybe lunch. Once the sun set, then it was time to scurry back home for dinner.

Grunion runs were the rare occasions when we could be out late at night. I loved watching the fish wriggle into and out of the sand, and though we'd catch a few, we never collected them the way others did during the runs. As a young adult, I realized just how good fishing could be at night during grunion runs and began targeting halibut when the little silver sides were spawning. It seemed the spawns of halibut and grunion would often coincide, and I caught many halibut with roe when fishing behind the runs. I would often pin a grunion on a basic Carolina rig and cast it out into the surf and hope for a taker that wasn't a leopard or shovelnose sand shark. This is still acceptable during the open seasons on grunion. That said, during "observation only" closures from April through June, "no take" includes using a fresh-caught grunion for bait.

You can, however, use grunion caught during open season (and then frozen) during the closure. How can authorities tell if a bait was fresh caught or frozen? Bill Varney, noted surf angler and author of Surf Fishing: The Light-Line Revolution, broke it down recently in a social media post: "Hey folks, today I had a chance to talk with my longtime friend Warden Ben Matias of the DFW about some questions that have come up regarding grunion collection. Ben is the Warden for the

years of experience. The question was: What happens if you collect grunion during the open season and then use them for bait during the 'observation' season. Will DFW ticket you because you have no proof they were collected legally during open season? Ben: 'That's a gray area" and we have to think logically to determine if they were taken during the open season. In order to determine when they were taken, the officer will examine the grunion (to see if they are slimy and fresh or have been frozen) and ask you some questions. Be prepared to know where, when, and at what time you took them. Also, if you have any witnesses who may have been with you at the time. If the answers seem reasonable that the grunion were collected during open season, then the angler is fine to use them. There is no 'in possession' limit at this time so don't be concerned with how many, collected legally, you have with you."

These days, when many surf anglers are choosing plastics and the newer castable crankbaits made especially for surf fishing, pinning a grunion on is not quite as common, and by all means, do not do so during the closure unless it was caught during open season and frozen. Saving a photo from when legally collected may also be prudent to make your case if approached by CDFW officers when fishing behind a run. If handled correctly, when the season is open, you can collect a limit, then freeze grunion for use as bait when the season is observation only. (One issue I have found is once thawed grunion tend to

If you still have worries about using grunion during observation only, salted anchovies. Smelt or sardines will also work when the predators are feeding on grunion. Fish that feed in the surf at night have big eyes and excellent vision, so those plastics and crank baits will also perform well, even in the dark hours when grunion usually hit the beach. The most important part is finding them, as it can be predicted when they will run, but what parts of which beaches they will choose to lay their eggs can be hard to call. Best bet is to grab the flashlight and a fanny pack tackle bag, trudge the beaches during the later half of the predicted run hours, and hope. The next predicted runs will be April 23-26, roughly between 10 pm and 1 am.



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#### Boom!

 Police in Rose, Idaho, revealed on April 10 the names of the victim and suspect in a home invasion that took place in March, EastIdahoNews.com reported. Officials said that around 2 a.m., 85-year-old Christine Jenneiahn was sleeping in her home when she awoke to a man shining a flashlight and pointing a gun at her. Derek Ephriam Condon, 39, allegedly then handcuffed Jennei-ahn and moved her to the living room, where he cuffed her to a chair and asked her where the valuables were. She told him there were two safes, and he left to investigate. While he was out of the room, Jenneiahn dragged herself and the chair into her bedroom and got her .357 Magnum revolver, which she hid on a nearby couch after returning to the living room. Ultimately, she made a "now or never" decision and drew the gun, fatally striking Condon with two shots. He returned fire, hitting her multiple times, but Jenneiahn survived and has already left the hospital. The case, said Bingham County Prosecutor Ryan Jolley, "presents one of the most heroic acts of self-preservation I have ever heard of." Official's said the two knew each other and it was not a random incident.

#### **Rectum? Killed 'im**

■ A 24-year-old man, Yogesh R, in Bengaluru, India, died on March 25 of massive intestinal damage after a friend, Murali, 23, playfully inflated his rectum with a powerful car wash blowdryer. The friend, an employee at a motorbike service center, had finished washing and drying

the vehicle of the victim when horseplay ensued, the *Times of India* reported. Murali was arrested for culpable homicide

- In the wee hours of April 10 at a train station in Sydney, Australia, an unexpected commuter showed up, United Press International reported. 


