




Car wars, continued City revisits ban on drive-throughs

Carlsbad's longstanding ban on new drivethrough restaurants is being reconsidered; in part because the city continues to receive requests to build them. According to the Carlsbad Community Development Department, the number of commercial property owners who want to start a fast food restaurant has "increased significantly through the Covid-19 pandemic."

Last week, the planning commission discussed options to regulate them. Everything was on the table, from keeping the ban to allowing new drive-thru restaurants

Comment letters from locals urging the city to keep the ban suggest that many still have the concerns that first gave rise to it in 1997: a spike in traffic and the loss of community character amid a spate of development in the 1990s that included Legoland, Carlsbad Premium Outlets, and Costco, the city's first big box store.

A city council study of fast-food land uses in 1996 focused on preventing a boom

citywide. After hearing from the planning commission and locals, the Carlsbad City Council will make the final decision. Among the possibilities presented was permitting certain types of businesses "by right" - skipping the public hearing process as long as specific zoning standards are met.

of poorly designed fast-food sites: businesses seen as ruining walkability and traffic circulation while adding signs, litter, noise, and fumes from idling engines.

Currently, the city has 12 drive-thru restaurants — the ones already in place when the ban took effect. Nine are clustered in just two areas: five in Carlsbad Village and four near the Palomar Airport Road/Interstate 5 intersection. Another two are located within Poinsettia Village.

In June, Chick-fil-A — which features

drive-through in about 60 percent of their stores — opened at 5848 Avenida Encinas. The company claims to make up for its lack of drive-through with its 34 curbside mobile order spots.

Other California cities have been trying to rein in fast food by barring or restricting drive-throughs in certain areas, such as a historic downtown; by requiring a traffic

study; by setting design standards such as where the drive-thru lane is located or requiring a minimum amount of space for cars to line up; and by limiting hours. San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara, and several others have banned them altogether. Los Angeles bans them in certain low-income neighborhoods. But in San Diego, a proposed ban on drive-throughs near mass transit in 2021 was defeated by the restaurant industry.

If Carlsbad reverses their rules, they won't be the first California city to do so. In August, Loma Linda in San Bernardino County lifted their ban on new drivethrough restaurants.

BRUTES AND BEASTS **Critter crime on the rise** Pilfered pups are one thing, but is someone trying to make turtle soup? In recent months, stolen pets and bizarre pet theft incidents have stirred up communi-

border. Local internet groups and social media platforms are buzzing with reports of missing animals — ranging from turtles to dogs and even horses — raising concerns over pet theft, bizarre criminal encounters,

and scams targeting pet owners desperate to recover their beloved companions.

Over the recent weekend, A. Gonzalez from Facebook captured a concerning encounter on video in Ocean Beach: it shows a man suspiciously "walking car per car, checking door handles." In her post, she shared that she had confronted him: "I knocked him down after he tried grabbing my dog!"

In another instance, horse trainers across San Diego County shared missing posters for a horse named Cash, a 15-year-old red dun gelding with distinct white markings, who disappeared from Prescott, Arizona, and is now said to be in the San Diego or Oceanside area.

South of the border in Tijuana, someone reportedly driving a blue Chevy Tahoe stole a small pug-chihuahua mix named Percy. Percy's owner shared that he has a curled tail with a black spot and a small dangling finger on his hind leg, a distinct feature that

makes him recognizable. Other reports of stolen pets across Tijuana have surfaced on the Perritos Perdidos en Tijuana Facebook page recently.

Meanwhile, back in San Diego, Kensington resident Mindi Davis took to the Next-Door app to share that six large turtles were stolen from the Good Vibrations Sanctuary on September 27. Some neighbors speculated that animal activists might have taken the turtles, while another suggested the turtles could have been stolen for culinary purposes.

Around the time the turtles were stolen, a small black dog named Millie was stolen from its owner at the Jack In the Box in Little Italy on Pacific Highway. The owner offered a reward of \$2500 on Reddit.

Jeanette M., who lives just west of where the turtles were stolen, reported a frightening encounter in City Heights last April. She warned neighbors about a bald Hispanic man, about 6 feet tall and 180-200 pounds, who chased her and attempted to snatch her continued on page 5

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French Bulldog. "I was able to get away, and cops were called," she shared. Since 2021, French Bulldogs have become a top target for dognappers, especially after Lady Gaga's two Frenchies were stolen in a violent incident where her dog walker was shot. According to the Dogster website, around 10 million pets go missing or are stolen across the U.S. each year.

In San Diego, turtle thefts are rare; however, last year, an older man was reportedly caught trying to steal a tortoise from an exhibit hosted by the San Diego Turtle and Tortoise Society in Balboa Park, prompting a call to the police.

On October 4, Mindi Davis provided a hopeful update on the stolen turtles in Kensington: two of the six missing turtles had been returned to the sanctuary. "Thank you to the person who had a change of heart," she wrote

Schools abruptly canceled physical education classes in the southern part of the county after a "chemicals of war" warning from a local emergency care physician went viral. battery fire at the SDG&E facility released harmful fumes, prompting the city to order evacuations of nearby residents. And across the border, a Tesla that was allegedly being charged directly from a utility pole caught fire, sending dangerous reportedly activated on September 12 in Tijuana to divert sewage away from the Tijuana River, sewage which typically flows into the waters off Imperial Beach and South San Diego. "The smell isn't completely gone, but it's better than it was for months," she said, adding, "I've had symptoms like headaches, nausea, sore throat, eye irritation, and trouble sleeping because the smells wake me up." On September 9, before a crowd in

fumes into the atmosphere.

In Imperial Beach, mortgage broker Amy Driscoll says she's been getting sick from the "sewage and toxic" smell from the Tijuana River. The stench has become so unbearable that she's resorted to using three air purifiers in her home. "The smell has improved since Mexico turned their pumps on, but I don't expect that to last," Driscoll told me. "It's the same story over and over."

Driscoll was referring to a third pump,

SDSU's un-transferred Com-

munity college students from San Diego and elsewhere around the state are losing out on a quality education, and much of the blame lies with California's university system, particularly San Diego State University. So says a September 24 report by California State Auditor **Grant Parks**. "Only about 1 in 5 students who began community college from 2017 to 2019 and intended to transfer did so within four years, and transfer rates were even lower for

students from certain regions and demographic groups," the newly released document says, adding that some state schools, including SDSU, are dramatically worse than others.

"When we examined majors that had low transfer representation within specific campuses, we identified some — mostly at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo and San Diego State — that exhibited indications they may be denying qualified transfer applicants."

SDSU management protested the conclusions, but auditors were unswayed. "When we analyzed graduation data — which considers only those students who ultimately earned a degree — we still found that certain [California State University] majors, such as biological sciences at San Diego State, awarded fewer than one-third of their degrees to transfer students. In other words, transfer representation remained low for many majors even when we adjusted for freshmen changing their majors."

Per the findings, "Cal Poly San Luis Obispo and San Diego State had the lowest campus transfer admission rates — 19 percent and

30 percent, respectively from academic years 2018–19 through 2022–23. Moreover, these two campuses admitted transfer applications to their computer science majors at rates of just 8 percent and 13 percent, respectively."

According to the document, "San Diego State's associate vice president for enrollment management acknowledged that some impacted majors, such as biological sciences, have denied trans-

fer applicants who meet the major's admissions requirements, although campus officials identified that recent trends show higher transfer admission rates in Fall 2023 and 2024, including in high-demand majors. Auditors remained unconvinced and called for more rapid reform. Although most transfer students who applied to CSU and [the University of California] gained admission to at least one campus in those systems, [community college] students still struggle to transfer," says Parks's letter.

The situation has become so bad that many community college students, although potentially qualified, don't even bother to pursue a higher education. "The vast majority of students who did not transfer never reached the point of applying to CSU or UC, mainly because they had not earned enough units. The three systems could help increase transfer rates by improving the outreach

> and support they provide to transfer-intending students. For example, [California Community Colleges] could ensure that students receive counseling and develop education plans so that they have a clear roadmap for transferring. The three systems could also share data about transfer students to help campuses make more targeted outreach efforts. Additionally, for students who earn enough units to transfer,

CSU and UC could facilitate access to their preferred degree programs by ensuring that competitive campuses and majors adequately prioritize transfer applicants for admission."

reported smelling the fumes as far as 50 miles away. One user commented, "It smells horrible in Carlsbad by the beach. It smells toxic." Another mentioned, "I could smell a faint toxic smell in San Juan Capistrano this afternoon." The gases released during a lithium-ion battery fire are particularly hazardous, as they are combustible, poisonous, or both. "Any fire puts off toxic gases, and the gases from a lithium-ion battery fire are even more dangerous," said Matt Salmon of the San Diego Fire-Rescue Department in a recent Fox 5 San Diego news report.

Electric vehicle batteries fires are another growing concern, as demonstrated by a recent incident involving a Tesla Model S with California license plates, according to the Milenio news outlet. On August 5, the car caught fire in the Colonia Lázaro Cárdenas neighborhood of Tijuana after the driver connected it to a Comisión Federal de Electricidad utility pole. The fire destroyed the Tesla and engulfed the house next to where it was parked.

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BLOCKFALL AND BLAME

PART 1: Fallout from the fatal fissure in Encinitas

The cliff collapse

On August 2, 2019, at around 1 pm, Dr. J. Patrick Davis, his wife, Julie Davis, Julie's sister, Elizabeth Charles Cox, and Pat and Julie's daughter, Annie Davis Clave — all three of them mothers — accompanied by Pat and Julie's adult daughter, Elizabeth McCullagh, a dozen wavetagging kids and several neighbor moms, 20 in all, descended a four-sectioned, rickety stairway to picnic on Grandview Beach at the north end of Encinitas. The Davis, Cox, and Clave families were in high spirits. They were celebrating a milestone: Elizabeth Cox's breast cancer, following a long stressful treatment, was in remission.

Above them towered a sandstone cliff 80 feet high. That summer at Grandview, thousands of beachgoers flipflopped down the zigzag stairs to the sand; they may or may not have noticed a sign warning that the cliffs along the narrow beach were unstable. In fact, Annie, Pat and Julie's daughter, asked the lifeguard Quinn Norwood, stationed in his tower with a broad

beach overlook, for the best place to set up. He said — this according to Davis family members — to nestle their chairs, towels, surfboards, toys, and umbrella against the sea-cliff toe, an exposed

spot at the base of the cliff-face, about 30 feet from his tower.

(In his deposition, Norwood admitted that in lifeguard training, he is told to advise people when he can to stay 10 to 15 feet from the cliff base because being too close is dangerous. "Rocks can tumble," he said. Especially along the narrow Grandview Beach. He noted, however, that to warn of a potential "collapse" is not his "primary duty." His duty, "95% of my job," is to

> watch swimmers and surfers and notify them about risky rip currents. He said that he didn't remember telling the Davis cohort to choose any particular place. The families dispute this.)

Under a blistering sun, a spotty wind tussled about, but the scene was serene. Tucked under the notch, the assembled party had a panoramic view of their kids playing in the waves breaking on shore, teens waist-deep in the littoral ebb and flow, and veteran family surfers riding five-foot swells. The day pearled with sunshine. The high tide was receding, retired pediatric dentist Pat Davis said in interviews and depositions. He knows the vicissitudes of North County beaches from his regular visits over 50 years.

At 2:54 - cracked watches fixed the time – approximately 15 feet above the families, an outcropping of the cliff suddenly severed, unloosing a block of cemented sandstone, 15-20 cubic yards, or 50 tons, a hard bluff-bottom layer called the Santiago formation. No one knew whether this chunk, crowned and crowded with ice plant, had begun fissuring 100 or 1000 years ago, or even from an unfelt tremor just that morning. No one knew - though many coastal geologists suspected - how saturated the cliff base was with groundwater. No one knew whether the wedge's mass had split internally, creating a "failure plane" and leaving it ready to cleave. Whatever it was, in that moment, the chunk — as heavy as two full garbage trucks – shrugged and fell forward.

In its coverage, San Diego Union-Tribune reporters as well as witnesses who were interviewed lat-

er described how the three adult women were sitting close together. As they toasted Elizabeth Cox's good "cancer news" and the children scampered around the picnic spot, Pat was positioned next to his wife Julie. When the sandstone bulk broke and fell, he was left untouched. But Julie was buried. He frantically dug through the sand, seeking to dig a hole through which she might breathe. He clawed and clawed, but he couldn't reach her. Then, turning to "his cherished daughter Annie," who was also trapped beneath the fallen earth, he cradled her head in his lap. A reporter wrote that as he held her, "her blood seeped into his lap and clothing." Close by, Elizabeth's daughter, Rachel Cox, had been seated near her mother when the chunk fell. Her injuries took her to the hospital, but not before she glimpsed part of her mother's body in the rubble. Most of the kids, including Pat and Julie's grandchildren, were in the water or moving toward it. Annie's daughter and son, five and seven, stood near their mother's chair moments before the collapse. As luck or fate would have it, they had stepped away.

Dead — at the scene or after being transported to the hospital — were sisters Julie Davis, 65, and Elizabeth Charles Cox, 62, and Pat and Julie's daughter, Annie Davis Clave, 35.

According to Pat Davis and plaintiff lawyers as well as court filings, depositions, and videos, Rachel Cox, the surviving daughter of the deceased Elizabeth Cox, incurred extreme mental anguish the moment she saw the severed body of her mother, seconds after the collapse. The cause of Elizabeth Cox's death was

"multisystem blunt force crushing injuries due to complete body fragmentation." Her heart was never recovered.

The Union-Tribune's online headline quoted a nearby resident, Jim Pepperdine. He'd heard the sirens on Neptune Avenue,

the long one-way street on the blufftop, biked past palm trees and the colonies of invasive ice plant that drape over many cliff faces, and ran down the three-decade-old stairs. On the beach, he saw the sandstone monolith. Later, a reporter asked him to describe what he saw as he watched first responders scramble to disinter whoever was under the blockfall.

Pepperdine summed up the tragedy with grim humor: "It was a normal beach day gone awry."

Liabilities

"Normal" beach days notwithstanding, Southern California's oceanside cliffs are fissure-prone. Sun and wind erode them, while water tapers their faces into rills and seeps into their presumed solidity. Small chunks often separate and fall, but rarely does a 50-ton block give

way. There was, most likely, a complex amalgam of causes: permeable terrace deposits on top; landscape and lawn overwatering (in one year, up-top grasses might absorb the equivalent of 50 inches of rain); the tonnage weight of irrigated ice plant and palms; and the pressure of homes and condos and parking lots plunked on top — the all-too-typical composition of San Diego's residential and urbanized coast. When the tragedy was examined in light of the law, the key questions were: who was responsible for this coastal crime against the 10 plaintiffs? Should up-top home and condo owners be held accountable for damages to the people on the beach below? And what significant remediation efforts could state and local governments offer to lessen or prevent such catastrophes?

In August 2020, one year after the tragedy, Athena Trial Lawyers filed a lawsuit on behalf of "10 plaintiff-family members," which involved the Davis, Cox, and Clave families — six surviving adults and four children, the latter named in the claim but not identified here. (For the sake of simplicity, I'll refer to the case as the Davis lawsuit.) Under the direction of personal injury attorney Bibi Fell, who specializes in cases "for those who have lost loved ones," the suit alleged that the 10 suffered "bystander emotional distress" and possessed "wrongful death claims." The plaintiffs argued that the collapse was the responsibility of four defendants, entities who willfully neglected to keep the Grandview beach safe and were, therefore, liable. Two were the Leucadia-Seabluffe Village Community Association, owners of the property at the top of the cliff, above the blockfall, and the Seabreeze Management Company, caretakers of the properties and landscaping. The other two were the city of Encinitas and the state of California's Department of Parks and Recreation.

California Penal Code 831.2 states, "Neither a public entity nor a public employee is liable for an injury caused by a natural condition of any unimproved public property." The public entity here was the city of Encinitas — and the lifeguard Quinn Norwood, the city's employee. The Davis lawsuit argued that two tenets of the code were violated: The Grandview cliff was not in its "natural condition" and its property was not "unimproved." In short, the cliff had been tampered with - de-

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stabilized — for decades. (Much of the California coast, under private control, has also become geologically dysfunctional due to shoddy human fixes.)

Grandview Beach is owned by the state. Under an arrangement between the state and the city of Encinitas, Encinitas agreed to "develop, operate, control and monitor" the beach "to minimize potential hazards to public health, safety, and welfare and to prevent the loss of life and damage to health and property resulting from both natural and man-made phenomena." This agreement included the staircase. The Athena complaint

asserted that the four defendants were responsible separately for monitoring the cliff's stability. Had the bluff been left in its untainted state, it would have possessed "natural" immunity — a legal status, albeit a confusing one. But once a beach access site is "improved," that is, altered and built on, remediated and overwatered, that status becomes contestable. Improvements subjected the cliff to stressors beyond what the access site could handle. In sum, the suit alleged that the four entities surrounding the August 2019 collapse created "an unnatural, unstable, and unsafe urbanized cliff," aptly termed "a death trap."

It's typical for an injury lawsuit involving negligence and the loss of life to limp along through mediation and court challenges, sometimes for years. It grows untypical when the case, as the suit alleged, interlocks "decades of conflict between the competing interests of municipalities, beachfront property owners, interest groups, and the state of California."

Loss and justice

While waiting for a proposed settlement to pass muster in Sacramento this summer. I met with Pat Davis in the Mission Valley office of Bibi Fell's firm, Fell Law. Now retired, Davis headed a pediatric dentistry group in Encinitas for more than 45 years; his sons continue to practice there. He is a fit man, a bike enthusiast who since the tragedy has eased into a degree of provisional wisdom, but also tears up by memories of the three women he lost. His wife and her sister was "bad enough," he said. But to think about "my beloved daughter ... "

Davis was eager to outline, and comment on, the history of the three families' lawsuit. Just one month after the accident, then-Encinitas mayor Catherine Blakespear walked the beach with him. He said she offered to improve the "signage" on the beach and promised she would "run it by me to see if you think the language is strong enough." He never heard from her again. Davis contacted Mike Levin, U.S. Congressman from District 49, now redistricted, San Juan Capistrano to Solana Beach (result: more coast). A month later, Levin read a statement in Congress about Davis and the families' loss and pleaded for money to help remediate San Diego beaches and bluffs. (Levin has helped secure federal dollars for sand replacement projects.) In February 2020, Davis testified before Congress about the dangers of the bluffs. (He got to attend President Trump's State of the Union address, the "one where Nancy Pelosi ripped it to shreds.") He met with Republican State Senator Pat Bates and testified twice before the state senate in Sacramento. Bates, prior to her retirement, proposed bills that would allow "cities, the state, and homeowners to protect their bluffs" for the safety of "people down below." Small world — today, Bates' seat is occupied by Blakespear.

After hearing a host of big-talk, little-do promises, Davis, as he said, now advocates for beach safety himself. To turn the tragedy into a "cause" is energizing. But activism also creates a paradox. Haranguing the Encinitas city council to tighten regulations on behalf of its citizenry gave Davis purpose and voice. But it also waylaid his despair, which, he said, accumulated inside him.

Nearly all accidentchasing attorneys who explored a potential lawsuit told Davis that "because of these huge immunity factors that [defendants' attorneys] will throw into these things, you'll never get anywhere." He decided on the Athena Trial Lawyers, an all-female firm, and Bibi Fell,

who understood there was "enough negligence" to proceed not to settlement but to trial. Survivor testimony detailing the horrors of the collapse, plus the scientific evidence, maent the case was "easily winnable," Fell said. Everyone's confidence in the case drove the plaintiffs' moral engine for the first few years. But, eventually, after unending stipulations, dismissals, motions, and other entanglements, their stalwart resolve began to wane, and a settlement grew likely.

While neither Davis nor Fell would comment on the negotiations, Davis brought up the money,

which he said would be sizable. "Not that I'm going to expect any particular dollar amount," he noted, "but \$100 million isn't a just amount of money for three women's lives." He continued: "Whether it's \$200 or \$300 million — that means nothing. Money was never my intent." His family's goal was "some" — he paused, I thought, to weigh the strange bond between loss and justice — "some satisfaction, some justification, for these women and why they died."

History lessons

In Encinitas, there are six access points to the water. all noted surf spots, each with its own geographic turn of tide and gratuity of sand: from south to north, there's Swami's, "D" Street, Moonlight, Stone Steps, Beacons, and Grandview. Grandview Beach is the county's narrowest beach abutting one of the region's highest bluffs. In 1978, as condo complexes and apartment buildings proliferated along the clifftops, a staircase was built from Neptune Avenue in Leucadia down to the beach. Rain and wind during the violent 1982/1983 El Nino



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winter battered the stairs.

On April 1, 1983, according to the deposition of Sydney Brown, retired geologist with the California Department of Parks and Recreation, "an 82-foot-long section of the sandstone sea cliff fell against the lower portion of the stairway and knocked down three of the four pilings." The chunk that fell stuck out "about 19 feet seaward" and came down from "20 feet up." Several people were injured, one suffering a broken leg. Brown noted that the rupture of "joints" in the Santiago Formation begins when water in the terrace deposits "percolates" to the cliff base, collecting in a "perched water table." There, the cliff undergoes a "cementing" process as "iron oxide minerals" in the sand shrink and swell its grains; these, in turn, harden into "parallelograms" and begin to fissure "in predictable ways," from small to large to very large. In 1984, there was another blockfall at Grandview. It was 102 feet long.

While Brown acknowledged that blocks have let loose for thousands of years and that rain

can swamp the mostly steady perched table, the past half-century of urbanization along North County's cliffs has destabilized the bluff far more than nature would have, had they been left alone. "Once a slight preference is found," Brown stated, and the cliff's bedrock is pulled seaward, "that becomes even more the preference." Her 1983-1985 report warned: "Do not reinstitute public access down the bluff" at Grandview.

Five years later, a consultancy firm dug into the cliffside and found it "had numerous points of weakness ...including... extensive groundwater seepage [from] excessive watering of lawns and nonnative vegetation," not to mention "onsite sewage disposal (septic tanks, leach lines, and cesspools)." According to the Davis lawsuit, "On the day of the [1983] incident, the ice plants added approximately 286 pounds of downward pressure on" that year's blockfall. What's more, Phillip Broderick, who owned the land on which the staircase sits, tried to sell the land to the city, expressing "concern over the liability, considering the past history of the stairs."

Another five years,

and the stairway, both opposed and championed, was finally rebuilt, with massive lag bolts to hold it up. Geologists recommended sinking the pillars 70 feet down; the engineers sunk them (the pillars, not the geologists) 35 feet. A seawall was built and sealed at the base with eight drainage pipes. Those fortifications, according to Fell, were done on the south side of the staircase; the 2019 cliff collapse occurred just north of the stairs. What's more, landscapers planted ten palm trees and other flora on top of the cliff, apparently, forgetting that more plants take more water and more water may collect in the sandstone. Who knows why these additions, ranging from necessary to half-assed, were piled on. One result: a cliff consultant declared in 1992 that "the structural life of the Grandview Stairway [was reduced] from 50-75 years to 10-20 years."

A geologist described another effect of these fixes. As water leeched out onto the vertical surface, the cliff-face became grooved with runnels, the starkly ugly hourglass shapes called "drip castles."

Bluffs regularly erode, crumble, slip, and fall along California's 1110 miles of coastline and 850 public access beaches. To hold back the slow disintegration, ten percent of the coastal bluffs are armored. Fell said that the most agreed-upon cause of blockfalls, at least in San Diego County, has been slapdash "improvements" and the flipside, "neglected maintenance." That dire mix was compounded by other stressors up top where the homes sit: concrete brow ditches, multiple irrigation systems, disintegrating storm drains, rusting corrugated pipes, rodent abatement systems, parking lots, potholes, sinkholes, septic tanks, and asphalt cracks on Neptune Avenue. (In fact, a stormdrain some 400 feet from the August 2019 collapse not only was leaking that day but had been leaking "for approximately 50 years.")

Moreover, according to a report in 2017, the landscaping "managing agent" Seabreeze revealed "evidence of bluff destabilization" from a review into its own overwatering (!). Even after their finding, the company failed to stop or fix what the loosened soil had undermined. (That the water has soaked into the "no-man's land" of the sandstone's interior is not a defensible position.) Fell's complaint notes that Seabreeze's "monthly water usage went up, not down, presumably placing property aesthetics over human life."

So egregious was the problem that the lawsuit alleges the "bluff destabilization put, or should have put, Seabreeze on notice that water from [the uptop condo] Seabluffe was likely seeping into the bluff" and, as a result, the city's engineering department "should have closed the beach or limited access to it." Despite varying degrees of responsibility and liability, Fell asserted in the suit that all four defendants' conduct "was willful, intentional, and with a conscious disregard for the safety of others," Their collective failure to "take protective measures" hurried the cliff chunk to fall, period.

Immunities

Perhaps the biggest head-



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ache in the Davis case was the question of immunity: who had it and who didn't and wished it did. Immunity means not liable for monetary damages in the event of injury or death. Bibi Fell outlined the basic concept. State entities who own, lease, or maintain coastal real estate "promote public access and open up its land resources for enjoyment by the public without heaping onto the state a ton of liability." Some suits for negligent death have been successful: most have not. The law is complex, perhaps overly so, because two disparate forces collide: one, Mother Nature, who harms with rare or no warning, and two, human improvements or indifference to coastal wear-and-tear. I sought counsel for further clarity.

I gained it from C. Brant Noziska whose law firm specializes in "complex civil litigation" and "public entity liability." In an email, he said that the state "can only have liability when it fails to do something it is mandated to do, a so-called ministerial duty." An example: the state or a city is ordered to inspect a problematic construction project on a beach property. "If they inspect but do so negligently, they are immune. But if they fail to inspect and are under a mandatory duty to do so, then they have liability from their failure to inspect."

Contrast that with "discretionary immunity," the means by which the California Coastal Commission grants permits for state and local beachrelated development and protects itself. (The commission was not a defendant in the Davis lawsuit.) In general, Fell said, the courts have ruled that the

commission shouldn't be punished for a "good-faith decision" when it tries to fix a problem and fails. But Noziska notes that there are exceptions. "If an unreasonable maintenance of drainage facilities causes or contributes to a failure, they can be liable for the failure. So, if the city storm drain leaks and saturates the bluff and it causes a loss of strength, that can trigger liability because of the dangerous condition of public property."

Another rub: the Coastal Commission has instituted a policy of "managed retreat" along the coast. Nature is eroding the cliffs, and the agency's policy is to let this happen—not to fortify the cliffs, but to facilitate "people, structures, and infrastructure" moving inland. This is not happening, however, in Del Mar, where SANDAG is spending \$78 million to drill shafts and pour concrete for new pilings to prop up the train tracks — in effect, to stop the bluff's retreat. That public right-of-way required an exemption from the commission. And yet, cliffside homeowners constantly petition the agency to allow them to shore up their residences with seawalls and other fixtures, and are routinely denied, vis-à-vis the policy, unless there's "an imminent danger of harm."

The Surfrider Foundation opposes coastal fixes at state beaches and prefers as much robust retreat as possible. Surfrider refuses most alterations of the beach's "natural" condition, which for them is protected by its recreational value, i.e., legacy surfing spots.

Davis disagrees with the Surfrider's mission: Erecting seawalls at the cliff-base — to restrain blockfalls and the pummeling, wintery waves of El Niño — is, he said, "a no-brainer." It's one defensive option that's been proven to hold back cliffs, at least, in the near term. He emphasized that the changes the families wanted in the settlement were central to human safety. "It's not about surf breaks. It's not about being able to have an area for people to sunbathe. It's about creating spots for people to gather and feel safe."

Aftermath

Concern for those he loves is everything for Davis. He described raising his kids in Encinitas, after which his sons went to dental college, returned, married, and still live and work locally. The clan still gathers at the beach. How often over the years? "Thousands of times," he said. Did he ever set up next to the cliff for a picnic? No, he said.

That afternoon, August, five years ago, the tide was going out, and the beach was exposing its stone riprap. The group of 20 picnickers set up under a step-toe, 20 yards from the lifeguard tower. Soon, a dozen kids had slathered on sunscreen and were playing tag with the waves. "I remember [a moment] between five and 10 minutes before," Davis said. "The cooler was behind Julie's chair, and there were probably two or three little girls getting drinks. Annie was sitting right next to Julie. I was sitting on the other side of Julie, and Betsy [Elizabeth Cox] was on the other side of Annie." No warning. No sound. "The huge chunk of it," he winced, "broke off and then slammed forward like that. All at once. All at once." He stopped. "I'd rather not get into the scene as it happened."

Davis spoke of the character of the three women whom he called "onethird of the family. Julie was the love of my life. I fell in love with her in the first hour I met her. We had four wonderful kids, all super-good students, respectful, loving children, all married, respectful loving spouses." Julie's sister Elizabeth, a psychotherapist who resided in San Francisco with her husband and adopted kids, used to summer in Encinitas and bought a house near Grandview to be close to where Annie lived.

A kind of shimmying sorrow swept over him, and he gave in — to feel in words, just for an instant, grief for his daughter Annie, "our baby, the glue who held our family together. Everybody loved her." On her birthday every year, the family holds a get-together in Annie's honor. "Eighty friends came, last time." He still gets letters from her college mates: "She was the one girl in the sorority who the other girls really wanted to become best friends with." Annie managed Davis's Encinitas dental practice — four Davises working together. "A people pleaser, organizing our office, saving us money. What a talent."

Matt, one of Annie's two older brothers, told his father after Annie died, "Dad, I hate going to work. Dad, I have to look at her chair'...That's really hard for him—and everybody. It's gotten easier over the years, but I tell you, it's..."

Next week: Pat Davis visits the site of the August 2019 cliff collapse and the plaintiffs reach a multimillion-dollar settlement with the state of California and the city of Encinitas. — Thomas Larson

Santa Ana winds heat up, cirrus clouds and sunsets, beaver moon

Santa Ana Winds In San Diego County often reach their greatest intensity during November, particularly in the mountain passes, where dry air from a high-pressure area over the interior deserts swoops coastward toward a low-pressure area offshore. The subsiding air warms rapidly as it descends, resulting in 80° to 90° temperatures close to the coast. While passing over the mountains, however, that dry air can be surprisingly cool — 60° or less in the daytime.

November's and December's Picturesque Sunsets And Sunrises are no accident. This is the time of year when high cirrus clouds, often the precursors of storms, sweep through our area with some regularity. When cirrus or other lofty clouds are present, low-angle sunlight bathes the undersides of these clouds in crimson luminescence. This effect is most noticeable a half-hour to a few minutes before the sun

rises and a few minutes to a half-hour after the sun sets. **November's Full Beaver Moon Will Rise From The Horizon** at 4:34 pm Friday, November 15. November's full Moon is called a Beaver Moon because this is the time of year when beavers begin to take shelter in their lodges, having laid up sufficient stores of food for the long winter ahead. Other November Moon names refer to animals readying for winter: Digging (or Scratching) Moon, a Tlingit name, comes from animals foraging for fallen nuts and bears digging their winter dens. The Dakota and Lakota term, Deer Rutting Moon, refers to the time when deer seek mates, and the Algonquin Whitefish Moon describes the spawning time of the whitefish. This Beaver Moon is also the final supermoon of four consecutive supermoons of the year!

Supermoons appear bigger and brighter than normal Moons. Jupiter Rises Around 6:30 pm On November 16, where it will come to rest next to the Moon for the evening. Late on November 16, you can also see Uranus come into opposition, making its closest and brightest appearance of the year — so bright that viewers in some dark, rural areas will be able see it with the naked eye. (More populated areas will need the help of binoculars.) Look for the green "star" just to the right of the Pleiades star cluster.

Incident at Our Lady of Perpetual Help

Katie Forgette's memory play about a personal crisis she endured as a precocious teenager in the early '70s is self-admittedly slight; though it is set in a devout Catholic family full of women who are suffering in various ways under the patriarchy, there will be nothing of the post-Vatican II seismic shifts in Church culture here. The parish priest is still omnipotent, the women of the house still circle Dad like frustrated planets that cannot escape his gravitational pull, and while Roe vs. Wade's promise of legal abortion may be imminent out there, in here, sex means pregnancy and pregnancy mean kids. Most of the time, anyway: Aunt Terri (Shana Wride) never had any children of her own, but look where that got her: on the outs with her man and living with her sister and her sister's tyrannical, bedridden mother-in-law. The play's real achievement is in hiding how hard and how effectively it works to draw the viewer in to the point where that slight story satisfies, and maybe even matters. Chief credit must go to Samantha Gorjanc's thoroughly winning performance as star and narrator, her addresses to the audience aided by frozen action and a bit of spotlight. A modern daughter in her situation would surely be incandescent with resentment and rage; Gorjanc makes us believe in a dynamic that leaves

her merely desperate - and not a little embarrassed. Not because she is oppressed, but because she is in a certain sort of family at a certain point in time. Even when she fights back, she is careful to show respect to her mother, rendered here as a titan of resilience and love by Erin Noel Grennan. You have to really like these women - aunt, daughter, mother — for the play to work. I did. Only at the end, when Forgette widens her scope and starts scanning the horizon for larger meaning, did it start to lose its gentle hold on my affections. Midnight at the Never Get

Wow. It would be notable, praiseworthy, amazing, etc. if Mark Sonnenblick's musical did nothing more than conjure up a collection of original songs that might believably have shown up in - well, if not the Great American Songbook, then at least the Good American Songbook, and perhaps more importantly, the Gay American Songbook – and then give them a plausible, meaningful setting: an underground '60s NYC gay bar, the only place in town that will host a retro show devoted to camp-free romance between a piano player and his manteuse/muse. See, the piano player has this idea that the way for gays to integrate with polite society is to be polite, to make them want to listen to you. Hence his attachment to the sweet songs of vesteryear, and his horror at the angry homos in the streets.

And that brings us to Sonnenblick's second achievement: making those songs tell the history of a decidedly complicated love affair. Trevor, our singing narrator, informs us excitedly at the outset that the piano player has just died; maybe that helps explain why the set looks way too pretty (and the band sounds way too good) for a grotty back room. He is a man who right away tells us that he is "at the mercy of love" — always a dangerous position to be in, moreso when your love is socially problematic. And as the show shifts almost imperceptibly from to giddy to grim, we learn just how dangerous. Lead Bryan Banville seems to age before our eyes as the political insists with increasing force on becoming the personal, and vice versa. And while the ending first struck me as simple and false, a little reflection suggested

it might be as complicated as what came before.

Anora — Writer-director Sean Baker's latest foray into the private lives of people who make their privates public opens brilliantly, as New York City stripper/escort Anora (a gung-ho, all-in Mikey Madison) grinds her way through her daily grind, making nice with a steady procession of customers, one replacing another so seamlessly that they run together just as they must in our heroine's mind. Then, during a break, a co-worker marvels that one fellow "told me how much I reminded him of his daughter, then ordered five private dances from me!" (The horror.) "At least he paid for the dances," replies Anora. (The banality.) That's Baker, mingling the deeply personal and the "merely" physical in ways feel moral without feeling moralistic.

Talking of which: the reason Anora (who prefers "Annie") gets picked to take care of Ivan, the young Russian playboy who shows up at her club, is that she had a grandmother who never learned English after coming over from the old country. Ivan is so taken with her attentions that he hires her for a week of sexy partytimes and whisks her off to Vegas, a city famous for its spur-of-themoment weddings. What fun! He even tells her that he'd be happy with her even without his parents' money. Annie tries not to believe him, but she doesn't have enough happy reality to counter the much happier fantasy - there's a sister (who feels like she should show up more), but no future. Small surprise when a mid-video game quickie gets interrupted by Ivan's long-suffering babysitter Garnick and his assistant Igor.

The manhunt that follows is longer than it needs to be, and even a bit indulgent, but still largely entertaining — a description which fits the film as a whole. Perhaps the director's most conventional effort to date; it even veers toward cliché in its final scene. But what comes before is strong enough to make it hit anyway. (2024)— M.L. $\star\star$ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Conclave — Director Edward Berger's adaptation of Robert

Harris' novel about the election of a new pope is shot and acted as a Serious Movie: all those muted reds and saturated blacks in those lingering shots of the Sistine Chapel ceiling overhead and the embattled Cardinals below, all that anguish and intellection in the faces of Ralph Fiennes, John Lithgow, Stanley Tucci, et al. (Oh, and not a little ambition, as well: Tucci's American hopeful insists that every Cardinal, deep down, has picked out the name he'd choose for himself as pope — although it's hard to believe this applies to the humble, war-weary newcomer who arrives at the conclave's outset and announces that he was elevated in secret by the late pontiff, despite his mysterious health concerns.)

But it's scored and written as a potboiler in the mode of The Da Vinci Code. (No Opus Dei assassins here, but still plenty of sturm and drang about the dark forces that keep the Church mired in the Dark Ages of Latin rites and sexual rigidity, forces that are threatened by the modern virtues of doubt and openness.) The sawing strings and plunking piano that punctuate the action, the ponderous portentousness of pronouncements like, "The Church is not tradition; the Church is what we do next."

And the fact that in the end, the drama is driven not by the Cardinals' ideas and ideals, but their secret sins: the sexual puritan with a promiscuous past, the lover of Latin with a heart full of hate, etc. It's possible that the film takes itself entirely too seriously; fortunately, the viewer is under no such obligation, and may have a good time as a result. (2024) — M.L. $\star\star$ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Heretic — The best reason to see writer-directors Scott Beck and Bryan Woods' thriller is Hugh Grant's smiling menace as the reclusive Mr. Reed. It's the same slight, self-deprecating upward tug at the corners of the mouth that made him a charming romcom lead back in the day, but give him a few more facial creases, some grandpa gravel in the vocal cords, and a genuine bone to pick with The Big Three monotheisms, and you've got a cheerfully creepy delight to accompany you on your way to the dark truth that he says lies behind (or maybe below) all religion. (His speech about iterations, as evidenced by The Hollies, Radiohead, and Lana Del Rey, is a corker.)

His conversational opponents here are a couple of Mormon missionaries — one a lifetime true believer, the other a clever convert — so it's probably not surprising that he doesn't spend much time on Buddhism, Hinduism, paganism, etc. The moodsetting is masterful, and the tension over Reed's true intentions rises nicely right up to the point where he writes "Belief" and "Disbelief" on a couple of doors and tells the girls that it makes a difference which one they choose.


After that, things get murky, both on his part and the film's. Beck and Woods want to present Reed as a diabolical genius, but he winds up proving careless, reliant on coincidence, and utterly unconvincing in his moment of triumph. And for a movie that seems to want to be about faith, it relies pretty heavily on works (and the miraculous transformation of a frightened teen into a tough-minded detective), right up until its big deus *ex machina*. (2024) — M.L. ★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

The Substance - Writerdirector Coralie Fargeat's long and lurid cautionary tale - anything so laden with body horror must surely be cautionary, right? - very much wants to have its cheesecake and eat it, too. Which is to say, the film treats the Awful Truth that Showbiz (the people who make it and the people who consume it) worships youth, and is mildly horrified by aging, while at the same time slavering over that selfsame youth and jabbing that mild horror with a needle full of nightmare juice.

The story concerns Elisabeth Sparkle (Demi Moore, who seems to have watched Gloria Swanson in Sunset Boulevard and declared, "Hold my beer"),

an actress who won an Oscar in her youth, grew famous enough to rate a star on the Walk of Fame, and then aged gracefully into a gig doing a fitness show on TV. (Paging Miss Fonda?) Now she's turning 50, and surprise, surprise, the network brass wants someone younger. Somehow, our heroine is shocked - she never thought it would happen to her, even though that's been the story since forever. Live by the body, die by the body. But hey now, here's an underground lab that's offering - free of charge, for some reason — a solution: a substance that will allow Sparkle to shine again: seven days as herself, seven days as ingenue Sue (Margaret Qualley, in a turn that screams "star" much louder than "actress"). She cheerfully sets out to replace herself, but even though both parties are constantly reminded that "You are One," it gets hard for them not to resent each other.

The story feels like it's headed somewhere harrowing and haunting, but then it takes a hard left into insane violence. It's not that it doesn't make sense, it's just that it turns a tragedy into a spectacle. All the wince-inducing stuff that came before — the merciless close-ups on aging flesh, the needles plunging into thinning skin, the accelerating moral and physical decay — gets drowned in a sea of arterial spray. Tigers on Craigslist

Asked about the weirdest or wildest gig they ever played, many folks understandably invoke chaos, mayhem, fire, floods, and/or smoke coming out the guitar player's ears. But David Martin from Tigers In Cairo — which just dropped its debut single "Alwavs Adored" — chooses mixtapes from my friends who had access to such luxuries as music." Guitarist Paul Skura, meanwhile, hails from Los Angeles, but moved south for school in 2001. As for guitarist Gavin Rhodes, he spent twenty years in Brooklyn before heading west. "New York City has the reputation of being a mecca for live music," remarks

to show that the kids are, in fact, alright.

"Around 2010 I think," recalls the singer, his math/ prog/metalcore band The 25th Hour was "supposed to play some [now closed] venue in North County with the band Embrace the End. It was supposed to be all ages, and it wasn't. All the bands on tour said they wouldn't play it, so it was moved to a garage in a suburb, and it became one heck of a house party. One of the bands on the tour was called Rise of Caligula. Two weeks later or so, they became the ever-so-amazing, Grammynominated Deafheaven. Unknown to most, a lot of the [Deafheaven] Sunbather album was written in that same garage."

Martin grew up "on a dirt road in Vermont" and recalls a childhood with "no internet, no cable, and a couple bad radio stations. I lived off Rhodes, "which it is in many ways. But what I've found here in San Diego is a much tighterknit community of musicians who are super-supportive of each other, regardless of what genre they're in."

The new band owes its existence to Martin, who made a New Year's resolution to form a band in his new home. "It all started with a Craigslist ad I posted: 'Indie rock guitarist looking to start or join project.' I added a link to a bunch of demos that I had been working on, and the first person to answer the ad was [drummer] Matt [Yansch]. I couldn't believe my luck. I had found a unicorn. Matt brought in his friends Paul and [bassist] Dennis [Smith]. Then, the hard part came: finding a singer. Using Craigslist and our network of friends, we received countless demos, some that were okay, others that were hilariously bad or deranged.

You get it all with Craigslist. Finally, after almost a year of searching, we found the final Tiger, David [Martin]."

"Always Adored" came together from an intro riff Rhodes laid down as a demo back in Brooklyn. At the time, it didn't have the trademark hook-y verse lead guitar part. "That only came about after the band started practicing," he remembers. "It was one of those lightning-in-abottle moments."

According to Martin, "Lyrically, this is about learning to forgive people, and sometimes coming to the conclusion they aren't worth being forgiven to begin with. It stems from things my father said after my mother passed away, and other traumatic incidents that surrounded me during that time in my life. But anyone who just can't give up that grudge that eats at their soul should be able to relate. A lesson/realization to myself and everyone else, and a lesson I'm still working on. Life is better when you can learn to forgive. Just don't just forget."

They're still practicing in El Cajon, a land of metal bands. But don't worry, everybody gets along. Watch for an album next year, and a series of singles before that. As for their name, a Smith named Robert, not David, had a lot to do with that. "We all are fans of The Cure," recalls the singer. "It's a take on their song 'Fire in Cairo' We were kinda kicking it around at practice one day, and I noticed Gavin has a tiger tattoo on his arm. I just blurted out, 'We should call it Tigers In Cairo!' I didn't think it was gonna stick, but we all agreed on it. After thinking about it some more, we thought it was perfect, since tigers aren't native to Egypt or Africa. We liked that juxtaposition, mirroring our broad range of influences: '90s indie rock and shoegaze, power pop, San Diego punk, and hardcore. We also figured we couldn't go wrong using an alpha predator in our name."

Chicken feet and jazzy beats Bringing the background to the foreground at Golden Island

"Jazz is whatever the fuck you say it is." I tell guitarist Aaron Lind, whose organ trio is performing at Golden Island Dim Sum and Asian Cuisine in Mira Mesa tonight. Though I'm not opposed to randomly blurting obscenities to strangers, this particular obscenity isn't random. My statement arises from a discussion of the similarities between the punk and jazz communities. While jagoff gatekeepers talk shit about kids in Bad Religion shirts they got from Hot Topic, the jazz community has their own self-appointed "experts" who decide what is "real jazz" and what falls short. It's the antithesis of two styles that are all about freedom of expression and individuality. Leave it to some dickhead to come up with rules.

The patrons at Golden Island don't seem obsessed by the nuances of authenticity, nor do they appear to be dickheads. They're here for the food, and Lind and his band are there to provide dinner music — they seem to me like they're background, designed to attract very little attention. But that's an art in itself. It's a challenge to get the sound right in any venue. The presence of carbon-based life forms alone can jack up your acoustics. And given that said bodies will fluctuate in number and location throughout the night, and that the volume level needs to be loud enough to hear, but also quiet enough to make conversation easy...well, it's just too much math stuff for me. Fortunately, soundman Iain knows his shit, so the mix and volume are excellent and sustained.

While I'm there at Golden Island for the music, I'm not complaining that there's food (though I do have to try not to throw up in my mouth when I spot chicken feet on the menu). The place provides an educational experience: I learn that dim sum is not a particular dish, but a variety of small dishes, often shared with friends and family. My friend Silas schools me about this via Google University. He also says something about etiquette, but I can't hear him over the sound of my own chewing as I shove the other half of a beef bun in my mouth.

My eyes, meanwhile are caught by the scene on the under-used dance floor. Two children who can't be over six stop their borderline-mosh

pit dancing when drummer Justin Joyce takes a solo. The younger of the two is mesmerized; his older sibling attempts to break the trance by hip-checking him. The tot absorbs the punk rock shot with the skill of experience and continues to stare until his brother leaves to run around the dance floor, then heads to his family when the band breaks for 15 minutes. The break is filled by fans of the musicians as they gather around; clearly, not everyone is here for the food alone. I barely have time to talk to organist John Opferkuch about the bass lines he's been playing before he extricates himself for a well-deserved beverage. His lines are so good that I'm not even resentful that there's no bass player to pick on.

I see restaurant staff wheeling glass-sided food carts, keeping them warm with a Sterno candle. This inspires me to repeat "Fire! Fire"

a la Beavis to one of the carters. Seems like she's heard it before; she stops just long enough to figure out that I don't need anything from her. I'm about to pull my shirt over my head to channel Cornholio and demand T.P. for my bunghole when I see a plate being set down at our table. Well, it's actually Silas' plate. My plate has been there for a while, but I've been busy! As the band starts

their next set, I dig into

garlic honey pork ribs so satisfyingly sticky that I feel like I'm eating candy. Then the garlic kicks in and the melding of flavors delivers a satisfying explosion that overwhelms the intrusive thoughts of someone eating chicken feet somewhere in the world, and maybe even this room.

The drummer child is back up front again, and his brother pulls on him to come to the table where their family is eating. I take the opportunity to ask his parents if he plays music, and tell them what I observed. Their smiles beam at me as they say they expose him to all kinds of music and instruments, but he hasn't settled on one yet. I scan their plates for chicken feet, but don't see any. I know I probably didn't have to look, but my curiosity often gets the better of me — though it stops well short of munching on poultry extremities. ■



Opera revives its Covid La Boheme

Back in the dark days of the pandemic, San Diego Opera conceived of a way to present Giacomo Puccini's *La Boheme* in a manner that would be consistent with Covid-19 social distancing rules. The performance was outdoors, and none of the characters interacted directly with each other. This was accomplished by setting the opera 15 years in the future and staging it as the memories of the romantic lead, Rodolfo, as he wrote his memoirs.

The concept led to some nonsensical moments, but the entire situation was nonsensical. So, ironically, it made sense. Fast forward to November 2, 2024, and, for some God-forsaken reason, San Diego Opera decided to reprise their quarantine *Boheme*.

The beating human heart of

La Boheme was ripped out with this conceptual production. The female romantic lead, Mimi, was a ghost the entire time. In the real La Boheme, Mimi is a fragile young woman who is full of life and hopes for springtime. In the third act, we find out that she has a serious illness, and in the fourth act she tragically succumbs to her poverty-induced poor health. It's a moving story — unless the show starts with her already dead. Her character arc doesn't exist at that point, and we don't really care much when she dies because she's already dead at the beginning.

In addition to the destruction of Puccini's characters, at least 30 minutes of music was cut from the show. I hate to bring this up, but it's only fair. This production is exactly what Ian Campbell was trying to avoid back in 2014 when he tried to wind the company down "with dignity."

The second act suffered the most. It is set in a boisterous Christmas Market in the heart of Paris's Latin Quarter. A chorus of wild children courses through the crowded street chasing an ancient toy maker. Adults hustle here and there celebrating on Christmas Eve. Amid this joyously chaotic setting, Mimi meets Rodolfo's friends.

Unfortunately, in this production, there was no children's chorus. There was no chorus at all on stage. The adult chorus sang a few bars from the left side of the house. They were actually in the auditorium, in the dark. At the end of the act, the chorus moved to house right and sang in the dark

again. This time, they sang about a military parade that was nowhere to be seen on stage.

Is it too much to ask that the actions being carried out on stage match the words that are being sung?

There is no conceptual version of any opera that is acceptable if the

words being sung do not match the actions on the stage. It is complete and utter nonsense and needs to stop, now. Stop forcing your audience to swallow falsehoods. Your production dishonors the composer, the librettist, and all the performers who have presented the opera correctly over the decades.

The pie of the beholder

Folks have been baking and eating pies like this for just about ever.

ust back from New Zealand, where I went crazy...on meat pies. (They're called "pot pies" back here.) If there's a national dish

Down Under, pies are it, Comfort food central. Kiwis are crazy for them. Meat pies, ground beef and cheese pies, veggie pies, *kumera* (sweet potato) pies, butter chicken pies, wild venison pies, *paua* (abalone) pies, mutton pies — all served up hot with mashed pota-

toes and drowned in Worcestershire sauce, natch. Now that I'm back on this side of the pond, I find myself fantasizing over pies with pastry so flaky, you'd think you were eating baklava, palmiers, apple strudels. Yum! Paperweight flyaway pastry! But also crunchy. Oh man. Must see some doctor

about these flashbacks. They're hitting me now, as I walk through Little Italy. What the heck? "Isn't there a Kiwi pub hereabouts?" I ask the four lions spouting from their fountain at the top of Little Italy's walk-through street. They keep silent, but then I look across Columbia to — oh yeah: that lovely old 1904 house. A Kiwi pub! The Queenstown. It

south of the equator.

childhood. Savory mince pies were the thing, even though our mom often brought home steak and kidney pies (and I hated kidney), or smoked fish (and I hated smoked fish), or (easier to take) bacon and egg. Or more than anything, the chicken and mush-

room pies. Mom would slam some ripped-from the-garden lettuce leaves down, scatter peanuts on top, plus a couple of olives, and the rest was down to the pie. "Be careful. It's hot inside!" she'd say as we lifted the pastry lid and unleashed a cloud of steam.

> So here I am crossing into this - have to say - dee-lightful garden, just up from Piazza Della Famiglia. "Happy hour?" I ask this gal skipping down the stairs from the house. She's carrying two plates. Man. Hope she doesn't trip. When she comes back, she ushers me to a li'l table at the top of the stairs, which looks out across to the fire museum's Pioneer Hook and Ladder Company. I try again: "Uh, do you have New Zealand pies in happy hour?"

She finds a happy hour menu. First thing you notice on the title page is that — nice touch — "Public House" is written upside down, with an upside-down sheep below. "You've got fifteen minutes," she says. "Let's...see. Oh yes. Our veggie pie

Public House. is on happy hour. No meat pies. Sorry. But the veggie pie has very good flavors. I eat it all the time."

There it is: "Veggie pie and chips," part of the happy hour's \$10 section. (They have \$9 dishes like slider and skinny fries, burger with a choice of lamb, pork-and-beef, or a *Kiwilango* — beef, jalapeño and cheese. Back up in the \$10 class you can also choose fish and chips, a beet salad, or something called "Cat's Chili." Do they have a staffer named "Cat" here?) Whatever, I'm going for the veggie pie, even though that *Kiwilango* would be it, if only it were a pie.

When Dan, the other server, brings my tray, it makes me happy. OK, it's a happy hour version

of the pie — so, not huge. And it's a simple pie dotted by black sesame seeds, surrounded by fat fries. But yes, my number one priority, the pastry, is the hoped-for puff pastry, super-crispy-flaky and golden. And number two, the pie may be veggie, but it really does have flavor. Guess that's curry in there, plus the usual suspects: peas, celery, zucchini, onions, mushrooms, and to sharpen it up, a pot of sweet tomato chutney.

I mean, it's just a pie, right? This happens a lot: restaurants get a comfort food and dress it up. Give it respect. Discover it again for the first time. But still, this is delish (though I found the thick fries not as tender as I woulda liked). And I do like the pastry-meat combo, even if it is veggie. Now I think about it, I remember I'm eating a really ancient food item: folks have been baking and eating pies like this for just about ever. The ancient Egyptians would use crushed seeds glued into a pastry with honey as a way of enclosing and baking meats. The Greeks followed. Then the Romans had the idea of sticking a pastry lid on top, as a way of keeping things hot, and also of preserving the meat inside. But here's the other thing I like: seems the word itself, "pie," comes from...magpies! "Pie" comes from "pica," meaning beak, "mag" from a noisy, naggy, "maggie" (sorry, all Margarets) person. So the crows' still-famous habit of picking up every bright thing they see and storing it noisily in their nest gave the idea for the name: a pie as a "pastry box" stuffed with food odds and ends.

So my pie was really good, even at the happy hour size. Next time, I'm going to go check out a Kiwi meat pie business named Auntie Devi's up in Poway. I've heard people say they're the best. Until then, I'm happy eating humble pie right here. ■

Economical freezer-filling rockfish trips -Long-range season begins with a bang

Dock Totals 11/3 - 11/9: 1033 anglers aboard 46 half-day to 3-day trips out of San Diego landings over the past week caught 18 bluefin tuna, 15 bocaccio. 10 bonito, 99 lingcod, 7 rock crab, 4908 rockfish, 23 sand bass, 40 sculpin, 14 sheephead. 15 spiny lobster (84 released), 321 whitefish, 222 yellowfin tuna (up to 90 pounds), and 26 yellowtail.

Saltwater: Deep water rockfish continues to be the focus for the short run fleet in local waters, but there are still some decent vellowfin and bluefin in Mexican waters within 3-day range. And this is the first week in a long time that no calico bass made the counts without a major weather event causing a days-long shutdown. That's likely due to the cooling trend that is slowing fishing on the kelp edge, while rockfish in 300 to 600 feet of water are biting very well. Boats running extended half-

day to full-day trips have been slaying the bottom fish on a fairly regular basis. This is a great time to stock up on filets on an economical fishing trip for under \$100. The Premier, for example, is offering extended half-day deep-water rockfish runs from 8am to 3pm for just \$80.

A few boats running 1.5 to 3-day outings are heading west toward the outer banks and San Clemente Island in search of the larger bluefin and yellowtail - with mixed results. Boats heading out to the Corner and south toward the banks off Ensenada to San Quintin have been finding decent yellowfin fishing, with a few yellowtail and an occasional bluefin in the mix. Lingcod and rockfish have been rounding out the counts on those trips when the pelagic action slows. All in all, it has been a good season within our 3-day zone as we head into the beginning of long-range season.

As the weather cools mid-fall, long-range fishing heats up off the southern Baja peninsula. The boats suited for longer runs are transitioning from 3-day trips to 7- to 10-day runs further south from Cedros Island to the Ridge and other high spots where yellowfin tuna, dorado, and wahoo are common targets. As noted in last week's report, our offshore pelagic fishery changes year to year, but one constant has been the late fall and winter long-range fishing down south. The closer you get to the tropics, the more consistent the fishing tends to be for the migrating species that spend most of their time where water remains warmer.

On these long-range trips lasting from 7 to 16 days, anglers can hope to be rewarded with the catch of a lifetime. In spite of the larger-than-normal yellowfin closer to San Diego this year, hauling in a cow yellowfin tuna over 300 pounds is really only possible in the waters off the southern third of Baja. Given the length of the trip, the first few days may be spent traveling, with maybe a stop or two if some action pops up. A surprise school of bluefin or some good

grade yellowtail may provide a pleasant diversion for a couple hours, but the ultimate goal is to get south to the target area. Regardless of the length of the trip, anglers may keep three day's limits, and often, when limits of tuna and wahoo are caught early, boats will switch up and target other species like pargo, grouper, and even halibut and yellowtail as they work their way north.

Long-range fishing is not a cheap endeavor. as maintaining, licensing, insuring, fueling, and operating a large sportfishing vessel is costly, and ticket prices reflect that. The average 10-day trip will run about \$5,000 per angler, plus tip and fish processing. But the allure of catching yellowfin tuna up to 300 pounds draws many, and these trips usually sell out in advance. Long-range season brings in snowbirds from colder climes as well, seeking the oft-glassy seas and the warmth of near-tropical weather. A week or two off the southern Baja coast can be a great escape from the wintertime blues. So far this season, the longrange boats have been killing it. The Excel reported a great start to their 10-day run on Sunday, with several yellowfin caught to just over 300 pounds.

Another option for fishing southern Baja is to drive or fly down and hire a local operator. This can generally be done for less money than a longrange trip, though local operations in Baja usually do not venture more than 30 miles from the port of departure for day trips, so spots like Alijos Rocks that are further offshore are not an option the way they can be on a long-range trip. That said, when living in Bahia Asuncion, I have seen long-range boats out of San Diego fishing within kavak range of my launch point and a lot of what is targeted on long-range trips can be caught within

a short panga or cruiser run from most Pacific-side southern Baja towns from Guerrero Negro to San Jose del Cabo. My friend Captain Juan Cook spends much of this time of year running out of Lopez Mateos in Bahia Magdelena, and is currently fishing the Ridge with great results on vellowfin and wahoo.

Full-day runs on a super panga or cruiser can run from \$600 to \$1200 in that region, but for that price, you will be fishing in the same area many of the vessels of the San Diego-based long-range fleet target. Either option can be great: heading down on your own to fish, enjoy local cuisine, camp, and explore; or riding a sportboat down and enjoying great fishing day and night - and also worldclass dining and no vehicle worries or other issues that can arise when driving the rough roads of Baja. Whether the beach, bay, lake, or offshore, they're out there, so go out and get 'em!

Wrong Place, Wrong Time

 Early on Nov. 4, a British tourist made an alarming entrance at an internet cafe near his hotel in Pattaya, Thailand, Metro News reported. First, staff at the Freelancer Hotel heard groans and banging coming from his room – which wasn't necessarily unusual in the red-light district. But then the 51-yearold man fell from a balcony and through the ceiling of the adjacent cafe, with just his naked leas showing to about 20 patrons below. As onlookers called for help, they realized the nude man was covered in excrement; he was taken to a hospital to sober up and address his minor injuries. Police checking out his hotel room found feces smeared on the floor: "We have some ideas about what he was doing in the room to make it so dirty but there was nothing illegal," officials said. "He will have to speak with the hotel to negotiate the bill."

It's Come to This

- We all know that Amazon has EVERY-THING, which apparently now includes readyto-assemble homes, the Mirror reported on Nov. 5. Content creator Nathan Graham ordered the compact home, which showed up in the signature smiley-arrow box. He spent about \$39,000, which included a bathroom, kitchen, windows and furniture. The metal home just needed to be unfolded and snapped into place to be livable. "This thing is so easy to build," Graham said. But another customer was less impressed -- at only 5-feet-8, he said he could touch the ceilings. "I'm actually going to Airbnb it," he said. Just to short people?

Bright Idea

- Even the Trevi Fountain needs occasional repairs and upkeep, but what about all those coins tourists toss in to ensure a return trip to Rome? Someone had the bright idea to build a temporary pool to receive the coins, CNN reported on Nov. 5, but its position behind a tall fence covered in plastic is problematic - many hopeful tossers simply miss. The fountain nets about \$1.6 million a year, which is donated to a Catholic charity called Caritas. Italians aren't loving the temporary pool, either. Hoesch alleges that in October 2022, as he rode his bike through Rainier, an ambulance slammed into him, breaking his nose and destroying his bike, then billed him nearly \$2,000 for the ride to the hospital. The driver, who was moving at less than 10 mph, heard a thump and then rushed the biker to the hospital. Hoesch also incurred about \$100,000 in medical expenses and suffers from permanent injuries such as "decreased range of motion" and "reduced grip." He is seeking almost \$1 million for pain and suffering, along with coverage of his medical bills.

Ewwwww!

In October in Sydney, Australia, beachgoers were confronted with mysterious black balls that had washed up on the beaches, CNN reported. Authorities closed the beaches and assumed the balls were unrefined oil from a spill. Now, scientists at the University of New South Wales have discovered what exactly the balls are – and it's not pretty. The orbs are mini "fatbergs" – human feces, methamphetamine, human hair, fatty acids and food waste, among other gross ingredients. "They smell worse than anything you've ever smelt," said lead investigator Jon Beves. The EPA guesses that the bergs came from "a source that releases mixed waste," but "testing has not been able to confirm their exact origin." Bleh.


News You Can Use

- If you're in the Lowcountry, exercise extreme caution. On Nov. 6, 43 female monkeys escaped from the Alpha Genesis Primate Research Center in Yemassee, South Carolina, The Post and Courier reported. The monkeys are bred and sold for medical testing and research; the facility houses about 6,700 animals. The company, along with police, are searching with thermal imaging cameras and setting traps. While police say the monkeys pose no threat or health risk to people, they advise residents to "keep doors and windows securely closed."
