UNDER THE RADAR

Future hits and misses A battle between San Diego's politics of the past and those of the its possible future is playing out in this year's mayoral race. Forces for Democratic mayor **Todd Gloria** — backed by housing developers, labor unions, and wealthy Democrats - have lined up a host of seasoned campaign operatives, including a reputed specialist in the dark arts of political attacks.

A good deal of Gloria's support currently comes from a Los Angeles-based indepen-

dent campaign committee calling itself Big City San Diego. The group, which registered with the city clerk's office on December 7 of last year, lists Jacob A. James as Principal Officer. James "has spent his career building the power and influence of organizations seeking to create global change," according to an online profile by his public affairs firm Dudley & Finch, LLC.

"As a professional advocate,

Jacob has advanced legislative and executive actions around the world," per a July 1, 2022, profile on the website of the San Diego Foundation, where Jacobs was on the group's Board of Governors. "His ability to problem solve and create impact across cultural barriers came as a result of his unique life experiences, including being 'the gay millennial son of a Navy SEAL and a Sharp health care nurse' and living 'as an evangelical Christian for 18 years on a San Diego naval base.' Although he's not particularly religious today, the deep connection Jacob has to faith through his mother's example helps him empathize and connect with others. LGBTQ+ rights, mental health access

and women's pay equity - all informed by his lived experiences — are causes that Jacob has a deep passion for outside of his environmental work."

On January 25, Big City San Diego filed with the city clerk to officially rename itself Big City San Diego Supporting Todd Gloria for Mayor 2024. Funding for the effort has since included cash from Fresno-based Klein Financial (\$10,000, February 5), San

Diego lobbyist Atlantis Group Land Use Consultants (\$5000, February 8), a La Jolla-based subsidized housing developer called Monarch Housing Solutions (\$25,000, January 25), and Building a Stronger California, Sponsored by the Western States Regional Council of Carpenters of Los Angeles (\$50,000, March 4).

The pro-Gloria forces have imported a roster of the nation's top tech brains for a slick online campaign. Big City San Diego has so far paid Meta, Inc., the parent of Facebook and Instagram, a total of \$21,250. Among Big City San Diego's other vendors is an outfit called Point Loma Strategic Research, run by Greg Scanlon.

In 2016, the trade publication Campaigns & Elections named Scanlon an up-and-comer in the opposition research business. "Oppo researchers are storytellers at heart and there's one tale that Scanlon has become famous for. He was hired by the [Democratic Governors Association] in January 2013 and helped set up the group's first permanent, in-house

research department.

A major victory for the nascent department came 11 months later when New Hampshire restaurateur and radio host Chuck Rolecek opted not to seek the state GOP's gubernatorial nomination after it emerged he'd declared his Hilton Head vacation home as a primary residence to save thousands of dollars in property taxes.

But that was small ball compared to Scanlon's time in Virginia, when as the research director at the Democratic Party of Virginia and House Caucus, he helped trigger the inquiry that led to the nine-and-ahalf year federal prison sentence for former state Del. Phil Hamilton (R) on bribery and extortion charges." The obvious target of any opposition research undertaken by pro-Gloria Big City San Diego would be the mayor's general election opponent, San Diego cop Larry Turner. Scanlon's firm has so far been paid \$15,000 by Big City San Diego, according to the group's filing for the first six months of this year with the city clerk's office.

campaign committee calling itself Responsible Energy San Diego, which reported raking in a grand total of \$592,725. Most of the money came from San Diego Gas & Electric, owned by utility

giant Sempra Energy, which set up Responsible Energy to tank a voter signature drive aimed at putting a measure on the municipal ballot to force Sempra's San Diego Gas & Electric to turn its city electrical energy franchise over to city hall. The pro-public power ownership forces failed to collect sufficient signatures to compel the turnover vote and the city council declined an option to order the move. The committee continued on page 4

pushing the ultimately failed initiative, Power San Diego PAC, took in less than the Sempra group's war chest, \$164,512.

Meanwhile, participants in the battle for mayor were also busy fundraising. Re-Elect Mayor Todd Gloria 2024 took in \$130,586. Turner for Mayor 2024, belonging to Gloria's general election challenger Larry Turner, raised only \$54,058. But those two so-called controlled committees, run by the candidates themselves and bound by law to \$1350 individual contribution limits, are only part of the story.

Independent Expenditure committees, not under the control of the individual candidates and free of any restrictions on the amount donors — including corporations, labor unions, and business partnerships can kick in, have this year been playing a larger role than ever in municipal politics, filings show. Los Angeles-based Big City San Diego, backing Gloria, raised \$141,498 over the first six months of 2024.

The San Diego Police Officers Association PAC, backing Turner for mayor and financed by unitemized cash from its police officer membership, took in \$90,318.

Then there was New San Diego, the independent committee run by Democratic Gloria backer **Gil Cabrera** which earlier this year went to bat for neophyte Republican mayoral hopeful **Jane Glasson**, a failed effort widely viewed as an attempt to keep Turner from making the November run-off against Gloria. New San Diego, with a sizable stash of corporate funding already in the bank from previous years, took in

continued from page 4 \$32,500 in 2024 before permanently folding its tent June 21.

An array of other big money independent committees representing special interests are also in the fray this year, including Protect Neighborhood Services Now, sponsored by the San Diego city employees labor organization, which came up with a hefty \$323,000 to place second after Responsible Energy San Diego in the fundraising derby. Third place was held by the San Diego County Building and Construction



Now the city has gone back to the drawing board and come up with another redesign for the signs, which cost \$600 each to manufacture and install. And this time, the message takes aim

at addiction. "Do not support panhandling. It directly contributes to drug and alcohol abuse." As councilmember Gary Kendricks put it, motorists are "not doing them favors by giving them \$5, and they go buy a bottle of booze. It directly contributes to their self-destructive lifestyle."

The good part, said councilmember Goble, was the message below the warning: "Free food and shelter is available in .8 miles at 1527 E. Main Street." But from

a legal perspective, Goble said he was wary of suggesting that all panhandlers abuse drugs and alcohol. "My compromise is: 'Don't support panhandling; help prevent drug and alcohol abuse."

For his part, El Cajon mayor Bill Wells said studies indicate that "somewhere around 45, maybe 35 percent" of the homeless have drug and alcohol addictions, but based on anecdotes he thinks it's much higher. Wells said he liked the idea of a directive because the city isn't allowed to make a law against Trades Council Independent Expenditure PAC at \$314,942. Contributions included \$10,000 on February 29 from the State Building and Construction Trades Council PAC of Sacramento, \$20,000 from the United Nurses Association of California/Union of Health Care Professionals PAC, of Long Beach, and \$25,000 from PACE of California School Employees Association of Sacramento.

"I think it would be easy to say we could put a no panhandling sign on every corner," said city manager Graham Mitchell. "But I worry that it does send a message. 

Drinks All Around

don't often notice my surroundings, but I like wood," says my daughter as we take a seat at the bar inside Part Time Lover. "It makes it feel like a place where people actually live, as opposed to places where everything is stone or marble..." "Like a tomb, where people get put when they die," I finish, and she smiles just a little. I'm glad for the smile, and for the comment about wood — the smile because the night has been bittersweet, a send-off as she heads to Denver for her first real job after college; the comment because this place is pretty well wrapped in woody warmth.

My daughter mostly drinks hard cider, but here, she orders a Soft Spoken. "Our drinks are basically riffs on classic cocktails," explains bartender Nicholas Welsh over the thumping music and lively chatter. "There are like 25 cocktail families, and they drill us on them really hard here. In the old days, there would be a guy watching you, and he'd have a bar spoon." If you slipped up, "he'd rap you on the knuckles — like the nuns. Guys today have it a lot easier, but they still drill you."

When it comes to invention, "basically, we take a drink and start choosing what elements we want to swap in and out to give it a different flavor profile. My coworker Tony Bautista created Soft Spoken to have something crushable and tasty for summertime. It's from the Collins BY MATTHEW LICKONA

family" — a sour cocktail featuring a base spirit, lemon juice, sugar, and carbonated water, served over ice in a tall glass. "It's modeled after Michael McIlroy's Rome with a View from Milk & Honey in New York City" — lime replaces lemon, dry vermouth and Campari serve as the base — "and Christian Siglin's Carlsbad Cooler from Noble Experiment here in San Diego." Bautista's drink keeps the lime and dry vermouth, but blends the Campari with the more floral aperitif Aperol and the strawberry-tinted Atost, the last of which gets a boost from the house strawberry syrup. "Then Basil Eau de Vie gives an interesting vegetal note against the sweetness," and a dollop of mezcal "to round out the cocktail."


The up-front first impression is pure nostalgia for the candy-sweet Slush Puppie of youth, gradually giving way to the more adult experiences of sour lime, dry vermouth, and finally, the gently smoky bite of mezcal. A fitting cocktail for a young person leaving behind the easy comforts of her childhood home, heading out into the wide world and its more complicated joys.

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Drowned Out

I HAVE TOLD THIS STORY BEFORE, OR PART OF IT. Or one side of it. The story of my friend Lisa Weber, her long struggle to balance her life as a methamphetamine addict with her life as a good wife and mother, the way the former made the latter possible until it didn't, her subsequent long struggle to quit meth, her eventual embrace of alcohol as a substitute, and her even more eventual decision to join her loving and supportive husband Ted in a life of sobriety. I ended the story with Lisa's declaration that "I am a good person with a problem. I am going to eventually get rid of this problem, and then everything will be okay."

This isn't a sequel, although parts of it take place after the events of that account. Rather, it's an acknowledgement that I knew what I knew and could write what I wrote not

because I was a dogged journalist or probing interviewer, but because I was her friend. We had — we have — a relationship. That means I am part of her story, and she is part of mine.

In that first account, I

wrote, "About those field trips she chaperones: the school banned her from driving after another mother smelled alcohol on her breath. What I did not write was that it wasn't her first time drinking and chaperoning, and more importantly, that I knew this. Before that, I had through Lisa was a weekend drunk, the sort who works her way through a bottle of white wine on a Saturday night while watching a true crime documentary, not the sort who hides vodka in her water bottle while she's running errands.

Our kids go to the same school, and on this occasion, we had both been roped into driving a bunch of students for a fun-time field trip. Let's say it was mini golf. A couple teachers, a couple other parents — including one we knew as Hot

Dad — the two of us, and a hot mess of kids. It was a fun

day, and I got a kick out of the way she flirted performatively with Hot Dad, asking for his advice on proper putting posture. I knew she was doing it to make me laugh, to make our mundane outing entertaining.

"I am a good person with a problem. I am going to eventually get rid of this problem, and then everything will be okay."

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At one point, she purred to Hot Dad, "I'll be right back. I need to get something from my car." And then I watched as she headed to the parking lot, popped open her minivan's trunk, pulled out a bottle of vodka, emptied it into her Hydro Flask, and took a large swig. No one else noticed — why didn't anyone else notice? - which meant I had to deal with it.

My first thought was to tell one of the teachers. We needed to send her home. Then my brain started spinning — what happens next? We'd have to call someone to pick up the kids who had ridden with her. Would the police be called? Would one of the other moms blab to the yoga pants brigade back at school? Of course she would. Would Lisa be forced to pull her kids out of the school? Suddenly, she was at my side, grinning. "I'm going to ask Hot Dad to help me get a hole in one," she said.

I was too stunned to speak. But even after I stopped being stunned, I didn't say a thing. There's no excuse for that. Thinking about it now fills me with shame. The old term for it is "sin of omission." In that moment, I was a bad friend and a worse chaperone. I told myself that I didn't want to blow up Lisa's life, but I kept silent at the expense of other people's children. While they made it home safely, they might not have. When we left mini golf, I tailed her car, thinking that if I followed her, I could somehow keep the kids safe. That was nonsense, of course.

At home, the full guilt of what I had done sunk in. Then came the anger — at myself, and at Lisa, for putting me in that position. I called her, furious. "I saw you dump vodka into your water flask today, and it is not okay. It's selfish and reckless."

She was silent for a long time before saying, "I drink more than that for breakfast. That was nothing, believe me. Nothing."

"That is insane," I managed, before adding, "Don't drive on another field trip...ever. If you do, I will tell the school."

"You are not better than me," she said.

What an odd thing to say, I thought. Of course, I was not better than her. I let her drive a bunch of kids home while she was drunk, just to avoid conflict! She has a disease, I thought. What was my excuse?

Months passed before we spoke. The next year,

mother. My mother did not smoke or wear dresses that cinched in at the waist. Her movements were not feline. Was it their shared Irishness, or my mother's endless patience and co-dependent tendencies? No, wait, don't answer that. But I certainly understood why my mother liked Maura. If Maura had invited me to abandon my family and come live with her, I would have accepted happily, even though her home was not a home for children. Everything was modern and mirrored; the furniture was angular and uncomfortable. Everywhere, there were ornate crystal ash trays for her lipstickstained Virginia Slims: in the kitchen, in the den, in the living room, even in the bathroom.

Maura's fingers were delicate. Her hair was ink black and fell in a heavy curtain below her shoulder blades. She wore it long and straight and parted in the middle. As she aged, it became peppered with gray that made her look even more elegant. When she rode in our car, I would sit behind her and reach out and touch her beautiful

I was less taken with Maura's husband Mike. He was a car salesman, and the only cool thing about him was his blue Corvette. Even that he managed to make uncool by doting over it — waxing and shining it in the driveway as if to announce to passersby, this beauty belongs to me. Mike spoke with a nasally accent, and wore glasses like Jeffrey Dahmer's. He had curly ginger hair, a matching mustache, and sideburns. He was short and paunchy.

I'm telling you all that about Mike because I want you to understand how fierce was my love for Maura — or rather, my image of Maura. When I was not yet 10, my mom told me that Maura's first husband Tony was handsome and rich — and a wife-beating drunk. He and Maura lived in downtown Chicago — probably an apartment. But when I pictured their home, I saw a brownstone on a tidy street, framed on either side with black antique streetlamps. One day, Tony beat Maura so badly that she jumped out of their bedroom window in an effort to escape him. She landed in the yard, naked and bloody, and ran through her neighborhood until an older woman saw her and pulled her inside. Maura called my mother, who showed up and picked glass out of her hair and skin until an ambulance arrived. After that, she lived with my parents for a time until she got back on her feet. My mother ended the tale by adding, "Had she stayed with Tony, I am certain he would've killed her."

Maura and Tony divorced, and Maura eventually started dating. She had two boyfriends: Mike and a handsome guy. Both offered to marry her. Maura chose Mike because he was safe. He owned his own home and had a steady job. But none of that mattered to me. No doubt, Mom told me about her terrible past in order to warn me against being fooled by a bad man's looks and money. But it only made Maura's story more cinematic, more glamorously tragic. In my mind, Maura wore a full-length mink, and the cuts on her face accentuated her cheekbones. I was certain that, had I been in her place, I would have chosen the handsome guy.

Lisa

"Everything hurts," complained Lisa over the phone. "It hurts to walk. It hurts to move." There was a hint of panic in her tone. I suspected she was doing drugs and drinking heavily again, but I

did not come right out and say that. Instead, I said, "You need to get out of your house. Walk around your neighborhood. Move your body. You will feel better."

We agreed to meet up. I wound up waiting for half an hour. When Lisa finally arrived, she was wearing a knee-length parka with a fur collar. A pair of yoga pants sagged off her in a way yoga pants are not meant to sag. She had lost weight. Her face was gaunt. She was holding a water bottle that looked more like a jug than a drinking vessel. "Let's get this party started, biiiitttttccccchhhheeeesss," she shrieked, shoving a Styrofoam container at me. "I got fish tacos from the original Rubio's! I saved you one to make up for being late." She was so close to my face that her spit sprinkled my forehead. I could smell her breath: sugar and booze. She collapsed into the lounger beside me and declared, "I have margaritas!" Her eyes were hidden behind big black glasses.

"You look like a mob wife," I said. "What's with the getup? It's like 70 degrees outside." "I'm cold," she said with a shrug.

"You need to see a doctor." She pushed her Stanley cup in my face, "Taste it!" she demanded.

"You said margaritas; that implies plural, not singular."

She let out a heavy sigh. "This thing is 64 ounces, we can share. Take some."

I shook my head. "I'm good."

She took a big swig, jumped to her feet, and cried, "Definitely not enough tequila!"

Before I could say a word, she was heading to her car for more tequila. And that was how I spent my night: next to my tanked friend Lisa, worrying over her weight loss and drunkenness. But worried or not, I laughed at her jokes. As drunk as she was, Lisa was still funny! I have spent 15 years watching her comedy act. Over those years, I have spoken up about the drinking and drug use. I have nagged; I have urged her husband to consider an intervention; I have attempted to admonish, to encourage rehab. But every time I do, I am met with anger on her part and avoidance on his. When I push too hard, her replies get sharp and mean spirited — aimed at my many insecurities. A few times, when I passed serious judgment, we stopped talking.

Years ago, in the beginning stages of our friendship. I took Lisa to a Narcotics Anonymous meeting. Back then, I was optimistic, hopeful that hers was a habit that could be kicked. I lured her in with the promise of excellent peoplewatching. "This is an opportunity to share a room with people who might be more fucked up then we are," I said.

The meeting was in a dusty old church in North Park. They made Lisa deposit her hydro flask in the narthex. Good call. We took our seats in the wooden pews and took in our fellow attendees. "That guy definitely has a toupee on," Lisa said in an audible whisper, indicating a man sitting within earshot. Then she indicated a woman in a green tracksuit. "And she definitely owns a family of gerbils — and they do not belong to her children. They are hers, and

Despite her quips, that day was the closest I came to understanding Lisa's addiction. When people began to introduce themselves and share stories, I was surprised to hear Lisa speak up. "My name is Lisa, and I drink because there is always so much to get done. All the responsibilities fall on me. When I wake up in the morning, I feel a sense of doom. I start the day thinking I can get through it without using, but it becomes so depressing and unmanageable. I medicate to make it easier. Sometimes I think that drinking makes me a better version of myself. I am shinier. I make people laugh." While she was speaking, she was looking over everyone's heads — looking at the gruesome figure of Jesus hanging on the cross.

I wanted to squeeze her hand and reassure her, but I didn't want to spook her. I wanted her to say more. I wanted to understand her better. But that was all she said. On the car ride home, we were silent for a long time. The only thing I could think to say was, "You make me laugh when you are not drunk."

"When have you ever seen me sober?" she replied. I looked at her face, expecting a smile, but it looked like she might cry. I couldn't think of a way to respond. So I said nothing. I think about that conversation often. I wish I could have a re-do.

Maura

I may have thought that Maura didn't like chil-

dren, but she had them anyway. Her first, Sean, was a beautiful baby. He had dark hair like Maura and warm hazel eyes. I felt a tinge of betraval over his birth. Michelle came soon after; she was less beautiful: her hair was tinted orange like Mike's, and her skin was as pale as mine, almost anemic. For a while, Maura stopped smoking and wearing cinched dresses, and started using the shiny appliances in her kitchen. When I got to tag along on Mom's visits to Maura, it was never spoke earnestly and in full sentences.) He was constantly scanning his environment for danger. "Our clothes will get dirty. We might get hurt. That doesn't seem like a good idea. Mommy won't like that." I found him exhausting — a tiny buzzkill in khaki shorts and loafers. Meanwhile, little Michelle stared at me with her huge pale eyes. If it weren't for Sean, she would've done anything I told her to.

longingly as I climbed the tree near the community pool. I liked to climb to the highest branch and scurry across it until my feet dangled over the chlorinated water below. Sean would vell, "You are supposed to be watching us!" but I knew they were okay. He was a 40-year-old trapped in a 6-year-old's body. I knew he was much more capable to taking care of his little sister than I was. He guarded her with a fierceness only a fearful child could muster.

Only once, after much prodding, did I convince Sean to roll down the hill in front of his house. Michelle gleefully followed behind. We spent the afternoon climbing up and rolling down that hill. I had never heard Sean laugh so hard. It was the freest I'd ever seen him. Afterward, we were painted green and brown, the stains from grass and dirt forming a colorful testament to the fun we'd had. But when we finally went back inside, Sean became a mass of nerves, and rightly so. Maura was horrified. Her mouth dropped open, and she hissed, "Your clothes are ruined! Into the bath, you holy terrors." She wasn't looking at her children when she said it. She was looking at me. My heart sank.

I did not see much of

Maura after that. I was getting older and was less interested in gaining her approval. I stopped tagging along on those visits to Maura's house. Sometimes, she asked me to babysit, but Mom wouldn't let me go over there alone. What I did not know was that by then, Maura was at the peak of her alcoholism. Her cinched dresses had been replaced with robes; her glossy hair had dulled. Sometimes I would overhear Mom on the phone, pleading with either Maura or Mike. One time, I heard her say through her tears, "But Mike, you can't just bury your head in the sand, she needs help. If not for her, do it for the kids."

Lisa

In early May of 2024, Lisa decided to check herself into rehab. "I'll be gone for six days," she told me. I was ecstatic, but I knew six days was not enough. You don't break a decadelong vodka habit in under a week.

When she sent me the rehab's website, I took screenshots of the counselors. One guy was bearded, waif-like, with long hair. "Please make this guy cry," I texted her, "I am begging you." She responded with a photo of another counselor, this one in a sweater vest. "I'm going to make this guy my bitch," she wrote. Another photo showed addicts doing the limbo. I sent that to Lisa too, writing "The idea of you limbo-ing with other degenerates fills my heart with joy."

As the day of her departure approached, I got nervous that she would change her mind. She called frequently; sometimes, her voice was so slurred I could barely decipher what she was saying. On the day of check-in, she called at 7 am and asked, "Do you think I'm going to be the only person in the history of this rehab to check in shit-faced?"

"Absolutely not," I said. "Everybody does it." She seemed annoyed at being so unoriginal. When we said our goodbyes, I was still not certain that she would go. But she did, and she even stayed five additional days. She called when she got out, and sounded upbeat, almost like a new woman. I felt cautiously optimistic. But the next time we spoke, her voice was slurred. I told myself it was from her medication. She couldn't possibly be drinking again. But over the next few days, her calls became increasingly incoherent, filled with swearing and belligerence. I didn't call her out. I just kept an-

Then, early one morning, she called again, sounding sober this time. Her voice was clear and bright. "I am going back in," she said before even saying hello. "This time for a month."

"That is great!" I replied. "You need more time to recover. I am so happy about this."

"I'm going to wait until Sunday, because Sam has prom." With that, the worry returned. There would always be something. On Monday, she told me. "I didn't end up going. It's too expensive,"

I was silent for a moment before asking, "What's the alternative?" She let out a dry laugh.

"I don't know."

"Do you have a sponsor yet?"

"Not. Yet." I could feel her annoyance through the phone. "I gotta go," she said and hung up before I could say goodbye. I tried not to cry. But I was so frustrated. Over the next week, she called multiple times a day. She was angry all the time. I couldn't always make sense of what she was saying. One Tuesday night, she called, frantic, and asked if she could stay at my house for a little while. I knew it was not a good idea. I did not want her to do it. I said yes.

Still, I thought her husband should know where she was, so I asked mine to give him a call. "Let him know that we are going to let her stay here for a bit to dry out." After he did, Lisa called in a rage. She did not want her husband to know her plans. I had crossed a line by reaching out to him. She was screaming at me, bringing up moments from our friendship when I had let her down. She listed them off, one after another, on and on. I knew that she was drunk and sick, but I still felt incredibly small. I did not want to listen anymore.

"I don't need you!" She finally shouted before hanging up. I texted her a few times, telling her she was still welcome if she wanted to stay, that I was worried, that I cared about her. She did not respond. Instead, she found her keys - the ones her husband had hidden, the ones to the minivan — and took off. When she called the next day, I did not answer. I was raised by a woman who believed that you do anything for your friends, but I made the decision to let Lisa go for a little while. I couldn't watch her self-destruct.

Maura

Even though she was my godmother, Maura did not attend my First Communion or my Confirmation. Not did she come to any of my birthday parties or graduations. She did, however, make an appearance at my high school grad party. I was shocked to see her. She wore a buttery silk top and a full, pleated skirt. Her beautiful long hair, by then more gray than black, was pulled into a tight bun. But while her clothing was immaculate, she was almost unrecognizable. Her teeth had vellowed, and her eyes were sunken. She offered a stiff greeting, the kind reserved for an acquaintance you run into unexpectedly on the street when you have other, more important places to be. I reached over and hugged her. She accepted the embrace awkwardly before turning to enter the kitchen. My friend Anne came up behind me. "How do you know her?" she asked, her face pinched with confusion.

"She's my godmother." "Get out!" she said. "I lifeguard at her community pool. She is a nut, a total drunk. Her daughter spends all day at the pool, no food, no sunscreen....neglected."

"But where is Sean?" I asked. "Who?" "Her brother."

"I didn't know she had

a brother. Sometimes,

When Maura's daugh-

Maura had died a few years before Michelle. Cirrhosis. Mike did not bother telling my mother, instead she found out at the grocery store from a mutual friend. She and Maura had been estranged for years. "It's a shame about Maura," the friend said, and Mom, not normally one for public displays of emotion, broke down sobbing in the produce section.

My mom stuck it out with Maura, unwavering in her attempt to help her. It was Maura who let go of Mom. In a spectacularly drunken stupor, Maura had fallen in her driveway. When it happened, Mike was out of town on a fishing trip with Sean, leaving her alone with Michelle. Maura hit her head hard. and lay there, unable to move, her blood pooling on the cement. Michelle, who was around ten at the time, thought her mom was dying. She ran to a neighbor's house. An ambulance was called. Afterward, the two of them stayed with my parents until Mike returned a week later. Yes, a whole week later. Cutting his trip short was clearly not on his agenda.

When Mike got home, he and Mom had an ar-

gument. Mom was adamant that Maura check into rehab. She begged them. Mike said he could handle it. "No big deal, just a silly accident," he claimed. My mom called both Maura's family and Mike's family, explaining the situation, telling them something had to be done to help Maura. She was worried about Michelle and Sean's safety. Maura told my mother never to speak to her again. She had crossed a line, invaded her privacy. And that was that. Thirty years of friendship, gone like Mike on a fishing trip.

That was my real cautionary tale: not the one about Maura jumping out of a second-story window to escape a violent man, but the one about my mother in the grocery store, sobbing because no one had bothered to tell her that her best friend had died. Maura was 56 when she died. Lisa is 57. I am full of dread.



Thunderheads bring rain, true jasmine, great meteor viewing

Towering Thunderheads Have Been Seen Hovering over the wall of mountains east of San Diego recently. Afternoon rainshowers have already dampened Palomar, Cuyamaca, and Mount Laguna on several occasions, with more of the same expected over the next two or three weeks. (Even some coastal areas got a few showers last week.) Usually, this kind of activity ceases by sunset, and clearing skies usher in a cloudless night. The marked contrast between the sunny but bland weather along the coast and the more lively and unpredictable mountain weather is one illustration of San Diego County's "geography of contrast."

Jasmine's Thick, Sweet Odor wafts on the night breezes this time of year, especially throughout the older, well-landscaped neighborhoods of San Diego. The exotic odor is produced by the flowers of

true jasmines (genus *Jasminum*), as opposed to the so-called "star jasmine" (genus *Trachelospermum*), which blooms in the late spring and early summer.

The Perseid Meteor Shower Will Peak August 11-13. Assuming the clouds cooperate, we will have excellent viewing conditions this year with the quarter moon (35% visible) seting just before midnight. During the hours between midnight and dawn (6:10 am) on the mornings of Monday, August 12, and Tuesday, August 13, the Perseids should deliver a meteor a minute. Remember that as the night progresses, it gets darker, so some of the best viewing times will come right before sunrise. If you're an early riser, it might be best to just check it out in the morning. And, because the sky will be so dark this year, trekking up to the mountains might not be necessary — as long as your view of the sky is wide and unobstructed by trees or structures, and away from any street or city lights. If you live in a rural region or in the darker suburbs, you can lay on a blanket in your backyard and enjoy the show. Be sure to not to just glance up at the sky off and on; rather, maintain steady viewing for a duration of time. These meteors are entering our atmosphere at 37 miles per second so the visible streaks will last for only a second or two.

Deadpool and Wolverine -

Superhero movie fans of a certain age may recall a moment at the end of Avengers: Infinity War when big baddie Thanos snapped his gauntleted fingers and so ended half of the universe's living things — including folks like Spider-Man, Black Panther, and Doctor Strange. For one brief darkling moment, you may have felt something — the presence of serious stakes, of possible death, of the sort of genuine ending forever denied those heroes in their original serialized medium of comic books. But most likely, by the time you left the theater, you were already coming to vour senses: there was simply no way Marvel was about to leave that much money on the table. And maybe, in that moment, you hated yourself just a little bit for thinking like that: for letting yourself careen out of the story and into such craven considerations so quickly. For dispelling the magic of moviemaking by casting your thoughts upon the monetary machinations at the heart of all that onscreen heroism. All of which is to say that the third entry in the Deadpool franchise feels your pain and laughs heartily at it. For here is a film devoted to exposing and ridiculing the nothing-means-anything narrative trick of the multiverse - a gimmick that gets to have Logan's noble death and feast on Hugh Jackman's ageless abs, too - that at the same time revels in it. As Ryan Reynolds, er, Deadpool says to a variant of his old buddy Jackman, er, Wolverine, "They're gonna make you do this until you're 90!" After all, both these heroes are basically indestructible, thanks to their powers of regeneration, and the boys at the lab are getting better and better at the whole de-aging thing... So yes, ha ha, we open with Deadpool figuratively pissing on Wolverine's grave by literally digging up his adamantium skeleton and using it to take out a horde of henchmen set on stopping him from saving the world. There's a half-hearted feint toward motivation: the merc with a mouth wants to matter. And there's a brief flirtation with the consequences of that desire. But mattering isn't what matters here. Not even the action is what matters here. What matters here, as in the first installment, are the jokes. So many of them, crammed in from and spinning off in all directions Many of them land. Some of them will most likely make you laugh. The effort and execution are impressive. At a certain point, the thought may occur: Is this the real endpoint of the Marvel Universe, the extremity toward which quippy Tony Stark in Iron Man was always tending? Is that why his power thingy appears at the outset? Might they be ready to mean what they say about the multiverse being exhausted and empty? By negating Wolverine's sacrifice, are they admitting their mistake and declaring an end to this nonsense? But most likely, by the time you leave the theater, you will already be coming to your senses.— M.L. ★ (IN WIDE RELEASE

Last Summer — Director and cowriter Catherine Breillat's French twist on the Danish film Oueen of Hearts has got your cycle of abuse right here. We open on the face of a trembling teen as she recounts her sexual history to Anne (a handsome and supremely put-together Léa Drucker), the lawyer who will be attempting to nail her rapist. "The defense will try to portray you as a world class slut." Anne warns "In court, victims often become the accused." A little later, we learn that the worst thing that ever happened to Anne was finding out she couldn't have children, thanks to an early-inlife abortion after...well, you figure it out. So when her older husband's don't-give-a-fuck-son-from-his-firstmarriage Théo (a dreamy and lanky Samuel Kircher) comes to stay and starts picking up on her hatred for normopaths (her term) ... well, you

figure it out. The only mystery lies in how the inevitable will or will not resolve — and even that isn't the point here (If it were, we'd see more of Chekhov's dictaphone.) Breillat's interests seem more personal than plotty, as evidenced by several long, long closeups: first of an ecstatic Théo, second of an isolatedin-the-midst-of-communion Anne, third of a terrified, discombobulated Dad. Despite being competent, compassionate, and even content, Anne has a fear of the call of the void, a fear of being the reason that everything disappears. (Why? Well...) But "disappears" may not be the right word, if only because it isn't nearly violent enough. Then again, that's the character of the film as a whole: cataclysmic events taking place amid lovely, languid scenery and civil conversation. (2024)— M.L. ★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Longlegs — Oz Perkins' adventure in toxic family dynamics - toxic in a way that results in copious quantities of spilled blood - hits so many of the beats from Silence of the Lambs that some viewers may wonder if it's some kind of supernaturally-skewed gloss. It's not just the green female FBI agent with the traumatic past, the major clue via hidden Polaroids, the tense conversation with the terrifying monster who might be able to help crack the case, the helpful but unsettling meet-up with the research nerd, the nightmare basement lair with the thumpy music, etc. etc. It's also the feel of the thing: the clouddimmed middle-American dread, the sadness of old houses and abandoned souls, the threat of violence just outside the door. And all that similarity-bordering-on-sameness might have been okay if the story this time was a little better told, if the murderous mechanics were a little less arbitrary. As it is, the supernatural stuff is strangely tethered to some highly specific, totally natural, and weirdly unlikely conditions that feel manufactured for the sake of the Big Reveal. And even so, all might have been forgiven but for the so-flatit's-funny final confrontation. That said, the big hook here is an almost unrecognizable Nicolas Cage as a fellow who worships Satan but does not seem to have gotten anything for his trouble except for an unpleasant and unprofitable skill set. He's wonderfully creepy, but that's about it. At least Buffalo Bill had a motive beyond "Hail, Satan!"- M.L.★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

The Vourdalak — Adrien Beau's first film digs up the first vampire — the Russian story upon which it is based predates Bram Stoker's Dracula — for a surprisingly effective horror story about ... what, exactly? The evils of an authoritarian, ancient order of things, and the toll it takes on the younger generation? Well, you might be forgiven for thinking so, when the first-born son declares dear old Dad to be just fine, when he very clearly is not. When he just asked for the family dog to be shot. since it won't stop barking at him. When he refuses to say a blessing. When he starts feeding on the young. But there's a reason the film opens with tidings of war, and we see right way the way it actually destroys old orders, upends morality, lays waste to the sort of civilization where a wounded man might be taken in and given shelter from the storm. But before you start chewing over

questions of meaning and intent, stay a while with the story at hand and its dreamy presentation. Because there is surprising mastery there, in the service of serious horror. (2023)— M.L. $\star \star \star$ (DIGITAL GYM)

Don't Dress for Dinner

Good gravy, what a funny and frenetic first act for this, the most requested return engagement ever at North Coast Rep. (They first produced it 17 years ago.) Marc Camoletti's madcap adventure in marital mores and mistaken identity sends us to a converted farm outside Paris — the guest bedrooms are referred to by their former roles of cowshed and piggery. It's a cute nod at the play's plenitude of BS and swinery — adulterous intent and the incessant lying

required to cover for same are the engine and wings for this farcical flight of fancy. As we open, wife Jacqueline is set to visit her mother for the weekend, and it seems that hubby Bernard has planned a rendezvous with his paramour Suzanne. But then his old buddy Robert shows up from out of town, and wouldn't you know it, he's having an affair with Jacqueline, so she contrives to stick around. Add cook-forhire Suzette into the mix — why. you could shorten both that and Suzanne to Suzi, couldn't you? — and you have a recipe for constantly-and-deliciouslyaverted disaster. And since most everybody is either trying to misbehave or making money covering for said misbehavior, there's no need to feel bad for anyone. You can just sit back and let the hilarity wash over you. Or, even better, try to keep up with the sheer number of twists and turns brought on by various situations and (mis)communications. The Rep has brought in an expert cast - rapid-fire comedy like this lives or dies by timing and reaction, and here, it flourishes in full flower. If the men are slightly more manic in their mendacity, well, they're men on a mission. And if the ladies are slightly more bald in their slipups, well, they're less practiced at plotting. (Veronica Dunne's Suzette has the least to feel guilty about, and so she has the most fun.) It's all great fun — until the second act, when the constant need for confusion begins to take its toll, and the question arises of how exactly all this ought to end. It's not bad by any means, just a little less good. And the ending feels designed to soothe an audience that has just been buffeted by the winds of societal change, concluding that bad behavior isn't so much bad as it is exhausting. Henry 6 One: Flowers and France and Two: Riot and Reckoning

As the Old Globe joins the pantheon of American theater companies that have staged all of Shakespeare's plays, director and Artistic Director Barry Edelstein has gone big and broad for a play that draws its tragic force from the fact that it is not a tragedy, but a history. Very big: the three parts of Henry 6 are here presented in two parts - named Flowers of France and Riot and Reckoning, though there is plenty of reckoning in part one and plenty of flowers in part two - totaling nearly six hours of love and war, triumph and treachery, and the endless struggle for power. The moment Henry V dies, leaving his infant son as king, France revolts against English rule and various factions begin eyeing Henry's crown. The cast is not so large that it can afford to cast a new actor for each role — Cassia Thompson spends the first part as France's Joan of Arc and the second as Henry's son Prince Edward, while Tally Sessions goes from the sublime (the heroic Lord Talbot) to the ridiculous (the villainous Jack Cade, dressed as the January 6 shaman, and slain by a doddering champion of the Good Old Days), etc. etc. - but it's still big enough for battles full of bodies and an enlarged sense of sweep and scope. (The cast list notes that "other people of England and France are played by community volunteers who participated in our arts engagement programs.") And very broad: Richard Plantagenet lays out his claim to the crown via a highly anachronistic slideshow that makes the goofiest plays-on-

names imaginable. Hey, John of Gaunt is scary skinny! (Flowers is otherwise set in olden days, while Riot features modern riot gear but keeps the swordplay.) The wailing ghosts of late-period Jessica Lange and middle-period Meryl Streep haunt a couple of the characterizations, and there is enough skitty slapstick amid the drama and death that you may feel you are watching even more plays than you actually are. The biggest trouble is Henry himself, who seems a great callow hollow at the center of Flowers, and shows himself clear only in his last two Riot and Reckoning soliloquies. Without a compelling character to embody the loves and hates of the state. it can be hard to care about all the goings on, no matter how oomphy the electric guitar or how dazzling the digital diplays. But again, the tragedy here is that there is no tragic hero. The good are ground under right alongside the wretched, and that - high and low, silly and solemn — is just the way it was, and is. The whole thing does, to borrow from Hopkins, gather to a greatness, or at least a grandness, and gains momentum as it rolls along. All that fury to rule France. All that English blood spilled for England.

Oooga-booga in OB

Local art-punks King Whisker filmed a video for their new single "Utopia" in late spring. The song is a commentary on how the world and life can be simultaneously beautiful and brutal. To hammer home this concept, they spent a day dressed as cavemen, running around Ocean

that 80 percent of the shoot was done in OB. "It was just so much fun being out there dressed as cavemen and just running around like idiots, and nobody was scoffing," he explains. "People were just stoked that we were out there having a good time. OB is so much our vibe. It's the only place in San Diego where I feel

"The video was a collaborative idea," King Whisker singer/guitarist Charlie Rohlfs explains. "I think the caveman idea kind of came from me. It's both a play on that and also the fact that we're still cavemen. We're still 'Ooga booga. Look at this. Kill! Kill!' just like everything else on this planet." Diego guerilla-style minus permits, but had zero issues throughout the day. Rohlfs estimates

like we could have done that." In true San Diego fashion, there's also a clip of the band on Newport Avenue, enjoying some massive burritos courtesy of Mike's Taco Club. "You know in The Flintstones when they get a steak it's always the size of a woolly mammoth? We kind of wanted to highlight San Diego and how we have caveman-sized burritos out here," Rohlfs says. Over at Belmont Park,

the zaniness continued: the cavemen can be seen marveling at the Giant Dipper roller coaster, plus other park rides and flowers. They even squeeze in a game of air hockey for good measure. Rohlfs says there were numerous fitness influencers and Tik-tokers shooting videos at the park as well, so even with the caveman costumes, they may have just blended in among all the videographers. Even so, when the cops came

by, "We would make sure we weren't doing any weird shit. We wanted to get all the shots we wanted to get, so we didn't want to get kicked out before we did."

One highlight of the "Utopia" video is what Rohlfs describes as the "step-stepwiggle-wiggle-step-stepwiggle-wiggle" caveman dance that the band does at various points. Now, it shows up sometimes in their live shows, like during their recent afternoon set at Winstons, "The place was packed, which was really nice for an afternoon during a weekend. It was interesting playing for a big crowd of people where most of them didn't know who we were. I think probably 80 percent of them hadn't seen us play before, and we were doing all originals. It was the first time we had played a show in the daytime, and we learned some stuff about it. Onstage, we are very much absurdist and satirical. But there are walls that are up there during the day between the person and the band that aren't up there at night. When you see a show at night, you get drunk, you get high, and you go dance. It's different expectations, I think, from the crowd in the daytime. But it was a ton of fun."

Expect more music, more videos, and more shows from King Whisker this year. Don't get excited for a new album though: that's 2025 territory. "We all have jobs," Rohlfs explains. "Music is expensive and time-consuming. During the pandemic, we just sat in a room and recorded because we didn't have anything else to do. Now, life is just different, so we are doing it at the pace that we can. We're really trying to get to a place where, after this album drops, we have enough of a following and the streaming metrics that people care about so we can start booking at smaller festivals. That is the dream."

The Space **Bar Sessions**

Sitting in on a jazz jam in La Mesa

"There's a lot going on in 'Take Five' that you miss until you try to play it," saxophonist and teacher Dave Good tells me. He's speaking of the jazz standard popularized by the Dave Brubeck Quartet in the '50s — standard for jazz people, at any rate. I know it from the 1981 Ralph Bakshi film American Pop. The song appeared on the soundtrack album, the second side of the vinyl following Jimi Hendrix's "Purple Haze," and it was easier to just let the record play through. The tune still brings the film to mind, and it's one of the few jazz pieces I can recognize immediately.

But I don't have to be an aficionado to dig live music, especially when the sets take place in a venue as laid back as La Mesa's Space Bar Cafe and Wine Bistro. But perhaps "sets" is too formal a descriptor for this, a jazz workshop that happens every Wednesday evening from seven to nine. My notion of the precise meaning of "workshop" proves to be a bit inaccurate, probably because of my lack of formal music

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training. The session is open to players of intermediate skill level and above, which means something beyond just knowing what notes correspond to what keys.

The musicians here tonight are working out solos with seasoned pros and lifelong educators. Taylor Smith and Horacio Mancilla provide the rhythm section for the house band on bass and drums, respectively. Outside of this venue, Professor Smith teaches at Cuyamaca College, while Mancilla is one of the most recognizable Spanish-speaking voice actors around. Both field my asinine jokes about bass players being failed guitarists and drummers delivering pizza with comebacks of their own. It's a different story with 16-year-old clarinet player Gavin Lowry when I tell him I work for a newspaper and explain that it's like the internet, but made of dead trees. He considers this for a moment, and then we move on to discussing why he's here tonight. It seems he's mostly just grateful that there's somewhere young people under drinking age can go to hear live jazz and sit in.

A steady stream of patrons is filling the tables. They all echo Lowry's sentiment: they're happy to hear some jazz and eat some food minus the usual cover charge. The proprietor of the café is too busy filling orders to chat, and I'm happy for him. I'm even happier for me, thanks to my order of fish and fries and wings. Lightly battered cod and spicy wings tend to take up all my band-

width, but what's happening onstage is magnetic. It's early days since my initial dive into jazz,

and the experience still leaves me a bit confounded, like my brain is failing to grasp an elusive concept. But even though its complexity stands in opposition to my punk rock simplicity, the live experience still works for me. I'm always awed by the mastery of the musicians in the room, and tonight is no exception. Here, it's the alchemy, the witnessing of people "working it out" that enthralls me. Lowry's clarinet solo sees him transformed from shy to possessed; it's an intensity apparent only when a musician is in the zone. Guitarist Nathaniel Haslin's time in the spotlight is controlled but emotive. It's not that he's holding back, it's that he's serving the song, choosing the right notes instead of a flurry of meaningless shred. They're up there with pros, including Dr. Karen Childress-Evans on viola and keyboardist Yasha Susoeff of Deuterium Jazz Quartet. But it's not like they're trying to hold their own. It's a pure learning experience, full of gentle encouragement. For all the talent onstage, I don't detect a drop of ego or one-upping, just high fives and smiles.

One woman, Lisa Saxton, seems shy and a little unsure as she begins playing her sax, but as she plays, I can see her letting go, getting in the groove, nailing a solo. Later, my

one-on-one interview with her shows me I was wrong about the shy part, and we have an extensive discussion about all things music. She shows me her favorite hoodie, the one with the cover for Slayer's South of Heaven on the back. I ask her if she has ever attempted to play the trash titan's songs on saxophone, and without missing a beat, she tells me that would be very hard. I dunno: at one point, there were a several sax players onstage, and I was reminded of Iron Maiden and Articles of Faith with their triple guitar attacks — but saxy!

There's an attempt at "Take Five" toward the end of the night, and for me, it's like hearing the song for the first time; what seemed like the off rhythms of the drum accents make more sense live. I think it sounds great, but Good stops the song, saying "It's not happening." Oh well. There's always next week. ■

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Izolapalooza

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Izola bakery returns to liven up Fault Line Park

Izola Bakery, 1429 Island Avenue, East Village. One of my favorite pandemic memories involves watching a basket packed with sourdough and croissants lowered to me by rope out the window of a third story East Village loft. Admittedly, I was chasing a unique curbside pickup story — and photo-op that day, expecting to find a plucky cottage kitchen banking on the Covid-era sourdough baking trend.

Instead, I was introduced to Izola Bakery, a plucky cottage kitchen that approached the baking hobby with artist's eye for perfection, and would go on to become a sensation. Business and life partners Jeffrey Lamont Brown and Jennifer Chen spent their "great pause" channel-



ing creative energy into the mastery of wild yeast sourdough and Paris-style croissants, fine-tuning batch after batch out of the back of Brown's dormant photography studio. Before I knew it, that studio would fill with tables, and customers, and employees, and Izola would become blow up to the point where Yelp named it America's best bakery 2022.

Nevertheless, late last year Izola abruptly closed, having reached the limits of its homegrown origin story. Originally billed as a two-month kitchen renovation, the closure instead led to a long move into new home, and it was only last month that Izola returned as the latest tenant of the distinctive indoor/outdoor restaurant venue overlooking the East Village green space Fault Line Park.

Once a fine place to grab a beer, the property now proves an excellent place to sample the bakers' ever-expanding menu of breads and pastries. It's the same dog-friendly park view, but a tick familyfriendlier. Banks of shiny new commercial ovens

stand where there used to be beer taps. And rather than the usual glass counter bakery display, Izola has a display of its wares atop the counter, modeling whatever treats may soon show up warm at your table. You'll see mostly croissants, morning buns, and sourdough loaves, the top of each branded with the Izola logo. In addition to regular (\$12) and seeded multigrain (\$15), I found combination breads including olive-pecan (\$20) and cherryparmesan (\$22.50). Rather than buy four or five loaves, you can go for a three in a half-loaf sourdough flight (\$24), available with salt, jam, and/ or rich French butter.

Speaking of butter, it's "96 gossamer layers of butter from Normandy" that go into Izola's wide and interesting range of laminated-dough morning buns and croissants. We'll get into just how wide and interesting these may get, because every visit should begin with a plain croissant (\$7). The thing hits the paradoxical croissant ideal: at once crispy, soft, and flaky; buttery yet light. It's well worth standing in line here for nothing more than a croissant and coffee.

And a line is what you'll likely find. East Villagers remember how good they had it when Izola was serving up their daily bread, and the rest of the city is gearing to show up and try what's new. During the months Izola was closed, Brown and Chen continued to experiment, and developed 27 new bread and pastry flavors. (Croissant-dough pizza? Sure, why not.)

In addition to a succulent Tahitian vanilla knot (\$6), I tried a hibiscus tequila knot (\$9), offering the same vanilla flavor with the addition of hibiscus, tequila, mint, pineapple, jalapeno and lemon, topped with candied jalapeño and lime zest. This one has special significance to Izola's founders: Brown tells me he and Chen were drinking hibiscus tequila cocktails when they first fell in love.

Already, customers may enjoy Izola's decadent, twice-baked almond croissant stuffed with melted single origin French chocolate (\$12), and notorious Moroccan black olive chocolate croissant (\$9), distinctive with its black stripes, its olive more earthy than briny, creating a compelling sweet-savory balance. And every month, Izola will debut another of its new, special flavors. Expect a carnitas croissant, modeled after local tacos; a *bibimbap* croissant, filled with Korean *gochujang* chili sauce and *bulgogi* beef; and a ramen croissant, stuffed with noodles and served with a cup of miso broth. They all sound super outrageous, but I've long since learned not to doubt these guys. *-Ian Anderson*

A RUDE ENCOUNTER

It was a crisp Sunday morning in the golden hills surrounding San Diego. Wispy white clouds hung low, cooling the earth. Soon, the scorching summer sun would burn it all away, and the hills would sizzle as lizards, birds, and hikers retreated in search of shade.

I had begun my hike in a hurry, then paused after spotting a blue silhouette walking toward me from the adjacent road. I saw a man, midto-late thirties, in a blue sun hoodie and trail runners, carrying a beaten trekking pole. Years of trail experience were etched into his legs and sun-worn face. In him, I saw a kindred spirit. More than a mere hiker, the man was an outdoorsman, who would probably pass everyone on the path ahead of him.

"Except me," I thought. My face grew grave as the competitive spirit flared within me. For the past few weeks, I had been climbing this mountain in competition with myself, pushing harder and harder to carve out a faster time. I didn't want the hiker to pass me and then throttle my pace if we began leapfrogging up the path.

With my hundred-foot head start, I zigzagged up the slope, pushing myself to put distance between us, but pacing myself so as to not overexert my legs. For ten minutes, I chugged along, passing saunterers and gawkers who were taking their time along the well-trodden path. Eventually, I came to a halt in order to give right of way to a woman heading down the trail with her dog. She was followed by two shirtless trail runners. As I waited, I saw the blue-shirted outdoorsman close the space between us and decided to let him pass me in case he was faster. As he did, I gave a friendly hello.

"Great pace, man," he said between breaths. There are few feelings better than a stranger complimenting your trail pace, and I let the praise wash over me with delight.

"Thank you," I said earnestly.

As he passed, I followed behind, staying enough to keep him in my sights, but never close enough to signal that I wanted to pass. I admired his pace, and concluded that my uphill was slightly faster than his, while his flat was faster than mine. By the time we reached the peak, he was a good 30 seconds ahead of me, and I was glad that he had passed me. It refreshing to chase someone up the mountain. Besides, during the final ascent. a dull ache had crept into my muscles from repeated climbs up this route, and I had felt my edge over the trail slipping away. Just before I reached the peak, the outdoorsman and I passed each other again, each offering one final nod of approval.

He was not the only person on the trail that morning. As I approached the peak, I noticed several others, including a fit woman in her late thirties, wearing a blue tank with matching shorts — an outfit that indicated a regular correspondence with the gym. Her expression was grave, her eyes cool and impersonal.

As I reached the peak, I checked my watch and found myself with a much better time than I had expected. After a minute of taking in the

familiar vista below, I headed down the flat portion of the trail in an easy jog. Although I was dressed in typical hiking gear—a loose, long-sleeve button-up and gym shorts — I also wore a pair of trail runners and a hydration vest in case I wanted a harder workout. When the trail became steeper, I slowed to a steady hike. Then, as it flattened out again, I began a fast, controlled descent down the mountain. I usually prefer this downhill stride. Compared to a reckless run, it feels almost zen, like I'm dancing along the mountain as it carries me on its back.

I overtook a man wearing cargo shorts; he pulled over and nodded while letting me pass. Not far ahead of him, I saw the woman in gym wear and quickly caught up to her. As I did, I cleared my throat and dragged my feet, a hiker's way of indicating that you'd like to pass. Oddly, she didn't seem to notice. She wasn't wearing headphones or earbuds, so I followed behind her, wondering if she was just waiting for an open spot to move aside. She never did.

"Pardon me, do you mind if I pass you?" I asked politely a few seconds later.

"Oh, let me speed up," she mumbled without turning to face me, before galloping down the trail a good thirty paces, kicking up dust and rocks.

Given that she had started down the mountain a few minutes before I did and that I had been able to close that distance of, oh a thousand paces, I knew those thirty wouldn't keep me from catching up to her again. Inconvenienced by her lack of courtesy, my soul heaved a mighty sigh. No more than 20 seconds later, I was back behind her. Still she refused to move over. Modesty, it seems, was not a part of her vocabulary. She wordlessly ran down the trail another 30 paces before slowing down.

This pattern continued a half-dozen times. She'd run ahead, I'd catch up, then she'd run ahead again. Tangled in this fever dream, I tried to make sense of her cause. I thought she might have feared for her safety, but in my experience, most women would rather have a strange guy walking ahead of them, not behind.

Unable to pass her, my mood soured as I continued to greet hikers heading up the mountain. Watching the rude woman scrape along the trail, I studied her footwork. It was muddy, and she trotted without grace and control. I could tell she wanted to break into

As the trail steepened into a narrow slope, I asked again whether I could pass, but she ignored me. Irritated that I couldn't descend at a comfortable stride, I felt my legs beginning to stall. I was taking half steps now, but because of her poor footwork, the distance closed between us anyway, and I barreled down the mountain trampling on her shadow while she bounded down the mountain like a drunken steer.

Once the trail flattened, her drunken trot became a pitiable jog. Tired of butting up against her, I decided to get off the trail as quickly as possible and switched into a jog for the remaining half mile, hoping that she would recognize my speed and let me pass. But again, she refused to let me by, and sprinted down the path before settling into a jog again. Denied the most basic etiquette of hiking, I became apoplectic.

Like a terrier, I ran to stay behind her, never keeping more or less than ten feet between us; just far enough to indicate that I didn't want to pass because I knew she wouldn't let me, but just close enough to keep her from comfortably slowing down. Minutes passed by as I ran behind her in spite, until we finally arrived at the trailhead, and I slowed to a walk while she jogged on a hundred paces into the street before doing the same.

Driving away, I saw her one final time out of the corner of my eye. She stood behind her car, facing the open trunk, watching me like an entitled brat. I thought of every cruel thing I wanted to say to shame her and let her know that she was one of the rudest hikers I had ever had the misfortune of meeting on the trail. But then I thought, "Happiness is the best revenge." It would be better to deny her the satisfaction of a confrontation. So I drove away without batting an eyelash at her.

As to why she refused to let me pass beats me. Perhaps she thought she was faster than me and didn't want to leapfrog. Perhaps she felt threatened by me, despite the fact we were constantly passing uphill hikers. Perhaps she'd been watching the Olympics and was imbued with a competitive spirit. I'll let readers come to their own conclusions. Whatever her reasoning, I hope she's satisfied with her pace running down the mountain. I am with mine.

Albacore caught mixed in with bluefin – a solid white seabass caught from shore

Dock Totals 7/28-8/3: 4868 anglers aboard 199 half-day to 3-day trips out of San Diego landings over the past week caught 613 barracuda, 3 black seabass (released), 2201 bluefin tuna (up to 240 pounds), 130 bonito, 307 calico bass, 24 dorado, 5 halibut, 19 lingcod, 1 rock sole, 795 rockfish, 6990 sand bass, 25 sanddab, 193 sculpin, 10 sheephead, 62 triggerfish, 105 whitefish, 1 yellowfin tuna, and 2699 yellowtail.

Saltwater: The bluefin bite turned back on after the full moon phase shut them down for a week with the total jumping from just over 400 to 2200 caught. There were some chunky units in the mix, but most were in the 20- to 60-pound range. The majority of the bluefin bite has moved up in the water column, as well as north to the areas around Catalina and San Clemente islands, and with them that much closer to home, some of the fleet abandoned the still-biting yellowtail Off the Baja coast and the Coronado Islands and headed west instead of south Though deep-drop jigs and weighted baits are still producing overall, rigged flying fish under a kite or balloon has been the go-to for some of the boats targeting the larger fish.

A big surprise has been the phenomenal sand bass fishing for the half-day and short run fleet, with

more legal sized fish caught in a week than I can remember, even after totaling the counts for 10 years now. Nearly 7000 fish hit the deck in seven days, which Is amazing considering that most were caught on half-day runs. Tube baits in 1- to 3-ounce sizes, skampis tipped with squid, and squid on a dropper loop worked best for those targeting the "grumpys" along the IB flats and other sand bass haunts within range.

A few albacore were caught within 3-day range this past week, but did not appear in the counts as they were caught by small charters and private boaters. Captain Dylan Gerson of AJ charters reported a couple longfins caught on a four-passenger charter from AJ Sportfishing while fishing offshore for bluefin. Since the early 2000's, albacore have been rare catches for the fleet, due to a fairly sudden change in their annual migration pattern taking the once locally abundant fish far offshore while they're passing through our latitude.

Since the beginning of the commercial (and ensuing recreational) fishing fleets out of San Diego, albacore was the mainstay species. But, around 2003 or so, they all but disappeared

destination for a sportfishing boat.

Along the beaches, surf fishing has been still going strong. A few striped bass have been caught close to our area at a time when they are usually much further north, and while surf perch, yellowfin croaker, and California corbina continue to be the top catches, halibut and even legal-sized white seabass have been caught from shore. Avid angler Kevin Trieu posted up a solid 20-pound white seabass this past week. Kevin, who hails from Virginia Beach, is relatively new to the SoCal surf fishing scene, but has been hitting it hard on the west coast for about a year now and doing very well.

Creme de la Weird

- Mary Jacobs, 77, of Newmarket, England, tried to sell her prized collection of bedpans at auction in July, the *Suffolk News* reported on July 29, but there were no takers. Jacobs said she started collecting bedpans in 1984: "I just wanted to collect something different," she said. "It snowballed from there." Now, with 160 unique items, she's run out of room to store them. The rarest ones are those with odd shapes, she noted. She's hoping to find a new home for them: "They're clean, washed and in fantastic condition."

But Why?

- St. Petersburg, Florida, resident Jaclyn Goszczynski, 40, was arrested on July 26 and charged with felony child abuse, *The Smoking Gun* reported. Goszczynski, police said, had been hanging picture frames with her three children when she asked her 12-year-old daughter whether she'd ever been "screwed in the a**," then proceeded to drive a screw into her daughter's "left side buttocks" with an electric screwdriver. No word on the daughter's condition, but Goszczynski sits in the county jail on \$25,000 bond and has been ordered to have no contact with the victim.

What's in a Name?

 On July 22, when officers noticed a white van on the I-5 near Weed, California, that kept swerving out of its lane, they engaged their lights and sirens – and it still took almost 3 miles for the van to pull over, KOBI-TV reported. Inside the van, they found 1,021 rooted marijuana plants, which, according to driver Yung Fai Sze, 53, were on their way to Oregon. However, Sze did not have the proper documentation from the California Department of Cannabis Control, so he was arrested and charged with illegal transportation and possession of marijuana.

Awesome!

— In Leicestershire, England, a quaint problem is getting a practical solution, the BBC reported on July 25. The North West Leicestershire District Council received a grant of about \$9,300 from Keep Britain Tidy's Chewing Gum Task Force to clean up the discarded wads of gum littering the sidewalks. "Many of the streets, pavements and shopping areas in our towns are affected by discarded chewing gum," said Michael Wyatt of the council, which will also install signs asking people to dispose of their gum properly. The grant is provided by gum manufacturers.

It's Always Something

- In 2016, the Scottish government declared it would increase the number of medical school placements because of a shortage of doctors, the BBC reported. Eight years later, professor Gordon Findlater, HM Inspector of Anatomy for Scotland, has declared an unexpected and potentially dire result of the change: a shortage of cadavers for medical students to train on. "This is already having an impact on the surgical colleges (which) are now having to cancel training classes," Findlater said.

Bright Idea

- Jason Arsenault, 41, pleaded guilty in Portland, Maine, on July 29 to an unconventional bank robbery attempt, HNGN reported. Back in January, Arsenault, wearing a black hat, a mask and sunglasses on his face, pulled into the drive-thru lane of a Key Bank location and sent a note to the teller through the pneumatic tube: "CAR BOMB No Cops Alarms or WE ALL DIE \$50,000 in 20s." The teller sent the money back through the tube, and Arsenault drove away. Surveillance video allowed law enforcement to track Arsenault's movements until they could spot him without his disguise; six days later, he was arrested. He directed police to a backpack with the money, hidden in the woods. He faces up to 20 years in prison.

Ewwwwww!

— Have it your way! Tiffany Floyd of Gettzville, New York, stopped at her local Burger King on July 27 to get her 4-year-old daughter a hamburger, *People* reported. When the girl started eating her burger, she said, "Mom, I don't want ketchup." Floyd took the bag back, thinking the order had been made wrong, "And I look in her bag and there is blood all over. You could tell it was human blood." She called the restaurant and asked to speak with a manager, who admitted, "Yes, I had a worker here cut their hand right before your food was made and bagged. The worker knew he cut himself but did not think he was bleeding that bad." The manager offered Floyd a refund, but instead she hung up and called the local health department. Burger King closed the restaurant for retraining and deep cleaning, but Floyd said their trauma continues: "She now needs to get bloodwork done every month" to look for HIV and hepatitis, among other infections, and her daughter is afraid to eat. "She thinks there's blood in it."

Mistaken Identity

- Gallaghers, a New York City restaurant with a nearly century-long presence on 52nd Street, is decorated inside with photos of celebrities who have frequented the landmark over the many years, the New York Post reported on July 27. One of the signed photos is of Perry Como, a wildly popular singer and television personality during the mid-20th century. But Gallaghers was forced to add a couple of small disclaimers to the frame of Como's photo because of his vague resemblance to disgraced pedophile Jeffrey Epstein, who died in 2019. "THIS IS NOT JEFFREY EPSTEIN," the first plaque reads. "THIS IS PERRY COMO." Gallaghers owner Dean Poll said "hundreds" of customers asked about the photo. "It was constant. Not one a day, but all during the day." He said Epstein was not a customer.
