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

Bluff battle continues

It may be a tired topic by now but, I want to respond to the two-issue feature story writer Thomas Larsen chastising readers for their comments about the bluffs collapse civil suit ("Reader writer fends off attacks on Encinitas cliff story", Letters, Dec. 12, 2024). Larsen objects to the idea that Davis is looking for a payout, that didn't he file the suit for the money. The problem is, the settlement is substantial and I have not read that he was donating the funds to a reputable charity. That would convince me that it was indeed "about beach safety."

Asking a lifeguard on any beach where would be a good place to put down their stuff is absurd. Reasonable beachgoers shouldn't even be engaging lifeguards in any form of conversation, as it distracts them from their focus of watching the water!

I knew that even when I was a young person, and long before my own kids trained to be beach guards. Even mentioning that in a legal filing is preposterous. The

Gone to the dogs Does poochy peril mean no more shores?

On November 10-11, a rare bioluminescence event transformed the waves rolling into Ocean Beach into a neon blue spectacle. But while the glowing waves may have appeared magical to beachgoers, they posed risks to pets. According to the National Centers for Coastal Ocean Science, the algae blooms that cause the effect can make dogs sick if they roll in it, swim in discolored water, or ingest the water while playing.

Other threats to pet health are less natural. Last year, a four-year-old Weimaraner in Ocean Beach ingested several different drugs, as reported by ABC 10 News San Diego. "She was avoiding me and avoiding being touched" explained owner Kelly Wiehe. "Her pupils were dilating, and she wouldn't go outside. She wouldn't eat. She wasn't interested in drinking any water." Tests at the emergency vet revealed marijuana, methamphetamine, and Ritalin in the dog's system.

Ironically, while contaminated water can harm dogs, their waste can also cause trouble.

According to Imperial Beach's official site, pet waste entering the storm drain system can lead to excessive algae growth, depleting the oxygen that aquatic life relies on.

her dog got sick after drinking seawater at Coronado Dog Beach. "He started vomiting within a few hours and is still sick today," she reported. Paula W. added her own experience, saying her Doberman suffered diarrhea so severe that it ended up "on the walls." Katherine B. echoed these warnings, advising: "If the water isn't clean for humans, don't take your dog in."

Lamenting the lack of backcountry bike lanes

Plenty of bike and pedestrian safety features are in the works in San Diego's North County. The same can't be said for East County, where there is only one protected bike lane, according to Santee mayor John Minto — "and that's so you can make sure to get out of East County." The lane he speaks of runs along the 52 between Santee and Tierrasanta and is separated from traffic by a concrete barrier. But that's the exception. The rule for East

County bicyclists is often little more protection than skinny shoulders. Says Minto, "Most of the time, they kind of faked a bicycle lane because there wasn't enough room. So where you normally have, I think it's an average four-foot bicycle lane, I think we're lucky to get a two-foot lane."

Minto and other East County officials raised their concerns at the November meeting of the San Diego Association of Govern-

Human waste is still another matter. On

December 1, San Diego County's Beach & Bay Water Quality Program issued bacterial exceedance advisories for several coastal spots, including Dog Beach in Ocean Beach. The closure extended 300 feet south to the San Diego River outlet, sending dozens of frustrated pooches and their owners to Fiesta Island for some worry-free playtime. (Well, almost worry free. In March, a dog reportedly died after ingesting rat poison allegedly left on the island.) And just a week before that, county health officials closed Coronado beaches because of high bacteria levels.

Some dogs that visited before the clo-

HABS EFFECTS ON DOGS

Dogs may be exposed to toxins by drinking the water, eating washed up mats or scum of toxic cyanobacteria, digesting toxic fish or shellfish, and by having skin contact with water. Dogs are often attracted to algal scum odors. After leaving the water, dogs can also be affected by grooming their fur and paws.

SIGNS OF POISONING

Signs of poisoning can occur within minutes to a few hours after exposure. Common signs of poisoning include: repeated vomiting · diarrhea or bloody stool · abdominal swelling that is tender to the touch · bluish coloration of skin · stumbling, seizures, convulsions, paralysis · excessive salivation/drooling · disorientation · skin rashes

When possible, don't let your dog wade, drink the water or eat/walk in a lake or beach with a HAB. If you suspect your dog has been exposed, please

nation but the ocean itself. In August, Mike M. recounted online how his dog suffered "saltwater poisoning" at Cardiff Beach after ingesting too much seawater. The symptoms included vomiting and diarrhea, and the dog did not survive.

As of December 17, Imperial Beach remains closed due to bacteria levels that exceed health standards. These closures clash with the impression given by the accolades awarded to San Diego's dog-friendly coastal enclaves. Coronado's Dog Beach made both USA Today and iPuppee.com's lists of top 10 beaches in the U.S. list this past July, while Fiesta Island continues to top dog park charts nationwide.

ments, hoping to bring some active transportation funding to the unincorporated area."I have my mountain bike and I love to walk, "said Robin Maxson, a member of the Ramona Community Planning Group. "But I have to put everything in my car and go find a park to go do this. There is not a kid in the neighborhood who can hop on their bike or walk. That's the life of being out in a rural area. The Youth Opportunity Pass, wonderful program. Nobody can use it. You know, very few unincorporated communities have that advantage. We're going to have microtransit. Another great option. for the region will be broken into highway, rail, lagoon, bike and pedestrian improvements. TransNet is the half-cent sales tax approved by voters in 1987 to fund local transportation projects. The county relies on TransNet funding to build and maintain transportation facilities that improve road safety and promote smart growth develop-

ments to SR-78 are badly needed, but the spending of tax dollars for healthy transportation should be more spread out. It's a "very bedecked out plan," said Maxson, "but if we're going to truly be regional in how we reach out and spend the tax dollars, we're leaving the unincorporated area in the dirt, literally." Where's the safety and equity, Minto asked.

Mario Orso, head of SANDAG, said that only cities who had a Vision Zero safety plan for roads and bike lanes were able to submit proposals for grants — which meant

The North Coast Corridor will be getting 12 miles of bike paths and sidewalks with barriers that safely separate pedestrians from traffic. State Route 78, the main eastwest travel corridor between Escondido and Oceanside — which crosses through Carlsbad, Vista, and San Marcos — will see similar upgrades. And in June 2024, SAN-

DAG began construction on Phase 3 of the Inland Rail Trail; a Class I bikeway (bikeways built into roads and separated from traffic) that runs adjacent to SR-78 in Oceanside, Vista, San Marcos, Escondido, and a portion of the unincorporated county, according to an email from the SR 78 Project Team. There are also plans to begin construction in 2029 of a new bike facility on Barham Drive/ Woodland parkway in San Marcos.

A report released last month by Circulate San Diego found that the city has fallen short on its adopted goal of zero traffic deaths and serious injuries by 2025. In fact, traffic deaths have increased over the past decade. And in 2021, collisions resulting in a fatality and/or severe injury were more concentrated within central San Diego and East County.

UNDER THE RADAR

Biden drones on The recent rash of mysterious UFO sitings over New Jersey and elsewhere have some eyes turning to a La Jolla-based Poway drone maker with friendly ties to **Joe Biden** and a chilly relationship with incoming President Donald Trump. Back during his first presidential stint in the first months of 2017, Trump dissed a costly and long-troubled high-tech aircraft carrier launch system that used a catapult and was sold to the Navy by General Atomics. "It

sounded bad to me. Digital," Trump told *Time* in a May 11, 2017 interview about a tour he had made of the *U.S.S. Gerald Ford*, an aircraft carrier then nearing completion.

"You know the catapult is quite important. So I said what is this? 'Sir, this is our digital catapult system.' He said 'Well, we're going to this because we wanted to keep up with modern [technology].' I said, 'You don't use steam anymore for catapult?' 'No sir.' I said, 'Ah,


how is it working?' 'Sir, not good. Not good. Doesn't have the power. You know, the steam is just brutal. You see that sucker going and steam's going all over the place, there's planes thrown in the air.' It sounded bad to me. Digital. They have digital. What is digital? And it's very complicated, you have to be Albert Einstein to figure it out.

"And I said — and now they want to buy more aircraft carriers. I said, 'What system are you going to be?' 'Sir, we're staying with digital.' I said, 'No you're not. You're going to goddamned steam, the digital costs hundreds of millions of dollars more money and it's no good."

Two years later, Trump was still at war with the Navy and its contractors over the catapult's fate. "He kicked his old-tech obsession up a notch during his visit to Japan, telling U.S. service members he plans to order the Navy to outfit all its new carriers with steam catapults," according to a May 2019 *Politico* dispatch.


Said the president to sailors and Marines during a speech on the *U.S.S. Wasp* at

a Navy base south of Tokyo, per the account: "So I think I'm going to put an order: when we build a new aircraft carrier, we're going to use steam. We're spending all that money on electric, and nobody knows what it's going to be like in bad conditions." Subsequent calls to the White House seeking confirmation and further details of Trump's plans to ditch the Electromagnetic Aircraft Launch System, EMALS for short, were not returned, noted the



Apparently he was right; despite Trump's vows to stop the program, the digital cata-

pult didn't die, as a February 28 General Atomics news release from this year attests. Rolf Ziesing, vice president of GA's Maritime Programs was quoted as saying, "U.S.S. Gerald R. Ford, CVN 78, is the first carrier to bring the safe, efficient, and robust capabilities of EMALS and the Advanced Arresting Gear into areas of operation as part of its deployment in the Mediterranean. CVN 78 has successfully conducted 22,900



The John F. Kennedy, CVN 79, the next of the so-called Ford Class carriers, has been testing the same General Atomics-provided system since earlier this year. "EMALS can also more easily adjust power levels to launch smaller, lighter aircraft such as drones,"

reported *Popular Mechanics* in a March 7 story on the trials. And drones, as it happens, provide another huge source of government cash to GA's business.

Departing president Joe Biden has been far friendlier to General Atomics than his predecessor, going so far as to invite **Linden Prause Blue**, CEO of General Atomics Aeronautical Systems and son of **James Neal Blue**, brother of **Linden Blue**, who runs Gen-

eral Atomics, to a June 2023 state dinner at the White House for Indian Prime Minister **Narendra Modi**. This fall, a Biden-blessed deal between GA and India came to fruition. "India inked the \$3.3 billion contract with the US government for the 31 'birds' or weaponized MQ-9B Predator remotely-piloted aircraft, along with another \$520 million deal with drone-manufacturer Gencontinued on page 6

eral Atomics to set up a MRO facility here, in South Block," reported the Times of India on October 24. "The 'birds' will provide a quantum jump in the ISR (intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance) capabilities of our armed forces," an official told [Times of India]. The two unarmed drones taken on lease from General Atomics since September 2020 — one of them crashed in September — have certainly helped India keep close track of the increasing presence of Chinese warships and spy vessels in the Indian Ocean Region as well as the People's Liberation Army's build-up along the 3488-km Line of Actual Control."

Meanwhile, as the Biden administration has remained generally mum about what's going on with the unidentified drones in U.S. skies, the General Atomics factory in Poway has been cranking out new generations of its lucrative unmanned vehicles. Sky-Guardian and SeaGuardian are some of the company's latest. "SeaGuardian can stay aloft for much longer than a humancrewed aircraft, making it ideal for the long loiter times involved with surface operations or hunting subsurface targets," says a February 20



release sonobuoys — sensors that splash through the ocean surface to search for submarines — and then monitor their signals. Or it can leave that monitoring role to another aircraft or take on the duty of monitoring sonobuoys released by another aircraft, such as a naval helicopter." Adds the promotion: "The U.S. Navy, for example, has integrated the SeaGuardian into several sophisticated international exercises in the Pacific — using the aircraft to escort surface action groups, serve as a communications relay for warships and aircraft, and establish new concepts of operation against hostile submarines."

A smaller drone the company calls Sparrowhawk, coincidentally or not about the same size of those sighted over New Jersey, is also being tested. "An MQ-9B might patrol to the edge of international airspace, for instance, and then release a Sparrowhawk for a closer look over a contested island. Upon mission completion, the Sparrowhawk would return, and the larger aircraft would reel it in with [GA's] aerial recovery system."

DT: You're going to sit here at my table and eat my scallops and drink my Icelandic Glacial water and have the temerity to talk to me about fake news? *You*, Walter? You put me on the cover of your little rag as a perfectly browned Thanksgiving turkey. You



Federal government responds to county



"The border is closed. I repeat: THE BORDER IS CLOSED. There is no crisis. We have always been at war with Oceania."

Last week, the San Diego County Board of Supervisors declared a humanitarian crisis in response to the public concern over the number of migrants being dropped in San Diego County by U.S. Border Agents. "We can't continue down this path," said Supervisor Jim Desmond. "We must acknowledge the practical limits of our own capacity to meet the needs of those who arrive in our region." Desmond and fellow Supervisors then issued an urgent plea for Federal Assistance in meeting those needs.

But their request was met with confusion by the Biden Administration. "The border is closed," said Homeland Security Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas. "The border is closed," agreed Secretary of State Anthony Blinken. "President Biden has done more to secure the border than anyone," said White House Spokesperson Karine Jean-Pierre, before continuing: "In light of that, we're not sure what the Board of Supervisors is getting at. How can there be a humanitarian crisis brought on by dropped-off migrants when the border is closed? Perhaps the Supervisors were confused. Perhaps the so-called 'migrants' were merely homeless veterans in need of care. And they are in need. What is the board of supervisors doing to alleviate the homeless problem in San Diego? Frankly, I would not have expected this sort of misinformation and finger-pointing from a Democrat-dominated body. They should be ashamed of themselves, really."

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
Biden Administration begins Operation Staycation in effort to convince would-be migrants to remain in-country.



One prong of the operation involves placing vintage travel posters along the border wall in an effort to get migrants from the Northern Triangle to reconsider the virtues of the places they have left behind. Says Turnback, "I look at these images and think, 'Who wouldn't want to live there?' It's like the song says: you never know what you've got til it's gone,' or at least until it's 1600 miles behind you. Sure, there are troubles, but you know what? You can't get away from your troubles by running. Or walking, for that matter. You've got to stand and face them. Besides, it's not like we don't have troubles of our own on this side of the border fence. Sure, everybody wants to come live in a country that elected Joe Biden president, especially after he said they should come during the debates. But this is also a country that elected Donald Trump just five years ago. Clearly, we've got some issues, issues that should give anyone pause. Plus, murders are way, way up. So are suicides. You've got mass shootings, hate crimes, systemic racism... Sometimes, I'm amazed we even have to make the case for staying at home."

"The President of the United States believes that families are the bedrock of a healthy society," says Sam Turnback, head of the Biden Administration's Operation Staycation. Star of the Nativity

In the cold season, in a locality accustomed to heat more than to cold, to horizontality more than to a mountain, a child was born in a cave in order to save the world; it blew as only in deserts in winter it blows, athwart.

To Him, all things seemed enormous: His mother's breast, the

Joseph Brodsky (1940-1996) was a Russian poet who settled in America after being exiled by the Soviet regime. The Leningrad native had long defied the Communist stranglehold on Russia. Like fellow Russian exile Alexander Solzhenitsyn, Brodsky fled to America and settled in Ann Arbor, MI, before taking up teaching positions at Yale, Columbia, Cambridge and the University

of Michigan. In 1987, Brodsky won the Nobel Prize in Literature, and in 1991 he was appointed Poet Laureate of the United States. While he considered himself only "a Christian by correspondence," Brodsky wrote a poem every year for Christmas. "What is remarkable about Christmas?" he once asked. "The fact that what we're dealing with here is the calculation of life — or, at the very least, existence — in the consciousness of an individual, a specific individual."

January's mean temperature at Lindbergh Field is about 55 degrees Fahrenheit. (July's mean is a balmy 70 degrees.) To experience much colder temperatures, journey to the Cuyamacas; -1 and -4 degree readings were once recorded there — the two lowest temperatures ever recorded in the county.

Anora — Writer-director Sean Baker's latest foray into the private lives of people who make their privates public opens brilliantly, as New York City stripper/escort Anora (a gung-ho, all-in Mikey Madison) grinds her way through her daily grind, making nice with a steady procession of customers, one replacing another so seamlessly that they run together just as they must in our heroine's mind. Then, during a break, a co-worker marvels that one fellow "told me how much I reminded him of his daughter, then ordered five private

dances from me!" (The horror.) "At least he paid for the dances," replies Anora. (The banality.) That's Baker, mingling the deeply personal and the "merely" physical in ways feel moral without feeling moralistic.

Talking of which: the reason Anora (who prefers "Annie") gets picked to take care of Ivan, the young Russian playboy who shows up at her club, is that she had a grandmother who never learned English after coming over from the old country. Ivan is so taken with her attentions that he hires her for a week of sexy partytimes and whisks her off to Vegas, a city famous for its spur-of-themoment weddings. What fun! He even tells her that he'd be happy with her even without his parents' money. Annie tries not to believe him, but she doesn't have enough happy reality to counter the much happier fantasy — there's a sister (who feels like she should show up more), but no future. Small surprise when a mid-video game quickie gets interrupted by Ivan's long-suffering babysitter Garnick and his assistant Igor.

The manhunt that follows is longer than it needs to be, and even a bit indulgent, but still largely entertaining - a description which



Conclave — Director Edward Berger's adaptation of Robert Harris' novel about the election of a new pope is shot and acted as a Serious Movie: all those muted reds and saturated blacks in those lingering shots of the Sistine Chapel ceiling overhead and the embattled Cardinals below, all that anguish and intellection in the faces of Ralph Fiennes, John Lithgow, Stanley Tucci, et al. (Oh, and not a little ambition, as well: Tucci's American hopeful insists that every Cardinal, deep down, has picked out the name he'd choose for himself as pope — although it's hard to believe this applies to the humble, war-weary newcomer who arrives at the conclave's outset and announces that he was elevated in secret by the late pontiff, despite his mysterious health concerns.)

But it's scored and written as a potboiler in the mode of *The Da Vinci Code*. (No Opus Dei assassins here, but still plenty of sturm and drang about the dark forces that keep the Church mired in the Dark Ages of Latin rites and sexual rigidity, forces that are threatened by the modern virtues of doubt and openness.) The sawing strings and plunking piano that punctuate the action, the ponderous portentousness of pronouncements like, "The Church is not tradition; the Church is what we do next."

And the fact that in the end, the drama is driven not by the Cardinals' ideas and ideals, but their secret sins: the sexual puritan with a promiscuous past, the lover of Latin with a heart full of hate, etc. It's possible that the film takes itself entirely too seriously; fortunately, the viewer is under no such obligation, and may have a good time as a result. missed your only opportunity." That's Escondido's Brian Ellis, recounting his recent opening for Sacri Monti and Mondo Drag. (He's not specific about who rocked

the bikinis). Never foot-dragging when it comes to music, he took the stage at an early age. "I started playing shows when I was around 12, back when the Metaphor Cafe and the old Soma sidestage still existed," recalls Ellis. "Some highlights would be all the shows my old band Los Machos opened for The Aquabats, my side project Birdzilla headlining over Powerman 5000 at the Jumping Turtle, having a Magic 92.5-sponsored gig with my band Reflection alongside XL Middleton and Moniquea and Egyptian Lover, and hearing my name on a 92.5 commercial."

Outside San Diego, "one of my recent favorites was playing the Gathering of the Juggalos as Egyptian Lover's keyboard player. It was unbelievable to share a bill with KRS-One, Sir Mix-A-Lot, and Slick Rick, and to get invited on stage during

more than four showers."

Asked about his childhood in Escondido, Ellis emphasizes having to make your own fun. "Something about the lack of anything to do as a young person in Escondido, at least in my growing-up years, seemed to foster a unique, creative group of kids that took having fun into their own hands. It's also always felt much more inclusive and embracing as an artistic community, rather than competitive like I've seen in bigger cities. I started producing electronic music around 12 years old with MIDI, and later discovered FL Studio around 14. But I only really had one or two friends that were hip into being into old-school rap or funk at all. Producing that music when I was young always felt sort of private, like it was just for a few friends. It was so great to realize I could pursue those styles more seriously."

Ellis is a vet of local psychedelically-inclined bands such as Astra, Birth, and the Psicomagia, and he also produced EDM music under the name Brian E. His newest project is the Campus Christy album,

a collaboration with Stones Throw Records' founder Chris Manak, aka electro-rapper Peanut Butter Wolf. PBW is handling the vocals while Ellis provides the instrumentation. Ellis met PBW through the long-running old-school electro-rapper Egyptian Lover, and started working with the Wolf during Covid. PBW took "Campus Christy" from the name of his old garage band, and the project lives up to the nostalgia so implied.

"The album is a covers album," Ellis elaborates, "mostly very obscure songs

> that PBW curated. A huge part of the beauty of the record is PBW's ability to curate a playlist of tracks that very unassumingly work well together, and even create the feeling of a story or journey from start to finish. I love the idea of a collection of songs all written by different artists that feel like a cohesive singular album. I play every instrument on

the entire album, other than some percussion and a couple random solos here and there. I didn't use any samples whatsoever. I think sampling is very cool, but being a modern musician proficient in over 14 instruments, I made the decision to avoid sampling completely. I like the idea that someone 30 years from now could discover one of my records and sample it, knowing it's purely original."

Not that shaking it oldschool with the Wolf is the whole of his passion. "I have a new solo album called Lifetime Supply coming out on CQQL Records on January 24. I've been working on it for the past five or six years now. I'm always constantly working on new music in the studio. I like Bandcamp, since I can release music very quickly — music a label might not take a chance on. Unfortunately, I broke my shoulder a few weeks ago, so I will be on hiatus from playing live while I recover."

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Order amid the Christmas chaos

For the first time, in many a year, I've had George Frideric Handel's Messiah as part of my Christmas season listening regimen. At this time of year, I'm usually all about the mid-century crooners, all singing the same few songs. I'll listen to "I'll be Home for Christmas" and "White Christmas" as sung by Bing Crosby, Frank Sinatra, Dean Martin, and Nat King Cole. But this year, Messiah made a comeback.

There are two recordings of Messiah to which I subscribe. The first is the audacious reorchestration by Sir Eugen Goossens. The Goossens version uses a full modern orchestra. The effect is arotesque, but I enjoy the spectacle. Conductor Thomas Beecham's recording is the only one I know of

The recording I actually listen to is conducted by Andrew Davis, and features big-name opera singers such as Samuel Ramey and Kathleen Battle. The Davis version also uses modern instruments and performance practices. This is how I prefer Messiah.

I tried out a few of the more "accurate" versions Labsolutely hate them. They treat Handel as if he were a chamber musician. Handel was a man of the theater. His fame was built on composing Italian opera. When given the resources, he went as big as possible with his Royal Fireworks Music. He used 24 oboes, for crying out loud. There is a sense of grandeur in Messiah that period performance mavens miss. Their delicate and precious musicianship drives me crazy.

The Messiah's "Christmas" section is largely drawn from the Old Testament prophets. The opening recitative and aria for tenor are taken from Isaiah Chapter 40, as is the first chorus.

"Comfort ve, comfort ve my people, saith your God. Speak ye comfortably to Jerusalem, and cry unto her, that her warfare is accomplished, that her iniquity is pardoned. The voice of him that crieth in the wilderness, Prepare

ye the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Ev'ry valley shall be exalted, and ev'ry mountain and hill made low: the crooked straight and the rough places plain. And the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all flesh shall see it together; for the mouth of the Lord hath spoken it."

This text is all about bringing order out of chaos. The coming one will bring order to the chaos we find on earth. The more I thought about it, the more I realized that this is one of the main tenets of the Christmas season. Peace on Earth is about order. Chaos and peace

And yet, the Christmas season is often a chaotic time with crowded shopping, unholy combinations of family, and Christmas parties that get a bit too festive. I could use a bit of order. and that's what Messiah gave to me this year.



Eats at the entry

You can keep your high-end joints. This has been a night to remember.

sada! Adobada! Chorizo! Buche! Suadero! Campechano!" Pedro's blasting out from this very first cluster of

food carts south of the border. I have just had a nice welcome from Mexican Customs; they had a couple of suggestions for places to eat while the officer stamped my passport. Mainly in the Zona Rio. I think they thought I wanted to spend more money than I do.

Kinda low on the dosh these days. So I got through the rack of federales soldiers relaxedly guarding the exit into the United Mexican States, and headed out to the long path that climbs past the railway station and the tracks heading

south. Now I'm looking at the bare border hills shining gold in the sun behind, just as the fog starts to roll in. You start to pass guys offering to help you carry bags for a buck and ladies selling "welcome home" flowers, and then you arrive at one of those clangy circulating bar gates. Except it has fallen off its axis. Then you're through the replace-

ment gate, and that's where Pedro's strutting up and down, chanting his chant. "Taco taco taco! Asada! Adobada! Pollo! Chorizo! Buche y

I ask him about Buche y Suadero. Buche is pork stomach. Suadero is meat from between the belly and the leg of a cow. It's literally the "sweaty part." Hmm. Is this telling us more than we want

I had thought of looking for a molé place: nice, oozy warm food for a cold day. On the other hand, here's Pedro. And the thought of that mile of walk over to Revolucion, all the traffic...whereas right here, these sabroso smells are wafting straight out of Pedro's place, Tacos Emmanuel. When I think about it, I realize it's the first eatery in all of Latin America. I join a group of line-crossers hooped over the standingonly counter. They're mostly gouging into tacos, but also quesadillas, mulitas, sopes. Heck, it just looks so luscious. Specially eating here at the end of No Man's Land, with the hills of "Lines and Shadows" (gotta read that border book!) behind, America to one side, Mexico to the other. Oh heck. Think I'll just stop for one taco. The one Pedro keeps shouting about, campechano. "What's 'campechano'?" I ask.

"Campechano? It's a mixture of beef and pork. Muy sabroso," says Pedro. Turns out it can $\stackrel{\Xi}{\otimes}$ be many things, including flank steak, sausage, and pork cracklings. Also means a friendly open

person from Campeche state, way down south. "Is that what you want?"

Heck yes. When I think about it, there's loads

of things here I'd love to nosh on. Including the chicken being prepped by the gal next to the cook with the flying hands. She's also squeezing corn tortillas out fresh and cooking them on the hot plate. It's about three in the afternoon and I ain't eaten nut-

tin' all day. Plus, campechano costs about, hey, \$1.80. I sit down next to — think he says Ignacio. Works in LA but always goes home to — Jalisco? He's got three carne asada tacos and a glass of horchata. He sees me fiddling with my iPad, try-

> ing to get the camera to work. "Here, give it to me," he says. "I'll take you eating your campechano." And before you know, he's done it, and we're talking up a storm. Maybe it's the instant surprise of this all, this sudden Mexico, but it's turning into the most delicious food episode I've had in a long time. Next, I notice the golden bronze sausages wait-

ing just across from us. "Chorizo," says Pedro. He's slicing some meat from the al pastor rotisserie in front of the vertical flames. "Yes," I say. "And then maybe al pastor?"

I mean, all this food I think I know like the back of my hand. And yet, it's like trying it again for the first time. The chorizo is a brilliant mess, strong flavored, but not sausagey. I pile sliced radishes and salsa that they make here. They seem to make everything on the spot. Pedro's telling me how they've been seven years here, and before that, 25 years at a location nearer the northbound entrance to the border. I'm almost full when Pedro brings me a horchata, on the house. I swear, beautiful things happening! And there's something about all us guys and gals, birds of passage, standing together, facing the setting sun, filling our faces before we head on to our lives. I've spent four bucks. Turned down the adobada. Was also tempted by a hot dog stall, resisted. But now I notice out of the corner of my eye, a little elote place. I pop across to where a young guy Angel is waiting. "Elotes, esquites, tostielotes.'

"I'll have what he's having," I say. Angel is handing over a cup with a pile of corn and other colorful stuff to this customer. "Esquite?" says Angel. It turns out that esquites are corn — elote — that has been shucked from the cob. Angel piles the elote in, adds a spoonful of mayo, then a wad of mantequilla — but-

ter — and sprinkles a handful of grated cheese, sprits limón, squirts Valentino Mexican hot sauce, something called "Porpo," Tajin, some salsa and a flick of salt. Halfway through, he adds more corn. I give him two bucks and start gouging out the freshly mixed elotes. OMG. Such a delicious combo, liquid enough but full to bursting with flavor. Why have I not been eating this every day of my life?

"Taxi taxi!" shout the guys next door who are paid to fill them, them and the mini-buses that pull in here. I half want to snag one, because the sun's gone and the cold foggy breeze is whipping around my ankles, but now I notice a place across the road I've never seen before. "Blue Luna." It's a coffee place and deli, and it looks really cool. Or, actually, really warm. And sitting here, Enzo Enzo, Parisian singer and heroine of mine, sings straight from the Left Bank.

Blue Luna is part of a Mexican chain, turns out. I get a small — no, a petit coffee. Costs \$2. And not to get hagiographic here (just looked up this word online), but the coffee is dee-lish. "We

get all our coffee beans from Chiapas and Oaxaca," says Elizabeth. Lord. I want to call Diane and get her down here.

Big swell rolls in for Christmas - Rockfish closure Big wahoo down south

Dock Totals 12/15 - 12/21: 552 anglers aboard 28 half-day to 3-day trips out of San Diego landings over the past week caught 1 calico bass, 1 lingcod, 3 rock crab, 2963 rockfish, 56 sand bass, 247 sculpin, 15 sheephead, 2 spiny lobster (2 released), and 160 whitefish.

Saltwater: Rockfish continue to account for the bulk of the catch as we head into the end of the deep water season on December 31. From New Year's Day through the end of March, rockfish will be closed at all depths in the Southern Management Area until it reopens on April 1 in 50 fathoms (300 feet) or shallower. During that time, most local boats will be targeting bass, bonito, whitefish, sheephead, halibut, and maybe the occasional homeguard yellowtail off the shallow reefs, kelp edges, and sand flats. Folks wanting to catch rockfish between January and April 1 will have to hop onto a boat heading into Mexican waters on extended half-day to 3-day trips down along the northern Baja coast. or head down to Ensenada or San Quintin and hire a local pangero.

The Dolphin will be running their 8th annual Halibut Derby on Wednesdays from January until the end of April. Tickets will be \$95 per angler with \$10 of that going toward the accumulative jackpot that pays the top three fish caught during the derby. Winnings can build to a few thousand dollars for the first-place fish. Plus, it is a great opportunity to fish San Diego Bay on a big comfy boat that has great burgers and cold beer. Last year, anglers fishing the Halibut Derby in March were rewarded with a solid shortfin corvina bite. Even as crowded as America's finest city is and as much

fishing pressure as it gets, San Diego Bay can be an excellent fishery.

Anglers fishing the surf were doing well this past week for barred surf perch with a few California corbina in the mix, but a large swell rolled in by Sunday the 22nd. That swell made its way down the Pacific coast and pretty much shut down fishing in the surf and offshore for

those hoping to get a local trip in over their Christmas break. That said, both bays have been producing some decent spotted bay bass and a few nice halibut. The swell should move out within a couple days, and most half-day boats are still running daily, but it is best to contact your landing of choice for availability and any last-minute notices concerning conditions.

Long-range boats are still killing it way down south, with vellowfin and wahoo putting on a solid show on

the lower banks, while yellowtail and grouper have been the favorite targets along the Baja coast. The American Angler reported solid wahoo fishing outside of Bahia Magdalena on their last trip of 2024, with one of their anglers hauling in an impressive 95-pounder. Most boats are now in for Christmas, but a few will be running mid-range 5- to 8-day trips between Christmas and the first of the year.

Though catch totals vary year to year, 2024 has been another great one in the salt, especially for large bluefin tuna and some late season yellowfin tuna that have been above the average in size throughout the range of the fleet along the Baja coast. It did seem cooler than previous years with a La Nina type setup offshore, but the fish did not seem to mind.

Freshwater: The local lakes have been on fire for trout, largemouth bass, and catfish. Stocker trout have been hitting lures and bait with consistency, with tiny tube baits, Kastmasters, and Roostertails working best for the lures, and Powerbait in rainbow color and small Powerworms doing the trick for those using bait.

Bass have been hitting deep on just about any plastic fished low and slow along the steep edges of deeper lakes like Dixon, while catfish have been fired up by the trout activity and are biting cut mackerel and chicken livers best. So, if conditions on the ocean aren't allowing, hit up one of our great area lakes to calm your wintertime fishing jones. The days will be getting longer from now until June 21st, so whether the beach, bay, lake, or offshore, they're out there so go out and get 'em! Merry Christmas!

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
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Grinch


