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

City considers barring cars on Indiana

As part of an effort to draw more visitors to downtown Vista, city council members are considering closing certain streets to cars and letting bikes, pedestrians, and even skateboards can take over the asphalt. A proposed pilot program, planned around events like the city's strawberry festival, which drew 80,000 visitors in May, is being touted as a post-pandemic way to spur the local economy and support more multimodal uses.

Following the lead of Encinitas, which holds an annual Cyclovia (Spanish for "Cycleway") event, Vista held its first Cyclovia on September 29. The global movement, allied with the Open Streets Project, temporarily reclaims city streets for walking and biking. (A similar event called CicloSDias will be held this November in Pacific Beach. The one-day event, sponsored by the San Diego County Bicycle Coalition, will close off nearly three miles of city streets to cars.) And if those

plan goes through, it would devastate the business, which would have to move.

Councilmembers noted that Rylan apartments, located about 300 feet from Dede's business on Main Street, has 55 parking spaces that are free to the public. Further, Main Street is expected to remain a passthrough. The streets that will be studied as possibilities for closure include the area around Indiana Street. Shutting down Indiana heading west from east Broadway and capping all the streets would still give access to every parking lot in that zone, Mayor Dan O'Donnell said. Only the Main Street parking spaces would not be available. Councilmember Green thought that parking might be

The U.S. Tennis Association recently announced that "at least 10 percent of tennis courts in America have been taken over and re-purposed for pickleball," according the *Wall Street Journal*. "The land grab should come as no surprise, considering pickleball is the fastest-growing sport in America." But according to Stefan Boyland, president of the Pickle-

frequent conflicts with tennis enthusiasts over space. (For their part, tennis players complain that when pickleball lines are painted onto tennis courts, it makes play more difficult.) Boyland believes the city prioritizes tennis over pickleball, claiming, "Tennis interests have padded the mayor's campaign coffers, while pickleball players have stayed transparent in their efforts to expand access."

Even a longtime tennis player like Gerry Velazquez, who picked up pickleball because it was easier on his knees, agrees with Boyland on the need for more courts. "It's a free-forall," he said, referencing an altercation in 2022 at Peninsula Tennis Club in Ocean Beach, where Boyland and other pickleball players were confronted by staff for trying to play on tennis courts. (Police were called, but no action was taken.)

Boyland is confident that converting more tennis courts into pickleball courts could generate significant revenue for the city. "With a full-service pickleball facility charging \$2.50 per hour, the city could earn \$26 million annually." He estimated that potential pickleball revenue by calculating that San Diego has about 57,000 core players — 4.1 percent of the 1.4 million population. That 4.1 percent was derived from the estimated 13.6 million core players nationwide, according to *SportsBusinessJournal.com*,

temporary events go well, the city might close some streets permanently.

Currently under discussion are five options that were settled on at a meeting in March, when Councilmember Corinna Contreras pointed out the need to activate the downtown. "This is urgent for me," she said, noting that the younger residents of her district "say there's nothing to do in Vista. You have to be over 21 for everything."

It wasn't always that way, councilmember Joe Green said. He recalled that while growing up in Vista, a weekly street fair was held — jam-packed with vendors and people dancing. "We would literally shut down the whole street." He urged the city to bring it back.

"I am so down with that," Contreras agreed.

But Carly Dede, who owns a chiropractic business at the end of Main Street, opposed the idea, citing the lack of parking downtown. She said that people hobble in on crutches and in wheelchairs, unable to walk any further than they already do. She added that if the increased by making both Main Street and Broadway one-way, then offering diagonal parking all along Main Street. "It's a loop to see everything and it gives tons more parking for all of our business owners down there."

As part of the study, officials plan to map out every entrance and exit to all potential parking lots. The council will also explore ways to revamp the public space around the gazebo on Main Street to make it a courtyard; ways to better advertise the public parking at the Rylan apartments; and ways to reach out to downtown business owners.

Is tennis the menace?Pickleball populists plead for places to play

Pickleball continues its meteoric rise in popularity around San Diego, with locals enjoying Dinks and Drinks at the Coronado Marriott or playing under blacklights in neon outfits and whacking glow-in-the-dark balls. But despite the proliferation of pickleball venues

ball Association of San Diego, it's not enough. "We need to convert more tennis courts into pickleball courts," he said. "San Diego needs 1000 dedicated pickleball courts; look at the numbers." (According to the Association of Pickleball Professionals, the number of players in the United States has increased by 223 percent since the pandemic.) Online forums are filled with complaints about overcrowded pickleball courts; one user commented, "Your best bet is to reserve a court months in advance, because people cancel."

But it seems that not everyone agrees. "On September 21, 2022, at the San Diego Equality Business Association virtual meeting, three people spoke about the need for more courts," Boyland recalled. "Mayor Gloria rolled his eyes when the first person spoke, even though the proposal required no city funding." The San Diego pickleball community says it's frustrated with the city's lack of dedicated courts and the

compared to the total national population. "I say 50,000 conservatively, and we have nice weather and more active folks, so you'd think we would have at least the average in the country." If those 50,000 hardcore players played for four hours a week, that would be about 200,000 hours a week at \$2.50 an hour, that would mean \$500,000 a week. Mutiply that by 52 weeks in a year, and you get \$26 million, not counting revenue from less dedicated players. (*ThePickleballDinks.com* estimated that 14 percent of the adult population played pickleball in 2022.)

But Jesse, a longtime tennis player at Peninsula Tennis Club, was unsympathetic. Recalling the 2022 clash, he said, "It's disappointing to see pickleball fanatics take over courts. If the sport is as popular as they claim, they should raise funds for dedicated courts like we did for tennis."

Maquiladora malefaction First a disappearance, then

a persecution

More than a month has passed since Servando Salazar, for 10 years a worker at Prime

Wheel factory in Tijuana, disappeared on August 23 within the company's facilities. Security cameras confirm hat he entered the factory as usual but never got out. (Prime Wheel, which is located across the border from Otay Mesa, sells road wheels and parts to customers in the United States.)

Servando's wife Wendy Bravo, who is pregnant and already the mother of three daughters, said that she and her sister-in-law went to look for him at the factory the next morning. They got access to much of the company's facilities, but couldn't make it into the area where the industrial furnaces are located.

Wendy then reported her husband's disappearance to the state prosecutor's office, and looked for support from Tijuana collectives dedicated to finding missing persons. She also started searching for Servando in areas surrounding the factory, which is located in a sparsely populated area on the outskirts of town.

While Wendy and the collectives were eliminating the possibility of Servando's

presence outside the maquiladora, the prosecutor's office conducted a search of the company's furnaces. That search led the office to obtain an arrest warrant for the two persons in charge of that area of the factory. But Wendy felt the prosecutor's office wasn't transparent and efficient enough. Encouraged by other maquiladora employees, Wendy and her relatives started a protest, blocking the factory's entrances. "How can be possible they are running the

factory as if nothing happened?" she said. "They are supposed to look out for their employees' security. He worked there for 10 years... We held out as much as we could, despite some of us getting harassed by their security staff. We just wanted to be heard. I know anyone would do the same to find their missing loved ones."

The blockade was used by Prime Wheel as an argument to fire those who didn't make it to their job due to the protest — a situation that led to workers turning their backs on



Rincon's splashy suicide Big

time gambling interests are playing a major role in the Republican-based Lincoln Club's hitpiece effort to take down Democratic County Supervisor **Terra Lawson-Remer**. On October 12, fresh money rolled into the club's Neighborhood Action Council Against Terra Lawson-Remer for County Supervisor committee in the form of a \$10,000 check from Valley Center's Rincon Band of Luiseno Mission Indians of the Rincon Reservation, per an October 14 filing.

The tribe's sprawling casino and resort complex is run by Harrah's Southern California, whose ex-senior vice president and general manager **Darrell Wayne Pilant** killed himself in Georgetown Lake, Montana this past summer following a bruising legal fight with the company over opening the casino too soon after the Covid epidemic. "Being tribally owned on the Rincon Tribe's sovereign land, Harrah's Southern California was not obliged



"On May 19, just three days before Harrah's Southern California reopened, California had recorded its deadliest coronavirus day to date with 132 deaths. Gov. **Gavin Newsom** (D) subsequently wrote the Rincon Tribe and other tribal casinos prepping their reopening plans to reconsider. Pilant refused to side with his employer and said his hand was forced to resign. In his obituary, his family, including his wife, Jenna, said he struggled to recover from the pandemic."

The county health department, overseen by

supervisors including Lawson-Remer, has long been at center of controversy over withheld reporting of Covid-19 numbers. "Public health officials have confirmed that more than 300 of the county's residents who contracted COVID-19 reported visiting a casino shortly before testing positive," says an October 16, 2020 online post by INewsource.com. "But the county won't disclose whether any community outbreaks occurred at local casinos because they're on tribal lands.


The tribal governments have released little information and aren't subject to federal and state disclosure laws as sovereign entities." Adds the account: "The casinos began reopening in May with new cleaning, social distancing and face covering policies, but some of their employees have raised concerns. In late August, the federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration launched an investigation into

Hurrah's Resort Southern California in Valley Center following a complaint. The case remains open and no further public details are available."

To strike or not to strike Union workers at 11 newspapers of the Southern California News Group, whose 12th and most recent member is the *San Diego Union-Tribune*, have voted to authorize a strike against the chain and its owner, Alden Global Capital, which is widely accused of being a vulture


"Over 90% of the 125 professional reporters, photographers, digital, social media and production staff across 11 newsrooms represented by SCNG Guild, a unit of Media Guild of the West, participated in the strike vote. A landslide 94% voted to authorize union leaders to call for a strike," per a September 24 news release by the union. "This vote should serve as a wakeup call for management who for more than

the West: "Alden Global Capital still thinks paying less than \$20 an hour is an acceptable wage for reporters serving hundreds of thousands of Southern Californians."

Pearce also lashed out at the state's Democratic governor and plans to subsidize jobs at the state's troubled daily newspaper business. "We also don't think Gov. Gavin Newsom and our state lawmakers should give a cent of taxpayer

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Wendy's cause. She started to get criticism from employees via text messages. After two days, Wendy agreed to leave if those who lost their jobs could get them back. However, she said, "I am not giving up my fight, and I am not being paid off by the company, as they are making it look like. But I never thought they would take it against other employees. I need to get back home, rest, see my kids, and take care of the little person I have inside me."

In the hours after the protest, state prosecutor Maria Andrade explained to the press that their investigation was not considering Servando's disappearance as a work accident, but as a possible intentional crime. "One of the investigation guidelines suggests that criminal activities have been committed," she said.

For now, Wendy has no option but to wait for the DNA results taken from the furnaces. Unfortunately, since the company handles strong solvents and industrial chemicals, evidence may prove difficult to find.

money As noted here back on July 3, a political committee calling itself New San Diego shut its doors on June 21, transferring its remaining \$15,717.06 to a newly formed committee called California Progress for All, which had been registered with the California Secretary of State's office just weeks before on June 6. New San Diego, many insiders observed, had apparently become a bad brand in local politics, having failed in its stealthy spring mission to pave the way for the success of Todd Gloria's Democratic mayoral re-election bid by backing the primary campaign of neophyte GOP mayoral hopeful Jane Glasson over staunch Gloria foe Larry Turner. Despite heavy spending for Glasson by New San Diego, Turner ultimately

made it into this November's

runoff against Gloria.

Now California Progress for All is going all out for the incumbent mayor, revealing in an October 16 filing with the city clerk's office that it has spent a total of \$84,500 on the mayor's cause, \$15,000 of that for an October 15 "media buy," on Gloria's behalf. Besides the five figure cash rollover from defunct New San Diego, the newly minted California Progress for All's biggest donations include \$10,000 on October 10 from utility giant Sempra Energy, whose SDG&E San Diego city franchise has greatly benefited under Gloria's protection. In addition, on September 21, \$50,000 rolled into California Progress for All from the Asian Business Association Candidate PAC of Encinitas. Recent donors to that group have included Marco A. Sessa. senior vice president of Mission Valley developer Sudberry Properties (\$5000, August 14) and the San Diego Regional Chamber of Commerce PAC (\$10,000, September 3). An apartment investors group, the California Apartment Association — Independent Expenditure PAC, came up with \$35,000 on September 17. Government subsidized housing outfit Affirmed Housing, another beneficiary of Gloria's reign, gave \$10,000 on September 20.

Larry Ronald Starbird


JANUARY 6, 1967 - OCTOBER 10, 2024

Extended family dynamics

Many of our neighbors live in the house they grew up in

Clairemont was created in 1950 by Carlos Tavares and Lou Bergener, and was named after Tavares' wife Claire. San Diego's need for housing at the time was enormous, thanks to massive growth in the military and aerospace, and Clairemont became San Diego's biggest postwar subdivision. At the time, it was the largest development of its kind in the country. My street seems emblematic of what much of Clairemont has become in over following seventy years. And even though I have lived here for more than a decade, I still find it a fascinating place to live.

Our house is a very typical mid-1960's tract home. We love it, and do our best to keep it maintained and looking good. Over the years, it has become my favorite home, completely customized for us and our tastes. We call it our "forever" home.

I know almost all our neighbors, and I like them. We talk on the street, wave at each other, trick or treat each other's houses. We are tucked away, so that the foot canvassers really must work to get to us. Our neighbors are mostly middle-aged or seniors, but about a quarter of are young families. Many Accessory Dwelling Units have popped up all over our street. Formerly known as "Granny Flats," they often look like second homes being added to a property designed for one.

What fascinates me most is how many of our neighbors live in the house they grew up in. Many have had parents pass away, or still live with one or both. So, this street is the only neighborhood many of them have ever known. The benefit of this is that our neighbors know

each other well, and are, in some cases, more like extended family than people that just live down the street. The disadvantage is that, just as in extended families, some of these dynamics are not happy. In the best-case scenarios, neighbors will take part in celebrations and rituals that I grew up thinking were exclusively family related. In the worst-case scenarios, neighbors stew over years of dislike based on fear, mistrust, and ancient history. Either way, when they call to each other in the street, they use each other's full names — perhaps to emphasize the extent of information each know about the other.

This familiarity also causes some boundary issues. Residents have been known to gawk over the fence at night at neighbors enjoying the backyard hot tub. It's rare that anyone addresses these issues face to face. To avoid an unpleasant discussion, the hot

tubbers simply install flood lights pointing at the neighbor's fence to discourage further peeping. Problem solved. Some life-long neighbors are so comfortable here that they have no issue with walking up to a house's window and peering in to see if anyone is home while calling out their names. Combining the two, we had a neighbor who would wait for us to go out of town, then help himself to our spa.

After we returned home to a muddy, trashed spa, installed security cameras and started locking our gates.

As with most older neighborhoods, the residents here put varying levels of effort into yard care. There is a property on our street that we lovingly refer to as "The Boo Radley House." One of its residents have lived there his entire life. The house can barely be seen from the street – the grass, bushes and trees are all wildly overgrown, and it all looks very out of place here. But every Christmas, Boo Radley turns on his holiday lights, even if the only way a passerby can see them is to peer through the dense thicket.

Another house of note is lovingly known as "The Hoarder House." My introduction to its lifetime inhabitants included a look at the in-garage art exhibit, which consisted of what seemed like a hundred Barbie bodies hung by a string from the ceiling. I asked for an interpretation, and was told that each body symbolized a different phase in a mental health process.

The people of our street are generous. Over the years, everything from food to half empty wine bottles to backyard fruit has appeared on our porch. Every summer, a block party is held, and neighbors assemble to get a current body count on who is still living (and living here), and to talk about what houses are now selling for. It's a bit ghoulish, but then, I don't have the perspective that comes from being a lifetime resident.

Clairemont is built alongside many canyons,

which brings lots of wildlife onto our street; one normally sees it at night while walking the dog. And given our large older population, it's sad but not surprising to hear the San Diego Police helicopters flying over the streets and canyons, announcing the details of a missing person — often last seen headed into one of the canyons.

A neighborhood wouldn't be complete without some tea to spill. We do have an active, if irregularly scheduled, booty call in progress. Romeo rides a skateboard down the street to Juliet's house, then rides back a little later. We're going to call it romance. We've also had our share of tragedy: since our arrival: our street has seen a suicide, and just a street over, there was a full-blown filicide.

Still, there is more happiness than sorrow here. I love it when the kids come out on weekends or on school break. The sounds of their play and laughter on the street remind me of my own childhood. Both their parents may work, but these latchkey kids seem to have it figured out. They look out for each other. They stay in touch with the neighbors that are home. It makes our street feel like a complete neighborhood. Our street reverberates with kindness, compassion, and a kind of neighborly love that I haven't experienced elsewhere. I like and trust the people on our street, and we are thankful to live here. No matter where we travel, the best part of our trip is always coming back home.



he Tijuana River Valley is a large estuary complex that drains the watershed area from the east and the urban runoff of Tijuana from the south, sending both flowing out into the Pacific Ocean to the west. Thanks to cataclysmic infrastructure failures and insufficient government response and regulation south of the border, that Tijuana runoff is famously nasty, rife with raw sewage and other sick-making things. And while the dominant current along most of the San Diego County coastline runs from north to south, this portion of our coast has a predominant current that flows from south to north. As a result, the ocean delivers sew-

age-infused waters to the beach communities south of Point Loma. There's an international border running between the dirty water's source and its destination, but the water doesn't seem to care about borders and the legal limitations they create. And given South County's economic and political status relative to,

say, La Jolla, there are those who wonder just how much the powers that be care about the water. Or, for that matter, the air.

On June 4, 2024, the mayors of the 18 cities in San Diego County sent a letter to California Governor Gavin Newsom. The letter made a unified and compelling plea to recognize the "urgent and escalating public health emergency" in South San Diego County, and to make a corresponding declaration of emergency in response. As the letter noted, "over one billion gallons of untreated wastewater pour into this region each month, resulting in the closing of Imperial Beach's shoreline for more than 900 consecutive days. Addition-

ally, Coronado beaches have been closed more than 50% of the time over the past two years. The resulting pollution is impacting the air quality of the communities of Imperial Beach, Nestor, San Ysidro, Tijuana River Valley, Egger Highlands, South Chula Vista, and Otay Mesa West. This environmental disaster is causing profound social, economic, public health, and ecological damage."

As evidence for this claim, the letter cited a white paper published in February of 2024 by the San Diego State University School of Public Health. The paper called the situation "a public health crisis," and noted "the unusual threats to health from pollutants arising in Mexico, including human and livestock diseases eradicated in California, pathogens carrying antibiotic-resistant genes, and industrial and municipal chemicals not permitted to be discharged into the environment in California." It noted that Hurricane Hilary and other rainfall events "have caused further damage to aging infrastructure...exacerbating concerns." It noted a recent study that found 175 compounds in border water that "appeared in the U.S. Environmental Protection Agencies Toxic Substance Control Act," and that found "a substantial number of contaminants of emerging concern" for the first time.

But beyond the toxic stuff that was keeping people out of the water, the white paper noted that "community concerns about strong odors and pollution within San Ysidro from the Tijuana River have been frequently reported," and

that "a recent study... documented airborne microbes and chemicals related to the sewage and runoff over the ocean." (That study, published in the journal *Environmental Science & Technology* in 2023, found that 40 tracer bacteria, used to research coastal water pollution released as sea

spray aerosol by breaking waves and bursting bubbles, "comprised up to 76% of the bacteria community in IB air." One of its lead researchers was Dr. Kimberly Prather, codirector of the recently founded Meta-Institute for Airborne Disease in a Changing Climate at UCSD, as well as found-

ing director of the Center for Aerosol Impacts on Chemistry of the Environment.) The white paper therefore claimed that "inhalation is also a pathway of exposure, as these dangerous contaminants can also be airborne... Poorly understood pathways of exposure should be carefully and explicitly

studied, such as exposures through breathing community air." The paper concluded, "Investments by Congress and federal and state agencies are desperately needed to not only slow and prevent the ongoing and egregious contamination but also assess the health and environmental harm that has occurred as a result."

The mayors' letter laid out the region's many needs, and then renewed their request for Newsom to declare a state of emergency, defined by the Emergency Services Act as "conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the state...which are likely to be beyond the control of...any single county, city and county, or city." They also acknowledged that Newsom's office had already declined to make such a declaration in an

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October 10, 2023 letter to the California Coastal Commission, "because it would not actually aid the ongoing response to this crisis." That letter argued that "a state proclamation of emergency cannot accelerate federal work needed on this federal facility that is in a federally-controlled area on an international border." highlighted what the governor had done already, and explained that "the Governor's emergency powers extend to waiving only state statutes and regulations...No one has identified or proposed any specific relief from state statutes or regulations necessary to facilitate emergency response and recovery."

The mayors were not mollified. Their June letter argued that, beyond suspending state law, "the Governor could 'use and employ [the State's] property, services and resources" to deal with the crisis, and also "'ascertain the requirements' of our communities to avoid preventable disease and property damage stemming from this pollution...The pollution crisis in the Tijuana River violates both state and

federal environmental laws, and it is incumbent upon the state to implement and enforce these laws vigorously."

In just ten calendar

days (which included


a two-day weekend), a


response, dated June 14, 2024, was rapidly generated by the governor's Office of Emergency Services. The letter, signed by director Nancy Ward, outlined in three pages why a state declaration was neither appropriate nor necessary. Notably, Ward wrote that "an emergency declaration is not necessary for the deployment of state resources. For instance, [the California Department of Public Health] has actively engaged with San Diego's County Public Health to review data and concurs with that local agency's conclusion that there is no evidence of increased infectious diseases, including gastrointestinal illness, in connection with the pollution crisis...We will continue to monitor the situation in collaboration with San Diego County."

That was June. By September, Imperial Beach's beach closure broke

1000 consecutive days. cyanide and focused on hydrogen sulfide.

Hydrogen sulfide smells terrible. But it's worse than that. On September 8, the San Diego County Air Pollution Control District posted on X that "inspectors have been documenting strong odors impacting South Bay communities. The current extreme heat is exacerbating ongoing





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odor issues in the Tijuana River Valley and surrounding communities. Compounds associated with these odors may cause adverse health effects. Residents near the affected areas who notice strong odors are advised to limit outdoor physical activity. Whenever possible, remain indoors, especially if you have respiratory or heart conditions, are elderly, or have young children in your household. We continue to assess the situation and we'll continue to keep the public informed."

There it was: "Compounds associated with these odors may cause adverse health effects." But then there was that caveat: "may cause." Under what circumstances? Part of the problem is that noxious hydrogen sulfide can be smelled long before it is considered dangerous. The California Air Resources Board has a standard of .03 parts per million per hour, which is the level at which the gas becomes detectable by people; that standard gives air regulators the go-ahead to start investigations. But according to a recent Voice of San Diego story, regu-

lators set the safety level for exposure at 20 parts per million per hour. The readings for the South Bay? Just three parts per million at their peak, and a more sustained level of .958 parts per million per hour. Well below the threshold — for an hour, at least.

The issue in South County is prolonged exposure. The Occupational Safety and Health Administration says that 2-5 parts per million, over time, "may cause nausea, tearing of the eyes, headaches or loss of sleep." Plus "airway

problems (bronchial constriction) in some asthma patients." It sets a 10 parts per million limit on people working just eight-hour shifts. When you have coastal winds blowing hydrogen sulfide in from the ocean during the afternoon, and then air flowing out to sea during the wee hours, you get a day-and-night, backand-forth wash of bad air over your South County neighborhood. And if people can't sleep, their health is compromised in other ways as well. While collecting data in the region, some members of Prather's team found they couldn't sleep; it seemed a clear confirmation of the problem.

And yet: no emergency. When Covid was floating in the air, that was an emergency. When forest fires choke the sky with smoke and ash, that's an emergency. Storms, yes. Droughts, yes. Even tree mortality. But not sewer gas.

"Emergency," according to Public Resources Code Section 30624, means "a sudden, unexpected occurrence demanding immediate action to prevent or mitigate loss or damage to life, health, property, or essential public services." It's true that by this point, the flow of sewage can be seen as neither sudden nor unexpected. But then, is California's annual fire season sudden or unexpected? We get fires every fall like clockwork, and yet the emergency de-clarations keep coming. The same could be said for winter storms and the resultant floods.

On September 3, Governor Newsom declared a state of emergency for the accelerated impacts of coastal landslides in Rancho Palos Verdes. There have been landslides in that area for decades: I know, because I grew up near there. I remember going to Marineland (now Terranea Resort) and experiencing the roller-coaster feel of the undulating roadway, which was always undergoing repair and maintenance. It's true that recent winter storms have proved a catalyst for an acceleration of landslide movement — one that affects the mostly affluent coastal enclave of Portuguese Bend on the Palos Verdes Peninsula. But as the SDSU

white paper noted, it's also true that Hurricane Hilary exacerbated the problem in the waters off Imperial Beach. And something relatively sudden and unexpected has resulted. It didn't used to smell this way.

On September 24,

Imperial Beach Mayor Paloma Aguirre sent a letter to President Biden's chief of staff Jeff Zients, pleading for immediate federal emergency relief. As of this writing, she has not received a response. But that's not to suggest that no one is paying attention. Whether or not all politics is local, local politicians have taken note — and not just those 18 mayors. The county board of supervisors has been renewing its proclamation of a local emergency regarding cross-border sewage every 60 days since it first issued it in June of 2023. In addition, it allocated \$100,000 to provide air purifiers to homes impacted by the odors. In October of 2023, the Air Pollution Control District set up an air sensor in South County to investigate odors. It added four more in August of this year. The district also

set up a website and hotline to investigate odor complaints. Research continues: The Tijuana River Project at SDSU now has a website documenting its efforts and offering an ongoing community health survey at tjriver.sdsu.edu. And last week, the CDC conducted 210 interviews over a 30-block region in an effort to understand better the public's experience of the sewage crisis.

And happily, there is positive precedent for a situation like this. In late September of 2021, a warehouse caught fire in the city of Carson, and the resultant release of chemicals in to the Dominguez Channel brought about the release of a massive cloud of hydrogen sulfide. Residents of Carson, Gardena, Long Beach, and other cities were sickened and eventually evacuated. The Los Angeles County Department of Public Works paid for hotel rooms for more than 3000 people, and distributed 27,000 air purifiers to homes. Grassroots residential activism resulted in agency responses. So there is reason for hope.

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A brief history of Tijuana sewage —

Very few people know this history. And almost no one in his right mind would want to hear the whole interminable chronicle. At the same time, it is a saga that exemplifies the chaos and paralysis and absurdity that can erupt when the First and Third Worlds intersect, when Mananaland Meets the Culture of Mr. Clean.

THE EARLY TURBULENT YEARS: 1935-1965

1935 — Tijuana builds a new community septic tank designed to accommodate the wastes of 5000 people. Interestingly, this project comes five years after Mexican federal census figures have revealed the Tijuana population to be 11,271. Consequently...almost Immediately — The new septic tank becomes grossly overloaded. Relatively untreated sewage once again contaminates

American crops and ground waters. 1938-39 — Mexican and American officials decide it would be

ican officials decide it would be better to dump septic tank effluent from Tijuana directly into the ocean (rather than letting it first flow through the Tijuana River estuary). So they build pipes leading to a point seven-tenths of a mile north of the border, where an outfall extends 140 feet beyond the mean lower low tide line. The County of San Diego agrees to operate the U.S. facilities as long as the Mexicans promise not to send untreated sewage into the outfall.

1948 — Tijuana has almost 60,000 residents and no sewage treatment other than the septic tank built for 5000. Americans complain about poorly treated flows coming through the outfall.

1952 — A county report recommends connecting Tijuana and San Ysidro to the treatment/disposal system proposed for the San Diego metropolitan area.

December 1953 — About 3.5 million gallons a day of poorly treated sewage is flowing through the international outfall. A government report concludes that the value of Imperial Beach has been impaired

and recreational use of the beach is threatened.

June 1954 — A bond issue for construction of the San Diego Metropolitan Sewage System (including a Tijuana connection) fails because of controversy over the proposed location.





July 1954 — The governor of California asks the U.S. State Department to file a formal protest with the Mexican government over the sewage issue.

1954 — The county's public health department starts chlorinating the discharge at the outfall.

May 1955 — The IBWC and its Mexican counterpart are authorized to investigate the problem.

September 1956 — Both American and Mexican sections of the IBWC say they're still investigating.

Summer 1957 — Chlorination at the outfall isn't sufficient to stop contaminated waters from reaching the beaches north of Imperial Beach.

Early 1958 — Tijuana agrees to remove solid wastes and scum from the septic tank, while the San Diego County Health Department plans an intensified chlorination program. It functions from May 29 through September 14, when the county runs out of money. One week later, water quality along the beaches has reached unsatisfactory levels again.

March 1958 - The California governor again asks the State Department for emergency action. The State Department talks to the Mexicans, who say they're studying the problem.

November 1958 — A design for the San Diego metro sewer system (including a Tijuana connection) is presented to the San Diego City Council and wins swift approval.

April 1959 — The California legislature asks the U.S. government for help in correcting the pollution problem.

August 20, 1959 — The county health department finds that the Mexicans are not removing sludge

and scum from the septic tank, per their promise. The county closes all beaches from the border to the north end of Imperial Beach.

September 1959 — The Mexicans announce they don't want to be connected to San Diego's new sewer system. They say instead they will build oxidation ponds and reclamation facilities in Tijuana. They say this project will cost only half a million dollars and can be completed in nine months.

October 1959 — The Mexican federal government assumes responsibility for operating Tijuana's septic tank, at the same time cleaning it and installing new sludge pumps. Mexico also informs U.S. officials that it has begun work on a pump station and a force main (a big pipe through which the sewage is moved under pressure). These will be used to pump Tijuana's sewage west to the top of the mesa overlooking the river basin. From the mesa, the sewage will flow by gravity seven miles south; where the water will be processed in oxidation ponds. The Mexicans say this will cost \$1.2 million and will take no longer than their original plan.

December 1959 — Mexico starts talking about revising its sewage treatment plans.

February 1960 — The Mexicans further revise their plans. Among the revisions is talk of a twelve-mile open canal that will terminate near Rosarito Beach. There the sewage is to be treated and used for irrigation.

December 1, 1961 — Mexican officials begin running their new pump station, which transports sewage to the

partially finished southbound canal.

December 3, 1961 — Minor rains wash out part of the open canal.

January 1962 — The Mexicans run out of money to complete the open canal. Work on the canal stops at a point about 5.5 miles south of the border. Here the raw sewage flows down an arroyo, across the beach, and into the ocean.

Spring 1962 — The Tijuana pump station fails, and all of the city's raw sewage flows across the border. Talk of an "emergency connection" to the San Diego metropolitan system begins.

Late 1963 — The San Diego Metropolitan Sewerage system is completed. But there's not enough money left to build the San Ysidro/Tijuana connection.

April 1965 — Storm run-off severs Tijuana's force main, and raw sewage flows north again.

December 1965 — San Diego and the Mexican federal government reach agreement to build an emergency bypass system, to divert Mexican sewage to Point Loma for treatment and disposal when the Mexican pump station foils. Each country agrees to build, operate, and maintain all the necessary facilities on its side. San Diego promises to let Tijuana use excess capacity in its Point Loma plant for twenty years on an asneeded, emergency basis. Mexico agrees to pay for this on a fixed-rate basis.

THE DECEPTIVE MIDDLE AGES: 1966-1980

Early October 1966 — Work on the emergency bypass is completed.

October 10, 1966 — Heavy rains cause a rupture in the Mexican force main that carries Tijuana

sewage toward the coast. The emergency bypass to Point Loma is used. It continues to be used, twice a month on average, through the end of the Sixties.

1971 — The emergency bypass is being used several times a day. (Tijuana's sewage flows have increased, fueled by the new water supply from the Rosarito Beach desalination plant, and the city's disposal facilities consequently break more often.) Throughout 1971, roughly eight percent of Tijuana's sewage is being treated in San Diego.

March 1972 — The Mexicans install new pumps at their pumping stations and announce plans for improving the open canal. They also talk about building new treatment facilities three miles south of the international boundary, but because of a shortage of money, no work on these plans begins.

January 1973 — The Mexicans announce plans for an elaborate treatment plant to be located fifteen miles southeast of Tijuana, at a cost of between four and eight million dollars. Construction is scheduled to begin later that year, but lack of funding causes an indefinite postponement.

April 30, 1975 — The Mexican press reports that a new sewage treatment plant is under construction a few miles south of Tijuana. But once again, lack of funding causes this plan to be abandoned, and the septic tank built in 1935 remains the city's only sewage treatment facility.

February 1978 — Failure of a pipeline causes raw sewage to spill into Smuggler's Gulch.

May 1979 — Tijuana's main pumping station experiences a major fail-

ure, and the open canal washes out 3.2 miles south of the border. From this time on, 70 percent of Tijuana's sewage is routed to the emergency bypass and the remainder flows across the border in a number of places.

RECENT CONFUSION: 1980-1988

Looking back on the events of the '70s, Pete Siltfa, a former IBWC engineer who now works on sewage issues for the City of San Diego, notes, "The emergency connection was sort of hiding the problem. It was taking all the load from Tijuana so the problems were minor." An act of nature was to shake up that complacency rather abruptly.

Late January 1980 — Storms bring heavy runoff and water from Rodriguez Dam coursing through the Tijuana River, and the force of that tide breaks the thirty-inch pipe that has been transporting the majority of Tijuana's sewage to Point Loma. More than 15 million gallons a day of Mexican sewage stream through the Tijuana estuary and out to sea, where unusually strong northbound currents created by the El Nino condition sweep the contaminants up the coast.

The San Diego county health department quarantines four miles of beach, from the border up to the naval amphibious base. Because of possible contamination to farm crops in the area, those crops cannot be sold, prompting a group of farmers to sue the city. (A jury eventually awards about \$600,000 to about a half-dozen of them.) Flows in the river water are so heavy that the emergency connection cannot be repaired until March. And excess raw sewage from Tijuana continues spilling into the U.S. until midsummer of 1980, requiring the continued closure of nearby beaches.

1981-1983 — Unusually rainy winters persist bringing many more sewage spills and quarantines. Dead farm animals washed up from Mexico are among the refuse found on beaches just south of Coronado.

April 14, 1982 — A "blue ribbon committee" is formed, consisting of representatives from a half-dozen American government agencies. They vow to abandon short-range thinking and come up with a permanent answer to the problem of Tijuana sewage spills. This leads to the commissioning of a major study in which the Lowry and Associates engineering firm is told to devise the ultimate solution to the problem.

November 1983 — The Lowry group's report is released. It concludes that the ultimate solution is for someone to build a treatment plant near the border that will process up to 130 million gallons a day of sewage — and cost some three-quarters of a billion dollars. Officials on both sides of the border are stunned by this figure. The Americans hastily revise their thinking about "long-term, permanent" solutions and order the Lowry engineers to come up with another report on short-term, interim alternatives.

July 1984 — The report on short-term and interim measures is completed. From among its offerings, the San Diego City Council endorses the idea of a 60-million-gallon-a-day, "bare bones" plant near the border that

would cost an estimated \$55 million.

Summer 1984 — The California legislature approves more than five million dollars to go toward construction of the bare-bones plant. But the federal government grants only five million dollars with the promise of only \$27 million more to come. Talk in San Diego shifts to building an even smaller facility, one that would process some 30 million gallons a day.

Late 1984 — As Mexico's application for the \$46.4 million IDB loan approaches fruition, various American officials see this as a great opportunity to pressure the Mexicans into doing something about sewage treatment. EPA officials lobby the IDB against granting Mexico any loan that doesn't have sewagecleaning strings attached to it. At the same time, American officials present Mexico with plans for a \$30 million, 30-milliongallon-a day international plant (to be built on the U.S. side). The Americans announce that the Mexicans will have to contribute half the money for this project in cash, up front.

February 4, 1985 — The Mexicans say thanks, but no thanks to the proposed binational plant. Instead, they formally announce they will build their own sewage treatment facilities in Tijuana, which they say will meet their needs at least up to the year 2000. The Americans don't like very much about any part of the Mexican plans. They also don't believe that the Mexican coastal plant will work very well. So the Americans immediately begin talking about building "defensive" measures to protect South Bay

residents against sewage spills that may occur in spite of the optimistic Mexican plans.

April 1985 — Lowry and Associates releases yet another study, this one of possible defensive measures, from which San Diego officials approve two ideas. The first \$3.8 million project would rig a system to catch the renegade flows that come through the five border basins and canyons and then pump this sewage to Point Loma for treatment, until the second \$31.6 million phase could be completed. This latter project would place a 66-inch pipeline extending from the San Ysidro border west to the ocean near Border Field State Park. Any and all runaway Mexican sewage would be captured by this pipe and then pumped up and over the border to the Mexicans' southbound open canal, for treatment and disposal at the coastal treatment plant. This latter idea comes to be known as "the Big Pipe."

August 1985 - The IBWC goes ahead and builds some scaled-down "surface interceptors." For about \$350,000, the boundary commission concocts a way to catch renegade sewage streams at the Stewart's and Silva drains and Canyon del Sol. (Instead of sending the stuff to Point Loma, the commission project simply pumps it the short distance across the border to the Tijuana pumping station that stands next to the highway leading to Las Playas.)

January 28, 1987 — With enormous fanfare, the Mexicans finally "inaugurate" the first phase of the coastal treatment plant at Punta Bandera. Mexican Presi-

dent Miguel de la Madrid arrives by helicopter to preside over the ceremony, and his secretary of ecology, Manuel Camacho Solis, promises American reporters that San Diego beaches will never be closed again because of Mexican sewage.

October 26, 1987 — The Punta Bandera plant breaks down, as two of three large holding ponds develop leaks. While the ponds are relined with clay and asphalt, the entire facility must be shut down, and raw sewage is dumped directly into the ocean at the discharge point five and a half miles south of the border.

March 8, 1988 — The San Diego City Council gives "conceptual approval" to revised plans for the so-called Big Pipe. The concept for the pipe has now ballooned to a twelve-foot-wide conduit that could carry more than 600 million gallons per day.

May 1988 — The Mexican sewage treatment plant at Punta Bandera returns to full operations. The Mexicans also have quietly announced that they will not build the second phase, which was to have doubled the capacity at Punta Bandera (even though they promised this construction in a 1985 treaty with the United States). According to American officials, the Mexicans have already spent an estimated \$30 million on the first phase alone — five times more than they had initially estimated. Instead of building on the problemplagued coastal site, the Mexicans indicate they plan to proceed with the proposed plant on the Rio Alamar.

And so it goes...



San Diego Reader: What is your favorite subject on which to preach?

Pastor John Ko: Time is short. Luke 12 tells the parable about the rich fool. It's a message I preach to many college students, since that's the focus of our ministry. The parable is about a man who hits it big, as if he played all the

stock markets right, got the best job and was so successful in life. But the one thing he didn't realize is that he had a short amount of time. Instead of thinking about the afterlife or God, he only thought about himself. It's a reminder that we only have a short amount of time on earth and we should invest the time we have properly. This subject is particularly important for students, because college is the most formational time for a person to make decisions about their belief in God, their purpose, who they are and what their life is about.

SDR: What is the mission of vour church?

PK: WAV stands for With

a Vision. We're part of a larger network called Acts 2 Network. Our vision is to launch lifelong Kingdom workers — those who will work in our church but can also work anywhere else, serving God in some intentional way — from every college we can. We believe in many kinds of ministries, but the college is where all those ministries start. Our network is called Acts 2, because Acts 2:42-47 is a picture of the early church operating as a close community. We want

to build that kind of close

community, one in which its

members love one another

and God, and share the gos-

pel with others on college

campuses. We have a lot of

members who have graduated from college but decided to stay to help out. They're volunteer staff, and they have day jobs, but they come to campus at night to mentor college students in life, career and spiritual things. We call it bilocational ministry.

SDR: What one book has had the greatest influence on your ministry?

PK: One book I go back to again and again is Mere Christianity by C.S. Lewis. He so plainly and elegantly explains chief spiritual principles with practical examples and explanations. His logic is tight and clear, and that resonates with a lot of college students.

SDR: Where do you when

PK: The Bible is clear that there is a heaven and a hell, and we'll all face God in judgment. Ultimately, where we go is not based on what we've done, on how good or bad we've been. None of us can meet God's perfect standard, but if we put our trust in Jesus, since he is the one who paid the price for our sins, then he becomes our

live with God forever. Still, something is required on our part. We have to admit we're sinners, confess our need for Christ, and receive his forgiveness. But that's freely given to every person to choose. If they choose not to accept that gift, they are separated from God, which is called hell — eternal regret, "gnashing of teeth" is how it's described. Hell is a separation from all that is good and lovely. God doesn't punish us for having the wrong answer. Rather, we choose how we want to live, either with him or apart from him. - Joseph O'Brien

Floss silk tree blooms, Waxwings arrive, Black oaks go gold for fall

The Floss Silk Tree, a conspicuous "autumn bloomer" here and there around San Diego, has been showing off its pinkish (or purplish) hibiscus-like flowers for at least a month now. The broad, heavy trunks of this South American import, which are studded with fat, cone-shaped spines, makes it easy to identify.

Cedar Waxwings Are Making Their Way to Southern California. Arriving as early as September and hanging out through April,

they almost look like they are made of porcelain, with their perfectly crafted feathers. Waxy red droplets may dot the ends of their flight feathers, formed by the wax of the small fruits they consume. Keep an ear open for their high-pitched trills as they flock around the highest branches of trees. Balboa Park is a favorite hangout.

The Tawny Autumnal Hues of the Black Oak Tree are just beginning to highlight the slopes of San Diego County's higher mountains. Named for the dark coloring of its bark, especially when wet, the black oak is the only deciduous oak native to the county. Often seen in association with pines, firs, cedars, various evergreen oaks, and occasionally chaparral, the black oak lends its true autumn coloring to the Cuyamaca, Laguna, and Palomar mountains.

The Rocky Horror Show

The most extraordinary thing about Cygnet's production of Richard O'Brien's sex-soaked sci-fi sendup The Rocky Horror Show is its casting of the huge and handsome Nathan Madden as the sweet transvestite from Transexual, Transylvania, Dr. Frank 'n Furter. Frank has been "making a man with blond hair and a tan" up in his lab, the sort of fellow who doesn't need dynamic tension to look good in a Speedo. But while it's true that Josh Bradford's Rocky is a marvel of definition, the good (bad) doctor dwarfs and outshines him — especially in heels and drag makeup. It's a bold move, one that works as well as it does mostly due to Madden's manner: how can someone so substantial seem so...mercurial? But It lends a more sinister cast to the act of Rocky's creation: this is not the work of a tortured little alien from an androgynous

planet who is seeking to create a masculine ideal, a god whom he might worship even as it services him. No, this is a pretty plaything made for a monster of control — much prettier than the previous one, who gets carved up with a chainsaw when he breaks out of cold storage. And that brings me to the second most extraordinary thing about the show: for all its famed on-stage naughtiness (the raciest bits are done in silhouette), it's wildly straight about its morality. Rock and roll really does lead to sexual excess and ultimate destruction (poor Eddie). Alien dudes who dress in women's clothing really are out to corrupt and destroy decent Americans (poor Brad and Janet). Using surgery to pursue perfection really does lead to a crisis of identity (poor Rocky). And you really can't get by with the living-my-truth mantra of "Don't dream it, be it" (poor Frank). But at least you can have campy comedy, catchy tunes and a killer floor show! The Fall — The second film by the one-name Tarsem (unused surname, Singh) differs by two letters from his first film, The Cell. It differs by little in other ways as well, a gagging phantasmagoria of debased and diluted surrealism. (Suggested title for his next onus. The Pill) The story. a fiction-within-fiction wherein a suicidal stuntman of the silent era whiles away the hours in a hospital ward by spinning an "epic" revenge tale for a broken-armed little girl, has hints of substance and dabs of invention; but the visual style of the "epic," a sort of fashion-shoot fotonovela, is ineluctably eye-glazing. The slow movement of Beethoven's Seventh behind the opening credits, perhaps the most oft-used classical piece in movies, or perhaps second or third to Handel's "Hallelujah Chorus" and Pachelbel's Canon, bodes ill for originality. With Lee Pace and Catinca Untaru. 2006. — D.S. Ø (IN WIDE RELEASE)

The Substance — Writer-director Coralie Fargeat's long and lurid cautionary tale - anything so laden with body horror must surely be cautionary, right? - very much wants to have its cheesecake and eat it, too. Which is to say, the film treats the Awful Truth that Showbiz (the people who make it and the people who consume it) worships youth, and is mildly horrified by aging, while at the same time slavering over that selfsame youth and jabbing that mild horror with a needle full of nightmare juice. The story concerns Elisabeth Sparkle (Demi Moore, who seems to have watched Gloria Swanson in Sunset Boulevard and declared. "Hold my beer"), an actress who won

an Oscar in her youth, grew famous enough to rate a star on the Walk of Fame, and then aged gracefully into a gig doing a fitness show on TV. (Paging Miss Fonda?) Now she's turning 50, and surprise, surprise, the network brass wants someone vounger. Somehow, our heroine is shocked – she never thought it would happen to her, even though that's been the story since forever. Live by the body, die by the body. But hey now, here's an underground lab that's offering - free of charge, for some reason — a solution: a substance that will allow Sparkle to shine again: seven days as herself, seven days as ingenue Sue (Margaret Qualley, in a turn

that screams "star" much louder than "actress"). She cheerfully sets out to replace herself, but even though both parties are constantly reminded that "You are One," it gets hard for them not to resent each other. The story feels like it's headed somewhere harrowing and haunting, but then it takes a hard left into insane violence. It's not that it doesn't make sense, it's just that it turns a tragedy into a spectacle. All the wince-inducing stuff that came before — the merciless close-ups on aging flesh, the needles plunging into thinning skin, the accelerating moral and physical decay — gets drowned in a sea of arterial spray. 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

There's a genre of chiptune that includes these retro sounds that were often called upon to provide this sound to game projects. My family thought I'd attempt becoming a game composer myself. I tried to do that, and am a bit of a hobbyist musician myself, but I didn't have the patience for perfecting my sound. Instead, I thought I would go into sound engineering to keep involved in that way. The most rewarding thing about this work is partnering with composers I've been a fan of since childhood and facilitating them creating even more music — while getting to hear

Unswayed by the sway

Jam band fans turn out for Goose at SDSU

Goose had been kicking around for five years by the time they played the jam-band heavy 2019 Peach Music Festival in Scranton, Pennsylvania. But that was the performance that paved the way for them to land on the bill at Dead & Company's 2020 Playing in the Sand event in Mexico. Their next tour was cancelled due to Covid, but since 2021, they have been playing sizable venues — such as our very own Cal Coast Credit Union Open Air Theatre, a venue with a storied concert history. That gig was in April 2023. I caught them at the same venue for their second go-around a year and change later.

About 15 minutes before showtime, I mistakenly plopped down in the correct row and seat —but the wrong section. I chatted for a bit with the guys next to me, who were

obviously big Goose fans. They informed me that singer/guitarist Rick Mitarotonda, and specifically his lead playing, was the beating heart of the band. This would prove to be correct. After becoming the subject of some upper-class ribbing due to my superior seating, I bid farewell to my friends in the nosebleeds with a sarcastic "So long peasants!" that

got some laughs. I then headed down to hang with the aristocrats closer to the stage. Once I landed in my actual seat, I took note that the theatre was very close to, if not completely, sold out. I will always give it up for jam band fans; they roll out to see the acts they love in force. I don't think there's a fanbase out there that is more dedicated to the live music experience.

As for myself, jam bands have always been an egg I've yet to truly crack...and it's not for lack of trying. I have seen many, many jam bands over the years. I have also been cornered by numerous randoms at bars and parties who then spent way too much of their time and mine trying to convince me that their favorite jam band was the greatest group on Earth and that I just had to "REALLY listen to them," at which point I

would "see the light." This assurance was usually followed by anywhere from 10 to 90 minutes of recruitment propaganda.

What caught my attention with Goose was that they've been portrayed by the press as being a jam band with a bit of an indie rock vibe. I figured that could be an interesting mix, but what sort of squashed it for me once they hit the stage — and I should have known this was coming — was that Goose is, first and foremost, a jam band. And the lengthy, expansive jams that jam band fans absolutely live for are the same long, drawn-out jams that make me appreciate Elliot Easton solos on Cars albums. So, even if the verse-and-chorus appetizer sections of Goose songs may share musical DNA with a band such as Wilco, the far-longer jam portions

are without a doubt the main course.

Still, once those jams kick in, watching thousands of fans lock into the music and dance in a hypnotic fashion is truly amazing. Hypnotic, even. Whenever I witness this live, I feel excluded, sadly incapable of being entranced by a magic spell that delivers pure euphoria. And when you throw in an epic light show like the one Goose served up, a person can become downright infuriated by the brain's failure to link up with everybody else's. I found myself envying the woman in front of me who was dancing furiously and waving her Japanese folding hand fan while losing her marbles to the music.

So, I was present at this show, but I wasn't present on the same wavelength as the majority of those in attendance. The tell that I was a square: I revealed to the couple sitting next to me in the aristocrats' section that I generally preferred the Grateful Dead's studio albums, especially American Beauty, to their live recordings. I could see their faces fall and feel their hearts sink as I told them this, as they had just revealed to me that they were huge Deadheads who still traveled to see Dead & Company concerts.

By the time Goose started their second set, that couple's seats were empty — and they stayed that way. I hoped that they had simply found better seats, and that they hadn't been scared off by my utterance of such nonsensical opinions whilst in the midst of so many true believers. ■

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A new standard for choral masterpieces

It was with a sense of anticipation that I arrived at the Jacobs Music Center on Friday, October 4. Gustav Mahler's Symphony No. 2 was my favorite piece of music once upon a time, but I had never heard it performed in person. In addition, I was amped up to hear the San Diego **Symphony Festival Chorus** sing at the conclusion of this masterpiece. To my knowledge, this was the first professionally auditioned chorus that the San Diego Symphony Orchestra has presented with at a Masterworks Concert.

Before the Mahler, there was Thomas Larcher and his composition Time. Modern music and all of its elements continue to exist on a plane beyond my comprehension. Perhaps it makes sense on the astral plane, but in the here and now. I continue to be perplexed.

The piece is an exploration of time, but I didn't get how it accomplished that. However, about a third of the way through, there was some rather lovely music that developed in a way I could understand. During the intermission, I eavesdropped on some of the conversations

around me. For the most part, my neighbors didn't get it. either.

I think the inclusion of this piece was unnecessary. With the addition of an intermission, the evening stretched to almost two and a half hours Mahler's Second could have been presented effectively as the only piece on the concert.

Some 30 years ago, I was all about Mahler's Second. I proselytized friends and family. I made my dad listen to the entire thing, at volume 11. in the confines of my cramped dorm room. I tracked down composition majors and forced them

to listen to the conclusion, also at volume 11. I had the thing memorized from start to finish. But it was never scheduled in San Diego. I finally had my chance to hear it performed, and it did not disappoint.

In the past, this piece was

all about the outer movements. The inner three movements were side dishes of boiled vegetables that Mahler forced me to eat before giving me the flaming entre at the conclusion. But on this night, the inner movements delighted my aging soul. The second movement was a welcome respite after

the tortured sufferings of the first. The third movement was all rambunctious fun, while the fourth movement was a calm and deep reflectina pool.

Contralto Anna Larsson floated onstage near the conclusion of the third movement to sing to the "Urlicht" text of the fourth movement. Ms. Larsson's comportment and bearing were regal, and her singing followed suit.

The final six minutes of the performance were as glorious as any I've ever experienced

in San Diego. The chorus was spectacular. The sound was full yet balanced. There was both a height and depth to the tone of the singing something that all great choruses have. I found my eyes getting a bit moist as they opened it up and matched the sonic outpouring of the orchestra in the concluding bars of the piece.

This performance set a new standard of excellence for choral masterpieces at The San Diego Symphony Orchestra.

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Peruvian pleasures

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Mama G brings saucy Peruvian flavors—and geography—to **Mission Valley**

Mama G's Kitchen & Sauces; 407 Camino del Rio S., San Diego. There was a Peruvian flag planted in the middle of my pasta, which had been tossed with large pieces of red onion, tomato, and sirloin. And just like that, I could reliably identify the flag of Peru. Few things teach geography better than steak.

I had to learn about Mama G's Kitchen & Sauces online. I would never have driven past it on my way anywhere, because it's in a little dead-end corner of Mission Valley, cut off by the 163 and 8 freeways and the busy corresponding onramps. Fortunately, I found this Peruvian restaurant to be worth the couple of curse words it took me to get there, and not only for the soy sauce and peppery steak in my fettucini. That would be the tallarin saltado, a pastafied version of the classic Peruvian stir fry, lomo soltado. Both are served here for \$17 (the lomo features french fries instead of noodles).

As much as I enjoy french fries, I had my eyes on Mama G's yucca fries. They were thick, and crispy on the outside — perfect examples of the french fry alternative. You could even get them loaded (a la carne asada fries), likely a holdover from Mama G's time as a farmers market vendor. Just like the soltado dishes, loaded fries were served with a choice of sirloin, chicken, or porto-

I tried my yucca fries as part of Mama G's Peruvian sampler (\$19). Now, if it strikes you ironic that a sampler representing Peru, where potatoes originally came from, would feature yucca fries, be assured that this sampler offers an convinc-

ing counter. Basically, Mama G has more interesting ways to handle potatoes. One is called papa a la huan-

caina (\$6), sort of a Peruvian potato salad, with slices of boiled potato, hard boiled egg, and lettuce smothered in a cheesy sauce mildly spiced with Peru's beloved aji (pronounced ah-hee) chili pepper.

A more interesting dish is called causa rellena (\$10). This is a pressed cake of cold, lime-flavored mashed potatoes, stuffed with a layer of either chicken or tuna salad. (My photo shows a smaller portion, or causita served with the sampler) Unusual as it sounds. I enjoyed this more than the other star of the Peruvian sampler, a swai ceviche, dressed with hominy and corn nuts.

Most of the sampler provided an opportunity to explore the "sauces" side of Mama G's Kitchen & Sauces. Look in a cooler in the shop's small dining room, and you'll see bottles for sale of four variations of a spicy, mayonnaise-based sauce that are marketed online and around Southern California as Mama G's Special Sauce (https://www.mamagsspecialsauce.com). Spiced with jalapeños, aji peppers, or another chili native to Peru, the spicier rocoto pepper.

Mama G herself is Gloria Tietjen, who on a video posted to Instagram says she started making these sauces when she moved to San Diego 25 years ago because they're one of the flavors she missed most while living far away from her native Lima. Which kind of makes me want to check out Lima, and also glad I only need to brave the fringes of Mission Valley to experience them.

Sudden late season yellowfin bite yields solid grade fish close to home - Massive tuna caught during the Los Cabos Open

Dock Totals 10/13 - 10/19: 2241 anglers aboard 111 half-day to 3-day trips out of San Diego landings over the past week caught 951 bluefin tuna (up to 150 pounds), 9 bocaccio, 30 calico bass, 5 halibut, 19 lingcod, 10 perch, 16 rock crab, 7935 rockfish, 70 sand bass, 350 sculpin, 24 sheephead, 66 spiny lobster (147 released), 956 whitefish, 270 yellowfin tuna (up to 80-pounds), and 126 yellowtail.

Saltwater: Go figure. After reporting last week on a lackluster year to date for yellowfin tuna within 3-day range of Point Loma, they showed up in force off the northern Baja coast within 1.5-day range. These aren't the football-sized units we often see up north; they are catching quite a few to 80 pounds in an area centering on 20 miles off Punta Colonet and south. Last week, reports of good-sized vellowfin tuna started coming out of Bahia Asuncion along the southern edge of the Vizcaino Peninsula, but to that point, we had seen very few north of Cedros Island but for one small flurry off Ensenada a month ago.

Normally, during season, we would see lots of them within a one-day boat ride of Point Loma in the 15- to 30-pound range with a few pushing 50 pounds, but these fish have mostly been on the beefy side of 40 pounds. This isn't a small spot of fish, as one boat reported; they are thick offshore from just south of Ensenada and south. After a very slow start on yellowfin this year, the Tribute, Oceanside 95, and other boats running short to mid-range trips have been getting good numbers of yellowfin over

the past few days, using all sorts of tactics — from trolling to deep-drop lures and fly-lined sardines. Even so, it has been a cooler than normal year, and we have yet to see any dorado mixed in with the yellowfin off northern Baja, which we usually do see in late summer and fall. There have been no storms pushing a south swell north, which usually pushes warmer water and semi-tropical species north of Isla Cedros and the mid-peninsula area.

An example of just how different it is this year: H&M Landing total year-to-date catch of yellowfin, including today's (Sunday, Oct 20) count of 153 caught, is 483 fish. Last year, H&M reported 7163 yellowfin caught. Dorado counts are 160 caught to date in 2024 for H&M boats, when last year's total was 13,602. That is a huge difference, especially since prime season is normally winding down by mid-October for the 3-day and shorter trips.

off Bahia Magdalena are usually 5- to 8-day runs, and those boats have been doing very well on good-sized vellowfin, wahoo, and dorado this season. To emphasize the quality of yellowfin down south: a 330-pounder just won the tuna division of the Bisbee's Los Cabos Open this weekend. That is now the largest yellowfin tuna caught in the long Bisbee's tournament history. Angler John Duffy of Team Broad Vision landed the brute yellowfin while fishing aboard Pisces Sportfishing's 62-foot Viking, Chasin' Tail. With 137 teams in the tournament, that is quite a feat. The fish netted \$109.090 dollars for the team in

The Captain of Chasin' Tail during the tournament was Pepe de la Peña. Fittingly, Captain Pepe was the mate aboard El Suertudo when they landed the IGFA World Record Yellowfin weighing 427 pounds in September of 2012. Angler Guy Yocom caught that fish, and he truly was the "lucky one" on the boat with the same name. Once the IGFA certified his catch, Yocom was awarded one million dollars from Mustad Hooks in their 'Hook a Million' competetion that year. Yocom's prize from Mustad was \$20,000 per year for fifty years, so he will still be getting paid for 38 more years for that one fortunate day of fishing back in 2012.

San Diego Anglers Open Bay Bass tournament also took place this last weekend, and though the official results have yet to be posted. I was informed that the winner of the boat division was 90-inches total for five fish.

That is impressive 18-inch average for five bass out of San Diego Bay. Species targeted were all three saltwater bass found in our waters; calico bass, spotted bay bass, and barred sand bass. Most of the fish caught and measured in the catch and release only tournament were barred sand bass.

Anglers in the two divisions, boat and kayak, had to take a photo on an official Ketch or Hog Trough measuring device, then release the fish unharmed. Gotta give the San Diego Anglers club some props for their format: by utilizing these measuring devices, weigh-inn, which can cause undue stress to fish that are to be released, are no longer necessary. There was also a jackpot for largest halibut caught in the tournament, which was reported unofficially to be 32-pounds. The official results for both the boat and kayak divisions should be posted by early in the week. Whether the beach, bay, lake, or offshore, they're out there so go out and get 'em!

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Field Report

- At the annual World Conker Championship in Southwick, England, on Oct. 13, veteran player Dave Jakins, 82, won the men's tournament, the Associated Press reported. (Conkers is a traditional game played using the seeds of horse chestnut trees threaded on string; players try to strike and break each other's conkers.) But controversy followed when Jakins was found to have a steel conker in his pocket. His opponent, Alastair Johnson-Ferguson, said his own conker "disintegrated in one hit" after Jakins struck it. "He was very closely watched by four judges," said St. John Burkett, chair of the event's organizing committee. "It looks like it was absolutely impossible for him to cheat." Jakins has denied cheating.

Saw That Coming

- An unnamed woman in Kitsap County, Washington, admitted to authorities that she'd been feeding about "a dozen" raccoons in her yard over the past 35 years, The New York Times reported. Several weeks ago, more raccoons started showing up, and on Oct. 3, the homeowner had to call 911 when about 100 animals arrived and became more aggressive. "Anytime she comes out of her house," said sheriff's department spokesperson Kevin Mc-Carty, "they swarm her until she throws them food. ... The new ones showing up scare her." The woman fled her home, and local trappers were going to charge \$500 per animal to remove the raccoons. So the state department of fish and wildlife stepped in, suggesting that she simply stop feeding them. "The raccoons appear to have started dispersing now that they are no longer being fed," the department

Ironies

- When cops in Portland, Oregon, pulled over a 1994 Ford Taurus that had been stolen on Oct. 9, they met Reginald Reynolds, 35, and Mia Baggenstos, 37, along with their toys: a loaded .357 Magnum, a bag of methamphetamine, \$1360 in cash, three white pills that Baggenstos said were OxyContin, and a meth pipe. The Smoking Gun reported that a vehicle search yielded more meth, two scales, and a "brown bag that said on it, 'Definitely not a bag full of drugs." Inside, they found more meth - a total of about a half-pound. Both were charged with multiple felonies.
- In Stadtallendorf, Germany, on Oct. 16, a state-of-the-art fire station that had been open less than a year ... burned to the ground, The Guardian reported. The fire started in a vehicle and quickly spread, destroying 10 fire engines and causing between 20 and 24 million Euros' worth of damage. "It is a nightmare for a firefighter," said district fire inspector Lars Schafer. He went on to say that the station was not required to have fire alarms because it was classified as a building holding equipment. Schafer said the building would be reconstructed quickly, for safety and for local

Oops!

- In early October, The New York Times reported, passengers aboard a Qantas flight from Sydney, Australia, to Tokyo were treated (or not) to an R-rated film with "sexual material and brief graphic nudity" on their seat screens – and it couldn't be turned off. Because of technological problems, passengers weren't able to choose their entertainment, so the crew queued up Daddio, starring Dakota Johnson and Sean Penn, and let it run for about an hour before switching to something more familyfriendly. "It was super uncomfortable for everyone," one Reddit user wrote. "We apologize to customers for this experience," a Qantas spokesperson said.
- The BBC apologized on Oct. 10 after releasing a weather forecast predicting winds in London of 20,000 kilometers (13,000 miles) per hour, Yahoo! News reported. Matt Taylor, a meteorologist for the network, soothed concerns: "Hurricane Milton hasn't made it to us here in the U.K.!" He added that a data glitch had caused the extreme forecast, also warning of overnight temperatures of 759 degrees Fahrenheit in Nottingham. "Folk are working to solve the issue," Taylor assured Brits.

Animal Antics

- Paraglider Marshall Mosher of Atlanta, Georgia, was drifting over the Great Pyramid of Giza in Egypt on Oct. 14 when he noticed something unexpected walking around the top of the structure, the

New York Post reported. Mosher posted a zoomed-in photo of a dog on Instagram with the caption, "A dog climbed all the way up the Great Pyramid of Giza!" Viewers worried about the dog's safety, but back on the ground, Mosher posted again standing next to the adventurous dog and explained that dogs in the area often climb up and down the 454-foot-tall pyramid. People have nicknamed the pooch Anubis Pup after the Egyptian god of the underworld, who is often portrayed with a canine head.

Wait, What?

- The Journal of Medical Case Reports published on Oct. 9 the highly unusual case of a cadaver of a 78-year-old man that was revealed to have three penises -- only the second recorded case of triphallia, a condition just discovered for the first time four years ago in a 3-month-old Iraqi child. From the outside, the man's genitalia seemed normal, but as the body was dissected, researchers found two smaller penises situated behind and below the primary one. Such occurrences are thought to result from genetic mutations.

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
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
