ON THE ROAD Buses busted And other public transportation mishaps

This summer has been tumultuous for both Caltrans and MTS vehicles. On the afternoon of August 25, chaos erupted at the intersection of University Avenue and 30th Street when an MTS bus traveling eastbound was forced to pull over for an unknown reason. Suddenly, thick smoke billowed from its rear engine, as depicted in a video shared by DayGoTV on Instagram. Young passengers could be seen leaping out of the bus, which was parked just a few feet from the US Bank walkway and still smoking heavily. One individual, dressed in black, could be seen falling onto the sidewalk in his haste to escape the dense smoke.

vehicle video made its rounds on YouTube: a Caltrans pickup truck was reportedly stolen from a construction site near El Cajon Boulevard and Iowa Street in North Park. According to *619 News Media*, the truck was found two hours after the theft, parked in front of a 7-Eleven store in the College East neighborhood, thanks to the police department's license plate reader camera at El Cajon

In July, a Caltrans worker was struck by a vehicle on Interstate 5 north of Camp Pendleton in San Clemente. The Caltrans employee died.

The incident sparked a flurry of comments, with one rider named Mohamed confessing, "No joke, my biggest fear ever since I saw [another] video about that a while back — I never sit in the back." Another commenter, Riley Carter, echoed the sentiment: "Me too; I almost got burnt the last time the bus I entered ha[d] that same kind of problem." Local teacher CJ Guerrero wrote that this was the first time he'd witnessed the smoke show, but noted, "I've been seeing a lot more of them break down. Maybe they Boulevard and 70th Street. However, as of this writing, no suspect had been apprehended.

These incidents followed a string of other bizarre events involving Caltrans vehicles. On August 7, 911 VIDEO NEWS was one of the first on the scene after a Mini Cooper collided with a Caltrans street sweeper in the HOV lanes of the 15 freeway early in the morning. When the Mini Cooper struck the sweeper, the Mini flipped and remained upside down on the pavement. The people in both vehicles were reportedly unharmed. Earlier that month,

on August 3, Pacific Beach residents reported on Facebook that a malfunctioning Caltrans street sweeper had caused a significant hydraulic fluid spill. In July, a Caltrans worker was struck by a vehicle on Interstate 5 north of Camp Pendleton in San Clemente. The Caltrans employee died. And on the morning

of June 17, in Chula Vista, an MTS bus was traveling northbound on Hilltop Drive when it collided with a BMW attempting to make a left turn from Hilltop Drive onto I Street. The force of the collision apparently sent the BMW into a spin, and the bus then slammed into a traffic light. Both drivers and two passengers on the bus sustained injuries and were taken to nearby hospitals.

Also in June, Tony Mora of Chula Vista posted a Facebook video of a man climbing onto an MTS bus en route to La Mesa. The man, who allegedly didn't have a bus pass, stood atop the retractable bike rack, posing for the camera and leaning against the bus's side mirror.

Camping ban? Yes we can! National City and Chula Vista set to join other cities

More cities are cracking down on homeless people's living arrangements — sharpening their codes to keep people from "camping" in public places. As a result, neighboring municipalities are feeling pressured to do the same, lest the problem come to them via an influx of the unhoused and recently uprooted.

In June, Escondido passed a camping ban just ahead of the U.S. Supreme Court ruling that allowed cities to evict, fine or arrest people for sleeping in public even if there are no shelter beds available. San Marcos passed one in July. And in August, Vista dusted off its own 1968 camping ban. San Diego passed a ban last year, and some officials say that it pushed unhoused residents into National City and Chula Vista. Now those cities are proposing their own ordinances. On September 10, the Chula Vista City Council will consider a proposed Encampment Restriction Ordinance that covers sitting, lying, sleeping, or storage on specified public property.

The proposed ordinance prohibits at all times lying, sleeping, and storing personal property if it blocks the disabled from the public right of way, obstructs vehicle or bike paths, or interferes with city events. It bars camping within 500 feet of schools, city parks, emergency and transitional housing, major transit stops, trolley stops at Palomar Street, H Street and E Street, as well as rapid bus service (line 225), and Multiple Species Conservation land, including Otay Valley and Sweetwater regional parks. The reason for the 500-foot buffer between homeless housing and safe camping and parking sites is because the city "wants to encourage those locations" and prevent them from becoming "hubs of unregulated activity" — which in turn causes residents to oppose them.

According to a city count, there are fewer unhoused residents in Chula Vista this year compared to last. The current total is 730, down from 786. That aligns with the state mandated Point in Time Count, staff said at a recent meeting of the Housing & Homeless Advisory Commission. The unhoused community is now concentrated mainly on the west side of the city, particularly along the I-5 corridor and around transit stations. "We also saw a reduction in the number in the Otay Regional Park in the south area of our city," said Stacey Kurz, director of housing & homeless services.

Park ranger Sam Alzubaidi said the population he most often encounters are older males. Alzubaidi is part of the city's homeless outreach team, which includes Housing & Homeless Services, police, and *continued on page 3*



code enforcement. Lieutenant Ernie Pinedo, another member of the outreach team, said they were asked about having the ban cover every bus and transit stop, but they

decided to stick with the more manageable 500 feet. "We don't want to keep pushing them around" from one area to another. "We want them to accept the services and get off the streets."

According to a commission report, only 35 percent of the unhoused accepted services, while 65 percent declined. "There are a lot of misconceptions," said outreach

if everybody was willing and able? Absolutely," says Davis.

National City, which opened its first homeless shelter in June, is also feeling ready to join the wave of enforcement targeting the unhoused. On September 3, the city will be the next to introduce a camping ban.

From paper to police Is the Union-Tribune, cast off last summer by Los Angeles billionaire Patrick Soon-Shiong, about to get a long-hoped-for second life? So believe an everhopeful few, as the paper advertises for new positions, earlier slashed by current owner Alden Global Capital in the wake of the vulture buyout firm's bloody U-T takeover last year. "The San Diego Union-Tribune is seeking an ambitious, accomplished and tenacious reporter to join its Watchdog team and hold power to account in

California's second-largest city and beyond," says an August 20 online recruitment notice for the position of Watchdog Reporter.

"This is an important, high-profile role in the nimble, award-winning newsroom of the region's premiere news organization. It's an excellent opportunity to produce impactful enterprise and investigative journalism whether you're a seasoned investigator, a data or public-records whiz, or a beat reporter eager to

move to focusing on public accountability fulltime." Some key tasks of the new hire, says the job notice, will be to "report a mix of short-term enterprise stories and longer-term investigative work, with a digital-first approach and a focus on holding to account the institutions and powers to forces that shape San Diego and its residents' lives," and to "serve as an evangelist in the newsroom for accountability and transparency."

One problem, skeptics note, is that the *U*-*T*, having fled its downtown digs in a B Street highrise, doesn't really have a newsroom anymore, just a virtual web of staff Internet connections, making any evangelism a bit iffy. Another issue: "The hourly wage is \$33.65-\$36.06." Doing the

math, that would top out at around \$74,000 a year. By comparison, California fast food restaurant workers get a \$20 minimum wage.

Sam Shulz, the U-T's government and watchdog editor, did some recruiting via her account on the social media site now known as X: "Great job alert: I'm hiring an investigative reporter to hold San Diego institutions to account & build up our Watchdog team. Come

break news, pursue short-term enterprise & big projects, & work with brilliant colleagues at the @sdut." She added: "But we've also got a handful of other open jobs around the @sdut newsroom, including 2 reporters & 1 sports editor. Details to follow..."

Along with the bevy of new help-wanted ads, U-T departures continue. "After 12 years at The San Diego Union-Tribune, I'll be starting a new chapter doing community liaison work at the San Diego Police Department, says an August 24 X

continued from page 3 an annual state license," says an August 29 audit report.

"We found that not all grantees adequately tracked their expenditures and documented whether staff time charged to the Grant Program was spent on tasks related to the program." In San Diego's case, per the document, "The city used more than \$6000 in grant funds to rent meeting space and provide translation services for the development of its equity program. However, developing an equity program is not an allowable use of these grant funds."

Notes the report: "There is some ambiguity in the grant agreement about whether San Diego intended to use the funds to establish a local equity program. Nevertheless, the purpose of this program is to help existing provisional license holders obtain annual state licenses."

A July 31 letter to auditors from **Lara Gates**, deputy director of the city's Development Services Department, says San Diego is no longer seeking state reimbursement for the misspent \$6000, but doesn't say where the replacement cash is ultimately going to come from. "The City of San Diego requests that the ports increased use of public transit, but you're not going to get most people to use it if it's perceived as filthy and unsafe which is what we've got today. The current state of affairs is miserable, and this stupid article only celebrates it. The "standing/sitting zombies" are disgusting and need to be off our streets and trolleys and in a hospital. The writer should have her head examined, and you should stop printing dumb stories like this one.

report should include language that reflects that the subject \$6000 line item for translation and room rental costs have been reversed and are no longer included in the grant expenditures."

Whether that will be enough to placate state auditors who are trying to claw back misspend marijuana money remains to be seen. "To reduce the risk that [the California Department of Cannabis Control] will require it to repay grant funds, by October 2024, the city of San Diego should review all expenditures it has paid for with grant funds, clarify with [the Department of Cannabis Control] whether the expenditures are allowable, and reimburse the grant funds from its general fund for any unallowable expenditures," the audit says, adding, "The city of San Diego had earned more than \$4800 in interest as of March 2023 on the \$611,000 in Grant Program funds that [the Department of Canna-interest that San Diego credited to the grant."

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Drinks All Around

RYAN ANDREWS Prohibition 548 Fifh Avenue Gaslamp



The Kentucky Tippler, says Ryan Andrews, lead bartender for the underground speakeasy Prohibition, is "a whiskey sour variation, named after a term that was used during Prohibition for a cocktail or drink — a 'tipple." Similar to a Gold Rush, it's "a modern contemporary classic of bourbon, lemon and honey. Our edition has a single-barrel bourbon, fresh

grapefruit zest, and sarsaparilla bitters that I make locally out of the Henebery distillery in Vista."

He gives a description of what I'm in for. "You definitely get that citrus note first. Of course, bourbon being the main ingredient, you're gonna taste that the whole way through. But then as you go past the citrus and it washes over your tongue, you're gonna get that sweeter note from the honey. The lingering flavor is gonna be the vanilla and sarsaparilla. And then what's gonna hang on your tongue the longest is that citric bitterness."

Andrews uses a Kentucky Bourbon hand-selected from Angel's Envy. "Like all bourbons, you have a subtle sweetness from the corn, a little vanilla from the barrel aging, the ever-so-slight hint of smoke." This particular batch was finished in port wine barrels, adding "another layer of very subtle sweetness from the residual sugar leftover. It tends to round out a lot of those harsh notes you get from some whiskey — the sulfuric parts of it get a little bit muted."

R&D Bitters draw in Americana-forward flavors. "I'm a big fan of root beer for starters. We were researching turnof-the-19th-century soda jerk fountain recipes. It was a part of American culture that no longer exists, and since our company is kind of a throwback to that time period, we decided to run with that." Andrews selected the sarsaparilla bitters for its "heavy notes of vanilla, a couple other herbal roots found in root beer like

angelica root, forest root. It adds a very nice



underlying flavor profile to the cocktail." Opting for the regal shake technique releases grapefruit oil directly into the cocktail. "You get a very nice aromatic out of it and the bitterness from the citrus peel itself." For a sweetener, he cuts clover honey with hot water to prevent it from congealing. "Clover is a mellower type of honey. Wildflower is the other popular one out there. To me, it has a few floral notes that I'm not too keen on in the cocktail, where clover is a much more consistent honey."

Andrews considers the Kentucky Tippler a very San Diego-appropriate cocktail. "We have summer 80% of the year... the general clientele wants something citrusy, refreshing. This drink is just a different vibe. You can take your time with it."

PROHIBITION'S KENTUCKY TIPPLER



- 2 oz. bourbon
- ³⁄₄ oz. lemon
- ³⁄₄ oz. honev
- 4 dashes R&D Sarsaparilla Bitters
- Large grapefruit peel

Combine all ingredients in a mixing tin with ice and give it a regal shake. Strain into a glass over one large ice cube.





By the time I got to Temecula, the UFOs had already been spotted. According to Manny Lopez — a local and my campsite neighbor at Native Falls Campground, just a few miles from the city's wine trail — they had been seen two nights earlier. Lopez had brought his family out to camp for his son's twelfth birthday on July 27 — the same day as mine. (Even more numerically eerie: our birthdays were 27 years apart.) As we tended our campsites and shot the shit, I asked, "You ever see any UFOs out here?" Lopez's expression said: how the hell did you know that? He pointed to the sky. "We noticed some type of lights in the mountain range beyond us," he said, "and they just weren't any type of regular lights. They weren't even flashing. It was like a half circle over the mountain range. That light would come on, stay on for a couple seconds, then turn off. Then it would be in another part. It wasn't a regular circle, but more like an oblong circle, and the middle was kind of fuzzy."

Later that evening, "I looked out in the distance and saw what I thought was probably an airplane moving away from us," he recalled. "When we were going inside, I noticed it was getting closer and closer. I called my wife back outside. Once I got to see the lights in real close range, I noticed there was no body in-between them, and they were moving in sequence. It sounded kind of like a helicopter, but had more of a deeper, slower hum. It sounded too far away for how close those lights were. Then when it went right over us. The middle, where the body should have been, just looked misty. It wasn't going super-fast or super-slow."

Lopez watched whatever it was fade into the distance, then turned to his wife Amy. "What the fuck was that? I've never seen anything like that!" He searched local internet chat spaces to see if anybody else had seen it. Nobody had.

According to the National UFO Reporting Center, there have been more than 149,000 UFO sightings around the world (and counting) — and that's just the most "credible and interesting cases" since the center started keeping track in 1995. The center's database is organized by where the craft was seen and what shape it was. Shape categories include things like orbs, flashes, fireballs, and what Lopez saw, which would likely fall in the "oval" or "other" category.

Lopez's story sparked a flame of excitement within me. I was, after all, about to attend as the first night of the CE5 Contact & Consciousness conference, hosted by renowned ufologist Dr. Steven Greer at Callaway winery and drawing curious folks from all over the world. When I told Lopez that a famous ufologist was in town, his sighting seemed to start making sense to him; perhaps Greer had attracted some interstellar attention.

Dr. Greer's technique

If you're not responsible for one of the 800 million views of Dr. Steven Greer's documentaries, here's a quick bio: Greer, 69, is a former emergency-room doctor who founded The Disclosure Project in 1993. The disclosure he's after is from the government; he wants to know what they know about extra-terrestrials. As a result, he has lot of friends and maybe even more enemies. On Greer's website, hundreds of open-sourced government documents have been archived for civilians to view for no charge. (However, a registration e-mail address is required.)

What I find most interesting about Greer is his chosen method for making contact with ex-

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tra-terrestrials. It's called CE5. or close encounters of the fifth kind, and it is a human-initiated encounter, one that uses expanded consciousness, achieved through meditation, to make peaceful contact with ET civilizations. Greer created CE5 in 1990, and during this three-day conference, a group of 500 curious people would participate in mass CE5 events led by him. I was curious: was this some hoaxed bullshit? Or was Greer sincere?

Even though this event would involve mass participation, CE5 doesn't depend on size. According to the CE5 app guidelines, assembling a team of no more than six to eight people is recommended. Even solo CE5 is an option for those courageous or curious enough. The key thing: the group's mindset should be unified. From the app: "ETs are very considerate of those who are not ready to manifest overtly and will cater their presence to the least-prepared member of the group." If you're showing fear, don't expect them to come kick it with you.

Your team can be anybody. Grab Mr. Fanetti, your old fifth-grade science teacher. Call your uncle Bobby who is living in his van down on an OB side street. Snag your the night. (Greer recommends that the meditations and CE5 should be done sober anyway.) Once the team is assembled, bring what you would bring camping chairs (zero gravity if possible), warm clothing, binoculars, flashlights, and so on. The main, and maybe most important, devices to have are star/ satellite charts to help identify what you see in the sky. Planes are easy to identify by their flashing lights and consistent movement, but having a chart helps prevent mistaking stars for UFOs. Of course, there's plenty of other stuff up there, from the International Space Station to SpaceX's Starlink, but still. (And even some of that other stuff may not be "not of this earth." During The Disclosure Project's National Press Club event in June 2023, Dr. Greer claimed that many UFOs or Unidentified Aerial Phenomena are man-made. "The big story nobody is telling you," he said, "is a large number of UAPs are in fact deep, black budget, electrogravitic, electromagnetic, propulsion devices based on the study of extra-terrestrial vehicles that began in the 1940s.")

homie Joe out of rehab for

Okay, we've got our gear. Uncle Bobby has pulled some chairs from



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his van, Joe is carrying the binoculars and flashlight, and Mr. Fanetti is being trusted with the charts. Now we need a good spot. Let's get out of the city, where light and noise pollution will kill any chances of an encounter, and out into nature.

Once the spot is established, "arrange the chairs in an inwardfacing circle to allow the group to maintain a view in all directions." Then there's the moon factor. If the moon is big and bright, we may want to think about going out on a different night, when it's fresh, or only a few days into its cycle. And another thing: if there are going to be celestial events like meteor showers or eclipses, it would be wise to take that into account.

Finally, it's time for the most important part of the process: the medi-

tation. This is when the UFOs are called in — peacefully and without fear. Fear will kill spiritual connection. The CE5 instructions say that you don't have to be expe-

sis

rienced with meditation to be effective, as long as you are sincere in your intentions for peaceful contact with the extraterrestrials. (That's the preferred term, according to Greer, who finds "alien" to be divisive.)

Now I'll tell you how a CE5 event went with 500 people in attendance. But first, lectures: a series of them, given by Greer and his associates. One Universe, One People was the theme — not only of the conference, but also of Greer's life's project. His mission: to spread awareness of the importance of universal peace with ET civilizations, and to expose operations' behavior that works against harmony with the ETs. "How do you know if they're lying in Washington?" Greer asked a jammed, steamy, wine barrel-lined room. "Their lips are moving."


Comments like that make it no surprise he isn't very well received by the political elite, especially given his global influence. Greer went on to describe a recent event which he said he may or may not have been an attempt on his life. While he was riding his bicycle, his seat came off, causing him to hit the pavement. His shoulder was ripped apart, and one of his feet was broken so badly that it dangled from his leg. The spill happened in Washington D.C., he said.

AND

Standing in front of a royal blue curtain, Greer surveyed the crowd, flashing an on-again, off-again smile. I sat with a mother/daughter duo with whom I'd had a glass of wine earlier that afternoon. Natasha was a history professor at Tulsa University, and her retired mother Rita told me they'd forgone their usual summer vacation p abroad to attend this conference. Natasha said it was her hope to create a curriculum surrounding UFOs.

"I'm surprised there's not one already," I said. "I don't think it's too far away."

Sitting on the other side of them was a financial analyst from Amsterdam who called himself Arjen. He'd flown in specifically for the conference, but had not told his friends and family at home what he was up to. "I told them I was traveling to the U.S. for work," he said.



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Herrera's harrowing encounter

Throughout the weekend, I noticed Greer was accompanied wherever he went by a heavybreathing bull of man. My first thought was he was Greer's personal bodyguard, and this turned out to be true. But he was more than that: he was UFO whistleblower Michael Herrera. He wore a nervous demeanor and a pinky ring. If mob movies have taught me anything, it's that a man wearing a pinky ring doesn't fuck around. At the same National Press Club event mentioned earlier, under oath and in front of congress, Herrera explained his UFO encounter. Here is his story; make of it what you will.

While serving as a U.S. Marine in 2009 and conducting a humanitarian relief mission after a 7.4 magnitude earthquake in

Indonesia, Herrera's unit was tasked with providing security and food/ medical supplies to the ravished area. According to Herrera, the five-man relief unit stumbled upon a 300-foot man-made UFO being guarded by a rogue military unit. (It should also be noted that his five-man team was without communications during this encounter, for some reason.) The UFO was described as having an octagonal shape that rotated in a clockwise motion. The craft floated about fifteen to twenty feet off the ground, emitting an audible hum, like a guitar amp or transformer. "When we'd got to the clearing, which was down the hill, there was an opening that came up, and we see this [man-made UFO]," said Herrera. "It was massive. Very strange. As we got up close in a tactical column, we were intercepted by a team of eight guys."

Herrera said that team held him and the other Marines at gunpoint with M4 assault rifles, which was surprising, because "they all had American dialects, American gear, black OTVs (outer tactical vests)." But they wore no insignias or any other way to signify who they were. Just black ball caps and black camo. "You could audibly hear them flow the safety selectors off," Herrera stated. "They basically started yelling at us, telling us to put our hands up. Asking who were we with, what were we doing there. Threatened that they could kill us right then and there. They said we could get 'lost in the jungle,' [that they could] throw us out of a helicopter if they needed to."

Each Marine was then patted down and dis-

armed. Once the rogue unit cleared the Marines' weapons and dumped their ammunition, their military IDs were confiscated. Given that the rogue soldiers' knew exactly where the Marines kept their IDs —left

breast pocket — Herrera was led to believe they were former service members themselves.

Herrera claimed that while he was being searched, the manmade UFO rose up from where it was hovering and whizzed away. "It floated right above the tree line," he said. "On each corner, it emanated a light that was either red, yellow, green, or blue. Only those four colors, I can distinctly remember. Once it got past that tree line, it shot over to the left, basically to where the ocean was. I would estimate it was going three, four, five-thousand miles-per-hour instantaneously. The coconuts on these trees weren't even touched. It produced no sonic boom."

After the craft de-

parted, Herrera said, the rogue unit gave them their weapons back — including their ammunition-filled magazines. The Men in Black escorted the Marines back up the slope, then told them they were not allowed to look back or talk about what they had just seen. To emphasize their point, two of the guys talked about whether or not they should smoke the five Marines.

Herrera said the team booked it back to their landing zone. There, an unhappy gunnery sergeant asked them why their guns were slung the way they were. They came up with an excuse, rather than tell him what had just happened. They then flew back to their ship, the USS Denver.

Onboard, they were debriefed by an admiral who Herrera said he'd never seen before. Herrera didn't know whether the high-ranking officer had any connection to what his experience in the Indonesian jungle.

When the ship eventually returned to its homeport in Okinawa, Herrera

received a call while on duty. He was told he was needed at the command post. "Oddly enough, there was nobody in the building," he claimed, "except for one gentleman who was wearing Air Force dress blues that were missing a name tag. I gave him the proper greeting of the day; I gave him the salute. He pulled me into an office, and he said, 'You're not allowed to tell anybody in your chain of command. I don't care if it's a General, I don't care if it's anybody, you are not allowed to talk about what happened. You could go to prison for this, or you could be killed." Herrera was then handed a disclosure agreement he skimmed over before signing. The only thing he recalled remembering was that it had said something about Indonesia.

Blow that whistle

Needless to say, Herrera has not remained silent. Happily for him (and others), Greer recently announced that UFO/UAP whistleblower protection is now available. A spe-

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cial access project (SAP) has been put into place to provide security for whistle-blowers. So, if you've got some shit to tell, and are afraid Will Smith and Tommy Lee Jones will come erase your memory, rest assured, you will be looked out for. According to Greer's website, if a whistleblower is threatened, the threatening individual will be identified, captured, and prosecuted. So, as it stands, Michael Herrera is protected.

Revelations disclosed by whistleblowers over The Disclosure Project's 30 years of research include: "Two primary types of UFO/UAPs exist-extra-terrestrial vehicles and man-made electrogravatic propulsion vehicles." Secondly, ET groups are not hostile to earth or humanity. It is not wise for us to try to take them down. Rather, the ETs are concerned about humans' hostility towards them. Let's be real: if they're coming to check us out, they likely have the power to destroy us a million times over. So, I say, let's just be cool with them, and maybe stop trying to reverse engineer their technology.

That brings us to the next revelation: ET technology has been reverse engineered, leading to breakthroughs in energy and propulsion. Then there's the secret organization running these illegal operations without constitutional government oversight. If it exists, it poses a threat to national and world security, especially if U.S. Government oversight committees have been denied access to these illegal projects.

CE5: The first event

Following the second day of lectures from Greer, it was time for the first of two CE5 events. On that same day, I completed my thirty-ninth trip around the sun. Some 500 heartbeats beat their way into an area on the Callaway winery lawn. White folding chairs were set up for attendees, while others, including me, brought their own camping chairs. Radar tones pumped from nearby speakers. Tonality is the first step in contacting the ETs; it serves as a communication vehicle. As night fell, stars began to wink in a clear summer sky. Our chairs were pointed east, overlooking rows upon rows of wine vinevards. Arjen, my new pal from Amsterdam, posted his white folding chair next to mine. "I have another camping chair, but it's back at the campground," I told him. "I'll bring it to-

morrow for you." Once everybody was good and settled, Greer began a *puja* ceremony and guided our meditation. He told us that before going to med school, he traveled around the world as a meditation teacher. "The total number of minds in the universe are one," he reminded us. "That is, consciousness is a singularity. It is not something that is divisible." Greer stood next to his *puja* table and encouraged us to join in a simple three syllable mantra to get us into a meditational mindset. "Im nah mah. Im nah mah. Im nah mah."

After the mantra, we meditated, welcoming the ETs with love and peaceful intentions. I had little expectation of anything really happening. I watched airplanes, helicopters, the ISS (International Space Station), and other sky pollution float across the dark heavens. Greer held a powerful laser pointer, circling the space station, and other objects that might be confused for UFOs. Many people had their sky chart apps opened up.

After a couple of hours, we took a break, then came back for a couple hours more. It was past midnight, and the ETs must not have been feeling it. Maybe there was a better Saturday night party somewhere else in the galaxy. Oh well, there was still one more night to make contact. When I returned to the campsite that night, Manny Lopez was still up. He asked what had happened. "Man, I didn't see shit," I admitted before retiring to my tent. I kept the top cover off, in hopes of catching a quick sighting as I drifted into a peaceful slumber.

CE5: The second event

Night two: Sunday. There seemed to be fewer people this time. Some of the locals must have gone home. But Arjen and I added a new guy to our little group. Ray was a youngster, riding solo, who flew in from Massachusetts for the event. He wore hippie attire, and with his shoulder length blonde hair, he looked uncannily like Kurt Cobain.

He seemed to enjoy being around like-minded people with whom he could be himself. Apparently, the last time he had been at a bar and tried talking about all this ET and meditation stuff to a patron, they had looked at him like he was a nutjob. We had met him during lunch break from the daytime lectures, and he clung on to us the rest of the night. We didn't mind. Come as you are, Ray.

Following dinner, the three of us walked to my car to grab our gear for

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The first part of the evening was like the first part of Saturday evening. Airplanes glided. The space station was still up there doing its thing. It was time for another break. People began to leave. It was getting late. However, there wasn't a feeling of disappointment among those leaving. The weekend had been fun. The CE5 events were meant to be fun, no matter what happened. We all knew it was wise to go into them without expectation. When the break was over, those who had chosen to stay gathered back at the grass. There were conversations going on all around. Ray was laying on the grass next to Arjen's feet. Arjen

was kicked back in the zero-gravity chair, eyes closed, mouth agape. I stared out at the Big Dipper. A shooting star sizzled across the sky. Everyone went "oooh" like they were watching fireworks. It was something, at least.

Moments later, the chatter came to an abrupt halt. *Did they see what I just saw? Was that what I think it was?* A distinct bright white light on the bottom right of the Big Dipper had flashed for a few seconds then turned off. It had caught everyone's attention. The crowd was silent, except for Arjen, who was still audibly snoring. "Wake up, you Dutch bastard!" I whispered through gritted teeth. "The ETs are here. Look!" I pointed to the sky and told him to watch the bottom part of the Big Dipper. Every 30 to 60 seconds or so, another light would appear for a few seconds, then

turn off. They have to be UFOs, right? What else could they be?

Dr. Greer began to welcome them in with open mind and heart: "Let's invite them to come as close as they can to this dimension. The sky and the field is filled with ET craft and shifted in a higher frequency, those from the worlds of light and the celestial. And in your heart and in your mind, you can feel and see together, and what you feel your sight can then see clearly." They kept coming. More than one at a time. All mostly in one area. It was as if Greer had known they

were going to show up. I looked for a projector or something that could possibly explain it. I hadn't expected to see anything. Then I remembered the aerial lights Manny Lopez had described. The lights he had described were similar to these: they would turn on for a few seconds, then turn off. Turn on for a few seconds, then turn off.

Arjen, Ray, and I were the last ones to leave. Greer had slipped off somewhere while we stayed, staring into the sky. Our wallets were still in our pockets. We remained in the Callaway winery parking lot with my binoculars, watching the aerial lights turn on and turn off for hours. We didn't understand how anybody could just leave. Maybe we just really wanted to believe they were UFOs. Maybe there's another explanation. Maybe not.

It was about 2 am when the three of us finally parted ways. Off we went, back to our earthly realities of jobs, morning highways, sunburns, deep breaths, sufferings, tequila, unknown neighbors, and good live music. "Back to the Matrix?" Arjen asked me. I nodded. "Back to the Matrix."

A couple weeks following the event, I reached out to Arjen to see how he was integrating the experience. Also to make sure I wasn't crazy, and that what we'd seen really happened. In his words: "I already saw so much convincing evidence, that I'm sure they're here. Also, there are other people I trust that talk about ET presence as if it is a very normal, logical thing. No hyperbole. The accounts are so numerous, detailed and consistent that it is actually really weird to dismiss them, because they don't fit your world view? So, I knew they were for real, just hoped to see something. And I may well have."



Sunset time changing rapidly, Moths live to reproduce, Venus

The Time of Sunset Changes Most Rapidly this time of the year. This is mainly because the sun is swinging rapidly south along the ecliptic (its apparent path through the background stars). From the latitude of San Diego, the sun is now setting about 75 seconds earlier every day (equivalent to about 9 minutes earlier per week), and its setting position along the horizon shifts southward about one-half degree per day.

There Are Over One Hundred Moth Species in San Diego County and they are out in great numbers right now. Usually seen at dusk and into the night, some moths are also day-flyers. The White-Lined Sphinx moth(Hyles lineata) is a dedicated pollinator and is also known



Alien: Romulus - Well, that was a surprise. The plan seemed clear enough: over the course of Prometheus and Covenant, the Alien franchise had gotten a little too far from its nightmarish roots - body horror, monster scares, and corporate malfeasance giving way to existential searches for meaning, the war of creation vs. creator, and well yes, corporate malfeasance. (Some things never change.) So here comes horror aficionado Fede Álvarez to co-write and direct a movie that will, if not reboot, then at least reset things. Bring on the throat rape, the bursting chests, the phallic threat and dread of pregnancy. Most of all, bring on the fear that made the first one so successful despite (because of) the rarely glimpsed xenomorph. And then, whoopsie! There is effective horror here, but it doesn't rear its head until very late in the game. Before that, what we've got is an artful blend of much of what has come before. Álvarez has done his homework, though maybe a little too well: there is a studied air to things that saps some of the viscerality out of all the viscera. (At least there are plenty of practical effects.) A scene in which our brave band of young would-be space raiders must traverse a room full of Facehuggers that are built to respond to sound and changes in temperature - stay frosty, indeed — seems like the sort of thing that our man ought to relish, a chance to make us hold our breath in sympathy. And yet...meh. The surprise is that the stronger stuff is in the idea department: the rejiggering of the corporate malfeasance, the shifting of humanity's relation to its androids. An effective, engaging outing, sadly marred by the resurrection of a dead character that sends us into an uncanny valley more unsettling than many of the film's more intentional horrors. 2024. Deadpool and Wolverine -Superhero movie fans of a certain age may recall a moment at the end of Avengers: Infinity War when big baddie Thanos snapped his gauntleted fingers and so ended half of the universe's living things — including folks like Spider-Man, Black Panther. and Doctor Strange. For one brief darkling moment, you may have felt something — the presence of serious stakes, of possible death, of the sort of genuine ending forever denied those heroes in their original serialized medium of comic books. But most likely, by the time you left the theater, you were already coming to your senses: there was simply no way Marvel was about to leave that much money on the table. And maybe, in that moment, you hated yourself just a little bit for thinking like that: for letting yourself careen out of the story and into such craven considerations so quickly. For dispelling the magic of moviemaking by casting your thoughts upon the monetary machinations at the heart of all that onscreen heroism. All of which is to say that the third entry in the Deadpool franchise feels your pain and laughs heartily at it. For here is a film devoted to exposing and ridiculing the nothing-means-anything narrative trick of the multiverse — a gimmick that gets to have Logan's noble death and feast on Hugh Jackman's ageless abs, too - that at the same time revels

as the "hummingbird moth" because of its 2-3 inch wingspan and the way it flies from one flower to the next. Not only are moths productive pollinators but they are also a great food source for birds, bats and other small mammals. The largest moths we see in San Diego are the Carolina Sphinx moth (Manduca sexta), which can grow to 4.75 inches, and the Ceanothus Silk Moth (Hyalophora euryalus), which can reach a massive 5 inches. Like many species, the moth's main mission is to reproduce. Moths typically have life spans of only a week or two, so they begin seeking mates right after they are born. The Green Luna moth(Actias luna) has no digestive system, so their brief lifespan is supported solely by nutrients consumed while in caterpillar form.

Lantern-Like Venus Lies Just To The Right of the crescent moon shortly after sunset on Thursday, September 5. Start looking very low in the western sky at around 6 pm to spot both of them. (Binoculars may be required to see the pale moon.) Any vantage point with a view of the ocean to the west of San Diego will do, as long as coastal clouds don't interfere.

Cleopatra

Joy Yvonne Jones stars in her own adaptation of Antony and Cleopatra, and while it's not quite a one-woman show, the only other person on stage is a mute servant-girl. Removed from the title, Antony is literally reduced to playing in the background, appearing only in occasional video segments that render him as a modern-day smooth operator who finds himself smitten with an African queen. This is to be her story, and a triumphant one at that: a narrator informs us at the outset, "Your life is but a bookmark in the story of her success," and Cleopatra herself follows soon after with the blunt delclaration, "There is no limit to my ambition." Jones has the bearing and presence to deliver the line, and the chops and voice to blend her words and the Bard's without making a mushy mash of it. (A possible exception: here and there, she slips in some modern sass, e.g., quipping "My ass" in response to Antony's "Brutus is an honorable man.") But despite that early declaration, and despite her grand and convincing self-regard — "My ego trip is a journey of self-love, selfappreciation," etc. - the story is largely one of loss and defeat. Her younger brother drives her out of Egypt, forcing her to turn to Rome for assistance. Julius Caesar allies with her and gives her a son, but she bemoans the way the baby leaches the nutrients from her bones, and Caesar not only goes and gets himself killed, he then hands the throne to his nephew Octavian. (Cleopatra's bellowed response: "Who the fuck is Octavian and why does he matter?") So then it's on to Antony and more children, but he goes and marries elsewhere as well, and when he finally comes 'round and takes her side, well...the Battle of Actium. And it gets worse from there. Through it all, Jones' head remains held high and her wardrobe remains on point - the winding of her headdress at the denouement is mesmerizing. But while she dismisses the idea that she was a simple seductress, she also notes that in living life by her rules, she used the tools at her command ... which look an awful lot like the tools of seduction. Never mind; what matters in the end is just this: "You will never forget me."

Henry 6 One: Flowers and France and Two: Riot and Reckoning

As the Old Globe joins the pantheon of American theater companies that have staged all of Shakespeare's plays, director and Artistic Director Barry Edelstein has gone big and broad for a play that draws its tragic force from the fact that it is not a tragedy, but a history. Very big: the three parts of Henry 6 are here presented in two parts - named Flowers of France and Riot and Reckoning, though there is plenty of reckoning in part one and plenty of flowers in part two - totaling nearly six hours of love and war, triumph and treachery, and the endless struggle for power. The moment Henry V dies, leaving his infant son as king, France revolts against English rule and various factions begin eyeing Henry's crown. The cast is not so large that it can afford to cast a new actor for each role — Cassia Thompson spends the first part as France's Joan of Arc and the second as Henry's son Prince Edward, while Tally Sessions goes from the sublime (the heroic Lord Talbot) to the ridiculous (the villainous Jack Cade, dressed as the January 6 shaman, and slain by a doddering champion of the Good Old Days), etc. etc. - but it's still big enough for battles full of bodies and an enlarged sense of sweep and scope. (The cast list notes that "other people of England and France are played by community volunteers who participated in our arts engagement programs.") And very broad: Richard Plantagenet lays out his claim to the crown via a highly anachronistic slideshow that makes the goofiest plays-onnames imaginable. Hey, John of Gaunt is scary skinny! (Flowers is otherwise set in olden days, while Riot features modern riot gear but keeps the swordplay.) The wailing ghosts of late-period Jessica Lange and middle-period Meryl Streep haunt a couple of the characterizations, and there is enough skitty slapstick amid the drama and death that you may feel you are watching even more plays than you actually are. The biggest trouble is Henry himself, who seems a great callow hollow at the center of Flowers, and shows himself clear only in his last two Riot and Reckoning soliloquies. Without a compelling character to embody the loves and hates of the state, it can be hard to care about all the goings on, no matter how oomphy the electric guitar or how dazzling the digital diplays. The whole thing does, to borrow from Hopkins, gather to a greatness, or at least a grandness, and gains

Showbiz kid covers showbiz Kids It was a

bright and sunny day when a pop music revolution took place on a hallowed stage in Southern California. Local singer Zach Goode, who has taken over frontman duties for '90s alt-rock icons Smash Mouth, recalls the moment "The Brady Bunch Kids' performance for The World of Sid & Marty Krofft at the Hollywood Bowl on July 29, 1973 was a pivotal moment in rock 'n' roll history. I have not yet been

able to fully realize my dream of playing on that same stage, so covering a Brady Bunch song was the next best thing until that day arrives.

Plus, our manager is friends with Barry Williams."

Williams, who played Greg Brady, recently recorded a cover of the classic Bradys track "Sunshine Day" with Smash Mouth; it was released on July 12. As Williams told Reminder Magazine in July, "I have been a fan of Smash Mouth since before they had hits. Since the beginning, they have been in my song rotation. Getting to know the guys has made it just that much better. Talent and style keep them timeless. I am very happy to be on that ride."

and Music Center in New York (whose alumni include Adam Schlesinger from Fountains of Wayne). He sang and acted in dozens of plays and musicals, even performing in

an Off-Broadway production of Runaways as a child.

While living in Hawaii, Goode cofounded the group that eventually became Ghoulspoon. After relocating to San Diego in 1991, Ghoulspoon (2001 San Diego Music Award winner for Best Hard Rock Band) evolved into Divided by Zero (2002 SDMA nominee for Best Hard Rock Album), with Goode occasionally playing solo acoustic shows and stockpiling songs. Then, in early 2022, Goode was announced as the replacement for original Smash Mouth vocalist Steve Harwell, who retired from the group in October 2021 due to health issues.

Covering pop culture icons is nothing new to Goode, who performed in Geezer, a San Diego take on Weezer made up as senior citizen cosplayers who changed lyrics to songs like Black Sabbath's "War Pigs" from being about impending nuclear annihilation to the challenges of finding discounts and freebies in local

papers. Weezer themselves thought well enough of Geezer to invite them onstage at Cox Arena in 2008. Geezer was also nominated as Best Tribute Band at the 2010 San Diego Music Awards.

Though preparation for covering "Sunshine Day" appeared straightforward, I expressed concern to Goode that the specter of the infamous television jinx Cousin Oliver might impute a curse

to the band, much as it did on The Brady Bunch. Goode was nonplussed about the risk, having somehow performed the Herculean feat of separating television from reality. "Although Cousin Oliver singlehandedly brought down the Bradys in only six episodes, in real life everybody in the LA music community knows [Oliver actor] Robbie Rist is a power pop gem who makes everything he appears in better. I'd love to work with him." He has a point, as Rist seems to have neutralized

the jinx factor inherent in the very character he embodied, scoring films (Sharknado), voice acting (Balto, Batman: The Animated Series), and writing with over 100 artists — including locals Manual Scan.

When I ask Goode if any band members will be getting bowl cuts as an homage to Cousin Oliver, his fashion sense takes a left turn. "I think I might bring back my whiteboy dreadlocks from the '90s instead." Finally: is Smash Mouth covering a Brady song the final say in the Brady Bunch vs. Partridge Family saga? "Absolutely," affirms Goode with weary confidence. "Just in case there was any question who won that war." Then, as with all endings, the shadow of doubt creeps in. "Well, unless Sugar Ray covers 'I Think I Love You.' Then we're in trouble." — Spike Steffenhagen





When the minutes fly Hearing sounds of long ago at Gallagher Square

It was 6:45 in the evening, overcast. A couple of sprinkles nicked me while I was on the ferry from Coronado to the Convention Center, but it wasn't a bad way to travel, and just \$9 for a one-way ticket. Still, I was wondering how the night was going to go; I had gotten only two hours of sleep in the past 24, and had spent two of my waking hours on a tarmac in Las Vegas.

From the ferry, I walked over to Petco Park. Not for a Padres game — they were in Miami — but for the Jane's Addiction/Love and Rockets show. As I walked around the stadium to the Gallagher Square entrance on J Street, I could hear Love and Rockets playing "Kundalini Express." That brought me all the way back to 1986: sitting in my friend Jason Vick's bedroom, listening to that song. Come to think of it, Vick was the guy who introduced me to Jane's Addiction two years later with "Standing in the Shower Thinking."

This was my first visit to Gallagher Square since its multi-million dollar transformation. After entering, the first thing I passed was the newly renovated kid's play area. The slides and structures still looked shiny and brand new. I walked past the merch booth without much more than a glance, then entered the Square proper. My first stop was at a beer and water stand. Bought a 25-ounce can of Pacifico and a 12-ounce water bottle for \$25.76. There was lawn seating — well, turf seating — and there was the Tony Gwynn Terrace Viewing Deck if you wanted to get an above-ground view of the stage. But that area appeared crowded.

As I walked, I heard someone call "Gabe!" I looked around and didn't see anyone I knew. Then I heard it again: "Gabe!" It was Neal, my buddy from the local Dead scene. He was sitting on a cement slab next to the walkway heading to the stage area. I decided to grab the slab next to him, do some people watching, and drink the liquids I had purchased. Love and Rockets was performing "Haunted When the Minutes Drag." But the minutes have not dragged. It seems like yesterday that I was sitting in Jason Vick's room listening to this song, and now I'm 52. Judging by the appearance of my fellow concertgoers, I'd say I'm not the only one who felt that way. Teddy from Winstons came up to Neal and me to say hi and to let us know that Stephen Perkins, the drummer from Jane's Addiction, has played in

the bar a couple times before. Then local drummer Ed Fletcher came to chat with us a bit. Right after he wandered off, Milo and his girlfriend Monica spotted us and stopped to say hello. A regular Winstons congregation.

I moved closer to the stage to watch Love and Rockets finish out their set. I was able to move about freely, even though the floor area around the stage was packed — I didn't have to deal with any "You Shall Not Pass" people. Daniel Ash and David J were still rocking at the ripe old age of 67. Whenever I hear the word

"goth," they are always the first people who come to mind. Is it because they were members of Bauhaus? But they had long since lightened their disposition with songs like "So Alive" and their version of "Ball of Confusion".

Jane's Addiction boasted their original line up: vocalist Perry Farrell, guitarist Dave Navarro, drummer Stephen Perkins, and bassist Eric Avery. They started off their set with "Kettle Whistle," a song written by Perry Farell and Eric Avery in 1985. But it wasn't released until 1997 with Red Hot Chili Peppers bassist Flea.

Have you ever attended a concert and been disappointed because the band didn't play any of the songs you were hoping to hear? I have. But not that night. I have mentioned those big songs from Love and Rockets. Jane's Addiction didn't let their longtime fans down either; they played "Pigs in Zen," "Jane Says," and "Mountain Song," Perry Farrell's high-pitched, haunting voice in tow. He also addressed the homeless situation in San Diego in a feisty manner, saying, "I noticed a lot of homeless people here in Downtown. Give some change or a dollar or something if you walk by a homeless person. Motherfucking rich people run this place! Motherfucking rich people are running this place into the ground!" He was drinking from a big bottle of something, and it wasn't water.

The band closed with "Stop!" and "Been Caught Stealing" from Ritual de lo Habitual. They finished by 10, and I was able to catch the last ferry home at 10:25. ■

The new Jacobs Center: expansive and eternal

On Tuesday, August 27, I and other several other members of the local media gathered at The Jacobs Music Center for a tour of the refurbished house. Many burning questions were answered. I wanted to know why the renovations took almost an entire year longer than expected. That's why I attended. Still, I resisted the urge to blurt out my question during the prepared statements from the powers the be. Then, as the tour progressed, I started piecing together the answer on my own. Especially when I learned that the supporting structures of the original 1929 building were, well, from 1929.

The original architectural plans were unavailable, which meant laser measurements were made and the new plans were based on that. However, sometimes the reality the craftsmen confronted didn't match up with the laser-guided plans. This meant the architects had to redraw the schematics based on the new information. Delay.

The building revealed its darkest, deepest secrets as the work progressed. What began as a refresh of the musician area under the stage turned into a complete rebuild, because the supporting pillars turned out to be wood when reinforced concrete was the expectation. Delay.

In order to fit the choral loft onto the stage, space was borrowed from 8th Avenue. The center section of the choir loft is literally under the sidewalk of 8th. If you are familiar with the area. then you know that 8th has a steep downhill section on the east side of the concert hall. Delay.

I made other discoveries — happy ones, unrelated to delay. The seating in the house was reduced from

about 2200 to about 1700. This was done by creating new, acoustically sophisticated walls on the sides and back of the floor level. Two rows were also removed from the balcony, creating more vertical space for another acoustic wall. In days gone by, the back walls reflected sound. They were then modified to absorb sound. Neither was ideal. Now, the walls disperse the sound, which makes a massive difference.

Above the stage is a configuration of acoustic panels that can be pitched at different angles to create different sound environments. The orchestra has been rehearsing with different configurations for months in order to find the optimal positions for both the performers on the stage and the patrons in the house.

There was a stage tuning rehearsal at the conclusion of the tour. I went up to the

very last row of the balcony, crossed my arms, and waited to be impressed. The orchestra played from the closing section of Carl Orff's Carmina Burana. The sound was definitely present. There was no doubt that the orchestra's

that. The sound was expansive. It was as if there were no edge to the sound and no walls to the concert hall. The sound of the music, so far as I could tell, went on forever.

Lolita's Mexican Food at 40: new look, same beef

Lolita's Mexican Food; 413 Telegraph Canyon Rd., Chula Vista. The decor around me says "fast casual." The unselfconscious pile of meat, cheese, and fries in front of me says "San Diego taco shop." The writing on the wall as I walk in the door reads, "Patience is the essence of fine Mexican food."

This is a visit to Lolita's Mexican Food in 2024, and I can't help compare the experience to what it might have been in 1984. That's the year husband and wife Joaquin and Dolores "Lolita" Farfan opened their original more of a late-20th Century technology. Lolita's has claimed to be the first — or among the first — Mexican restaurants to serve carne asada fries. And it was sometime in the 1990s that french fries were first served nacho-style: smothered in carne asada beef, cheese, guacamole, and sour cream.

Depending how you look at things, carne fries are either an ingenious, Mexican-American twist on poutine or a California Burrito missing its tortilla. Either way, carne fries hold a substantial spot in local food lore, as much a mascot for our city as the San Diego Chicken or dudes with chinonly goatees. (I'll have to circle back to that 1980s innovation, the California Burrito, at a later date, when I revisit some 60-year-old San Diego chain.) The most glaring change customers will notice at Lolitas 2024 versus Lolitas 1984 has to be price. And that seems to be the one thing 40-year taco shop veterans gripe about most - that prices have gone up. But, since nobody who's been eating carne fries for 30 years is in any kind of shape to remember what they paid for food back then, I took a look at Lolita's earliest reviews on Yelp (est. 2006) to get a sense of changing prices over time. Sure enough, I found a Yelper from 2007 complaining that Lolita's carne fries cost \$6.79. Given

that I understand how inflation works about as well as the average American, I figure that means the 1990s price must have been roughly 23 cents.

When I plug that \$6.79 into actual inflationary calculators online, they tell me those carne asada fries would cost about \$10.64 today. Lolita's is charging \$11.55 for a small order, so a little relative increase. But I've got no complaints here. In fact, I paid \$16.25, opting for a large order of Lolita's carne asada fries, and happily so — it turned out to be more than a pound and a half of food! Do the facetious math on that, and it comes to the same price by weight as a McDonald's Quarter Pounder. Ergo, cheap.

But that's not why I think paying 2024 prices for Lolita's is still worth it. Nor is the reason the brand's polished new look, or its shaded dining patios. We all know Mexican food has been historically undervalued in the dining sector. And, though it doesn't always look good in photos, we in San Diego all absolutely know that Mexican food is the world's best-tasting cuisine. The American Dream means any taco shop that has succeeded for 40 years — competing in the restaurant industry — has earned my respect, my business, and my hope the next generation gets enjoy the prosperity of profit margins.

So, keep ringing me up, Lolita's. And add a couple of tacos to my order while you're at it. -Ian Anderson

counter shop on Telegraph Avenue in Chula Vista. Now operated by their children, Lolita's is currently celebrating 40 years as one of those archetypal, California burrito-totin' taco shops for which San Diego is justly famous.

Not only is the original Lolita's still at it, but it has also been joined by four others over the years: three in South Bay, and one in the Convoy District. (Apologies to that overlapping demographic of San Diegans who revere both the Padres and large burritos, but the Lolita's next to Petco Park closed last year.)

I won't pretend to know what the original shop looked like, but I'm fairly certain it was not much like the Farfan family's businesses look now. Particularly those in Kearny Mesa, Bonita, and Eastlake, which flash the combination of design elements I'm used to spotting in equity-funded fast casual chains: polished woods, Edison bulbs, subway tiles, and pithy quotations on the wall.

Let's not overlook the new ordering tech, either. These days, you can order Lolita's rolled tacos (and other things) online before you stop by and pick them up. And if you didn't think that far ahead, you may place your order via touchscreen on a digital kiosk off to the side of the service counter. It all depends how determined you are to avoid human contact.

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

Jig Strike goes down near Cortez Bank – could it have been a "dreaded deadhead"?

Dock Totals 8/25- 8/31: 4052 anglers aboard 181 half-day to 3-day trips out of San Diego landings over the past week caught 299 barracuda, 2799 bluefin tuna (up to 201 pounds), 72 bocaccio, 1488 bonito, 1847 calico bass, 1 dorado, 12 halibut, 13 lingcod, 1 mako shark, 606 rockfish, 688 sand bass, 47 sculpin, 142 sheephead, 2 thresher shark, 322 whitefish, 13 white seabass, 6 yellowfin tuna, and 1498 yellowtail.

Saltwater: With about the same number of trips and anglers as the week previous, bluefin tuna numbers doubled, bonito quadrupled, and vellowtail halved. Half-day boats have been doing well on Calico bass and even some white seabass and the occasional yellowtail, while further out, much of the focus of the 1.5-day to 3-day fleet has been due west about 100 miles from Point Loma near the Cortez and Tanner Banks where bluefin tuna are showing very well in large schools of fish up to 200 pounds. That there are many boats working the area turned out to be a

very good thing for the passengers and crew of the Jig Strike out of H&M Landing.

While working the area at 10:35 am on Saturday, August 31, the 56x18-foot boat struck an unidentified submerged object, causing a major hull failure in the portside bow. The boat began taking on water very rapidly and Captain Patrick Dorety had just enough time to put out a Mayday call to the other boats in the area before mustering the passengers to the stern to don lifejackets and abandon ship onto the life raft. True to form, Captain Dorety was the last off the sinking shipm which went down so fast it was less than five minutes between striking the object and abandoning ship. No injuries reported and all were safe.

MV Legend, a partner vessel out of H&M Landing, was on the scene in minutes and took the passengers and crew aboard and returned them to San Diego. The object was never sighted; as Captain Dorety noted, "I can't say what we hit, as I never saw it. The only thing I was concerned with after the accident was that we got everyone off and kept everyone safe." That he did, earning praise from the sportfishing community for his quick action in a very stressful situation.

Given the number of boats in the San Diego fleet and the thousands of trips made annually, such accidents are fairly rare. The last sportfishing vessel running out of San Diego that sank was the Invicta when she ran into rocks at Coronado Island while under way in the wee hours of the morning on September 3, 2016. Passengers were in their bunks asleep but were jolted awake by the collision. All managed to get off the boat and onto life rafts. The Mayday call went out, a Coast Guard MH-60 Jayhawk helicopter crew was launched, and the crew of the Coast Guard Cutter Sea Otter was diverted to assist the passengers and crew. By the time the Coast Guard cutter made it to the area, a commercial tuna boat, the Sweet Marie, had come to

the rescue and was able to get the passengers and crew of the Invicta aboard before the life rafts were washed against the rocks by the current.

On Thursday, June 15, 2023, MV Sea Jav running out of Channel Islands Sportfishing struck rocks near Santa Cruz Island and went down. Ten passengers and three crew members made it onto the deployed life raft as the captain anchored the boat. As it sank in relative shallows on the lee side of the island, recovery crews were able to refloat the Sea Jay and tow it for repairs. That is not normally the case when a boat goes down so quickly. The Invicta was a total loss, and given the location far from any port, it looks like the Jig Strike will not be able to be salvaged.

Most importantly, no lives were lost in those three incidents, due to quick actions by captains and crews. Striking rocks adjacent to an island is usually due to operator error or electronics malfunction in some way, and

in both of those cases, the collision came in the middle of the night when most aboard were asleep. In the case of the Jig Strike while underway in daylight, it is gemerally believed that a submerged log was the culprit. In years when we have a lot of rain and flooding along the Pacific coast of North America, logs can become more of an issue than normal. I have seen many while fishing from off the coast of Puerto Vallarta to Catalina Island. Usually, if you are in warmer water, logs are a good thing for anglers. Baitfish will gather under and around them for shelter, and thus, they will hold gamefish like dorado, yellowtail, and tuna.

But logs are not always a benefit. As may have been the case here, they can sink a goodsize vessel. As they saturate, logs washed out to sea will become less visible as the majority if not all of the mass will be under the surface and hard to see. Radar or sonar - even sidecanning sonar — will not normally pick them up. If they don't wash ashore, logs can drift in the currents for years. Though most are encountered coastally, they have been seen in all parts of the ocean.

The most dangerous are large 'deadhead' logs. Deadhead logs are those that are mostly saturated and float vertically and can do so for months or even years before sinking. They can bob, barely breaking the surface all but unseen, but still pose a threat, especially to fiberglassand wood-hulled vessels. They are called the "dreaded deadhead" for good reason. Given that the accident was 100 miles off the coast, a dreaded deadhead log is the most likely culprit in the demise of the Jig Strike. A very popular overnight, 1.5-day, and lobster hooping boat, the boat will be missed. But our sportfishing vessels undergo rigorous inspections annually, and the crews are trained for this very occasion, no matter how rare, so wherever they are biting, go out and get 'em!

That Rule Doesn't Apply to Me – Police in Brighton, New Jersey, charged Zyair J. Dennis, of Millville, New Jersey, was recorded at the Cohanzick Zoo taunting a tiger after climbing a barrier into the animal's enclosure. Police said she tried to "entice" one of the Bengal tigers through a second, inside fence. In the video, the tiger appeared to try to bite the woman's hand. Dennis was also caught on camera at the zoo's bear exhibit, demonstrating the same kind of behavior, said Bridgerton Police Chief Michael Gaimari.

Weird in the Wild

- A bald eagle that was "rescued" near Wilson's Creek National Battlefield in Missouri because it couldn't seem to fly wasn't injured at all, Fox News reported on Aug. 25. Instead, wildlife officials at the Missouri Department of Conservation determined that it was "too fat to fly." "The bird was ... engorged with raccoon," officials said. X-rays taken at a nearby zoo showed a raccoon paw inside the eagle's distended stomach. The bird was released near where it was found.

Florida

 Tampa police responded to a call on Aug. 24 at the Rags to Riches Animal Rescue, WFTS-TV reported. Dominique Amerosa, one of the owners of the rescue, said she and her mother were doing a meetand-greet with a potential owner for Bluey, a disabled pug, when they told the woman she wouldn't be a good fit because of her other dogs. First, the woman wouldn't give the dog back to the owners; then she retrieved a gun out of her car and pointed it at the back of Amerosa's head. "My lovely neighbor came out and saw her with my mom and then ran in her house to call 911," Amerosa said. "That is a very scary person," she said. Police said they are investigating and working with the state's attorney's office to "determine the most appropriate charges."

Unclear on the Concept

— Rolando Ramos, the quarterbacks coach for the Cigarroa Toros football program in Laredo, Texas, was arrested on Aug. 19 after he called police to report that a prostitute had stolen money from him, the *Laredo Morning Times* reported. When Ramos tried to pay her, she allegedly grabbed \$100 and ran away. Ramos, who is also a health and physical education teacher at Cigarroa High School, faced a \$2500 bond for soliciting prostitution and was released later that day. He was placed on administrative leave by the district.

SNAFU

- The U.S. Navy has run out of pants, the New York Post reported on Aug. 21. The official "Navy Working Uniform," or NWU, camouflage trousers are out of stock because of "Defense Logistics Agency vendor issues," officials said. This particular uniform is allowed for wear on the job and out in public, but only new recruits will get new pants until at least October. In the meantime, sailors will be allowed to wear coveralls off-base (so chic) or the "2-piece Organizational Clothing," which features flame-resistant tops and bottoms.

News That Sounds Like a Joke

— The Hong Kong Education Bureau has produced a 70-page sex education manual for kids between 12 and 14 years old, *The New York Times* reported on Aug. 26. The booklet advises kids to avoid premarital sex and other "intimate behaviors" by participating in exercise and other pastimes, such as badminton, that "draw attention away from undesirable activities." The Education Bureau is undeterred by criticism and ridicule; it said the advice will help kids "cope with the various physiological and psychological consequences of premarital sex." Meanwhile, teenagers are incorporating it into their slang, with phrases such as "friends with badminton"

News You Can Use

— Residents of Oxford, Massachusetts, are buzzing over a voluntary curfew officials put in place in late August, CNN reported. The restriction on outdoor activities after 6 pm through the end of September (and 5 pm in October until the first frost) is meant to keep citizens safe from mosquitoes that may be carrying eastern equine encephalitis, or EEE, a deadly infection, but about 200 people showed up at a town meeting to protest it. Officials say the curfew makes people more aware of the threat and gets them off the streets while communities are spraying chemicals to combat the mosquitoes. "It's an unpopular recommendation, but we feel that it's a really important part of a layered prevention strategy," said Dr. Catherine Brown, the Massachusetts state epidemiologist. One commenter on social media complained: "Government overreach in the name of safety has upended the lives of our kids enough." Others called for a dusk-to-dawn curfew, which would mean getting inside by about 8 pm.

Questionable Judgment

- Back in January, a 33-year-old man underwent emergency surgery at Graz University Hospital in Austria after a forestry accident, *Sky News* reported. It wasn't until July, however, that the patient learned the unnamed surgeon allowed his 13-year-old daughter to drill a hole in the patient's head. "There was no contact, no explanation or apology, nothing," said the patient's attorney, Peter Freiberger. "That is simply undignified." The operation was successful, but the patient is still recovering. The main surgeon and another specialist who was present during the operation were let go by the hospital. Investigations by the public prosecutor's office are underway.


