





### Hydrant horror Why couldn't the fire department stop the blaze?

On May 26, Lakeside's Lisa Zouhar woke up to a fire at her home on Shamrock Lane by Woodside Avenue. She, her husband, and two dogs made it outside, but she said she lost her home and everything in it. She also said she believes part of her home could have been saved if the firefighters who responded to her 911 call weren't delayed in their efforts to secure a water supply.

According to a Lakeside Fire Protection District incident report, more than half of the home was on fire when firefighters arrived. "There was no way to make an interior fire attack safely. This was a defensive fire... Resident was at the garage with a garden

Drinking Water. That state board declined to confirm his statement and referred me back to the local jurisdiction.

> Johnze said before the May 26 fire, the hydrant in front of TNT Locksmith was last serviced more than three years ago, in February 2021. "At that inspection all three caps were removed, inspected, lubricated, and one was replaced as it was missing at that time of inspection. All other functionality of the hydrant was verified as in good or better condition...Fire hydrant caps are typically made

"There's a big disconnect on what's being said," homeowner Zouhar said. "We are currently seeking legal counsel about this." ERIC BARTL

### THE TRACKS **Trolley terror** Did victim's wheelchair wheels get stuck in the tracks?

A little before 1 pm on May 22, a person was struck and killed by an MTS trolley in South San Diego, according to *619newsmedia.* That same day, San Diego MTS tweeted, "#MTSAlert Please expect delays along the Blue Line South between Palm and Iris at the 27th St. grade crossing due to police activity."

No official reports were made afterwards, but locals commented on *619newsmedia*'s Instagram post in the comment section. "It was a man on an electric wheelchair," wrote Alicia. Palmak9kennels added, "It's right next to the police station... They need to upgrade that crossing. I cross with my kids all the time, and my kid's stroller gets stuck in between the tracks. I can only imagine the poor guy being stuck and not being able to move." One e.m.i.l.*y.bless*ed commented, "I used to work for MTS, and weekly had to put all the MTS news clippings in a binder for the head folks to read. A lot of the accidents were people

hose trying to put the fire out. He had to be removed by [a deputy sheriff.]" According to the report, the engine crew assigned to the role of fire attack pulled a 2.5-inch hose line on one side of the house and a 1.75-inch hose line on another.

Zouhar said, "We heard the chief say, 'We are out of water.' My husband replied, 'What do you mean, you ran out of water? My house is on fire!' Our neighbors offered their pool, but were told the truck didn't have the tools to pull water from there. And the hydrant down the road wouldn't open. There was no water for at least five to seven minutes. The battalion chief was on the phone with the water district and they told him they hadn't maintained that hydrant in ages."

A neighbor confirmed, "The fire truck ran out of water. It took forever for them to get water again while the house was burning down in front of them."

Lakeside fire marshal Jeremy Davis explained that while the fire attack crew went into quick attack mode on the fire, another crew laid a 4-inch hose from the fire hydrant in front of TNT Locksmith on Woodside, east of Shamrock (less than a block from the fire), but the 500- gallon tank in the engine supply was down for less than a minute."

Davis claimed that the Lakeside Water Department told him the hydrant is an older style that will be up for replacement. He said, "All public fire hydrants within the Lakeside Fire Protection District are maintained by their respective water districts. [Lakeside Water] fire hydrants receive an annual to biennial inspection and maintenance, and are replaced as needed." He pointed to the California Fire Code, which states, "Fire hydrant systems shall be subject to periodic tests as required by the fire code official." He didn't clarify whether his two-year standard for hydrant maintenance is the legally required standard, pursuant to fire code. And I did not get an answer as to why the four-inch hydrant cap was not readily openable.

Much of what the fire department said was contradicted by the water department. Lakeside Water District operations superintendent Quinn Johnze said, "The Lakeside Water District completes preventative maintenance on each fire hydrant every 4-5 years." He said that this maintenance standard — more than double the time given by fire marshall Davis — is provided by the State Water Resources Control Board-Division of

of cast iron and the threads they attach to are made of brass. This is done to make sure that caps cannot become 'rusted' together, as brass will not rust."

He further said the hydrant passed reinspection five days after the fire, May 31. "Lakeside Water District has no plans to replace the hydrant in the near future as the average lifespan of a wet barrel hydrant can range anywhere from 50-100 years. The trying to beat the trolley."

Rick Dixon has been riding the trolley since the 1980s. He saw the Instagram post regarding the May 22 accident, and told me, "I've seen wheelchairs almost get stuck. It depends on the tire of the wheelchair." On June 8, Dixon sent me photos of the tracks by Seaport Village and the convention center; some of the tracks' grooves were wider *continued on page 3*

### than others.

"If he's was in an older wheelchair with thinner wheels, he could've got stuck," a man named Don Franco told me in a recent interview. "I rode the trolley on June 4 and took my mountain bike. My tires can't get stuck in those [tramway] tracks; my tires are too thick. But them old school 10-speed tires are another story."

In February, the Times of San Diego reported that a cyclist "believed to be in his 70s" was struck by the trolley where Dixon took the photos. While there was no update on the cyclist's name or whether he survived, the Times reported that authorities said he was "suffering from injuries to his head and legs." Reddit commenter Some-Highlight-9470 wrote that he saw the accident happen. "I was waiting to turn on First when this happened...I think he was trying to beat the trolley but couldn't make it in time, the trolley was moving really slow but still was a significant impact and he was

dragged along a bit by the trolley. I called 911 immediately and people seemed to be on the scene quick. I really hope he's okay; he seemed instantly unconscious."

Last year, Jannell Greene, 43, was reportedly hit and killed by the trolley while skateboarding on Noell Street north of the San Diego Airport.

### SAN MARCOS A goat for Elon "I thought I was in a video game."

On December 5 of 2022, 36-year-old Alexander Belinsky sneaked onto a three-acre San Marcos property on Seaforever Drive. The owner was home, and she phoned the Sheriff to report that there was a stranger in her yard asking about her dog. The 60-yearold woman called her dog to her, and the stranger ran from the yard. The next day, the same man came back and assaulted her goats. A little after 3 pm, the woman and her 79-year-old husband heard one of their goats screaming and went outside to investigate.

According to defense attorney Ryan Cannon, Belinsky — 6 feet 3 inches tall and a robust 250 pounds — was attempting to corral one of the couple's goats. In the defense attorney's version of events, the woman of the home came outside to tell Belinsky to

stop what he was doing and to leave the property, "Mr. Belinsky replied that he was only doing what Elon Musk had instructed him to do." According to the defense attorney, the gate of the goat pen was opened, and that was when the 79-year-old man got knocked down. Belinsky continued trying to catch a goat while the woman followed, carrying a stick and telling him to leave. "Mr. Belinsky was able to grab hold of one of the goats and slung it onto his back while he walked to the front of the property," the defense attorney stated. "Mr. Belinsky believed that he was being instructed by Elon Musk to capture a goat, bring it to the top of a nearby hill and sacrifice it."

At the front of the property, Belinsky noticed a dune buggy parked under a carport. He threw the goat into the passenger seat and secured the animal with a seat belt, head-first in the seat. Then he tried to start the buggy, but discovered it was out of gas. He then demanded that the homeowner fill the gas tank so he could make his exit with the captive goat. "By this time, (homeowner) had gone back inside of his home and retrieved a .22 caliber rifle," defense attorney Ryan Cannon stated in court papers. One version of subsequent events stated that the stranger approached *continued on page 14* 

### UNDER THE RADAR

**Homeless tackled** A non-profit foundation tied to a controversial giant San Diego-based healthcare staffing outfit has come up with \$75,000 for mayor **Todd Gloria**'s San Diegans Together Tackling Homelessness effort, according to a February 20 behesting disclosure filed by the mayor's office. The giftgiver, the Torrey Coast Foundation, which has net assets of \$303,352,893 per the group's 2022 federal disclosure filing, was founded and run by **Alan Braynin**, the president and CEO of Aya Healthcare Inc.

The Torrey Coast Foundation was first known as the Braynin Family Foundation until its name was changed in January 2021. The bulk of the foundation's cash hoard has been handed out to cancer research projects, including \$4,500,000 to the Entertainment Industry Foundation's Stand Up to Cancer drive in 2022.

In recent years, Aya has

been fending off class action cases brought by so-called travel nurses, who argue their pay was slashed abruptly in midcontract as Covid waned. "To fill travel nursing roles, 'healthcare facilities utilize intermediary staffing agencies to employ the travelers, negotiate pay rates, and schedule assignments," reads an April 27, 2023 opinion in the case by Federal Judge **Roger Benitez**.

Citing plaintiff's brief, the opinion continues: "Hundreds if not thousands of nurses employed by Aya across the country have reported experiencing mid-contract pay reductions after starting an assignment with Aya, with many reporting that Aya reduced their pay multiple times within the same

assignment or slashed their pay by more than 50% or more than originally promised." Benitez dispatched the case to arbitration. An Aya spokesperson has called the allegations "demonstrably false," according to a September, 2022 *Newsweek* account.

Regarding the destination of the Torrey Coast foundation's \$75,000 Gloria behest, the city's website explains: "The City of San Diego does

not have the resources to solve the homelessness crisis alone. It is a humanitarian crisis and a burden every San Diegan must share. It will take all of us doing something collectively to make a meaningful difference. The ultimate goal is that all 1.4M residents contribute something to assist every stakeholder group."

Parting a sea of red ink Exodus

Recovery, Inc., currently negotiating a singlesource contract to operate a 16-bed psychiatric hospital at Tri-City Medical Center in Oceanside for San Diego County, received a negative Fiscal Compliance Review from Los Angeles County Auditor-Controller **Arlene Barrera** last year. "Our review noted significant areas of non-compliance, which impact Exodus' ability to ensure county funds are appropriately used to provide [mental health] program services and resulted in a significant amount of questioned costs," according to a March 22, 2023 memo from Barrera to LA

County Supervisors. The doc-

ument reported that Exodus

"charged \$2,975,760 in inad-

equately supported expendi-

tures, including \$1,839,772 in

inadequately supported related

party expenditures," and fur-

ther, "did not provide adequate

documentation to support the

total salaries paid to the chief

and whether the salaries were accurate and reasonable." The memo went on to say that "if Exodus does not immediately resolve the \$2,975,760 in questioned costs and correct the significant non-compliance issues noted in this report, DMH should consider placing Exodus in the county's Contractor Alert Reporting Database."

In a February 15, 2023 response to the review, Exodus Recovery CEO **Luana Murphy** wrote, "Exodus both disagrees, agrees and partially disagrees with the recommendations made by the auditor-controller contained in the report and either has taken or will take corrective action to address the recommendations as detailed in the attached Agency

> Action Plan/Response. At the same time, however, Exodus believes it has been wrongly maligned by this process given Exodus' exemplary record of service to the county when nobody else was willing or able to provide these services."

Added the response: "The county, both before and after the time encompassed by the referenced audit, has repeatedly sought Exodus' services because nobody else was able

or willing. For this, Exodus was dragged through a tortuous multi-year audit that should have been simple and routine and not one that included assertions of wrongdoing based upon clearly inaccurate factual assumptions."

San Diego behavioral health director **Luke Bergmann** told the *Union-Tribune* three weeks ago that his department "has worked with Exodus since 2008. Most recently, the *continued on page 6*

county chose the provider to run its two community-based crisis stabilization centers in Vista and Oceanside." Regarding the proposed \$9.6 million San Diego County contract, Bergmann was quoted as saying, "To have a provider that has a long history of weaving community supports into their work, and that has a history of doing acute psychiatric care, feels promising."

### **U-T union-less** Work-

ers at the Union-Tribune aren't among those at eight newspapers owned by Alden Global Capital who got a collective bargaining agreement last week. "Six years later, we finally have a contract with Alden Global Capital," said Suburban Chicago Tribune Guild unit chair and member bargainer Wendy Fox Weber in statement released by the AFL-CIO. "The company fought us every step of the way, and everything in that

contract is thanks to the work of a dedicated group of member bargainers. I am honored to have helped bring it to ratification." Like the *U*-*T*, the Alden papers used to belong to Chicago-based Tribune Publishing, a former public company taken private by Alden in May 2021.

But the San Diego paper was bought by LA billionaire Patrick Soon-Shiong in 2018; he sold it to Alden a year ago next month. Back in June 1998, the U-T's then-editor Karin Win**ner** urged workers to throw the newspaper union out of the plant, arguing that publisher Helen Copley would reward them with better salaries and a host of related benefits if they did. Winner's promises proved empty, and instead, union-less, the U-T has careened from one out-of-town owner to another before reaching its nadir under cost-cutting Alden last year.

"Orlando Sentinel workers have secured a union contract for the first time in the newspaper's 148-year history, establishing two years of raises, protecting our retirement plans and

overall setting the foundation to build a stronger newsroom," Cristóbal Reyes, a member of the Orlando Sentinel Guild and joint bargaining committee, said in a statement after the two-year contracts at each of the Alden papers were announced, according to a June 5 report by the Orlando Business Journal.

"The agreement includes 6% across-the-board raises, maintenance of 401K matches for all employees currently participating, guaranteed severance pay if a reduction of force happened and a notice requirements for layoffs," the account says. Meanwhile, back at the U-T, the paper's website morphed into a version run by other Alden papers last week, apparently marking another break from the Los Angeles Times, which is still owned by Soon-Shiong.

# Deported, Not Defeated

# Call center drama in Tijuana

"The new girl already quit," said my girlfriend as she climbed into my car after work. "She only lasted two weeks and said she couldn't handle it anymore. Nothing against me, she said the workplace was too much." My girlfriend is the head recruiter in a call center in Tijuana; she's been there about a year. Her call center pays better than some others, but employee retention is still an issue. The new girl was supposed to help her out, but decided that the work conditions were too poor and the interview process was too lengthy. She cited "general mismanagement" as her reason for leaving. That's one term for it, though not the one I thought of when my girlfriend showed me security video of her breaking up a fight. "They said I was crazy for jumping in like that," she told me. The fight was supposedly over a stolen phone, but in reality, it was a drug and money dispute. She jumped in when she saw the bigger guy hitting the smaller one.

At least her job seems secure: there is an endless thirst for new call center agents. The call center employs over 200 people. My girlfriend interviews and applies basic English and computer tests to an average of seven people daily. The test also measures personality, grammar, math, and listeningoral skills. Almost all applicants are deportees with better English skills than Spanish. Five out of seven usually make it to the next phase to get hired. Without asking them directly, she has to figure out if the person she is interviewing was deported for a violent crime.

Besides working as a recruiter and peacemaker, my girlfriend acts as a therapist; she has a Licenciatura in psychology (similar to a Bachelor's degree). I dubbed her job "La Escuelita." From what she tells me, it seems like she works with middle school children instead of adults. Every time I pick her up, I hear about a new drama. Hook-ups and romance in the office (plus sex in the bathrooms). Pizza parties to boost morale gone wildly wrong. An elevator declared off limits, ostensibly for the sake of employee health (in reality, it was malfunctioning). A request from the boss for all employees to wear a costume the whole week of Halloween, and to get their faces painted for Día de Muertos.

It could be worse. At some places, it is worse. I asked users on a Reddit thread to share their worst call center stories. Here is part of one response: "They played us the recording of a client asking the girl who attended to him not to hang up — until the guy came, and the girl realized by his moans and hung up. Poor girl still worked there and got agitated every time they gave that to the new recruits. In another, my supervisor and 'the client' sold pot to the agents on Fridays, and next to the call center there was a 'little store' (and not an Oxxo type) that accepted food vouchers for products. And it didn't touch me, but they told me that a little boss in the one that rhymes with 'HellVista' was twisted in a bathroom with a high school girl giving him a hard time."

Ads for call centers are common on Spotify and YouTube and social media. All of them claim to be the coolest, most fun call center in the city. In one of the ads, the big call center TaskUs offered free craft beer. The only requirement was to listen to a recruiter. Posing as a potential employee, I went to the Cerveza Insurgente taproom with my girlfriend for a couple of free beers. We got to the taproom on 4th Street and Avenida Revolución at around 8 pm. A man wearing a LizardBear mascot outfit danced outside the bar as other members of TaskUs invited us in. In the opposite corner of the brewery, there was a pool of blood from a man who had been shot dead hours before. They gave us a small notebook with notepads and a plastic ball with the company's logo emblazoned on it, as well as two drink tickets, and instructed us to go to the back of the bar to meet with our recruiter.

This is what I learned: The base salary is 3700 pesos a week after taxes (around \$220). It also includes 220 pesos' worth of food stamps per week, medical and dental insurance, educational incentives, an on-site gym, free parking, 21 days off per year, a wellness center, cafeteria discounts, and an onsite nurse. The office has 650 seats and they call it "The Oasis;" it is open 24/7. The job consists of nine hours daily with a one-hour lunch break. The work is divided between answering the phone, online chat, and emails. They have more than 15 clients, including one popular hotellike service (I guessed it was Airbnb, but the recruiter only smiled and said she couldn't tell me). About 75% of the clients are customer soft sales, and the others are legal clients.

*"¡Pues un montón!"* (most of them) said the recruiter when I asked her how many deportees worked at TaskUs. Deportees don't just have superior English skills; they also have a better understanding of American culture. If a customer calls from Houston and the call center agent was deported after living in Texas, he can connect with the customer in specific ways that relate to Texans, via sports, food, or general knowledge.

### First contact with 1Click

I met Luis Esparza in June of 2022; he wanted me to take photos of his staff at 1Click Contact Center, which he founded. He hired me again to take pictures at the company's Christmas posada at the Red Room restaurant inside the Xolos soccer stadium. "I'm going to say this in English because my Spanish is no bueno," said Luis at the beginning of his speech to his employees. "Like many of you, I am deported. What you don't know is that I have a Master's in Human Behaviorism..." Luis continued with his life story speech, followed by his vision for the company's future.

A little while later, I sat down with Luis in his office in Zona Río (near the Statue of Lincoln) to get a more complete account. He looked younger than his 50 years. "My fam-

ily migrated when I was only eight months old," started Luis. "I was born in Juarez, Chihuahua, Mexico way back in 1973. From Juarez to Michigan." That explained the blue and vellow color scheme for both his business and his office. "My whole life I was raised in the U.S. in a Mexican household, but much integrated with the American lifestyle. We never spoke Spanish, but we understood

it for our mom. My dad got a job at Ford Motor and got to the US a lot sooner than us. After he got established, he brought the family with him. My older sister and I are the only ones not born in the U.S.; my other three siblings were. I went to Clintondale High School, where I was the starting quarterback for three years. From there, I got a partial scholarship to Ferris State University in Big Rapids. I played quarterback there and got a degree in psychology."

He soon discovered that "psychology doesn't do much unless you get your master's," so he got into real estate. "A professor persuaded me to get into human behaviorism. I got my Master's degree from Wayne State University and continued to excel in the real estate field in the Detroit metro area. A couple of life changes happened and I'm suddenly in Mexico."

"Aggravated" aggravation Wait, what? "I was always a resident alien," Luis explained. "That was one of my biggest problems. I could apply for my citizenship, I was married, and I was part of the community. I never looked at myself as a resident alien. I bleed American culture. I love being Mexican too, but I never looked at it like that. Even when I was married, my wife said, 'Get it over with; get your citizenship so we never run into an issue.""

It became an issue when Luis got arrested. "I got into a bar fight in 2012. Things escalated. The assault charge turned into aggravated felonious assault. Because there was a weapon, which was a beer bottle. You can't strike someone in the head with a beer bottle. Everything was handled smoothly and professionally. I was given probation for a year, and I was dismissed in four months. But when my probation officer was signing off on me, that's when he said, 'Wait a second, are you a U.S. citizen?' And I was like, 'No...' He goes: 'I always thought you were a U.S.

When the probation officer made a copy of Luis' identification and documents, he was flagged by immigration. "My assault charge was aggravated. It was reduced from a felonious assault to a Class A misdemeanor, but they kept the word 'aggravated.' And if an assault charge is aggravated, it is an automatic deportation. Because they look at you like a violent individual. I didn't know this, or I would have tried to get it dismissed and never heard from immigration. Two months went by, and everything was fine. I had just finished my divorce and moved to a new home down the road, probably 15 minutes away from my other home. I had 50% custody of my 3 children and wanted to be nearby."

And then one day, "I saw three black Yukon trucks parked outside with blacked-out windows. After maybe two or three minutes, I heard a knock and the doorbell. I thought it was a new neighbor or something, but it was a very tall guy who said, 'Hi, we're looking for Luis Esparza.' And I said, 'That is me.' He looked back at the other guys, and then looked at his paperwork that said I was dangerous. I was in my shirt and tie, looking all nerdy. They looked all surprised and asked if they could come in. I said absolutely. They asked for my paperwork and then said: 'We are from INS, Immigration. This is regarding your case. Luis Esparza, just so you know, we are arresting you right now. This is a warrant for your arrest and now you are subject to deportation."

His heart dropped in his chest. "This had to be a joke." It was not. Luis was locked in Monroe County jail for two days, and was then taken to an immigration dome in Monroe. Most people who are there get deported in a week. Luis managed to get bonded out after five days. Seven days later, he was back in court. "The judge said very nice things about me, but added, 'Unfortunately Mr. Esparza, I cannot change the immigration laws, I'm a federal judge, I have to uphold the laws. Mr. Esparza, please stand.' The courtroom was packed. It's still emotional for me. My mom started crying behind me. My daughter was there and my siblings. They all saw me get deported."

### Welcome home?

Luis had five days to get his things in order. He reported to immigration at 6 am and was flown to Texas in a 747. During the flight, he was "shackled, like in the movie *Con* Air. Hitting Mexico is a whole different... thing... It took a while for it to sink in," Luis doesn't remember what city in Texas he was deported from, but he does remember that by 2011, he was back in Mexico. "I had a cousin that picked me up to take me to Juarez, help me get my papers and all that," continued Luis. "But it didn't work well with the family I was living with. Though they are family, primas y tías, I hadn't seen them since I was a little kid and I was now a grown adult. They started asking for money. I got frustrated. I didn't feel comfortable.

"I talked to my mother and her husband and they had family in Tamaulipas. They had a rancho, and said, 'You are going to be more comfortable.' I went down to the rancho. And it was the poorest environment I've been in in my life. It was shocking. They were the happiest people I've ever seen, but eating beans for breakfast, lunch, and dinner is not for me. I was there for seven long weeks. I was trying to decide where to go in Mexico to make a home, and at the time my brother was living in San Diego because he was in the Marines. That influenced me to move to Rosarito."

### Calling for help

With the income he had saved and the help of his brother, Luis moved to Rosarito in 2012 and bought a sports bar. He decorated the bar with Michigan sports memorabilia and called it the Oue Paso Bar. It was not a success. "There were days that I would make 200 pesos total on sales when you have rent of \$2000 a month. I realized there was no money in bars in Rosarito. It was sad. I was probably in the worst stage of my life. I was just drinking and partying. I was going through all the cash I had, so rapidly, and it hit me: What the fuck are you doing with your life?"

Luis closed his bar after a few months. He had a friend who worked in a call center and told him to apply, but no call center wanted to hire him. "When I went, I got discriminated against... sort of. Because my education was so much higher. They were intimidated. The general manager and higher-ups were

scared of me, so they wouldn't hire me. 'Too advanced, this is not for you,' they would say, but what the fuck am I supposed to do?" The ones that did offer work didn't pay enough. "I applied for Bimbo [Bakeries], for a sales manager on the American side. I had all the credentials to work for them but here's the thing, my Spanish is horrible. They were offering me 25,000 pesos salary, which is good money here, but they didn't hire me because of my Spanish." His experience was not unique. Many deportees speak better English than Spanish. Many barely speak any Spanish, and get mocked for being pochos.

Finally, he got a break. "One day I was in Plaza del Zapato and I was having a drink, and a güero from California was there. I was talk-

ing to someone, and he overheard me and said "You have excellent English, do you want a job? I just started a call center down here." I told him no one wanted to hire me. He offered to hire me." Luis took the job for 1200 pesos a week in 2014, around USD \$60 at that time. "I went from sales agent to manager and overseeing HR, then director of operations. I get this industry, but I'm not happy. As I kept growing and learning, I used my degree. How can I run this? How do I manage all these people and persuade them?"

He got another job, where he learned how to run a business and also met his current fiancée. But there,"Me and my managing partner were bumping heads a lot. There were struggles. Bottom feeders. They were doing whatever they wanted. People were coming stoned or on crystal meth. They fight over 20 pesos. Only crackheads fight for something like that, and the call center allowed it and laughed at it. We had an incident one day when two individuals got into a fight. One of them left and came back with a gun. I wasn't there but my fiancée was there." That was the end of that.

### Starting over with a start-up

In 2017, with around \$1500 USD, Luis started his own operation: a business process outsourcing company. Four girls and a few computers. The first client, from the makeup industry. The next, a year later, a dental office. Then a telemarketer. Four employees became 12, 12 became 25. "It felt good having them working for me getting them paid well

and all that stuff." Then Covid hit, and he found himself back down to his original client in the makeup business.

"A good six months with just one client. It was difficult, me and my girlfriend just bought a house and now this. Holy crap, we had to rebudget." But he survived, "and over the past four years, it just kept escalating. We have 13 clients right now. Customer service, tax support, BPO [business process outsourcing], things of that nature."

His call center boomed, and 1Click moved to a bigger office in his current building in Zona Río. "We help veterans with their VA and now we are doing immigration. We do all the intake when they start the file. When I spoke to the law firm, they were surprised that I knew that much about immigration. I told them I was deported. I said, 'If you don't want to do business with me I understand.' They were like 'No, on the contrary, we want to do business with you.""

It helps that he keeps drugs out of his workplace, and that he's stuck around. "What we project, from my attorneys, is that there are at least 100 call centers in Tijuana including those that are not registered. A lot of them pop up and are gone. Americans that have cash. They throw a call center here, or whatever at it, rent a building, and two months later, something happens and they are gone. Some people work there and get good money in the first weeks, but then they disappear. No stability. They disappear and take your money."

### Looking back, looking ahead.

Things are good enough now that he can think about the long-term. "I'm at a crossroads in my life. I just turned 50 in December. I take good care of myself. Not sure what I want to do moving forward. I can't do this industry for two or three more years. My goal is to give this to my fiancée, soon to be my wife. I built it well and she can manage it. What I want to do is be a mentor for businesses. See what they are doing wrong and show them my expertise. I have a great client from Denmark, and he has been recruiting me. He wants to send me all over Europe or Mexico."

Though Luis has succeeded in Mexico, he still thinks of his family back in Michigan. "I have a great relationship with my son. He just became a father so I just became a grandpa. He is not with the girl who had the baby, so he is learning to coparent, so he talks to me. My granddaughter is six months old. My oldest daughter I barely talk to. She is 25, she is about to get engaged, and she is a producer for Channel 5 News in Michigan. My youngest daughter is 19, so she is in party mode. The messages I get are, "Can I get \$100? Please, daddy? Love you." She is in college; she wants to become a make-up artist. With my ex-wife, it was terminated ugly so we don't talk. But as soon as my son graduated from high school, in 2019, he came to visit me. One of the best days of my life. It took me nine years to see him."

They were lonely years. But they did not embitter him. "I miss taking my kids to



a baseball game on a Tuesday. That's what I miss the most. I'm a big sports guy. I used to be a season ticket holder for the Lions and also at the University of Michgan. I missed their national championship, and Michigan sports is at its peak right now. Outside of that, I don't miss



and put his hands on the elderly man, and this caused the gun to go off. In any case, one bullet blasted into Belinsky's belly. After he was shot in the stomach, "Mr. Belinsky took the rifle away from (homeowner) and then sat down on the ground and began complaining of pain from the gunshot wound. Eventually Mr. Belinsky wandered into the home and collapsed on the floor."

When Sheriff's deputies arrived, Belinsky told them he was "on a mission for Elon Musk" and "needed a goat to sacrifice on the highest hill in the area," according to statements in court files. One week

later, Belinsky was arraigned; he was informed of multiple felony charges and pleaded not-guilty to all, including abuse of elders, abuse of goat, theft, and robbery. The next month, defense attorney Ryan Cannon filed papers asking for "diversion" for Belinsky. In this way, the defendant would avoid jail or normal adjudication through the courts.

Belinsky said he started using marijuana at 16, and that "weed is my drug of choice. I would use it daily if I can. I feel that it has many health benefits. It relaxes me. It is a stress reliever. It's my self-medication.

anything else. I accepted Mexico as my home. When my son visited me, he liked it, and was like, 'Dad, this is great. You are looking good, and this looks good for you.' I was afraid I was being watched by this group of billionaires. At that time, I thought Elon Musk was involved. I thought I was in a video game."

tion for his strange behavior:

Prior to the goat incident, Belinksy had been arrested for stealing beer from someone's house, and had once broken into a car in the parking lot of Palomar hospital. "I was in the parking lot," he recalled. "I saw this Tesla car. I knew it was a game, and so I busted the window. I can't decide if that was delusional. It seemed so real. Anyway, I was sure I was part of this game. I bashed the car. Security came up and I ran off." Documents in court files state that Belinsky is single with no children and receives SSDI disability payments. He was born in San Diego and grew up in La Jolla "We had everything I ever needed," he said. His mother is 72 years old, and his father died at 63 of cancer. He does not like his older brother, who is seven years older. "He always picked on me."

Judge Michael Washington granted Belinsky the mental health diversion that defense requested. The elderly couple was granted a restraining order to keep Belinsky away from their property; that court order expires in December of 2027. EVA KNOTT



### Ocean temps are climbing, the highest sun, the lowest moon

Ocean Water Temperatures are Rising into the mid- or high 60s this month, perhaps to reach the low 70s in July or August. The usual early-summer cool weather along San Diego's coastline, disappointing to many tourists, is mostly caused by the sluggish warming of the ocean water. The payoff will come later: as the ocean gives up heat absorbed during the sunny summer months, we'll enjoy warm days and evenings well into autumn.

The Summer Solstice occurs at 1:50 pm on June 20. That's when the sun will reach its highest point in the sky, rising from its leftmost position and setting at the year's rightmost spot on the horizon. The summer solstice marks the first day of summer for

the Northern Hemisphere as well as the longest day of the year. San Diegans currently enjoy approximately 14 hours of daylight, in contrast to the 10 hours we get in December. Anytime this week or next, try checking your shadow at 12:50 pm. (the local daylight time in San Diego currently equivalent to astronomical noon). The sun is then only 10° south of being directly overhead and so casts near-vertical shadows. A lesser-known consequence of the summer solstice is that our twilight periods are longer. Evening and morning twilight periods are now lasting more than 90 minutes.

June 21 Brings June's Special Solstice Full Moon. While on June 21 will see the sun reach its highest point in the sky, June 21 will bring the moon to its lowest. Because of this year's extreme tilted orbit, this particular full moon will be lower in the sky than we will see it for the next 18 years. If you can stay awake until around 1 am on the night of June 21-22, check out the heavenly body's proximity to the horizon. And because the Moon is so low, it will also appear bigger than ever due to "Moon Illusion" - an optical illusion in which the moon appears larger than usual because the eye contrasts it with earthly objects such as houses, trees, etc.

### Camelot

A smart production of a great musical: unobtrusive direction, solid casting, and inventive staging. Camelot sounds like a big show - King Arthur, Lancelot, the knights of the Round Table, the creation of the chivalrous order, the transformation of England, war, fer Pete's sake – but North Coast Rep, cheerfully bowing to the necessity of its intimate dimensions, hews close to the famous story's heart: the friendships of a King. And really, that's the genius of the story, because where else can the personal and political — the very big and the very small — so intimately intermingle ... and conflict? (Arthur, having grown up under the wise tutelage of Merlin the wizard, wants to change "might makes right" to "might for right," and that's a lovely idea for a king to have, but even a king must reckon with the tortuous and tempted human hearts within his household, and himself.) So even though there are often only one or two people onstage, none of the bigness is lost. Quite the opposite: the small-scale interactions feel enlarged: the temptation to personal betrayal is at the same time the temptation to treason, and more — the temptation to raze a civilization. It's thrilling stuff, and surprisingly painful after the crazy fun of the first act, when Lauren Weinberg's spirited Guenevere has giddily daydreamed about the romantic frisson of having men fight over her, Brian Krinsky's imposing Lancelot has modestly proclaimed his perfection, and Jered McLenigan's Arthur has risen to his moment. And yet, wasn't the pain portended by all that came before it: the queen's love, the knight's power, the king's dream? The singing Is mostly strong all 'round — so much so that they might have dropped the mics – but special mention might be made of Weinberg's, which must serve so many moods: now lilting, now saucy, now richly melancholy. Furiosa — Just as Tom Hardy's taciturn Max was not the dramatic center of director and co-writer George Miller's hyper-kinetic Mad Max: Fury Road - that honor went to Charlize Theron's rebellious Praetorian Furiosa and her mad quest to find a paradise in the wasteland - so that same Furiosa is not the center of the more reflective but still wildly mobile prequel Furiosa. This time, it's Chris Hemsworth's hook-nosed, ambitious and vicious, frequently weird and somewhat less frequently wise gang leader Dr. Dementus who gets the sidelong spotlight. Dementus just wants what's best for his people, even if he himself is doomed to despair, now that the endlessly warring world has taken those he loved and left him with just a stuffed bear for comfort. And what's best for his people, as far as he can tell, is for little captive Furiosa to tell him where he can find her Edenic home — the sort of place where fruit trees still grow, even after humanity has all but wiped the world clean in its mad embrace of violence. Talking of which, Dementus kills Furiosa's mom in an effort to get the location, thus giving our big-eyed heroine her raison detre for much of the rest of the film. But before he can get the girl to talk, he stumbles into the unholy trinity of Fury Road's makeshift civilization - The Citadel, Gastown, and the Bullet Farm — and the mental wheels start turning. Phew! That's a lot of plot just to set the scene - small wonder the thing runs two and a half hours. And yeah, some of that scenesetting involves surprisingly clunky special effects/sound work - how exactly do people chat in a sandstorm? But once the gears catch and things get rolling, literally and otherwise, the ride is by turns thrilling and fascinating, a brutal, complicated struggle of conflicting interests and strategies leading to a desert showdown that is...well, a word on that. It's talky, and it slams the action to a halt, and it sounds very much like an authorial statement: Dementus throwing off his eccentric speech and vocabulary and revealing the dark heart of the Mad Max saga. But it also makes way for a nasty, batty, but strangely redemptive segue into Furv Road's story. Make it epic, indeed. — M.L. ★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

**Inside Out 2** — Nine years ago, Pixar took us inside the mind of young Riley to meet her emotions: Joy, Sadness, Anger, Fear, and Disgust. At the end of the film — spoiler! — after Jov has learned she can't just repress Sadness and take the helm at all times. she dismisses the expanded Rilev mind console's puberty alert, saying "It's probably not important." Ha ha, and yeah, sequel incoming. Three big changes brought on by the necessity to go bigger. 1: instead of helping Riley grow up and accept change, the big challenge now is creating her core identity via experiences that form beliefs. 2. Friendship island looms much, much larger than family island in the conscious landscape. 3: The puberty alarm finally sounds, and heralds the arrival of a new team: Anxiety, Embarrassment, Envy, and Ennui - oh, and Nostalgia. (This is Pixar, after all, and making parents remember what it was like to be a kid is key to the brand.) Anxiety, wondrously voiced with just the right level of twitchy intensity by

Maya Hawke, is the troublemaker here: Riley is off to hockey camp, and needs to think about forging a future. Once again, Joy finds herself struggling to remain at the forefront - a struggle so fraught that at one point, Joy cries. Should that be possible? Doesn't that make Joy Sadness? No matter: the original team isn't the point here — we get precious little anger from Anger, fear from Fear, etc. And even amongst the newcomers, there's precious little drama: Envy doesn't do the damage she should, and Embarrassment is weirdly brave when it counts. It's all about Anxiety, with an appropriately brief cameo from Ennui. There's plenty of invention at the granular level: the battle within the Projection Room is smart, the sar-chasm is funny, the stream of consciousness is cute. But the story is very much the same, starting with Joy's doomed decision to dump bad experiences in the back of the mind. And if the emotions are more complicated, then the resolution is more convoluted, save for the blunt

declaration of Joy's fate. It's funny and sweet, but that's all. (2024) — M.L. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

I Saw the TV Glow — Jane Schoenbrun's followup to We're All Going to the World's Fair has been hailed as a breakthrough cinematic treatment of gender dysphoria. Maybe so, but it's a good enough piece of art to bear multiple interpretations; for your humble correspondent, it played an almost shockingly effective evocation of How Things Felt, back before the internet made cult followings into malignant mobs, and more importantly, back before we - the collective we - put aside childish things and let adulthood take hold. Before the mundane obscured the magical. Maddy and Owen are miserable middle-schoolers: she because Dad is loud and violent, he because Dad is cold and controlling. They bond over and take comfort in watching The Pink Opaque, a show that is supposedly for kids, but way too complicated and creepy for that to be true. The show's heroines are up against Mr. Melancholy, a moon man whose chief weapon is self-forgetting. Hardly the enemy of children; more like the enemy of childhood. After the show gets cancelled, Maddy disappears; her reappearance years later forces a reckoning. What she says is impossible; what she asks is terrifying. And yet. Owen says early on that he knows something is wrong with him, and Justice Smith's performance makes that clear. Whether it's anything more than simply being a person is less so. (2024) - M.L. ★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

that perfectly melds its sometimes desperately disparate tones, namely: a touching but not too sweet meditation of aging, its attendant losses, and the right response to both and a funny but not too far-fetched riff on Mission: Impossible. (If Tom Cruise refuses to age, why not June Squibb, or at least her nonagenarian character, Thelma Post?) The widow Post has been scammed via phone, but she has an address where she's sent the money, and stops off at her very old friend Mona's for some equipment to aid in its recovery. She finds her old travel buddy much diminished. content to sit in her chair, watch birds

on TV, and wage a losing but worthwhile war against the encroaching roaches. There is sadness and not a little horror at Mona's plight, but there is also steel in her voice and a sparkle in her eye when she acknowledges her enemy and says that she must choose her battles. Choosing a battle of her own, Thelma sneaks upstairs to execute her version of Cruise dropping through the ceiling to steal a computer disk. Drama, meet action-comedy. For much of the rest of the film, however, it's back and forth between one or the other. Both are largely successful if you don't push them too hard. which should be easy enough: this is a movie that works hard to please, and often succeeds. The old-folks tech — iPhone compatible hearing aids, life-alert bracelets, a sweet electric scooter, etc. — is put to good use, as are the old folks themselves. Squibb is almost unbelievably lively and sharp, and Richard Roundtree serves as a fine, sober counterpoint to her "age is just a number" attitude. Fred Hechinger as the grandson is smartly employed for the sake of cross-generational appeal; he may be a bit of a failure, but the film's flubbed ending isn't his fault. ### Surf rock scion makes

**'em sway** Tourmaline is a legendary surf spot nestled between Windansea and North Pacific Beach; longboarders flock to it for its mellow break. So if you're familiar with San Diego surfing culture, you'd probably think that a band named The

Tourmaliners would be into surfing. And vou'd be right, as guitarist Deven Berryhill confirms. "The drummer. John [MacElwee], and I are the ones that continue to surf. Matt [Clowmintzer], our bass player, grew up in Point Loma, so he

surfed and all that. Joe [Dameron], our guitarist, went to La Jolla High School and is from Bird Rock, so he grew up surfing. We all have surfing in our DNA." The band's sound reflects that.

Further, surf music's reverb-drenched guitars likely played a larger role in Berryhill's upbringing than they did for most of the other kids on his block. His father, Bob Berryhill, is a founding member of The Surfaris and co-author of their hit "Wipe Out." "I was just so enamored by my dad's playing that I loved it from the minute I heard it as a small child," he says. "The whole surf music thing for me was easy to enjoy because it was fun - and that was what music was for me. I didn't know much other stuff until I went out and discovered it on my own."

Though he's a native of Orange County, the majority of Berryhill's musical journey took place here in San Diego, starting when he chose to attend Point Loma Nazarene College (now University). There, he put together a campus band called Transcendence, and followed that with a couple of solo albums, work as a session musician, touring with a Canadian band called The Cry, and eventually forming a surf music trio with his brother and drummer

Jake Najor (Big Daddy Kane, TV On the Radio) called Ice Cream Headache.

Everything came full circle for Berryhill when he and his brother joined their mother and father in a family-band version of The Surfaris in the early 2000s. Surfaris shows became Berryhill's main live musical fix until Frank Sciuto, owner of Tio Leo's Mexican Restaurant, pitched him on playing Tuesday nights at his venue. "I said, 'Sure'. I had my own home Pro-Tools studio and I had been demo-ing some surf songs on my own for a while. But I didn't have a band yet, even though I told him I did. I did have a couple friends that I had been jamming with here and there, so I called them up."

Fast-forward about six years, and the band has released two albums of originals and an LP of Christmas covers cobbled together remotely during Covid. Berryhill is especially proud of their latest release, *Surfidia*, which is the first true studio representation of the live lineup the band has had since 2019. Released on vinyl via local Pacific/Sharawaji Records, the album is accompanied by a music video for the track "Swanky" featuring Eddie Angel from Los Straitjackets.

The band's debut LP, *Tourmaline Dream*, was, according to Berryhill, "mostly just me playing most of the parts with some fill-in guys...we just called it The Tourmaliners.") Berryhill is quick to acknowl-

edge the importance of having the full band contribute their skills and ideas, and cites it as the key to Surfidia's success - including its win for Best Rock Album at the 2023 San Diego Music Awards. This fall, look for a new Tourmaliners live LP featuring songs recorded over two nights at, you guessed it, Tio Lio's. Until then, the band will continue to carry on their oncea-month Tuesday residency at the venue and pop up at other clubs around town. "Our hope is that we can bring happiness and joy into every moment," Berryhill says. "We get people coming up to us at

the merch table saying 'Man, you brought a smile to my face, I got up and danced? We're really a dance band. It's not the kind of dancing you see down at a club on Garnet where they are playing EDM. It's rock and roll. At the same time, we played the 710 Club a couple weeks ago, and it was people in their twenties. A lot of them didn't even know what we were doing, but they got up and moved and had a good time to it. It's a music that crosses all cultures." - Dryw Keltz

### A tribute to TV tunes

### **Turning into the Brady Bunch** at The Jazz Lounge

"I opened this club, so I can do what I want," says Leonard Patton from the stage at The Jazz Lounge. He's flanked by pianist Aimee Nolte and bassist Antar Martin (San Diego Jazz Quintet, Coast Bop Quintet, Antar Martin Aggregation), and he's saying this as part of his introduction for a musical set the likes of which likely wouldn't be performed at any other club: television theme songs.

When I first meet Patton before the show, the trio is in the midst of rehearsing. (They'll finalize the set later in the green room over a pizza from Milos, which is walking distance from the club.) Patton himself is not on the stage at this point. Instead, the prolific singer and Guinness record holder for most consecutive shows in a 24-hour period (70) is vacuuming the club floor and directing staff for preparations. He handles every aspect of the venue's operations, from the sound to the

meals, which are ordered in from Terra American Bistro (my order of rigatoni Bolognese is delicious). He belts out melodies and runs through vocal scales in between bits of conversation, and never stops speaking to his staff like they're members of a team. He smiles, confident that everyone's invested in a common goal, and his people move like a ballet company in the close quarters, avoiding collisions with pirouettes that would make Pittsburgh

Penguin Sidney Crosby blush. I wonder how the table seating is going to work in these cramped quarters, even as I try to count the number of times I've walked past the nondescript club — part of a strip mall that also houses Little Fish Comic Studios, a hair place called The Shop SD, and Aphrodite, a rave clothing store — without even noticing it.

As the room gets closer to full, the sound level rises; I hear a lot of talk at polite volume about topics ranging from veganism to the weather. Occasionally, music gets mentioned. Even with my rock concert-induced tinnitus, I can make out the discussions, a testament to both the acoustics of the venue and the manners of the patrons. Once the set begins, the conversation between songs shifts to banter between the musicians and the audience. It

plays like an extension of Patton's interaction with the club staff, quietly signaling that nobody in the room is more important than anyone else, that we're all there for the same reason. It's weirdly reminiscent of those punk shows where the line between performer and patron gets blurred. But while punks form their own bands overnight out of pure adrenaline and passion, the musicians on this stage have been honed by decades of practice, and my cursory knowledge of theory tells me that they make the difficult look easy because of it. For his part, Patton doesn't have to demand attention; he attracts it with his presence while seated on a *cajon*, keeping the beat.

As for the TV themes themselves, the shared bonds within a room full of people whose childhood schedule was formed around television transcends the nostalgia of actually hearing the songs that introduced their shows. Case in point: the shout of "it's on" interrupting playtime when Nolte shares a memory of her grandfather watching All In The Family, and witnessing Archie Bunker's transformation as the world around him changed. When the trio performs the show's opening song "Those Were the Days," Nolte channels Jean Stapleton's Edith Bunker, while Patton delivers the accompanying lines in his own distinctive voice.

As part of the tribute, they play "Suicide Is Painless" from M.A.S.H., albeit without the depressing lyrics, in order to keep the mood upbeat. A wise choice, and appropriate, because the lyrics were heard only in the film, not on the television show that ran longer than the war it depicted.

Antar Martin doesn't speak often, instead letting his notes do the talking. But he receives a roar of approval when someone yells out "Law and Order," and he plays the opening by himself as Nolte and Patton laugh and applaud along with the audience. There's more laughter when he cites playing it innumerable times in high school as the reason for his instant recall.

After the set, the room seems just as populated, but not cramped. Art is transformative magic and has turned an anonymous strip shop to a cozy music joint, close quarters to intimacy, and strangers to friends. In the process, we all became the Brady Bunch for a short but mystical time.



nation's attention in 1948, when his chorus performed Beethoven's Symphony No. 9 with Arturo Toscanini conducting the NBC Symphony Orchestra. Shaw immediately became Toscanni's favorite chorus master. The 1951 performance of Verdi's Requiem with Toscanini and The Robert Shaw Chorale is a prime example of their collaboration.

From 1956 to 1967, Shaw was the assistant conductor to the legendary George Szell at The Cleveland Orchestra. During his tenure, he took over The Cleveland Orchestra Chorus and turned the volunteer group into a powerhouse. The evidence of their excellence can be heard in a 1967 performance of Beethoven's Missa Solemnis, with Szell conducting the chorus that Shaw prepared for him

Shaw took on the mantle of music director for The Atlanta Symphony from 1967 to 1988. He recorded extensively on the Telarc

While his recording of the Verdi Requiem doesn't compare to Toscanini and his Missa Solemnis doesn't exceed Szell's, there are several fantastic choral recordings available from Shaw and Atlanta. The first one that comes to mind is Johannes Brahms German Requiem. I know this piece is supposed to belong to venerable Germanic geniuses such as Szell or Otto Klemperer, but the chorus is so damn good with Shaw, Also, soprano Arleen Auger is out of this world on Shaw's recording.

There is also an exquisite recording of the requiems by Gabriel Faure and Maurice Duruflé. The Faure

# **Mussel music**

# *"Looks more like a bistro than any bistro on Boulevard St. Germain in Paris."*

t's not often that a restaurant commissions a song in honor of itself. But Marcos Luciano, the Mexico City-born restaurateur who took over Dobson's Bar

and Restaurant from the man himself, Paul Dobson, decided the place's 40th anniversary was an event worthy of a musical celebration. He played it for me during a recent happy hour visit: *Come try our mussel bisque/It's our signature dish/Over one million sold/It'll touch you right down to* 

your soul...At Dobson's, we treat you just like gold.

A little cute, but it grows on you. Just like Dobson's. It's old-world but cool. No, wait — warm. Everything about the place is warm. This one Yelper I'm checking out, Ron W., nails it: "a two-story

Shotgun Shack that has been Frenchified." On the button, Ron! The space, long and narrow and divided by stairs, is "totally tricked out in Bistro Chic," Ron writes, adding that it "looks more like a bistro than any bistro on Boulevard St. Germain in Paris." It has the carved wood bar, the subway-tiled floor, the textured walls, and, well, the bistro feeling that Paul Dobson brought back with him from his time in France and Spain.

It was 1983, and Dobson was determined to create a *simpatico* businessman's lunch joint in the food desert that was Downtown. To provide something that this town's political, business, and chattering classes sorely needed: a place to sit down and, well, chat. "You may notice," says Marcos, "we have no TVs. This is a talking bar. So when you come here, you get a nice drink, and...you talk! You talk to people. And that's what it's all about. There's not that many restaurants in downtown where you do that." You also eat. Some might even argue that the real treasure Paul Dobson brought back from his bullfighting stints around Europe was recipes.



Soup. Just to prove it's not all about mussel bisque.

I meet up with Marcos the way you do at this place, simply because he's nursing a drink where the bar J-tails to the right. He's the

> owner now, but as he says, "it's still the same" as when Dobson owned it. "It's still Paul Dobson's mussel bisque, Mediterranean mussels. We're still with our beautiful menu. We're very famous for the mussel bisque. As

popular as always. The sourdough bread is still the same. Everything is the same." And it looks like everybody wants it to stay that way: a kind of Movers and Shakers Central that neither moves nor shakes with the times. Not that it's sleepy, mind you. Many's the Friday I have come in and found the place rockin' with way-articulate policy wonks, lubricated by likker, going at it over who said what that afternoon, or arguing some piece of legislation like this was the Supreme Court — if you were allowed to drink in the Supreme Court.

"As you can see," says Marcos, "there are a lot of plaques on the walls, with the names of all the politicians you can imagine, from councilmembers to mayor." I spot a plaque signed by Mayor Todd Gloria that starts, "Whereas Paul Dobson is a Dis-

tinguished Restaurateur..."

"But is it true," I ask Marcos, "that you have sold over a million of those mussel bisques over the years? Really?" "Really."

So cool for So Cal. I'm part of that million. I've also had the steamed Mediterranean mussels, which I love basically because they come swimming in that deee-lish coconut curry, garlic, and white wine sauce. Here at the bar during

happy hour (4-7pm), they're \$18, about the top price for HH. And of course, have to have snails. *Escargots a la Bourguignonne*, which I also love, go for \$14. But hey hey! That millionseller mussel bisque *en croute*, with lobster and shrimp in puff pastry, is yours for just \$10. And of course, that includes the long gloop of sherry they pour into the hole they make in the top of the *croute* when they bring it to the table. (The name "bisque"? Might come from "bis-cuit = twice-cooked." Or maybe — jury's still out — it refers to mussels from the famously stormy Bay of Biscay. "*Croute*"? Think "crust.")

Actually, Happy Hour has quite a rich posse of not-quite-cheap, but still attractive dishes: Dobson's Bar Room Burger on Brioche goes for \$14; Brie *en croute* with dried fruits and roasted beet salad is \$16; fish and chips, \$15; honey sriracha chicken wings, \$10; pizza, \$14; octopus tostada, \$16. Not the cheapest. But when I think about it, prices are zooming skywards in every restaurant in town, so maybe these are reasonable after all.

But here's the tricky bit: I've had to pop down

friend Diana for state-side tasting assistance. "Lady Di! Feel like sampling some mussels in coconut curry at Dobson's? I need someone to tell me if they are up to scratch. Can you help me out?"

Silence. Then: "If I can bring a visitor from Singapore," she says. "Denis. International business. Very sophisticated foodie. Has eaten all over the world. Can you handle that? In town tonight. Have to entertain." Meaning, is Dobson's up to the challenge?

"Perfect!" I say. "Bring him on!"

Three hours later, my phone vibrates in my pocket. "Look at your messages!" Diana shouts down the line. "I'm taking video." And now there's a pic of this guy Denis, chomping into his mussel bisque's feathery golden crust. For a moment he says nothing, and then he breaks out a big smile across his face "Very delicious!" he says into the phone.

"As good as Singapore?" asks Diana. "As good," he says.

"Rare praise," says Diana. "But what's that music?"

Marcos must have put the Dobson's song back on behind her. It comes right through. *Come try our mussel bisque/It's our signature dish/Over one million sold/It'll touch you right down to your soul...*

Collaborations are common among many of San Diego's best breweries, but The Original 40 Brewing Company and TapRoom Beer Company have found a way to incorporate a little friendly competition into a cross-promotional tactic. Soo Breezy West Coast Pale Ale is a "Side-by-Side Trial Beer" that each brewery made using the same recipe - including the new Gambrinus IPA malt that, so far, had not been widely available - but with different Amarillo hops.

The Original 40 version of Soo Breezy added T90 Amarillo from Virgil Gamache Farms, while TapRoom used Flowable Amarillo from Totally Natural Solutions. Perhaps

Brewers Supply Group has been working with **Gamb**rinus Malting Company to develop this new malt spe-

cifically tailored for IPA/hop-forward beers. When something like that happens, reps from these companies reach out to accounts to ask if they would be willing to incorporate a collab brew into their already busy brew schedule. The breweries that are able to accommodate have the opportunity to be one of the first people to try these new products and give performance feedback to the companies?

## Spiny mole crabs can be great bait for larger surf perch – A somewhat odd but very productive week for San Diego fishing

Dock Totals 6/9- 6/15: 3280 anglers aboard 139 half-day to 3-day trips out of San Diego landings over the past week caught 4 barracuda, 1539 bluefin tuna (up to 244 pounds), 85 bocaccio, 154 bonito, 1814 calico bass, 9 halibut, 2 lingcod, 2920 rockfish, 66 sand bass, 73 sculpin. 77 sheephead, 31 triggerfish, 143 whitefish, 6 white seabass, 1 yellowfin tuna, and 82 yellowtail.

Saltwater: The number of anglers topped 3000 for the first time in 2024 this past week, and the bluefin tuna did not disappoint. With the fish still mostly gathered from off the Corner to down outside of Ensenada and ranging from 40 to well over 200 pounds, anglers were either schooled, spooled, or they got a fish on the deck. On the boats that ran into schools mixed in size, there was about one fish landed out of every three fish hooked.

Thirty-one triggerfish were also caught this past week, which is an oddity considering the water temps have been cooler than they have

been over the past eight or nine years at this time of year. Triggerfish are more commonly found in warmer marine climes like the Sea of Cortez, and usually show during El Nino years if they show at all. Even then, we might only get one or two in any given week. Conversely, there were six white seabass caught that were over their 28-inch minimum size limit, and thus kept. Though this is the time of year they do start showing, we typically see only one or two in the weekly counts from local sport boats, at least over the past few years. The one yellowfin tuna in the counts is also an anomaly for early June, though we did see one very early in the year when the bluefin were biting strong in March before they slacked off for a month or so.

The strong tenacious red tide that developed along Southern California beaches over the past couple of weeks has put a bit of a damper on surf fishing. Red tides typically occur when phytoplankton bloom as water warms in the spring. Usually, these conditions are very localized and will last only a week, but this year's event has been widespread from the Mexican border to the beaches near Los Angeles, and has been hanging around for more than two weeks. Some of these plankton can be bioluminescent and create quite a show for viewers at night: when waves crash or fish swim through the plankton, the stirred water will glow bright neon blue. This event has not been so dramatic, as the bloom in the San Diego area is not the type that creates bioluminescence. Sea foam has been appearing along the beach, which is an indication of the algae dying off. That should be a signal of the end of the red tides.

As these blooms tend to pull oxygen out of the water when they are thick enough, fish will evacuate the area for cleaner environments. Thankfully, there haven't been any mass die-offs of bait fish found on the beaches, which is a sign of a toxic bloom. Toxic plankton blooms can affect marine life in the food chain from tiny crustaceans all the way up to marine mammals and seabirds. That said, it is probably a good idea to stay away from eating mollusks or fish that feed primarily in the surf zone until the situation clears up.

Further south, along the beaches of Northern Baja, there have been fewer blooms and surf fishing has been very good. We did have a little bit of stained water here off of San Quintín, but that only lasted a few days, and the perch bite has been more consistent with the tide and conditions than anything else. Surf perch primarily feed on sand crabs and small clams that they can manage with the crushers located between the mouth and stomach that break down the hard shells of their prey. Sand worms are also on the perch's diet, though they are not as thick in population as sand crabs are along the beaches in the littoral zone out to the surf break where perch feed.

Ghost shrimp can also make good bait for perch, even though perch typically do not feed on them as they live in calmer water in bay mouths and into the back bays where perch typically do not venture. However, ghost shrimp are excellent bait for many inshore species found in the surf zone,

the rub is that they are very delicate and hard to keep on the hook when casting. Some anglers use thread to tie them on, but I typically just run the hook through the middle of the head and body and out through the backside of the tail and then cast very gently. Another naturally found bait that I have found works very well on perch is the spiny mole crab. Spiny mole crabs are much larger than their sand crab cousins and feature spines along their forward legs and body that can be very pokey if you dig for sand crabs with your feet while fishing as I do. Unlike sand crabs, spiny mole crabs also have an impressive pair of claws that can pinch very hard.

I like to check the very highest point of the swash after the tide drops to see what bits and pieces might be there to indicate what the fish are feeding upon. And when I do, I find a lot of leg pieces and carapaces of spiny mole crabs. Since I was finding them while digging for sand crabs, I decided to give them a shot. I found they are actually loaded with meat from the legs to the body, and if broken down correctly can be strung on to the hook. By cutting the crab in half long ways then crossways between each pair of legs I can get six to eight baits out of each spiny mole crab. The trick is to crush the leg shells just enough to allow them to bend with the curvature of the hook. Then, beginning towards the end of the leg back to where the body would be, I then string the hook through, with the point poking through the chunk of meat where the leg joins the body.

I have found that bait selection tends to make a difference in the size of perch I catch. I get more smaller perch on clams and artificial baits like small grubs and gulp sandworms, while most of my larger fish are caught on big sand crabs with roe, larger artificial baits such as spoons and crankbaits, and spiny mole crabs. Though the latter are not as commonly found on San Diego beaches, I find them in good numbers every day I fish along San Quintin's sandy shores during the lower tide phases.

Whether fishing the beaches, bays or boats offshore, they're out there, so go get 'em!



### Creme de la Weird

 On June 6, when Farida, 50, went missing from her village in South Sulawesi province in Indonesia, her husband and other residents started searching for her – but found only her belongings, the Daily Mail reported. They did, however, spot a "python with a large belly," village leader Suardi Rosi said. "They agreed to cut open the python's stomach. As soon as they did, Farida's head was immediately visible," he said. She was found fully clothed inside the python, which was about 20 feet long. Farida's husband, Noni, 55, lamented her fate: "I am forever sorry that I let my wife go out alone. If I had been with her that day, the snake would not have dared to touch her." Farida was taken away for a religious burial.

### **Bright Ideas**

- The ancient statues at China's Yungang Buddhist Grottoes have taken a back seat to a new installation: timers installed above a row of toilet stalls in the women's restroom show whether the cubicle is occupied and, more controversially, how long the door has been locked. CNN Travel reported that the timers were installed to help mitigate the increased number of visitors: "We aren't setting a time limit ... It's impossible that we would kick someone out midway." But one user said, "I found it a little embarrassing. It felt like I was being monitored."

- On June 5, Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, exmayor Cesar Maia, 78, took a seat to join a Zoom meeting of the city councilors, the Daily Mail reported. Unfortunately, his seat was the toilet, and he was caught with his pants down on the video feed. Maia quickly brought his computer closer to his face, but his fellow councilors couldn't control their reactions. - Real estate developer Sekisui House in Osaka, Japan, has announced that it will demolish a nearly completed new condominium building in Kunitachi, Tokyo Prefecture, because the structure is blocking neighbors' view of Mount Fuji. United Press International reported that the 10-story building was just weeks away from opening to new residents. "We were aware of the culture that values scenery, but we failed to consider it adequately," the company said. People who had bought condos will be compensated financially, they said.

### **Animal Antics**

- Paisley Toten, 2, was riding in a pickup bed through the Fossil Rim Wildlife Center in Glen Rose, Texas, on June 1 with her parents when their interaction with the animals took an unexpected turn, the Associated Press reported. The family stopped their truck to feed a giraffe, but the giraffe nibbled instead on Paisley's shirt, lifting her several feet into the air. When Paisley's mom shouted, the giraffe dropped the tod-

dler into her mother's arms, leaving her unhurt. After the incident, the park changed its rules to disallow riding in an open truck bed. Paisley got a stuffed giraffe from the gift shop for her trouble.

### End of an Era

- If your July 4 traditions include watching Nathán's Hot Dog Eating Competition, steel yourself: Joey Chestnut is out. The contest in Coney Island has taken place since 1916; Chestnut has prevailed a total of 16 times, and every year since 2016, the New York Post reported. His record, set in 2021, was 76 dogs and buns. Sadly, Chestnut won't compete this year. Major League Eating (MLE), which runs the event for Nathan's, said Chestnut's recent deal with Impossible Foods to rep their vegan dogs was beyond the pale. "He's the Michael Jordan of competitive eating," a source said. "But imagine if Michael Jordan said to Nike, 'I love being the face of Nike, but I want to do commer-cials for Adidas, too.'" MLE commented, "It seems that Joey and his managers have prioritized a new partnership with a different brand over our longtime relationship."

### **Crime Report**

- The Golden State Water Company in Los Angeles is installing locked shields over fire hydrants in some neighborhoods in response to a surge in thefts, CBS News reported on June 3. The company said the thefts happen daily; because the hydrants are made of iron and brass, company offi-
