



Bus fuss Migrants didn't board school's Route B, but they do ride jet skis

Migrants seeking to cross the border into the United States have used a great many means of transportation: jet skis, UTVs, vans with FedEx stickers, construction vehicles, SUVs with unauthorized Border Patrol decals, and even a Jeep that scaled a border wall ramp. Recently, a new and alarming vehicle of choice seemed to emerge: a school bus loaded with children.

On August 28, parents in the Jamul-Dulzura Union School District were shocked to learn that migrants had approached their children's school buses on Highway 94. In an email to families, Superintendent Liz Bystedt informed them that a group of migrants had even tried to board one of the buses. "Good morning, Route A and Route B Families," the

email read. "It just came to my attention that this morning, a group of migrants tried to board Route B at one of the stops on the way back towards school." Bystedt then added that Route A had encountered a similar situation on the previous afternoon in the same area. Border Patrol, the sheriff's office, and the CHP were notified, and the incidents were brought under investigation.

The sheriff's office concluded that after speaking with witnesses, there was no evidence that the migrants intended to forcefully stop or enter the school buses. "At no point

did anyone other than the students attempt

to board the bus or even come close to it," its statement read. The sheriff's office also noted that it's common for volunteers and charitable organizations to operate in the

area, sometimes using vehicles that resemble school buses. And while most online reactions expressed alarm over the migrants' actions, some commenters empathized. One user, joseperezsr420, remarked, "They confused the school bus with the big white bus the Feds use to transport them away from the border."

Jeremy, a firefighter and long-time Jamul resident, saw a screenshot of Bystedt's email circulating on Facebook, and was surprised he hadn't received it, since his child attends school in the same district. (Jamul is located about 20 miles east of downtown San Diego

and 24 miles northwest of Tecate, Mexico.) "I saw the screenshot online and wondered why we never got notified," he said. Jeremy also shared the screenshot on his social media and sent it to his friend, Mario Escovedo at CBS 8 News in San Diego. The story quickly gained attention across the U.S. and beyond. Only then did Jeremy receive the

He added, "I've also seen videos of [migrants] coming in on boats and jet skis." 911 Video News reported on September 4 that U.S. Customs Maritime Patrol agents tracked a jet ski entering U.S. waters illegally

from Baja. The jet ski headed toward Point Loma, where law enforcement was waiting. Three individuals were apprehended after attempting to flee up a staircase at Sunset Cliffs. Migrants have also arrived by other means, including *pangas*, pontoons, and sailboats. On August 29, a sailboat carrying five undocumented individuals landed at North Island near two docked aircraft car-

EL CALON **"911, what's your** non-emergency?" City weighs options for dealing with crush of calls from care centers

El Cajon officials say the city is being swamped by 911 calls that aren't real emergencies - meaning, no one leaves in an ambulance or requires medical aid. Many of them come from skilled nursing facilities or psychiatric care homes. The city has 20 licensed group care facilities, which accounted for over 2700 such calls over the last fiscal year. On average, 7.5 calls per day summon the city's six engine, truck, or squad companies. Twelve of the top twenty addresses the fire department visited last year were group homes (the city calls them "congregate care facilities.") There were also 372 lift assist requests, most coming from private homes. "They have a huge demand on our services," city manager Graham Mitchell said at a recent meeting as the city council weighed options on how to end what they call "misuse" of public resources.

It's not always a simple matter of ignoring certain requests, however, especially when fragile seniors or mental health crises are involved. And California law requires licensed facilities to call 911 "if an injury or other circumstance has resulted in an imminent threat to a resident's health." However, the city wants skilled-care facilities to rely more on their own staff, rather than emergency services. The proposed solution? Giving the group homes a "bank" of calls. If a home goes over the allotted number, then fees kick in. How much? The city is considering charging according to the aver-

riers, reported 911 Video News.

Jeremy noted, "Twenty years ago, you'd rarely see them, but now they walk the streets without much concern and get picked up by waiting cars just a few miles away." After reflecting on the situation, he told his eightyear-old son: "Some people come here for a better life, bringing their families with them. But others, like young men from the military or gangs, may have different intentions." MIKE MADRIAGA

age cost per call: \$486.83. That reflects the amount of time for a captain, engineer and firefighter to respond; wear and tear on the vehicle; the actual 911 call the city gets charged for by Heartland; and another fee on top of those. If the city approves the idea, they'll be among the first to do so, Mitchell said. "We have not discovered anyone who's doing this right now. We would be on the cutting edge."

Prior efforts to curb the call volume via educational outreach failed in 2022, after a city-conducted study showed that about 44 percent of calls from congregate care centers were non-emergencies. And the

911 system as part of their business plan," Mitchell said. Avocado Post Acute, a 120-bed nursing home with a record of abuse and neglect, had the most calls per bed at 324, but was one of six that decreased its call volume after 2022. Fourteen others have increased since then, some dramatically: VOA Carlton G. Luhman Center for Supportive Living, for example, went up 670 percent. (One of the challenges is the industry's extremely high

city has already tried carrots as opposed to sticks, councilmember Phil Ortiz pointed out. Mitchell agreed that penalties would encourage some facilities to purchase new equipment, hire more staff, or make other needed changes. "The minute they get a bill for \$29,000, now they have some incentive to do the low hanging fruit."

The 2022 study revealed stark differences among the operators, about half of which were "heavy users." One facility had less than 10 percent of its 911 calls classified as nonemergencies, while three others were over 65 percent. "We have this range of operators, some of which are relying on the city's

turnover of operations staff, Mitchell added.)

Next, the city will seek feedback from operators as they consider how to charge the \$486 fee. Another option discussed by the council involved charging just \$243 per call for each call over the median number for all facilities. An appeal process was also considered, since many calls deemed nonemergency will likely be challenged.

Some of the facilities will just pass the costs along, objected councilmember Michelle Metscher. "I hate to see private pay patients get stuck with the extra bills, because I know that's what they're gonna do."

U-T's strange volleyball days

There was a time not long ago that the Union-Tribune was the mouthpiece for San Diego professional sports. In those old days, the paper hustled mightily for the Chargers, denying for two decades that the team and its billionaire Spanos family owners (of Stockton) were secretly planning to yank the team out of San Diego in favor of moving to a far more lucrative Los Angeles gig. Critics, including onetime city councilman Bruce Henderson, who dared speak the

about the scheme were pilloried in cascades of the paper's sports columns and editorials. Now comes the San Diego Smash, a pro volleyball team that has been linked to the head of the U-T's latest owner, Florida-based vulture capital outfit Alden Global Capital. The Smash received its rollout to the public via a September post on Instagram. "INTRODUCING TEAM SAN DIEGO SMASH," said the post. "Women's Duo:

Toni Rodriguez & Geena Urango Men's Duo: Chase Budinger & Miles Evans. The San Diego Smash will make their debut on WEEK 1 at The UCLA Tennis Center on September 14th - 15th." The newspaper puffery role was reserved for Alden's LA Daily News, which introduced the new team to its readers on September 12, then reported on the Smash's initial outing versus the newly formed LA Launch at UCLA's Los Angeles Tennis Center two days later. "The Launch and the Smash gave fans the first three-set match of the AVP league season. It didn't disappoint as the teams were tied 14-14 in the third set, before Chase Budinger and Miles Evans were able to snag the victory for the Smash, relying on their experience to carry them through the final points."

For some reason though, the news failed to make the *U*-*T*, which reported nothing about the team's existence or successful up-the-road debut. Odder still, a full-page September 18 display ad touting an event that is set to be the Smash's first San Diego appearance doesn't mention the team at all. Rather, the copy touts something described only as

"AVP LEAGUE WEEK 3, SEPT. 28-29, VIE-JAS ARENA, SAN DIEGO, CA," without once using the word "volleyball." Reads the ad's headline: "AVP, SEE YOU ON THE SAND! " Otherwise the U-T has maintained radio silence. What gives? It could have something to do with avoiding any embarrassing coverage of AVP, otherwise known as the Association of Volleyball Professionals, which has been owned by sports gambling giant Bally's Corporation, which in 2021 acquired AVP as a way to grow

its sports betting platform. But a shakeup could soon be in the works, with the July news of a proposed multi-billion-dollar takeover of Bally's by global hedge fund Standard General. As a result, insiders speculate that Bally's may be ready to dump its expansive portfolio of so-called interactive sports assets, including AVP, as is demanded by other hedge funds with holdings in the company.

Enter Alden's honcho Heath Freeman, who in addition to being a widely vilified staff cut-

> ter at Alden's chain of American newspapers, including the *U-T*, owns a Pro Bull Riding league team called the Florida Freedom, according to the PBR website. Since that acquisition, reported to have happened in December 2022, the *U*-*T* has been running full-color display ads for the PBR similar to those now appearing for the AVP. Freeman has been on a sports spending binge of late, with plans to start a BIG3 pro-

fessional basketball team in Miami, Florida next year. "BIG3 is a 3-on-3 professional basketball league co-founded by producer, actor, and music legend Ice Cube and entertainment executive Jeff Kwatinetz," per a June 17 online news release by the Sidley law firm. "Freeman will take ownership for the 2025 season." Continues the release: "He is also executive chairman of the AVP, the premier beach volleyball league in the world."



The Pronto problem

A few months ago, MTS instituted a new payment system for their buses, one that enabled its Pronto machines to take credit cards as payment. But there was no formal announcement. When MTS switched from the Compass card to the Pronto system in 2020, they started letting riders know about the change an entire year in advance. There were flyers everywhere. For months, they held Pronto card events at various trolley stations. There were tables set up; people were handing out free cards and helping disabled those types of things." The other, dressed in yellow, said that he'd heard about it a month ago, but "my scanner still can't check the credit cards, so if someone tells me they paid by card, I have to take their word for it." (I actually asked multiple employees, and received multiple answers as to when they found out the change had taken place.) Soon after, I saw a man tap his entire wallet on the Pronto scan pad. Before the change, individual cards had to be removed and scanned. No more.

Why is this a problem? Because I began

people like me register for disabled passes. They touted the benefits of being able to pay in advance. Electronic banners and recorded announcements on the bus informed us of the upcoming change.

But this time? No flyers. No mention in the MTS newsletter. I did notice on September 2nd that there was an electronic banner announcing that the Pronto machines could now accept credit cards — even though the change had taken place in early August. It said there was information on the Pronto website. No regular rider ever visits that site; they visit the SD511 MTS site, which has information about routes, arrivals, and departures. And at least some MTS drivers and support workers were not informed of the change. In early September, I was on my way home when I encountered two security guards, checking passes. I asked when they learned about the credit card capabilities. One of them, dressed in blue, replied, "I'm sorry, I don't really follow

finding strange charges on my credit card statement, charges for \$2.50 to Pronto. How were these charges being made without my being aware of it? I was baffled. Then it hit me. I buy a monthly disabled bus pass every month. But for almost a month, ever since I noticed that the machines no longer required individual card swipes, I had been swiping both my bus pass and credit card - along with my other cards - over the Pronto machine. It was marvelously convenient to not have to shuffle through cards when I got on the bus — I usually have stuff in my hands, and my disability means that I have pain executing fine finger movements, so it felt like an answered prayer. But what I didn't know was that the machine had the power to charge my credit card, never mind my bus pass.

I contacted my credit card company to dispute the charges. The lady who helped me laughed when I explained the situation. All of a sudden, the machines can scan more than

one card at a time? What's going on? All of a sudden, it's no longer important to pay in advance? You can just pay with your card? Then why did I see the "Credit cards now accepted" announcement replaced with "Make sure to buy your Pronto cards and load enough value to get home" after a recent Padres home game? Why not let riders know that San Diego has caught up with cities like Chicago when it comes to paying for mass transit?

On Sept 7th, I noticed that SDSU was having some kind of festival celebrating the football game

outside the stadium, and that MTS had an information table set up with a water bottle give away and at least three informational pamphlets on their table. None of them mentioned the credit card changes. I asked the representatives what they knew about the credit card situation; one girl told me she thought it started a month ago. I mentioned what happened with my credit card, and she said. "Oh yes, that's happening to a lot of people. There have been lots of people calling customer service to complain about this, so you should call them too." Lots of people? Why didn't they do something about it after just one or two?

I headed to the trolley platform and saw two young MTS passenger support girls. I

asked them if they knew about the credit card changes. The girl responded, "Oh my God, it's so strange, I only found out about it 2 weeks ago. I feel so stupid working here and not knowing. But at the same time, we noticed that MTS didn't tell any of the workers about it. It's all been word of mouth, through the grapevine." Why didn't MTS tell its passenger support team, whose sole job it is to help passengers buy Pronto cards and pay their fares? They are always there whenever there is a special event , eager to assist new riders unfamiliar with the system. How can it be that they were not informed? That's when I saw a line of 15 SDSU students in front of the Pronto machines, waiting to buy a Pronto card. No one from passenger support was telling them that standing in line was not necessary, that they could just tap their credit cards.

After that, when I boarded the 936 bus at SDSU I decided to ask the driver when she found out about the change. She said she did not work for MTS, that she drove for Transdev, a company with which MTS contracts. She said she started driving only three months ago, but that she knew about it from her first day of work. I was shocked that this had been going on for three months, and kept asking her if she is certain about that timeline. I told her what happened to my cards, and she said, "Oh yeah, I know what you are talking about. A passenger told me six weeks ago that the same thing happened to her."

I have always been fond of MTS and of riding the bus. But all this has changed me. From now on, I'm keeping my credit cards in my pocket when I board the bus. ■

William "Bill" Paul Kidder passed away at home on August 25, 2024. Those closest to Bill called him Billy. Billy was born on March 18, 1954 in Minneapolis, Minnesota to Jay T. Kidder, Sr. and Dorothy Foster Kidder. The youngest of three sons, Billy had an adventurous childhood under the watchful eye of his parents and his older brother Jay "Tom" Kidder and Robert "Bob" Kidder. After High School, Billy joined the United States Army, working part of that time in the Pentagon in Washington, D.C. Billy worked for Pillsbury bakery and then opened a record store in Minnesota after his honorable discharge from the Army. Billy, always the adventurer, moved to San Diego, California in 1975. Local inventors keep things fresh

A coyote escaped with his beloved Buffy, but Paul Mott didn't simply mourn his loss. The tragic event spurred him into action.

D. Salar A Man, A Plan, **A BANANA?**

MOST PEOPLE DON'T NOTICE power lines unless there's a problem with them. And as a kid, I was like most people — until my dad pointed up at the lines as we drove the backroads of suburban Philadelphia and said, "Hey look up there. You see dad's spacers?" My grandfather, an engineer, was also an inventor. The spacers he invented kept power lines at a consistent distance from one another. They were constructed using a material called faience, similar to porcelain. (Even though the faience spacers would last longer, they were eventually phased out by less durable plastic spacers.) As inventions go, they weren't that exciting. What was exciting was the inventing itself: an idea that became a creation that became a product that others felt was worth purchasing.

Many San Diegans probably don't realize that WD-40 was invented here. The go-to remedy for silencing squeaky hinges, lubricating moving parts, preventing grimy tools from rusting, and oh yes, breaking down that awful adhesive residue left behind by retail price tags was invented for the Rocket Chemical Company (later the WD-40 Company) circa 1953. Its original purpose was to prevent the outer skin of early intercontinental ballistic Atlas Missiles from corroding. But by 1958, it was being sold to consumers in San Diego, and it became a commercial product in 1961. The company currently has a net worth of \$3.4 billion — that's a whole lot of silenced squeaks.

The following four local inventions may not take off the way WD-40 has, but they all serve a unique purpose and fill a specific void — an empty space in the world of products that their creators recognized and remedied.

The Genteel Trail Bell

Chris Lacy owned a company that marketed trade shows and the tech industry, but he knew that world was in decline. He wasn't exactly racking his brain for an idea that would bring in some extra money, but he knew that he could probably use a

second income at some point in the future. He lives near the beach in Encinitas with his wife, and they both surf often. But, as he explains it, "the surf is not always good." So about 15 years ago, the couple took up mountain biking. "We ride all the trails all over San Diego and are super into it," he says. "One day, we were out on the trail, and we were riding, and we came up behind some hikers. There are usually two ways you pass hikers. You either ring a traditional dinger bell, or you yell, 'Passing on the left!' Let's just say that we rang the traditional dinger bell in this situation, and the people kind of got angry at us. They gave us a look. They didn't say anything, but you could tell that they were annoved that we came up and rang a bike bell right behind them to say, 'Hey, we're right here!' When you do that, or when you yell 'Passing on the left!' there's almost an implications that you are asking that hiker to step aside. Saying, 'Hey, I'm moving fast on a bulky object that could injure you. Get out of my way.' And it's not that you're saying that, but the other person on the trail — which might be a hiker, equestrian or another biker — they perceive it that way. So after that encounter, my wife and I were talking and saying, 'Regular bike bells just don't do it on a trail," and yelling 'Passing on the left!' has almost the same effect. We were like, 'If only there was a bell that was a little nicer. That didn't sound aggressive. What would a bike bell like that be like?"

They met some mountain bikers who were using cowbells or sleigh bells. These seemed less annoying to the hikers, but proved perhaps more annoying to the riders themselves, since they were always dinging. "At that point, we said, 'What if there was a cowbell that you could turn on or off depending on the situation?' We pretty much went home immediately and out to the garage and started trying to hack the concept. It turned out to be a little harder than we thought. The first year, we just hacked around. I would order parts — just simple dinger bells on Amazon or cowbells — and then I would go in my garage

After a year of garage experimentation, they had a good idea of how they wanted the bell to work, but it was still a far cry from a finished design; something sleek, functional, and reasonably inexpensive to manufacture. In 2013, they hired an engineer to help refine their ideas. Lacy

estimates that they went through 30 to 40 versions of the bell before they arrived at the final product. The bell would eventually be constructed of "reasonably thick" solid brass. "The reason we wanted it that way is basically that the larger the bell and the thicker the brass, the richer the sound," Lacy says. "We felt like since it was something that people were going to be listening to a lot, and also that it was something you really wanted to use to communicate in a very pleasant and positive way to other trail users, that the sound really needed to be good."

In 2014, the first Timber Mountain Bike Bells went on sale to the public. They were the first bike bells that could either ring continuously or be switched on and off. Sales grew organically. "The great thing is that the product makes itself known," Lacy says. "It's not a quiet product that sits there in the corner, which people forget about. People are out on the trail, and they hear

somebody with our product and say, 'Hey, what's that?' They answer, 'Oh, it's this cool bell I got and here's how it works.' Honestly, that is probably where most of our growth has come from. Just from people talking about it on the trail."

Since 2016, Timber Mountain Bike Bells have generated enough sales to support Chris and his wife. "I think when we started this, I think we thought the end game was selling," Lacy explains. "The truth is, we kind of like doing it. It makes us happy. We're reaching the age when people do retire, but if you have a gig that allows you to do what you like to do, go surf in the morning and take vacations and spend time with family and friends, and yet have a vocation that you enjoy — it's not too bad. We're in a happy place running the company."

Helping Hats

Sean Adler grew up in Del Mar and graduated from Torrey Pines High School. Afterwards, he attended the University of Colorado and graduated with a degree in corporate finance. When he moved back to San Diego, he landed a job as a money manager, but the gig didn't entirely satisfy him. "Numbers and math are great," he says, "but I have an artistic side, too." Adler began logging random ideas when they came to him "at the weirdest times of day or night."

"I had this idea in 2016 when I was a single guy," he explains. "Maybe I didn't have a lot of things on my plate at that time. I knew that the tape on the bananas wasn't meant to preserve them, and most people don't realize that. I was trying to figure out ways to make them last longer. I tried duct tape and tin foil, and Saran Wrap, and all those methods just don't look good on the kitchen counter, and they are also bad for the environment. So when the pandemic happened, and I was stuck working from home, that was really my chance to launch one of the businesses and ideas that I had."

The idea eventually became Nana Hats. Beneath the hat's cute, crocheted exterior, usually in the shape of some critter or other, lies the product's secret weapon — a silicone cap which extends the counter life of your

bananas. Adler claims that he has seen a bunch last for two weeks when Nana Hats are placed on the stems right way. This is because the Nana Hats act as a barrier to contain the ethylene gas (a plant hormone that can cause fruits to ripen) that bananas naturally release. That release ramps up significantly as bananas ripen — which explains how pristine, yellow fruit can quickly transform into brown, gooey globs in such a short span of time.

Picking the correct silicone proved to be a tricky task. "We wanted to use something that was stretchy," he explains. "So, we tried different materials. With silicone, there are all different types of hardnesses for how stiff or stretchy you want it to be. There were so many different materials that we played with, because if it's too stretchy, they can't get the silicone out of the cavity. It gets stuck in there. If it's too hard, then it will just rip when someone tries to stretch it. There was so much tinkering with the design and the material. We chose a BPAfree, surgical-grade silicone. That's silicone you would see in hospitals."

What Adler initially assumed would be a weekend project turned into a ten-month endeavor with tooling done overseas and injection molding. "We had people knitting and crocheting and machine-woven designs and lawyers and patents and trademarks...it's just insane. I was all-in when I filed the patent because that's a big commitment financially, and I knew I had to see it through," he says. He eventually dropped six-figures into his self-funded adventure for something that looked "so simple and easy to do."

Once they were manufactured, Adler experienced rapid success on social media. "When you are scrolling on Instagram you are going to stop scrolling when you see a picture of a hat on a banana," he says. "I don't care who you are. It's the best scroll-stopping material." He had some early success landing Nana Hats in some grocery stores and mom and pop retail gift shops, and then Nana Hats got mentioned in a kitchen gadgets segment on Today With Hoda & Jenna. "I had no forewarning, and I was totally caught off-guard," he explains. "I didn't know what was happening. You see all these sales coming in to your website and you are like, 'What's going on? There's something happening right now, but I don't know what's happening." Adler's grandmother called him from the East Coast to inform him that she had just seen his product on the Today Show. She was likely watching as well when Adler appeared on Shark Tank in November of 2022, and she watched her grandson strike a deal with Lori Greiner and Peter Jones.

Adler recently struck

a deal with Kroger that will land Nana Hats in four northwest states inside Fred Meyer grocery stores. If they do well there, they could eventually make it to local Kroger stores such as Ralphs and Food 4 Less. "They just got delivered to their distribution center in Washington two days ago," he says. "It will be a little while until they make their way to San Diego stores. But I am optimistic and confident it will do well. They are gonna be hanging off the banana racks. It's actually hard to get it into the stores. It's interesting. I never thought it would be this difficult, but it is a trailblazing product."

Coyote Confounder

"I've always enjoyed working with things and inventing things and making things," Paul Mott explains. "I was a mechanic as a young man, and then when I finally decided I didn't want to be a mechanic, I went to college. I got a master's degree in computer science, so I had a nice job here in San Diego doing software development. I did that for many years, and then I went off and started a motorcycle company with a buddy of mine. We did that for a few years, but it all fell apart in 2009 with the economy crashing."

Mott returned to the world of software engineering. Fast-forward to 2014: after working at home all day, he would often take his three small dogs out for a walk. Sometimes, these strolls would be at his local dog park in Scripps Ranch. It seemed like a safe place to walk his loyal pets offleash - until one September evening, shortly before sunset, when a coyote brazenly snatched up one his dogs. "The dog was actually behind me, and I heard a little yelp, and I turned around and saw her in the jaws of this coyote," he explains. "At that point, the damage was already done before I even realized it was happening. He carried her away.

"I'm a pretty good runner, but he carried her up into an SDG&E pipe storage yard. I don't know if you can imagine being in a video game where there are these pipes that are 50 feet long and stacked up as tall as you, and you are running through this hallway and you can just kind of see down the lengths of where these pipes are stacked. It's like a maze." The coyote escaped with his beloved Buffy, but Mott didn't simply mourn his loss. The tragic event spurred him into action. "At some point, I real-

At some point, I realized that if I am ever going to have any peace of mind ever again, we've gotta have some kind of a solution to this problem," he says. "So, I started analyzing everything I had witnessed the coyote do. I realized that like any other complicated system, all you have to do is break one part of it and it all falls apart — introduce a point of failure. So I just started thinking, 'What could I have done? If there was anything that could have existed to make this coyote let go of my dog, what would it be?'''

His original thought: protect the dog by utilizing a sudden burst of electricity, in the same manner that an electric dog collar would work. To harness the electricity to the dog, Mott devised a stab-resistant vest made of Kevlar. "These ideas just started popping into my head," he says. "Then I thought, 'Let's put spikes on it and make it cover the whole body. Let's cover everything." Paul worked with his wife Pamela on designs for the vest, and eventually they started strapping early versions onto their dogs to wear during their walks.

"Sure enough, other people saw it and they started going, 'Well, that's pretty cool. Can you make one for us?" Mott says. "We started thinking that maybe other people would want to do this, so we would start a little

shop on Etsy and just make a few and sell them here at the house." Those days in 2016 and 2017 were the start of what would become known as the CoyoteVest, and the company has morphed from a makeshift operation run out of a garage to a business with locations in Scripps Ranch, Oceanside, and Orange County. Along the way, CoyoteVest also popped up on Shark Tank in 2019. In this case, no deal was struck but Mott mentions that they still see sales bumps whenever reruns of the episode air. An even larger boost came from a viral video of a man defending his small dog from a coyote. The encounter ended with the owner picking up the covote by his tail and tossing the animal into a dumpster. At the very end of the clip, he showcases his small dog — now outfitted in a brand new CoyoteVest.

One interesting sidenote: the original concept of the vest delivering an electric shock was eventually abandoned entirely, thanks to a conversation Mott had with a biologist who studied coyotes and their interactions with

University in North

skunks. He informed Mott that the look of the skunks — specifically, the contrast of their colors and lines - were their primary defense. Mott recalls the biologist telling him, "You know what? This is probably freaking out the coyotes just because of the look of it.' I think there's a lot of biological stuff going on with this vest in the way that a coyote perceives it when they encounter it on potential prey," Mott concludes. "It's like playing a card game with the coyotes — telling them it's a losing hand, don't even try."

The Waterman's shifting season shorts Greg Orfe and Wes Hor-

batuck met when they were undergrads at Elon Carolina. The two were roommates through all four years of college, then went their separate ways, with Orfe landing in D.C. and Horbatuck moving to New York. But both ended up moving to San Diego at the end of 2015. Orfe would begin to pursue a career in graphic design, while Horbatuck seemed like a natural entrepreneur. "It was the start of the remote movement," Orfe says, "so we were living the California dream. We had our desks in our garage and a pingpong table. We were just having a good time." The two fully embraced the San Diego lifestyle and found themselves "in the water, surfing every day." "One day on the beach,

we literally had that light-

bulb moment of, 'I wish there was something that was in-between a whole wetsuit and a boardshort," Orfe explains. "This was because it was too cold for boardshorts, and just too warm for that wetsuit. We kind of ran with that idea, and I needed a project for design school to just brand a business from the ground up. I took that idea to class and by the end of the semester. we had a whole business pretty much mapped out. I had a logo designed, business cards...everything. Even though that wasn't the business itself, it made us feel confident that this was something that could take on a life and have some legs to it. Then we ended up meeting the right people and

What makes Orfe and Horbatuck's Driftline "Driftie" boardshorts unique is that they incorporate a 0.5mm neoprene inner lining which is connected to an outer shell that resembles a traditional board short. Horbatuck guesses that most San Diegans who enjoy water sports would use these when the water temperature ranges from 69-75 degrees. "From a Driftline standpoint, we have athletes that are in Florida in the summertime wearing our product and that water is in the 80s," he says. "The reason is because it fills that chafing gap more than just being something that can keep you warm. We also have people who during the summer on Michigan lakes don't want to wear a wetsuit and can handle the cold very differently than those in Florida. So, they will wear our trunks in low-60s water, because to them that is considered warm. So, 'ideal' is a huge range, depending on your location."

there. "We have now sold at least one product in every state," Horbatuck says. "So, someone in Alaska is rocking Drifties is some water sport." The key may have been shifting Drifties from a core-surfer item to a product aimed at waterfolk of all types. "Surfing is definitely big for us, but I do know as a San Diego guy that core surfing can be intimidating for people," he explains. "You realize that the majority of people who surf aren't that core, incredible surfer. It's the everyday person who just wants to get a little bit better at their water sport and enjoy their life on the water. I think what happened is that once we realized that, and then also, at the same time, during Covid watersports got really popular. We started to open our eyes to be like, 'We are bigger than just surf." They mention an email from a customer that detailed a genius repurposing for the Drifties — a bathing suit that can keep a colostomy bag in place during a day at the beach. "He was able to wear shorts in the water at the beach without causing too much of a stir," Hor-

batuck says. "He was really appreciative of that."

All of the previous inventors in this story mentioned issues with others attempting to rip off their products. An interesting aspect of Drifties is that the manufacturing and design processes were so complex and demanding, that they are not too worried about someone cloning them. "From an actual, physical making of the product standpoint we have a utility patent, and it's a really solid patent in the United States," Horbatuck says. "So, we're covered from a lot of standpoints. We are actively working to maintain that and extend it. We also went through sixteen manufacturers. You need a special kind of needle to work with this. Also, neoprene is not a cheap or easy material to get. You have to go over all those hurdles to even create one sample, and a lot of rip-off companies really just want to make cheap stuff that is easy to manufacture. If you want to create something that is true neoprene and very similar to our shorts, it's not easy to rip off at all." -Dryw Keltz



Ground fog expected, Chinese flame trees, Santa Ana season

Dense Ground Fogs Are A Trademark of the onset of autumn along San Diego's coastal strip. The fogs arrive during the night and early morning hours when the moist marine air that has settled in valleys and low areas is chilled below the dew point. These ground fogs are distinct from June Gloom, the low overcast that usually blankets the coastal strip on late-spring and summer mornings.

Chinese Flame Trees Are Starting To Display colorful clusters of orange, reddish, or salmon-pink seed pods. Good specimens line the south end of Balboa Drive in Balboa Park, and Lake Murray

Boulevard through San Diego's San Carlos district. Most of the remainder of San Diego's ornamental trees will continue to remain drab until November, the onset of "autumn" botanically.

Late September Signals The Beginning of Santa Ana winds, which may continue intermittently through the winter. Early Santa Anas are often responsible for coastal San Diego's hottest and driest days of the year. Records show that 62 percent of the days at Lindbergh Field with 90-degree readings or higher have occurred during the months of September and October. The desert-like days are a consequence of dry air from a high-pressure area centered over Nevada or Utah moving across Southern California's coastal mountains toward a low pressure area offshore in the Pacific Ocean. West of the mountains, the air sinks as it rushes toward the coast, heating (by compression) about 5 1/2 degrees Fahrenheit for every 1000 feet of descent. During a full-blown Santa Ana, gale-force winds rake the foothills downwind of the mountain passes, and San Diego's coastal communities often experience temperatures that are among the nation's highest.

A View From the Bridge

The program informs us that playwright Arthur Miller first wrote this near-perfect drama as a one act verse play, and if that wasn't tip enough that he's reaching for the heights and depths of Greek tragedy here, the lawyer/narrator actually mentions Greece — in connection with Sicily, from which our immigrant characters, legal and otherwise, hail — in his opening monologue.

The monologue's subject is the law: the American version, in

which we settle for half and civilization muddles along, and the more ancient, less codified, and definitely more violent version that might have been enforced by the cliffs of Siracusa long ago. The play's subject is Eddie Carbone, the sort of monster part into which actor Richard Baird has been ripening for some time now. Eddie is a longtime longshoreman, old enough to both savor his achievements — he's kept his promise to his dead sister to raise her little girl Catherine — and reckon with his mistakes — he's let his fatherly concern mushroom into something less...distanced. ("You're walkin' wavy. You gotta keep yourself more.") He is, as the lawyer puts it, "as good has he had to be," a man with a code and a worldview. And you know what tragedies do to good men, their codes, and their worlds. Baird is the sort of actor who can dominate a stage with his controlled ferocity, but he knows how to keep his presence in check, and even if he didn't, he has a powerful cast to bang up against. (There are no disappointments, but Margot White as Eddie's wife Beatrice and Coby Rogers as his


unwitting rival Rodolpho stand

out; she for her bravery in battling Eddie's demons, he for his easy embodiment of everything that summons them.) Just before the end of the first

act, our narrator laments, in true Greek fashion, that he can see what's coming, step by inevitable step, and that brings us back to the "near" in "near-perfect." Because this isn't a one-act verse drama, it's a two-act prose play, and here and elsewhere, the narrator demonstrates his

superfluity. He says what he needs to say about the uneasy relation of "the law" to "what's right" in his capacity as a character in the story. As a narrator, he articulates profundities that are already on display — and in his closing remarks, his confusing comments work to blunt the action's considerable force. Still, it's a triumphant production of an American classic. Agatha Christie's Murder on the Orient Express

Or, What Could Be Funnier than Child Murder? Well, not quite, but still. Playwright Ken Ludwig knows that familiarity breeds... maybe not contempt, but perhaps a certain lack of enthusiasm - even if you are working with the greatest detectives in the genre. What to do to liven things up? Bring on the laughs! It worked with audiences when he adapted Sherlock Holmes' spookiest case into Baskerville, so why not here, for Agatha Christie's terrible tale about the reverberations of violence and the murkiness of justice? (Perhaps because it's a terrible tale about the...oh, never mind.)

But comedy does help with coping, and Ludwig and the Globe deploy the gambit with considerable skill, first by giving us the awful murder that begins the action in movie form, so that it's formally separated from the antics of the actors on-stage, then by having Belgian detective Hercule Poirot play it almost entirely straight throughout, and finally by backing off the funny bits as the play progresses toward its undeniably weighty conclusion. And oh yes, fair play: the broadest broad in the bunch, the moneyed Minnesotan, has good reason to act the way she does.

The setting for this murder mystery is justly famous — a seemingly disparate group of passengers on a luxurious train that has been stopped in its tracks by a blizzard — and the Globe has done that setting justice. (The revelation of the train's dining car marked the first time I have ever heard an audience applaud a set change.) The wintry surroundings, projected around the ingenious interiors, contrast splendidly with the purpled luxury on display.

The murder scene itself is also famous: a riot of wounds, a mess of clues. Poor Poirot has a lot of slogging through to do. Good thing the lovely doctor who assists him notices that the deceased's cheek is red, as if he had been slapped earlier. How can she tell? "Because I slapped it." Ho ho! Still, it gets confusing when, just after one character wishes eternal damnation on

the dead man for what he did before he died, another character runs screaming from the stage like a frightened chicken, and everyone...laughs?

Finally, Ludwig might have worked a little harder on Poirot's penultimate speech, in which he first accuses the killer of playing God and then invokes the deity's blessing upon him. The Rocky Horror Show

The most extraordinary thing about Cygnet's production of Richard O'Brien's sex-soaked sci-fi sendup *The Rocky Horror Show* is its casting of the huge and handsome Nathan Madden as the sweet transvestite from Transexual, Transylvania, Dr. Frank 'n Furter. Frank has been "making a man with blond hair and a tan" up in his lab, the sort of fellow who doesn't need dynamic tension to look good in a Speedo. But while it's true that Josh Bradford's Rocky is a marvel of definition, the good (bad) doctor dwarfs and outshines him — especially in heels and drag makeup.

It's a bold move, one that works as well as it does mostly due to Madden's manner: how can someone so substantial seem so...mercurial? But It lends a more sinister cast to the act of Rocky's creation: this is not the work of a tortured little alien from an androgynous planet who is seeking to create a masculine ideal, a god whom he might worship even as it services him. No, this is a pretty plaything made for a monster of control — much prettier than the previous one, who gets carved up with a chainsaw when he breaks out of cold storage.

And that brings me to the second most extraordinary thing about the show: for all its famed on-stage naughtiness (the raciest bits are done in silhouette), it's wildly straight about its morality. Rock and roll really does lead to sexual excess and ultimate destruction (poor Eddie). Alien dudes who dress in women's clothing really are out to corrupt and destroy decent Americans (poor Brad and Janet). Using surgery to pursue perfection really does lead to a crisis of identity (poor Rocky). And you really can't get by with the living-my-truth mantra of "Don't dream it, be it" (poor Frank). But at least you can have campy comedy, catchy tunes and a killer floor show! Oh, and also the cheerful incorporation of the audience responses - though not the props — created for the musical's film version. There are no telephones in castles! Alien: Romulus - Well that was a surprise. The plan seemed clear enough: over the course of Prometheus and Covenant, the Alien franchise had gotten a little too far from its nightmarish roots - body horror, monster scares, and corporate malfeasance giving way to existential searches for meaning, the war of creation vs. creator, and well yes, corporate malfeasance. (Some things never change.) So here comes horror aficionado Fede Álvarez to co-write and direct a movie that will, if not reboot, then at least reset things. Bring on the throat rape, the bursting chests, the phallic threat and dread of pregnancy. Most of all, bring on the fear that made the first one so successful despite (because of) the rarely glimpsed xenomorph. And then, whoopsie! There is effective horror here, but it doesn't rear its head until very late in the game. Before that, what we've got is an artful blend of much of what has come before. Álvarez has done his homework, though maybe a little too well: there is a studied air to things that saps some of the viscerality out of all the viscera. (At least there are plenty of practical effects.) A scene in which our brave band of young would-be space raiders must traverse a room full of Facehuggers that are built to respond to sound and changes in temperature - stay frosty, indeed — seems like the sort of thing that our man ought to relish. a chance to make us hold our breath in sympathy. And yet ... meh. The surprise is that the stronger stuff is in the idea department: the rejiggering of the corporate malfeasance, the shifting of humanity's relation to its androids. An effective, engaging outing, sadly marred by the resurrection of a dead character that sends us into an uncanny valley more unsettling than many of the film's more intentional horrors. 2024. The Substance — Writer-director Coralie Fargeat's long and lurid cautionary tale - anything so laden with body horror must surely be cautionary, right? - very much wants to have its cheesecake and eat it, too. Which is to say, the film treats the Awful Truth that Showbiz (the people who make it and the people who consume it) worships youth, and is mildly horrified by aging, while at the same time slavering over that selfsame youth and jabbing that mild horror with a needle full of nightmare juice. The story concerns Elisabeth Sparkle (Demi Moore, who seems to have watched Gloria Swanson in Sunset Boulevard and declared. "Hold my beer"), an actress who won an Oscar in her youth, grew famous enough to rate a star on the Walk of Fame, and then aged gracefully into a gig doing a fitness show on TV. (Paging Miss Fonda?) Now she's turning 50, and surprise, surprise, the network brass wants someone vounger. Somehow, our heroine is shocked - she never thought it would happen to her, even though that's been the story since forever. Live by the body, die by the body. But hey now, here's an underground lab that's offering - free of charge, for some reason — a solution: a substance that will allow Sparkle to shine again: seven days as herself, seven days as ingenue Sue (Margaret Qualley, in a turn that screams "star" much louder than "actress"). She cheerfully sets out to replace herself, but even though both parties are constantly reminded that "You are One," it gets hard for them not to resent each other. The story feels like it's headed somewhere harrowing and haunting, but then it takes a hard left into insane violence. It's not that it doesn't make sense, it's just that it turns a tragedy into a spectacle. All the wince-inducing stuff that came before - the merciless close-ups on aging flesh, the needles plunging into thinning skin, the accelerating moral and physical decay — gets drowned in a sea of arterial spray. Angel sings for Saints

Angel Mariscal had a shortlived stint playing the piano when he was in elementary school. "The teacher would be, like, 'Play this,' and then I would want to go outside to play with my friends. So, that didn't last. After that, it

was the acoustic guitar, and I stuck with that." Eventually, he became so proficient that his teachers basically told him they couldn't teach him anymore, so he plugged in and started playing electric. He had a cousin: Emiliano Garcia, a drummer who shared his passion for music. "In 2017, we were like, 'Hey, I play music. You play music. Let's start a band.' We kind of did it as a duo. I wrote some songs like 'Let It Out.' It wasn't really until a year or two years after I graduated from high school

that I started thinking about being in a band. I just wanted to make music and put it out."

The first Los Saints singles (the aforementioned "Let It Out" and another song titled "Extraterrestrial") popped up on the streamers in 2019. At that point, the group was still a duo, and Mariscal, with some help from Garcia, was just dipping his toe into the songwriting seas. Before then, he would simply listen to music on his phone and, as he says, "try to freestyle on my guitar" and record it on his phone. "I was like, 'This sounds cool; this could be a song.' But I really started writing music when I joined up with my cousin. He's the one that taught me, 'This is what a verse is. This what a chorus is? Structural stuff."

The duo became a trio in late 2019 when Gianluca Exposito joined on lead guitar. Soon after, they were ready to start gigging. "We were gonna have a show as a three-piece," Mariscal says. "Me as the singer and rhythm guitarist and Emiliano on the drums based ENCI Records. They started gigging more after the EP garnered some positive accolades from the likes of *Under The Radar* and *Alternative Press*. And later that year, the trio started working on the songs that would form their recently released debut LP, *Certified*.

The album proved to be the swansong for Exposito's tenure with the band. After the recording was completed, he offered his bandmates a fitting farewell present: his replacement guitarist. "Jorge

and Gianluca on the lead guitar. I had made some backing tracks for the bass. We got offered a show. We confirmed it and everything. We were, like, 'Dude, this is going to be our first show. It's going to be a sick house show.' And then it was canceled when Covid came around."

The three-piece became one of the many local bands that had the performance rug pulled out from under it when the pandemic hit. Their live debut was delayed until they hosted a show on Fiesta Island in August 2021. They played a 20 minute-long set: the two singles and a handful of songs that hadn't been released yet.

By 2022, they had recorded a self-funded, five-song EP (*Welcome to Confusion*) that got picked up by EncinitasVazquez was introduced to us by Gianluca when he was leaving the band," Mariscal says. "He was in another band called Undead Sunset. When Gianluca brought it up, he was down. This is definitely a permanent setup."

Another new guy entering the Los Saints (musical) fold is bassist Greg Ortega, an early supporter of the band who also shot a video for their song "Fouund You Somewhere." "I asked Greg if he wanted to be the bassist for the band. He was like, 'Tve never played

an instrument before, but I love music, and I love you guys as friends. So, I'll do it.' He just picked it up last year and he has been getting down. Playing a show for the first time two months after just picking up the bass takes a lot of courage."

Mariscal says the band is hoping to tour next year, and just continue writing and recording. "Right now, we just really want to release more music," he says. "I have been getting my demo songs down, so we have a lot of new stuff ready."



Oxford commas, aliens, and sparring superheroes

The conversation hops at IB's The Salty Frog

"I'd lose that if I were you," WeAreJackStrong bassist/vocalist Gregg Oliver advises me. He's referring to my faith in humanity, specifically, the place of creators in a world where Artificial Intelligence has evolved from pervasive to invasive. I'm amused by the contradiction: such a pessimistic view for a man who created a band that references a fictional character who is meant to be all of us, writing songs about dealing with the stressors of life and, with support, emerging stronger. Then again, he thinks the Oxford comma is cool. It is not. Neither is it hip, bitchin, or useful.

I'm mulling over all this at The Salty Frog in Imperial Beach, where the band has started their set. To my ears, the sound is perfectly balanced. (Not surprising, given the combined experience of house soundman Chris and drummer Mitch Grant, the founder of SEAS Productions, a full-service audio/visual company based in Oceanside.) The place is situated in a quiet area; many of the surrounding stores and eateries are closed, either because of the late hour or the latest economy. The bar's clientele has changed over the years, from a Navy SEAL hangout, suitable for sailors on shore leave, to non-military locals who come to hear live music and grab a drink. But the interior still retains signs

of its former military focus: a wall painting depicts three muscular anthropomorphic frogs in Navy gear, seated around a table and drinking. No amphibians are drinking tonight, so I check out the back part of the bar, where two humans are playing pool. I wait to see if they transform or maybe let a little "ribbit" escape their mouths, but they just keep playing.

I grab some pics and footage before stepping outside again, where I'm still able to hear the music while I get my nicotine fix and chat with Jacob, the doorman for tonight. He tells me that patrons are always respectful; they come here for the music and to socialize. There's an immediate connection as we dive into punk rock history and discuss our favorite bands. His friend is looking at my arms, checking out my ink, studying the lines and shading. He's an artist named Chris, and we bond over my KISS tattoo, discussing the finer points of their second release, *Hotter Than Hell*. He

shows me a comic he's drawing for his son: a story of Superman vs. The Hulk that visually samples several styles of the icons' renderings through the ages. They're battling through their own histories.

Jacob tells me I have to check out bartender Brandy's 3D tattoo, and I belly up to the bar to do so over a Diet Coke. The body art doesn't have its full effect without 3D glasses, however, and I suggest she carry some around for dorks like me who want to see the alien pop out of her skin instead of a red and blue image. It's a cool tat, though, and it leads to an impromptu education on all things extra-terrestrial. Brandy is well-versed, and I tell her that I'm skeptical, but want to believe, because, when I look around at the carbon-based life forms around me who were the fastest swimmers, I figure there's got to be more intelligence out there.

As WeAreJackStrong winds up their first of two sets, I grab Oliver for a video interview.

We play a game called "Justify" — the musician is challenged with something and has to justify it. Jaco Pastorius needing only four strings when Oliver uses five and the second "g" in his first name elicit matter-of-fact answers. It's only when the Oxford comma gets brought up and he justifies it with "bacon, and eggs" as opposed to "bacon and eggs" that things get more animated.

Following the interview, Oliver introduces me to several members of bands such as Birds Kill Bugs,

hyping up the others in the musical community that make nights like this possible. Soon Oliver and his group (drummer Grant, guitarist/ vocalist Dan Scott and sax/flute/ keyboardist Jay McGuerty) are set to play another set of no-frills classic rock. And though they "threatened" a night of all original music, a cover of Nick Lowe's "Peace Love and Understanding" done Elvis Costello-style breaks that streak. Before they play, a man named David, carrying his dog Lola, stops the band and thanks them for playing live music, and he also thanks Jacob for having a place where original artists can play.

There are few things better than a night filled with music, great conversation, threedimensional aliens, art, and a friendly dog. Whatever their relative intelligence vis-a-vis aliens, I'm glad the people I interacted with won the swimming race when they were sperm. And fuck the Oxford comma. ■



IMMORTAL BEAUTY

Gramophone's Puccini gaffe

The prestigious classical music publication Gramophone recently listed their 10 greatest Puccini singers of all time. There were a few omissions that raised my ire, along with a few inclusions that made no sense whatsoever. It may seem strange to get worked up over a list of greatest singers, but opera fandom is itself operatic. I've seen grown-ups shout each other into a frenzy over lists of the greatest NFL guarterbacks, and I find that to be entirely appropriate. Shouting isn't encouraged within opera, but squillo that projects to the back of the house certainly is.

The Gramophone list starts with Enrico Caruso and Claudia Muzio, as it should. but then moves on to tenor

next. I find it difficult to include any bass or baritone on a list of great Puccini singers, simply because there is only one truly great baritone role, which is Scarpia from Tosca. It is fair to include him because he was a fantastic singer, but there are a few sopranos and tenors that could have been inserted instead.

There is no way to deny that Renata Tebaldi was a fantastic singer of Puccini. She excelled in multiple

Boheme, Tosca, and Cio-Cio-San in Madama Butterfly.

Next up are Mirella Freni and Luciano Pavarotti. These two are included as a team, and that makes sense. Their recordings of La Boheme and Madama Butterfly are definitive. However, I would not include Pavarotti as a great Puccini singer, because these are the only two roles that fit his voice and I prefer other tenors in these roles. For example, I prefer Jussi Bjorling as Rodolfo and Carlo Bergonzi as Pinkerton.

Soprano Reata Scotto cannot be denied, but tenor Placido Domingo does not belong on this list. He is a good Cavaradossi in Tosca and a great Dick Johnson in Girl of the Golden West but Franco Corelli is better



Not every great opera singer is automatically a great Puccini singer. in both roles. And Corelli is not on the list. He should be right here in place of Domingo. Corelli owns the roles of Cavaradossi and Calaf in Turandot. The final singer on the list is...Jonathon Tetelman?

No. Maria Callas should be on the list, based on her Butterfly and Tosca. Mario del Monaco and Giuseppe di Stefano would have been better choices. Birgit Nilsson should be on the list, if only for her Turandot. (There are no great Turandots on the list, by the way.)

Perhaps Gramophone got to the end of the list and realized none of these singers, except for Domingo, is still living, and they wanted to include a current singer. In that case, a separate list of current great Puccini singers would have made sense. The sad fact of the matter is that there are currently no "greatest of all-time singers" of any type currently on the world stage.

Hongyuan Kebab takes Korean **BBQ** for a spin

Hongyuan Kebab; 4681 Convoy St ste E, San Diego. Sometimes, it feels like half the food I've ever eaten, I tried for the first time in the Convoy District. That was certainly the case when I walked into Hongyuan Kebab, a recent addition to the small but mighty strip of restaurants including Tajima Ramen, Steamy Piggy, The Friendly, and Song Hak Korean BBQ.

Like Song Hak, Hongyuan Kebab is a Korean restaurant where you cook your meat in your seat, browning some assortment of beef, pork, and seafood on a tabletop grill. However, this place differs from that one in some key ways. For one, the signature options here consist of lamb and squid. For another, the equipment provided is less a tabletop grill and more of a tabletop rotisserie.

Look closely at the skewered meats that arrive at your table and you'll see the metal skewers have little round gears at one end. The teeth on those gears correspond to a little moving track along one side of the grill-as the gears turn, the skewers turn the meat, giving it a succulent, even spit-roast.

I wanted to try pretty much every meat available-okay, that's a lie: I had no interest in the beef

aorta, lamb kidney, or abomasum (tripe). But with options including spare ribs (\$27), squid (5 skewers for \$18), and lamb ribs (4 for \$30), some choices had to be made. Each order of a particular meat contains a fair amount of that meat (there are no combos here), meaning this is a really a place for a group of four or more, so people can order and share.

I stuck to the standard lamb (10 skewers for \$27) and pork belly wrapped mushrooms (8 pieces for \$17). The lamb proved excellent – for this alone, I would recommend the place but the texture of pork belly and mushroom combo didn't benefit from the rotisserie treatment in the same way. I ordered and ate it because I felt like I needed to add something at least vegetableadjacent to my meaty meal.

To that end, I also ordered a half-ear of corn (\$4), which was also cooked at the table but without the rotisserie action. Hongyuan is not entirely about food such as the lamb ribs and a whole squid (\$25)— are cooked in the kitchen, then brought out to your table, ready to eat (maybe to toss on the grill if you want to add some char).

Then there's a dish that intrigued me because I'd never

seen it before: Naengmyeon. It's a noodle dish that has roots in North Korea-a first for meand which is apparently a big deal in its capital, Pyongyang.

Obviously, noodles aren't something you'd fire up at your table, and especially these noodles. Naengmyeon translates as "cold noodles," and they

are indeed served cold, along with meat, vegetables, and half a boiled egg - in a broth so cold there are little icebergs floating around in it.

I've had cold *japchae* noodles at Korean restaurants before — and the occasional cold ramen - so I had some understanding of how refreshingly cold noodle dishes go down on a hot day. But, served hot or cold, japchae features potato starch glass noodles served without sauce or broth (or rather, as the internet tells me, the noodles soak up any sauce). Naengmyeon, on the other hand, features some kind of quite chewy buckwheat noodles, and the broth steps up that sense of refreshment with a somewhat surprising hit of vinegar.

It's not a bad side dish, considering how much meat will likely wind up at your table, slowly turning over the flame on your tabletop.

A scratch of yellowfin to the south – Striped marlin near the Coronado Islands – Lobster season begins this Friday

Dock Totals 9/15-9/21: 3540 anglers aboard 163 half-day to 3-day trips out of San Diego landings over the past week caught 2009 bluefin tuna (up to 198 pounds), 22 bocaccio, 1477 bonito, 1 cabezon, 1905 calico bass, 6 dorado, 11 halibut, 169 lingcod, 1246 rockfish, 289 sand bass, 226 sculpin, 375 sheephead. 4 striped marlin (2 released), 2 triggerfish, 1202 whitefish, 3 white seabass, 27 yellowfin tuna, and 521 yellowtail.

Saltwater: Yellowfin tuna and dorado are still basically a no-show this year within 50 miles of Point Loma, most likely due to cooler water along the coastal side of the California current and few storms to push warmer water north during hurricane season along the Baja Peninsula. That said, the Top Gun 80 had a nice score of 276 vellowfin during a 5-day run with 17 anglers aboard. I did not add those to the counts, as I only total the half to three-day counts for consistency as many of the mid- and long-range boats do not publish their totals. Blackfin Sportfishing running out of Punta Banda near Ensenada did report a scratch of small yellowfin early in the week, but that bite seems to have died down. For the larger yellowfin and great wahoo fishing, the typical fall bite is far south off the Ridge and Alijos Rocks off the southern half of the Baja Peninsula, where long-range boats have been doing great.

Bluefin tuna continue to bite well from near San Clemente Island to the outer banks, and with most of the boats concentrating their efforts there, fewer boats are fishing south along Baia, where there have been reports of a decent yellowfin bite off Ensenada by the local operations, which are also scratching up a few bluefin as well. When the tuna or vellowtail aren't cooperating, or when limits are caught with time left, rockfish and lingcod are being targeted with success to add some variety to the overall catch.

White seabass have been biting well along the coast and near the islands in recent weeks, but that action has been slowing a bit. Maybe as the

full moon wanes they will start biting again, but for now, white seabass have been a pleasant surprise on trips mostly targeting calico bass, sheephead and yellowtail just off the kelp edges. The big surprise this week, however, has been a showing of striped marlin.

Last Sunday, the six-pac boat Reel Champion caught and released two stripers within one-day range of Point Loma, and the Sea Watch boated two later in the week on consecutive days near the Coronado Islands, also on full-day runs. We usually see striped marlin in the counts only on longer trips along southern Baja or during warmer El Nino years in our area. Striped marlin

catch several hundred metric tons in warmer years, but much less than their counterparts in the western Pacific — again, due to the clockwise circulation of currents in the Pacific that keeps the majority of striped marlin far to the south on the west coast of North America.

Living an average of 11 years, older striped marlin can be high in mercury, and it is recommended to eat the fish only once per week. Larger species that live longer lives while preying on baitfish that often migrate near industrialized nations tend to have higher mercury concentrations. The tiny amounts of heavy metals in each baitfish eaten accumulate in the predator species, as mercury does not naturally process out once ingested. That said, I have eaten marlin (both blue and striped) in jerky, soft smoked, and in tacos, and it was excellent.

Lobster season is set to begin this Friday, September 27 at 6 pm in Southern California waters. Make sure to meet the licensing and other requirements before heading out to target the tasty bugs. Those pursuing lobster need to have their CDFW Spiny Lobster Report Card and California sport fishing license. An Ocean Enhancement Validation is also required unless you have a one or two-day license. Spiny lobster can be taken only by hand by SCUBA and free divers. For those hooping from piers, only two hoop nets can be used. Boaters may have 5 hoop nets per person with a maximum of ten nets on each boat. Hoop nets cannot be set before the official season start time, so hold your horses until 6 pm Friday. Please visit the CDFW website for all rules and regulations for taking lobster, the fines for infractions can be very stiff. Whether the beach, bay, lake, or offshore, they're out there so go out and get 'em!

do have an endothermic organ that allows a broader temp range, but they typically spend their time further south on this side of the Pacific where the main currents run north to south — as opposed to the opposite in the western Pacific, where they are heavily fished by commercial fleets.

Though striped marlin are mostly concentrated in the central and eastern Pacific, historically, Japan and China catch more of them than any other country in the western Pacific, with peak total metric tons around 18,000 for each country from 1964 to 1969. Since then, there has been a downward trend to under 2000 metric tons by 2011 and just about 1000 metric tons over the past few years. Striped marlin are the most widely distributed billfish in the Pacific, ranging in a horseshoe shaped arc in the north central Pacific Ocean.

Though most recreational anglers release them, striped marlin are eaten in most places where they are commonly found. Striped marlin are caught recreationally in Mexican waters where commercial take is not allowed, and U.S. commercial fleets

 Poor Crumbs. The now-famous corpulent cat, named for his ability to eat, was found in early September in the basement of a hospital in Perm, Russia, the New York Post reported, where the staff had given him a steady diet of cookies and soup. When he was discovered, he weighed more than 37 pounds - about three times the average size for a cat - and was unable to support his weight to walk. Crumbs (or Kroshik, in Russian) was moved to the Matroskin Shelter, where workers put him on a strict diet and exercise regimen - apparently not his cup of tea, as he tried to escape on Sept. 11. Rehab expert Ekaterina Bedakova said Crumbs was "extremely displeased" when, during his escape attempt, he got himself stuck in a shoe rack and couldn't get out. But she was enthused about his effort because it demonstrated that he's a "very active guy.'

Precocious

- A family in Bedford, Ohio, reported their Nissan Rogue and their 8-year-old daughter missing around 9 am on Sept. 15, the Associated Press reported. Police learned that witnesses had seen a small child driving nearby, but it wasn't until they checked the parking lot at Target, about 13 miles away, that they discovered the car. The girl was inside the store; she told officers that she had hit a mailbox during her journey, but otherwise it went fine. Authorities were weighing whether any charges would be filed. - In Japan, the number of people aged 100 or older has hit a new record – 95,119, AFP reported on Sept. 17. Most of the centenarians are women, the Ministry of Internal Affairs and Communications noted. The world's oldest person, Tomiko Itooka of western Japan, is 116. Japan's oldest man, Kiyotaka Mizuno, 110, told local media that he has "no idea at all about what's the secret to my long life."

Inexplicable

- Beaches along the Atlantic Ocean in Delaware, Maryland and Virginia were closed to swimmers by authorities on Sept. 15 after mysterious medical waste started washing up, The New York Times reported. The trash included syringes and needles, used feminine hygiene products and plastic cigar tips. "We currently have no idea where it came from and will not be speculating about a source," said the National Park Service office at Assateague Island National Seashore. They were unsure how long beaches would remain closed. "We recommend wearing shoes on the beach and avoiding the ocean entirely," warned Joe Theobald, director of Emergency Services in Ocean City, Maryland.

- Norton Havoc, 32, can now "smell colors," they said, after blowing their nose in the shower and dislodging a Lego block that had been stuck inside for "at least 26 years," the New York Post reported. Havoc

— Vacaville, California, resident Ken Wilson is VERY careful about his consumption of electricity. "I was being very vigilant on this," he told KMAX-TV. "Every day that I go to work, I turn the breakers off." He also purchased a device that tells him how many watts of energy his appliances use. But recently he noticed that his bill was higher than normal. Wilson has lived in an apartment, unit 91 of his building, for 18 years. After Wilson called PG&E to come out and check his meter on Sept. 10, he discovered he's been paying for unit 90's electricity usage for years. PG&E admitted the mix-up and said it is "fully committed to rectifying the situation." Wilson said he hopes the story can help others with similar problems.

Explosive!

Magnet fisher and YouTuber Dani Dip pulled a provocative find out of the Saint Joseph River in South Bend, Indiana, on Sept. 1, ABC57-TV reported. "We believe this is a 175mm Howitzer round from like a stationary cannon back in the day," Dip said. "It took four people to pull this big two-foot round over the wall to safety so it wouldn't fall back in and potentially go off." The South Bend Police Department said further testing would be necessary to make sure the charge is not live. "We're just here to help and clean out the river and see what we can find," Dip said.

More News You Can Use

- About 40 feet off the coast of Miami Beach, the world's first underwater cemetery is already home to about 1500 "placements," ClickOrlando reported on Sept. 17. The Neptune Memorial Reef's community resource director, Michael Tabers, said the area had already been designated for an artificial reef when "a group of businessmen in the area ... had the idea." The reef was built "from an artist's conception of the Lost City of Atlantis;" customers' cremains are mixed with water and then formed into road columns, archways or depictions of local sea life, such as starfish or seashells. Then the coral grows around them. "We have sea turtle placements; those are some of our more popular ones," Taber said. The reef has already been extended once, but when it fills up, "we will launch the next phase," he said. Coral reef conservation activists are thrilled; the reef provides hard surfaces that help coral to thrive. And loved ones can also dive to visit their family members' resting places.


