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

Reportorial risk at the races and elsewhere

Capturing moving objects on video sometimes means getting hit by them On November 14, at the Baja 1000 in Ensenada, an orange trophy truck in the contingency lanes lost control and hit four people. The four were rushed to the hospital, where two died.

Yolie Stover, an off-road reporter from Imperial Beach, was just around the corner live-streaming for her Off-Road Girl Loves Baja channel when the accident occurred. "The trophy truck hit the car in front and crushed four people," she told me. "The guy getting interviewed that had his back to the car [survived]. Two other racers on quads died too," she added. "One injured racer was being transported to the hospital by their chase crew and died on the way. The other had just finished his section on the racecourse and got hit by a car." Stover wasn't sure if the cameraperson or vlogger interviewing the victim was also struck, but she's aware of the risks involved in filming race events. She's been capturing off-road races with a video camera since 1999 and filming the Baja race series — produced by SCORE International — on her smartphone for over five years.

Like many vloggers and camera operators at the race events, Stover has experienced injuries from debris while filming off-road races herself. "Many times by lots of rocks," she said.

But stops short of letting empty office building turn into apartments

It takes more than a developer's proposal to turn deserted offices into homes — even in Escondido, where a surge in empty office buildings has led the city to regulate them with fees.

Given the empty offices (Escondido has an 8.8 percent vacancy rate) and a severe housing shortage (the city claims it needs 9607 new homes by 2029, and that only 1088 units were built between 2021 and 2023), some see an opportunity.

At the northeast corner of South Hickory Street, near the historic downtown and Grand Avenue, is a three-story office building the owner wants to convert into 21 homes. The project's two-bedroom units would rent for less than \$2000; a hard-tofind value in the city.

Last week, the planning commission voted 3-1 to deny the conversion, which required a general plan amendment to change the land use from office to urban and a zoning change from commercial to residential.

thoughts and prayers are with you, and your work is greatly appreciated. We hope you get well soon." This sentiment was echoed widely in the comments on his video.

These incidents serve as reminders of the hazards faced by reporters, camera operators, and vloggers. During the recent Olympics, for example, a cameraman accidentally stepped into the path of runners in a 5000-meter race. The risks resonate; I've had my share of close calls while capturing action shots for my outlets. Once, I was photographing roller skaters speeding by at 25 miles per hour, and I filmed a drift event, and rubber chunks hit me in the face.

Even YouTubers exposing scams encounter danger. Recently, some creators filming scammers were assaulted by the same individuals they were documenting. Someone in a passing car threw coins at the vloggers.

In 2022, two reporters, Lourdes Maldonado Lopez and Margarito Martinez, were shot and killed in Tijuana. In the 1990s, Michael Burke, a Los Angeles cameraman, lost his life while filming in San Diego County.

City planner Veronica Morones said the request for a general plan amendment is "inconsistent" with the city's goals for residential development because the project provides no open space, unlike other apartments in the area, such as Summit, Rosewood Villas and Montecristo Villas, which have recreational and open spaces.

Based on the proposed unit count, 6400 square feet of usable open space is required, which applicant Darshan Patel said might be squeezed in by using existing landscaping areas.

Patel sought a waiver of open space under density bonus law, which planners did not contest. But according to the city attorney, a density bonus request doesn't require them "to grant a legislative entitlement to change the land use and zoning designations for a site."

Commissioners weren't worried that amending the general plan not to include open space would set a precedent for other applicants in the future; the main issue was that "the bar is exceedingly high" when it comes to making changes to the general plan. The infill project failed to meet stancontinued on page 5

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dards of living, since it lacked open space or recreational amenities, planners said. The complex would also have two parking spaces per unit, which is "overparked."

"It does go back to standards of living, because in some of your floor plans you're not even showing closets," said commissioner Carrie Mecaro. "It's great that they're going to be affordable, but people who live in these spaces also deserve to live in a space that functions."

"We're going to see a lot of this coming through," she said of future infill projects. The city has identified over 800 sites that could be used to accomodate 10,000 units of various income levels, staff said, "and this is not one of them."

Another issue was the density bonus request for one additional unit. Commissioners disagreed with the applicant's use of a waiver for dedication of a two-foot strip of alleyway as a public easement.

"They're just providing the two feet for future wid-

ening should another project or city project be funded to do the widening down the alley," said Owen Tunnell, assistant city engineer. "Our alleys are currently 20 feet and our city standard" is 24 feet. "So any project would have to dedicate their side of the alley."

Tracy Burrow, a local who spoke in support, said the project would be good both in terms of housing and climate, because it wouldn't result in new construction and related emissions.

Patel defended the project, saying the affordable units would be furnished with

Jared backs Bobby Jr. Onetime La Jolla denizen Jared Polis, now governor of Colorado, is under fire from some fellow Democrats for praising the nomination by Donald Trump of Robert F. Kennedy Jr. to run the department of Health and Human Services. "[Kennedy] helped us defeat vaccine mandates in Colorado in 2019 and will help make America healthy again by shaking up HHS and FDA," Polis wrote in a November 14 post on his X account.

"I hope he leans into personal choice on vaccines rather than bans (which I think are terrible, just like mandates) but what I'm most optimistic about is taking on big pharma and the corporate ag oligopoly to improve our health. Before you mock him or disagree, I want to share with you some quotes that if he follows through show why I'm excited: 'In some categories, there are entire departments, like the nutrition

department at the FDA that are — that have to go, that are not doing their job, they're not protecting our kids,' YES!

"The entire nutrition regime is dominated by big corporate ag rather than human health and they do more harm than good 'We've got to get off of pesticide-intensive agriculture.' YES! We have tried unsuccessfully to better protect people and pollinators from harmful pesticides here in Colorado and we need all the help we can get to take on big chemical companies and improve human health and the environment! For our pollinators and our people! He will face strong special interest opposition on these, but I look forward to part-

nering with him to truly make America healthy again and I hope that we can finally make progress on these important issues."

The head of the Colorado Democratic Party, **Shad Murib**, fired back: "Robert F. Kennedy Jr. has been credibly accused of sexual assault and consistently undermines trust in science using his personal beliefs and conspiracy theories as evidence."

Polis responded to the pushback in a subsequent post:

"Science must remain THE cornerstone of our nation's health policy and the sciencebacked decision to get vaccinated improves public health and safety. But if as a country we follow the science we would also be far more concerned about the impact of pesticides on public health, ag policy on nutrition, and the lack of access to prescription drugs due to drug high prices. This is why I am for a major shake-up in institutions like the FDA that have been barriers to lowering drug costs and promoting healthy food choices. Lest there by any doubt, I am vaccinated as is my family. I will hold any HHS Secretary to the same high standard of protecting and improving public health."

An October 1, 2018 *Colorado Independent* profile describes Polis's political coming of age in San Diego. "At that time of his life, Jared played almost daily in an urban canyon near his family's home in the uppercrust San

> Diego community of La Jolla, and one day some neighbors came by to inform his parents that developers sought to build condominiums in the canyon."

According to his mother **Susan Schutz**: "Jared stood up and said, 'Have you ever been in the canyon? There's no snakes, there's no garbage.' He said, 'I walk in it and play in it every day after school. It's a beautiful place to be.' He spoke for about 10 minutes, and the council later surprised every-

one by siding with Jared. The local newspaper quoted the mayor saying it was 'that young man's' speech that made the difference."

He said to the oldest guy that being away from them was eating him up, that holidays are a time to be with family, and he didn't have anyone. It tears up my wife, this stuff. 'Sure it's sad,' I tell her, 'but basically, it just pisses me off.' You get my drift?"

Regina, an exuberant mid-twentyish charmer, ran a hand through her dark curls. "Let's see. I have a sweater that's too small and a food chopper I'll never use My mom gave me the chopper. She gave it to me because I make a lot of salads. I told her that I was going to take it back and get a

can opener — you know, the little cute kind that hangs from under the cupboard?" Regina emphasized, however, that she did get a lot of things for Christmas that don't have to be returned. "A beautiful ring, a garnet — that's my birthstone; clothes; a heap of money that I'm getting ready to spend!" Regina whooped and disappeared into the Broadway's doors.

"I'm always late, everywhere," Suzie pouted, pulling up bright pink legwarmers over her black jeans. "So what I ended up getting was three watches. I'm taking back two. Who needs three watches? I'm going to get cash back, if I can, and put it in my vacation savings. I'll use their money," she giggled, "to get away from them. I'll be late in distant countries."

As Rosemary and her husband, he carrying a hat box, walked out of the Village Hat Shop, the sun was nearing the meridian. Sky was clear. The wind had died down, and shoppers and gift returners bustled shoulder to shoulder along Horton Plaza's top tier. Offered a jubilant Rosemary, "We returned a hat we gave to a friend. It was too big. What we've got here," she took the top from the box, "is a kind of safari hat. It's even better than the one we first bought him" Rosemary tilted back the hat's brim, grinned. "This hat has a wire in the brim so you can shape it any way you want. Neat. huh?"

Behind the counter in the Village Hat Shop, the tall clerk ran a pale, slender hand through his crest of black hair. "We've already had some returns." The nondesirable items," he bristled, turning his green eyes down onto Carmen, "are all the clothes I gave her. We've known each other for nine months. We weren't together last Christmas. It was pretty expensive. I'm also return-

Paul, brown hair graying, sits on a black metal bench smoking a cigarette He warms one hand on his belly beneath his blue Yale sweatshirt. The Rolex on his hairy wrist glitters. "I'm a dad. I'm relaxing while my kids shop. They were at their mother's for Christmas, and today's my gift to them. I let them get what they want. With the sales, they can get twice as much anyway and save me the headache of having to pick stuff out for them."

Sister Santa's once-ayear smile

I fell in love with America for the first time on a sweaty night in a Bangkok refugee center in March 1991."In America people have meat with every meal," my dad told me as we looked into the city skyline glittering with streetlights and blinking neon signs in the distance. I was transfixed. Braised meat, steaks, chops; meat on skewers, meat over rice, between bread. All around us were other refugee families coming to America through Humanitarian Operation, a subprogram for the relocation of families that faced political persecution in Vietnam. After a week of boiled eggs and pickled turnip every day, twice a day, I was ready for Meat Country.

Two months later, I fell

for America even harder. It was my birthday. My Uncle Frank bought me a cake with my name on it and bought me a mottledgray Huffy bike. I did not know this was a thing: that you got free stuff, a cake, and a song on a day that commemorated your birth. I also always thought my birthday was in August, but who cares? And then came Christmas.

Christmas in my village of Lam Son meant night Masses with about two hours devoted to singing and scripture reading. The songs were mostly majorkey standards, accompanied by some American Christmas carols with Vietnamese lyrics.

Afterward we would head out to the front of the church and the priest would project the movie King of Kings onto a white sheet while we sat crosslegged with our families on the gravelly ground. Little kids would sit with arms folded as a sign of respect. The more devout church ladies would cross themselves every time Jesus, played by Jeffrey Hunter, appeared onscreen. I wonder now what Hunter would have felt about being an object of devotion to some lady

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in a brown *ao dai*, teeth blackened by betel nut, and skin prune-darkened by the sun.

We would eat popcorn handed out by the nuns. Among them was the Soeur Santa, affectionately called Soeur Satan, who had a chubby face and a voice like vinegar. We'd then trek back to our homes in the dark guided by the shapes of swaying bamboo trees in the night. I would wear my good jeans, my bigboy jeans imported from Laos with patches spelling out nonsense English words on them. The priest would go back to his rectory, light a cigarette, and fall asleep watching old soccer games on one of the three TVs in town. What was most apparent was the lack of stuff, or the promise of stuff. There were no elves-on-the-shelves, no lists, no Stasi Santa wiretapping us and watching us while we slept.

American Christmas had its own vocabulary, its own grammar, and the movie Home Alone was my guidebook. I learned there was no Christmas but American Christmas, and Macaulay Culkin was its prophet. American Christmas was fluorescentbright, it was loud, it talked back to its mom, and made its family disappear. Nobody went to Mass during American Christmas except for semi-orphaned

kids and weird old men with snow shovels. And even though *Home Alone* was in some ways a cynical movie, it made me think of family in a more immediate sense — the movie was about forgiveness and grace as much as it was about outsmarting burglars who probably would have just knocked out Kevin with their big adult hands and called it a day.

I watched the movie over and over on VHS and even bought the novelized version on Scholastic book day in school. Side-by-side, the contrast is temptingly convenient. On the one hand we have a rustic set-piece defined by its smallness and communal intimacy, while on the other hand, a tacky worship of capitalism and individualism. You want to choose the former in the same way you want to eat that gluten-free, fair-trade, organic chocolate bar: it's the more virtuous option. But it's not so binary. I

loved, I adored American Christmas. I looked forward to seeing the glittering lights in the bustling suburban malls of the Bay Area, Eastridge, and Valley Fair, Vallco Park (RIP), and Great Mall. I looked forward to hearing "Jingle Bells" in English — there was more Jesus in the Vietnamese one. I loved having the option to pick out a Calvin Klein windbreaker

or a Tommy Hilfiger one, of getting a Rune Glifberg Flip skateboard deck or a Natas Kaupas Element version. It was odd for me to experience American Christmas with such joy and see some Americans denounce its materialism. Only in a country of abundance can people reject stuff, reject ownership, and come off as more virtuous than their neighbors. In my village, we were sharing year-old toothbrushes gifted by my mom's friend from Australia.

Over the years, I admit there was a constant tension between the Christmases past and present. But like many things, they synthesized, fused. I learned to stop worrying, stop choosing, and to love them both. I celebrated American Christmas with open gratitude while Vietnamese Christmas played a hidden soundtrack underneath. And every year after the presents have been unwrapped by the tree and the prime rib is congealing on the oversized plates and Nat King Cole sings "Chestnuts roasting on an open fire ... " on Pandora, I look inside myself. I replay those dark Lam Son nights, of a flickering Jesus swaying on the white sheet, Soeur Santa smiling her once-a-year smile, and me in my big-boy Laotian pants in my father's arms on the long walk home.

Anora — Writer-director Sean Baker's latest foray into the private lives of people who make their privates public opens brilliantly, as New York City stripper/ escort Anora (a gung-ho, all-in Mikey Madison) grinds her way through her daily grind, making nice with a steady procession of customers, one replacing another so seamlessly that they run together just as they must in our heroine's mind. Then, during a break, a co-worker marvels that one fellow "told me how much I reminded him of his daughter, then ordered five private dances from me!" (The horror.) "At least he paid for the dances," replies Anora. (The banality.) That's Baker, mingling the deeply personal and the "merely" physical in ways feel moral without feeling moralistic.

Talking of which: the reason Anora (who prefers "Annie") gets picked to take care of Ivan, the young Russian playboy who shows up at her club, is that she had a grandmother who never learned English after coming over from the old country. Ivan is so taken with her attentions that he hires her for a week of sexy partytimes and whisks her off to Vegas, a city famous for its spur-of-themoment weddings. What fun! He even tells her that he'd be happy with her even without his parents' money. Annie tries not to believe him, but she doesn't have enough happy reality to counter the much happier fantasy - there's a sister (who feels like she should show up more), but no future. Small surprise when a mid-video game quickie gets interrupted by Ivan's long-suffering babysitter Garnick and his assistant Igor.

The manhunt that follows is longer than it needs to be, and even a bit indulgent, but still largely entertaining — a description which fits the film as a whole. Perhaps the director's most conventional effort to date; it even veers toward cliché in its final scene. But what comes before is strong enough to make it hit anyway. (2024)— M.L. $\star \star$ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Conclave — Director Edward Berger's adaptation of Robert Harris' novel about the election of a new pope is shot and acted as a Serious Movie: all those muted reds and saturated blacks in those lingering shots of the Sistine Chapel ceiling overhead and the embattled Cardinals below, all that anguish and intellection in the faces of Ralph Fiennes, John Lithgow, Stanley Tucci, et al. (Oh, and not a little ambition, as well: Tucci's American hopeful insists that every Cardinal, deep down, has picked out the name he'd choose for himself as pope — although it's hard to believe this applies to the humble, war-weary newcomer who arrives at the conclave's outset and announces that he was elevated in secret by the late pontiff, despite his mysterious health concerns.)

But it's scored and written as a potboiler in the mode of The Da Vinci Code. (No Opus Dei assassins here, but still plenty of sturm and drang about the dark forces that keep the Church mired in the Dark Ages of Latin rites and sexual rigidity, forces that are threatened by the modern virtues of doubt and openness.) The sawing strings and plunking piano that punctuate the action, the ponderous portentousness of pronouncements like, "The Church is not tradition; the Church is what we do next."

And the fact that in the end, the drama is driven not by the Cardinals' ideas and ideals, but their secret sins: the sexual puritan with a promiscuous past, the lover of Latin with a heart full of hate, etc. It's possible that the film takes itself entirely too seriously; fortunately, the viewer is under no such obligation, and may have a good time as a result. 





white Fender Stratocaster, which I still have and play today. I took weekly lessons throughout high school, but I didn't play as much during college. It wasn't until I headed off to music school in LA for a few years that things got really serious for me." In San Diego, he took

other way, maybe to balance things out. "I'm actually a Seattle native," admits the singer-songwriter, whose new album Twists and Turns hit in September. "Growing up in Seattle, grunge had a major influence on me, as did classic rock. Bands like Nirvana with Nevermind, Pearl Jam's Ten, Screaming Trees' Sweet Oblivion, Alice in Chains' Facelift, Sweet Water, Jimi Hendrix's Are You Experienced?, Led Zeppelin's *I-IV*, and The Allman Brothers' Eat a Peach were all on heavy rotation in my early years. Those albums really lit the fire for me and got me excited about picking up a guitar."

His classical-pianist Mom got him lessons on her instrument; Bleiweiss stuck with that from age four or five up until fifth grade. "At that point, I switched to guitar 28 because I felt a stronger connection to it, especially since it was one of the things that really drew me into the music I was listening to at the time. I still remember going down to a store called American Music San with my Mom. She bought me my first guitar, a black-and-

the Strat through On the One, StarShak, and Anthony Smith's Trunk Fulla Funk. Then came a stretch back East, a sharp contrast to Left Coast life. "I lived in Brooklyn, both in Williamsburg and South Williamsburg, from 2013 to 2021. I used to walk about seven miles a day to and from work, unless there was a crazy storm. During those walks, I'd listen to podcasts or new music, often getting lost in the city. Even though I generally took the same route, I always stumbled upon something new, whether it was a piece of graffiti on a wall or a store I'd never noticed before. There's always something to do and a new place to explore, which really inspired and energized me during that time. With music all around me, I probably attended three or four shows a month on average."

In Brooklyn, he took the leap into writing fresh material, and the tunes on *Twists* and Turns progressed from there. But returning to San Diego, he insists, "brought a different kind of inspiration. The city's more laid-back pace and fresh perspective have sparked new creative directions. I've found that inspiration is still abundant; it's just a matter of viewing it through a new lens."

He cut Twists and Turns around town, including Big Fish Recording in Encinitas, his own home, and "a studio that used to be next to San Diego Audio Design." His old boss Anthony Smith helped produce. He also thanks his players, most of whom are from San Diego, including Anthony Smith, John Staten, Kevin Freeby, Ken Dow, Sean Hurley, Rebecca Jade, Durell Anthony, Leonard Patton, Dan Hochhalter, Derek Cannon, Gerard Nolan, Kevin Esposito, and Alex Vargas.

Asked how he goes about weaving together song genres, he says that's "just what naturally came out as I started writing. I never set out to specifically create a funk tune or a bluegrass song. Honestly, everything was challenging. I had never done this before, so all the final decisions rested on my shoulders. Like anything new, there was a lot to learn. It felt like putting together a puzzle, searching for different pieces that fit just right. Once I assembled my dream team, everything started to fall into place over time. The songs evolved as I worked on this project for about five years."

A proud LP nerd, Bleiweiss loves to sort through the stacks, giving shout-outs to local vinyl retailers M-Theory, Folk Arts, Vinyl Junkies, and Cow Records. "To me, there's something special about the story, the art, and the lyrics. Vinyl allows you to explore those elements. So, when I decided to put my album out, I wanted to include the lyrics and some photos, and vinyl seemed like the perfect way to do that. Nobody buys CDs anymore, so vinyl is also a great way to support an artist."

And yes, he's still spinning Eat A Peach.



A metal man at the jazz jam French compositions fly at California English

"People say I'm too nice to play jazz," says bassist Paul Tillery. He's unloading an upright bass to perform at California English with guitarist Jon Garner as a duo. They're replacing Amanda Portela, who had to cancel because of illness, and this sets the tone for a lot of last-minute shuffling for this writer as I accidentally crash not one, but two private events.

Back to Tillery's statement about being "too nice to play jazz" for a moment: it's been my experience since diving into jazz coverage over a year ago that most jazz musicians are pretty nice, and their musical vocabulary leads to extended conversations of music outside of jazz. In Tillery's case, it's all about Iron Maiden, Metallica, and Black Sabbath, and my usual practice of taunting bass players backfires on me because we share too much musical DNA.

A quick intro to Garner later, I'm sitting outside to the left of the duo, sipping on tea because I want something warm as the temperatures drop and the breeze starts to accentuate the cold. The menu looks tempting, but the fish and chips I crave are available only for lunch. The dinner version has English smashed peas and I hate peas. As a child, I used to try to feed my Playskool horse that offal, and he never ate it. Stupid plastic horse.

Awakening from my resentful reverie, I look up to realize

that everyone is on one side of the patio. In the middle in front of the musicians and on the opposite side, there are only empty chairs. The manager, Marco, tells me I'm sitting in the middle of a private event. That must be why the bartender looked confused when I tried to pay for my tea.

It also explains why many people in the section are wearing name badges. I try to sneak a peek at the plastic tags to suss out where they all work, as the neighborhood is surrounded by laboratories. But my glasses are good only for distance; their primary purpose is screaming "hookers and blow" via their yellow tint. Maybe the badge holders are celebrating a breakthrough in creating a mutant like Wolverine or, even better, a taco-making robot! I leave

them to it and move over to the other side of the patio, where Marco tells me another private event will start in less than an hour.

Exploring the venue, I find it simultaneously cavernous and comfortable. At the bar, a customer named Justin is deciding on a beer. I ask him about the prolonged deliberation, and he tells me Smithwick's used to be his favorite Irish beer, but the last time he ordered it at another bar, it was tapped wrong and tasted weird. He takes a leap of faith and orders a pint of something else, placing his taste buds in the bartender's hands. What my limited experience assumes are croquet mallets are placed throughout the restaurant as décor, along with books by executive chef Richard Blais. More

functionally, there are more mallets on the lawn area — assumedly for playing the game and not for eliciting a thud like a whacked wheel of cheese when striking someone on the chest as Jack Torrance did in The Shining.

Back on the patio, setup begins for the second private event, and a staffer named Flora kindly moves my seat away from the chaos but with the same view of the band, which is cranking out some gypsy jazz manouche. Several compositions are from the catalog of the genre's inspiration, Django Reinhardt. In a move that is challenging under the best of circumstances, the duo attempts a piece written for a larger ensemble, complete with the warning not to try this at home. The musical lock they've created increases in intensity when Tillery fixes his eyes on Garner's hands for cues that happen so smoothly, they must be difficult without a time-keeping instrument. I have no idea if they perform the song to aficionado standards. I just appreciate the constant attack of notes and the dynamic interplay. The way the gas flames encased in a glass barrier behind them are giving a Number of the Beast vibe doesn't hurt.

Post-set, my interview with Garner is less about jazz and more about Iron Maiden and him seeing Black Flag with Henry Rollins in New England. I figure that spirit is what he brings, no matter what style he's playing. And speaking of spirits, I check on Justin to see how his beer is. He raises his glass and tells me it's perfect. Faith restored.



Antonin Dvorak's Symphony No. 9 "From the New World." I wonder what the attendance would have looked like without the Dvorak. What if the concert had been all Thomas Adès?

I must say, however, that Josefowicz played the hell out of the piece. She is an amazing musician and a fierce performer. The symphony, as conducted by Elena Schwarz, was straightforward. There is something to be said for this approach. It could be considered a way to restore Dvorak's music to its original intentions and to remove any pretentious performance practices that have choked the piece. On the other hand, if there is to be no push and pull. If there are to be no risks taken, then why is the conductor there?

For instance, the brass chorale that starts the second movement can be ponderous. In Schwarz's hands, it was not stagnant, but it bordered on being perfunctory. The entire performance sat on the edge of being too breezy, too slim.

arrio Logan, I'm thinking, is bound to be a cinch for Yoli, the Mexican lemonlime soft drink that started in Guerrero a century ago, and tastes like Sprite, only a tad more concentrated. That's why I'm walking on the

sunsetty side of Logan Avenue on this Thursday afternoon as people are setting up for the evening market. It's been a while since I've been in the barrio. Good to know it's all still here, what with the all the gentrification pressure you hear about. It's not just the familiar

and fantastic food smells; it's also great that the gentle, communal street-life feel is alive and well. I pass places like "Sew Loka," a place where the art of sewing is being revived. (Yes, a take on Soy *Loca* — "I'm crazy."). Then I pass by the sun-lit

façade of "Todo Pa' La Cruda." The columns are wildly decorated. (Name means "Everything for the Hangover.") I guess they'll have menudo, and other vuelva a la vida dishes like *pozole verde* and caldo de marisco. A couple of Anglo guys who are in there chowing say they're eating the best veggie burritos of their lives, for about six bucks each. I'm almost tempted to sit right down and order one.

Except a veggie burrito is not what I'm really looking for, here in the barrio. What I want is - don't laugh — a hot dog. Not just any hot dog, but what I heard described as a "Sonoran hot dog," like they have down in Hermosillo (the capital of Sonora). Sounds so delicious. Basically a beef dog wrapped in bacon, drowning in pinto beans,

onions, tomatoes, and lots of different sautéed peppers, all tucked up inside a wide bolillo jacket.

Park, and now they've even opened a third in San Antonio, Texas. They call their food Chicano Comfort Food. Dogs with a Mexican riqueza. This I gotta try. I hop inside and hitch myself onto a stool at the counter that faces the sidewalk.

> Francisco and Ericka come up with a menu. "Sonoran dogs?" I say.

"We have many like that," Francisco says. What I like is that he and Ericka are keen to get into it. I ask for a *michelada*. (Turns out the name comes from the

Mexican slang for beer, chela. Mi chelada! Who knew? She has one brought up for me. Gonna pay \$11, I think). "It's kind of like a Bloody Mary, with La Especial beer," she says. Mine is the regular, with clamato and salsa roja. And along with

> jalapenos and lime, it has a dried prune floating on top, a *saladito*.

"The saladito will sink through the drink and add a saltiness to the flavor," Ericka says.

It's refreshing and peppery, but Ericka says the "Fresca" michelada is the most popular. It has cucumber juice added.

I wait a few minutes, and instead of my hot dog, Ericka arrives with a jar of what looks like a creme caramel custard. "This is because we've kept you waiting," she says. Huh. Nice and sweet, and this is going to be cool with the coming heat.

Now Francisco, who's also one of the cooks, appears with this little mountain that is my La Yorona hot dog. "Are you sure?" he asks. "This is our spiciest. Our scariest." And by the time he has run through all the

ingredients, I believe him. Apart from the big beef dog, wrapped in bacon, there's the...well, take it away! "Chile con carne, cheddar cheese, sliced jalapenos, aged Manchega cheese, salsa verde, different peppers we call Crazy Rabbit, Purple Rain, and Creeper or Carolina Reaper, Dragon Tears (that's a kind of chili oil), crunchy fried onion and garlic, pickled red onion, fresh habanero, wasabi sesame seeds, and one of the bolillo buns, which we bake ourselves every morning."

Wow. So I get the "tears," but how come that name, La Yorona? It turns out it's based on the legend which goes back to Aztec times, of La Llorona, a vengeful ghost. She wanders by water mourning her children - who she drowned. I

think it also ties in with La Malinche, the "Mother of Modern Mexico," who guided Cortez, bore a son to him, and some say betrayed her people by aiding the Spanish. One way or another, you're gonna be shedding tears.

And specially, when I bite into something small and lethal, feels like, man, I'm shedding more than tears. But I surprise even myself: I seem to be able to handle the heat. Mainly because the flavors are so strong and luscious, and surrounded by that excellent bolillo, they almost round out the tongue-withering heat. The chela helps too. When

I'm finished. I sit back like a sumo wrestler after Round Ten. I'll have to come back, because now I'm curious about other options like El Bombero ("The Fireman," with seven distinct chiles), or El Xolito, with cheese, sour cream and, they say, plenty of crunchy garlic. Costs two dollars less than my \$12 Yorona.

"Come back when the low riders parade past here," says Ericka. "Every weekend evening. Like your La Yorona dog, they're hot!"

Oh, and the Yoli? Guess we're talking TJ for that.



aboard 27 half-day to 3-day trips out of San Diego landings over the past week caught 2 bonito, 3 lingcod, 9 rock crab, 2167 rockfish, 9 sand bass, 8 sculpin, 22 sheephead, 29 spiny lobster (70 released), 273 whitefish, and 3 vellowtail.

Saltwater: The reason I total the fish caught by the half day to 3-day fleet is that most longer running boats do not report their counts. That said, some of the boats that run anything from 1.5-day to long range trips of a week or longer also don't report their counts on the shorter trips. So, I total the fish caught from the same set of boats every week over the past ten years to give a sampling of the catch that is consistent. This is why there are no tuna in the count this week, and also so few yellowtail. But yes, some boats got into yellowfin, bluefin, and yellowtail within 3-day range.

Most of the pelagic action was far south, from the Bahia Asuncion area south to the Ridge and banks outside of Bahia Magdalena off the Pacific side of the lower half of the Baja Peninsula. Yellowfin tuna, some pushing 300 pounds and one pending world record 442.5-pounder reported last week, and bluefin tuna to 200 pounds are still being found off southern Baia, while there are still sightings of tuna outside off northern Baia and even out west at the Cortez and Tanner banks. Varying winter conditions often keep the boats working south along the coast rather than further offshore, so that can also skew the counts.

While most of the long-range fleet has been concentrating along the Baja Pacific coast south of Isla Cedros, the Searcher went out west to

Alijos Rocks and found steady action on yellowfin tuna, some wahoo, and yellowtail. Alijos Rocks are a series of tiny, steep, uninhabited, and barren volcanic islets about 190 miles west of the southern Baja coast. The total land area is a couple acres, and is mostly pinnacle rock. The edges of the drop-offs around the high spot are steep, which provides upwelled nutrients where baitfish and their predators gather, making it a choice, if not distant, destination for longrange boats.

On that Searcher trip, a yellowtail caught by angler Arturo Pino off the edge at Alijos Rocks was about the thickest yellowtail I have ever seen. I have seen some fat ones, but most are built like torpedoes, long and narrow. Their cousin amberjacks will have more "shoulders" on them, with a taller profile, but this was not an amberjack. We should get an official weight on the fish when the Searcher returns mid-week, but, given an estimated length and girth, Arturo's fish may be around 60 pounds. In looking at the photo, I figure about 50 inches long by at least a 30-inch girth. Given the common formula of length times girth squared then divided by 800, the fish would weigh just over 56 pounds. And that is a very conservative estimate of the girth. It would be nowhere near the world record, but it does have some folks wondering if the fish is somehow a hybrid yellowtail/amberjack or just a bit deformed.

Imperial Beach Pier is going through some repairs and upgrades, where \$2 million has been allocated to add enhancements and replace a couple pilings. The southernmost pier in California has been closed for times when public safety could be endangered, such as during the piling replacements being done by helicopter but has opened a day or two between phases. The current phase of the project should be completed and the pier fully reopened by Thanksgiving Day. Future deck board replacement work and utility piping work may require partial pier closures or short full pier closures. The project is anticipated to be complete in summer 2025, so until then, check the Port of San Diego Imperial Beach Pier Enhancement page for updates.

Imperial Beach Pier used to be the landing and launching point for sportboats, like the Bright and Morningstar, that used the pier as a convenient departure to fish the Coronado Islands. I rode that boat from the pier a few times, and can see why, given rising insurance costs, that they had to guit running those trips. There was a ramp that one had to walk down to board the boat, and with the waves causing the boat to buck and rock, it made getting aboard a challenge at times. Anglers' rods and tackle boxes were loaded by a davit (a small crane) mounted to the pier. My last trip out on that boat was on a Monday, seniors' day, and it took a while to get underway, because a strong yellowtail bite had lured some 50 seniors, who took advantage of the half price discount and excellent fishing. My partner Susan and I were the only passengers that day under 55 years old, and she had an unlimited supply of both cold beer from the galley and off-color jokes offered by winking geezers. In spite of the crowded load, we got limits of yellowtail and gifted beer, so it was actually quite the fun day on the water!

Most anglers fishing from piers are those targeting smaller fish such as mackerel, croaker, and the occasional piling perch. But there are a few folks who traipse out to the ends and set up for big game; usually sharks and bat rays. When targeting larger fish from a platform far above the water, a pier gaff is necessary to raise the fish too heavy to be brought up by rod and reel. These gaffs are basically a weighted large treble hook on a rope, and often requires a second person to gaff the fish while the angler keeps the fish flat on the surface. Some piers with bait shops will have a loaner pier gaff, though there is usually one or more anglers out there targeting larger game who has one if the need arises. Whether the beach, bay, lake, or offshore, they're out there so go out and get 'em!

Locally, lobster hooping was tough and a bit hit-and-miss, while rockfish continue to be the



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

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Suspicion Confirmed Customs officials at the Lima, Peru, airport spotted something unusual about a man boarding a flight on Nov. 8, The New York Times reported. The unnamed 28-yearold, a citizen of South Korea, was returning home with a planned stopover in France, but he was notable because of his extremely swollen stomach, officials said. When asked to lift his shirt, he revealed a creepy, crawly cargo: 320 tarantulas, 110 centipedes and nine bullet ants. Each bug had its own plastic bag, all of which were attached to two girdles wrapped around the man's body. The 35 adult tarantulas were each about the size of a human hand. All the bugs are native to the Amazon region of Peru, said Walter Silva, a government wildlife specialist. He added that the discovery was "part of the illegal wildlife trafficking that moves millions of dollars." The tarantulas are on the country's endangered species list. The man was arrested with charges pending.

Field Report

- Norwegian fisherman Harald Engen got a message on Nov. 11 that his 32-foot boat's trawl nets had snagged something most unusual, the *Anchorage Daily News* reported. Turns out the USS Virginia, a 377-foot nuclear-powered submarine, had been chugging away from Tromso, Norway, with a Norwegian Coast Guard vessel escorting it, when its propellers became entangled with the nets. As a result, the Coast Guard had to cut the nets to free the submarine. They

assured Engen that he would be reimbursed for his nets.

Gimme a Sign

- Transportation workers in Boulder, Colorado, had to go out on Nov. 19 to take down some "freelance" road signs that had mysteriously appeared in the city, 9News-TV reported. The signs, which appeared in four different locations, warned drivers to "Get Off Your Damn Phone" and "Don't Kill Any Kids Today," along with other messages. Boulder Police spokesperson Dionne Waugh said the signs are professionally made and installed, but officials don't know who put them up. "I'm guessing that it's a concerned citizen that is kind of fed up with the behavior they're seeing in their neighborhoods," said police commander Darren Fladung. He suggested there are more appropriate ways to get those messages out.

Latest Religious Message

— Why settle for a middleman when you can confess your sins straight to Jesus Christ himself? Worshippers at St. Peter's Church in Lucerne, Switzerland, are baring their souls to a hologram Jesus powered by AI, the *Daily Mail* reported on Nov. 20. And already, at least twothirds of the people who have received the image's grace have called it a "spiritual" experience. "Though it's a machine, it gave me so much advice," one person said -- like, "Your task is not to judge, but to accompany with love." The AI Jesus can even speak 100 different languages. It was trained at the Lucerne University of Applied Sciences and Arts using the New Testament.

It's Come to This

- Sweden's minister for gender equality and work life, Paulina Brandberg, has spoken in the past about her extreme phobia of bananas, *The Guardian* reported on Nov. 14. But recently leaked emails have made clear just how far her staff will go to protect her from the yellow fruits. For instance, staff will specify that "no traces of bananas must be in the room" before she arrives. Brandberg said she was getting professional help with her phobia, but Prime Minister Ulf Kristersson backed her up: "I am disturbed when a hardworking cabinet minister is almost reduced to a phobia and people make fun of it."

Weird Science

- University of Richmond professor and neuroscientist Kelly Lambert has been training rats to drive tiny cars since 2019, the *New York Post* reported. "Unexpectedly, we found that the rats had an intense motivation for their driving training, often jumping into the car and revving the 'lever engine' before their vehicle hit the road," Lambert said. She and her fellow scientists concluded that the rats' excitement was a Pavlovian response to treats and operating the vehicles -- but even when the treats were removed, they were ready to put the pedal to the metal. "They remind us that planning, anticipating and enjoying the ride may be key to a healthy brain," Lambert said.

Great Art

— The duct-taped banana "artwork" just won't turn brown and mushy and find its way into the bin. On Nov. 20 in New York City, Sotheby's sold the latest iteration for \$6.2 million to Justin Sun, founder of the cryptocurrency platform TRON, WFAA-TV reported. Bidding started at \$800,000. Sun said the art "represents a cultural phenomenon that bridges the worlds of art, memes and the cryptocurrency community. ... In the coming days, I will personally eat the banana as part of this unique artistic experience, honoring its place in both art history and popular culture." Lucky for Sun, he technically bought the rights to duct-tape any other banana to any other wall and call it "Comedian," as it was dubbed in 2019 by Italian artist Maurizio Cattelan.
