





ENCINITAS

Wanted: junk in the trunk Thick trees needed to keep things clean

For years, Encinitas has been grappling with a proposed addition to its 2017 tree ordinance regarding mature trees. Studies have found that about 50 percent of a tree's wood is carbon, so bigger, older trees are powerful carbon sinks, absorbing more carbon than they release. This makes their protection an important part of a city's climate action plan. A county report notes that trees around buildings can reduce air conditioning needs by 30 percent and save 20-50 percent in energy used for heating.

The city already has a category for heritage trees, which is reserved for those that are among the oldest and largest of a unique species, have historical significance, or help define a neighborhood. In January 2023, that ordinance was amended to allow the designation of a "heritage grove" — entire groupings of such trees.

regardless of size: those trees the city and county define as invasive, fruit trees of any kind, and all palm trees.

But according to resident and certified arborist Mark Wisniewski, the proposed definition fails to account for the growth rates of different species. "Not all species will come to 9 inches at 54 inches above grade, including a lot of the trees we're currently planting," he said. "You've got fast growing trees, slow growing trees, and *very* slow growing trees." And what about the scrub oaks the city was named for? (Encinitas means "little oak.") They wouldn't be protected either, he said,

commercial or mixed-use projects. It would also affect some redeveloped private property. Single-family properties on single lots, including those with accessory dwelling units, would be exempt, as would all properties in very high fire hazard zones, which officials said are mainly within Olivenhain. In cases where developers propose to remove mature trees, the ordinance would require a 3:1 on-site replacement ratio; a 2:1 ratio if native species are used; and a 4:1 ratio for offsite replacement.

But while San Diego County has the most reported shark attack incidents of any county in California, that fact has done little to deter beachgoers. In a recent interview, Lillie R. of Rusty Del Mar Surf Shop said that "a baby two-foot-long shark" attacked Adams. She said she surfs closer to the shore than where the attack occurred, and that, based on her knowledge of the rescue efforts, "he was attacked out closer to the buoys." When I asked if Lillie was worried about sharks, she said she was more concerned about "stingrays in the area."

But not everyone is as sanguine about sharks. "Shark attacks are super scary here

At their April 24 city council meeting, planners finally presented their recommendations for establishing objective standards for preserving mature trees, but there is more work to be done. The first step, defining them, is still proving tricky. Around the state, cities that do consider mature trees in their ordinances describe them as oaks, native oaks, trees of a certain diameter (a qualification which varies widely), or any tree close to its full height and crown size.

Senior planner Evan Jedynak explained that in Encinitas, "mature tree" would mean any tree with an 11-inch or greater trunk diameter, measured at 4.5 feet from the ground. It would also include some native species with a 9-inch or greater trunk diameter: coast live oak, Engelmann oak, Fremont cottonwood, western sycamore, and Torrey pine. Jedynak also said that some trees would not fall into the category of mature trees,

Real estate agent Tom Cozens argued that drought conditions were at odds with the city's tree planting priorities. "Let's preserve tropical rainforests," he said. "You can get an acre for \$5. Encinitas already has a lot of canopy." At the end of 2022, the Encinitas urban forest included 21,806 trees in the public right of way and parks. When it comes to "tree equity" in San Diego, Encinitas scores a high 89, while National City, which appears on a map of areas most in need of tree canopy, gets a locality score of 63.

The ordinance protecting mature trees would apply to all public property and rights of way, as well as private property with new subdivisions, multi-family housing, and

Stingrays scarier than sharks?

Just 25 attacks in almost 75 years

A little after 9 am on June 2, Caleb Adams became the 25th victim of a reported shark attack in San Diego County since 1950. The city of Del Mar reported that the shark bit Adams' left arm and hand and his torso, and that after lifeguards rescued the 46-year-old swimmer, he was brought to the Beach Safety Center on 17th street and then rushed to the hospital. He was then released on June 4 after receiving treatment.

because a couple of people have died in our county," said Jacob Stevens, a local body-boarder. "I think your magazine posted about one of them." Stevens was referring to a 1989 *Reader* story about 33-year-old Convair engineer Robert Pamperin. According to the story, on June 14, 1959, Pamperin went skin diving for abalone off La Jolla Cove, accompanied by a friend. That friend later claimed to have witnessed Pamerpin being swallowed by a shark.

In April 2008, Dave Martin and his triathlon training buddies were swimming off Solana Beach when a shark reportedly attacked

him. Martin died shortly after. In the other 22 reported shark attacks since 1950, five of the victims suffered major injuries, eight had minor injuries, and nine had no injuries.



Tunnels unloved

Only one of the three options "disturbs no one"

As part of the plan to reroute trains away from the eroding Del Mar bluffs, officials are trying to figure out exactly where to put North Portal and continue southeast to exit at the knoll adjacent to I-5. The tracks would then rise as they transitioned back into the existing railway north of the Sorrento Valley station. The third option, by Camino Del Mar, is nearly five miles long. It would also descend south of the rail bridge over the lagoon and enter a portal near the intersection of Jimmy Durante Boulevard and Camino Del Mar. It would then exit from a southern portal at Torrey Pines Road and Carmel Valley Road onto a bridge over the Los Peñasquitos Lagoon before transitioning back to the existing track.

Del Martians say the I-5 alignment under the Del Mar Fairgrounds and San Dieguito Lagoon is the only route that "disturbs no one," as one comment to the city reads. The second option, Crest Canyon, would demol-

the tunnels that will carry the trains beneath the city — in some places, 300 feet underground. While the 1.7 mile LOSSAN Rail Realignment will touch on portions of Solana Beach and San Diego, Del Mar is ground zero. And those who live there — worried about air pollution, sinkholes, noise, vibration, an active earthquake fault, and even losing their homes — have opposed most of the locations proposed so far.

To win more support for the project, which is projected to cost at least \$4 billion dollars, the San Diego Association of Governments came up with more than a dozen options. Three of them have now been chosen for further study in a draft Environmental Impact Report the agency is preparing; the goal is to produce a final version in 2026. A notice of preparation for the report describes the three alternatives as running along Interstate 5, Crest Canyon, and Camino Del Mar. Each one would require a north and south portal, a tunnel connecting the portals, and double tracking of the rail line.

The I-5 alignment is a nearly seven-mile stretch that would descend just south of the Solana Beach Station, enter the Fairgrounds North Portal, continue south into the fairgrounds, then travel under the San Dieguito Lagoon to the west side of I-5. The 5.3 milelong Crest Canyon Alignment would descend south of the rail bridge over the San Dieguito Lagoon, enter the Jimmy Durante Boulevard

ish homes, while the third would mar Los Penasquitos lagoon "with a forever double track." Some who weighed in wondered if the hillside above Camino Del Mar, which has a soil composition similar to that of the bluffs, would be able to handle the double tracked trains. Others asked where the runoff that currently gets absorbed by the hillside would go once huge tunnels are built there.

SANDAG's notice of preparation for its upcoming environmental report initiates a 45-day comment period in which local agencies and residents can provide their written feedback. The Coalition for Safer Trains, a local advocacy group, has submitted questions such as, "Why build a project with a 100- to 150-year lifespan in a floodplain with documented sea level rise and erosion?" The group is also asking the agency to show the exact addresses of residential and commercial properties expected to be taken by eminent domain for each portal option. Fifty homes are at risk, they say, and there are about 51 acres of home dwellers who wind up living over a tunnel, according to a 2017 study.

At a recent council meeting, councilmember Dwight Worden said it's unlikely the agency will address eminent domain in the environmental report. But if it can be shown that a project splits a community, as this one surely does, the city would have more leverage. "Most of the impacts are coming to us." SHEILA PELL

UNDER THE RADAR

Waste much, want more Given the Democrats firmly in charge of both the San Diego County Board of Supervisors and San Diego's City Council, plus a group of wellheeled contractors and labor unions lurking in the background, a raft of new tax hikes may hit local ballots this fall. But some local Republicans could be about to hit back with a secret weapon in the form of Miles Himmel, offspring of the late, beloved KFMB weatherman and TV comic Larry Himmel.

Two months ago, the city council's rules committee voted to raise municipal sales taxes from 7.75% to 8.75. "That projected revenue amount would be 19.9% of the city's General Fund, and it would go towards upgrading streets, roads, storm drains, and other parts of the city's infrastructure," per a KGTV March 20 dispatch. "Raising the sales tax to 8.75% would match the sales tax rates of cit-

ies like Chula Vista, National City, Del Mar, Solana Beach, and Imperial Beach."

Also likely headed for the ballot is a measure ostensibly meant to fix flooding problems in the era of heavy downpour climate change. "The flood prevention measure would be a parcel tax on properties based on their square footage that is developed or paved," noted the *Union-Tribune* in a June 6 report. "The median monthly cost would be \$18.67 for single-family properties and \$145.44 for other properties."

In a bid to insure electoral success, the paper reported, "officials said they've written the measure to require only a 55 percent approval threshold, instead of two-thirds,

provided California voters also approve a statewide November measure lowering approval thresholds for some tax measures."

In the midst of the city's tax-hiking fervor, a countywide half-cent sales tax increase has been placed on the ballot by a group of outof-town contractors and labor unions now calling themselves Lets Go San Diego. Officially titled the San Diego Alliance

for Traffic Relief, Reliable Transit & Jobs, the political committee laid out almost \$2.3 million in 2023 to qualify their measure for the ballot and is expected to spend heavily in the months leading up to the November election.

Corporations behind the big money include the Flatiron Corporation, the U.S. subsidiary of Hochtief AG, a huge German construction company based in Essen, North Rhine-Westphalia. Last fall, a Flatiron partnership reached a \$400 million settlement with the Texas Department of Transportation over allegedly shoddy construction practices at Corpus Christi's Harbor Bridge, according to an October 23, 2023 report by Engineering News Record. "The six-lane span has been plagued with issues since construction started in 2016, and cost overruns have pushed the price from \$806 million to \$1.2 billion. If completed within the new time frame, the bridge will still be five years behind schedule."

Another big corporate backer of the

Let's Go San Diego measure is global construction giant HNTB Corporation. That firm is currently enmeshed in a long-running controversy over its role as Tolling Systems Advisory Consultant in the flawed operations of the South Bay Expressway, a toll road run by the San Diego Association of Governments, which would be in charge of spending the cash raised by the Let's Go San Diego mea-

sure if it is approved by voters.

The treasurer and one of three principal officers of the campaign committee, per a May 31 disclosure, is **Gretchen Newsom**. A onetime San Diego mayoral hopeful, she's currently the powerful Political Coordinator for the Ninth District of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers.



hopeful to union operator.

Enter a newly organized political committee calling itself Stop the SANDAG tax, which filed its statement of organization on June 11, listing its principal officer as Miles Himmel and treasurer as longtime Lincoln Club and GOP county bookkeeper and strategist April Boling. An exproducer and online media guru at KFMB-TV when it was owned by members of the Republican Meyer family,

Himmel is currently communications director for GOP County Supervisor Jim Desmond. In 2022, his total pay was \$128,329, per the Transparent California website.

"His dad was a beloved TV reporter in San Diego for over 35 years," says Desmond's county website. "Miles is a native San Diegan, who started a foundation in memory of his father. The Larry Himmel Neighborhood Foundation helps those in need in San Diego."

Oceanside from another angle

A longtime resident's take on the changes

We bought our house in the early '90s: an unassuming bungalow on a cul-de-sac in Oceanside, with straggly palm trees in front and an overgrown canyon in back. Buying in Oceanside meant a long daily commute to my job at KPBS in San Diego, but it was all we could afford. Most of our neighbors were new immigrants with lots of kids, families trying to get a foothold on the ladder to the American dream. As former hippies who had spent many years living in ashrams, we could relate. The kids proved to be a blessing: as part of my effort to clean up the empty lot next to our house, I paid them a dime for every food wrapper or empty oil carton they collected.

The neighborhood was what they call "in transition." Saturday mornings we woke up to the sound of mariachi music and the sight of the neighbors changing the oil in their trucks under those straggly palms. One evening as

I drove home from a long day of deadlines, I was met with sirens, blinding lights and police cars blocking the road — the SWAT team was engaged in a stand-off with the folks living across the street, who, it turned out, were dealing drugs and gun running.

Things are so different now. The lot at the end of the cul-de-sac just sold for 1.2 million, and the house on it is little more than a shack. At least it has a view of the ocean, two miles away. It isn't just our street that has changed. Oceanside used to be a military hang out: we'd go to the movies downtown and be surrounded by guys with very short back and sides. Barber shops and uniform laundry services dominated

the scene. Now, Camp Pendleton has turned into a small city of its own, fueled by massive investment after the Iraq War, and now there's no need to come into downtown Oceanside to watch a movie, get your uniform laundered or your head shaved. One old-time barber shop is now sandwiched between the Surf Museum and a boutique hotel, The Brick, that serves oysters for Happy Hour.


Two enormous resort hotels have sprung up next to the pier, built in what seemed like a few months during the pandemic. They have rooftop bars with pools overlooking the beach, and conference facilities on the ground floor. When residents emerged after Covid, Oceanside was a transformed town. It felt like everyone who had ever wanted to open a restaurant had discovered our town, where the most enticing option for dining out used to be Chinese. Highway 101 is now full of

interesting eateries: there's even a Michelin-starred restaurant next to the pier which serves 14-course meals with matching paired wines, much of it sourced from the chef's grandmother in Mexico.

But while Oceanside may be entering its heyday, not everyone is happy. Residents attend city workshops where we discuss how to develop tourism while "keeping it real." Many people are upset at the ostentatious investments at the beach, while inland neighborhoods feel neglected. And then there is the question of investing in the sand on the beach itself. In the old days you could walk it all the way from Oceanside

to Carlsbad. Now, the waves sometimes break over the sea wall at the south end of the Strand: I saw them flooding the underground parking lot of oceanfront condos as they were being built a few years ago. And while you can still walk to Carlsbad from south Oceanside at low tide, beware trying to get back at high tide: you may wind up trapped against the rock walls protecting private properties from the incoming waves.

Every year, the Army Corps of Engineers pumps sand to clear the mouth of the harbor and sends it down the coast in big black pipes to help bolster the beach. Tourists seem remarkably unperturbed by the bulldozers that

operate in the surf line for weeks each spring, spreading the sand that gushes out of the pipes. But even this time-honored strategy, which has been going on for years, is no longer enough to keep the waves from washing away much of the sand, leaving big pebble dunes next to The Strand. The city, to its credit, mounted an innovative search to find a company with the best idea for preserving its beaches. Personally, I favored the Dutch company; the Netherlands has been reclaiming land from the sea for centuries. But the Australian plan was chosen, so we'll see. And there's no telling whether Oceanside will be able to leverage the millions of dollars it will cost to implement from state and federal funds, the way Encinitas and Solana Beach have done.

One thing Oceanside has that those cities do not is the pier. So many times, I have walked its length, out into the ocean toward the horizon, reveling in the evening light as hundreds of pelicans soared south in long wriggly lines, their wings skimming inches above the surface of the ocean. The allure of the pier never fades for me, and it's a relief we can still walk most of the way out, even though the tip is blackened and closed off after the

fire that burned the two restaurants perched on the end. I hope whatever replaces them is not designed to bring only well-heeled resort hotel guests stumbling down the pier's uneven planking. Somehow, I suspect the rough-and-tumble fishing parties that used to gather at pier's end won't give it up that easily.

CLOSE TO

Back in my cul-de-sac, the street is empty of cars most days... everyone is off working. As I pick up the mail or weed my succulents, I reflect that that used to be me. Like me, most people on my side of the street are retired or close to retirement and happy with our canyon view. Most people on the other side are young and upwardly mobile — working so hard they only just get home in time to see the sun set over the ocean horizon. The lot next to our house is still empty, though its owner has a permit to build three-stories of multi-unit housing on it. I spoke in its favor (with some conditions) at the Planning Commission, because I know how badly we need more housing. But I'm grateful the builder hasn't broken ground just yet. I went to pick up a little blowing trash this afternoon after we returned from the pier, and I couldn't help wishing the kids across the street were still around to help me. ■

One Airbnb guest said to me, "You bought the house, not the neighborhood." But communities are essential to the happiness of the people in them.

Party rockin' in the house next door

The death of a neighbor ended an era on our peaceful street. For sale signs are not allowed in La Jolla, but news spread fast of the sale: \$2,175,000 for the 3 bed, 2 bath California ranch-style stucco home, west of La Jolla Boulevard. It was re-painted white, and a realtor told that us a quiet, mature man would be our new neighbor. But no one moved in. Then the garage got converted into a "sleeps eight" dormitory bedroom outfitted with four queen

It felt as if we were living next to a frat house, a bar, a low-end hotel, and a theme park, all rolled into one. We no longer waited until midnight to call the non-emergency police number to lodge complaints.

San Diego has welcomed visitors ever since The Hotel del Coronado with its 679 guest rooms opened in 1887. But the city did not have regulations for short-term vacation rentals (STRs) until 2023, thanks to the efforts ing people the petition was for affordable housing. But nothing stopped PCI. They collected the necessary signatures. The referendum passed. Airbnb's crusade in San Diego had succeeded.

With legal objections out of the way, Airbnb bombarded San Diego with pleas for locals to list their homes on the platform — with popup tents at farmer's markets and music events, and with television advertising. The promise: "You won't get sued. There are no zoning regulations for STRs." At first, everything seemed

wonderful. The additional taxes. The additional tourist dollars. The idea of low-cost lodging in a home, vetted by a major corporation, made Airbnb the poster child for the lodging industry. The ability to rent either a room or an entire house helped Airbnb become both a noun and a verb. The company's ads portrayed a gentle company intent on bringing people together and ending loneliness. Who would suspect that it had sued cities — Santa Monica, San Francisco, New York, Miami, Boston — when their city managers objected to unsupervised mini-hotels in residential neighborhoods?

Airbnb's ban on parties didn't stop guests

at the "sleeps 14" house from drinking and being loud. Neighbors still had to go over at 3 am to ask for quiet. Besides calling the police, we installed security cameras, posted "neighborhoods are for neighbors" signs in our yards. The sharing economy had become our nemesis. We needed nice neighbors. We craved sleep.

In May of 2023, the city's STR ordinance took effect. The ordinance mandates that owners or hosts have both STR and business licenses, with the STR license displayed such that it is visible without entering the property. Hosts must respond within one hour to neighbors reporting problems. And there are to be no one-night rentals or rentals of Acccessory Dwelling Units as STRs.

The ordinance allowed for 7430 licenses, with a concentration in Mission Beach. But 8599 licenses were given, thanks to a loophole in the ordinances's classification system for types of STRs. The ordinance is full of such problems. Applicants do not have to show proof of identity; the only genuine information they need to provide is the property address and the real estate tax ID number. As a result, one Ocean Beach real estate investor owns 100 STRs. Licenses are not denied even if the owner has a history of problems reported to the police. There are five code enforcement officers for 8599 properties. And even if you should have a case for closing down a bad operation, the wait for the required building inspector is currently 92 days — and nights. ■

beds. That raised eyebrows. Months passed. Finally, in May of 2021, on garbage pick-up day, I saw a young man on the property. He identified himself as a host. Host? Airbnb, he said. Gave me his cell number.

Memorial Day weekend, a party bus arrived on the street. Fourteen giggling young women emerged and strolled into the empty house. Ubers and delivery vehicles came and went. That summer night, the women's high-pitched shrieks and the booming voices of the young men visiting them blocked the sounds of the Sea World fireworks. I called the host to complain. He arrived in a foul mood. Told us we should mind our business and went inside. A little later, the Airbnb "guests" flowed out — their voices louder than ever, their bodies brightly illuminated by the headlights of a dozen Ubers — and walked past us without a word of apology or any sign of embarrassment. "Sorry for my existence," one young man said to me.

We never saw the host again. He stopped answering our calls. We did not have his email. The neighbors and I sent messages to him via the Airbnb site, to no avail. We complained to Airbnb. Their response: "Airbnb cannot

of Airbnb. In 2017, as part of their planned initial public offering on the stock exchange, Airbnb hired San Diego's former city attorney, Mr. Jan Goldsmith, to be a lobbyist and advisor in their fight against the city's zoning laws, which prohibited lodging businesses in residential neighborhoods.

The city had signed a Voluntary Collection Agreement (VCA) tax agreement with Airbnb in 2015. But after Airbnb refused to supply the identity and contact information of property owners or managers, the City Council prepared an ordinance for shortterm vacation rentals, to make enforcement possible of non-compliant STRs. To prevent that ordinance from taking effect — it could have limited Airbnb's needed growth prior to the IPO — Airbnb hired PCI Consultants, the largest company in the U.S. for signaturegathering, at a cost of \$300,000. (At the time, PCI was under investigation for signature fraud in multiple states.) PCI flew in 130 of their heavy-hitter signature workers and stationed them in front of big box stores. Trader Joe's filed a law suit against Airbnb and PCI to stop the harassment of its customers. Local television stations filmed PCI workers tell-

ne morning, after surfing at Imperial Beach, my friends and were hanging out and bragging about one thing or another. Someone shared a story they had heard about how easy it was to catch a freight

train from San Diego to the Midwest. That got me thinking: that sounds like a great adventure and a lot of fun. It wasn't long before I had my journey planned. I would start in San Diego and go all the way to Chicago on Santa Fe freights, a three-day journey on the produce train. I tried to get my friends to go with me, but they all seemed to have an excuse. What could go wrong? I was 18 and had never been out of California, so this was a good chance to see more of the country. But most importantly, what a great adventure this would be to brag about when I got back.

Within a few days, I was ready to begin my journey. I bought a small shoulder strap bag at the Army surplus store. I really liked that khaki-colored Army bag, because I believed that a soldier must have used it on the battlefield during World War II. I packed a change of underclothes, socks, a T-shirt, and a lightweight sweater. It was summer, so I didn't need much. For food, I brought a couple of peanut butter and jelly sandwiches, two

apples, and a small water canteen. For bedding I secured a tightly rolled up blanket to the bag with an old belt. I also took a small pocketknife, which had a little bottle opener, hid about \$50 in one of my socks, and put a few bucks in my pocket, along with my driver's license.

My good friend Gary

took me to the Santa Fe passenger station in downtown San Diego at about 10 pm. Catching a freight train during the day was too risky, because you could easily be spotted by railroad workers. I remember when Garv dropped me off, he said, "People die doing this type of thing." But it was

too late for me to change my mind; I was way too fired up.

An unlucky start

The freight trains that passed the Santa Fe station were going too fast to hop on, so I walked south down the tracks about a mile to where a freight yard was. I didn't see any

people, but the freight yard was busy. That's when I got my first sense of the noise and power of those big steel cars as they were pushed around the tracks. I crouched down by a fence on the perimeter of the yard and watched for about an hour. Finally, I spotted a slow-moving train that looked like a good option. I said to myself, Either go for it, or walk back to the Santa Fe Passenger station and call Gary.

With my bag over my shoulder, I began running. I jumped over a couple of tracks, then caught up to the train and found what looked like a good freight car to jump into — later, I found it was called a gondola. I grabbed the little metal ladder on the front-end, pulled myself up, and jumped into the car, which was empty. The inside resembled an enormous metal bathtub with five-foot sides.

I got on just in time, because the train immediately started to pick up speed. We passed the Santa Fe station, and after that, the train started to pick up even more speed. The noise of the train and the lights and bells from the train crossings as we passed through North County were intense, but I felt safe, and was excited that I was on my way. I started to feel like this was going to be a real kick, and not dangerous at all.

One of the first things I realized was how bumpy the ride was. I mostly had to stand, because if I sat down, I would just bounce around. After a while, we left the cities behind, and it became totally dark — only an occasional signal light. I lay down on the floor of the car, put my blanket

over me, and used my shoulder bag for a pillow. Somehow, I fell asleep. The next thing I knew, it was light out, and everything was quiet and still. The train had stopped. I looked over the side and I didn't see anything except sagebrush and rolling hills. I grabbed my stuff and climbed up and out of the car. I stepped back from the train and saw that there was no engine or caboose. It appeared that some cars had been uncoupled from the bigger train — including the one I was in.

I ate everything that I had brought and tried to figure out what to do. It was too soon to bail. I had just gotten unlucky. Then I noticed a big fat rattlesnake close by. It was time to move on before I got unluckier still. I walked down the tracks, and after a few minutes, they crossed a road. I put my thumb out on the side that was headed north. Within a few minutes, a guy stopped and asked me where I was going. I figured I must be east of Los Angeles, and knew where I wanted to go: the San Bernardino fright yard, where I had been told the produce freight

trains assembled before heading to the Midwest. Hopefully, I could find one going all the way to Chicago.

The guy that picked me

up was very friendly, so I shared with him what I was up to. It turned out he had ridden on freight trains himself, and he confirmed my San Bernardino plan. He gave me a bunch of tips about riding on freight trains. First, don't get caught by the train police, the Bulls, because "they take the law into their own hands." Second, watch out for my fellow riders, as they would most likely be thieves or worse. Third, because it's easy to fall off of a moving train, always hold on and lie down — and don't ride on flatcars that have nothing to hold. Fourth, never get into a boxcar, because if the door got closed, I would most likely suffocate. Fifth, never ride in cars that have cargo, because a sudden shift could crush you. Sixth, don't lie down in the wheel path of big truck trailers on flat cars, because they can move. Seventh, never cross under a stopped

train or between coupled cars, because freight trains are somewhat unpredictable as to when they'll move and in which direction they are headed. Seventh, watch your step in the fright yard, which is crazily full of tracks. Finally, if possible, ride on a passenger car carrier. Supposedly, they had better springs than other freight cars, and so they weren't as bumpy or loud. (That one turned out to be my favorite.)

My ride went out of his way to take me directly to the freight yard. He even stopped at a little store and bought me some candy bars and a couple of bottles of Coke. He let me off just outside the freight yard, shook my hand, and wished me luck. I recall he looked me straight in the face, and said, "Remember: always hold on."

It was about 10 in the morning. I began to watch the trains coupling and uncoupling, and soon figured out which ones were going east. These trains had a couple of engines and a caboose, were very long, and had a variety of freight cars — mostly boxcars. It was hard to see each train, because there were several sets of tracks, and the trains that were constantly crossing in front of each other. The yard was much bigger than the one in San Diego, but just as in San Diego, I didn't see many people at all, just trains moving back and forth and a few rail workers tending to cars and switching tracks.

Soon I spotted what looked like a passenger car carrier moving east very slowly, a very long train with a lot of boxcars. I figured it must be headed to the Midwest somewhere. I thought, that's my ride, and off I went. Sure enough, I tripped on the very first set of tracks I crossed, but I didn't completely fall down. I learned from my mistake, and within seconds, I had crossed several tracks and made it to my train. It was barely moving, but I could see and hear that it was picking up speed.

Once again, I grabbed the little metal ladder and climbed. Once I reached the cars that were being carried, I lay down alongside the tires of one of them. The car carrier had two levels, with three cars on each level. The train immediately started to speed up. As the scorching summer air hit my face, I thought, *In three days, I will be in Chicago*.

Rich and The Bulls

As the train began to pick up speed, I noticed someone else lying down near another car. Then I saw a couple more people. As it turned out, there were five of us on that car carrier. Soon the train was moving fast, much faster than my first ride. I remember thinking, Hold the hell on, because this thing is really moving. Also, who are all these other people?

When the train got into a mountainous curvy area, it slowed down quite a bit. One of the other passengers came over to where I was and asked, "Where are you going?" I said Chicago. He replied,

"Me too." Of all the people I encountered on my journey, he was the one I who scared me the most. He sat down and told me his name was Rich. He told me he had traveled all over the country on freight trains but lived in Los Angeles. He looked a few years younger than me and a little smaller. but as I found out later, he was a lot stronger and a whole lot more fearless. I learned a lot about riding freight trains from Rich, but I never figured out why he traveled around so much.

During that slowmoving stage, my fellow train-jumpers started moving around on the car. I said hi to whoever approached me and tried to be as friendly as possible. They were all young guys like me, and they all had a destination. Mostly it was Arizona or Texas, but I remember one guy said he was going all the way to New York. No one seemed especially threatening, and everyone had a little bag with a stash of food. Then, as the train hit the desert and the terrain flattened out, the train sped up again. The wind against my face was hot and fierce. Everyone except for Rich laid back down and held on.

We didn't slow down until late afternoon, when we pulled into a small town — a sign beside the track identified it as Needles, California. I spotted a two-story building decorated with columns that looked out of place; Rich told me later that it was an old hotel. I also spotted a small grocery store, and decided to hop off and stock up on supplies. Some of my fellow passengers had the same idea. But as we got off the train, suddenly, from out of nowhere, two railroad Bulls pulled up

in their car, jumped out, and hollered, "You are all under arrest!"

They walked us to a nearby office building and took down our names, but didn't ask for IDs, which I thought was odd. Then they told us to get out of the area where the trains stopped, and said if they saw us again, we would go straight to jail. I thought the Bulls didn't seem to be especially mean after all, but I kept my head down and mouth shut. Rich, on the other hand, was making all kinds of wisecracks. And as we left the building, he turned to us and said, "We are going to get back on that train." I just nodded. We hid behind some bushes. Rich said, "When the train starts to move, we will run for it, and get right back on our car carrier."

"Won't we get caught by the Bulls again?" I asked.

"No, once the train starts to move, it won't stop for anything," he replied.

When the train started to move, Rich said, "Let's go," and all five of us took off running. Within seconds, we were next to the car carrier. I could hear the Bulls yelling for us to stop. We started climbing the car's two ladders, and all of us made it except for one guy who tripped and fell. He got back up, but the train had picked up too much speed, and we saw the Bulls get ahold of him. Rich hung over the side and shouted some swear words in Spanish. The guy that tripped had thrown his bag on the car carrier, and I thought we should throw it off in case the guy could possibly still get it. Rich grabbed it, opened it, took out what he wanted, and then tossed the bag off the train.


When the train got up

to speed, everyone lay down again — everyone except Rich. I watched him walking around, climbing the ladder to the car's second level, and thought, You are not long for this world.

The cars on the train

the desert; it was spectacular, like a beach sunset without the ocean. As I watched it, Rich slipped up beside me and said, "Come on. I opened one of the cars." I followed him to the ladder leading up the second level, gripping everything I could along the way. When we reached the ladder, he just hopped on and climbed. I followed, but it was a scary experience: climbing up the side of a freight train going full speed, with a strong wind blowing against you, on a thin metal ladder, fighting the constant shaking of the train, and carrying the extra weight of a shoulder bag. When I made it to the second level, I crawled to the car Rich had opened, a two-door Chevy convertible. He sat in the driver's seat, so I took the passenger. The other two guys had followed us, and they got into the back. One of them said, "What's this?" and produced a rack of keys for all the cars on the car carrier. Rich immediately determined which one fit our Chevy, started it, and turned on both the A/C and the radio. Soon Rich had opened all of the cars, and each of us found the car we wanted to ride in. Mine was a big Caddy on the lower level. The A/C was great, and I stretched out and blasted that radio. What a sweet ride this was going to be.

Occasionally, the train would stop, and I would hear someone walking

around the train and the sound of banged metal. I found out later this was a railroad worker checking the metal wheels and other parts of the cars using something called a wheeltapper, to make sure everything was intact. This noise reminded me of the way bus drivers on long haul bus journeys in Mexico would bang on the tires during stops to make sure they were all well inflated.

We always ducked down in the cars when the train slowed down and when it was stopped, which wasn't often. Hiding in the cars meant I didn't see any signs, so I wasn't sure where we were, but we had traveled all night and a full day, and it was starting to get dark again. I had finished all my food, and my canteen was empty. I knew that I would have to get off the train the next time it stopped to stock up, even though it meant I might lose that sweet Caddy, with its cool air, comfortable seats, and great music.

It must have been midnight when the train stopped in what looked like a small town. I quickly opened the door

of my Caddy, grabbed my shoulder bag, and jumped off the car carrier. Everyone else did the same. We all stood there for a few seconds, waiting for Rich to tell us what to do. Rich gave all of us a big grin and said, "Come on."

The moon was out, so we could easily see where we were walking. I could also see that there were only three of us. I asked Rich about the missing guy, and he said, "I think he got off somewhere." I remembered that he had showed us a metal bar he was carrying, "in case I run into trouble." I also remembered the advice about being careful with

people I met. From that point on, I never let Rich or anyone else get behind me, and did my best to sleep with one eye open.

A rough night in Clovis

The three of us followed Rich out of the small freight yard. The sign on the depot read Clovis. That was a rough night in Clovis. We found a spigot for water, but nothing was open, so we couldn't buy food, and we had to sleep on the ground. In the morning, we stocked up on food and water. I asked the clerk where we were. He replied, "You are in God's country: Clovis, New Mexico" — right on the Texas border. Our

train had left in the night, and we had to wait all day for another one in unbelievable heat. At least we didn't see any Bulls. Around sunset, a new train stopped, and happy day, it had a car carrier. Just like Needles, we waited until the train started moving and made a run for it. I went for the frontend side ladder on the car carrier and the other guy caught the rear-end side ladder, but Rich didn't get either. I thought he must have missed out.

Soon the train was going full speed. We both just lay flat as the train sped along. Then someone kicked my foot — it was Rich. He managed to catch the boxcar directly behind the car carrier and somehow worked his way to where the cars were coupled together and crossed over to the car carrier. I thought, that's crazy, but then again, the whole thing was crazy. It wasn't long before Rich figured out a way into one of the cars, prying down one of the windows and unlocking the door. Soon all three of us were riding in style again, even if there were no keys — so no A/C or radio. It was a four-door Chevy, and I got the back seat. It wasn't long before we were all asleep — me

with one eye open.

I recall waking up at least once because there were a lot of lights. Rich was also awake, and he said, "Stay down." I heard voices and banging on the rail car wheels. Then the car jerked back and forth, and I figured out that they were uncoupling our car. I heard the hiss of air brake hoses being disconnected, then reconnected. I whispered to Rich, "Where are we?"

"Amarillo, Texas."

I realized that my plan of "three days to Chicago" had been foolish. It had already been three days, and Amarillo was not even halfway to Chicago. Too many train changes. But it couldn't be helped; I needed food and water. At least our new train was still heading east. All night and all the next day we stayed on our new ride. I think Rich hopped off once or twice but the other guy and I just stretched out and rested. We rolled down the windows because it was extremely hot — a damp heat that was nothing like what I was used to in California. As it started to get dark, I could tell we were coming into a big city, because we were crossing a lot of roads with signal bells. Soon the train stopped. Rich said we had reached Kansas City. It was time to get off for food and water. I figured we would probably lose that ride, and I was relying on Rich to figure out our next train.

There is such a thing as a free lunch

There were a lot of lights in this freight yard, so I could see that it was much bigger than San Bernardino's. There were tracks everywhere, with trains pushing and pulling cars all over. When we hopped off the car carrier, I fol-

lowed Rich as he crossed several tracks and headed toward a little shed. When we got to the shed, he said, "We will stay here tonight, and catch a freight in the morning" — one that would go all the way to Chicago. The shed was locked, but that didn't stop Rich; he kicked the wooden door open. Inside, we found a couple of canvas cots, some wooden chairs, and a pot-bellied stove. I thought it must be where the rail workers would hang out when they took breaks. Despite all the noise, I got a decent night's sleep — with one eye open. But I woke up to the sound of Rich arguing with someone. When I looked out the door, I could see he was in a shouting match with a railroad worker. Luckily, it was not a Bull. Rich was telling him to basically get screwed, and I thought for a minute they were going to start to throw blows. But Rich turned to me and the other guy and said, "Let's get out of here." That was fine with me.

Once we made it out of the freight yard, Rich noticed a supermarket and said, "Come on, we will get some food there." I followed right behind him with the other guv. Inside the store, Rich asked one of the clerks where the manager was. I wasn't sure what Rich was up to. We stood there by one of the checkout registers for a few minutes, and finally a guy came up to us and said he was the manager. Rich looked at him and said, "We are hungry and need some food." I thought, This is it, the cops will be here soon, and we are all going straight to the Kansas City jail. But instead, the manager grabbed a big cardboard box, handed

it to Rich, and said, "Follow me." He walked us all around the store putting various food items in the box: milk, bread, oranges, and some lunch meat and cheese. The box was nearly full when he started to walk us to the door. As we got close to the door, we passed a big display of packaged cookies on the end of one of the aisles. Rich, holding the box with one hand, reached over and took not one, but two packages of cookies and tossed them in the box. The manager saw this but didn't say anything. When we got to the door, the manager looked us all straight in the face and said, loud and clear, "I don't ever want to see vou again."

We found a restroom, and for the first time since leaving home, I changed my underclothes and brushed my teeth. Riding freight was not a hygienic endeavor. Then we hunkered down outside of the freight yard and ate most of what we had been given. Those cookies were so good. But Rich seemed a bit agitated, and the other guy barely said anything. Maybe Rich was mad about his encounter with the railroad worker. I was glad that it hadn't escalated into a fight, because I don't think it would have ended well for the worker. But I was happy. I was now over halfway to Chicago, and I got a second wind. I believed I could do this.

Late in the afternoon, Rich started scouting out our next ride. I was all in on whatever he wanted to do; I was afraid of him, but it was clear that he

knew his way around when it came to riding freight trains — and hustling for free food, too. As evening approached Rich told us, "We will get a train soon." We worked our way toward the area where freights were leaving the yard heading east, and stayed crouched down near a fence, waiting for what Rich decided would be our ride. Several trains passed that looked good to me, but none had car carriers. Rich would say something like "too fast" or "not big enough." I figured that "too fast" meant that by the time we got alongside, the jump would be too difficult, and "not big enough" meant the train probably wasn't going very far.

Soon Rich spotted our ride, and said, "Come on." Without any hesitation, we all took off, but I wasn't sure what car we were going for, because it looked like mostly all boxcars. Then I noticed a big flatcar with a big truck trailer on it. Rich had spotted this car, and although we were all running in front of it alongside the boxcars, the truck trailer car quickly caught up with us. Rich jumped on first, using the front-end side ladder. I quickly followed on the same ladder, and the other guy

caught the ladder on the rear-end side. We all laid down flat as the train began to accelerate. Some rail workers spotted us and yelled at us, and that's when I noticed Rich flipping them off.

Art sale As Arizona State University begins moving in on its long-exclusive turf, San Diego State University's broadcast and website operation KPBS has gone looking for a short-term arts editor with a relatively hefty salary. "The salary range for this position is \$7500-\$8333.34 per month (\$90,000-\$100,000 per year) depending upon qualifications and is non-negotiable," says a recent online help wanted advertisement.

"This position is grantfunded for up to three years. Continued employment is dependent on funding." Adds the note: "The arts editor coordinates arts coverage in partnership with KPBS newsroom leadership for digital, social, video and audio platforms and leads special projects that innovate and seek to deepen connections with the community around arts engagement. The arts editor will lead the creation of a new Arts podcast, edit the weekly Arts Newsletter and the Arts in the Open series. The arts editor supervises a team of journalists, including two reporters, a podcast producer, a freelance video journalist and web producer.

"The arts editor understands how to leverage social networks to grow audiences for the arts hub on kpbs.org and broadcast platforms, emphasizing the value of connecting audiences with our content and engaging them in conversation."....

So-called local control advocates — who are trying to thwart an avalanche of state legislation raising residential density by overriding the will of city governments — finally have something to cheer about. But maybe not for long, thanks to San Diego state Senate Democrat Toni Atkins, reports online news website CalMatters in a June 18 dispatch. "The late April opinion from Los Angeles County Judge Curtis Kin held that a 2021 state law letting homeowners split up their houses into as many as four separate units regardless of local zoning restrictions had no effect in Redondo Beach, Carson, Torrance, Whittier or Del Mar. The reason: the five SoCal jurisdictions are 'charter cities' - jurisdictions with their own municipal constitutions that grant them extra independence from state law."

But Atkins is already firing back. "Even some of those who welcomed the ruling as a victory for local control were tempered in their enthusiasm, if only because the ruling seems to invite the Legislature to simply fix its wording with another bill. San Diego Democratic Sen. Toni Atkins, who authored the four-unit housing law, is working on a bill this year, which aims to make it harder for local governments to obstruct the earlier duplex law by delaying approvals or imposing costly or unworkable design and setback requirements."



Older neighborhoods still colorful, crickets signal warmer weather

Colorful Foliage along San Diego's Coastline Lingers, despite the lack of rainfall and warmer, drier days. In the older, landscaped neighborhoods of Coronado, Point Loma, Pacific Beach, and La Jolla, you'll find oleander and hibiscus blooming in many shades, and colorful bougainvillea creeping over garden walls. Look for the magnificent clusters of red flowers adorning the crowns of the flame eucalyptus (red-flowering gum) trees.

Magnolia, the southern-U.S.-native commonly planted as a decorative street tree in many of San Diego's older neighborhoods, continues to bloom this month. Called the "queen of the flowering broadleaf evergreens," its branches carry leathery, dark-green leaves and large, white blossoms of pleasing fragrance. This slow grower can reach heights of 30 feet, and, once established, is relatively insect- and disease-free.

The Chirping of Crickets tells us the warmer weather of summer is on its way. The critters' plaintive pleadings for mates are heard wherever bits of semi-natural scenery cut across the urban tapestry of San Diego. Visit the Spruce Street suspension footbridge, just west of Balboa Park between Front and Brant streets. From the swaying bed of the 70-foot-high bridge, you can admire a canyon filled with green and gold grasses, nasturtiums, and eucalyptus, pepper, and palm trees. Sound effects begin by mid-afternoon.

The Bikeriders — At the outside of Jeff Nichols' gorgeous and grungy look back on the history of the Vandals motorcycle club, we are informed that it is based on The Bikeriders, a book by photojournalist Danny Lyon, based on his interviews with the club's members — and, significantly, their women — between 1965 and 1973. And boy howdy, does it feel like it. After a rousing opening scene in which a couple of locals attempt to separate beautiful Benny (Austin Butler) from his club colors, we cut to an interview between Danny and Benny's bride Kathy (an appealing Jodie Comer), in which she opines that "it can't be love" that fuel's Benny's devotion, so "it must be stupidity." Well, if the wife can't tell, what hope is there for us, especially given the way Nichols keeps us at arm's length from the characters? Danny asks why club founder Johnny (a slippery-accented Tom Hardy) started the Vandals, and Kathy says something about him seeing a movie. Cut to Johnny watching Brando in The Wild One, answering the question "What are you rebelling against?" with "What have you got?" Except Johnny's not rebelling; he's got a wife and kids and a house and a steady job, and the Vandals are just a bunch of guys who like to talk motorcycles, race motorcycles, and hang out and drink, whether in a bar or in a field. Why join? "Everybody wants to belong to something," offers one member. Okay. There's a story here — about changing times and how you can't always be the master of your own creation, about the way that a band of brothers can devolve into a gang of criminals once you take love out of the mix — and yeah, that story hinges on Johnny and Benny's choices. But their reasons seem murky even to themselves, and for all the cheerful exposition Kathy provides, Nichols seems happy to have it that way. There were these guys. They looked like this and talked like that. They rode these bikes. And that will have to be enough. Well, maybe. (2024) — M.L. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Furiosa — Just as Tom Hardy's taciturn Max was not the dramatic center of director and co-writer George Miller's hyper-kinetic Mad Max: Fury Road - that honor went to Charlize Theron's rebellious Praetorian Furiosa and her mad quest to find a paradise in the wasteland — so that same Furiosa is not the center of the more reflective but still wildly mobile prequel Furiosa. This time, it's Chris Hemsworth's hook-nosed, ambitious and vicious, frequently weird and somewhat less frequently wise gang leader Dr. Dementus who gets the sidelong spotlight. Dementus just wants what's best for his people, even if he himself is doomed to despair, now that the endlessly warring world has taken those he loved and left him with just a stuffed bear for comfort.




The Bikeriders: You gotta do it for love, or else it's just another commercial enterprise.

And what's best for his people, as far as he can tell, is for little captive Furiosa to tell him where he can find her Edenic home — the sort of place where fruit trees still grow, even after humanity has all but wiped the world clean in its mad embrace of violence. Talking of which, Dementus kills Furiosa's mom in an effort to get the location, thus giving our big-eyed heroine her raison d'etre for much of the rest of the film. But before he can get the girl to talk, he stumbles into the unholy trinity of Fury Road's makeshift civilization - The Citadel, Gastown, and the Bullet Farm — and the mental wheels start turning. Phew! That's a lot of plot just to set the scene — small wonder the thing runs two and a half hours. And yeah, some of that scenesetting involves surprisingly clunky special effects/sound work - how exactly do people chat in a sandstorm? But once the gears catch and things get rolling, literally and otherwise, the ride is by turns thrilling and fascinating, a brutal, complicated struggle of conflicting interests and strategies leading to a desert showdown that is...well, a word on that. It's talky, and it slams the action to a halt, and it sounds very much like an authorial statement: Dementus throwing off his eccentric speech and vocabulary and

revealing the dark heart of the Mad Max saga. But it also makes way for a nasty, batty, but strangely redemptive segue into Fury Road's story. Make it epic, indeed. — M.L. ** (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Inside Out 2 — Nine years ago, Pixar took us inside the mind of young Riley to meet her emotions: Joy, Sadness, Anger, Fear, and Disgust. At the end of the film — spoiler! — after Joy has learned she can't just repress Sadness and take the helm at all times, she dismisses the expanded Riley mind console's puberty alert, saying "It's probably not important." Ha ha,

and yeah, sequel incoming. Three big changes brought on by the necessity to go bigger. 1: instead of helping Riley grow up and accept change, the big challenge now is creating her core identity via experiences that form beliefs. 2. Friendship island looms much, much larger than family island in the conscious landscape. 3: The puberty alarm finally sounds, and heralds the arrival of a new team: Anxiety, Embarrassment, Envy, and Ennui - oh, and Nostalgia. (This is Pixar, after all, and making parents remember what it was like to be a kid is key to the brand.) Anxiety, wondrously voiced with just the right level of twitchy intensity by Maya Hawke, is the troublemaker here: Riley is off to hockey camp, and needs to think about forging a future. Once again, Joy finds herself struggling to remain at the forefront — a struggle so fraught that at one point, Joy cries. Should that be possible? Doesn't that make Joy Sadness? No matter: the original team isn't the point here — we get precious little anger from Anger, fear from Fear, etc. And even amongst the newcomers, there's precious little drama: Envy doesn't do the damage she should, and Embarrassment is weirdly brave when it counts. It's all about Anxiety, with an appropriately brief cameo from Ennui. There's plenty of invention at the granular level: the battle within the Projection Room is smart, the sar-chasm is funny, the stream of consciousness is cute. But the story is very much the same, starting with Joy's doomed decision to dump bad experiences in the back of the mind. And if the emotions are more complicated, then the resolution is more convoluted, save for the blunt declaration of Joy's fate. It's funny and sweet, but that's all. I Saw the TV Glow — Jane Schoenbrun's followup to We're All Going to the World's Fair has been hailed as a breakthrough cinematic treatment of gender dysphoria. Maybe so, but it's a good enough piece of art to bear multiple interpretations; for your humble correspondent, it played an almost shockingly effective evocation of How Things Felt, back before the internet made cult followings into malignant mobs, and more importantly, back before we — the collective we — put aside childish things and let adulthood take hold. Before the mundane obscured the magical. Maddy and Owen are miserable middle-schoolers; she because Dad is loud and violent, he because Dad is cold and controlling. They bond over and take comfort in watching The Pink Opaque, a show that is supposedly for kids, but way too complicated and creepy for that to be true. The show's heroines are up against Mr. Melancholy, a moon man whose chief weapon is self-forgetting. Hardly the enemy of children: more like the enemy of childhood. After the show gets cancelled, Maddy disappears; her reappearance years later forces a reckoning. What she says is impossible; what she asks is terrifying. And vet. Owen says early on that he knows something is wrong with him, and Justice Smith's performance makes that clear. Whether it's anything more than simply being a person is less so. Thelma — There is a moment near the middle of writer-director Josh Margolin's geezer crowd-pleaser that perfectly melds its sometimes desperately disparate tones, namely: a touching but not too sweet meditation of aging, its attendant losses, and the right response to both and a funny but not too far-fetched riff on Mission: Impossible. (If Tom Cruise refuses to age, why not June Squibb, or at least her nonagenarian character, Thelma Post?) The widow Post has been scammed via phone, but she has an address where she's sent the money, and stops off at her very old friend Mona's for some equipment to aid in its recovery. She finds her old travel buddy much diminished. content to sit in her chair, watch birds on TV, and wage a losing but worthwhile war against the encroaching roaches. There is sadness and not a little horror at Mona's plight, but there is also steel in her voice and a sparkle in her eye when she acknowledges her enemy and says that she must choose her battles. Choosing a battle of her own, Thelma sneaks upstairs to execute her version of Cruise dropping through the ceiling to steal a computer disk. Drama, meet action-comedy. For much of the rest of the film, how ever, it's back and forth between one or the other. Both are largely successful if you don't push them too hard, which should be easy enough: this is a movie that works hard to please, and often succeeds. The old-folks tech - iPhone compatible hearing aids, life-alert bracelets, a sweet electric scooter, etc. — is put to good use, as are the old folks themselves. Squibb is almost unbelievably lively and sharp, and Richard Roundtree serves as a fine, sober counterpoint to her "age is just a number" attitude. Camelot

A smart production of a great musical: unobtrusive direction, solid casting, and inventive staging. Camelot sounds like a big show — King Arthur, Lancelot, the knights of the Round Table, the creation of the chivalrous order, the transformation of England, war, fer Pete's sake — but North Coast Rep, cheerfully bowing to the necessity of its intimate dimensions, hews close to the famous story's heart: the friendships of a King. And really, that's the genius of the story, because where else can the personal and political — the very big and the very small — so intimately intermingle...and conflict? (Arthur, having grown up under the wise tutelage of Merlin the wizard, wants to change "might makes right" to "might for right," and that's a lovely idea for a king to have, but even a king must reckon with the tortuous and tempted human hearts within his household, and himself.) So even though there are often only one or two people onstage, none of the bigness is lost. Quite the opposite: the small-scale interactions feel enlarged: the temptation to personal betrayal is at the same time the temptation to treason, and more - the temptation to raze a civilization. Ît's thrilling stuff, and surprisingly painful after the crazy fun of the first act, when Lauren Weingiddily daydreamed about the romantic frisson of having men fight over her, Brian Krinsky's imposing Lancelot has modestly proclaimed his perfection, and Jered McLenigan's Arthur has risen to his moment. And vet. wasn't the pain portended by all that came before it: the queen's love, the knight's power, the king's dream? The singing Is mostly strong all 'round - so much so that they might have dropped the mics — but special mention might be made of Weinberg's, which must serve so many moods: now lilting, now saucy, now richly melancholy. Bonding at the Blarney

Stone It's been fifteen years since Adam Jones made his debut at The Blarney Stone Pub in Clairemont. "One evening back in 2009, when I stopped in for a weekend nightcap, I heard another

They're related, obviously, but it really is working a different muscle. Thanks to the fact that I got my start at a neighborhood bar, the way I've preferred to work said muscle is to break down the proverbial 'fourth wall' as much as I can. One of

band covering a song that I played regularly at the open mics. I was sitting in 'Liars Corner, and said to a waitress I'd befriended, 'Hell, I can do that as well as they can.' To which she replied, 'If you wanna put your money where your mouth is, I'll talk to the owner.' That turned into my getting a month of four-hour Thursday night shows that I was completely unprepared for, but somehow didn't totally screw up. That eventually turned into another month of Thursdays, which eventually turned into a four-year Thursday night residency — Thanksgivings included."

Given the consistent milieu and regular patrons, you might envision a Cheers-type atmosphere, where everybody knows your name. Jones says it goes beyond that. "It certainly was, and it really did shape how I approach things when I'm on stage. I consider performing for a crowd to be its own discipline, apart from being a musician.

the highest compliments I've been paid is that when you're at one of my shows, it feels like you're sitting in my living room and we're all just hanging out together. This has allowed me to have a much deeper connection with the folks I've played for than I ever would have thought possible. I've attended the weddings of couples whose relationships I watched grow with each successive show. I still keep in touch with former audience members who have moved all over the country. I've attended memorials for regulars that have passed away. I know each performer's mileage will vary, but at least for me, maintaining a Cheers mentality has made my run at this all the sweeter."

Covid saw a slowdown in live performances everywhere, and the addition of personal stress took Jones out of the loop for a bit. But he's back now, with a new resolve and a new four-song vinyl offering called Now and Then. "I'm intentionally offering them for sale only at my live show. In that true

Cheers spirit, I think it's super cool to have an actual human connection with whoever has one of the 100 or so copies, and for the rest of the listening public, the tracks are available on all major streaming services — if they wanna throw me a fraction of a fraction of a cent or two."

The personal connections have led to unique experiences for Jones. "A good buddy of mine that I met during those first few months of playing Thursday nights at the 'Stone is a chaplain at Donovan State Prison. He was able to hook up a gig for this group that he runs, and I got to cover 'Folsom Prison Blues' in an honest-to-God prison. I guess for a few of the guys in the audience, it was the first time they'd ever seen live music, period, so that was pretty damn special as well."

Not all interactions have been as genuine. Once, a man in the audience who sported a British accent introduced himself as Jeff Lynne of Electric Light Orchestra. "I headed home and immediately Googled 'Jeff Lynne,' and realized that the old British dude could not have looked more different than the face I saw on my screen. We'd all been had. I'm still trying to write a song about the whole experience. Might have a percussion section of me smacking my forehead and groaning."

As for the future, Jones sees San Diego as sharing in some of the mojo associated with notable music towns like Los Angeles and Nashville. "DIY music production and distribution are more approachable than ever, which hamstrings the typical industry gatekeepers. Local recording studios like Studio West aren't just cranking out awesome stuff, they're also educating a new generation of professionals. Super creative venues like Lou Lou's Jungle Room are opening and booking a ton of local talent. I just hope the trend continues, and I'm gonna do my damnedest to be an active part of it."

Mainly Mozart unleashes liquid mercury

Thursday, June 20, saw the awakening of happy feelings in my soul upon my arrival at The San Diego Mainly Mozart Festival. The concert was held at The Epstein Family Amphitheatre on the campus of UC San Diego. The concert featured Beethoven's Symphony No. 6, so I also enjoyed the awakening of happy feelings upon arriving in the countryside.

In most cases, there is the orchestra and then there is the star conductor. Mainly Mozart music director Michael Francis is an excellent conductor, but I think he would agree that the true star of the Mainly Mozart Festival is the orchestra. That orchestra is created by bringing in the top players from the top orchestras from across the United States and Canada.

The concertmaster for this

first concert was Nurit Bar-Josef. She is the concertmaster of The National Symphony in Washington, D.C.; San Diego Symphony Orchestra concertmaster Jeff Thayer sat next to her. Rounding out the violin section were concertmasters from Atlanta, Vancouver, The Canadian Opera Orchestra. and on and on and on. The rest of the string section contained principal players from multiple orchestras, as did the woodwind, brass, and percussion sections.

The concert began with pianist George Li playing Mozart's Piano Concerto No. 21. Mr. Li is based in Boston, but performs on the world's stage. It was a delight to hear him perform this most famous of Mozart piano concertos. His playing was like liquid mercury: it flowed, but had weight and a brilliant sheen that illuminated the inner

workings of Mozart's masterpiece. As an encore, Mr. Li set a world speed record with Rimsky-Korsakov's Flight of the Bumble Bee. I chuckled when he began the piece, because of course, that was the encore we all wanted to hear.

I think it was because the orchestra was close enough to the audience that the sound didn't need to be pumped up to ungodly heights.

composer for Maestro Francis and this orchestra to perform, it would be Beethoven. I know, it's Mainly Mozart and not Basically Beethoven. However, a Beethoven symphony has more gravitas than anything Mozart wrote outside of his operas.

Was the performance perfect? Yes, yes it was. I was especially struck by the playing of the woodwinds during the second movement. The bird calls that Beethoven includes there registered as the Platonic Form of birdcall as performed by Jeffrey Khaner, flute, Frank Rosenwein, oboe, and Boris Allakhverdyan, clarinet. All three are the principal chairs at their orchestras, which are Philadelphia, Cleveland, and Los Angeles, respectively. Not to put too much emphasis on it, but those are three of the top orchestras in the world.

I must mention the storm section as well. Let's just say it sent a tempest of the aforementioned liquid mercury spinning off the stage.

The Mainly Mozart Festival continues through Saturday, June 29.

Luna's Lunpias adds a Filipino twist to Poway

14034 Poway Road, Suite C, Poway. It was only a few months into the pandemic when one of my editors e-mailed me to suggest our readership must surely be getting tired of covid-era food stories already. Couldn't we move on to other topics? As I check my watch now, four vears later, that's certainly truer than ever. That erstwhile era of Instagram delivery services, pop-up grocery

stores, and take-home cocktails seems almost cute in retrospect. Nevertheless, I have to take that

backwards look sometimes, because covid's impact continues to churn up stories like the one I recently encountered in Poway, where I followed a steady stream of lunchtime customers into Luna's Lunpias, an intentionally misspelled and self-described "Filipino Fusion Eatery" that opened in a small strip on Poway Road last fall.

Turns out, the business was born amid the lost jobs and uncertainty of quarantine, when, in April 2020, the namesake Luna posted a photo of lumpia wrappers to her social channels, announcing, "Place your orders... heehee." Apparently, as the rest of us spent the past couple of years throwing away our masks and arguing with AI chatbots, Luna and her family have been steadily growing a business: taking internet orders, establishing a catering operation, popping up at farmers markets and breweries, etc.

Their work has culminated in a small, all-day, counter-service restaurant squeezed in among car dealerships and self-storage facilities. It's not a

glamorous location, but it does the job well enough that Luna is probably wishing she could fit in a few more tables. Because her shop offers the one thing that's arguably more important to a restaurant's success than hard work: tasty food.

> Guests may start spotting the fusion in the breakfast items scattered throughout the all day menu notably a *chilaquiles* dish made with the Filipino pork belly dish tocino (\$17). But if the world has a better allday breakfast option than the Filipino garlic rice and egg dish known as silog, I haven't met it. For \$13-

14, you can get a silog bowl featuring a variety of proteins ranging from Filipino sausage to Hawaiian-style

huli huli chicken. It's savory and quite garlicky, and has become a Luna's staple.

Most of the fusion makes sense, because Luna's mainly sticks to infusing culinary traditions already linked to Filipino culture historically. On the Mexico side, you wind up with the slightly-less-weird-than-they-sound lumpia nachos (\$12.25), and several tacos filed with traditional Filipino meat dishes, including *tocino* or the crispy pork belly *sisig* (\$6-7).

Hawaii turns up again in the guise of a smashburger style *loco moco* served over garlicky mashed potatoes (\$16.25), in sides of macaroni salad, and in the customer favorite spin on *musubi*, the sushilike rice and seaweed wrap featuring slices of Spam. Except, here the Spam is fried in a panko crust (*a la* Japanese tempura) and dressed with *unagi* eel sauce and spicy mayo (two for \$10.25).

If you're not looking for any cross-cultural experimentation, just show up to Luna's Lunpia

for the traditional stuff, whether vegetable, pork, or beef lumpia; pancit noodles; or plates highlighting the likes of pork belly or chicken adobo (\$15-19). Just avert your gaze from the dessert menu, or you'll wind up spending all your money on a litany of sweets built around ube, flan, or sweet, banana-filled lumpia. Any of which suggest something better came out of quarantine than home-baked sourdough.

Santee Lakes Firefighters Catfish Derby this weekend Bluefin tuna biting well day and night

Dock Totals 6/16-6/22: 3116 anglers aboard 132 half-day to 3-day trips out of San Diego landings over the past week caught 14 barracuda, 1862 bluefin tuna (up to 90 pounds). 939 bonito, 2501 calico bass, 20 croaker, 10 halibut, 3 lingcod, 1904 rockfish, 254 sand bass, 18 sculpin, 34 sheephead, 2 Spanish jack, 148 whitefish, 3 white seabass, and 181 yellowtail.

Saltwater: It's not often that you see calico bass outpace rockfish by such a large margin as they did last week, but with windy conditions outside, boats focused more along coastal and island kelp edges than the banks. Bonito numbers also went up six-fold, and a few dozen white seabass were caught and released (only two kept). For the boats that did get out to the grounds, the fishing was very good for quality bluefin in the 30- to 90-pound range, but I didn't see any reports of standout fish in 150- to over 200-pound class, the sort we usually see one or even a few of on any given week. The big fish are out there, but when the schools are mixed in size from 25 pounds and

up, anglers tend to fish lighter gear to get more bites and then get outclassed when bit by a larger fish. There is just no stopping a 200-pound bluefin tuna without the heaviest gear.

Fishing down the Baja coast has been excellent between blows, with yellowtail showing very well for the longer-range runs, as well as some yellowfin tuna south of the Vizcaino Peninsula. The Royal Polaris returned from their first eight-day run of the season with a great mixed bag of fishing inshore and offshore, posting up limits of yellowtail to 35 pounds, along with a solid catch of grouper, pargo, yellowfin tuna, and bluefin tuna. The Intrepid also scored well on yellowtail to 45 pounds while fishing down at the Ridge during their seven-day trip that finished up targeting bluefin closer to home on the grounds 60 to 120 miles south of

Though much of the bluefin bite has been between sunset and sunrise, the fish are beginning to bite better in daylight hours. The Oceanside 95 and Constitution have begun departing on their 1.5-day trips at 1 pm to give anglers a chance at more fishing during the dark hours when the larger tuna have been most active, and have had good results. Those trips tend to fill up quick, but just about any 1.5-day or longer trip will give great odds of boating a limit of tuna, what with the daytime bite improving and the large area of fish out

Half-day and 3/4-day runs have been splitting their time between the kelp edges and local rockfish spots as the sand bass bite has slowed a bit off the Imperial Beach sand flats from

the spree just a couple of weeks ago. As noted in the counts, the calico bite has been phenomenal with about half the fish caught keepers over 14 inches. I only total the fish kept, as not all boats report the number of released fish, and even then it is usually an estimate. In spite of those who claim the counts are exaggerated to draw more customers, the truth is that boats are obliged to report accurate numbers, especially for rockfish and bass, as that is the main way the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) keeps track of the health of the marine biosphere and adjusts limits accordingly.

When I worked on the boats. I would often hear the mantra that the counts were fudged, but after walking the deck with a whiteboard and marker hundreds of times, totaling all the fish by species while getting the orders for processing, I know that to be at least mostly a falsehood. Maybe some boats have fudged in the past, but I never witnessed it. I have seen anglers complain that the boat did not get limits because they did not catch

a limit, or in some cases anything, but that is why there are boat limits. CDFW can only really verify the number of fish caught against the number of anglers, so a boat can return with limits determined by the number of passengers and still have some passengers with fewer than the limit of any given species. Usually, in those cases, those who catch over a personal limit will share with those who have fewer fish.

Fishing from the beach has been very good, now that the water is much cleaner after an extended algae bloom the week previous. Barred surfperch, corbina and halibut have been biting well in their respective zones along the coast, with perch wide open along the sandy stretches, corbina biting where sand meets cobble, and halibut laying in the deeper slots of sand near reef rock. Shortfin corvina are still showing well along the riprap inside San Diego Bay, while spotted bay bass have been very active along the deep side of eel grass beds. Halibut in the bay can be found most along the channel edges from just inside Point Loma back to the Coronado Bridge.

Freshwater: Santee Lakes has begun stocking catfish for the summer season, and anglers have been doing well on them, with cut bait such as mackerel doing the best. This Saturday, June 29, they will be holding their annual Santee Firefighters Catfish Fishing Derby at lakes 3 and 4 from 6 to 11 am. This event is for youths from 3 to 17 years of age, and though adults can help bait up and cast, they cannot fish. Those interested can register at santeefirefighters.org. Walk ups will also be accepted.



Mistaken Identity

 Alexander Morris, 53, filed a lawsuit against Ascension Macomb-Oakland Hospital in Warren, Michigan, on June 10 over an incident that took place last year, NBC News reported. Morris, the lead singer of the Motown group the Four Tops, went to the hospital with "clear symptoms of car-diac distress" in April 2023. While there, Morris told nurses and security staff that he was concerned about stalkers and fans - but they didn't believe that he was with the Four Tops, and ordered a psychological examination, which delayed his treatment. He was physically restrained, he said, for at least 1 1/2 hours - "a terrifying experience to be in the middle of a medical emergency," Morris said. The suit, which seeks \$75,000 in damages, alleges negligence, racial discrimination, battery and intentional infliction of emotional distress. Morris' ordeal finally ended when he showed a nurse a video of him performing at the Grammys. He was offered a \$25 gift card to a Meijer grocery store as an apology, which he re-fused. "I never imagined I would become a victim of 'being sick while Black,'" Morris said. The hospital had no comment on the

Bjork was fired from the restaurant for making the post but said it "wasn't too much of a shock, thank goodness."

What's in a Name?

- Here's a term you might not know: A "cryptic pregnancy" occurs when a woman is pregnant but doesn't realize it until labor begins. So it went with Tayvia Woodfork, 26, of Mississippi, who experienced stomach pains while dining at a Golden Corral restaurant in North Little Rock, Arkansas, on May 6. Fox News reported that Woodfork went to the restroom, where she delivered 6-pound Tamaar Kylon Corral Woodfork, a boy. Yes, that third name is a tribute to the restaurant. Golden Corral shared news of the birth on their Facebook page and even gifted the new mom a \$200 gift card, among other items.

The Continuing Crisis

Laurence Van Wassenhove worked for France-Telecom starting in 1993. France-Telecom, which was later bought by Orange, knew of her physical limitations caused by medical conditions, so they tailored a secretarial job to fit her skills, Oddity Central reported. In 2002, she asked to move to another region of France, and her request was approved -- but the new workplace was not adapted for her needs. However, instead of making the necessary changes, Orange continued to pay her full salary for 20 years, while she did ... nothing. A mediator was appointed in 2015 to resolve the situation, but nothing changed. "Being paid, at home, not working is not a privilege," she said. "It's very hard to bear." Van Wassenhove is suing Orange for "moral harassment and discrimination at work linked to her health condition." Her lawyers believe Orange was trying to coerce her into quitting.

Weird in the Wild

 Scientists studying African elephants at Kenya's Samburu National Reserve and Amboseli National Park have discovered that the pachyderms call to each other and respond to one another using individual names, the Associated Press reported on June 10. The names are expressed in low rumbles that can be heard over long distances - by elephants, anwyay. Many of the noises are low enough not to be heard by humans. When scientists played recordings to individual elephants, they responded energetically to those that contained their names. "Elephants are incredibly social, always talking and touching each other," said co-author George Wittemyer. "We just cracked open the door a bit to the elephant mind."

Fail

— The U.S. Department of Homeland Security notified the Akron (Ohio) Police Department's SWAT team that the body armor plates they recently purchased were counterfeit, WJW-TV reported on May 8. "We became part of a bigger investigation," said Capt. Agostino Micozzi. The gear was purchased from China and sold to law enforcement agencies, DHS said. The Akron City Council approved immediate replacement; Micozzi said there might be a chance to get restitution on the counterfeit plates.


