

Seawalls and semantics Condo owners question meaning of existence

According to a report by the Legislative Analyst's Office, between \$8 billion and \$10 billion of existing property in California is likely to be underwater by 2050. Now, a lawsuit that had beachfront property owners feeling hopeful about their ability to rely on seawalls to protect their homes is leaning the other way — toward upholding limits on coastal armor.

The current fight is between homeowners and the California Coastal Commission, and it hinges on whether seawalls may be used to defend any structure on the beach or only those built before the California Coastal Act took effect on Janu-



But the commission appealed, and in a tentative ruling in October, the 1st District Court of Appeals in San Francisco agreed with the commission that homes built after the California Coastal Act took effect are not entitled to permits to build seawalls. Under the landmark Coastal Act, permits were



allowed for seawalls and other armoring to protect "existing structures." But since that term was never clearly defined, property owners have tried to argue a different meaning, saying it applies to any building that exists when the permit application is filed.

Attorneys for the commission argue that seawalls and other armoring — which now covers at least 33 percent of the southern California coastline - stop bluffs from eroding and beaches from naturally migrating inland. As sea levels rise, sandy public beaches grow thinner and thinner. Surfrider San Diego, which joined the fight against the "seawall precedent" in Half Moon Bay, argued the case could reshape the entire coast.

A final opinion on the seawall case will be issued after a Dec. 11 hearing.

spurred panic buying among Filipino Americans in San Diego County and beyond. The FDA recently restricted imports of these tangy and spicy sauces, because ingredients like BHA (butylated hydroxyanisole) and potassium iodate exceeded permissible levels. But despite risks linked to these preservatives, locals have been scrambling to secure the dipping sauces in time for the holidays.

Countywide, besides scouring the OfferUp and Facebook Marketplace platforms, Filipinos are meeting with strangers in parking lots to buy bottles of sauce for as much continued on page 5

as ten times the original market value. "Without the special sauces for our big parties - Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's Eve — it's really not the same," said Jon-Jon Hernandez of Chula Vista. He compared the situation to "banning ketchup and mustard before the Super Bowl - and I'm not overreacting!" Hernandez and others are shelling out \$20 to \$25 per bottle for sauces that previously sold for just \$2 to \$5 at the Seafood City supermarkets in Mira Mesa and Chula Vista. "We're biting our tongues because we need the sawsawan for our house parties and Karaoke together," Hernandez added.

Despite internet claims that the condiments have been outright banned, the FDA has clarified that they are being detained at U.S. borders under Detained Without Physical Examination policies until manufacturers comply with safety standards. But even so, the scarcity of sauces

has turned some locals into opportunistic sellers. Kirby Pac from North County has

been listing his surplus bottles of Mang Tomas sauce - traditionally paired with *lechon* (roasted pig) - for \$20 each on Facebook Marketplace. As of this writing, his ad warns, "Only ten bottles left. Will not ship; meet around Peñasquitos or Mira Mesa on weekends. Priority to buyers purchasing multiple bottles - no bulk discounts."

On Amazon, Mang Tomas bottles sell for \$20 plus \$9 shipping, while Jufran Banana Sauce, a Filipino alternative to ketchup, fetches \$23. About six months ago, I bought a bottle of banana sauce at Ranch 99 on Claremont Mesa Blvd. for just \$3-\$4. I use it as a dipping sauce for my Max's Fried Chicken and lumpia. Even non-Filipinos guests have expressed disappointed online over the lack of Mang Tomas or banana ketchup at recent Friendsgiving gatherings. (Popular dipping sauces like UFC Sweet

Chili Sauce and Jufran Sweet Chili Sauce, often served with lumpia, are also on the FDA-restricted list.)

For those unwilling to pay inflated prices or unable to find the sauces, DIY recipes have become a last resort. "I went to

Seafood City for Mang Tomas Lechon Sauce and All-Purpose Sauce," said Joselito Santos, "but it's banned now! I have to find someone selling it or make it myself." Happily, websites like *TagalogLang.com* offer step-by-step guides to recreate Mang Tomas using ingredients like breadcrumbs, vinegar, garlic, liver, sugar, and spices.

> The shortage doesn't end with the sauces mentioned above. Products like UFC Sweet Filipino Style Spaghetti Sauce, a staple for sweet spaghetti with hot dog slices, have been restricted. HDR Foods Corporation's Kare-Kare Stew Mix, beloved in Filipino kitchens and restaurants across Mira Mesa and National City, is another casualty. Kare-Kare, a rich peanut-based stew featuring oxtail, tripe, and vegetables like banana blossoms and eggplant, is a staple for Filipino Christmas and New Year celebrations. Even its essential accompaniment,

bagoong (fish paste), has faced restrictions in the past.

These scenarios are not the first time San "I went to Seafood Diego's food scene has faced challenges due to City for Mang Tomas import restrictions or food bans. Around the Lechon Sauce and time of Covid, local Thai restaurants struggled All-Purpose Sauce, when retailers stopped but it's banned now!" selling a famous coconut milk brand over allegations of monkey labor in its supply chain. The coconut milk

ban disrupted the curry menus, soups, and even the peanut sauce — San Diegans' go-to dishes and condiments when choosing Thai cuisine.

Food restrictions and bans go beyond Asia. Authentic brie cheese, made with unpasteurized raw milk, is illegal in the U.S. Haggis, Scotland's national dish, has been banned since the '70s due to its inclusion of sheep lungs, and Beluga caviar is prohibited to protect overfished sturgeon. UNDER THE RADAR

Basket bets Heath Freeman, the highrolling Wall Street investor behind the takeover of a raft of distressed American newspapers, including the *San Diego Union-Tribune*, is moving into the world of junk sports. "In Heath, we've found a partner who is passionate about developing communities and creating meaningful change for the better. This market has the unique distinction of mirroring the growth and expansion that is currently underway in our league, and I am confident that Miami will be

an ideal home for our second Big3 franchise," said the rapper and actor **Ice Cube** in a June 18 dispatch by *SportsPro.com*.

Freeman is backing a new team for the Big3, a professional three-on-three basketball league. Chimed in Freeman: "I am honored to join Ice Cube and **Jeff Kwatinetz** at the Big3 and bring a new professional basketball team to Miami. Big3 is shaping the future of basketball; the gameplay is dynamic and nuanced

and the product on the court appeals to the audiences in this incredibly fast-growing region. Basketball fans across South Florida can rest assured that this franchise will soon add to our great region's winning sports pedigree."

However happy he is to have Heath aboard, however, Ice Cube remains unhappy with the rival National Basketball Association. "They've been doing things behind the scenes that nobody can see. They're discouraging networks from showing Big3, discouraging sponsors, those kinds of things. It's terrible. And it's been going on for six years," he said in an interview posted in June 2023, by the *Dallas Morning News*.

"They don't own basketball. They think they do, but they don't. I like to say that nobody goes to their house and says, 'Mom, I wanna play NBA.' They say, 'I want to play basketball.' They just don't like the fact that we've changed the game. All the stuff they're doing behind the scenes — I believe they're breaking a lot of antitrust laws — it has to stop."

What role Freeman and his newspapers may have in taking

on the NBA remains unknown. In the meantime, Freeman's name surfaced in a *Wall Street Journal* story last week about the Professional Bull Riders League, under the headline "Meet the Billionaires Taking Over Professional Bull Riding." Per the *Journal*, "Some are longtime sports investors, looking for the next big pro league, such as Nascar team owner **Richard Childress** and the Fisher family, owner of the Athletics Major League Baseball team. Others have serious Wall Street credentials. Avenue Capital bought a bull-riding team earlier this year, wagering that a big media deal would draw more deep pockets into the sport." The paper described Freeman as "President of Alden Global Capital, an investment firm that gained attention for buying up local newspapers and slashing costs. He owns the Florida Freedom."

Freeman and his fellow bull riding owners have found themselves in a tough new world. "PBR starts each event with a prayer. It

is sponsored by the U.S. Border Patrol, has partnered with the U.S. Concealed Carry Association and often honors the military at events. Longtime PBR fans have noticed the crowd changing: Many point to sightings of cowboy hats worn backward, or the emergence of booing during events, which is taboo in bull riding." Last month, Malley spoke to Capital News Service at the University of Maryland about why the group paid for House staffer tours. "When you're physically [visiting someone] who's talking to you about how their home was demolished...it's hard to ignore that when you're thinking about your policies."

The local food, as shown by Bercovitch's trip itinerary attached to his disclosure form, also may play a role. "The Old Man and the Sea Restaurant in Jaffa, founded in 1999 by **Younes Ali**, is a well-known spot that offers fresh Mediterranean seafood, a table filled with salads, a captivating sea view, and a warm, friendly atmosphere where families, friends, and dignitaries come together to enjoy dinner," says a group's itinerary.

In an account of meetings held by the group on October 27, the itinerary says: "With Congress defunding [United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees], it is important to understand the scope and scale of the work that they do." Israeli officials have accused the U.N. relief agency of involvement in the Hamasled attack on Israel on Oct. 7, 2023, but the Rebuilding Alliance itinerary maintains reductions aren't called for.

"Instead of a cut in funding, if anything, the health centers need more money to deal with increased demand after the COVID-19 pandemic. Big house on the hill

A little history of Ivanhoe Ranch

Ivanhoe Ranch was part of a nearly 9000-acre land grant — Jamacha Rancho — given in 1840 by Alta California Governor San Juan Bautista Alvarado to Apolinaria Lorenzana, a Mexican orphan under the care of the Catholic Church at Mission San Diego de Alcala. She lived at the San Diego Mission, nursing and educating Native Americans on the premises. Daily operations of the Rancho were conducted by her mayordomo, Robert Kelly, who oversaw the cultivation of wheat, corn, and limes. Although she would visit her property on occasion, she did not reside on the premises. Eventually, she moved from San Diego to San Juan Capistrano when the last pastor, Father Olivos, left in 1847.

Following the Mexican-American War, all rancho land was appropriated by the U.S. government. Kelly allowed military officials to stay on the rancho and graze livestock. In 1853, Colonel John Magruder purchased Jamacha Rancho from Lorenzana for \$4167. She later began an appeal process to recover the land, but had already sold her mortgage, which weakened her legal position. In later interviews, she claimed she had not sold the property, and that it had been taken from her by the U.S. military. In 1928, the section of Rancho Jamacha that eventually became known as the 200-acre Ivanhoe Ranch was bought for the recently orphaned John Paul Scripps in 1928 - to give him space to raise cattle and earn an income. Barns, bunk houses, and houses built around this time still exist on the ranch today.

The Spanish hacienda, situated at the top of a lone hill in the Sweetwater River watershed, was designed by noted architect Frank Hope and completed in 1941. The nearly 5000-square-foot house has views of the surrounding Steele Canyon

and Cottonwoods golf courses located along the river valley and Mt. McGinty. It contains four master suites and five baths, plus an office/library, four fireplaces, and a private saloon. The grounds are lush and carefully landscaped. The property contains an Olympic size swimming pool with accompanying changing rooms for men and women. The pool lies adjacent to a picturesque courtyard decorated with palms and birds of paradise, and is adorned with brick walkways and a fountain.

In 1946, Robert Immenschuh married Jean Campbell, and in 1949, Jean's father David - a tuna boat builder and the founder of Campbell Machine Co. — bought the property for them.

Development has been slowed by the discovery of Native American remains and traffic concerns.

Robert was originally from Kansas; he moved to San Diego and worked as a veterinarian for the San Diego Zoo during World War II. Jean was a veterinarian as well, and an accomplished equestrian. She was a member of the Cow Belles, the women's affiliate of the Cattlemen's Association, and a director for the San Diego County Cutting Horse Association. The family raised quarter horses and Hereford cattle, and grew oat hay, which kept the operation self-sustaining. They were involved with racing and showing horses. Jean's parents lived in an adobe hacienda on the ranch until her mother's death in 1980. After that, the ranch served as a hospital for horses from all over San Diego as well as a boarding center - until Jean and Robert divorced in 1999.

The marriage had produced two daughters, and after the divorce, one of them attempted to sell and develop the property. However, the ancestral family will stated that while any grandchildren of the couple would inherit the ranch, no development of the ranch could occur until Jean's death. This would later become a source of bitter contention and litigation among the family. According to a local resident, Karen Romano, she was taken to court by one of her daughters, and lost. The ruling allowed Jean to stay in the ranch house, while control of the ranch property was ceded to her daughter. The other daughter would visit on birthdays and holidays, but most of the time, Jean lived alone.

I personally have fond childhood memories of riding my bike down the dirt road at the end of Ivanhoe Ranch Road and onto the ranch. It was guarded by an electronic fence that seemed to be open more often than not, and since the ranch occupied an immense mass of land, the "no trespassing" sign was hardly, if ever, heeded. Other

neighborhood kids and I would frequently hop the fences to play hide and go seek and explore.

In July of 2005, Jean hosted a community event at the main ranch house featuring Jane Goodall, a famous biologist known for her work with primates. A local middle school science teacher, Marion Soloway, organized the event on behalf of the local chapter of the youth organization, Roots and Shoots, which was co-founded by Dr. Goodall. Students, teachers, and families from Hillsdale Middle School came to hear Goodall speak. Jean offered tours of her manor and incredible garden. The ranch was sold the same year, and Jean died in 2020.

Today, the corrals are overgrown with weeds and large portions of the fence are missing. The stalls remain largely unoccupied. The main ranch house and its five-acre property, while currently vacant, continues to be maintained by on-site staff, and is currently listed as a rental property. An effort to convert the property to a residential development has been underway for several years, but has met with numerous challenges.

A groundskeeper named Manuel has been working the Ivanhoe property since 1984. He described Jean as very strict with the four or five workers she employed. One day, he didn't show up to work without leaving a message because he wasn't feeling well. The next day, she told him, "I expect a message if you're not coming in," and said that he would be fired if it happened again. But he also described her generosity and personal emphasis on the value of education. Manuel's eldest daughter wanted to go to college, but the family did not have enough money. Jean ended up financing her education for the first semester, including books. She also personally financed the college education of a horse trainer who worked on the ranch.





Westfield Shoppingtown Mission Valley

Santa never wrapped anything at our house. Presents from Mom were wrapped, but not the ones from Santa. And there was always flour — and we knew it was flour — all over the place, with footsteps in it that led to the fireplace and up the chimney. 

Drinks All Around

ANTHONY SCHMIDT Born & Raised 1909 India Street Little Italy



The news of late has been full of stories about the price of eggs; some pundits have gone so far as to suggest that it tipped the recent Presidential election. It's not just a lot of clucking and crowing; the Bureau of Labor Statistics website features reports on eggflation. Eager to toast the end of same and the promise of better times to come, I went looking for the most elevated egg nog I could find, and soon found myself ensconced beneath the walnut blooms of the baronial bar at Born & Raised, there to sample their Holiday Punch.

"They say you can live on one egg a day; I can feel that in this drink," marveled The Wife. "That substantial yolk secures the center, and yet it's not cloying or heavy. You want a tray of them to send down the hatch, like Anthony Blanche with the Brandy Alexanders in *Brideshead Revisited.*" I had to agree, at least about the relative lightness of the foamy-custardy cocktail.

It turns out that much was intentional. "Not every egg cocktail needs to have a whiskey base," says Anthony Schmidt, partner and Beverage Director at CH Projects. "We wanted a lighter version, something not crazy decadent — especially in a situation like Born & Raised, where so much of the experience is decadent. Cognac tends to be more velvety and luxurious than whiskey, but while there's a richness and an opulence to it, there's also some lightness. We didn't want a dessert drink to just hammer you."

There are similar reasons behind

the use of amaro CioCiaro. "We have what we call 'burnt orange;' it's a superreduced orange juice — we cook it down, down, down to 70% water reduction. It's this intense orange — super thick and syrupy, and slightly bitter and roasted. Then we stabilize that with the Cio-Ciaro bitters, which has its own hint of orange. We knew the orange aspect would freshen up the drink, lighten it. But the burnt caramel aspect of it was going to keep it in that transitory place of 'sort of a dessert, sort of not."

As for the absinthe rinse that graces the glass with its herbal bite, "that's been around in cocktail books as far back as 1900. It's an old trick to make a gin drink a bit more ginny, but it works really well with a number of spirits. A Sazerac is basically a rye Old Fashioned served without ice in a glass that has been chilled with a little bit of absinthe in it. You empty the glass before pouring in the drink, but it has a lovely residual aroma. And the oldest version of a Sazerac is a cognac Old Fashioned. We've been messing with that combination since forever."

- •.5 oz VSOP cognac
- •.5 oz. Licor 43
- •.5 oz caramelized orange syrup
- •.25 oz amaro CioCiaro
- •.1 oz cream
- egg yolk

Combine ingredients with ice in shaker can and shake vigorously. Strain into the small side of the shaker can, empty ice, re-seal shaker and shake intensely for a brief moment. Pour into 6-7 oz cocktail glass that has been rinsed with absinthe.

"Christmas berry" decorates our landscape, Geminids, high tides

Toyon, Or "Christmas Berry," One Of The More Distinctive Shrubs of southern California's native chaparral plant community, has begun to flaunt clusters of red berries. Hollywood (California) derives its name from the holly-like appearance of this plant. Here in coastal San Diego, toyon can usually be found wherever large patches of native vegetation survive, but especially in the thick chaparral covering some north-facing slopes. A holiday warning: toyon branches may look inviting to cut as a Christmas wreath — but they're protected by California state law.

December 13 Will Be The Peak Of One Of The Year's Brightest And Most Active Meteor Showers, the Geminids. The Geminid meteor shower is also the longest shower of the year typically averaging 75 meteors per hour from 9 pm until the break of dawn. Most showers don't get going until well after midnight, but this show begins early because the Gemini constellation rises so early. Ideal viewing

will be at 2 am as Gemini reaches its highest point in the night sky. Unfortunately, December's "Cold Moon" Will Wash Out Most Of The Meteors and only the brightest will be visible. December's Full Moon, named the "cold moon," "oak moon," "wolf moon," and "moon of long nights" according to the traditions of certain past cultures, rises spectacularly over the eastern horizon a few minutes before the sun sets on Sunday, December 15. The moon's night-long journey will take it nearly to the zenith of the sky by midnight and then down to a setting position over the ocean by dawn on Monday morning. Exceptionally High And Low Tides Are Set To Occur on several days in mid December. These tides coincide with the full moon, and also with the upcoming winter solstice — two factors that influence the tidal extremities. Friday, December 13, the tide will reach 7.32 ft at 7:02 am; on Saturday, December 14, 7.51 ft at 7:44 am; on Sunday, December 15, 7.51 ft at 8:25 am and on Monday, December 16, it will reach 7.28 ft at 9:07 am. If any strong winter storm happens to arrive from the west during these peak tides, some flooding of low-lying coastal areas around San Diego is likely. Several exceptionally low tides will also occur within the same string of dates. On December 14 and 15 the tide will fall to an extreme depth of -1.84 feet at 3:01 p.m. and 3:46 pm. December 16 will see a low of -1.61 feet at 4:30 pm. A perfect winter weekend for exploring marine life in the tidepool areas along San Diego County's coastline.

Your Local Theatre Presents: A Christmas Carol, by Charles Dickens, Again

A late contender for my favorite play of 2024. I went in with my guard up, thanks to that arch title — the bland anonymity of "Your Local Theater," the world-weary ennui of "Again." Yes, local theaters tend to do *A Christmas Carol* every year. What of it? *A Christmas Carol* is not only a great Christmas story, it's a great story, period. And if you can't indulge — and even revere — tradition at Christmas, then you probably hate tradition. And Christmas. Bah, humbug! What could possibly

be more tiresome than a backstage play in which a bunch of Theater People tear apart something beloved by the rubes in the audience?

Funnily enough, the play has an answer: a twenty-hour meditation on the passage of time in which a naked woman covered in flour crawls across the stage with agonizing slowness against a backdrop of primitive puppetry. Happily, that show is only referenced by one of the actors playing in this show, which is a much briefer, more engaging, and yes, more entertaining meditation on the passage of time in which a man makes his way from Fred to Cratchit to Scrooge over multiple productions of a Philly theater's annual rendition of Dickens' famous ghost story.

Yes, the characters are theater people — from the outset, our man is more comfortable on a stage, where he knows what he's supposed to say and how things are supposed to go. (Once those things are out of the way, he can flourish; the old hand playing Scrooge marvels at the way he handles the "difficult beast" of Fred, transforming him from cardboard prop to beating human heart.) But before that, they are people, people with off-stage lives that must be navigated without a script. And it is to playwright Anna Ouyang Moench's considerable credit that when she finally brings the action "on stage" and into the world of A Christmas Carol, she manages to merge those two aspects in genuinely moving fashion. Anora — Writer-director Sean Baker's latest foray into the private lives of people who make their privates public opens brilliantly, as New York City stripper/escort Anora (a gung-ho, all-in Mikey Madison) grinds her way through her daily grind, making nice with a steady procession of customers, one replacing another so seamlessly that they run together just as they must in our heroine's mind. Then, during a break, a co-worker marvels that one fellow "told me how much I reminded him of his daughter, then ordered five private dances from me!" (The horror.) "At least he paid for the dances," replies Anora. (The banality.) That's Baker, mingling the deeply personal and the "merely" physical in ways feel moral without feeling moralistic.

Talking of which: the reason Anora (who prefers "Annie") gets picked to take care of Ivan, the young Russian playboy who shows up at her club, is that she had a grandmother who never learned English after coming over from the old country. Ivan is so taken with her attentions that he hires her for a week of sexy partytimes and whisks her off to Vegas, a city famous for its spur-of-themoment weddings. What fun! He even tells her that he'd be happy with her even without his parents? money. Annie tries not to believe him, but she doesn't have enough happy reality to counter the much happier fantasy - there's a sister (who feels like she should show up more), but no future. Small surprise when a mid-video game quickie gets interrupted by Ivan's long-suffering babysitter Garnick and his assistant Igor.

The manhunt that follows is longer than it needs to be, and even a bit indulgent, but still largely entertaining — a description which fits the film as a whole. Perhaps the director's most conventional effort to date; it even veers toward cliché in its final scene. But what comes before is strong enough to make it hit anyway. (2024)— M.L. ★★ (IN WIDE RELEASE)

Conclave — Director Edward Berger's adaptation of Robert Harris' novel about the election of a new pope is shot and acted as a Serious Movie: all those muted reds and saturated blacks in those lingering shots of the Sistine Chapel ceiling overhead and the embattled Cardinals below, all that anguish and intellection in the faces of Ralph Fiennes, John Lithgow, Stanley Tucci, et al. (Oh, and not a little ambition, as well: Tucci's American hopeful insists that every Cardinal, deep down, has picked out the name he'd choose for himself as pope — although it's hard to believe this applies to the humble, war-weary newcomer who arrives at the conclave's outset and announces that he was elevated in secret by the late pontiff, despite his mysterious health concerns.)

But it's scored and written as a potboiler in the mode of *The Da Vinci Code*. (No Opus Dei assassins here, but still plenty of sturm and drang about the dark forces that keep the Church mired in the Dark Ages of Latin rites and sexual rigidity, forces that are threatened by the modern virtues of doubt and openness.) The sawing strings and plunking piano that punctuate the action, the ponderous portentousness of pronouncements like, "The Church is not tradition; the Church is what we do next."

And the fact that in the end, the drama is driven not by the Cardinals' ideas and ideals, but their secret sins: the sexual puritan with a promiscuous past, the lover of Latin with a heart full of hate, etc. It's possible that the film takes itself entirely too seriously; fortunately, the viewer is under no such obligation, and may have a good time as a result. 

vinyl Wax, whose "government name" is Michael Jones, knows his way around the local music scene. "I have played empty open mic nights in San Diego, and I have performed in front of a sold out crowd of 10K at Rady Shell.

My go-to venue as a headlining act for a while was the Soda Bar. I lived a block away from there in Normal Heights. The Soda Bar has no green room, so I would just use my living room instead." On the road,

though, things sometimes get weird. "I think my favorite gig I ever did was on the campus of Worcester Polytechnic Institute, about 2009," recalls Jones, who boldly went vinyl-only for his new album Lifetime Achievement Award.

"The student

organization that booked the musical events was run by a student who was a huge fan of me. I had started gaining notoriety online at that time, but still, even to this day, the average college student has no clue who I am. They set me up at lunch time in the middle of a dining hall. I was playing instrumentals from my iPod and just rapping in the middle of the cafeteria. All the students were walking by, looking at me like I was insane. Wait, we have a random rapper happening today? One guy came up about two feet away from me and just laughed in my face for a minute. I remember just staring at the clock as the contractually-obligated hour went by ever so slowly. The dude that booked me sat there watching me, smiling the whole time, absolutely loving it. He was the only person who gave a shit out of the hundreds of people who were there to

eat. I think now I am experienced enough that I wouldn't be that embarrassed. At the time, it was quite rough."

Wax started out in Maryland, but hit Southern California in 2006. "I have lived in Ocean Beach, Normal Heights, and now Santee. I enjoyed liv-

> ing in Ocean Beach during the pandemic, it was even more lawless than usual. People were selling large bags of psilocybin mushrooms openly at the farmer's market. Maybe that is legal now, I don't know. They wouldn't do that here in Santee...unless the mushrooms were somehow Trumpendorsed. He sells vodka, so I wouldn't put it past him."

As for that three-letter moniker, "My name has zero relation to the LA band Wax, but I did meet their singer Joe Sib, who is now a comedian. He is a good dude. Unfortunately, there are, like, 100 musical artists — from metal bands to K-Pop singers to folk singers to other rappers - named Wax. If I were to name myself today, I would be WaXXX\$\$67 or something like that. You gotta be searchengine optimized these days, that is why young rappers often have names that look like email passwords."

He grew up on the Red Hot Chili Peppers, Pharcyde, NWA, and the Wu-Tang Clan, but now loses himself in Steely Dan, Earth Wind & Fire, the Bee Gees, and Stevie Wonder. "I still mostly write simple stuff, but I take it up a notch here and there thanks to the brilliance of these folks that came before me."

So why a vinyl-only release? "Nowadays, when an album comes out on Friday, you see it posted on Instagram, listen to ten seconds of a song through

> a short-form content video, then mavbe head over to your Spotify app and listen to the first fifteen seconds of each song while getting interrupted by text notifications and whatever other noise you have your phone programmed to bombard you with. On top of that, you're thinking about what to do that weekend and scrolling TikTok or YouTube shorts, or whatever other nonsense you are

However, he says, "When you listen to a vinyl record, you listen mindfully. You drop the needle, then sit down with some wine, weed, cheese, popcorn, and/or a cigar, and consume the whole album the way you would watch a movie. You don't skip. You listen to the songs you don't like. You experience the record with respect for the record. Don't get me wrong, I love the convenience of streaming, and one day this album will be on there too. But for now, the intention behind this project was for it to be experienced as a vinyl record. And yes, the people who have tried to talk me out of it are mostly people who don't own record players."

Minnesota nice — and gnarly

A polite pit coalesces at Quartyard

"Are you more concerned about your drinks being stolen or someone putting something in them?" I ask a gaggle of patrons at The Quartyard in East Village where Hockey Dad, Remo Drive, and Tatiana Hazel are performing. (As the customers left their drinks on a table to come outside to the smoking section, a security guard assured them he would remain vigilant while they partook.) In unison, several of them say that someone drugging their drinks is the greater concern. After all, they reason, they can always buy another drink if one gets pilfered. Over a smoke, Rose tells me about one of her friends being dosed and then walking on the 8 West. She got home safely, but didn't remember anything the following morning.

Rose discovered the band Hockey Dad while bartending in their native Australia at a small bar. I tell her I liked the name and was interested in the venue, though I'm disappointed that the Wayne Gretzky jersey I'm wearing isn't sparking a game of pickup puck. But back to Rose, who was traveling in Indonesia when she saw a woman wearing a hat sporting Hockey Dad's logo. Amazed that anyone else had heard of them, she approached the woman

and found herself talking to the singer's mother. I

have so many questions for her, but she's going back into the show after telling me she's an engineering student at UCSD with no solid plans for doing anything cool like creating a taco making robot. (I have my obsessions.) She's just "learning to learn."

Tatiana Hazel has just wrapped up her set. It's atmospheric music with an angsty flavor, but her presence has a strength, a "fuck you" undercurrent that complements the power of her voice. I heard it when I made the short walk down Market Street from the trolley stop to the club, but seeing the performance accentuated the impact. The line for drinks is getting longer, but moves quickly. Cool names for the beverages don't sway me from my usual Diet Coke on the rocks as Remo Drive comes on. They're from Minnesota, as they remind us several times. They're also on Epitaph records,

which is owned by Bad Religion co-founder Brett Gurewitz. I find myself wondering how they got signed to that label, because the first song is about a deck being flooded and other mundane suburban concerns. Or at least that's what I surmise.

Later in the set, things get faster, a bit heavier, and the rhythm section becomes volcanic, churning with fluid intensity. The word "mercy" in lights has been on the stage during both sets — it's both the name of Remo Drive's newest album and a snarling showstopper that sets off the most polite pit I've ever seen. Still, it makes a little sense of Epitaph. Singer-guitarist Erik Paulson seems to have a thing for lights. Particularly the string of lights that drape and illuminate the floor area. Being a polite Midwesterner, he clarifies that he's not being sarcastic, that he genuinely loves string lights, before launching into a cover of The Darkness' "I Believe in a Thing Called Love" that manages to rock without the cheese of the original. I didn't see him grip his balls to hit the high notes, so it must be skill or a very well-hidden clamp.

Back out in the smoking area, I talk to Stephen and his friend Winston. They heard about Hockey Dad through friends, plus, they dig the venue. Winston shares with me his passion for helping others, a calling he's fulfilling through getting a psychology degree at UCSD. A former military member, his focus is treating his fellow vets. A pit opens up for Hockey Dad, and it's still more polite than any I've ever seen, just bigger than the one before. On my way to the front, I see a woman wearing an Iron Maiden shirt and have to comment because it matches my tattoo. Her name is Bailey, and she's recently moved here for school. She's a postgraduate student at — you guessed it — UCSD, majoring in art history, and this is her first concert. Up front, the barrier in front of the stage is bending under the collective weight of the crowd. It's a testament to people being considerate that it doesn't collapse and result in injury. It's not meant to withstand weight like that; it's made to help people form lines as they enter the venue or cross to the smoking section.

But it works. The sound is great, and I enjoyed both fantastic conversation and the short trolley ride home after a night under the open sky. Also, it turns out I too like string lights. ■

IMMORTAL BEAUTY

The greatest first symphony ever?

Every now and then, a truly underappreciated gem comes along. I have a friend who has bugged me for ages about Havergal Brian's Symphony No. 1: "Gothic." I ended up listening to it about a dozen times in a row over the course of two or three weeks.

This thing is *gigante*. It's at least 105 minutes long and requires a massive orchestra and chorus. I usually listened to it at the gym while on the stationary bike and while lifting weights. 105 minutes is the perfect length for a workout, and I have to admit that it got me pumped up while exercising. There are sections with the choir that sound like they were picked up and dropped into the Lord of the Rings movies.

Havergal Brian was an English composer born on January 29, 1876, in Birmingham. He was the son of a carpenter, just like someone else I've heard a lot about, and was introduced to music at an early age.

However, his formal education was cut short due to financial constraints, leading him to pursue various jobs. including a stint as a civil servant. It was not until he was in his thirties that Brian began to focus seriously on composition. He wrote his first symphony between 1919 and 1926. It wasn't performed until 1961, and didn't receive its first professional performance until 1966. Brian was 90 years old at that point.

Even though that 1966 performance was a smashing success, there have been only a handful of performances since then. The odds of ever hearing this symphony live are slim to none. There are also just a handful of recordings. I listened to The Slovak Philharmonia as conducted by Ondrej Lenard. I chose it because it was the first thing that showed up on Spotify.

Brian was influenced by Germanic composers such as Richard Wagner, Anton Bruckner, Gustav Mahler,

and Richard Strauss. He dedicated his Gothic Symphony to Strauss. Edward Elgar also influenced Brian. Wagner, Bruckner, and Elgar are three of my favorite composers, so it makes sense that I enjoyed this symphony.

There are some great first symphonies out there. Those by Johannes Brahms, Mahler, and Sergei Prokofiev are amongst the most popular. Ralph Vaughan Williams's first symphony is his A Sea Symphony and for decades, it was my favorite. I also considered it to be the greatest and grandest of first symphonies. I was wrong. Havergral Brian's Gothic Symphony surpasses Vaughan Williams. (I will say that the Vaughan Williams is more appealing upon first hearing it.)

Havergal Brian went on to write over 30 symphonies. Does this make him the greatest symphonist of them all? He died on August 28, 1972.



A different sort of happy

t was one of those gifts a cash-strapped cuss like myself always dreams of.

I heard about it first in 2013: this crazy eat-drinks place with World War I biplanes decorating its garden - plus old artillery and

tons of actual live ducks - set in an authentic-looking World War 1 French farmhouse, all sitting at the edge of Montgomery Field. And with an equally crazy happy hour! Crab-stuffed mushrooms with hollandaise, \$4.50. Corn chips and stew, free. Carrot

sticks on ice, free. Lasagna. Quesadilla. Veggie plates. Popcorn. Potato skins, \$3; escargots in mushroom caps, \$4. Aviator's cheeseburger and fries, \$4.50. Three sliders and fries, \$4.50. Margarita, \$3.50. Bud Light, \$2.



1918 life have been cleared away. Happily, once inside, you still get a zillion photos from when the Yankee 94th "Hat In the Ring" Squadron, aka Lafayette Escadrille, requisitioned a French farmhouse and made it their HQ for the final

this is not your daddy's happy hour. Mostly, it's about drinks. But not all. "\$5 off select bar appetizers" - which happen on Monday and Tuesday only. I check the appetizer list. At the top are "Aero pilot's buffalo wings," nine of them for



Held together by cheese

Sigh. I visited, natch, and it proved a night to remember: food, Buds, and instant buddies. A room full of genuine characters. Happy hour aficionados like George McBride, an old gent who was 86 and had just stopped flying his own plane (that he built himself). He used to land it and taxi up to a spot right outside the restaurant. The place, said George, was always crowded.

What happened? Covid happened. But it's still open, and a happy hour's still happenin'. So now I'm on the bus. We're in the zone. I see the sign: "94th Aero Squadron. Restaurant & Lounge. Open to the Public." "I've been driving this route for years," says the #60 bus driver, "and I have never thought to go in there." And yes, as I walk up, I see the three stacked wings of the Red Baron's Fokker triplane sticking out through the trees. I continue past a pile of 44-gallon drums of aviation fuel labeled "petroleum," and through to the airfield side. "Caution," says a sign by the fence. "There are rattlesnakes in this area. Rattlesnakes are active throughout the year." Good to see there's some wild life beyond the bar.

Still, in some ways, this place seems a shadow of its former self. The other ancient biplanes, the live gaggle of ducks, and various signs of

come with chopped bacon, cheddar cheese, antiboise, scallions, and sour cream cost \$14, or \$9 HH. Cheese curds with habanero aioli are \$15/\$10.

Uh, antiboise? Turns out it's a sauce made popular in Antibes, on France's Côte d'Azur, and it's basically tomatoes with olive oil dressing plus capers, garlic, toasted coriander seeds, basil, spring onions and salted anchovies. Good to go with fish and meat. Count me in on that.

So yeah, reasonable deals, although nothing like the swingin' pre-Covid days of 2013. I opt for the stuffed potato skins. Forget to ask if they get the \$5 discount. But when the three skins come — while I'm on my second \$10 Alesmith .394 draft beer and hoisting a toast to Tony Gwynn, who, let's remember, batted .394 in 1994 - I decide I couldn't ask for anything more lush. Not sure if I can pick out the sauce from Antibes, but the totality is, well, deeply satisfying. That good ol' combo of sour cream, half-leathery skins, cheese, and the tang (maybe from the *antiboise* sauce?) does it all. But my coup de foudre - since we're talking of everything French — has to be the last-minute decision to order a French onion soup au gratin (which, I'm just now realizing, means sprinkled with grated cheese, or bread crumbs, or both,

and browned). Not from the HH menu, but the regular one, under soups and salads. Only costs \$8. It comes with Parmesan and gruyère cheeses. And man oh man, they have the touch. Yes, part of it is the odd insert of a kinda-transparent cheese slice which folds under the onions, plus what looks like an egg. Quail's

egg? Grated cheese? Minced meat in its own womb? I decide to just chomp and see what happens. Have to say, deep ooh-ooh-umami flavor, starting with the onions — rich like kettle drums beating deep beneath the cheeses. That's maybe a bit high-flown, but whatever, they just give out this cold weather/hot snack flange-flaring jowl appeal.

more loaded with dinero, mainly for a wagyu burger I see Angellena hauling off to a couple of flier types who have turned up at the bar. It's a half-pound of American wagyu with spring mix, red onion, tomato, white cheddar, and aioli. Costs 29 buckeroos. So. Not cheap. But not a probbo for these two gents.



Nature starts taking back the war machine

And hey, they're buying cigars! They're on the menu. Prices range from \$19 for a Padron 2000 Maduro to \$35 for a Romeo Y Julieta Reserva (\$25). "You can smoke 'em on the patio," says one of the guys. I ain't no smoker, normally, but somehow the whole idea, here, has the whiff of this other, older world. Guess I'll have to come back for that burger, maybe a glass of port, and maybe even that Romeo.

I make a note to myself to come back a little

Dock Totals 11/24 – 11/30: 1117 anglers aboard 49 half-day to 3-day trips out of San Diego landings over the past week caught 1 bonito, 5 calico bass, 1 lingcod, 5 rock crab, 1904 rockfish, 116 sand bass, 255 sculpin, 19 sheephead, 15 spiny lobster (39 released), 176 whitefish, and 38 yellowtail.

Saltwater: La Jolla has seen a bit of late season yellowtail action this past week, through the fish are holding deeper and not boiling on the surface the way they often do. Metering for schools and presenting jigs vertically has been the best method to catch these fish, though the further south one goes along the Baja coast, the more surface action for topwater jigs and fly-lined live bait can be found.

Since most local boats shifted to deep-water rockfish along the 9-Mile Bank, the yellows have been caught more by those fishing just outside the kelp beds, especially just outside the La Jolla Reserve. Due to the bite, there have been several private boats along with a few sportboats posted up between Boomers and the La Jolla Canyon in the flats from 80 to 100 feet deep or so.

The best odds for yellowfin or bluefin tuna have been on multi-day trips south to the lower half of the Baja Peninsula, where there are still large yellowfin and bluefin being caught with regularity. Reports from *pangeros* from Bahia Asuncion to Bahia de Magdalena are mostly yellowfin averaging 50 pounds or more, while the bluefin have been further offshore and running up to and over 200 pounds.

On the local scene, the low count of lobster does not quite accurately represent the actual season:

many private boaters hoop-netting are getting limits in short order when in the right spots. The one tip I have seen working most consistently is the more bait in the hoop, the better the odds. Oily fish, such as tuna, mackerel, bonito, and sardine have been the most productive baits to attract the foraging bugs.

California spiny lobster range from the central California coast down into Mexico, with the largest concentrations off the central third of the Baja Pacific coast. Co-op commercial lobster fishermen working from San Quintin to La Bocana are having a good year so far, but getting fresh caught lobster where it is illegal to take recreationally can be tough. Most of their catch, as is the case for the California commercial operations north of the border, gets shipped to China.

While in Bahia Asuncion during the Covid outbreak, China had a temporary ban on imported lobster, and it was easier to find in the local *tiendas*, though the best way to score a few has always been to hit the launch spots and catch an incoming crew. The lobsters meant for China have to be in perfect shape, with no missing legs or antennae. Sheephead, with their powerful jaws and crushing teeth, will often nip at the lobsters in the commercial traps, or "pots." When in Mexico during lobster season, if any lobsters have had parts nipped off, there is a chance you can buy them straight off the boat for 100 to 200 pesos apiece.

As I liked to paddle out and target sheephead during lobster season in Baja, I would look for the buoys marking the lobster pots and fish close to them with crab or shrimp for bait and do very well. The lobster co-op guys always appreciated that and would gift me some of those that were fine for cooking, but not sellable to China. I stumbled onto a great recipe when

trip running out of havin Landing. A friend in the Asuncion co-op just shared that they zip-tied a tracker to a good-sized lobster to see if they became wary of the pots. That same lobster was caught in the very next set, so that question has been answered: lobsters are not very bright. They do live a long time, up to 50 years, and though most are two pounds or less, the largest California spiny lobster caught was nearly 26 pounds and close to three feet long. That was nearly a century ago. The California record is 16 pounds, 1 ounce, set in 1968.

California spiny lobsters are omnivorous and feed on a variety of prey, including fish, sea urchins, clams, mussels, scallops, sea stars, snails, worms, kelp, algae and even other lobster. Most are found offshore in depths of 50 feet during season, though they range from rocky shoreline shallows out to 200 feet or so. When spawning and out of season for commercial or recreational take, they move into shallower water of 30 feet or less where females will be "berried" with thousands of eggs. As they are highly preyed upon, only 3% of larvae live beyond the first few months and grow beyond an inch and a half in length.

A slow-growing species that molts up to 40 times during its life, a spiny lobster reaches legal size with a 3.25-inch carapace between 6 and 8 years of age. They can forage for up to a half mile per night and seek shelter by daylight, which is why we continue to catch legal-sized bugs from the same areas over time without depleting the stock drastically. Given time, a good hiding place for a lobster seeking shelter during daylight hours will be holding new arrivals. Sportfishing operations targeting lobster, such as *Patriot Sportfishing*, generally run during the evening hours and provide the hoops and bait for targeting bugs. Lobster trips run around \$100 per person. Please refer to the landings for pricing and inclusions, as well as the CDFW website for special regulations for taking California Spiny Lobster to avoid fines that can run \$5000 or more. Whether the beach, bay, lake, or offshore, they're out there so go out and get 'em!

 No doubt inspired by WKRP in Cincinnati, Esther Keim of Anchorage, Alaska, this year completed her third Alaska Turkey Bomb, the Associated Press reported. When Keim was growing up in rural Alaska, a family friend would drop turkeys to her family and others from a plane, along with newspapers and chewing gum. She started her tradition with a small plane she rebuilt with her father, and this year she dropped 32 frozen turkeys to people living beyond roads. Dave and Christina Luce live a 90-minute snowmobile ride from the nearest town. "I'm 80 years old now, so we make fewer and fewer trips," Dave said. Keim has "been a real good friend." She hopes to start a nonprofit organization to solicit donations and reach more people, with more than turkeys. "There's so many kids out in the villages," she said. "It would be cool to maybe add a stuffed animal or something they can hold."

Family Values

- An unnamed mother in Cheshire, England, was sentenced to 7 1/2 years in prison for "extreme neglect" after her 3-year-old daughter of hers was found to have been living in a drawer under a bed, the BBC reported. The mother hid the child from her siblings and even from a boyfriend, who discovered her in 2023 after hearing her cry when the mom was away. The court said she was severely malnourished, looking more like a 7-month-old baby, and had a cleft palate, matted hair and other deformities. The mother told police she had not realized she was pregnant and was "really scared" when she gave birth, calling the child "not part of the family." Judge Steven Everett said he could not "remember a case as bad as this in my 46 years."

- Three generations of a family in Palm Coast, Florida, celebrated Black Friday by shoplifting \$400 worth of cosmetics and alcohol from a Target store, the *Miami Herald* reported. A 76-year-old woman, her 54-yearold daughter and a juvenile granddaughter were arrested after a Target loss specialist saw the juvenile putting items in her backpack, police said. The two adults were charged with theft and contributing to the delinquency of a minor; the girl was turned over to her father.

Bright Ideas

- If you're fortunate enough to live in California, Ohio, Tennessee, Texas or Florida over the next couple of weeks, you can have your photo snapped while driving through Taco Bell, KTLA-TV reported. "Every day in our drive-thrus, we see moments that are so uniquely 'our fans," said Chief Marketing Officer Taylor Montgomery. Select locations will be transformed into photo booths, with some of the photos ending up on a Taco Bell commercial during the third quarter of the Super Bowl. Participating fans will need to have the TB app and scan a QR code at the drivethru. Photos will be sent to the account holder's email address. Smile!

- In Lone Tree, Colorado, on Nov. 23, police officer Jacob Tarr was busy arresting a suspect in a theft when the perp took off on foot, KY3-TV reported. Thinking fast, Tarr commandeered a kid's bike to continue the

chase, police said. "The suspect might've had a scooter, but Officer Tarr had determination, and a kid's bike," the police shared on social media. The suspect, who had three outstanding warrants, was eventually nabbed and charged with felony theft.

But Why?

- Tyler Wade Gibson, 35, and his wife, Bailey Alexus Gibson, 32, were charged with child abuse on Nov. 27 in Columbia, Missouri, after Tyler tried to perform a circumcision at home on their infant son, *Law and Crime* reported. The parents took the child to Lake Regional Hospital after being alarmed by the amount of blood; Bailey told police she was "very hesitant" about her husband doing the procedure but helped him do it. Social services went to the home on Nov. 29 and removed five children. The Gibsons are scheduled to be back in court on Jan. 28.

Animal Antics

- They say all fashion trends eventually come back around. *Science Alert* reported on Dec. 3 that orcas off the West Coast of North America have started wearing salmon as hats - again. The fad was first noticed in 1987 in Puget Sound, when orcas started balancing dead fish on their noses. Scientists believe they may be storing the food for later or "showing off," or it may just feel good. Humpback whales, for example, have been known to wear hats of seaweed. "Honestly, your guess is as good as mine," said Deborah Giles, science and research director at Wild Orca. With further study, "we may be able to gather enough information to show that, for instance, one carried a fish hat for 30 minutes or so, and then he ate it."

Least Competent Criminal

- Maybe don't record your crimes in your journal – that's the lesson just learned by Vanessa Guerra, 30, of Mankato, Minnesota. *The Smoking Gun* reported that on the same day that a 2004 Ford Freestar van was stolen, Guerra wrote in her diary: "Totally stole a car today! Something I never thought of doing." She sold the van to an auto salvage company for \$2000. As investigators closed in on Guerra as the thief, she told them she didn't know the van was stolen – but they were "able to locate a journal belonging to Guerra" that included her admission. She was charged with two felonies.

Questionable Judgment

- Amanda Joudrey LeBlanc of Blandford, Nova Scotia, found a dog sitter she liked and booked them several times over the summer, the CBC reported on Nov. 19. That is, until she discovered a video of the sitter advertising an account on OnlyFans. LeBlanc immediately recognized her own home in the background - her bathroom and her outdoor pool. She bought a subscription to the service and discovered more explicit content filmed in her house. "I am still shocked by it, to be honest with you," LeBlanc said. "Everyone can do whatever they want. I don't care. I just don't want it done in my home." The dogs were not featured in the videos.
