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
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

The flame blame game What caused the pier fire, and will all that smoke obscure the new fish market?

The historic fire at the end of the longest wooden pier on the West Coast has, unsurprisingly, been the subject of considerable local speculation. A random man-on-the-street poll of Oceansiders about what caused the fire that destroyed the vacant Ruby's Diner building brought out these toxic gems: "The homeless were camping underneath the pier and they had a camp fire." "The city did it for the insurance." "It was arson by people who were kicked off the pier." The best one I heard was that there was a homeless guy who was shooting firecrackers from his boat under the pier.

At a press conference April 29, city officials said that while the official forensic report has not yet been issued, they could rule out two popular theories. First, there was no welding activity going on, since there was no demolition happening at the time of the fire. Ruby's Diner went out of business during Covid and the scheduled construction for a new restaurant tenant had not yet begun. And

while the operators of the adjacent Brine Box cafe, operating out of a 10° x 10° building, did have access to the Ruby's building, they were only using a hotplate in the kitchen.

an hour-long video produced in 1987 that told the story of a time capsule being installed in the last piling to be installed at the end of the new pier. "It had items relating to the

Oceanside fire officials said that the blaze appears to have started under the pier, and that an electrical mishap couldn't be ruled out.

This was not Oceanside's first pier fire. Kristi Hawthorne, Director of the Oceanside Historical Society says there was a 1976 fire

at the Pier Cafe, also at the end of the pier, "but it was knocked down quickly. That was not the same thing. This fire took like 24 hours to get under control." She says that building was then removed.

"I just want to throw my hands up," says Hawthorne about the rumors. "People are saying 'My family helped build this pier' and that's just not true" — a reference to the reason behind the 5200 names etched into railing boards along the side of the pier. "They collected like \$25 or \$50 for each name. It was done during Oceanside's centennial celebration in 1988. It was called 'buy a piece of the pier,' but that money was collected by the Centennial Foundation, and it went into the centennial celebration. None of it went to the city to rebuild the pier." Hawthorne doubts that the names lost in the fire will automatically be re-engraved.

She says Oceanside Library director C.J. DiMento uncovered

redevelopment of Oceanside at the time: seven silver dollar-sized medallions with current and former city councilmembers, police badges, and lifeguard patches. The

medallions might have survived, but I wonder how those patches held up in the fire."

Hawthorne says the pier is a city treasure. "People who fish can get food for their family. It's almost like a city park, a wooden promenade where you can take in the ocean experience. So many people recognize it. It's a beautiful landmark." The city hopes to have 75 percent of the pier re-opened soon, with fencing installed to keep people out of the scene of the fire at the very end. Oceanside's elected officials were optimistic, saying this was an opportunity to revitalize the nearly 2000-foot structure.

This is Oceanside's sixth pier. Press accounts say the previous pier underwent significant storm damage in 1976, which led to the "amputation" or removal of 18 feet from the end of the pier in 1977. "Once that damage happened in '76, the pier so

end of the pier in 1977. "Once that damage happened in '76, the pier sort of went on a downhill slide," says Hawthorne. Reports say that pier visitors could feel the pier "swaying" in heavy surf. After a second 1978 storm, the city decided to replace that pier with this one that opened in 1986.

While floorboards that were torn out during the firefighting operation will be reinstalled, city engineer Brian Thomas says that there are no immediate plans to replace the pier pilings. He says that typically, piers have a life of 50 to 100 years, and that he is not aware of any plans to replace this pier, which, at 38 years old, has already outlasted the previous pier, which stood intact for about 30 years.

The media attention drawn by the pier inferno came at the expense of a long-awaited harbor event that launched just three days later. After two years of battling Oceanside city bureaucracy, Oceanside native Travis Tielens says he was finally allowed to unveil his weekly fresh fish market, where local fishermen can sell their freshly caught catch directly to local consumers. "This is the second market like this is California," says Tielens. "It was allowed by [2016 state law] AB 226, which is called Pacific To Plate." He says the Oceanside market follows the lead of Harbor Dockside Market in Seaport Village.

The first weekend saw six pop-up kiosks sell out most of their locally-caught fish. Halibut was the first to go. Some vendors sold still-alive sheepshead, crab, and black cod that were swimming in buckets. "People were saying, 'I can't believe it's been this hard to get fresh fish, when we live so close to the ocean,'" says Tielens. "A lot of people were asking for tuna and sea bass, but those fish haven't moved into our waters yet. Eventually, we'll get mackerel, sardines, and of course live lobster."

Tielens says his dream to bring a fresh fish market to the harbor faced big resistance. "This has been a struggle with the city for

over two years. They gave me all these ceaseand-desists, telling me my permits would not be issued. Finally Mayor [Esther] Sanchez dropped what she was doing and stepped in to make this happen."

Then there's the salty locals who actually do the fishing. "Oceanside fishermen have a reputation as roughnecks who can't work together," says Tielens. "Fisherman aren't necessarily the most social types. I had to ask them to put their egos aside and look at the bigger picture."

Happily, a declining supply of fish was not one of Tielens' worries. "The year before last was the most fish ever caught off Southern California," he says. "The biggest ever biomass of yellowfin is right now off Point Conception. The ocean is pretty abundant right now. There is more halibut now than I've ever seen in my life."

Tielens, 36, has been fishing for 25 years. He has a year-long permit for the market, but sees no reason it would end. The Fishermen's Market of North County is held every Sunday from 8 am to 2 pm in the parking area just north of Joe's Crab Shack restaurant at the Oceanside Harbor.

Beach blanket bust-upsScraps by the surf not just for surfers any more

In April, San Diego County beaches saw their share of violence. A man was stabbed at Black's Beach, and a woman was arrested for the perp was masturbating — Black's has a long history as San Diego's nude-friendly beach — and that this caused the conflict between him and the victim. Others hypothesized the stabbing was because of territorial surf beef — which seemed more likely.

On April 29, I spoke to two surfers at Pacific Beach who have surfed throughout San Diego County since the 1980s. "I've surfed at Black's many times," said Surfer Joe. "There are a lot of new surfers there, and they all have attitudes — and it's not a locals-only thing. I doubt the stabbing was because of the people at Black's being territorial."

Surfer John continued, "Now, people who surf at the South Mission jetty — it's a big-time localized spot. A crew regulates down there. And the same at Windansea Beach. It's just the nature of the guys who want to protect their spot."

Those two surf spots have brought some heat lately, according to *Crimemapping.com*. At the Mission Beach jetty parking lot, where many surfers park their cars, a man was arrested for assaulting someone on February 19. And on Felspar Street by Windansea, SDPD arrested an unidentified female in March for an assault with a deadly weapon. But there has been trouble elsewhere as well: at Dog Park in Ocean Beach, 100 people, including some surfers and bodyboarders, were involved in a fight last February.

According to the other bodyboarders and surfers I spoke with on Monday, territorial surf fights in San Diego County have decreased since the 1980s and 1990s,

assault with a deadly weapon by a beach in Carlsbad. Two men were arrested for assaulting different people in the Tourmaline Surfing Park parking lot and at the Encinitas surf spots by the 101 freeway. And Imperial Beach sheriffs arrested a woman for assaulting someone with a deadly weapon by that city's pier.

The person who was stabbed in Black's Beach in La Jolla on April 10 was reported to have non-life-threatening wounds. Mainstream news did not mention why the person was stabbed, but fans of the spot were happy to opine on social media. Some said

thanks to cell phones and waterproof cameras that can capture incriminating video. Pair the technology with increased awareness, social media shaming, and changing attitudes, and surf-related violence may be on its way to becoming history, despite the recent violence.

"Honestly, I liked it a lot better ten years ago when our surf was regulated and there were more surf confrontations," Surfer Joe concluded. "That was the school of hard knocks."

UNDER THE RADAR

It's complicated North County Republican Congressman Darrell Issa, apparently assured of reelection this fall in his safe Republican seat, has been largely flying under the national radar of late. That's a change from his political salad days, when the billionaire car alarm magnate bathed in the spotlight as a powerful House committee chairman with help from a glamorous young media assistant, whom he has since quietly married and who has subsequently dropped from public view.

"Chairman Issa has an ability to escape from aides assigned to accompany him during events," then-29-year-old **Becca Glover Watkins**, the press secretary for the Issa-led House Oversight and Government Reform Committee, told the *Daily Beast* in a Jan. 18, 2012 post. "You have to pay attention to where he is, because if you don't, he'll slip away and stop in at another office or event.


"Nothing's more nerve-wracking than not knowing where he is 10 minutes before he's set to be on national television in front of millions of people. But he always makes it on time with a huge grin on his face. I've gotten used to the challenge of keeping track of him now, but there were a few times when I thought he had been kidnapped."

Working under Issa was hectic, she continued: "Our days can be very long, so we keep the local Chinese restaurants in business. I usually start early, at 6:15 am, when I read the 'overnights,' the news stories that come out while we sleep. I try to get home at

a reasonable hour to see my husband and our dog, Poppy, but 'reasonable' is a moving target: it usually means 8 or 9 pm."

More of her backstory was related in a January 28, 2008 post by the *Washington Examiner*. "Becca Glover, sister of Washington hostess and Ashcroft Group lobbyist **Juleanna Glover**, recently got engaged to **Pepper Watkins**, her boyfriend of four years,"

says the account. "Watkins, who is a graduate student at Columbia, got down on one knee and proposed to Glover with a diamond ring that has been in his family since the 19th century. A wedding date hasn't been finalized, but Glover expects the wedding to take place in the late fall of this year, or spring of next." Concludes the cheerful item, "The news will dismay many of Washington's social bachelors, who have gotten used to fawning over Glover at her big sister's parties." In an Octo-





Fast forward to July 24, 2018, when Issa filed papers to split from his wife of 38 years, Kathy, per a San Diego Superior Court divorce filing posted online by the *Times*


of San Diego. Six months earlier, Issa had announced he wouldn't run for reelection, opening the way for Democrat Mike Levin to claim Issa's 49th District seat in November. But just two years later, Issa returned to the House by winning the race for the safe Republican 48th District spot vacated by convicted felon **Duncan Hunter**, Jr., who Issa recommended for a pardon that was ultimately given by president **Donald Trump**.

Issa's 2020 primary bid for the seat was endorsed by Hunter's father, also named Duncan, who occupied the House seat before his son took over. "This is just Darrell Issa's

quid-pro-quo reward for shamelessly defending Duncan Hunter Jr.'s behavior for two years and suggesting Hunter be granted clemency instead of being punished," said GOP San Diego ex-city councilman **Carl DeMaio**, who Issa knocked off in the primary.



Homeless community finds new purpose, place to pitch tents

Reginald Crabtree was in a bind. The longtime member of San Diego's homeless community had just been served with a police order to clear his tent and other belongings from his spot alongside the College Avenue exit from the I-8 freeway,

and he wasn't sure where he was going to spend the night. "I headed toward campus to see if there were any leftovers from the previous night's fraternity ragers — sometimes, those guys get so drunk they leave unfinished bottles on the lawn. That's when I saw this big group of kids marching up College Avenue. A lot of them were waving signs about Palestine and freedom, but a lot of them were carrying tents, too. And some of them looked almost as old as I

was! I blended right in, and marched along, just to see where they were planning to set up camp. And what do you know, they set it up right on the campus green! Such a nice, sweet spot. As they told me that as long as we don't tell any Jews that they should go back to Poland, we can sleep here as long as it takes. I don't know how long that is, but as long as a Jew doesn't try to take my spot, I'm not going to tell him to go anywhere."

Not All Walls

Anti-Zionist activists set up new PedWest border checkpoint

Last week, students at UCLA drew national attention when, as part of their pro-Palestinian protest, they began restricting the movements of students who refused to wear an anti-Zionist wristband. Self-identified Zionists and others were prevented from entering certain parts of campus, and in some cases, campus buildings such as libraries. This week, UCLA senior and political activism major Adam Larper has taken his bike-rack barricade and taken things up a notch: he's set up a checkpoint at the PedWest entrance to the United States from Mexico, and is asking would-be immigrants to affirm their anti-Zionist beliefs before being granted entrance to the country. "All my life," explains Larper,

"I've been told that immigrants are America's future, and that they make America stronger. But why would I want to make America stronger? And why would I want a future surrounded by people who have left their indigenous land and betrayed their traditional culture to take part in the great colonialist crime that is the United States — and by extension, America's colonialist ally in the Middle East, Israel? I hate President Trump because he hates brown people and he built this awful wall to keep them far away. Not me. I love brown people. It's Zionists I can't abide. And sometimes, you have to use the political tools — like this wall — that your enemies give you, you know? I learned that in class."

Besieged Trump supporter expresses solidarity with Pro-Palestinian protestors

Last week, the City of San Diego threatened to cite and fine Jake Bamberson, the leader of Republicans of Pacific Beach, because of a pro-Trump tent his group had set up on the boardwalk. But Bamberson says he has no intention of moving, and he cites a surprising source of inspiration: the many pro-Palestinian college students who have spent the past month demonstrating by setting up encampments on university grounds. "Honestly, those kids have my sympathies," says Bamberson. "They have

real and convincing reasons to believe that the Palestinian people have been unjustly displaced and ghettoized by an illegal occupying force, and that the so-called attack on Israel on October 7th of last year should really be viewed as a heroic attempt at liberation by force. And now they're setting up tents and waving

flags and demanding that the world take note. I'm not saying I was at the January 6 'invasion' of the United Sates Capitol; I'm just saying that I have real and convincing reasons to believe that Donald Trump was unjustly displaced from the White House, and that his supporters have been ghettoized by an illegal occupying force known as the Biden Administration. And if some of those supporters then tried to liberate their country by force, well, at least they didn't rape anybody in the attempt. So

now I'm setting up my tent and waving my flags and demanding that the world take note. I'm not really a fan of Hamas, but I get where those students are coming from. Yeah, the city is telling me I have to move, even though I'm on public property, just because my message might make some people uncomfortable. They're citing these bullshit code amendments, talking about me disrupting traffic. But those protesting college kids and I know the truth. The Man doesn't like it when you step out of line."



City spokeshunk Brad Goodguy pleads with Bamberson to take down his tent: "But 50 Trump is bad, and he did bad things. Even if you think the larger Republican cause 20 is just, don't you think it's morally repugnant to choose this particular moment in 24 history to rally?" As of press time, Bamberson remained unmoved.

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The Pete Wilson legacy in thirty pieces

Puzzling

No California politician gets more blame for the denigration of the migrant than Peter Barton Wilson, now 91, last century's Mr. San Diego. Now, in a political year that has been inflamed by another crisis at the border, Wilson's name — and legacy — is newsworthy again. Was the the man an architect of anti-Latino prejudice or a champion of state sovereignty? His

pertinent history begins with three years as a Marine Corps platoon leader, followed by a Yale law degree (it took him four tries to pass the bar). San Diego Union journalist Herb Klein, later President Nixon's speechwriter, encouraged Wilson to come west, where opportunities for a Goldwater Republican abounded. After a brief stint as a criminal defense attorney, he embraced politics, a career for

which he seemed born, his persona nailed by a GOP pal: "coldblooded and cleareyed." Wilson won every seat he ran for in the Golden State, except for one loss in the Republican primary for Governor in 1978. Even so, from 1966 to 1999, he was always in office: state assemblyman, San Diego mayor, two-term California Senator and twoterm Governor. When Wilson retired in 1998, he'd proven himself a perennial winner, sunsetting with a 55 percent approval rating. This despite his great failure — Proposition 187.

The Prop 187 referendum, which passed 59 to 41 percent, would have created a state "screening system" to track undocumented migrants ("illegals" or "aliens") who sought education, healthcare, and social services. The proposed law was never instituted; in 1998, a federal district court ruled it unconstitutional. A hearing before the appellate court was never filed by Wilson's successor Gray Davis. Outraged voters, mostly Hispanics, believed that the proposition demonized all immigrants, with or without documents. Organized pushback branded the Republican Party in California as meanspirited, and, by Bill Clinton's second term, the state GOP had fallen into disrepute, an electoral failure. Has been ever since.

These days — as everyone knows, even those who are leaving the state — many California voters have repudiated Wilsonian exclusion and, in turn, formed a Democratic juggernaut. The party has enjoyed consistent supermajorities in the state assembly and a 40-12 margin in congressional districts. But the sentiments behind Prop 187 have endured within the Republican minority, and have even helped congeal the Republican Party's party's more nativist, America-First elements. (In 1960, there were 9.7 million immigrants living in the United States. In 2018, there were 45 million, a fourfold increase.) The MAGA goal is to restrict the "foreign element" with walls and deportation for the undocumented.

An old Mexican-American adage says: "We didn't cross the border; the border crossed us." The politically crafted, 1200-mile line between us and Mexico has proven, in many ways, to be porous and all but unpoliceable. It's also a very active exchange site for tourists, businessmen, goods, cultures, and migrants; the last, some say, as a necessary element of the U.S. labor force. The U.S.-Mexican border — at San Ysidro, Otay Mesa, and Tecate — is the busiest back-and-forth

crossing in the world. Writ large, our Southern border is peerless in its attraction and its repulsion to "good people" on "both sides."

5In the 1960s and 1970s — his time

in San Diego - Wilson was characterized by the following reported news and opinions: "San Diego's Outstanding Young Man" in 1968 was called "Mister Clean" and tagged as resembling a "college freshman from the 1940s," his face wearing "an almost Wall Street pallor." His hobby was, with his first wife, Betty, "watching the news on TV." Neil Morgan, editor of The Tribune, faulted him "for being colorless," but otherwise endorsed him at every turn. He didn't live in La Jolla but in Clairemont; his collars were "button-down" and his brow was "always dry, as if tiny fans" were concealed there. His hair never touched the tops of his ears; he never stooped to the "mod shagginess" of 1970s men, and he had nothing in common with "the rebel generation." He was "taciturn to the point of freezing."

In 1971, he was elected Mayor, having spent \$175,000 of other people's money for the \$12,000-ayear job, less than the city paid bus drivers; and he did something unthinkable for party politicians — he turned down donations and political support from C. Arnholt Smith, the banker-industrialist who ruled the local GOP for decades. Some say this proved to be the beginning of the end for the local Republican party.

6 Many Latinos, especially those of Hispanic heritage, who were here before Prop 187, identified with the small-business focus of the Republican Party. They helped Reagan, Wilson, and Schwarzenegger reign in Sacramento. It's also true that many Hispanics voted Democrat, even though they didn't want to. Why did they abandon Wilson? In an interview after he left office, Wilson claimed that Latinos were smart enough to know "there's a right way and a wrong way" for immigrants to come, but they were also victims — "misinformed

[and] misled . . . by the Democratic Party that they were discriminated against by racists." Not Pete's fault for stoking anti-Hispanic prejudice, he said: "There are few nastier smears than the charge of racism." Wilson denies he's ever been racist or anti-immigrant: "I value the continuing energy, drive, guts, the talent that has been brought to this country by people who came as legal immigrants."

Ricardo Flores, executive director of San Diego's Local Initiatives Support Corporation, disagrees. He tells me that among immigrants, things are "deadly worse, as witnessed in the 2019 mass murder of 22 people in an El Paso Walmart by a man who admitted he was targeting 'Mexicans' and wrote that his actions were 'a response to the Hispanic invasion of Texas.' Wilson's War on Latinos continues to echo long past his days in power, in part, because of the nativist streak in white Protestant American society that at first rejected the Germans, the Irish, then the Italians, and now Latinos. Hate and demonizing 'others' by elected leaders who consistently fail to improve the lives of their constituents has never proved to be a legacy builder, and for Wilson this remains true."

Zsean Walsh, of the Wilson-Walsh law firm in Los Angeles, was Wilson's chief of staff and remains his current law partner in Century City. The office's website notes that the "team has decades of experience helping individuals and companies bridge the gaps between business, law, and local, state, and federal governments." In 2023,

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
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Walsh said that "There's no...man or woman who's done more for the city and county of San Diego than Pete Wilson." Though he cites Wilson as "absolutely critical" to the "influence and rise" of Hispanic power in California, some wonder whether Wilson deserves credit, or if it should be given to the Latinos who organized their legislative presence against him. It is true, however, that Wilson is one of a vanishing breed — the moderate Republican: he signed a reparations bill for the unjustly detained Japanese-Americans during WWII; he voted for a Martin Luther King Jr. federal holiday; he got Ray Kroc to keep the Padres in San Diego when, miffed, the Kroc was leaving in 1973; and he jumpstarted the Gaslamp Quarter, which Robert Kittle, former editorial page editor at the *Union-Tribune*, called a "sweeping development plan that transformed downtown San Diego from a place of tattoo parlors and strip clubs to a vibrant urban core."

As the *Union-Tri-*bune's Michael Smolens wrote in 2020, "Wilson was Trump before Trump." The then-President, Wilson said, "has very good judgment, and very good people around him making honest calls." "His opposition" to immigration "is based on style," apparently a reference to his ad hominem abuse. Wilson loved the idea of the Wall, as well as making immigration merit-based, as opposed to granting it for the sake of family reunification. Furthermore, he said that Trump's "global leadership" had bolstered our friends and weakened our

9In 1994, Latino anger over 187 produced loud, sustained protests — thousands marched and rallied at the San Diego and Los Angeles city halls. "Wilson How Long Did It Take U To Cross the Ocean," read a sign made by a Century High School student in Santa Ana. foes "because he's been forthright and strong." After 212,000 Americans had died of Covid, Wilson said lots more would have died had it "not been for Trump's early action."

FRaid." One activist said at the time, "Among my peers, Wilson's about as much a legend as *La Llorona* [a vengeful ghost], *El Cucuy* [a child-tormenting demon], and all the other monsters our parents scared us with as children—except he was the real thing."

Today, Americans are once again incensed by the notion of an ungovernable border, just in time for a presidential election. All new arrivals must be stopped! Build the wall! Barb the wire! End catch and release! Deputize citizens! Remain in Mexico! Restrict asylum. Five thousand a month tops! According to his "Presidential Transition Project," Trump's immigration policy includes a cap on "refugee admissions," finishing the Wall, and "activeduty military personnel and National Guardsmen to assist in arrest operations along the border." The new perk for the asylum seeker is the boutique option: "premium processing," pay to stay.

11 In 1972, during Mayor Pete's first tenure, Sheriff John Duffy

issued an order to taxicab drivers in the form of a code with which to contact the police when swarthy men with no English got in the backseat. Though the order was hardly legal, Duffy argued that such culling would cut down on "bad hombres" picking up border crossers for overcharged trips to LA, and said that drivers, if they finked, would not be charged for "transporting them," one of those rarely enforced misdemeanors. Livid, Wilson put the kibosh on it. The other border crime Wilson quashed was "thugs ...lying in wait" to exploit migrants. Wilson later described those migrants as "victims of real atrocities. I mean rape, robbery, in some cases pretty close to murder." His dozen pro-cop brawlers "went down and cleaned that up in short order."

This is the thirty-year anniversary of "Three Strikes and You're Out." Passed as an initiative by Californians, codified in law by the legislature, and signed by Wilson, its consequences were: 1) doubling of prisons and inmates; 2) mak-

ing guard unions major donors to statewide campaigns; 3) brief reinstatement of the death penalty for child murderers and for people killed while being carjacked or serving on a jury. Strikes accumulated until the third strike got you 25 years to life. The overpunitive law has since been modified — automatic sentences limited,

parole hearings granted, and lessor crimes cut from the list. Subsequently, the state inmate population has dropped from 165,000 to 95,000.

The border crisis

5never ends. Wilson, like his predecessors and successors, has faced vigilantes: Roger Hedgecock's "light up the border" campaign; Tom Metzger, California Grand Dragon of the Ku Klux Klan, who organized the Klan Border Watch to "roundup and return" Mexicans; California employers who approved of the trade in "driver's licenses, social security cards, and all manner of ID" sold to migrants to legitimize them as farm laborers and construction workers. Wilson acknowledged that overlooking fake documents, though under the table, was pro-business — sanctions would ruin the economy.

Not long before he ran for president in 1995, Wilson had throat surgery. The result was that he couldn't speak for months, which kept him from making the normal announcement at a rally and stifled the famously uncharismatic Mr. San Diego from campaigning. A month and a day later, he withdrew with a million-dollar debt.

15The policies for which Wilson was praised (reasonable limits on development, merit-based incentives in promotion and education, pro-choice on reproductive rights) struck a peculiar balance with stances that antagonized voters: he was anti-collective bargaining, anti-social services for the undocumented, anti-bilingual education, antiunion, anti-collective bargaining (teachers especially), anti-birthright citizenship, and anti-LGBTQ protections in the workplace.

One crisis that turned in Governor Wilson's favor was a deficit budget of \$400 million — given to him with "all the warmth and cheer of an open grave" — by the legislature in 1992. Instead of raising taxes (anathema to Republicans), he proposed cutting every program in sight (education, the most), negotiating IOUs to be honored a year later, and leaving the mess to assembly members to duke out. How did he help wrangle a deal? "I picked the eight smallest guys," he said, "and one at a time broke their arms." He was also hailed for reapportioning districts whose boundaries resembled "snakes and belts." Accordingly, moderates won more seats. In addition, he passed term limits, trimming the pork bellies in Sacramento. By 1994, Wilson used his budget clout to push for 187 and further state savings. Even though that cause backfired, he won a second term (55 to 40 percent), and by then, the state was back in the black.

17The most expansive interview Pete Wilson has done in the 25 years since he left office is one from 2019 with Gustavo Arellano, columnist for the Los Angeles Times, a critic of 187. Give Wilson credit: at 86, he speaks thoughtfully, with coherent, if wordy, arguments; Biden or Trump might covet his explanatory preparedness on border issues. Arellano asked what gave birth to 187. Arellano asked. Wilson replied that in the 1990s, the federal government "not only were not doing the job adequately in terms of securing the border; to the contrary, they had mandated very

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expensive services upon the states, state and local taxpayers to provide . . . education, healthcare Healthcare had mushroomed." Wilson cited federal law that, in his words, "made it possible for illegal immigrants to enter the country, 18-year-old women, pregnant, go the county hospital, have prenatal care, have delivery, postdelivery, postnatal care, and the children were, of course, citizens." Yes, the system was severely stressed. But hospitals handled the influx. Later in the interview, Wilson rightly predicted that what was then "a problem for the border states will be one for all the states." As for DACA, Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals, a program that renews visas for people brought here as children, Wilson opposes it: "If you recognize the DACA kids [and] grant amnesty, you encourage future illegal immigration." He had no comment about deporting noncitizens, whether young or old. The policy for Dreamers continues to face court challenges and appeals.

Searching a number of libraries for biographies, I find the shelves mostly empty. U.S. Senator Pete Wilson: The First Six Years. A manuscript, Mayor Pete Wilson's Speeches. His eight-page "Open Letter on Affirmative Action to the People of California." An 84-page report, Governor Pete Wilson and the San Jose Mercury News: a Case Study. Chapters (covering both accomplishments and controversies) in a few California political histories. Numerous news articles and commentaries: Reporters spilled much ink about his flavorless personali-

ty. No full-length biography of Wilson has been written. Nothing - authorized or not — and no loving tribute to him in the San Diego public library system. I sometimes wonder if he existed at all. so vacant is the curiosity of writers to investigate his legacy.

19In 1982, the Supreme Court ruled in Plyler v. Doe case, a 5-4 decision, that access to education by children of undocumented parents was protected no matter how their parents came to the United States. The majority opinion cited the Equal Protection Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment: Undocumented children were allowed to "live within the structures of our civic institutions." The decision also eliminated a \$1000-a-year fee parents in Texas had to pay to state schools. Cities and states instead footed the bill for pens and pencils. The *Plyler* case backstopped any legal challenge that arose because of 187. None ever did, in part, because denying kids an education

is unconstitutional.

20^{As governor in} 1995, Wilson proposed ending affirmative action in University of California admissions and hiring. In defense of keeping the policy, civil rights lawyer Eva Paterson told Wilson that with Prop 187 the prior year, he'd "become the symbol of racism in the United States." Nonetheless, two out of three regents voted with him. The decision was among Wilson's most prophetic feats. In June 2023, the Supreme Court struck down affirmative action at colleges nationwide.

21 Upon leaving office in 1999, Wilson's high approval rating (55 percent) was the envy of any politician. It may be traceable to his blaming the poor and the vulnerable in his 1995 second inaugural address: "Welfare is to be a safety net, not a hammock The costs are simply too high for society to continue tolerating the promiscuity and irresponsibility that have produced generations of unwed teen mothers." Morally pugnacious, Wilson gave himself the kudos: "Leadership means doing the things that you, in your heart, know need to be done. It means making people unhappy. It means making them enemies. Not that I enjoy doing that. But I'm not going to shrink from combat if, to avoid it, you've got to avoid doing what you know is needed."

Claims the undocumented stir: they take jobs away from unemployed Americans; they never learn the language; they're pawns or proponents of the Great Replacement Theory, making non-Hispan-

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ic Whites a minority by 2045; their caravans have received carte blanche by a secret pact between President Biden and Mexico's President; and they're swarming into the country, according to Elon Musk, to "vote" in 2024. They can't vote, of course. When Democrats press fines on those who hire the undocumented (see Tyson Foods), the Republicans call foul — industrial agriculture and the meat industry will be robbed of cheap labor.

23 In the fall of 2020, not long after George Floyd's murder, the Pete Wilson statue in Horton Plaza was removed. Among Hispanic leaders who demanded its ouster was Dolores Huerta, co-founder of the United Farm Workers with Cesar Chavez. She argued, in a Union-Tribune editorial, that because of Wilson's "inflammatory rhetoric and imagery," demonizing every desperate Mexican or Central American coming to the U.S. to work, the vertical tribute was "glorifying his action ... tantamount to Confederate statues." Robert Kittle wrote that recent cancel culture, which derides Wilson's legacy as gaslighting history, is comparable to the vilification of Father Junipero Serra for flogging Native peoples. However, Kittle said, Serra's "critics display scant regard for his seminal contributions in bringing European civilization to the California frontier." Within a few months, Wilson's tall brass likeness was stood back up, nearby, on private ground.

24Chicken or egg?
Did Prop 187 drive Latinos into a Democratic bloc or are they Democrats ab ovo? Enrique Morones and Ricardo Flores state in the *Union-Tribune* that since Wilson's ascendancy in 1971, the Latino population climbed from its then-12.7 percent to 30 percent now, and is forecast to top 41 percent in 2050. In 2023, registered Hispanics are 55 percent Democratic, 16 percent Republican, and 29 percent Independent. Latinos oppose illegal immigration. But historically, they resent Republicans who play the race card and target their kinsmen as criminals. Downstream from Wilson's tenure-

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25 Political ads that use an "attack" or "satire" format capture our interest the most. Wilson's thirty-second Prop 187 ad in 1994 was called "They Keep Coming." A night-vision camera with grainy footage shows people with parcels running through traffic at the San Ysidro crossing and onto I-5. The message, which Wilson termed "a statement of fact," is that their cicada-like dispersal will in-

fect America's "blood and soil." In 2019, the California Latino Legislative Caucus released a short video, a backhanded slap against our erstwhile governor. Dozens of state and local officials expressed their gratitude to him for fueling a political revolution among Latinos, who

now help Democrats rule most civic assemblies: "Our work isn't done, but we want to say thank you, Governor Wilson. Now, on this 25th anniversary of Proposition 187, we have a roadmap for the entire country to follow. A roadmap on how to fight back against racist, xenophobic policies. Thank you, Pete Wilson. Thank you, Pete Wilson. Thank you, Pete Wilson. Oh, and happy anniversary." Mischief mixed with gloating — one can feel the taunting of the near-extinct California Republican party in this year's Hail Mary, Steve Garvey for U.S. Senate. Wilson called the featurette "a very snotty little commercial."

26 According to local news sources, Mayor Pete fought "unsightly billboards;" he "insisted that Mission Valley and the Tijuana River Valley can have flood control without expensive concrete ditches;" he "worked tirelessly to entice smogless new industries to the city;" and he was "determined to deter San Diego from becoming another 'sprawled-out Los Angeles monster." With suitable imprecision, he liked

to claim that "San Diego has to have as much of its past in its future as possible." But it was never about preservation. Inevitably, the city colonized the county. This is the ship Wilson steered: controlled growth, snarling everyone in the daily commute. One example was Mira Mesa — settled in stages: first, roads, infrastructure, parks, and schools, then houses and apartment buildings, mini-malls and low-rise business offices, packedtogether infill, all future, no past.

27Wilson's Republican picks in electoral horse races have rarely won. Washouts include presidential candidates Rudy Giuliani, John McCain, and Ted Cruz as well as Meg Whitman for California governor. Last year, Wilson backed the Los Angeles conservative radio host and haranguer Larry Elder for President; he fizzled out like a Las Vegas romance. Wilson was luckier with Schwarzenegger in 2005 and Trump in 2016. In October 2020, he threw the dice again, giving the ex-President \$5000, funds more for the lawyers, it turns out, than the campaign.

28 The most odious requirement of 187 was for workers at hospitals, schools, and churches to call the police or ICE if they "suspected" a Latino (Brown? Swarthy? Spanish accent?) had no papers. In other words, surveil those who interacted intimately with migrants who came to them for medical help, for education, for a faith community. California teachers and their unions abhorred this provision, which helped doom 187. Did any teacher ever alert the authorities to take their students away?

29 To grok the Wilson enigma, we must understand a fundamental fact about politics: To win — and to remain in office — politicians need to make voters want things. The thing Wilson and those in his claque got San Diegans to want was their version of the city's expansion, which, along with a pro-business city council, made voters buy controlled or managed growth, by which sleepy ship-docked San Diego was on its way, commercially speaking, as "America's finest city." Election triumphs led him to believe his people desired more of his proposals. Once in the Governor's mansion, Wilson taught his base to want what he did not want - an "invasion" of Mexicans. As quickly as his victory on 187 codified assaults on foreigners, back came the rhetorical volley, disabling Wilson's cause. Wilson fell from a voter-approved high and took the local and state Republican guard with him. It's a lesson in how political cycles work. When voters want something so strongly, they demonize

anyone to get it. The pendulum swings back or adjusts to what's fairer, less punitive, and (yes) more liberal. Wilson's legacy proves that to push incessantly for what he and others deem is right misses how compromise and reasonableness are the wisest political choices.

30But wait. The cycle may be turning again, a reversal of the reversal. Wilson is suddenly in vogue, his nobby voice echoing in our newly restored antimigrant hysteria. Ex-President Trump's latest characterization of border-crossers is: "In some cases, they're not people, in my opinion. But I'm not allowed to say that because the radical left says that's a terrible thing to say." Then, he clarified not people by labeling the "some," "animals." Does Mayor Pete agree that only a dictator can save America from its fear of the caravaning other into the country? If severe restrictions and roundups of the undocumented are coming, the former governor morphs into what he's always wanted to be—a political visionary whose referendum will, at long last, have beaten back the tired, the poor, the huddled masses, "yearning to be free," the border lamp "beside the Golden door," extinguished for good.



Rains delay grassland transition, Silk Oak blooms for a moment

The Annual Green-to-Golden Transition Of San Diego's Wild Grasslands normally takes place in late March or early April, but another year of late and heavy precipitation has again delayed the dry-out phase. These rains also trigger a late growth of grasses. The browning can happen very quickly after just a couple of dry weeks with warming temperatures. North-facing hillsides and canyon slopes retain the green color longer, as they are less exposed to

drying sunshine. Locally, most of the wild grasses are naturalized (non-native) annuals, the seeds of which were introduced along with hay and other grains brought in by the Spaniards well over a century ago. Some of the mountain meadows have remnants of native grasses, which remain more or less green almost year-round. These rare native grasslands can be found in certain parts of Cuyamaca Rancho State Park and are more widely distributed at the Santa Rosa Plateau Ecological Reserve near Temecula.

The Silk Oak Tree, a fast-growing import from Australia, comes into its short-lived glory this month. Golden flower clusters decorate the silvery-green branches, an effect that is particularly stunning when seen in contrast to the blue-blossoming jacaranda trees often planted nearby. A common tree in San Diego-area parks, the silk oak is also a popular street and backyard tree in the older residential areas.

A wildly creative, absurd and surprising reinvention of Ibsen's Hedda Gabler. Jane Gordon, a pregnant housewife, is abducted by robots, taken to the rainforest, and forced to perform Hedda Gabler by her robot captors. Meanwhile Nugget, her ten-year-old daughter, with the aid of her milquetoast father, an eager documentary filmmaker and her small arms dealing uncle must rescue Iane - whether she wants to be saved or not. As we approach the AI singularity, Heddatron constructs a bizarre and strangely familiar world of reality TV and rocket launchers where everyone, artificial or otherwise, just wants to feel a little bit human.

Natasha Pierre and the Great Comet of 1812

You've read War & Peace, right? Playwright Dave Malloy did, and it seems he got to the section where the scoundrel Anatole sets out to seduce the engaged ingenue Natasha and thought to himself, "This would make a great opera!" Well, not an opera, exactly, but something close to it: nearly everything is sung, and

there isn't much in the way of structured song until the second act.

The opening number a hoot, wherein the cast introduces itself — this is a complicated Russian novel, after all — letting you know that your program lets you know that "Balaga is fun, Bolkonsky is crazy, Mary is plain, Dolokhov is fierce, Hélène is a slut, Anatole is hot, Marya is oldschool, Sonya is good, Natasha is young, and Andrey isn't here." Oh, and Pierre is stuck in an existential rut, drinking and reading and growing steadily stouter. He used to be better. He tells you so. Just as Bolkonsky tells you he is really old and mean. Just as Mary tells you she is frustrated by her static life. Just about everybody is ready to tell you about themselves and their thoughts, even as they're interacting with each other. It starts to feel less like a dramatization of a novel and more like a novel set to music.

Some may find the conceit delightful — the play got nominated for 12 Tonys! I found it not so much off-putting as away-pushing; the self-narration, so intimate and immersive in a novel, kept me from feeling with the characters on the stage. And you need to feel with the characters, because the plot is simplicity itself (sort of like an opera). Which isn't quite the same as clarity itself, especially when it comes to Pierre's part in things.

Kürt Norby sings the heck out of the role, and it's clear the man has some breakthroughs of some kind — because he tells us so. But his actions and character leading up to them, and even after them, seem...confused.

Be assured, however: the second act is much more fun (and tuneful) than the first, and the cast is having a blast throughout (which helps a great deal), and it looks great.

Sense of Decency

Jack Broder's North Coast Repcommissioned dramatic adaptation of Jack El-Hai's nonfiction book *The Nazi and the Psychiatrist* opens with Hemingway's famous line, "The world breaks everyone and afterward many are strong at the broken places. But those that will not break it kills." It's a bit curious, given what comes immediately after: a man making reference to a magic pill that will make him disappear. Broken or killed? Given that the man is Dr. Douglas McGlashan Kelley, the military doc tasked with assessing Nazi propagandistin-chief Herman Göring before he is set to be tried for war crimes at Nuremberg, it's tempting to wonder why Broder didn't go with Nietzsche's "If you gaze long into the abyss, the abyss will also gaze into thee."

Because that's very much what's going on here: Kelley's looking for book material from Göring, while Göring is looking for...something else from Kelley. (For a certain sort of actor, there must be a dark sort of relish in rendering an infamous Nazi as not only human but also charismatic and even sympathetic. Frank Corrado holds the stage much like Anthony Hopkins

held the screen in Silence of the Lambs. His grinning glee during his running joke about various nationalities is positively infectious — "One Englishman is an idiot, two Englishmen is a club, three Englishmen is an Empire!")

The trouble comes when he leaves the scene: Kelley, while played by Brendan Ford with the earnest sense of decency referenced in the title, is simply no match for Göring dramatically. The latter was the brilliant architect of a world-shaking monstrosity, while the former is worried about his career and his mother's opinion of him. The play wisely brings in his wife Dukie (a wideeyed Lucy Davenport) to do some relatable suffering — the poor woman, so able to advise her husband on how to talk to a bad man, so unable to advise him about his own badness. The Beast — Author Henry James parable of paralyzing anxiety The Beast in the Jungle treats the case of a man who misses his own life in an attempt to avoid the catastrophe his is certain will befall him. Director and co-writer Bertrand Bonello has adapted the story for an age that is anxious about what it even means to be human. (Post AI. what can we do that our dolls can't?) It's 2044, and mankind has done something so bad that it can no longer be trusted with itself. Too many strong emotions, leading to too many disasters. But the Buddhists have always known that desire was the problem,

and purification the solution. Passion is just a kind of suffering, after all, something that assaults and overwhelms us. And who would not want to be free of suffering? And maybe get a less menial job to boot? The good news: what used to take many lifetimes can now be achieved in minutes, thanks to science! Léa Sevdoux stars as a woman who left her husband for George MacKay once upon a time (passion!), but now, the two are thinking of going under the needle and getting free of "affects." The story takes its time relating all this, beginning instead in the glamorous past when the romance first began — well, after a disconcerting green-screen opening in which Sevdoux acts out her confrontation with the Beast. The movie is asking you to sink into its techno-dreamstate, to get lost in the gorgeous world that we have wrought from our desires before becoming utterly spooked by it. MacKay is a pleasant surprise as a suave leading man (and its opposite), while Sevdoux makes the absolute most of her porcelain features and her considerable magnetism. Civil War — It's telling that the two war photographers at the center of Alex Garland's story say they have parents back home in the heartland who are pretending that the civil war that is raging right here in the No Longer United States of America (the reasons for it are unclear and unimportant, but maybe the President shouldn't have disbanded the FBI) is not happening. Because if your harrowing images of human conflict and suffering, obtained at great personal risk and even greater personal cost, can't even rouse Mom and Dad to belief - let alone concern, let alone action - well then, what exactly is the status, what exactly is the point, of the media? Why are you wading into the horror — no, not wading, plunging, immersing yourself in the very worst of humanity. We get it, you're good journalists: you're here to get the story, not to take sides. But really, why? Weary Lee (a scowling Kirstin Dunst) isn't quite sure any more, but she's still game to join gung-ho Joel (Wagner Moura) on a mad dash for D.C. in an attempt to interview a President who might just have them shot on sight, since he views journalists as the enemy. (At least Joel is honest about his motivations: combat gets him hard, and even after it hits too close to home, he stays on task.) What Lee didn't count on was bringing newbie Jesse along for the ride (an impossibly tiny Cailee Spaeny); Jesse with her oldschool camera and new-kid eagerness. "If I got shot, would you take a picture of it?" she asks, wonderingly. 'What do you think?" snaps Lee. Unlike this review, Garland keeps the thinky stuff in the background and concentrates on the brutal, intimate action - like a good war photog-

Evil Does Not Exist — Well, then, what does, Mr. Director? Rvusuke Hamagachi's followup to Drive My Car goes very small to dig very deep. There are few events — a girl walking home from school through the woods, a forgetful man doing chores, a contentious community meeting in the country followed by a blunt business meeting in the city, etc. But the scarcity sharpens focus on what is there, makes room for rumination on the careful -methodical. really - presentation of words and pictures. There are answers to that opening question — desire, competiton, chance, intention, etc. — but they still leave room for mystery. A quiet, thoughtful, but very ungentle moment in the life of a place that, like all places, threatens to collapse once things become unbalanced. (2024) — M.L. ★★★ (IN WIDE

Immaculate — Michael Mohan delivers a fun if flawed twist on the old argument between faith and science - specifically, which one gets to save the world, and what salvation looks like, anyway. It helps that it's lovely to look at, and not just because of big-eyed star Sydney Sweeney. (If Elisha Christian's camera doesn't quite leer at her — for shame, this is a devout young religious sister we're dealing with here — it certainly does a lot of beholding.) Christian has a whole world of wonderful visuals in the old Italian convent for old Italian nuns at which Sister Cecilia has arrived - what with the reliquary holding one of the nails

that pierced Christ, the pristine countryside stretching for miles in every direction, the catacombs upon which the whole place rests - and he makes the most of his setting. But getting back to the that bit about "fun if flawed." The fun is the flaw, or rather, the lack of it. This is a horror film in which divine rape is treated as a miracle, and in which the second coming is hastened in highly unorthodox fashion, but for much of the runtime (and her mysterious pregnancy), Sweeney is content to shed silent tears over her predicament instead of making legitimate war on the patriarchy. And when the Enemy is revealed, he utterly flubs his big speech. What should be a declaration of war on heaven is instead pitched as a twisted sort of piety. It's as if the film doesn't see the glorious silliness in a woman taking perpetual vows on her first day at the film's outset, or in attempting to make her escape in the midst of labor pains. By the end, you get the feeling that Mohan was so intent on making the (admittedly bonkers) final moments hit that he tried to tamp down everything that came before. Monkey Man - Early on in director, co-writer, and star Dev Patel's madcap mashup of a movie, his protagonist Kid sets out to buy a gun. "You like John Wick?" asks the salesman. "This is the same gun he had, except made in China." You know: a cheap knockoff. A cleverly self-conscious pre-emptive strike against those who might dismiss this revenge drama — with its black suits, its secret sects, its exotic clubs, and its long, loving depictions of brutal hand-to-hand combat - as John Wick, except made in India, You know: a cheap knockoff. Because it aims to be much more than that. The revenge sought here is against the man who killed Kid's mother — but since that man was the local chief of police, and since the killing was part of a brazenly corrupt land grab by evil forces operating under the guise of restoring Mother India — well, one mother quickly starts to stand for another. And even more than that, as evidenced by the juxtaposition of word and image during our hero's moments of whispered prayer. (Who really makes you happy?) Which moments bring us back to

that "mashup" bit: the scenes between mother and son look and sound like Terrence Malick's Tree of Life. Other scenes recall Guy Ritchie cheekily working the collision of higher and lower classes. And yeah, there's some John Wick-y stuff. (Why yes, our club is hosting an event honoring India's next president, but no, none of our security guards have guns, so all disruptions will need to be resolved with punching; why do you ask?) It makes for disconcerting, uneven ride, sort of like a tuk-tuk that is mysteriously equipped with turbo, threading its way through the streets before slamming on the brakes so as to avoid crashing into a little girl. About those streets: they - or rather, the suffering they contain, and the blunt sympathy with which Patel depicts it - are the film's real strength. That, and the rich imagery and theme provided by the traditional story of Hanuman — the original Monkey Man. Much stronger than his order of transgender warriors in exile who talk of their devotion to a god who is both creator and destroyer, but don't seem to teach our hero much beyond rope-a-dope rhythm. (The Cruel Tutelage of Pai Mei this ain't.) Their leader mentions fighting with purpose; that much, the Kid already had. (2024) — M.L. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

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

Creative Covid coop-up

Blair Gun's Joedin Morelock and Zach Cavor started writing songs together in 2020. "We had just met up and we were jamming with some different musicians," Morelock recalls, "but Zach and I really connected on a lot of the

The album was a full band product, with the duo of Morelock and Cavor now augmented by the rhythm section of Jake Richter (drums) and Alland Mendivil (bass). "We got connected with the label sonaBLAST! which is based out of Louisville, through Red-

bands we were listening to at the time, and our songwriting styles really meshed. It was maybe a month of us meeting up and writing and recording all the time — and then Covid happened. Quarantine locked us down. Zach and I were pretty much like, 'We're not really doing anything else. We're just locked in.' So, we just buckled down and recorded a lot of songs through 2020. That's where the band really came from."

With Morelock singing and playing rhythm guitar and Cavor tackling lead guitar duties, the duo began to amass songs. Early on, the band tended toward a post-hardcore, grungy sound that leaned heavily into one of their biggest influences, Fugazi. But as time passed, they morphed into a brightersounding indie rock outfit that wasn't too far removed from another band that had heavily influenced them — the Pixies. They self-released an EP and some singles (which Cavor says are now "hidden in our archives") before their debut album, Blaspheme Queen, was released last spring.

dit," Richter says. "We ended up signing a deal with them and went out to La La Land [studios] out in Louisville for two and a half weeks and recorded the album. It took about eight months to come out. We were lucky enough to have help from sonaBLAST! and Enabler No. 6, which was cool. Not a lot of bands get the opportunity to fly across the country and record their first album."

One curiosity on Blaspheme Queen is "Andrew Savage" —a tribute to the Parquet Courts frontman, not the two-time Survivor contestant. "I don't think we would have written a whole song about Andrew Savage if we weren't huge Parquet Courts nerds," Morelock says. "I feel like there's a lot of celebrity obsession. We thought it was funny to use kind of a more niche celebrity that we're super-obsessed with, that we're honoring with a song."

Listeners will have to wait until this summer to determine if the quartet (now joined by new bassist Alyson Valdez) will gift them another celebrity tribute song on their

second full-length. Valdez points out that the new album "has a lot more different dynamics to it," and Cavor hints that it will include some rootsy folk songs, ballads, and even some sample-based production. "I think that Pixies-style alt-rock on the verge of punk is definitely one of our main characteristics," he explains. "It's still going to be present, but it will be a little bit more dressed up in some areas"

The band was nominated for two 2024 San Diego Music

Awards (Best New Artist and Best Video). The latter was for their song, "Man of the Hour." The video is "a parody of some cheesy talk shows we had known growing up," according to Cavor. It was shot in El Cajon with the help of some of his SDSU filmmaking program friends. "We're kind of all in this together, so we all just kind of help each other out," he explains. "Nobody is really getting paid, they are all just volunteering to make it happen."

Summer will find the band undertaking a national tour in support of the new album. "Kind of just doing a big horseshoe through the south and then up north and looping back to San Diego," is how Morelock sums it up. On the local front, the band has played bars such as Til-Two Club and The Tower, but they seem very keen on playing venues like Che Café, SOMA, house gigs, and odd spots where their underage fans can get in. They even played a rowdy Cinco De Mayo set at Folk Arts Records in City Heights. "We pulled the full Marshall half-stack acoustic set there," Morelock explains. "Honestly, we were probably way too fucking loud. We probably shouldn't have done that, but we did. It was fun. We kind of blew the record store out. Hopefully they will invite us back again someday." — Dryw Keltz



Jesus taps into the spirit

On a recent Saturday night, I slipped out of the pad and took a walk down to Lou Lou's Jungle Room to catch a show. I'd been hearing a lot about an animal they called Jesus Gonzalez. I was told that he plays cosmic spiritual music. The kind of stuff that makes you want to get weird with friends, or strangers. Gonzalez typically makes a lot of his noise in OB, but on this night, he had come to the ballroom attached to the newly renovated Lafayette to play two separate shows. The cost of admission? Nothing more than bringing your spirit animal. Money was not necessary, unless of course you wanted to snag a fifteen-to-twenty-dollar cocktail.

Going in, I wasn't sure what to expect. I'd driven past Lou Lou's multiple times, trying to sneak a quick peek as I rolled by. From the dress of the crowd in line most nights, I figured I would need to wear something a little more formal than Chucks and a black tee. But Gonzalez's fanbase hardly even wears shoes. No bullshit: the cosmic musician identifies as a National Forest. I wondered how the mix of bougie and beach bum would intertwine. Could the sweet and sour blend of expensive perfumes and hippie toes coexist in the same room? The jungle admits many possibilities.

The dimly lit bar buzzed with loud chatter. I caught the glow of strangers' eyes as they looked in my direction then quickly darted away. Every table was taken. Hundreds of heartbeats thumped. The ceiling was low,

almost pushing down on us. Then, as I left the bar area, two golden statue jaguars adorned with rosettes lit up and greeted me I entered the ballroom. 

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

IMMORTAL BEAUTY

Assembling the perfect Butterfly

I saw Giacomo Puccini's Madama Butterfly on Sunday. April 28 at the Civic Theatre. It was the fifth production of Butterfly that I have seen at San Diego Opera.

My first experience came in 1993. Back in the 20th century, SDO had something called "standing room." I believe the ticket was \$10. I recall that it was the only time I bought a standingroom ticket and ended up actually standing. As for the performance. I remember thinking it lacked cohesion.

The next occasion, for me, was in 2003. Tenor Richard Leech and baritone Stephen Powell, in the roles of Pinkerton and Sharpless, were peerless. However, the soprano singing the title role was justifiably annihilated by my predecessor here at the Reader, Jonathon Saville.

He described her singing as, "scarcely human." The production was also a bunch of nonsense, as it was set entirely at The U.S. Embassy in Nagasaki.

In 2009, Butterfly came around yet again. The production was the same BS as in 2003, but singing the title role was Patricia Racette. Need I say more? Racette had just sung the role in the landmark Anthony Minghella production at The Met. Her performance at The Met was broadcast in movie theaters across the U.S. as part of the Met HD series.

It's hard to believe that the most recent production was from eight years ago, in 2016. Latonia Moore sang the title role, and she was, by far, my favorite Cio-Cio San. Her voice is extraordinary, and she vocally owned the charac-

ter. I can't think of another singer I would rather hear in the role.

The 2024 edition was the most beautiful of all the productions I've seen. The stage direction by Jose Maria Condemi was absolute perfection. When the singers moved on stage, it was for a clear reason. There were no arbitrary crosses downstage. Every movement had a purpose and served the story. I can honestly say it was the best-directed opera I've ever seen — anywhere.

The setting was correct. We were in the house on top of a mountain overlooking the sea. The costumes were appropriate for the story that was being told. There was no misguided "reimagining" of Butterfly.

All the dramatic moments in the story hit — thanks, in no small part, to the efforts

of conductor Yves Abel and the San Diego Symphony. The "miu and piu" of the score were handled with expertise. And the beauty of the overall score came across without spot or wrinkle.

The singing was consistent and pretty. However, that is a far cry from exciting and beautiful. Soprano Corinne Winters is a fine singer. She just isn't a Cio-Cio San. She doesn't have the correct voice for the role. Tenor Adam Smith also has a fine voice, but I expected more from his top. He also had a habit of coming off his

voice at the end of almost every phrase. That is fine for dramatic effect — but only once or twice. And neither singer's voice filled the theater.

To get the perfect Butterfly, I'd have to select elements from three different productions that I've seen. I'd have to take Richard Leech as Pinkerton, Stephen Powell as Sharpless, and Latonia Moore as Cio-Cio San. I'd definitely take the staging, costumes, and direction from this most recent production, along with Yves Abel's conducting.

Take me down to the Burrito City

Burrito City, 1255 Avocado Ave. #103, El Cajon. You can find roughly a million "taco" shops in San Diego. And, I don't mean restaurants that serve tacos (that number's closer to ten million) — I'm talking about eateries that put some form of the word taco in their names. Places like Mike's Taco Club, The Taco Stand, Tacos El Gordo, City Tacos, and Taqueria you-name-it.

I haven't stumbled upon any place calling itself a burriteria just yet, but when I spotted a new place open in El Cajon called Burrito City, I definitely took notice. Then, because I'm a professional, I took notice again. And a couple more times again. Let's just say I've been taking a lot of notice, and not because the place serves only burritos. Actually Burrito City offers a reasonably large Mexican food menu, featuring tacos, street tacos, enchiladas, tortas, nachos, tostadas, fajitas, plus seafood soups, rice bowls, and several variations of loaded carne asada fries. Nor do I keep going back because the salsa bar is well stocked with a wide range of spices and flavors, including the likes of chipotle, serrano, habanero, mango, and avocado.

Okay, the salsa helps. Good salsa always helps. But what I really like about the place is that Burrito City delivers on the promise of its name. Including the robust assortment of breakfast burritos, I count 39 named burritos on the menu, plus a willingness to modify. Want Flaming Hot Cheetos on your Baja Fish Burrito for some reason? Well, there's burrito number 40.

The shop already gives a workout to the concept of a California burrito, but if adding guacamole (Cali Supreme, \$11.65), bacon (Bacon Cali, \$11.65), shrimp (Surfing California, \$13.65), and/or chipotle chicken (Cali Chipotle, \$10.85) aren't enough, I may have heard you can add to the basic carne and fries California burrito in ways that will horrify your spouse.

Purists will still find your basic carne, pollo asado, carnitas, and adobada burritos, filled with little more than meat, pico, and maybe guacamole. However, even these taco shop standards top \$10 apiece. If you still love your neighborhood shop dishing burritos at old school prices, well then hold on tight and don't ever let it go.

But I'm the type of guy who likes to see an entire dinner plate wrapped inside a flour tortilla, and I'm ready to pay ten bucks and up for that. If I've zeroed in on a Burrito City favorite, it would be the Poblano Burrito (\$11.85). This starts with a choice of shrimp or carne asada, then adds rice, beans, cilantro salsa, and a grilled poblano chili pepper stuffed with melted cheese.

It won't be everybody's favorites — some may prefer birria, chili pork verde, or something Flamin' Hot in their slimmed-down burrito. But

something like the Poblano tells me these folks are serious about this being a Burrito City. As serious as (apparently) I am. And for that, I consider this addition to El Cajon a match made in gut-busting heaven.



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ROAM

My soul itches as I pace back and forth in my room, unable to decide where to hike. Through a linen curtain near the window, I see that the sky above is blue and clear, and to the east, although the window is closed, I hear the green hills beckoning me.

"Cowles or Kwaay Paay," I muse. Two close hikes, more familiar to me than the back of my hand. "Or perhaps I crack open my copy of Afoot & Afield and aim for trails unknown?"

This is the dilemma tormenting me: should I soothe my achy legs, flying up familiar hikes in competition with the ghost of my younger self, or would it be wiser to pacify my urge to write by greeting a new trail, then chewing on the encounter, and spewing it onto paper? I haven't a clue, yet the hills continue their siren call. Frustrated at my indecision, I sit on my bed, and that's when a dull gleam in the corner of the room catches my eye and a distant memory creeps into my mind.

Years ago on the trail, I met a gruff firefighter, strong, bronzed by the sun's embrace, and clad in a weathered tank top, shorts, and leather boot. He strode with purpose. But what captivated me most was his companion - an iron kettlebell, which he passed between

Staring at my own 25-pound kettlebell on the floor, the path forward becomes clear. I will go on a familiar hike, but I will carry this weight with me and write about the experience.

Parking my car in Mission Trails. I am anxious to avoid prying eyes, so I slip the kettlebell into my fanny pack and carry it towards the trailhead along Father Juniper Road. I am worried the iron load will betray me, that it will grow too heavy as I haul it down the muddy path before me, and that my knees will buckle, leaving me sweaty and short of breath in front of amused strangers who pass by, grinning at the stupidity that is on full display.

As I pass by several strangers, I catch a curious look of scrutiny from a few observant folks who notice one of my arms appears oddly

strained for a man who is carrying a simple black fanny pack. But aside from a raised eyebrow or a double take, they keep their observations to themselves.

Midway through the grasslands that spread out north of the San Diego River, I unzip the pack and extract my cumbersome cargo. I survey my surroundings like a watchful meerkat and see that I am alone, aside from a few distant hikers on parallel paths some ways away. The lump of iron looks out of place in the sea of verdure that extends out every direction around me. With a deep breath, I fasten my fanny pack and stoop down to begin carrying it up the mountain.

I have decided to hike up North Fortuna; I want to test myself against the Fortuna Saddle trail, which connects North and South Fortuna on a low-lying ridge that separates the east and west sides of Mission Trails. I know this trail well, especially the intensity of its sloping side, and want to see if the iron within me is as enduring as the iron I hold in my hand.

I strike my boots along the path, finding a steady rhythm as I trade the weight back and forth between hands. I carry it on one side until fatigue creeps into my arm, then swap. This happens every few minutes or so. After a mile

of flat walking, I still feel fresh; my muscles settle over bone to brace against the added weight. But as the road turns up towards the sky, the iron begins to sink into me and I am surprised to find that it isn't my arms or back that begin to complain, but my quads. It has been a while since I backpacked or hiked with any serious weight and they begin to stir like hungry snakes on a summer day. I tune them out as I continue up the hill that overlooks Oak Canvon.

Patches of light blue flowers are knitted in among the sage scrub and granite boulders, which stick out like broken molars in the jaw of a long-dead giant. Spring is in full bloom, this first wave of flowers will crest in a colorful crescendo before crashing amongst the later blooms that will arise in the following weeks. Spring will shed its youth, the light blue flowers and orange poppies dwindling to mangy, threadbare tatters along the chaparral slopes before slipping into a quiet dormancy as the April gives way and May gray returns to the land.

I pass several other spring hikers. A few are caught up in thought or conversation, ignorant of the burden I carry Others take note of it. Among the latter, some keep a straight face, while the rest gawk with bewilderment, the same way I did when I spotted that firefighter hauling his iron load up the mountain.

As I descend the hill towards Oak Canyon, I am amazed by the amount of water flowing through the creek, which I cross via a flight of dry, protruding stones. As I follow alongside it. I decide to change my heading and continue along Oak Canyon instead of going up the saddle. I am curious to see how much water is flowing along the rocky gorge; it seems I haven't seen this much since I was a boy. Keeping to the right at the fork, I bow my head and enter a low tunnel formed by overhanging branches, then cross a wooden bridge, passing a couple shirtless guys sipping Arizona iced teas and snacking on Cheetos.

A middle-aged couple is cautiously approaching the water's edge to snap a selfie when I arrive at the upper canyon. Seemingly satisfied with their photos, they saunter off into the brush to circle out of the canyon back towards the grasslands. I set down my burden, take my own photos, and watch the cascading water as it barrels through a slot along the canyon wall.

Content after taking in the view, I pick up my iron and continue up the canyon towards the rolling hills that will lead me up the backside

of North Fortuna. Before I start up it, I pass a father and his young son who are wandering out of the park to pass below SR-52 and enter into an idvllic green dell where the creek meanders its way below old oaks that know the faces of birds, rabbits, lizards, and deer better than those of men. I am envious I am not going that way, and feel the urge to drop my weight and follow them. Instead, I turn away toward the sky.

I am making good time ascending the backside of the mountain, where the trail rises and falls like the humps of a camel. Every step taken up the hill is lost going down its other side, until I arrive at the final ascent, which looms over me like a sheer cliff rather than a steep hill. I dig my boots into the earth with every step forward, keeping my back as straight as a rod as I shift the iron weight back and forth. Somewhere during the climb, I forget that the weight is separate from me.

When I reach the flat, barren top of the final hill, I anchor the kettlebell and stretch my arms while looking at the rest of the mountain. It is too late to turn back. The path behind me is nearly as strenuous as the path ahead.

Resolved to finish what I have started, I sip water and prepare for the final effort. Behind me, the tumult of traffic zips by along the 52. Clustered alongside the concrete road are a few patches of California poppies. They hold their golden petals high as they are buffeted by the wind — not a gentle blowing breeze that comes from the earth, but a gust from passing cars as drivers speed by, blind to the fleeting beauty that grows alongside them.

Saltwater: Those pesky bluefin showed up hungry for a few of the boats that got out this past week, with several two-fish limits caught. As I was putting last week's report together, word began trickling in of willing biters. Most of the action was predictably during the hours between sunset and sunrise. That said, predictability with bluefin tuna is not really a thing, given the way their endothermic system allows them to feed throughout the water column without being stymied by the colder water down deep. So, if a bluefin is keyed in on squid a thousand feet deep or deeper, it is not likely it will come up to feed on finfish within reach of most anglers' gear.

As a result, some boats are finding willing biters and solid action, while others are looking hard for any takers with spotty results. This quote from the captain of the Independence sums it up.

"After looking all day, we came up short. The bluefin disappeared again. As we keep fishing for

vise versa. Maybe one day we will figure out the patterns of these fish. Until then we will keep trying to catch these creatures of interest." And so it goes with the far-travelled hard-pulling About that hard pulling: bluefin do their deep dives to feed, but they may also dive when hooked as they fight for freedom from what to them must seem like some sort of unseen assault. For every fish brought to gaff, at least one pulls hard enough to earn its freedom.

There have been reports of dozens of hook-ups with only a few landed. It doesn't help that the

fish are ranging from 30 pounds to over 300 pounds in the area. For those planning on going out after bluefin, captains advise bringing three outfits from 40-pound to 100-pound test capability and two-speed reels for the best chance of getting fish on the boat. Even so, if you're fishing a school of 30-pound fish that are biting only the lighter line and you suddenly get hooked up to a fish over 100 pounds, well, you're probably not going to land that fish. The captain will have a general idea of the size of the fish by the meter marks,

so always pay attention to the captain and use the appropriate setup to increase your odds.

With the bluefin turning back on enough to garner the attention of the 1.5- to 3-day fleet, lingcod counts dropped quite a bit from the week previous. As boats spent more time looking and fishing for tuna there were fewer stops on the area's high spots for rockfish. Still, the rockfish numbers were pretty good, as many of the shorter runs from 1/2-day to full-day trips fished the depths when conditions allowed. Too much wind or current can make deep fishing very tough, as it is too deep for the anchor, and wind and current can push a boat off a spot quicker than an angler can get a jig or bait down to the fish. I've been on trips, especially on smaller boats and pangas, where the captain had to keep the boat running and in gear just so we could have a shot. Ideally, a nice slow drift across structure is what you want when fishing deep.

For any private boaters heading out to the grounds off the northern Baja coast, be sure to keep a sharp eve out for debris. The Tribute reported several large driftwood logs, some holding yellowtail, amid the kelp paddies they have been looking for. There is so much driftwood out there boats have been running with their spotlights on full time so as not to hit any when travelling at cruising speed. These are tree trunk-sized logs, hard to see in the dark and big enough to cause major damage to even a large sportfishing vessel.

When it has been tough outside, shorter run boats have been inshore fishing for barracuda, bonito, yellowtail, and especially calico bass. The "checker bass" have been feeding well as the water warms along the kelp edges off Point Loma and La Jolla, which is why the count jumped from a few fish to a few

hundred this past week. Sand bass and halibut, much targeted earlier this year, are getting a break as the boats look more to kelp edges than sand flats. All in all, it's been a good week of fishing for the time of year.

Freshwater: Lake Jennings will be holding a New Moon Night Fishing event this Saturday, May 11, giving anglers a chance to fish until 10 pm. Their last trout plant of the season was April 15th, and their catfish opener will be on May 24-27, with their first stock of catfish on May 20. Even so, there is a healthy population of catfish in the lake for night fishing, and trout tend to feed at night, especially near or under lights. A lantern at the water's edge might just draw a few in close. Glow in the dark mini jigs, scented bait, and cut mackerel would be a good selection for fishing at night for either trout or catfish. Full-sized lanterns are required, and the entry gate closes at 8 pm, so be sure to get there early to pick your spot for the evening. They're out there, so go get 'em!

Alden goes to court

Can the San Diego Union-Tribune be saved by cash from Microsoft and OpenAI? That's the long-shot possibility raised by a new lawsuit filed against the two artificial intelligence giants by New York-based

Alden Global Capital, which owns the U-T and hundreds of other papers around the country, many of which are facing feared shutdowns due to rapidly falling advertising and subscription revenue.

"In the complaint, the publications accuse OpenAI and Microsoft of using millions of copyrighted articles without permission to train and feed their generative AI products, including ChatGPT and Microsoft Copilot," reported the New York Times in an April 30 dispatch.

"We've spent billions of

dollars gathering information and reporting news at our publications, and we can't allow OpenAI and Microsoft to expand the Big Tech playbook of stealing our work to build their own businesses at our expense," said Alden papers chieftain Frank Pine in a statement cited by the newspaper, which has launched its own suit against the deeply-pocketed AI twins. "In December, the Times sued OpenAI and Microsoft, accusing them of using

copyrighted articles to train chatbots that then competed with the paper as a source of news and information. Microsoft has sought to have parts of that lawsuit dismissed. It also argued that the Times had not shown actual harm and that the large language models that drive chatbots had not replaced the market for news articles. OpenAI has filed a similar argument"...Meanwhile, Alden-owned MediaNews Group is out hiring for two new positions in the *U-T*'s advertising department, including Digital Sales Manager with yearly pay between \$110,000 and \$120,000, and Digital Account Executive, to get \$64,430, raising hope that the paper, even if it folds its print version, will still be around in some form on the Internet.

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

Lagoon leak loomsWastewater may put waste in the water

Escondido officials are scrambling to avert the catastrophic failure of a section of the city's 14-mile-long land outfall pipeline that is situated near the matched that of the treated effluent from the facility, indicating a leak at the land outfall, which was built by the city in 1974.

Currently, the leak is confined to the area near the Nature Center at the northern border of the lagoon, west of Interstate 5 and south of Manchester Road. Officials say the water has not entered the lagoon, and isn't expected to. However, due to pressure on this portion of

this emergency repair is necessary to avoid danger to life or damage to property and permit the continued safe operation of the land outfall."

To speed up containment and repair, the city has proclaimed a local emergency, which can be used to forego competitive bidding under state and local law. Any delay, the city said, would substantially slow the leak's containment.

On April 16, the city was alerted that water was seeping up by the San Elijo Lagoon Nature Center near the outfall, which traverses the Escondido Creek and carries treated wastewater from the Hale Avenue Resource Recovery Facility to the ocean. The pipe near the leak is around 16 feet deep and 25 feet off the roadway. It's also in a sensitive habitat, making access too difficult for city staff and equipment, a report says. On April 25, he went under the knife to remove the phone, which was stuck at the entrance of the small intestine. The phone had been inside Parashuram for 20 days when it was removed; the prisoner recovered from the surgery and was returned to his cell.

— When David Loop of Sierra Pacific Furbabies, a feline rescue organization in California, found a box dumped in front of the group's office in April, the attached note explained that the "kitten" was found "in Mt. Rubidoux hiking path." But when he opened the box, Loop said instantly, "I'm pretty sure this is a bobcat kitten." Sure enough, Newsweek reported, when Loop contacted a local wildlife center, they thought the bobcat kitten was 3 to 5 weeks old. - Last September, Stephanie Langley, 55, of East Farleigh, Kent, England, stepped outside the Hare and Hound pub and stabbed her former brother-in-law, Matthew Bryant, to death. She was convicted on May 1, the BBC reported. Although Langley "claimed in court that she had never intended to hurt her victim," she started that violent evening by telling pub-goers, "Get a drink while he's still alive." Then she told Bryant, "You're dead tonight." After she stabbed him three times, witnesses heard Langley say, "I hope he's dead." She told arresting officers she had killed him, was glad she had killed him, and was happy to go to jail for it. She'll be sentenced at a future hearing, probably to life.

News You Can Use

 Attention Tornado Alley dwellers: On April 30, as violent storms were coursing around the Midwest, two "rare" versions were detected near Loveland, Oklahoma, Fox Weather reported. Meteorologist Stephen Morgan acknowledged that "some strange things" popped up that night. Turns out, more than 98% of tornadoes spin in a counterclockwise direction. But that night, two tornadoes - technically called anticyclones - were found to be spinning clockwise. Morgan said the anticyclonic tornado "rotated around what you could call a 'normal' tornado. What we saw ... was very rare." The anticyclones are typically smaller and weaker than cyclonic storms. There were no reports of injuries in the area.

It's Come to This

- Stanislav Netesov of Moscow, Russia, was attacked on April 27 at a bus stop on his way home from work, Oddity Central reported. The assailants took his phone and knocked out one of his teeth. The next day, Netesov went to the Ministry of Internal Affairs to report the attack, but instead of taking his report, they accused him of a crime: dyeing his hair yellow and blue, the colors of the Ukrainian flag. Doing so is a punishable offense against the Russian army. Police took his fingerprints, handed him a summons to military enlistment and told him they'd force him to "kiss his native soil in the trenches."

- The large animals are restless lately. On April 28, four zebras made a break for it from a trailer at a highway exit in Washington State, the New York Times reported. Kristine Keltgen was hauling them to her petting zoo in Anaconda, Montana, when the latch on the trailer became loose and the zebras "bolted out." Police officers and volunteers headed up the effort to corral them, but David Danton of Mount Vernon, Washington, proved to be a ringer: Danton is a former rodeo clown and bullfighter. He and his wife happened to be driving by and stopped to help. "It was kind of divine intervention," Danton's wife said. Danton built a makeshift chute leading to a horse pen on a nearby farm. "It's just about being quiet, working them gentle and not getting excited," he said. As of May 2, one of the zebras was still on the lam, but Keltgen was sure it would be found.

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
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
